**Englets Play Louisville Team At Lexington For Polio Fund**

Breckinridge Training high's Englets, favorites to carry off this year's state high school basketball title, will meet St. Xavier high school of Louisville in the feature game of a benefit double-header in the University of Kentucky gymnasium Saturday night.

Coch Andy Anderson of the Lexington Latin school, through whose efforts the twin bill is being arranged for the benefit of the March of Dimes campaign, said that St. Xavier authorities notified him of the acceptance of the invitation to meet Breckinridge. Earlier Coach Bobby Laughlin of the Morehead quintet agreed to take his squad to Lexington for the contest.

Anderson is attempting to arrange a preliminary game between two other outstanding teams which will make the double-header one of the most attractive of the season.

Teams under consideration to appear in the other game include Russell, an eastern Kentucky powerhouse; Maysville, one of the state's highest scoring aggregations; Covington Holmes, which lost by only one point to Louisville Male's undefeated Purples in the All-Kentucky Conference tournament last week; Frankfort and Mt. Sterling, two of the leading Central Kentucky Conference teams, and Clark County high of Winchester, a topnotch Blue Grass independent.

Attempts to arrange a tie between Breckinridge and Male were unsuccessful when Coach Paul Jenkins of the Purples declined the bid.

rabid sports fans, and before his health failed him he never missed a baseball, football or basketball game. Even when he was in poor health he attended many sporting events. He was a devout follower of Morehead teams, and was always ready to recite every important play of a game. For four years he umpired in the old Kentucky State League, and was recognized as the outstanding arbitrator in the circuit.

Dr. Ellington maintained an interest in good city and county government until his death.

Surviving are his wife, Ethel Ellington, Principal of the Morehead High School; a daughter, Mrs. C. B. Craft, Cumberland, Ky.; his father, Harlan Ellington; a brother, Farmer Ellington of Detroit; and a sister, Mrs. Beulah Perry of Ashland.

The funeral rites were conducted by Rev. B. H. Kaeze, Pastor of the Morehead Baptist Church; Rev. Homer L. Moore, Pastor of the Ashland Methodist Church; and Rev. Charles Dietze, Pastor of the Morehead Christian Church. The church was bedecked with floral offerings from his friends and acquaintances. Arrangements were handled by the Lane Funeral Home.

**Uses Of DDT  
For Farm Use  
Are Explained**

Professor W. A. Price, of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station says that the new insecticide known as DDT is not a remedy for all insect troubles. It has proven to be effective against certain insects, however, when used according to recommendations.

The 5 percent DDT dust with a carrier of pyrophyllite, talc or finely-ground walnut flour is recommended for use on potatoes, and all flowers for the control of thrips, leaf hoppers and plant bugs. It is not recommended for use on squash, melon, cucumber, and bean plants.

The 10 percent DDT dust can be used for fleas, bed bugs, ants, roaches, lice and ticks. DDT is not recommended for general use in the orchard.

For the control of stored grain insects, empty grain bins and corn cribs should be cleared of the old crop and then sprayed inside with either the 5 percent in oil or the water-suspensible powder.

The 5 percent DDT in oil may be used in the house for the control of flies, mosquitoes, and bed bugs, when applied as a spray. For flies and mosquitoes apply with a hand sprayer to the walls, ceiling, and light cords and other resting places. Put it on screens with a sponge or paint brush. One or two applications should last through the season.

pers brought \$59, or \$3 below the ceiling.

Warehousemen reported that heavy sales are expected to continue throughout the week, but that the volume probably would drop sharply early next week as the sales block is broken.

Rain brought tobacco back into handling order, making it possible for farmers to resume stripping of the leaf. However, it was reported that a large percentage of growers already have finished stripping.

Four-hour sales boosted the volume of burley sold on Kentucky markets yesterday to 8,745,355 pounds of leaf which sold for \$2,097,801.18, an average of \$34.18, which was 24 cents higher than Friday's \$39.97.

Highest average for the day was \$38.47 at Paris, where 424,248 pounds sold for \$163,227.34. Paducah was low with \$24.86.

Most of the deliveries made over the week-end were sold at some of the smaller markets yesterday and today's volume is expected to show a decrease.
