Morehead State students win multiple vocal competitions

Four Morehead State University music students were winners at two different vocal competitions this past November.

Campbellsville University hosted both competitions. On Nov. 11, Mason Pack, a junior music major from Louisa, won the Bluegrass Young Artist Music Theater competition of the Kentucky Music Teachers Association. Alura Schaum, a sophomore history major from Cynthiana, and Eli Campbell, a sophomore vocal performance major from Ashland, earned Honorable Mentions in the Bluegrass Young Artist Classical Competition.

On Nov. 17 and 18, MSU singers competed against nearly 200 singers from around the state in the Kentucky auditions of the National Association of Teachers of Singing. Ashley Vela, a freshman music major from Lexington, won the Freshman Women Classical division. Schaum won in Sophomore Women Classical and Sophomore Women Music Theatre divisions. The students will compete at the Mid-South Regional auditions at Tennessee State University in March.

"It is wonderful to see how our students can stack up against the powerhouse schools throughout the state of Kentucky," said Dr. Roma Prindle, professor of voice at MSU.

Morehead State students share Kentucky history through Level UP courses

Through its Level UP program, Morehead State University prepares students for career success by ensuring they have multiple opportunities to apply what they learn in the classroom in real-world settings throughout their undergraduate years. MSU students recently gained valuable experience while helping preserve and share Kentucky's history.

In the Level UP course titled "Language Arts for Early Elementary," Assistant Professor of Early Childhood, Elementary and Special Education Dr. Gera Nelson had her students complete a collaborative service-learning project with Tilden Hogge Elementary School to enhance their teamwork skills.

"This collaboration has so many benefits to our students. It allows our students to refine their teamwork skills in a real-world educational setting, fosters a sense of civic responsibility, and builds experiences for their resume that show they are effective teachers," Nelson said.

MSU students had the opportunity to volunteer at the school's recent Kentucky History Night, where they worked in teams to develop a lesson complete with an informational display board and hands-on activities. The student's projects featured various activities designed to bring Kentucky's history to life. These activities included constructing Kentucky's state bird, the cardinal, using feathers and a paper plate, building Fort Boonesborough with popsicle sticks, and simulating coal mining in tubs.

"Our students and families enjoyed the hands-on educational activities and displays that the MSU students prepared to go along with our theme of Kentucky history," said Tilden Hogge Elementary School Principal Jessica Elliott (Class of 2009). "We appreciate the partnership as it's a great way for our students to learn a little more, our future MSU educators to experience a successful family involvement and engagement event, and partnerships to be fostered between families and outside agencies to allow for a more all-encompassing experience and environment for our students."

MSU student Isabella Gilvin, a junior elementary education major from Dover, also sees the benefits to her career development.

"It was so much fun interacting with students and their families. As an upcoming senior at Morehead State University, I value the opportunity to use my family engagement strategies in a rural area before I start teaching," she said.

"Level UP courses and service-learning projects not only benefit the community but also enrich the educational journey of our students," said Andrew Sexton (Class of 2020 and 2022), coordinator of service learning.

Morehead State University honored approximately 400 graduates at ceremonies on Dec. 9.

Graduates celebrated their academic accomplishments with family, friends, loved ones, faculty, staff, and members of the Eagle Nation, both past and present. It included congratulations from MSU President Dr. Jay Morgan.

The ceremony honored graduates of the Caudill College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, the Elmer R. Smith College of Business and Technology, the College of Science, and the Ernst and Sara Lane Volgenau College of Education.

Isaiah Davis (Class of 2023) of Fort Worth, Texas, was the student speaker representing the Elmer R. Smith College of Business & Technology. Morehead State students gain valuable experience through local mock interviews

Morehead State University prepares students for career success, including successfully completing one of the first steps to employment.

MSU's Center for Career Development and Experiential Education partnered with the School of Business Administration so students could participate in mock interviews with local business community members. On Monday, Nov. 6, Dr. Christy Trent, instructor of business communication and management, hosted eight employers in her three Business Communications classes to conduct mock interviews with over 100 students. Trent had the students choose a team with an industry focus that matches their career goals, such as construction, real estate, finance, insurance, sports marketing, accounting, small business management, entrepreneurship, hospitality, and sales. The classes are part of the Level UP program, which helps students develop specific career skills.

The 22-student teams researched real-world internship opportunities and prepared resumes and cover letters. Students also had the chance to use the center's free Suit Bank to obtain professional clothing. On the day of the mock interviews, students dressed professionally and came with materials for their mock interview sessions.

Each employer had a rubric to provide direct feedback to individual students, scoring them on professional appearance, ability to answer questions using the STAR (Situation, Task, Action, Result) method, and interpersonal skills. This experience refined their communication and interpersonal skills and honed their ability to navigate the complexities of business interactions.

Belinda Stafford from Eastern Kentucky Power Cooperative (EKPC) noted the students' "maturity at this point in the game, and their ability to communicate in the manner they did with a complete stranger was impressive."

"This mock interview event offers a practical experience that prepares our students for future internships, graduate school, and job interviews in professional fields," Trent said.

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41 students earn Adobe Certification during fall semester

Students in Morehead State's Caudill College of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences earned an impressive 41 Adobe Certified Professional certifications during the Fall 2023 semester.

Three students earned exceptionally high marks on the exams. Dustin Lewis, a junior convergent media major from Stopover, earned a perfect, 1000/1000 score on the exam, which earned him the top score at MSU and placed him among the top scorers nationally. Senior Art Major Cal Leadingham from Flatwoods and Mercedes Mason, a senior convergent media major from Flemingsburg, each scored 984/1000 on the Visual Design Using Photoshop exam, placing them among the top scorers nationwide.

The total certification numbers for the semester are as follows:

- Twelve students earned certification in Visual Design using Photoshop.
- Three students earned certification in Graphic Design and Illustration using Illustrator.
- One student earned certification in Print & Digital Media Publication using InDesign.
- Eighteen students earned certification in Digital Video using Premiere Pro.
- One student earned certification in Multiplatform Animation using Animate.
- One student earned certification in Web Authoring using Adobe Dreamweaver.
- Three students earned certification as a Visual Design Specialist (earned by a student who has passed the Illustrator, InDesign, and Photoshop exams).
- One student earned certification as a Video Design Specialist (earned by a student who has passed the Premiere Pro, After Effects, and Photoshop exams).
- One student earned certification as a Web Design Specialist (earned by a student who has passed the Premiere Pro, Animate, and Photoshop exams).

"The fact that our students were able to achieve these types of scores really speaks to the quality education that is built into our programs," said Tony Glover, certification program coordinator for the Caudill College.

"There is no better way to level up a student than to have them obtain a great degree that prepares them for the future, then top that off with industry-standard certifications that make their resume stand out even more. I want to say thanks to all the faculty, staff, and especially the students for putting in all the hard work and dedication to their craft which made this achievement possible."

Morehead State alum awarded grant to help student-athletes E

Dr. Jamaal Jackson (Class of 2023) is a graduate of Morehead State's Doctor of Education in Adult and Higher Education Leadership program. He's applying the skills he learned in the program to help student-athletes succeed on and off the court.

Jackson is the head men's basketball coach and deputy director of athletics for external operations at Kentucky State University (KSU) and his innovative approach to helping student-athletes has been awarded the KYNETIC (Kentucky Network for Innovation & Commercialization) Cycle 8 Grant.

Jackson led an effort to create a groundbreaking e-learning tool tailored for the departmental staff for college or university athletic programs.

The tool consists of modules designed to pinpoint and address graduation barriers faced by Black male student-athletes, including mental health challenges, and offering valuable guidance for helping students in overcoming these obstacles. The KYNETIC Cycle 8 Grant will support Jackson and others as they work to develop and introduce the product to the marketplace.

"The KYNETIC team helped me through every step, and being awarded the grant is just the beginning for me and my team," Jackson said. "We hope to develop our e-Learning tool and successfully market it to institutions throughout the nation, not just for use in athletics, but for all different student populations.

Jackson said many of the skills and approaches he uses to be a leader on and off the basketball court came during his time at MSU.

"The relationships built with my diverse cohort were very helpful in helping me through the process of earning the Ed.D. degree and will be very helpful as I continue to grow professionally," Jackson said. "The ideas that were shared, stories about different paths, why's, and backgrounds, along with the need to constantly motivate each other, is something that I'll never forget."

"The Morehead State University doctoral program is proud of Dr. Jackson's accomplishment," said Dr. Timothy Simpson, director of the MSU Doctoral Program. "He had the ability to recognize a problem facing student athletics, design a solution in collaboration with others to support students and staff, and the tenacity to see the solution to reality. Dr. Jackson is an excellent representative of our program's desire to create educational leaders in the Commonwealth."

Dr. Lawrence Stephen "Larry" Albert, a retired professor emeritus of speech communication, died Sunday, Dec. 17, at the age of 72.

Albert came to MSU in 1986 as an assistant professor of speech. He served as the chair of the Department of Communications from 1990 to 1993. He retired in 2017 after 31 years of service. He was a proud supporter of the Kentucky Center for Traditional Music, where his son, Thomas Albert, is a lecturer. An accomplished musician, Larry was a member of the band Rusted Clay and collaborated with local musicians Russ Ward, Harvey Pennington and the late Leo Blair.

Albert received his bachelor's degree from Virginia Commonwealth University, his master's degree from the University of Virginia and his Ph.D. from Pennsylvania State University. He was a member of the Speech Communication Association, the American Society for Training and Development and was vice president of the Kentucky Association of Communication Arts.

He is survived by his wife of 48 years, Linda; three children, John (Emily), Daniel (Jessica), and Thomas (Amber); a grandson, Oliver; a sister, Mary Jean; a brother, Edward; and in the memories of all those whose lives he impacted.
