NASA administrator kicks off 2023 McBrayer Lecture Series

NASA Administrator Bill Nelson will kick off Morehead State's McBrayer Presidential Lecture Series this year with his keynote address at the inaugural Appalachian Space Technology and Research Advancements Conference (ASTRA-CON) on Friday, Sept. 15, at 1 p.m. in the Adron Doran University Center (ADUC) ballroom.

Nelson was named the 14th NASA administrator on May 3, 2021. Before becoming administrator, he represented the state of Florida for 18 years in the U.S. Senate and 12 years in the U.S. House of Representatives.

In 1986, he trained and flew with the crew of the Space Shuttle Columbia. They orbited Earth 98 times over six days, and Nelson conducted 12 medical experiments, including the first American stress test in space on a treadmill and cancer research.

ASTRA-CON will be held Sept. 14-16 at Morehead State. The conference aims to create a space for collaboration between aerospace companies, space research institutions, and students. The event will feature speakers, student presentations, discussion groups, workshops, exhibitor booths, and more.

Space Science Center Executive Director, Dr. Ben Malphrus, said students have played a key role in creating the conference.

"ASTRA-Con is student-led and student-invented. Everyone from students to Space Science Center staff to university officials here at Morehead State University has had some role in planning, organizing, and hosting ASTRA-Con," Malphrus said. "We couldn't be more excited to give our students this networking experience and a chance to listen to professionals in the field and hope to foster a future of success through this conference. Anyone interested in space, the aerospace industry, or high-tech economic development in the region has a reason to attend."

The McBrayer lecture series is named in honor of MSU alumnus W. Terry McBrayer (Class of 59), who gave the University a generous gift supporting the lecture series and

student scholarships. McBrayer was a lobbyist, attorney, and former politician in Lexington. He was a senior partner and lead lobbyist for the McBrayer, McGinnis, Leslie, and Kirkland law firm. McBrayer was a native of Greenup County, and in addition to graduating from MSU, he also attended the Brandeis School of Law at the University of Louisville. He was elected to the MSU Alumni Hall of Fame in 1966 and was awarded an honorary doctoral degree in 1975.

From having the opportunity to work in the gallery through my Undergraduate Research Fellowship, I was able to be exposed to arts administration and all the opportunities to support artisans and makers that come with that," Lowe said. "The professors in the art department were the most supportive people. They truly rooted for my success and gave me tools to become the artist I am today."

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Former MSU President Dr. Morris Norfleet dies

Former Morehead State University President Dr. Morris Norfleet passed away Thursday, Aug. 31, 2023, at the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital Jean Waddle Care Center at 92.

Norfleet was inaugurated as MSU's eighth president in 1977 and served until 1984. Before serving as president, Norfleet worked for 26 years as an administrator, starting his MSU career as the director of student teaching in 1962 and later becoming the vice president of research and development. During his tenure, he served as a special consultant of corporate relations for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and as chair of the Jesse Stuart Foundation Board of Directors.

Morris graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1952 and began teaching in Spiceland, Indiana. He then obtained his Doctor of Philosophy from Purdue University in 1962.

Norfleet was a faithful Christian who served as a church deacon and a Sunday school teacher. He participated in numerous mission trips to Russia, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Djibouti, Brazil, and eastern Kentucky. In 2006, he received the Missionary of the Year award in Kentucky.

Morris is survived by his wife of more than 70 years, Loistene Tarter Norfleet; a son, Douglas Lee (Lora Lee) Norfleet of Nancy; a grandson, Brandon Lee Norfleet of Nashville, TN, and a granddaughter, Ashley Elizabeth Norfleet of Louisville.

At 1 p.m., Thursday, Sept.7, a funeral service will be held at the Chapel of Morris and Hislope Funeral Home with Bro. John Piercy officiating. Interment will be in the Norfleet Cemetery.

A visitation will be held after 10 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 7, at Morris & Hislope Funeral Home.

To honor her memory and love for animals, Colclough's mother, Elizabeth, created a generous scholarship fund at Morehead State. The timing of the scholarship coincided with her late daughter's 30th birthday.

"I am honored to be able to help students with their educational journey," Elizabeth said. "Emily's love for animals was an important part of her life. She was such an upbeat and positive light in the world. She was once described as lighting the room up on the darkest of days. I hope that this scholarship brings a bright light to the students that it supports. Celebrating her legacy and providing scholarships in her name to others who love animals is something that is so special to me."

This scholarship supports juniors and seniors pursuing a veterinary sciences or veterinary technology degree. Applicants must be from MSU's 22-county service region and have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above.

The 2023-24 scholarship recipient is Annika Weaver, a veterinary science major from Richmond.

"I have always had an interest in science," Weaver said. "Animals, in particular, are fascinating and important to our daily lives. I am honored to receive this scholarship as it will have a tremendous impact on my education."

"The theme of the exhibition explores the diverse and complicated ways in which we engage with skepticism and belief in the pursuit of knowledge," said Anthony Meade, director of the Morlan Gallery. "Skepticism, at its core, is a mode of questioning and doubting, a demand for evidence and rigorous inquiry. It is a powerful tool for exposing biases and challenging authority for good or for ill."

Mesa-Gaido will display two installations and multiple pieces from her personal "Then and Now Series." The artwork touches on the unfavorable conditions in her parents' home country of Cuba, the oppressive history of its government, and the aid offered by everyone from individual U.S. citizens to international organizations to assist the Cuban people during trying times.

"I've truly immersed myself in Appalachian and folk music through KCTM. I've learned about the rich tradition of folk music and musicians as storytellers," says Peterman. "I love telling my stories, and I want to share the stories of musicians."

Working as a student news reporter and audio announcer at MSPR since 2022, Peterman is thankful for the opportunity to host her own weekly music radio program.

"I didn't realize these opportunities existed. I'm so grateful to all my mentors and friends at MSPR and KCTM," she said. "I especially wish to thank Michelle Wallace (retired host of Bluegrass Sunday) for mentoring me through this process."

Peterman looks forward to carrying on the rich tradition of locally-hosted music programs on MSPR by presenting a wide array of acoustic-based Americana music on "Pickin' Parlor."

"I have a special appreciation for the entire folk and acoustic umbrella, so I hope to feature a wide variety of acoustic music," says Peterman. "I hope to share classic songs, ballads, and regional singers and songwriters, tunes from the 18th century to today, and everything in between."

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Alum and poet Willie Carver to visit MSU

A Kentucky poet and former educator will visit Morehead State for a poetry workshop, reading, and book signing on Tuesday, Sept. 19.

Willie Carver (Class of 2006 and 2010) will hold a poetry workshop in Breckinridge Hall, room 217, from 2 to 4 p.m. He will have a discussion and book signing from 4:30 to 6 p.m. in the Adron Doran University Center theater, featuring his new work, "Gay Poems for Red States." Carver will read from his collection of queer narrative poetry and will discuss hope as a necessary concept in meaningful, community-based advocacy. He will discuss his experiences winning Teacher of the Year, testifying before the U.S. Congress, leaving K-12 education, and advocating for some of Kentucky's most vulnerable youth.

Carver earned a bachelor's degree in English and French literature and culture from MSU in 2006, a master's degree in French and English teaching in 2010, and has completed post-graduate work in English language and literature.

In addition to being named Teacher of the Year, Carver was named the 2022 Kentucky Department of Education Teacher Ambassador and recipient of the 2021 University of Kentucky Teachers Who Make a Difference Award.

"People will have the opportunity to enjoy poignant poetry, meet the 2022 Kentucky Teacher of the Year, and reflect upon LGBT lives in red states," said Dr. Bernadette Barton, director of the gender studies program at MSU.

The event raised nearly \$7,000 to help create the new scholarship.

Dr. Kenney was instrumental in the early successes of the regional campus and served as its first director. She served as director from 2003 to 2014. Before that, she was a professor of communication and chair of the then-named Department of Communication and Theatre at MSU.

During the surprise announcement, she received a plaque to honor her devoted service to the MSU at Mt. Sterling campus. The Dr. Janet Kenney Scholarship Endowment is for students studying at MSU at Mt. Sterling.

Sterling family," said Rick Hesterberg (Class of 1980), vice president for University Advancement. Art Professors Gary and Lisa Mesa-Gaido chosen for ArtPrize international exhibition

Morehead State University art faculty will exhibit at the ArtPrize in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

The international art competition and exhibition chose MSU Professors of Art Gary Mesa-Gaido and Lisa Mesa-Gaido to display their work in the Grand Rapids Community College (GRCC) Art Gallery. They will show their work during the ArtPrize competition from Sept. 14 through Oct. 1.

ArtPrize is an independent art competition that highlights and celebrates international artists across all mediums and displays art in various locations around the city.

Gary will exhibit a digital animation, "String Theory Series Part 2." His vision statement describes the eight-and-a-half-minute digital animation with audio attempts to provide a visual representation of the quantum physics concept of String Theory.

"I am inspired to visualize this theory, not literally, but through invention and experimentation," he said. "I use trial and error techniques as well as variations on themes with digital tools to create purely digital images, and through built-in algorithms, edit, manipulate, and process those images to create snapshots of the conceptual representation of the theory."

Gary previously exhibited work during the 2022 ArtPrize competition and art showcase and was the Juried Awards Digital Winner for his entry "Deviations of a Gothic Arch Part 2." This honor included a \$10,000 prize.

Lisa will exhibit her installation, "Pandemic Clouds," which was made possible with help from the Kentucky Arts Council. The installation was created with textiles from countries worldwide, speaking to the global reach of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"These make connections between the fear of a virus made up of particles, too small to be seen, with the joy of an expansive skyscape - the outdoors being a way to escape our protective enclosures while safely engaging with others at a distance," Lisa said in her artist statement.

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Craft Academy service project advances with 'Music on the Green'

Students from Morehead State's Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics are seeing their work on a service-learning project pay off with the launch of the Music on the Green concert series at the Hazel Green Academy (HGA).

The Craft Academy students on the HGA Leadership Team have been working on restoring HGA's campus in Wolfe County for the past two years. Their goal is to transform the campus into a vibrant educational outreach and community center while preserving its cultural significance and history.

Music on the Green is a community engagement initiative held on the HGA campus. The event will be held every Thursday from Sept. 14 to Nov. 9, from 6 to 8 p.m. The concerts and restoration project aim to attract tourism and raise funds to breathe new life into the community. The restored auditorium will be a venue for musicians, open mic nights, food trucks, concessions, and outdoor field day activities.

Admission to the event is free, but donations are welcome.

"Music on the Green not only seeks to entertain and engage attendees but also to preserve and revive the historical significance of HGA and its surroundings," wrote Dr. Rachel Rogers, visiting assistant professor of research/QEP at the Craft Academy. "The talented musicians who grace the stage will help drive momentum toward rebuilding this once-vibrant community. By showcasing the area's unique cultural heritage and offering a memorable experience to visitors, Music on the Green hopes to attract the attention and support necessary to restore Hazel Green's former glory."

Founded in 1880, the HGA was a residential academy where students learned about STEM, art, history, and religion. At its peak, the academy was accredited by the Kentucky Board of Education and focused on science and mathematics, like the Craft Academy. The HGA closed in 1983, and the remaining buildings have fallen into disrepair. The Craft Academy project aims to restore the buildings to create a community educational outreach center.

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Lacefield creates first endowed scholarship for space science

Eugene Lacefield has always had his sights set on outer space. He asked his mother for a telescope for his 11th birthday. She promised him one, but only if he read 11 books first.

Lacefield dove into science fiction, read 11 books and kept going. Since then, he has been fascinated by space exploration and extraterrestrial life.

Lacefield hopes to support other young minds interested in the field by creating a new scholarship endowment at MSU: The Eugene Lacefield Space Studies Endowment. Thanks to his generous \$100,000 contribution, future generations of MSU students will continue to shoot for the stars.

Lacefield, a graduate of the University of Kentucky and a longtime resident of central Kentucky was familiar with MSU's space science program. When a special edition of Kentucky Living magazine arrived in his mailbox, he chose to build an authentic connection between the program and himself.

The Lunar IceCube cube satellite, which was part of NASA's Artemis I mission, landed the MSU space systems engineering on the cover of the magazine. The cover story shared the impressive developments and learning opportunities at MSU's Space Science Center. Lacefield was fascinated to read that MSU's space systems engineering program was taking off for the moon.

The story was just what Lacefield needed to decide to sponsor a scholarship at a Kentucky university. His interest in space and the opportunities Morehead State was providing gave him the final nudge to turn his thoughts into action.

"Space exploration is the wave of the future. We can only see a glimpse of the opportunities the future holds," says Lacefield. "Seeing an increase in space exploration and education for our youth puts a smile on my face, and I'm happy to support the MSU space science program."

Lacefield's contribution created the first endowed scholarship specifically for space systems engineering students. The Eugene Lacefield Space Studies Endowment will provide annual scholarship awards to junior and senior students enrolled full-time in the Bachelor of Science in Space Systems Engineering program or graduate students enrolled in the Master of Science in Space Systems Engineering program.

"The Eugene Lacefield Space Studies Endowment is a great example of true philanthropic spirit," said Rick Hesterberg, vice president for University Advancement. Students gain cultural enrichment and career preparation through Education Abroad

Morehead State University offers many experiences outside the classroom so its students can get the skills and expertise needed to pursue their passion and unlock their potential.

For one of those programs, students are gaining cultural and academic experience through MSU's Education Abroad program.

The Education Abroad program has allowed students to study internationally at a university or complete an internship in another country. The program cooperates with the Kentucky Institute for International Studies (KIIS) and the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad (CCSA). Through these partnerships, MSU students can travel to 25 countries, covering Canada, Mexico, several countries in Central America and South America, and overseas experiences ranging from London and France to Japan and South Korea. The Education Abroad experiences can last as short as a Spring Break, a month in the summer or an entire semester.

Ava Winstel, a senior from Fort Thomas, and Lakole Fields, a senior from Grayson, are education majors who participated in Education Abroad during spring break last year. MSU education students went on a 10-day trip to a non-English-speaking school in Vila Velha, Brazil. The practicum experience was at a large P-12 school teaching Brazilian students how to improve literacy skills in the English language.

"One of my favorite highlights of the trip was going to the school for the first time and being greeted by the sweetest students and staff. They would crowd around us just to take us in and hear us speak English. Every time we would come and leave the school, everyone would wave and want to take pictures of us," Winstel said. "The students would individually thank us for coming to their school, talking to them, and wanting to experience what they experience every day." "I learned so much more than I ever expected from this trip. I honestly thought just being able to go to Brazil and be on the beach would be the highlight of my trip, but actually going to the school was my absolute favorite part of the trip," Fields said. "Getting to interact with the students and teach them about America was something I will never forget."

Dr. Gera Nelson, assistant professor of early childhood, elementary and special education, was one of the MSU faculty members who accompanied students on the Brazil trip, and it was her first Education Abroad experience.

"I was initially apprehensive about the MSU students getting too frustrated about the language barriers. However, our students improvised with Chromebooks and navigated the communication and teaching tasks with an incredible ease," Nelson said. "In the end, our students expressed their satisfaction with their ability to communicate with the students in Brazil and succeed teaching their lessons."

Aaron Hirsch, coordinator of Education Abroad, said that while the program has always had cultural and educational benefits to students, the focus has shifted to making students more career-ready. Since becoming a part of MSU's Center for Career Development and Experiential Education, almost every Education Abroad experience will count as a Level UP course where students can gain certification in one of five desirable career skills for potential employers.

"Lots of students would go on programs that might fit their personal interest but not necessarily their academic or career interests," Hirsch said. "We try to promote it on the impact it is going to have on your career moving forward. We're just trying to get you the most benefit for your financial investment."

Hirsch points out one of the benefits of Education Abroad can be a cost-beneficial choice when it comes to internships or practicums. Many internship opportunities are in larger Kentucky cities like Lexington, Louisville, or Frankfort. Since many MSU students are from the Eastern Kentucky service region, the cost to complete these internships adds up when you factor in travel expenses like food and gas or housing. For the same price, students can sometimes complete their internship or practicum while traveling internationally, whether they are a social work student getting work experience in Spain or an education student completing their practicum in South Korea.

If students qualify for a Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship, their Education Abroad experience could be cost-free. This prestigious scholarship is the U.S. Department of State's grant program, allowing students in need of financial support the opportunity to study and intern abroad. Hirsch said this past year, the Education Program awarded \$100,000 in scholarships through the Gilman Scholarship last year, "and we expect to be over that for the coming year." Students eligible for Pell Grants are also eligible for the Gilman Scholarship. Hirsch said 12 students were Gilman Scholars last year, and the program aims to reach 20 Gilman Scholars per year to continue their education abroad. "That is our biggest growth component for us is low-income students. Those are the student population growing the most for traveling abroad for us," he said. "A lot of students think of finance as the biggest barrier. There are a lot of ways we work to get around that barrier."

As more college students are looking for ways to obtain real-world experience and career-ready skills while standing out to potential employers, MSU's Education Abroad program can provide all those with the added possibility of cultural enrichment and international perspective.

"To anyone considering the Education Abroad program, just do it. I would go again in a heartbeat," Fields said. "I made so many memories on this trip that I will never forget. I formed better relationships with my classmates and formed new relationships with the students in Brazil. When I think about how hesitant I was about going initially, I am so glad I did not talk myself out of going. I honestly cannot say enough good things about this program and the mentors who went on the trip with us."

Making a good first impression on a potential employer at the Career Fair is a great first step in the right direction."

Students should do a bit of preparation to make the most of their time at the Career & Internship Fair:

- Dress the part. Make sure to dress professionally, as potential employers will take you more seriously when you make a solid first impression. If you need a suit or business jacket, visit the Suit Bank in the MSU's Center for Career Development and Experiential Education. If you find something you like, you can have it without charge.
- Bring copies of your resume and have an introduction prepared to serve as what Boone calls your "30-second commercial."
- Research the companies and schools in attendance and be prepared with questions to ask them. Kayla Harrison, director of talent management at St. Claire HealthCare, puts it well: "When you come to the Career & Internship Fair, have your resume ready in a concise and easy-to-read format. Be prepared to introduce yourself and have some basic knowledge of our organization. This allows us to focus the time we have together on getting to know your strengths and accomplishments. Use the event as a chance to inform yourself, so don't hesitate to ask the recruiters what they are looking for in an intern or employee. We are so excited to meet you and learn about you."
- Expand your network. It is always early enough to explore industries and start building your network. You could be that student who walks out of the Career & Internship Fair with an offer to interview for a fantastic opportunity that you did not know existed. Many MSU graduates return to campus to recruit talent and are eager to assist current students in achieving career goals. "There are many advantages to attending the fair, from making your name known to employers and graduate schools in your field to getting comfortable interacting in a professional setting," Boone said.

Morehead State hosts annual Constitution Day events

Morehead State University's Department of History, Philosophy, Politics, Global Studies and Legal Studies is again sponsoring several events in honor of Constitution Day.

On Monday, Sept. 18, there will be a presentation on both the recently concluded and upcoming terms of the Supreme Court (i.e., the 2022-23 term and the upcoming 2023-24 term). Assistant Professor of Legal Studies David Grise and C.J. Nunley, staff attorney for Legal Aid of the Bluegrass, will serve as panelists highlighting important constitutional cases from last year and previewing the constitutional cases on the docket for the upcoming year. The event will occur in Room 310 of the Adron Doran University Center (ADUC).

On Tuesday, Sept. 19, a public reading of the U.S. Constitution will be at the Little Bell Tower at noon. Assistant Professor of Political Science Dr. Jason Adkins will lead the reading.

On Wednesday, Sept. 20, there will be a public lecture by Judge Cole Adams Maier, Chief Circuit Judge, Kentucky's 25th Judicial Circuit, titled "The Constitution, Law and the Judiciary." It will be at 12:30 p.m. in Rader Hall, Room 112.

On Thursday, Sept. 21, the presentation "The Supreme Court as Constitutional Guardian: A Reassessment" will examine the Supreme Court's role in American government and society. Topics discussed will include what the Supreme Court does, what it should do, and how it fulfills its role as constitutional guardian today, placing that in some historical context. Panelists will include Assistant Professor of History Dr. Benjamin Fitzpatrick from History, Associate Professor of Philosophy Dr. Charles Prusik, Political Science Lecturer Dr. Erik Lewis, and Assistant Professor of Political Science Dr. Douglas Mock. Associate Professor of History Dr. Tom Kiffmeyer will be the panel's moderator. It takes place from 6 to 8 p.m. in Room 329 of ADUC.

"Constitution Day - September 17 - celebrates the remarkable governing document that was signed on that date in 1787 in Philadelphia. At Morehead State, we have a long

tradition of a week of activities, including public lectures, panel discussions, and a Supreme Court review, and we've strived both to make these events reflective of current discussions in the public square and to lead those discussions into new territory," Mock said. "Our week of activities this year continues and builds on that tradition. All are welcome and encouraged to come to these public events. We seek to contribute to the civic education of the community and to provoke thought, but these events will also be fun and well worth your time."

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NASA administrator Bill Nelson speaks at MSU

NASA Administrator Bill Nelson was the keynote speaker at the inaugural Appalachian Space Technology and Research Advancements Conference (ASTRA-CON) on Friday, Sept. 15.

Rep. Hal Rogers (R-KY) introduced Nelson and announced that he requested nearly \$10 million in funding for MSU satellite tracking operations in the next federal budget. Rogers said it's important to support the potential of students.

"As I look around this campus, I wonder if I'm looking at the next Sally Ride, or Neil Armstrong, or the other heroes of NASA's space exploration programs," he said.

Nelson was named the 14th NASA administrator in 2021. Before becoming administrator, he represented the state of Florida for 18 years in the U.S. Senate and 12 years in the U.S. House of Representatives. His lecture kicked off the 2023-24 McBrayer Presidential Lecture Series at MSU.

In addressing the students at the event, Nelson discussed MSU's involvement in NASA's Deep Space Network and its satellite tracking operations, saying students here are at the forefront of the next phase of space exploration.

"You are the Artemis generation," Nelson said, referencing NASA's Artemis moon missions. "These are some of the exciting things that are happening right here at Morehead State, and you're a part of that."

Nelson also answered questions from students in the audience about his experiences and the future of space exploration.

The conference aimed to create a space for collaboration between aerospace companies, space research institutions, and students. It featured speakers, student presentations, discussion groups, workshops, exhibitor booths, and more.

The McBrayer lecture series is named in honor of MSU alumnus W. Terry McBrayer (Class of 1959), who gave the University a generous gift supporting the lecture series and student scholarships. McBrayer was a lobbyist, attorney, and former politician in Lexington. He was a senior partner and lead lobbyist for the McBrayer, McGinnis, Leslie, and Kirkland law firm. McBrayer was a native of Greenup County, and in addition to graduating from MSU, he also attended the Brandeis School of Law at the University of Louisville. He was elected to the MSU Alumni Hall of Fame in 1966 and was awarded an honorary doctoral degree in 1975.

With funding from the national grant program, MSU will work with Complete College Accelerator to conduct assessments of institutional performance, build data capacity, and develop and implement strategies to improve student outcomes. MSU's participation in Complete College Accelerator will allow access to innovations and best practices from other Accelerator systems and institutions and enable the University to share its findings with other institutions.

"While persistence and retention are finally returning to pre-pandemic levels at both twoyear and four-year institutions, there are troubling gaps in access, completion, and career outcomes that continue to persist for students from underserved communities," said Yolanda Watson Spiva, Ph.D., president of CCA. "As institutions and economies continue to shift following the pandemic, taking action now is critical to long-term success. Through the Complete College Accelerator, these 11 states and more than 80 participating institutions will build their capacity to scale, implement, and sustain evidence-based practices that improve college completion rates for all students. We are proud to partner with Morehead State University on this effort."

Dr. Lisa Shannon assists with grant for Mountain Comprehensive Care Center

Morehead State University Professor of Social Work Dr. Lisa Shannon has again contributed to a grant that will benefit the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-05), Congressman Brett Guthrie (KY-02), and U.S. Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) recently announced the first Comprehensive Opioid Recover Centers (CORC) grant. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services awarded an \$850,000 grant to the Mountain Comprehensive Care Center (MCCC) in Prestonsburg.

The MCCC's mission is to provide complete treatment and recovery support services to those affected by substance abuse, particularly opioid use disorder. The center is the first grantee for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Comprehensive Opioid Recovery Center program in the Commonwealth.

"Mountain Comprehensive Care Center is proud to be the first grantee for the Comprehensive Opioid Recovery Center program in the Commonwealth. This grant will allow us to provide treatment for substance use disorder to persons whose insurance coverage is not sufficient for the treatment required," said Promod Bishnoi, CEO of MCCC. "These funds will create meaningful impact in the community through expanded availability of treatment. We thank Congressman Rogers for his continued dedication to the issue of opioid recovery in eastern Kentucky."

Shannon was an evaluator of the grant, helping write the evaluation section and will serve as the lead evaluator for the project. Both MSU and MCCC collaborate on the grant, with MCCC collecting data and MSU taking that data to enter, analyze, and report to stakeholders and interested parties.

Shannon said the application process was highly competitive, with SAMHSA forecasting only two awards. The project intends to develop comprehensive opioid recovery centers in Kentucky.

"I am excited that MSU and I have the opportunity to be involved in this project, as it is much needed and will hopefully provide recovery services/resources for many areas of Kentucky that have been devastated by the opioid epidemic," she said.

Morehead State soars in nationwide social media rankings
