Morehead State College ended one of their finest baseball seasons with their second straight Eastern Division Championship, with a record of 22 wins and 8 losses.

The team, as a whole, did a great job, and here are a few of the standouts:

Dennis Doyle set a new conference record with 27 stolen bases and had a batting average of .390. Lester Stewart was the conference's leading batsman with a whopping .404 batting average and a record for home runs with 9 4-runners. Herald Penny set a new conference record for no of games won with an outstanding record of 10 wins against only 2 defeats. His ERA was 1.52.

Others to surpass the 300 mark on what has been termed as the "pat" list were Terry West, 340; Jim Mastrolucasa, 319; Charles Merle, 335; Ed Haslock, 347.

The team did a tremendous job. It is hard to believe that a college team could have such impressive statistics. They are as follows: Hits, 222; RBI's, 193; HR's, 22; and a combined batting average of .329. This was all accomplished in only 30 games. M. S. C. can look forward to another fine ball club in 1965 and maybe the OVC Championship.

Harry West, an all-OVC League baseball star at Morehead College, has signed with the Minnesota Twins. The 6-1, 175-pound shortstop signed for a reported \$10,000 and has been assigned to the Melbourne Twins in the Florida State League.

West graduated from Morehead in June, hit .340 as a senior with 34 hits in 100 times at bat, drove in 28 runs, had 21 runs batted in and had six stolen bases.

A native of Fayetteville, Pa., he had named to the ALL-OVC team as a senior and led Morehead to a 22-8 record and the championship of the Eastern Division. He had the pleasure of coaching," said Rex Chaney, head baseball coach, "and we are pleased that he has signed with a major league team. We wish Chaney pointed out that West has good speed, is a fine fielder and a steady hitter.

FOOTBALL PROSPECTS GOOD

Young Guy Penny has put together two winning seasons in a row at Morehead State College—something no other football coach could do in well over a decade at Morehead.

The Eagles posted a record last year of 10-3 mark in 1962 but the story is much the same in 1964 as it has been for the past two years—Penny has a top-notch first unit but very little depth.

Seventeen lettermen return but beyond that number Penny has only quality marks. Key losses include: halfback Howard Murphy, who was signed by the Dallas Cowboys; guard Scott Davidson; tackle Roy Lucas; center Ron Raloff and halfback Tom Westall.

Penny's number one quarterback will be Junior Mike Gottfried, who completed 59 of 121 passes last year for 854 yards and 10 touchdowns. The poised and competent Gottfried will be backed up by sophomore Jay Brogan who showed great improvement in Spring drills.

Backback will be strong with 195-pound junior Dennis Brown converted junior quarterback Tally Johnson and freshman Tommy Gray leading the contingent. Gray, who was held out of action last year, is a speedy 175-pounder, who has a 10-10 yard dash in the 100-yard dash and is ticketed for stardom at Morehead.

Manning the fullback slot will be senior Russ Campbell who led the Eagles in rushing last year with 347 yards and a 4.2 average. Sophomore Scotty Russell will help provide good depth at fullback.

At end, Penny has three of the Ohio Valley Conference's best in seniors Richard Pare and Jack Smith and Junior George Adams. Pare is a defensive specialist while Smith caught 20 passes last season for 272 yards and a 3.5 average.

Three veterans will head a crop of tackles which will lack depth but has good size. 250-pound James Osborne, a Junior, leads the pack with seniors Richard Jones and Junior Warner expected to fight for the other starting post.

Penny will have only two seasoned veterans at guard in juniors James Hall and Ken Howard while the center post will be manned by junior Bill Hornback and sophomore Gary Virden, who has been shifted from end.

OPEN AGAINST BUTLER ON SEPT. 12

The Eagles play a rugged nine-game schedule, opening with Butler University on Sept. 12 and meeting Marshall University in the Shrine game in Ashland on Sept. 19. Morehead dealt Butler its only loss in 1963 and also downed Marshall as the Big Green went on to finish second in the rugged Mid-American Conference.

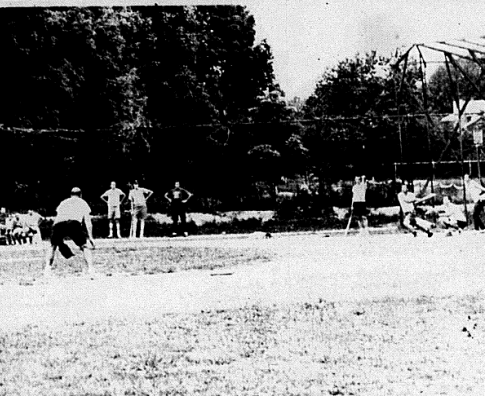
Seven straight Ohio Valley games follow the two opening encounters as the Eagles hope to better their 3-4 conference record of last year after holding the conference co-championship the previous year.

Language Lab Workshop Is Under way

A foreign language laboratory workshop is currently underway on the Morehead State College campus. The workshop began on July 6 and will end this Friday.

Bernard Hamilton, assistant professor of modern languages, Morehead State College, is director of the workshop.

"The program is designed to be both versatile and practical," said Hamilton. "We are dealing with three major aspects of teaching foreign languages: the mechanical, the use of materials and texts in the class and how to instruct through the use of these teaching aids."

The workshop is designed to give foreign language teachers a better comprehension of modern language methods of instruction.

"This workshop is not for training in the languages of Spanish, German or French, the three languages primarily taught in Kentucky," said Hamilton, "but places emphasis on adapting and using texts on the state lab for classroom use."

Literature Motion Picture Produced By College

A 44-minute experimental 8-mm. sound motion picture film in color has been produced at Morehead State College. The title of the film is "The Nature of Physical Nature in Literature."

The film, utilizing the new magnetic sound track on 8-mm. film, was produced as a joint enterprise of the Audio-Visual Department and the Division of Languages and Literature at Morehead State College.

The script and original concepts were by Dr. Lewis Barnes, Professor of English. Photography, recording and technical supervision were by Dr. Norman Tate, Director of Audio-Visual Education.

Comments on narration were James Earl Davis, an instructor in the English department and Miss Sandra Manning, an instructor in the Speech and Drama Department. All recording of narration, shooting of the film, editing and recording of the sound track were done in the Morehead's modern equipped audio-visual laboratories.

A novel approach to film making was utilized. First 8-mm. sound film only made its debut as an instructional medium less than two years ago and is generally still in an experimental stage. Second, still color pictures were selected to portray the various aspects of nature which have been written about by poets and novelists.

Using Zoom techniques to simulate action and motion while shooting still pictures, the film develops twenty concepts of physical nature as portrayed in literature through the ages. The narration of the film is closely knit with the pictures and interlarded with appropriate quotations from poetry and excerpts from prose, plus substantive interpretation.

A somewhat related production has been prepared by Dr. Ruth Barnes, Associate Professor of English. A synchronized tape and slide presentation of illustrative material on 35-mm. color slides and appropriate quotations from literature with explanations develop twenty-two aspects of Romanticism in Literature.
