Exonerate Matters For Hunting With Overloaded Gun

Forest Fire Damage Heavy In County

Dist. Forest Ranger Hicks of the United States Forest Service reports that during the past week the woods have become tinder-dry, making forest fires of any kind a real possibility. Ten fires, burning in and near National Forest lands in Rowan, Powell, Lee, and Estill Counties, have caused an area of some 3000 acres, including many homes, schoolhouses, barns for hay, and destroying good timber and game. **Ignition System Has
Been Improved In
Many Ways**

"When you come out on a cool
morning and your car starts right
up on the first try, you can thank
the research men of the Ford
Engineering Laboratory, who
found a way to prevent moisture
from forming in the distributor,"
the Collins Motor Company point-
ed out today.

When moisture forms in the
distributor, it causes hard start-
ing. Ford engineers designed a
lead-air chamber between the
terminal housing and cap, that
stops moisture formation. In principle,
it works in the same way as
the vacuum-bottle you take on a
picnic. The cold air outside can't
cool down the air inside and thus
it can't cause moisture to form.

The ignition system in the new
1946 Fords has been improved in
other ways, too. Synthetic rubber
has been used on ignition
wires for insulation, because it
won't crack in extreme cold
weather and is oil resistant. This

idea came out of the use by high-
altitude airplanes of synthetic
rubber insulation.

Water-splash from wet roads
can't stall the engine because new
plastic sleeves tightly seal the
ignition wires.

And the problem of ignition
wire insulation breaking down un-
der the attack of zone gas, which
is formed by the high-voltage
current of the ignition system, has
been solved by the use of the new
coating on the wires, which won't
deteriorate under high-tension
current.

**With Peace Civilian
Can Anticipate New
Canned Foods Soon**

Now that the postwar era has
become a reality with the down-
fall of Japan, citizens of Rowan
county can look forward to dramatic
developments in canned
foods, many of which were first
packaged for the armed forces,
according to W. C. Stolk, vice
president of the American Can
Company.

Mr. Stolk said that the ap-
proximately 1,000,000 cans of
food opened annually by residents
of the county undoubtedly will be

largely increased with the arrival
of the new postwar items. It will
be no trick at all, he said, for a
housekeeper to put together a
three or four course meal by mak-
ing use of the canned foods she
should shortly find on grocery
shelves.

Among the new foods he listed
are such items as canned ham-
burgers, canned onion, seafood
cocktails and salads in cans, as
well as a long list of meats new
to a can, among them chicken
steer with dumplings, beef and
gravy, pork with apple sauce, ham
with raisin sauce and boned
turkey.

With Bomber Group**

**HQs, 7th Bomber Group -
TEZPUR, INDIA** One of the
oldest Heavy Bombardment
Groups now in existence in the
Army Air Forces, the veteran 7th
Bombardment Group will soon ar-
rive in the United States.

Boasting of a record that dates
back to December 7, 1941, when
planes of the Group were attempt-
ing to land at Hickman Field in
Hawaii during the sneak Jap at-
tack, the Group has seen action
in the Philippines, Java, New
Guinea, China, India, and Burma.

Flying first in the B-17 Flying
Fortress and later in B-24's the
7th received a Presidential Unit
Citation for outstanding perfor-
mance of duty in Java in early
1942.

Arriving in India in 1942 the
Group reached its peak April 24,
1945 when 41 B-24's ranged up
and down the Burma Siam Rail-





'Texas Black Sam' Famous Dog Is Dead

Bloodhound Had Been Used In Suppressing Cumberland Forest Fires

Texas Black Sam, the well-known bloodhound owned by the U. S. Forest Service, is dead. This noted man-hunter became ill at the Cumberland National Forest Ranger Headquarters at Stearns, and died while en route to a veterinarian at Lexington, Ky. The cause of death was not immediately determined, but an autopsy by Dr. A. J. Steiner, of Lexington, indicated that the dog may have eaten some poisonous material. A chemical analysis is being made and investigation is under way to trace the source of the material that may have caused the death of the dog, according to H. L. Borden, Supervisor, Forest Service, Winchester, Ky. Texas Sam was brought to Stearns in April 1941 from Arkansas State Penitentiary. He has been kept on the Laurel Ranger District practically all the time because of the greater danger of incendiary forest fires in McCreary County. However, he has been used frequently on other

parts of the National Forest, by the Kentucky Division of Forestry and other agencies throughout Kentucky and adjoining states. This great man-hunter, since coming to Clearfield, has made a record. Many of the cases the dog has taken part in have not been given public attention for various reasons, but his record of convictions on the Cumberland Forest alone is an enviable one.

One such case may be recalled by folks of McCreary County when the late "Dink" Slaven, of the Troublesome Creek section, was trailed by Texas Sam and apprehended for setting a series of incendiary fires that brought him a Federal Court sentence. In 1942 the dog was taken to Harlan County to assist the State Forestry Department in combating forest fires along the Kentucky-Virginia line while on this mission his man-trailing instinct brought five court convictions in two days, which seems to be a record for any bloodhound. Last year this dog was used by the West Virginia Conservation Commission and at previous times he had been stationed in Virginia and West Virginia.

With the approach of the fall fire season and the likelihood of a greater risk than usual from hunters and others, Texas Sam will be replaced, probably by Red who has been on the Forest since 1943, and is now being used by the West Virginia Conservation Commission.

The use of bloodhounds has made a favorable reduction in the number of man-caused fires on the Cumberland National Forest. Texas Black Sam' Famous Dog Is Dead

Bloodhound Had Been Used In Suppressing Cumberland Forest Fires

Texas Black Sam, the well-known bloodhound owned by the U. S. Forest Service, is dead. This noted man-hunter became ill at the Cumberland National Forest Ranger Headquarters at Stearns, and died while enroute to a veterinarian at Lexington, Ky. The cause of death was not immediately determined, but an autopsy by Dr. A. J. Steiner, of Lexington, indicated that the dog may have eaten some poisonous material. A chemical analysis is being made and investigation is under way to trace the source of the material that may have caused the death of the dog, according to H. L. Borden, Supervisor, Forest Service, Winchester, Ky.

Texas Sam was brought to Stearns in April 1941 from Arkansas State Penitentiary. He has been kept on the Laurel Ranger District practically all the time because of the greater danger of incendiary forest fires in McCreary County. However, he has been used frequently on other

This great man-hunter, since coming to Kentucky, has made a record in the cases the dog has taken part in have not been given public attention for various reasons, but his record of convictions on the Cumberland Forest alone is an enviable one.

One such case may be recalled by folks of McCreary County when the late "Dink" Slaven, of the Troublesome Creek section, was trailed by Texas Sam and apprehended for setting a series of incendiary fires that brought him a Federal Court sentence. In 1942 the dog was taken to Harlan County to assist the State Forestry Department in combating forest fires along the Kentucky-Virginia line. While on this mission his man-hunting instinct brought five court convictions in two days, which seems to be a record for any bloodhound. Last year this dog was used by the West Virginia Conservation Commission and in previous times he had been stationed in Virginia and West Virginia.

With the approach of the fall fire season and the likelihood of a greater risk than usual from hunters and others, Texas Sam will be replaced, probably by Red who has been in the Forest since 1943 and is now being used by the West Virginia Conservation Commission.

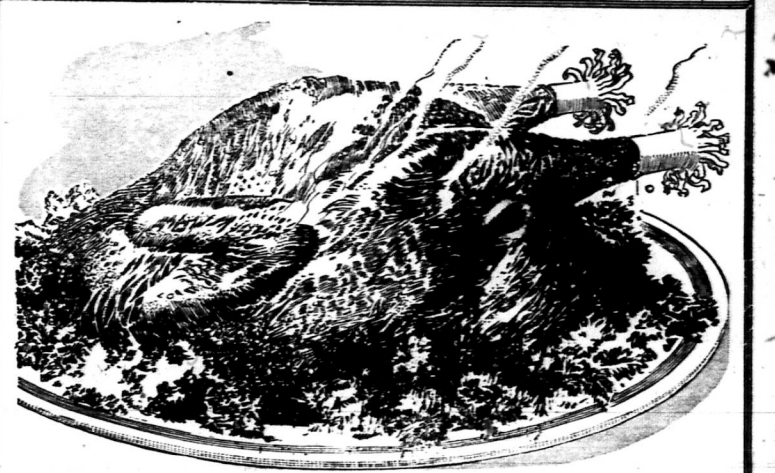
