Jailer Caudill says he is leaving politics for good—not that he lost any in popularity or prestige; rather he has gained in public favor because he has been a good public servant.

Jailer Caudill may differ from us politically, but we commend him on the manner in which he has kept the courthouse and the jail sanitary and in good repair. The buildings are clean and orderly, the lawns have always been immaculately kept, all of which reflects creditably on our county.

To the new Jailer, Allie Sorrell, we can say that if you do as good a job as Isaac Caudill the people will keep you in office so long as you want to remain.

KENTUCKY'S SHAMEFUL HEALTH CONDITION

No people are more proud of their state than Kentuckians. And, well they might be, for the Almighty has bestowed upon us bountiful and productive land, beauty and a method of living that seem to make us stand apart. Kentuckians are probably happier than any people in any state.

But, Kentuckians should well blush in shame when they read the facts unearthed by editors and publishers at their conference in Louisville Friday. It was a black picture of the health conditions in Kentucky which State Health Commissioner Phillip E. Blackery unfolded.

Highlights of the undeniable facts are:

1. Kentucky has but 800 beds for 14,000 active tubercular cases, 5,500 of whom are unaware of it and are unwittingly exposing their families and friends to the

disease.

2. Outside of Jefferson and Fayette counties, there are only 200 sanatorium beds for nearly two million, five hundred thousand Kentuckians.
3. Two-thirds of the schools in Kentucky don't have safe drinking water.
4. Nearly one-fifth of Kentucky mothers don't have a doctor at childbirth.
5. The average sanitation grade of Kentucky's eating and drinking establishments is 40 per cent.
6. Our death rate from dysentery is twice the rate for the nation as a whole.
7. Three hundred, thirty-three communities with populations from 200 to 3,000 have no public water supplies.
8. One-half of the state's population is served by open privies. These attract flies which then pollute food and milk.
9. Two-thirds of the total milk consumed in Kentucky homes is not pasteurized, and 45 counties have no pasteurized milk available.
10. One out of every 300 Kentuckians has cancer, and some 2,500 die each year from this disease.
11. About 30 per cent of all Kentucky men rejected for military service in World War II were rejected because of mental defects.
12. Mental illness is officially a crime in Kentucky.
13. The law allows \$1 per day for food for each inmate of a County jail, but only 37 cents per patient is available at our largest mental hospital for food, laundry, medical care and other services.
14. Kentucky has but one dentist for every 4,000 persons.
15. Adequate medical care is not available to all Kentuckians. One rural county has but 2 doctors for 23,000 persons.

These and numerous similar health facts were presented at the public meeting which included representatives of 56 statewide organizations, with a membership of 350,000 Kentuckians. A program of action aimed at remedying shortcomings uncovered by Blackery's report, was presented by Dr. Oscar O. Miller, past president of the Kentucky Medical Association.

The following essay, written by a Kansas school boy, has been sent to us:

AN EDITOR—

"I don't know how editors and magazines got into the world, and I don't think God does, for He ain't got nothing to say about these in the Bible. If an editor makes a mistake, folks say he ought to be hung; but if the doctor makes a mistake, he buries it and the people can't say nothing because they can't read Latin. When the editor makes mistakes, there is a big lawsuit and swearing, and a big fuss; but if the doctor makes one, there is a funeral with flowers and perfect silence. A doctor can use a word a yard long without him or anyone else knowing what it means; but if the editor uses one he has to spell it. If the doctor goes to see another man's wife, he charges for the visit, but if the editor goes, he gets a charge of buckschock and he has to be born."

OPA Announces Hardware Increase

Hardware Items Up 10 Percent
An increase of 10 per cent in the maximum prices for low priced builders' hardware items used in building and repairing homes, was announced this week by the Office of Price Administration.
This action, effective November

14, 1945, covers cast iron, wrought steel and a very few wrought brass builders' hardware items such as hooks, catches, hasps, brackets, drawer pulls, knobs, pulleys, mending plates, door springs, basement window sets, and bright wire goods such as screw eyes, hooks, etc.
Previously, OPA increased the ceiling prices by 10 per cent of other builders' hardware items such as steel hinges, butt hinges, certain locks and lock sets and other miscellaneous builders' hardware items.

Price increases have been allowed for these essential low priced builders' hardware items to encourage their production for use in the expected increase in building and repairing homes now that the war is over and construction restrictions are removed, OPA

said.
Ceilings Same On Pork
Present ceiling prices for pork products including lard will not be changed as a result of reductions that are being made in some freight rates, the Office of Price Administration announced this week.
Effective November 10, 1945, the Interstate Commerce Commission authorized substantial reductions in freight rates, including those on packing house products moving westward from the central part of the country.

More Reasonable Clothing Available
The Office of Price Administration acted recently to aid in stepping up the flow of certain types of essential low-cost clothes to retail stores and in filling the apparel needs of veterans, their families and others with limited incomes. The action was effective November 13, 1945.

The garments covered include several important items of low priced knit underwear and nightwear for men, women, children and infants; cotton homery, men's and boys' woven dress shirts, shorts and pajamas, and men's handkerchiefs. Although the action is not restricted to cotton

goods, items in the low price ranges affected are most likely to be made of cotton.
Manufacturers who produce these items below specified cut-off prices are permitted to increase their ceilings up to an average of 15 per cent but not to exceed the cut-off price.

Lumber Prices Remain Stationary
The Office of Price Administration announced recently that it had denied a request of lumber wholesalers for a mark-up on mill ceilings of eight per cent. The wholesalers asked permission to add the eight per cent to mill prices and let it be absorbed by retailers.
A large group of retailers, how-

ever, said that they could not afford to absorb the requested eight per cent wholesaler mark-up.
Many retailers argued that any increase that they would have to pay, either in the form of a wholesaler mark-up or a higher price to the mill, would have to be passed on to the consumer.

Denying the wholesalers' request, OPA said that there was merit in the contention of retailers that such an increase in price would have to be passed on to consumers sooner or later, and that better distribution would not be accomplished.

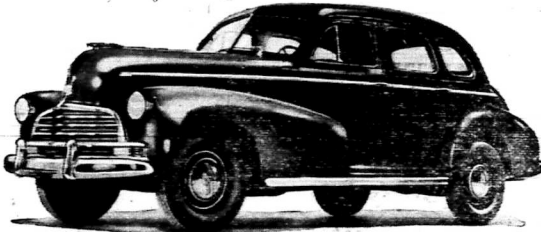
