

Catholics To Build Church In Morehead

Structure Planned On Lot Deeded To Church By Mrs. Grace Ford

Preliminary plans for the construction of a Catholic Church in Morehead were completed this week.

The plans call for the construction now of a temporary church on the lot of Mrs. Grace Ford on Patton Avenue, opposite the Senn Natatorium. Later, when materials and labor are available the church plans to build a magnificent structure out of native stone on the same lot.

The Catholic Church has been having mass here for several years, although they have no permanent quarters.

When the permanent church is built the present home of Mrs. Ford will be torn down. The property, in one of the best sections of the city, next to the college, has a 83x190 foot lot. Mrs. Ford has deeded the property to the church.

In addition to constructing the temporary building now, the church plans to landscape the rear of the lot with shrubbery and flowers.

Rev. William S. Mulloy, Bishop of Covington, whose diocese includes the eastern half of Kentucky, has been in Morehead looking over the site and has approved the construction of the church. "I am greatly impressed with Morehead and with the college," he said. "I would like to build a church here that will be a credit to your community."

Father A. J. Muench, of Mt. Sterling, is the present pastor of the church.

District 4-H Meeting To Be Held Tuesday

A District 4-H achievement day program will be held at the Morehead College campus, October 22. 4-H boys and girls who were county champions in their project work will meet with the champions from ten other counties.

The district champion will be selected from each of the following groups: Sewing, canning, lamb, home improvement, poultry, cattle, sheep, corn, swine and personal grooming.

Religious Groups Re-Unit in Support Of USO Campaign

The major religious group of Kentucky will join forces this week-end and next in support of the USO, whose six member agencies represent America's three leading faiths—Protestant, Catholic and Jewish. Dr. Raymond F. McLean, campaign chairman, said today.

Priests, ministers and rabbis in churches and synagogues throughout the State are urged to support the USO campaign by raising funds needed to continue USO activities through 1947 for the 11-2 million men still in service, the 190,000 still in hospitals, and the youths now entering the armed forces.

Religious agencies incorporated in the USO are the Young Men's Christian Association, the National Catholic Community Service, the Salvation Army, the Young Women's Christian Association, the National Jewish Welfare Board and non-sectarian National Travelers Aid Association.

"USO is a great example of inter-faith cooperation," declared Dr. McLean. "In the USO, Catholics, Protestants and Jews have come together, faced common problems and worked together. But these problems which USO has been working on during the past five years are still with us. There are still veterans in hospitals, still inductees, leaving their homes, still serving men overseas still needing USO in 1947. That's why we must give, and give all we can, to the present USO drive and to USO drives federated with Community Chests."

'Clean House,' Willis Tells Local Audience

Governor Seeks Election Of John S. Cooper, Schmauch

Governor Simon Willis called upon Kentuckians to do their part toward "cleaning house" at Washington in an address here Saturday. The Governor, speaking before a full house at the Morehead courthouse at an Eighth District gathering, asked that Kentuckians elect John Sherman Cooper to the Senate and Ray Schmauch to Congress from this district.

"The race in Kentucky," said the Governor, "is not a contest between the Democrat and Republican parties as we know them, but between the distinct philosophies of government. The present administration acts upon the philosophy that the government belongs to their party and is to be used for their benefit."

Governor Willis declared that a start must be made to restore the confidence of the people in their government and to bring back faith and integrity. "These corrections," he said, "can be obtained only by the election of a Republican Congress because the Democrat party has been taken over by the radical element of the New Deal and cannot help themselves out of their own dilemma."

The Governor termed the present administration "inefficient, confused and self-contradictory," and declared that a Republican Congress will clean house at Washington.

Speaking of his own administration Governor Willis said, "I want to say to you that the accomplishments of this administration when the proper time arrives with anyone who questions them. Let it be sufficient to say at this time that every policy which I have advocated has been put in effect with the exception of the repeal of the income tax. "My record," he said, "is open for all Kentuckians to see, and I am proud of it."

Governor Willis asked that Cooper and Schmauch be placed in the Congress of the United States to show the nation that "Kentucky wants to dispel the great dark clouds of dissension and incompetency which are hovering over Washington and which have placed many evil men in power."

Wisconsin Labor Federation No Longer Advocates Public Ownership Of The Utilities

Tacoma (Washington) Light Company Also Beset by Troubles;
Superintendent Resigns Because of Political Overseeing

IT has not been at all unusual recently to hear that tax-free chickens of publicly owned power systems have come home to roost, but it does throw new light on the entire matter to learn that a State Federation of Labor, who wrote into its constitution 38 years ago a plank in favor of public ownership, has obliterated the plank, writing it entirely out of its constitution.

At its meeting in Superior a couple of weeks ago, the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor did just that. After carefully reviewing the facts concerning public ownership, Wisconsin labor officially decided to have nothing further to do with it.

Good Service Doubtful

IN commenting upon the Federation's move, the Green Bay (Wis.) Press-Gazette made this extremely pointed statement:

"It (the Federation) has learned that if the public cannot secure satisfactory operation of its utilities when it has such complete authority to regulate them, even to the money they borrow, the dividends they pay, the extensions they build and the rates they charge, how can it expect to improve their service by investing tax-raised money in them? That is a question that the little coterie of extremists will not face because, however much they patter and putter and spout about heavenly motives, their real purpose is to get hold of the utilities for what they think is in it for themselves."

"The Federation is just as sure of itself when it denounces any purpose of advocating public ownership of our industry."

Glamour Evaporated
NOWHERE has there been found a more candid spokesman of the advocates of public

ownership than that final conclusion of the Green Bay Press-Gazette: "Their real purpose is to get hold of the utilities for what they think is in it for themselves."

Meanwhile, on September 10, the Portland, Oregon Voter began a lengthy news story with these ominous words, "The gleam which public ownership crusaders of the nation have wrapped around Tacoma City Light, for these many years, has started to evaporate."

For many years Congressman Rankin and his political affiliates pointed to Seattle as a model of what the cities of the United States could do with municipally owned systems. When Seattle's shining example collapsed like a house of cards, the public power people leaped quickly to Tacoma City Light Company as the "yardstick" to be pointed to with pride. Now, the Portland paper points out, "Evidence accumulates that Tacoma City Light is falling into that same pattern."

Political Control Hated

TO quote the Portland Voter: "After one year as superintendent of the Tacoma System, Alvin P. Darland resigned, effective August 1. It is not the mere fact that Mr. Darland resigned that has surprised the electric industry and jolted the public ownership enthusiasts, but it is the reasons he gave which furnish the atomic explosion. One finds these two amazing facts:

"1. Mr. Darland revolted against political control. Basically, this was the most important of the disclosures made.

"2. Mr. Darland decided that goals desired for the Tacoma system are 'unattainable.' The Voter went to great lengths
