In Study Of Foreign Language

Semantics is the branch of linguistics concerned with the nature, structure, and the development and changes of the meaning of speech forms. It leads to the hypothesis that good human relations stem from good speech and that disorder occurs during misinterpretation of words from other languages. Such a thing is possible when we realize the difficult task of interpreting the meaning of words.

The visit of Nikita Khrushchev is an example. His proverbs and idioms were often beyond translation or were construed to mean something other than spoken. Certainly if he or President Eisenhower could have communicated fluently, relations would have been better. Newspapers also distort many words when the mistake could be disastrous. War could come over one insignificant word!

When we desire good human relations, they can only come about when our representatives speak the language. The inability to do this has often been cited as a bad phase of foreign policy and too often our ambassadors and other service personnel cannot communicate effectively. In the book "The Ugly American" this was apparent. Our foreign personnel did not know the language, customs, and history of their countries, nor were they learning about them. While Russia was meeting with the people, our ambassadors were fraternizing with the higher class and it about no longer surprise us why Russia has been successful in foreign relations and we have not.

Now we are realizing the importance of foreign language training and have begun a mad-dening crash program. However, a foreign language cannot be forced for it takes much time and work to become fluent and whether we keep pace with Russian is a thing better left for the years ahead. What is the realization that students are interested in other cultures is perhaps the best thing to come out of any language program.

If a language can break us out of our feeling of American superiority, by showing us the attributes of other people, then something vital has happened. Instead of our feeling of superiority, we give Russia credit for her scientific achievements. Then America will be better for it. Instead of calling them barbarians and uncivilized, we might learn from them! When similarities are being, close, maybe, we would deliver into Roman history.

Feel the sway of Roman legions, learn of Julius Caesar, Mark Anthony, Pompey, Scipio, leading Roman armies, nearly invincible. We can see the clash of gladiators as Latin unfolds the spectacle of history before our eyes. Here is a language used to learn English words by and worthwhile if for no other reason than the knowledge of Rome. Ask the Latin Club more and you will find it is interesting, yet today.

Shall we further delve into language and cite more, important to America and the world? Do Madrid, Barcelona, Seville connote adventure to you for if they do Spanish might just be for you? Spanish people are present in California, Florida, Mexico and Spanish neighborhoods have claimed such lands as Peru and Mexico for Spain. During the reign of Phillip II, Spain had her dreaded Armada and the best army in Europe and held sway over most of East and Central Europe.

However, it is known for much more than conquest. Spain can proudly claim Voltaire, Goya, El Greco and today one of the leading modern painters, Pablo Picasso. 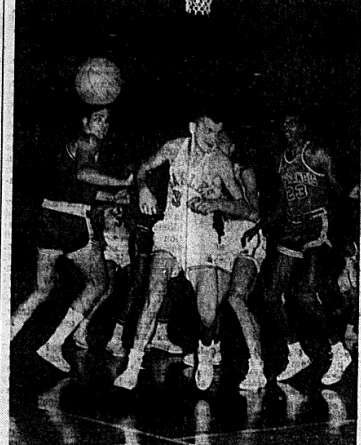
