A PEOPLE OPPRESSED
 LESSON TEXT—Exodus 1:5-14:2-25
 GOLDEN TEXT—And he said, O that I might be with thee—Exodus 1:12.
 God never forgets His people. We can be assured of that even though at times we must wait for His coming to bring us deliverance.

The history of Israel repeatedly demonstrates the faithfulness of God; hence the lessons of this next lesson concerning them will be a source of real blessing to all who need and seek God's help.

The family of Jacob—or, as the Bible calls them, the children of Israel—prospered in Egypt particularly as long as Joseph and the rulers who remembered him were alive. But they soon learned one of life's bitter lessons, namely, that: **Prosperity Is Not Always a Blessing (1:5-11).**

The leading grocery stores were J. A. Allen, Sam Allen and Dan and Harvey. Blair Brothers and P. Hunt were the leading dry goods stores. Charles Bishop and Harry Bishop operated the drug stores and Clayton and Flood and Battison's the soda fountains.

Clint Tolliver had the best restaurant. Three hotels—the Cottage Hotel, the Peoples Hotel and the Midland Trail Hotel—were operated by John Cecil, and a dinner was 50 cents a throw. They piled the tables high with wonderful pastries home-cooked and killed. "Come and Get It," in piggy-wiggly style. There was plenty of food if you managed to get on the first or second shift, but sometimes on the third shift the cooks began to run out of ammunition.

 I was especially impressed with the manner in which Drew Evans met his pay-roll on his many timber jobs (and the operation were large) in Rowan and Morgan Counties. The Kentucky Power and Light Company bought the electric franchise that year. Earl Young started to work for them then. Jess Feltrey and Frank Blair ran the plant for them. John Ambrey operated the lumber yard for Sam Bradley and "Uncle Pete" Henaker was night watchman. It was about this time that "Uncle Pete" painted a man's house air color and he came to Morehead to paint a red ring around it so the man could find it.

Jack Helwig ran the hardware with Norman Hogg, but he was as good a hunter and fisher as he is now. Bruce Harman ran the hardware store.

There are plenty of businesses under exactly the same management as 20 years ago. They are Sam Allen's Store, J. W. Hogg, Battison Drug Store, A. B. McKinney Department Store, N. E. Kennard Hardware Company and the Morehead Ice and Coal Co.

The Lee Clay Products Company was being constructed that year but no one knew much about it. John Palmer or "old-man" Borne. Old George Gardner ran the Morehead and North Fork Railway Company. Cliff McClellan, Frank Ginter and Bug Fugate constituted the freight crew. Jim Rigby the "Newstock" or gas motor car, hauled passengers, traded for chickens and eggs and brought chestnuts out of the mountains. 1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistment, for men now in Army with 6 months' service.)
2. Enlistment age from 17 to 34 years inclusive, except for men now in Army who may reenlist at any age.
3. Men enlisting retain present grade, if they reenlist within 30 days after discharge and before February 1, 1946.
4. The best pay scale, medical care, food, quarters and clothing in Army history.
5. An increase in the reenlistment bonus for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.
6. Up to 90 days' paid furlough, depending on length of service, with furlough travel paid to home and return for men now in Army also enlist.
7. A 30-day furlough every year at full pay.
8. Mastering-out pay (based upon length of service) for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.
9. Option to retire at half pay for life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
