## Eagles Face U. of L. Here Saturday At Homecoming

### Parade, Barbecue, Dance Are Also Scheduled

It's Homecoming time! The University of Louisville Cardinals invade Jayne Memorial Stadium Saturday for a 2 p. m. bout with the Morehead Eagles. The game will be varied activities of homecoming day.

Alumni registration and a gigantic parade through Morehead are scheduled for Saturday morning. An alumni barbecue is slated immediately following the game and the annual homecoming dance will be held in the gymnasium at 9 p. m.

The homecoming dance features Buddy Rogers band. Rogers is bringing a 10 piece group and part vocalist Betty Heath from Cincinnati. The dance is scheduled to get underway at 9 p. m. The homecoming queen will be crowned at intermission. Her court also will be presented. Presentation of winning football trophies and the annual decoration winners, and best business window awards will also be made during the dance.

Student couples will be charged 60¢ a couple, while non-students will pay 25¢. The dance is sponsored by the Myrtle Club. The parade is scheduled to get underway at 10 a. m. with floats forming in front of the stadium at 9:30. The Morehead State

## Haggan Named Best Professor; To Be Honored At Ashland

Henry C. Haggan has been selected as Morehead's outstanding teacher by the faculty.

Mr. Haggan will be presented an award at the November 8-9 meeting of the Eastern Kentucky Education Association in Ashland.

A graduate of Holmes High School in Covington, Mr. Haggan did most of his agricultural study at the University of Kentucky where he got his masters degree and did additional graduate work.

His wife, Pearl, is a graduate of MSC. She received her A. B. and M. A. here, and is now a teacher at Morehead High. They have one daughter, Mary Mitchell, also an MSC alumna who is teaching at Ashland School in Lexington.

He served overseas during World War I. Mr. Haggan has helped establish v-oag departments at many schools.

The first two school fairs in Rowan were organized and promoted by Mr. Haggan on the campus. He was the first to greet the late T. A. E. Evans, a former county judge, he helped take Rowan off the compulsory voter list system of repairing rural roads and put it on a tax basis. A rain gauge has been operated by Mr. Haggan on the campus of MSC for the past 15 years. The only pay he received for this was a service pin. He also has a 30-year service pin which he received from the U. S. Agricultural Extension Service for work with 4-H clubs.

He is a member of the 4-H Council, Lions, National Biology Teachers, Friends of the Land, and the Kentucky Academy of Science, and of Horticultural Science. He is honorary member of the F. F. A. He is a life member of the N. E. and its Department of Rural Schools. He donates his services in the summer as a teacher at the American Youth Foundation, a Christian leadership training camp.

Time is not the only thing he gives, as he has financially helped some students through college (and he still is). He recently obtained a \$100 fellowship from a former student, Wilford Fryman (given in honor of Fryman's mother, a former teacher in Rowan County) to help needy students.

He has always taken an active part in community improvements. He has been selected by the public relations department of the State of Kentucky as a

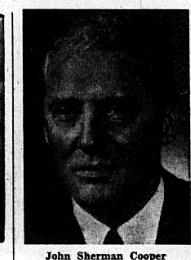

## Eagles Lose To OVC Leader Middle Tenn.

Morehead's Eagles lost their third game of the season by the touchdown Saturday as Middle Tennessee sneaked past the Gold and Blue, 20-12.

Paul Adams, freshman-dominated squad played an aggressive game, but numerous fumbles kept Middle Tennessee territory hurt.

Middle Tennessee's tight pass defense which held Morehead to one completion in 12 attempts and intercepted two passes from quarterback Tom Sims, proved a chief factor in the Tennessee's win.

Morehead scored early in the first quarter as center Tom Scott picked up a Raider fumble and ran 35 yards to paydirt. Sims extra point attempt was no good. Scott is the third Eagle line-man to score a touchdown this year.

Middle Tennessee came right back, with passes of 25 and 15 yards setting up much yardage to tie the score. The Raiders kicked the extra point to go ahead, 7-6.

The Eagles scored first in the second quarter as Buddy Fields went over a 20 yard line out after Wayne Chapman had recovered a Raider fumble on the 22 yard line. Sims' third attempt pass for the extra point was no good. (Continued On Page 3)

Over 2,000 high school students are on campus today to hear Senatorial candidates John Sherman Cooper and Lawrence Wetherby in the nation's first high school-college Citizenship Day.

Wetherby and Cooper will speak this morning at 10. Also on the program are Frankfort Attorney Joseph J. Leary, President Adron Doran, Student Council President Ron Hamilton, Open Forum Club, prexy Bill O'Willoughby and two students who will introduce the senatorial candidates.

High School-College Citizenship Day is designed to "help the 18-year-olds in Kentucky who are voting for the first time in a national election in November realize the responsibility they will assume as voters," said Dr. Doran.

Cooper and Wetherby will speak from the same platform on the importance of the government and other timely topics of aid to the first time voter.

Leary, an authority on the highway bond issue to be voted on in November, will follow the two senatorial candidates on the program.

Over 2,000 high school students from nearly 80 schools in the state are attending the unique event sponsored by the Kentucky State College Open Forum Club.

The Morehead band is scheduled to perform prior to the 10 a. m. speaking. Student Council President Ron Hamilton will preside, with Open Forum Club President Bill O'Willoughby scheduled to give a welcoming address. Morehead students will introduce the speakers.

Both Cooper and Wetherby's speeches will be broadcast over local stations. TV film will be made in the morning's activities.

High school students will attend from nearly 80 schools in the following counties: Mason, Madison, Hancock, Montgomery, Menifee, Morgan, Elliott, Magoffin, Johnson, Floyd, Pike, Martin, Lawrence, Boyd, Carter, Greenup, Lewis, Nicholas, Wolfe, Bourbon and Rowan.

## Murray Slips By Eagles; 'Too Many Mistakes'—Adams

Murray, with a heavier forward wall and more experienced squad, edged Morehead's freshman-laden crew, 13-7, at Murray.

Murray scored in the first quarter and again in the third, with Morehead's lone touchdown coming late in the fourth quarter. Morehead's offense just couldn't get started, as the heavier Murray line held the Eagles to 81 yards on the ground.

Morehead employed an entire freshman backfield throughout most of the game, as coach Paul Adams started nine freshmen. "We just made too many mistakes," said Adams. "But I suppose that's to be expected from a young squad."

"Murray had one of the finest lines I've seen in a long while," said Adams. "Our inexperienced forward wall learned quite a bit from the heavier Murray line."

Morehead's lone tally came with only minutes left in the last quarter. Halfback Curt Cassell scored from three yards after Morehead had recovered a Murray fumble on the Murray 48 and driven to the three. The drive was highlighted by a 15 yard pass from Tom Sims to Bert Dixon.

The Eagles completed 4 of 14 passes for 54 yards, while Murray completed 6 of 11 for 118

yards. Morehead had 10 first downs, Murray 11. Morehead was penalized 5 yards, Murray 65.

## X-C Team Wins Again

Last Saturday was the 13th day that is supposed to be hazardous or unlucky for various undertakings. And unluckily it was for Marshall College's cross country team, for the Thundering Herd met Morehead's harden when the latter were in their best shape of the still-young season. The meet, held in Huntington over a 42 mile course, resulted in a lopsided 16-44 win for the Gold and Blue, their second for the season.

Marshall was never in the race. By the time the one mile mark was reached the race had already assumed its ultimate pattern. The weather was much too hot for good cross country work, but the Moreheadians paid little heed to this factor.

Leading the Gold and Blue were Carl Deaton and Kenry Daugherty who raced as a team practically all the way and finished in a dead heat with the good time of 21:36. They had been pressed they could have gone much faster, but their time, nevertheless, was quite good, for it works out to around 20:30 for an even four miles.

A pair of sophomores, Paul Whiteley and Dick Wilson, were third and fourth, respectively, with times of 21:51.5 and 22:45.5. Wilson gave Marshall's first man, Herley (22:19.6) a good beating, while Jerry Joe Lancaster, running his best race of the season, just failed to get fifth place as he recorded 23:25.5.

Billy Razor took fifth place, his highest yet in a meet, with 24:19.1. Billy Grimes, a freshman who was competing in his first meet, bested three of the Marshall squad as he finished seventh in 25:28.

## Hard Working Adams Is Popular With "His Boys"

Paul Adams is a fellow who gives us the leadership required of a college football coach. So stated several of the boys who are members of the squad this year.

Last year when announcing the appointment of Adams, President Adron Doran said, "We feel that an alumnus who has achieved a high degree of success in coaching football at the secondary school level will be able to attract material and develop an acceptable team at Morehead State College. We believe that Mr. Adams fulfills the requirements for a successful college football coach on the basis of his training and experience."

Now to look at the record which Coach Adams has achieved while one-half way through his freshman year. Football at Morehead was at a depth lower than any other college the country. Coach Adams took charge of a team this year which had not had a single victory in 31 attempts.

The first team which Morehead faced was Maryville of Tennessee. Coach Adams sent a fired up group of boys into this game and came out victorious 13-0, thus ending Morehead's long losing streak.

Next came Carson-Newman. Morehead soundly trounced them 13-0. Morehead then met Tennessee Tech and Murray and lost 26-19 and 14-7 respectively in hard fought games.

Coach Adams is always quick to give full credit to his boys when asked about the success of this year's squad. Adams has said, "They want to win and when a group of boys feel this way they will give their all in every game."

Coach Adams has had considerable experience prior to coming to Morehead. During his three years at Raeland High School his team won 18 games and lost eight. His team finished second in the Northeastern Kentucky Conference in 1953.

Adams played center for four years here at Morehead under the coaching of Ellis Johnson and Len Miller. In 1949 he was selected on the Little All-American football team.

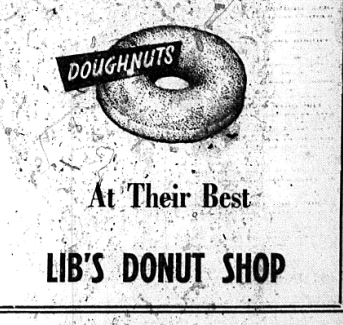

Nothing went right with the Eagles that day. It rained for about four hours preceding the meet and poured during the run itself with the course a quagmire as a result. The squad was twice detoured on the way to Hanover so that it arrived too late to prepare adequately for the meet.

Kenny Daugherty, number 2 man for the Moreheadians, re-injured a knee when he stepped into a hole.

This meet was the fourth of

the year for Hanover—the first for Morehead. Two Eagle runners were beaten by a mere second each by their opponents, and this margin was enough to lose the meet.

The boys simply weren't "up" for this meet. They relied too much on last year's record of 8 wins and no losses in intercollegiate competition.

Carl Deaton resumed his winning ways of last spring as he beat Hanover's ace, John Owensby, by over a 100 yards in the good time of 21:47 for the 4-mile course. This was some 50 seconds over the course record, and the Hanover coach opined that Carl would have smashed it on a good day.
