Right-of-Way Granted For Power Line

Cumberland Forest Gives Permission; Better Service Assured

The long awaited word that right-of-way through the Cumberland National Forest has been granted by the United States Government to Kentucky-West Virginia Power Company was received by E. E. Curtis, district manager of Kentucky Utilities Company early Monday.

Although K. U. has completed its half of the Morehead-Haldeman line that will give Morehead, Mt. Sterling and Winchester residents "loop" service, federal action on the right of way has been in abeyance for several months, Mr. Curtis said.

Work clearing the land for pole lines was expected to get under way immediately. Material for the line construction has already been allotted by K. U., and the new service is slated for completion within a few weeks after the clearing is finished.

Mr. Curtis also announced that plans are under way to hold a public opening of the new line. Invitations will be sent to city officials of each town affected, and Mayor Noah Kennard of Morehead will be asked to throw the switch putting the new service into operation.

The new \$50,000 Morehead-Haldeman transmission line, Mr. Curtis said, will reduce service interruptions in the Winchester-Mt. Sterling-Morehead area to a minimum. If the Lexington-Morehead line breaks, service will be restored immediately by switching to the Morehead-Haldeman line.

Morehead High and Breckinridge were off on the right foot in basketball as they annexed double-headers in the college gymnasium during the past week.

Shorty Wiggins' Morehead High Vikings, paced by Berkley Cow, who has an unenviable eye for the basket-defending Grayson 17 and then toppled Owingsville 32-21.

Bobby Laughlin's Breck quint scored on the right foot in Grayson 31 to 20. The Breck team didn't have the speed and finesse of last year's state champions, but they are expected to improve as the season progresses.

Both Morehead High and Breck looked better in their second appearance of the season. The Vikings have a rangy club which should figure in the regional championship picture all season. Breck's attack is built around 6 foot 6 inch Marvin Mayhall, and the club, although small elsewhere, is fast.

Ellis Johnson's Morehead College team is competing in the schedule in the annual basketball tournament at Loyola, Arizona, Creighton, Texas A&M, Davidson and other schools. The team will open Thanksgiving night against Southern Baptist at the college gym. The match is expected to be a breath for the "big blue."

Frank Fraley and Don Battson, stars on last year's Breck team, were not included in the squad at Vanderbilt. Their loss may hurt the Eagles chances, although Johnson has an array of talent this year.

Rowan Group Will Go To Covington

Licking Dam Protest Scheduled By Army Engineers Monday

A Rowan County delegation who oppose the construction of the Licking River dams will leave Morehead Monday morning at 7:30 for Covington where they will join similar groups from all counties in the Licking basin to protest to army engineers.

The Covington hearing was called by the government to hear the protests. Originally scheduled last spring it was postponed after the Licking dams were dedicated from the Congressional appropriation.

Attorney John Adair Richards of Owingsville will be spokesman for all the groups in his capacity as President of the Licking River Valley Protective Association. The Rowan delegation will be led by County Judge Luther Bradley.

Judge Bradley urges every Rowan Countian to make the calendar of events be made to provide free transportation. "This matter is vital to every person in the county," Judge Bradley said, "and every spirited citizen should be at Covington Monday to raise his voice against this unfair proposal to dam the river and ruin some of the finest farming land we have."

Jury Gives Fyffe Life For Murder

Elliott Countian To Appeal Second Conviction For Slaying

Matthew Fyffe, former WPA executive in Rowan County who was convicted here Saturday of the murder of Ida Mason and given a life sentence has filed motions and grounds for a new trial. The motion has not been acted on, and it is assumed that his attorney's will again appeal.

This is the second life sentence that Fyffe has received. A hung jury resulted at his first trial while a Rowan County jury gave him life at the second hearing. He served six months at LaGrange before the Court of Appeals reversed the decision, holding that he was sentenced on insufficient evidence. A jury from Fleming county heard the trial last week.

The Commonwealth contended that Fyffe murdered Miss Mason, his cousin for \$45,000 in insurance. The defense contended that the girl, a Cullerton aircraft factory worker, was killed by a passenger train on the Chesapeake and Ohio railway.

The next meeting is scheduled for January at which time the members expect to make dress forms.

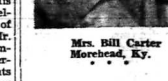
Mrs. Sinclair said her office at the courthouse can supply any individual woman with patterns for home-made house slippers.

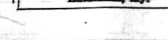

McGuire Gets 21 Years On Robbery Count

Henderson Murder Trial Scheduled Next Tuesday

Ollie McGuire, Jr., was given a 21 year sentence in Rowan Circuit Court this week for the robbery of Lewis Switzer at Bluestone last spring. The Commonwealth claimed that McGuire took Switzer's car and drove to the head and then robbing him of \$600. McGuire later lost the money when he got drunk in Huntington, W. Va., but part of it was recovered by police there.

The trial of Hubert Henderson of Carter County accused of killing a companion, Charles Stephens, during an altercation on a fishing trip to Lewis Pond near Farmers, has been set for next Tuesday.

An indictment was returned by the grand jury against Billy Cochran, Johnny Lowe and Edmond Lewis Cecil Perry with breaking into the home of Lester Casey.

Fred Quisenberry, held for a mountain county over the case set for the next term. The case of armed robbery against Leslie Cecil Perry was changed to armed robbery and the trial is scheduled for the 15th day of the term. He is accused of robbing Andy Lanber.

Raymond Traylor was indicted for taking a motor vehicle without the owners consent and the case set for trial on the 15th day.

The Army Engineers Place No Value On Your Life

A report from the Army engineers, who will conduct hearings on the proposed Licking River dams, carries one statement that is so lamentable that one hesitates to believe, that it could come from such a source.

Discussing at length the flash floods at Morehead they conclude "the cost of elimination would be 50 percent more than the cost incurred so nothing will be done."

We do not profess to know about construction costs, flood-wall maintenance or power dams. However, we will accept the engineer's own figures that the average flood damage to Morehead, based on a period of 14 years, is \$36,400 annually.

We are not immune from another flash flood—in fact the danger is greater because during the war most of the timber in the Triplett Valley has been cut making flood damage, particularly from flash floods, more imminent.

The Army Engineers (and we use their figures) say that the cost of eliminating this flash flood horror would be twice the average property loss over the 14 years period, which means in round figures that protection for Morehead and vicinity would average approximately \$52,000 a year.

The Army Engineers didn't mention the 39 lives that were lost in Morehead on July 4, 1939 when the waters of Triplett Creek, rising at the rate of a foot a minute, threw this town into a night of horror.

This report deals in dollars and cents. The loss of life in the Ohio River flood is negligible because the Ohio rises slowly and the people have ample warning. But, here at Morehead, when a flash flood comes, there is little or no warning and the swirling waters, falling from the mountainsides in torrents, sweep everything before them.

More lives were lost in Morehead from floods in one hour than on the Ohio River in 25 years. The United States government places no limit in the amount of money to be spent to protect property along the Ohio River but here at Morehead they say "the cost of eliminating flash floods would be twice the average flood damage."

The Licking River dams are being built for three reasons: (1) Flood control on the Ohio from Cincinnati on west; (2) Provide Cincinnati with a suitable source for drinking water; and (3) Make electric power.

A total of \$2 million dollars will be spent in building these dams which are bitterly opposed by the counties along the Licking. But, here at Morehead, the government refuses to spend one dime—and the amount that would be spent here would be negligible in comparison to the total.

You people of Morehead and vicinity who live in the path of a possible flash flood are risking your lives every night that you lay down to sleep because the United States Army Engineers apparently place no value upon you. It's just a few dollars and cents proposition with them and you have been relegated so that Cincinnati can get some drinking water which we have not polluted like they have theirs, and so that their property can be protected while your property and life are both endangered.

From an air-conditioned room and behind a walnut desk the Army Engineers push their pencils and clothe their reports with nice sounding phrases, but they have no adding machines to total the value of human life, nor do they possess any calculating devices to record the human miseries and sufferings that Rowan Countians went through on July 4, 1939.

Union Warns It's Members

Before the election, the 850,000 members of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, an A. F. of L. union, were warned by their official organ that "strikes have become a national menace."

Declaring that the Union "did not reach its present position of power and influence by letting its members run wild," the editorial emphasized its determination to stamp out wildcat strikes, declaring that local union charters could be revoked and individual strikers fined, suspended or expelled for violation of the organization's rules.

While making no reference to the two-months' general trucking strike in New York and the fifty-day tieup of certain delivery services, which were not sanctioned by the international union, the editorial insisted that the union would exercise its power to maintain a disciplined organization, warning that "if it strikes that duty, the Government will act." Moreover, it declared that "the responsibility for many restrictive laws that have been passed can be laid directly at the door of wildcat strikers."

ing, scarcity of ammunition or various other reasons. This season they will want to let off steam. They will go afield determined to make up for lost time. The airplane has made many places accessible that heretofore could not be readily reached. It will be hunted and fished this year and the hunters to come. A recent survey by Outdoor Life revealed that since 1943 the sale of all types of hunting and fishing licenses and the sale of Federal Duck Stamp has been on the increase. This survey also predicts that between 22,000,000 and 26,000,000 nimrod and fisherman can be expected in the fields and streams this season. Can the game and fish in your area withstand its share of this increased pressure?

The sale of hunting and fishing licenses in Rowan County this year has already exceeded the sales of last year by several hundred licenses. The hunting season has just begun and many licenses will yet be issued before the year is out. I can see that our game and fish is in a pretty tough spot.

What can we do about it? Can the whole load be borne by the Game and Fish Division? Each man, woman, boy or girl who buys a license feels that he or she is entitled to some game in return. The truth is, they are entitled to such a return, but each one of them will have to do his part to conserve a seed stock, or the increased drain will soon deplete the present supply.

The Division is doing and will continue to do everything within its power and financial means to protect the game and fish we now have and to restock those areas that are badly depleted, but it cannot stand alone in this program. Like our soil, our game and fish has suffered unwise use and harvest since the white man began to encroach upon its natural conditions. Much of our fine game food and cover areas has disappeared with the decrease of our soil fertility. Like the restoration of soil fertility and the wise use of soil, it will take years to restore our game and fish in many areas even a partial restoration will be impossible or impractical. Our game restoration and conservation program is a long range affair and all sportsmen are urged to help.

to be patient and to give their utmost cooperation. Each sportsman or sports-woman should forget about the daily or possession bag limits. About all these limits mean is that the one who gets that limit only has something to brag about, but he should stop to think that

he is robbing himself as well as his neighbor of future sport by continuing to take the limit.

Approximately 150,000 hunting licenses will be sold in Kentucky this season. If only ten percent of the persons who have bought these licenses take the limit of quail this season, that means that 150,000 quail will be bagged. Add to this several thousand more that will be taken by per-

sons who do not get the limit and several thousand more that will be lost as cripples, etc. In the State hatchery was hatched 42,000 quail during the past summer. Approximately 100,000 is expected to be hatched next Summer. Many of the chicks hatched will die for some reason or other so that not all of the hundred thousand will reach the fields. Any way we look it, we will be far behind the drain on quail alone unless each hunter will do his part to help himself. Each pair of quail the hunter leaves in the field for brood stock means a better season to follow.

Each sportsman should make it a point to win the friendship of the man who is the friend of us all—the farmer. In the final analysis, it is he who furnishes us our game. The sportsman should talk with the farmers about game conservation and be of help to him in putting more game in the fields and then not arouse his enmity by shooting his livestock, trampling his crops, or leaving his gate open. The U. S. Soil Conservation Service and the Division of Game and Fish has worked out a memorandum of agreement whereby

each department will work with the other in providing game food and cover as well as fish ponds and lakes. Talk to the farmer about this program and assist him in every way possible. It will pay off eventually in better hunting and fishing conditions. If you are not familiar with this program, contact the conservation officer or the U.S.C.S.

Each sportsman should cooperate with the conservation officer by reporting all violations and if necessary be willing to go to court as a witness or as a prosecutor to enforce the game and fish laws. These laws are for the protection of the sportsman and when he will not cooperate, he is not hurting anyone else more than he is hurting himself. The conservation officer cannot work alone in this program; he cannot be all over the county at the same time. If visitors had each sportsman to contend with instead of one or two game officials, the number of violations would greatly decrease. The sportsman would not be protecting a small group of people who have little or no respect for the rights of others at the expense of denying to our posterity the right to enjoy the sport of hunting and fishing.

Each hunter and fisherman should become a member of a Sportsmen's Club and each club should affiliate with the State organization. Any block of votes as large as an organized group of sportsmen covering the entire state could not well be ignored by our legislators. Proper legislation in regard to better game laws, yes and even financial assistance can be had in this way. Your club should have committees—active committees who are on the job—to take care of the program for each type of game. There should be a Fox Hunter's

Committee, a Quail Committee, and Fish Committee, a Coon Hunter's Committee and any others that might be needed. These committees would work with the Division and the club in making surveys for their respective interests, improving habitat, and many other things that will further the conservation program.

The sportsmen clubs should be an active part in the Junior Conservation Club activities. These boys will be the sportsmen of tomorrow. These boys should be taught the principals of good sportsmanship, proper methods of handling firearms, proper care of game, and many other facts of great outdoor life. The members of the sportsmen clubs should accept invitations of the Junior Club Councilors to make talks or otherwise render assistance at the regular meeting of these clubs. There is more to this Junior activities than the awarding of prizes for excellence in various skills.

This article is not a complete answer to the question of "What can we do about aiding our game to withstand the increased pressure it is now suffering and will suffer for some time to come?"

It is, however, an article intended to cause the sportsmen to begin thinking and to follow thoughts with action. Each sportsman who expects to enjoy the fun of hunting and fishing should assume his share of the responsibility to conserve it.

efforts to conserve the nation's coal supply.

Although the Commission couched its order in the form of a request rather than a formal order, R. M. Watt, president of Kentucky Electric Company, stated that K. U. would cooperate with the CPA completely, and would ask all K. U. customers to curtail their use of electricity to conform to the restrictions laid down by the CPA.

All outdoor lighting, electric signs, decorative and show window lighting will be most seriously affected. This will include Christmas trees and Yule decorations if the "request" remains in effect that long.

The eleven restrictions set out by the CPA under its wartime powers follows:

Pursuant to Paragraph "C" of this Order no consumer shall use electricity for any of the following purposes:

- (1) Refrigeration for air conditioning except to the extent essential for industrial processes or for health and safety;
- (2) Outdoor and indoor advertising and promotional lighting;
- (3) Outdoor display and flood lighting except to the extent necessary for the conduct of outdoor

business or service.

- (4) Outdoor or indoor decorative and ornamental lighting;
- (5) Show window or show case lighting;
- (6) Marquee lighting in excess of 60 watts per square foot;
- (7) White way street lighting in excess of the amount determined by local public authority to be necessary for public safety;
- (8) Outdoor or indoor sign lighting for (a) Directional or identification signs required for fire and police protection, terminal control, transportation terminals or hospitals or directional or identification lighting for any similar essential public services;
- (9) Directional or identification signs using not more than 60 watts per establishment for doctors and for hotels and other public lodging establishments;
- (10) Outdoor entrance lighting, except the minimum essential for public health and safety and then not more than 60 watts per entrance;
- (11) Any other form of general outdoor or indoor illumination in or about any commercial, industrial or other non-residential establishment in excess of 75 per cent of the illumination normally used;

A LETTER ON CHRISTIAN LIVING

LESSON TEXT—Acts 15:22-29: Ephesians 4:1-3. MEMORY SELECTION—Ephesians 4:1-3. For three months he spoke in the synagogue, as was his custom, but when his ministry resulted in many converts others hardened their hearts in opposition. So he withdrew (a bit of strategy in this spiritual warfare) to gentile groups in the neighborhood of one Troas, where he could teach and reason with them daily.

Paul knew by experience that this could not go on, for he had learned as we should learn to

I. Expect Opposition—E. W. Gilchrist (Acts 15:22-29). The comfortable and contented Christians of our day who just want to be let alone to carry on as they please are certainly not related to the real Christians of Paul's type.

The enemy of our souls is often content to let us go on in contented ease as long as we do not bother him unduly, but once we put up the banner of a holy life and the sword of God's army, he begins a terrific counterattack. Paul had felt it already in the hardening of the Ephesians' hearts (v. 18).

1. Selfish Opposition (vv. 23-27). One way to bring a violent reaction against spiritual truth is to let it be the Word because they are in a business which is condemned by it.

2. Senseless Turmoil (vv. 28-30). Knowing that their opposition was without true foundation, they resorted and against a wild demonstration.

Shouting a slogan which had no real meaning, they lent their voices to the tumultuous agitation against God. Finally, one sensible man, fearing the punishment of city officials, quieted them (Acts 18:14).

The Ephesians were just like many in our day who fear man more than God. But, may we not, if we fear the judgment of men, bow think you to escape the judgment of God? After all, it is God and His Word you oppose, uncovered friend. Do you think He will hold you guiltless?

Paul was not afraid (v. 28), for he had also learned that the servant of the Lord can

III. Content on God—He Will Deliver (Eph. 6:12-18).

Writing to the church in this very city where the Lord opened a "great door and effectual" for Paul (1 Cor. 16:9), he admonishes them and us to make full use of the provision which God has made for victorious warfare.

There is a complete armor, and a mighty weapon, the sword of the Spirit, but some will do us no slight good unless we put it on and go into battle. If we think we can do without the breastplate of righteousness (and some Christians and church workers seem to think they can), or neglect to carry and use the shield of faith, we can only expect defeat. We fight great spiritual enemies (see vv. 11, 12 of this chapter) and we need the best in both offensive and defensive equipment.

The girdle of truth binds up the warrior and eliminates the hindrances to rapid movement. The breastplate is righteousness, not his own but Christ's, but it must be appropriated and used.

The soldier must be well shod for the long rough journeys and to give him a good foothold in the day of battle. Peace in the heart provides such a firm vantage point in the fight for God.

Paul is the quickly moved shield, catching all the fiery darts. Here again it is not my faith or yours alone, but our faith in God, putting him between us and our enemies.

The sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God, is our all-powerful weapon. Let us not neglect to use it. We are so prone to talk about the Bible, to defend it, to argue for its truth. Talking about a sword does not make it effective. Let's really use it.

Prayer is always to be counted on and it is both a defensive and offensive weapon. It keeps us in touch with the Captain of the Lord's hosts. We call for help, get orders and a "word" of victory through prayer.

Local Trains Discontinued On C. & O.

Lee Clay Coal Strike Is Felt Locally

Although Morehead is in the vicinity served by "truck" mines which are not affected by the general coal strike, the effects of John L. Lewis' "stop-work" order have been felt here.

The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company has discontinued local passenger trains 25 and 26 between Ashland and Lexington and movements of freight have been materially slowed down. This is in conjunction with a de-

crease in rail traffic all over the nation.

Local theatres have discontinued their marquee lighting and the brown-out applies to all of Kentucky.

M. S. Bowers, general manager of the Lee-Clay Products Company, Clearfield, said today that their coal supply was very small, but the company was managing to continue operation. "We believe in Kentucky industry and that is the reason we have not converted to gas," Mr. Bowers said.

All tile and brick plants between Morehead and Ashland and natural gas which means that General Refractories at Haldeman will not be affected, except shipping is expected to be difficult.

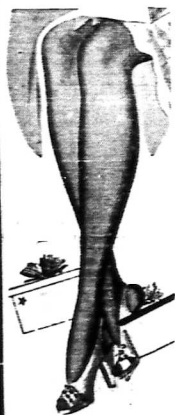
