The announcement followed a series of conferences with Maytag branch managers and distributors held at the home office in Newton, Iowa, at which the new products were previewed. They will be added to the line of conventional type washers and dryers produced by the 50-year old company, which manufactured and sold more than 1,000,000 washers before converting to war production in 1942.

The Maytag Company recently purchased a minority interest in the Globe-American Corporation of Kokomo, Indiana, which will produce the new gas ranges exclusively for Maytag. Fred Maytag II and Maytag Vice Presidents George Umsted, and Roy A. Brown have been elected to the Globe-American board of directors.

No date has been announced as to when the new products will be made available to the public, although President Maytag expressed an opinion that the gas range and the frozen food locker would be on the market about the first of the year.

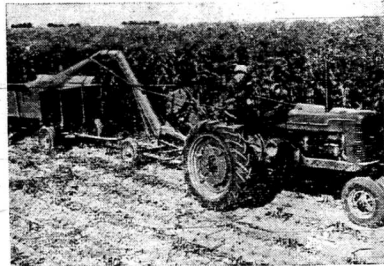

Whiskey Robbery Foiled Thursday At Owingsville

William "Buster" Crockett, volunteer Owingsville night watchman, frustrated an attempt to rob the liquor dispensary of Dennis Harrett early Thursday morning, but received some injuries in the scuffle with the thieves.

According to Town Marshal Claude Bausher, Crockett, about four o'clock Thursday morning, walked in on the robbers after he had seen them break the glass in the front door of the dispensary. One of the men was in the car with the engine running and the other was dragging the cases of liquor through the door. The thieves escaped in the direction of Mt. Sterling and Crockett notified the police in that city of the incident and gave them a description of the automobile. Mt. Sterling police spotted the car about twenty minutes after they were notified. The car was speeding and in trying to evade capture, was wrecked. One of the occupants was arrested.

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FOLLOW DIRECTIONS WHEN USING D. D. T.

Dichlorodiphenyltrichloroethane: It's as formidable as its name — this DDT — warns the National Safety Council, unless directions are carefully followed. Sure death to flies, roaches, ants, and lice, DDT also can cause trouble for the user if proper care is not taken to follow directions.

In spite of its apparent toxicity, there will be no danger to the user if these two essential precautions are taken:

1. Avoid skin contacts with the substance, especially if it's mixed in an oily solution.
2. Take care to spray away from the face, and wear long-sleeved, long-necked clothing which will expose as little of the skin as possible.

While there is no warning in the use of the powder form of DDT, the Council adds a note of warning on mistaking the powder for foodstuffs. Keep it in a well-labeled container.

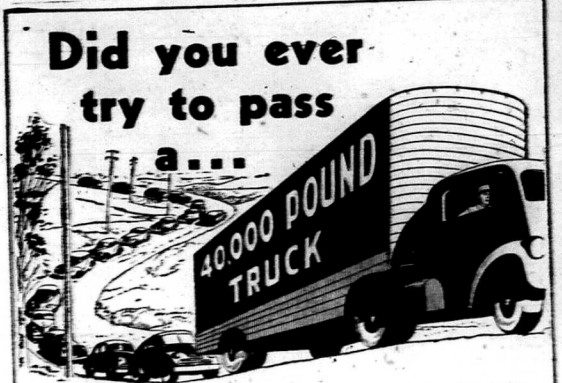

Kentucky's Highways Were Not Built for 20-Ton Trucks

It is reported that the commercial trucking industry will endeavor to have the next session of the Kentucky Legislature pass a measure law authorizing the operation of truck-trailer combinations weighing twenty tons.

Heavy trucks, when grinding slowly uphill, impede all traffic because of the difficulty and danger of passing. A last-moving 40,000 pound truck, whether on a down-grade or on a narrow level road, is a positive menace to all other traffic. The book "Kentucky: Designs for Her Future," recently issued under the auspices of the University of Kentucky, thus aptly expresses the views of the operators of all motor vehicles — whether buses, trucks or automobiles. "Few experienced drivers resist the prospect of an overcrowded highway tract" on a narrow, slippery, double switch-back curve. "The danger and inconvenience in the day time is lessened many fold at night."

According to the Good Roads Extension the 16,000 miles of highways in the Kentucky Highway System include only 4,200 miles of highway surfacing and there are 4,200 miles of road less than 20 feet wide and 1,200 miles less than 18 feet wide with 16,000 places where

rights ahead is restricted by sharp curves or other obstructions. The facts are graphically shown in the following statement in the book "Kentucky: Designs for Her Future": "Her extremely low — next to the bottom per cent of population."

In the County Road System, of 47,000 miles there are 27,000 miles of unsurfaced, mud roads, and the remainder cannot properly support the 20,000 pound trucks which were permitted before the war. The simple fact is that Kentucky's highways, consisting as largely of narrow, winding, hilly roads, were not built for 20-ton combinations.

All commercial trucks in a normal year pay only about \$600,000 in gasoline and license taxes. This is less than 1% of the total highway taxes paid by the public and is also less than that part of railroad property taxes that is used for highway purposes in this state. To permit the operation of 20-ton trucks is an unfair to competing forms of transportation as it is unreasonable from the standpoint of the capacity and character of the highways.

Provision of the safety and convenience of the operators of passenger cars and of trucks of reasonable size, preservation of the highways and due regard for the taxpayers who build and maintain these highways — all these with simple measures in competing forms of transportation in regarding that reasonable limitations be imposed upon the transportation that use public property for private profit.

This message is published by the Kentucky Railroad Association. In addition to income taxes the railroad in a normal year pays in this state more than \$5,000,000 in property taxes, of which approximately \$2,500,000 is paid for schools and more than \$2,000,000 for county roads and city streets.

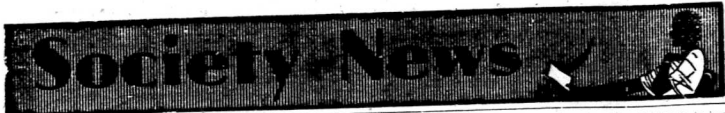
