## Morehead Hi Annexes EK Tournament

**Vikings Spill Olive Hill; Eagles Trounce Creighton U. Quint**

After dropping three straight heart-rending one-point decisions to top ranking teams in the nation at the Louisville Armory the Morehead College Eagles hit the victory column last night by downing Creighton University of Omaha, Neb., 68-55.

Sonny Allen dropped in 17 points to pace the Morehead attack.

The victory over powerful Creighton was overshadowed in local interest by the sensational play of Shorty Wiggins. Morehead Hi Vikings by winning the E-K sectional tournament at Grayson.

After downing Boyd County by 55-44 and Hitchins 39 to 26, the Vikings turned the heat on the Comets in the finals for a 47-44 victory. It was Olive Hill's first in 27 conference games over a two-year span.

Olive Hill had previously handed Morehead a 33-32 defeat at Morehead, but in the sectional tournament the Vikings were more decisive winners than the score indicates.

The victory installed Morehead High as favorites to cop the 16th Regional crown.

Cox, R. Stewart, Green and Spencer, all of Morehead High, made the all-tournament team at the Grayson meet. These are the four lads who gave a packed house a fine exhibition of ball handling and shooting.

In a game that should attract a big crowd, Morehead Hi will play Male at the college tomorrow night, while Ellis Johnson's Eagles take on Morris-Bauer in the same gym at 8 o'clock Saturday evening.

It is noted that Morehead College is now ranked nationally as the best college team in the state with the exception of the University of Kentucky.

## Kilgore Announces Support For Harry Lee Waterfield

Ben Kilgore, strong contender for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1947, today removed himself from the ranks of possible candidates for governor in 1947 and pledged his active support for that office to Harry Lee Waterfield, Clinton publisher and speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

In a statement in which he said that "I will not be a candidate for governor in the 1947 primary," Kilgore declared:

"It is my profound hope that all Democrats will unite this year on Harry Lee Waterfield, Clinton, Ky., because I believe he is best qualified to lead us to a brilliant Democratic victory in November, and because I am confident he will give our great state an honest, progressive, and constructive administration."

The Rowan County Corn Derby will close Friday, Jan. 17, with the corn show at Morehead.

The Rowan County Corn Derby contestants will each enter a sample of corn in the county corn show. Mr. Johnston will judge the county corn show and see that the best samples are entered in the State Corn Show, which will be held in Lexington in connection with the State Farm and Home Week.

Russell Hunt, tobacco specialist at the University, will also take part in the Agronomy meeting and discuss tobacco plans for 1947. Every farmer in the county should attend the meeting.

## Announcement Comes In Letter To President Baird As Students Enrolling For Third Quarter

### THE SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION STATEMENT

This is the all-important statement issued by Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools which means so much to Morehead College and in particular the student body:

"Following precedent in such situations the action of the Association in dropping the Morehead State Teachers College from the membership will become effective September 1, 1947. This is in order that full recognition may be given students who will graduate in June, 1947, and those who may receive degrees during the summer sessions."

College officials said that if this statement had been received two or three days ago they felt there would have been no noticeable decrease in enrollment. It came as students were enrolling for the present quarter.

All credits earned by students at the Morehead State Teachers College prior to September 1947 will be as good as they ever were it was learned today.

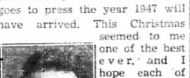
This startling development came this morning as the third quarter enrollment was underway and was contained in a letter from the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to Dr. William J. Baird, Morehead president.

It was the brightest note yet sounded in the Morehead situation but it probably arrived a few hours too late to halt an anticipated drop in enrollment. However, Dr. Baird said that the registration this morning is "going strong" and that "more than we expected."

Other college officials expressed the opinion that enrollment would have been about normal if the announcement had come in time to allow students to know about it. As it is, many have already transferred to other colleges.

Dr. Baird said that he was advised at the Southern Association meeting that Morehead's suspension was as of that day, and it is noted that this is in conformity with press releases from Memphis.

## THE RANGERS COLUMN

Christmas, 1946, belongs to the past and, by the time this paper goes to press the year 1947 will have arrived. This Christmas seemed to me one of the best ever, and I hope each of you had one just as satisfyingly merry. I want to take this opportunity, too, to extend to all of my readers my very best wishes for a happy and prosperous 1947.

The dawn of a New Year is usually associated with the making of good resolutions. In a moment of strength we resolve to do certain things and not to do certain other things.

Just in case any of you are hard up for ideas, I am going to suggest a list of resolutions for Rowan County folks. I guarantee that if they are carried out 100 per cent, Rowan County will prosper therefore. Perhaps the results won't show in one year or even five, but certainly they will within a decade or a generation.

I will cause no forest fires in 1947. Further, I will prevent others from starting forest fires.

I will not hunt or fish unlawfully in 1947 and will stop others from hunting and fishing unlawfully.

I will do my part to see that the remaining timberland in Rowan County is conserved in the most important natural resource. What timber I own, myself, will be cut according to sound management principles, with a careful eye toward future production possibilities. My idle land, too steep or otherwise unsuitable for cultivation, I will convert to the production of timber by planting where feasible, or by allowing Nature to re-seed it, and, most certainly, by protection from fire and grazing. This policy I will recommend to my neighbors and my associates.

You know, folks, those are simple resolutions to keep, and they spell better conservation for Rowan County in the long run.

## Grave Injustice

As matters stand a grave injustice was worked on Morehead and the student body by the erroneous assumption that the suspension was as of that day, and it is noted that this is in conformity with press releases from Memphis.

Another bright gleam for Morehead also shone with the advent of the New Year as the University of Kentucky announced that they would accept Morehead's suspension from this time on. It was assumed by the University that Morehead's suspension was then in full effect. It had been previously announced by the State Department of Education that all teachers certificates were as good as over.

One administration officer of the college, who asked that his name not be used, gave this version today:

## Not Fatal Blow

"Morehead students" should have no great worry. Practically all colleges will continue to accept Morehead credits following the University of Kentucky's statement.

"Since the credits are good in the Southern Association until September there is a period of only three months when the school will be off the accredited list inasmuch as the institution will likely be re-instated in December."

"If I were a Morehead student I would not be concerned about my credits," this official said. "Although much embarrassment has resulted and the situation is not pleasing, it is not as bad as at first supposed."

## MISREPRESENTATION OF SURPLUS SALES

Widespread misinterpretation of War Assets Administration regulations dealing with disposal of surplus property in areas where shortages of certain items impeded or threatened to impair food production has resulted in belief by some farmers that they can execute their own impairment certificates as W. D. McAfee, chief of WAA's Agricultural Branch, said today.

"The regulation was never intended to apply to individual cases," said Mr. McAfee.
