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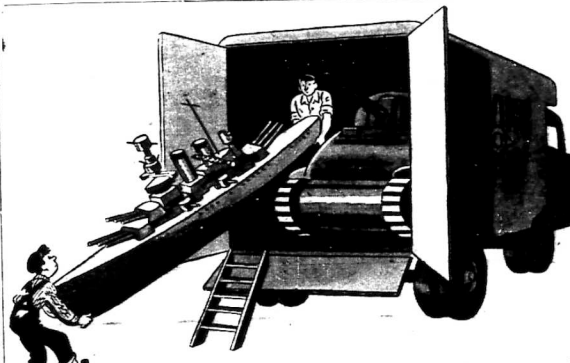

Leaf Beds In Rowan Spotty, Survey Shows

Some Farmers Have Good Prospects, However, Agent Says

Ray McKinney, tobacco specialist who is working with Russell Hunt and the local County Agriculture Agents visited Rowan County Tuesday May 15th. Mr. McKinney visited several tobacco growers and found that some had excellent tobacco beds, while others had very poor prospects for a tobacco crop this season. Investigations show that poor tobacco beds were caused by several different things. Cold damp weather has caused many beds to turn yellow. The plants stop growing and the beds took on a whitish, yellow color resembling wilt. Many of these conditions will outgrow this condition if we have plenty of warm sunny weather. Other beds were found to be in poor condition because the grower used too much fertilizer on his bed in seeding time.

Many Rowan County farmers are in the habit of using 100 pounds of tobacco plant fertilizer to every 100 foot bed nine feet wide at seeding time, when only 25 to 40 pounds has been recommended. Too much fertilizer cause the reaction and the fertilizer instead of being used by the plant formed a salt which killed many plants and turned others yellow. A small number of tobacco growers are disappointed in their plant beds because they used old seed that they had saved from their last year's crop. In many cases these seeds do not germinate but where they do germinate they are slow and the plants not as healthy and thrifty as are the plants grown from recent seed.

McKinney said that growers with late beds should treat the beds with the bluestone lime treatment which consists of one and one-half pounds of bluestone, two pounds hydrated lime to 20 gallons of water. One-half pound of arsenic of lead should be dissolved in water and added to the bluestone solution. The bluestone and arsenic of lead will not have a chance to settle to the bottom of the barrel. Those farmers having plants ready for transplanting and do not have the ground prepared should remove the canvas during the day and put it back at night. This will make the plants tougher and help get a better stand in the field. Growers setting tobacco with planters in their field should water their beds before pulling the plants. This keeps the soil from breaking off from the tender tobacco and helps the plant live in the field. The dirt should be shaken from the roots of the plants. Horsespun tobacco should not be used by the men working around the plant bed while the beds are being pulled and set in the field. This is to prevent the plants from becoming affected with the common disease known as mosaic. Cover crops should be turned over at least two weeks before tobacco is planted. If the tobacco is planted in rows after the cover crop is turned over the best generated from the cover crop will kill the tobacco plant. Tobacco ground should be dragged as soon as it is turned so that the ground can be sealed up and the air kept away from the cover crop so it will decay rapidly. Big plows should be used in turning cover crops at the vetch and small grain can be turned completely over. Some farmers use a rolling cutter and a chain to help turn the cover crop over. Tobacco ground should be well prepared. There is not a set rule on the number of times the tobacco ground should be stirred but the ground should be disked and dragged until the grower is thoroughly satisfied that the soil is in good condition. This may take two double diskings and it may take five or more. Farmers are using much more fertilizer under

tobacco than they have in the past few years. This year they have not been able to purchase regular tobacco fertilizer but instead they have sought fertilizer that contains muriate of potash instead of sulphate of potash. Mr. Hunt says that the use of more than 60 pounds of muriate of potash per acre is not advisable and that the tobacco on the danger list. One thousand pounds of 686 fertilizer when the potash is derived from muriate of potash is fertilizer that can be safely recommended. Mr. McKinney recommends that the rows be about three and one-half feet wide and that the plants be set about 18 to 20 inches in the row. Many farmers in the recent years have been setting the tobacco too close and resulted in the loss of the bottom leaves. Close setting means more work, more labor in setting and harvesting and hanging in the barn. Close set tobacco is more susceptible to field disease such as wildfire and rust as well as horseburn.

Then during war years education, along with all other peacetime activities, is pushed into the background, but with the war's end almost in sight we may expect an upsurge of interest in education not before witnessed in this country, when the mustered-out soldiers start taking training for peacetime careers.

We resist paying for teaching service because education is free. The freer anything is the less it is valued. When we bought books for our children we valued learning more than now with free books and so on. To make us appreciate and support schools we need a reversion to a primitive school—each paying the bill himself for being taught.

In ten years the people will be doing what schools are now advocating. They are everlastingly trying to make society and its people over along and different lines, trying to give us a new world. But do we want a new world? I have found very few individuals who want to be made over, or who want change anywhere. In fact it is only the new generation of children who want or must have anything different.

There is a disparity between needs of adult and child. Their interests are opposite. The adult is called upon to change in mid-stream. This he can and must do if the child is to have full life's opportunities. We adults exploit our children.

Emerson says we live by cycles, a little improved education gives increased enlightened support of schools, in turn better support gives better schools, and so on just as the hen produces the egg that produces the hen that produces the egg. Then what would you begin, by improving schools or by enlightening the public? By raising salaries, or getting better teachers? With which bootstrap can one lift himself higher?

Then I might say that if society failed to provide opportunities by which I could get education myself, why should I make effort to provide education for the other fellow? Why let him take it on the lamb as I did—unsound philosophy, you would say?

There are schools so ineffective as to be worthless-like saying "hypocrites in the child," a prime cause of public apathy. A school may—worse than no education—give the wrong education. A single bad school will neutralize the good impression made on the public by a thousand good ones.

The public never tells you what it thinks—why it holds back from giving support, but if we expect its support of a big postwar program of education, these are some impressions there that will need correcting, else it will withhold support.

More Fags, Other Scarce Items To Be Available

WPB today revoked its controls on an array of civilian products ranging from golf clubs and juke boxes to house trailers, but gave manufacturers no metal to make them.

One sweeping action expunged controls on 1,200 of the commonest civilian items while the juke box revocation also released pinball machines, coin-operated amusement devices and the so-called "one-armed bandits"—slot machines for gaming.

The War Production Board simultaneously predicted manufacture of 200,000 passenger cars late this year with output rising to 400,000 in the first three months of 1946 and reaching an annual rate of 2,000,000.

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Vote Down Move To Consolidate State Dioceses

The Episcopal Diocese of Lexington today voted down a proposal to merge with the Diocese of Kentucky and approved June 26 as the date for a special convention to elect a successor to the late Bishop P. P. Almon Abbott.

A motion to appoint a committee to investigate the possibility of merging the Lexington Diocese, Eastern Kentucky with the Kentucky Diocese, embracing western Kentucky, was offered by Rev. David Clark, rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Lexington. The motion was withdrawn after it was amended to provide that under no circumstances would the diocese consider a merger. The amendment then was offered in the form of a motion and was adopted by acclamation.

All diocesan officers, committees and department heads were elected to serve another year, with the standing committee authorized to fill any vacancies which might occur in the interim.

Two hundred delegates from parishes and missions throughout Eastern Kentucky attended the convention at Christ Church.

Doenitz Made Prisoner Of War

Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz, who succeeded Hitler as Fuehrer in Germany's dying hour, has been made a prisoner of war, the Allies said last night.

In clearing up Doenitz's somewhat shadowy status Allied officials said it clear that the eleven-hour Fuehrer and his group of fellow German officers in the Flensburg area had been doing only a very temporary administrative job under Allied supervision and in no manner had been "recognized."

The moment their usefulness in effecting the surrender of German forces ended they will become so many more Nazis and subject to all the penalties as such. This prospect promised to still the clamor of Allied states over the supposedly preferential status which had been accorded the Doenitz regime.
