## Kiwanis To Stage Drive Against Rats

Over 1,000 Pounds Of Poisoned Bait Will Be Distributed

The Morehead Kiwanis Club will sponsor a drive designed to eradicate as many rats as possible by spreading more than a thousand pounds of poisonous bait on April 18 and 19.

Harry Goldberg, chairman of the campaign, today called upon all Moreheadians to cooperate. Details of how they may help will be issued next week.

Mayor N. E. Kennard, terming the campaign as "something the city needs," is preparing a proclamation, while the police force will enforce laws during the drive that will make it mandatory that citizens keep any foods, away from rats so that the bait will be more effective.

Two experts from the University of North Carolina will come to Morehead to direct the drive. They will be here under the auspices of the Fish and Wildlife Division of the Department of Interior.

The bait to be used will be a mixture of red squill and fish. It is not poisonous to dogs, cats or pigs.

"For a successful drive every citizen must lend his support," Mr. Goldberg declared. "We ask you to observe the regulations, to be published in next Thursday's News, very carefully."

## Club Will Meet To Plan Action Against Desperado

Old Scrap Iron is on the rampage again!

This famous, but by no means legendary, desperado has resumed his nefarious activities with the result that a special meeting of a local civic club is being called to try to find ways and means to eradicate him once and for all.

For years Old Scrap Iron has been a nemesis in Rowan County, and although many citizens in Eastern Kentucky have almost caught him he has always managed, through sheer strength and wit, to escape.

Although he has never been caught, he has been seen many times, and it is possible that many of those who nearly landed him or saw him have exaggerated his size and ability. But, they are all agreed that he is the biggest specimen to ever take shape in Rowan County.

In the event that you're one of the few citizens who haven't heard of Old Scrap Iron—he is a fat—a muskie.

For several years Old Scrap Iron has lived in Triplett Creek near Farmers. Many anglers have had him on their lines, but not for long. Others say that when he turns over the water splashes to the top of the birch trees that line the banks. But,

after interviewing many Isaac Waltons, including Fuzzy Jayne and Roy Cassidy who hooked the big fellow and Herbert Hogan and Jack Helwig who have seen him several times, the best estimate is that the fish weighs between 60 and 70 pounds. The world's record for a muskie is around 65 pounds.

The directors of the Licking Valley Fish and Game Club have called a meeting for Tuesday, April 1, at which time Old Scrap Iron will be the principal point of discussion. The directors say that a reward will be offered for his capture.

It seems that Old Scrap Iron lies in the deep and long hole in Triplett opposite Farmers and devours or scares away muck fish trying to come up the creek from Licking River. As a result, they point out, fishing hasn't been good in Triplett Creek for several years.

Bearcat spinners, tandem spinners number 2, jointed pickers and other lures have been successfully used to get a rise out of Old Scrap Iron, but after taking the bait he dives among the roots and sunken logs and tears it from his mouth.

The Licking Valley Club will also discuss its coming skeet shoot at Tuesday's meeting.

## City Jail Scored By Grand Jury

Condition Termed Deplorable; Recommend Filing Injunction

The Morehead city jail, and the method of its operation, drew bitter criticism from the March grand jury which pointed out that nothing had been done despite previous warnings by the court, and urged that a full time jailer be employed.

"As conditions presently are," the jury report said, "a man could die of illness, fire, flood or other cause."

any one of a hundred other casualties before he would be noticed as there are long intervals of time when no person is around the jail except the prisoners.

"Even on our inspection," the report declared, "we had to wait 30 minutes before we could find anyone with keys to let us in and see this deplorable state."

The report further stated that the city jail is not properly ventilated, and is an unsafe place for people to be incarcerated.

It was recommended that "if the city does not rectify these conditions an injunction should be filed to prevent the city from using the jail further."

Although the report did not set out several persons have died in the city jail, the last from suffocation when a mattress caught fire.

The grand jury also criticized the Ashland High school, declaring the building a fire hazard and a safety hazard.

The jury returned 17 indictments, the smallest number in years, indicating that the predicted post-war crime wave has not developed.

## School System Will Go In Debt For Construction Of New Building At Morehead High Meadows To Manage New Bulk Plant

Ashland Oil And Refining To Establish Wholesale Station Here

The Ashland Oil and Refining Company today announced plans for the installation of a bulk and storage plant in Morehead.

The new plant will be managed by Russell Meadows, agent-in-charge.

All of Rowan and Elliott Counties and parts of Bath, Fleming and Carter will be included in the new plant.

Products to be distributed are Ashland gasoline, oils and greases, kerosene and diesel fuel.

The establishment of the Morehead bulk plant is in line with an expansion program of the Ashland Oil and Refining Company, one of the major distributors of fuels in this section of the nation.

The Morehead plant will be located across from the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Station, near the Morehead Stockyards. The installing of tanks and equipment is expected to start in a few days.

## Veterans News

**73,570 Vets Get G.I. Loans**  
 Veterans institutions had advanced \$384,183,946 in home farm and business loans to 73,570 World War II veterans in this state under loan guaranty provisions of the G.I. Bill as of March 1. It was reported today by officials at the Veterans Administration VA had guaranteed \$182,115,361 of the total. In Kentucky 73,779 veterans had borrowed \$23,997,418, of which VA guaranteed repayment of \$18,630,447.

**VA Hospital Load at Peak**  
 The number of veterans hospitalized by the VA in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky has set a new all-time high on March 1, totalling 10,150 the Branch Office reported recently.

Officials said the March 1 total was 1,260 greater than the 8,890 veterans who were hospitalized in VA hospitals and homes and in VA-contract hospitals in the three states on the 1st of January.

Hospitalization was furnished for 2,038 veterans in Kentucky on March 1, compared with 1,059 on January 1.

Veterans with service-connected ailments are given top priority for VA hospitalization, but veterans with non-service connected disorders are hospitalized only when beds are available and if they say they cannot afford treatment at other institutions. However, all emergency non-service connected cases receive immediate attention.

**"Radio-for-Amputees"**  
**"Radio-for-Amputees"**  
 "Radio-for-Amputees" World War II veterans residing on farms may purchase various types of mechanical farm conveyances if they are eligible for vehicles at government expense under the so-called "radio-for-amputees" program, officials of VA stated.

Eligible veterans living on farms may apply for trucks, tractors, riding plows or other agricultural conveyances instead of automobiles, officials emphasized. The last day for filing applications is June 30.

Legislation enacted by Congress last August authorized VA to provide an automobile or other conveyance for each World War II veteran entitled to compensation for the loss, or loss of use, of one or both legs at or above the ankle. The cost of each vehicle is limited to \$1,600, including any special equipment or attachments.

**Questions and Answers**  
 Q. I would like to reinstate my G.I. insurance term policy which lapsed in 1945, and would like to know how to go about it.

A. Through Aug. 1, 1947, the requirements to reinstate a term policy, regardless of the date of lapse, are the payment of only two monthly premiums and a signed statement that you are in as good health as you were on the date of such lapse. You can obtain an application for reinstatement at any VA office.

Q. My G.I. insurance premiums have been waived due to a total disability. Can I convert my term insurance to a permanent plan and still have my premiums waived?

A. You have the privilege of converting to ordinary life, 20-payment life, or 30-payment life and the waiver of premiums will remain in effect as long as you are totally disabled.

## He Goes Truckin' Down The Road

Maybe the third piggy had the right idea when he built his house of brick, but an uncashed student at the University of Oklahoma took a lesson from Tommy Turtle and built his house on a truck so that night may never catch him far away from home.

When G. E. "Skip" Landon, Stuttgart, Arkansas, decided to enroll at the university, and learned the seriousness of housing problems he bought a 2½-ton enclosed army truck. After installing a bed, electric refrigerator, stove and other house-keeping essentials, he fastened them to the floor and drove off to Norman.

Since arriving at the university, he has installed shelves, built-in radio, record player, curtain sink and dozens of other articles to make a model home. This summer he plans to travel without ever leaving home. —(ACP)

New Classified Ads Pay.



Governor Willis' sub-committee on Motor Vehicle Administration recently prepared a report that is just about the best public document I have read in a dozen years.

The sub-committee recommends that a separate agency having equal status with other state departments be called the Department of Motor Vehicles. This agency would be charged with responsibility for administering the Operators' License Law, the Drivers Responsibility Act, the Motor Vehicle Regulatory Laws, and all other motor vehicle functions of the state, including the Highway Patrol, the Division of Motor Transportation and the Department of Revenue, relating to the operation of vehicles. This would be consolidation for economy and efficiency, and the agency would study traffic problems in critical areas on county roads and city streets as well as state and federal highways.

It would promote strict enforcement of the law by all peace and judicial officers of the commonwealth, with emphasis upon the following causes of accidents which result in the loss of hundreds of lives, injury to thousands, and hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages to vehicles:

Violation of speed regulations, drunken driving, overtaking where vision is obstructed, violating signals and signs, operating with improper lights, violating line markings, stopping or parking in hazardous places, and pedestrians violating rules for people on foot.

Important also would be better training of highway patrolmen in traffic law and how to obtain the right kind of evidence to be used against violators. And here comes a recommendation your reporter has been advocating ever since this column was started in January, 1946. A regular system of periodic inspection of all motor vehicles.

This would involve inspection

of cars twice a year or oftener by well trained mechanics. The inspection work could be maintained by charging nominal fees to car and truck owners who would profit in the long run by getting a statement of defects to be used to protect themselves against ignorance of service charges for fictitious repairs.

Persons issuing drivers' licenses would be trained to examine applicants. Strict rules as to mental and physical qualifications of applicants for drivers' licenses are one of the main recommendations of the sub-committee. This clause in the report is too long to be covered in this article. I will give you all the essential points in the near future.

A program of education in road courtesy, urged by the sub-committee, would include:

Strict observance of speed laws, stopping behind halted school buses, aiding and assisting motorists in distress, education in the use of hand signals, proper use of dimmer switches, assistance by local and state police in the training of fleet drivers.

My guess is that less than 50 percent of the licensed drivers in the state use the required hand signals all the time, and as many never think of using their dimmer switches unless they are asked at by persons meeting them.

## Report Of March Grand Jury Of Circuit Court

To Honorable John J. Winn, Judge Rowan Circuit Court: We, the Grand Jury, impaneled for the regular March 1947 term of the Rowan Circuit Court, report that we have been in session five days and that we have returned in open court, 17 indictments. We have inquired diligently into all reported law violations in this county and have found that there are none to be especially noted and that the county appears to be fairly well disciplined. In all cases warranted by testimony before us we have returned true bills.

The most important thing to be reported by this Grand Jury is the condition of the City Jail and the manner in which it is operated. It is our understanding that this jail has been condemned by several previous Grand Juries and as yet nothing has been done to correct any of the conditions noted. It is recommended by this

body that the city be required to hire a city jailer or other official to be the custodian of the jail. As the conditions presently are, a man could die of illness, fire, flood or any one of a hundred casualties before he would ever be noticed as there are long intervals of time in which no person is around the jail except the prisoners therein. Even while on our inspection, we had to wait 30 minutes before we could find anyone with keys to let us in and view this deplorable sight. The jail is not ventilated properly and we believe is an unsafe place for any person to be incarcerated. If the City of Morehead does not rectify these conditions at once it is recommended and urged that the proper officials file an injunction to prevent the jail from being used further.

The Morehead High school building was visited by this body and we have determined as have other Grand Juries that this building is unsafe; presenting a fire hazard in that there is inadequate fire protection and inadequate fire escapes. We also understand that the actual structure of the building is now weakened. It is to be noted here however that at present plans are underway for the construction of a new building. In absence of this we would recommend that further use of the old building would cease.

The courthouse appears clean and apparently is being properly taken care of. Further we noted that the County Jail appeared to be in a sanitary condition and not subject to criticism by this body. However, on the grounds between the jail and the Superintendents office there is a great deal of trash and refuse which presents a very unsightly appearance. It is urged that the parties responsible for this condition be restrained from this practice.

It is noted here that the sanitary facilities at the Morehead High school are inadequate and dangerous to the health of the children there. Further the gymnasium building was dirty and showed a great deal of neglect. Some arrangement should be made and agreement reached between the County Superintendent and the County whereby an

incinerator could be built to burn the papers, etc., from the former's office and to take care of the county trash. This would nullify the prospects of any further dispute as to this matter. Respectfully submitted, J. W. JONES, Foreman.

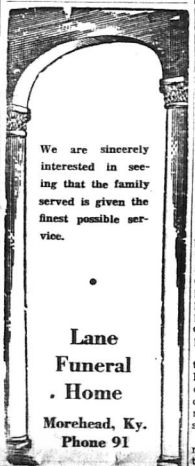

**Sarah Anne's COOKING CLASS**

The housekeeper who is thrifty as well as a good cook knows the art of making good sauces. The most indispensable of all sauces is the white sauce. It appears throughout the menu in soups, entrees, sauces with vegetables and sometimes as the base for desserts. Any leftovers combined with the appropriate sauce may appear to the family as a new and interesting dish.

**Horae Radish Sauce**

1/2 cup cream or evaporated milk  
4 tablespoons horae radish  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1 teaspoon salt  
Beat cream until stiff. Mix horae radish, vinegar and salt. Fold into cream. This is a favorite sauce to serve with beef. For variety add 1/2 cup apple sauce and serve with roast pork or duck.

**Thin White Sauce**

1 tablespoon fat  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 cup milk  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Use for creamed soups, bisques, purees and sauces.

**Thick White Sauce**

2 or 4 tablespoons fat  
3 or 4 tablespoons flour  
1 cup milk  
1 teaspoon salt  
Melt the fat in a saucepan. Stir in the flour and cook until bubbling and smooth—2 or 3 minutes. Pour in the milk, about one-half at a time, stirring constantly until perfectly smooth and creamy. When all the milk is added cook the mixture over boiling water while seasoning and other ingredients are added. If after careful mixing the white sauce is lumpy, beat with a rotary beater until smooth.

**Cucumber Sauce**

1/2 cup cream or evaporated milk  
1 large cucumber  
2 teaspoons vinegar  
1 teaspoon salt  
Beat cream until stiff and add salt and pepper. Add vinegar a little at a time. Peel cucumber, chop and drain well. Beat into cream. Chill. Serve with cold salmon or broiled flounder.

**Spanish Sauce**

2 tablespoons fat  
2 tablespoons chopped onion  
2 tablespoons chopped celery  
1 1/2 tablespoons flour  
1 cup brown stock  
1/2 cup thick tomato pulp  
Hot fat, add onion and celery. Cook until delicately browned. Blend flour and stock, add to tomato pulp and combine with the mixture. Cook about ten minutes. Chopped ham or bacon may be added.

**Lemon Sauce**

4 tablespoons sugar  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1 cup water  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons butter  
Salt  
Mix sugar, cornstarch and the water; cook in double boiler until slightly thick, stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add sugar, cook until it thickens again, stirring constantly. Add salt. Serve hot.

**Marshmallow Mint Sauce**

1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
8 marshmallows cut in small pieces  
1 egg white, stiffly beaten  
1/4 teaspoon peppermint extract  
Green coloring  
Cook sugar and water to a thin syrup. Add marshmallows. Let stand until marshmallows are dissolved. Pour syrup slowly over the egg white, beating constantly until mixture is cool. Add peppermint extract and enough coloring to make delicate green.

**Mint Sauce**

1 tablespoon powdered sugar  
1/4 cup fresh or dried mint leaves  
1/2 cup vinegar  
Heat sugar and vinegar to the boiling point, then pour over chopped mint leaves. Serve with lamb.

**Sauce for Game or Vegetables**

2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 cup sour cream  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Cayenne  
Melt butter, add flour and salt. When well mixed add all of the cold, sour cream at once. Boil

#### JESUS LAYS DOWN HIS LIFE

LESSON TEXT—John 13:37, 38: 19:16.  
MEMORY SELECTION—"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.—John 3:16.

The cross of Calvary, from man's viewpoint, was "a paradox. There is something startling and seemingly incredible about the idea of a crucified king, particularly if those who do the crucifying are the king's own subjects. Kingship implies rulership over others, and not self-destruction and death at their hands. Pilate told the simple truth when he exclaimed, 'Behold your King,' and when he flung out the sarcastic question, 'Shall I crucify your King?' he was speaking more truly than he knew. They were, verily, doing the incredible thing of demanding the death of their King, their Messiah, yes, of the very Son of God." (B. L. Olmstead).

I. Jesus said, "I Am a King" (18:37), 19:16.

Jesus was before Pilate. The Jews had accused him of declaring himself to be king (see Luke 23:2). Pilate demanded, "Art thou King of the Jews?" (v. 19). Jesus did not answer directly at first, but declared his kingdom to be "not of this world" (v. 30).

When Pilate persisted, Jesus openly declared, "I am a king." The expression "Thou sayest?" (v. 31) is a question, "Do you say that I am a king and you are right?" I am a king, it was in no sense a disavowal of his royalty, but a declaration of it.

Pilate, troubled, convinced of Christ's innocence but too cowardly to declare it, hid behind man's proverbial inability to know the truth (v. 38), and wrote himself into history as a hypocritical coward.

What have we to say—what have you to say, dear reader, to Christ's claim to Kingship over your life? Should we not know the King of the Jews, he is the King of our life?"

II. Jesus said, "I Am a King" (18:37), 19:16.

Pilate, in healthy pride, taunted Jesus with his power to determine his fate. He did have much power as the representative of Rome, but power over Jesus he did not have. He said, "I am a king, it was in no sense a disavowal of his royalty, but a declaration of it. Pilate, troubled, convinced of Christ's innocence but too cowardly to declare it, hid behind man's proverbial inability to know the truth (v. 38), and wrote himself into history as a hypocritical coward.

III. Jesus said, "I Am a King" (18:37), 19:16.

In his time of greatest anguish Jesus, in an act of tender thoughtfulness, provided for his mother, and gave the beloved disciple John a high place of privilege and responsibility. He thus, as he made his last request, brought together the two who in all his human relationships had been closest to his heart.

Ready for the final word before he died, Jesus received the commendment which quenched his awful thirst. Then crying out with a loud voice, "It is finished" (Matt. 27:50), he commended his soul into the hands of the Father (Luke 23:46).

What was finished? The great redemptive work, the work of reconciliation and atonement. The Lamb of God had made his great sacrifice for the world—it is this that was completed. Our great Substitute had paid the great ransom price, paid it to the uttermost farthing.

"It is finished indeed. Others will yet preach and teach, and Jesus will work through them; as the King on David's throne his regal work will continue forever; but the redemptive shedding of his blood once for all is finished, and stands as finished forever (Heb. 7:27; 9:12; 10:10; 13:10) (G. C. H. Lewis). Hallelujah, what a Saviour! Is he your Saviour? If not, turn to him by faith just now.

## Waterfield Files Papers For Democratic Gubernatorial Race

Glenn Lane, Morehead Banker, Among Signers Of Publishers Papers

Harry Lee Waterfield formally entered the race for governor this week and declared the primary issue will be "the people versus the privileged interests."

In asking his fellow Democrats to nominate him at the coming August primary, Waterfield declared he believed it is "becoming clear to the people that my opponent is supported by a combination of special interests on one hand—and a coterie of machine politicians on the other hand."

Only definitely announced opponent in the Democratic primary so far is Congressman Earle C. Clements of Morgantown, representing the Third Kentucky District.

If the people elect me governor," he said, "I will pledge that my service will not be hindered by political consideration, nor strangled by unbecoming ambition for personal advancement. I shall covet only the approval that my record will deserve."

People Vs. Special Interests Waterfield declared, "It is my humble conviction the people want greater achievement in schools, hospitals, prisons, highways, rural roads, parks, health departments, bridges." He said he would soon make a detailed announcement of his program.

After declaring "the primary issue" of the coming campaign will be "the people of Kentucky versus the special interests," Waterfield said the second issue will be "private utilities versus TVA and REA."

The third issue, he continued, "is the issue of performance." He rested his claim to that on his record of ten years in the Kentucky House of Representatives.

Waterfield served as Speaker of the House in the 1944 and 1945 sessions and was one of the leaders in defeating a bill which its opponents charged was designed to hamper use of TVA current in Kentucky.

Graduate of Murray Born on a Calloway, County farm Jan. 18, 1911, Waterfield was graduated at Murray State Teachers College in 1933. He was married in 1933 to Laura Ferguson of LaCenter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Garth Ferguson. They have three children. Waterfield is a farmer and newspaper publisher who makes his home at Clinton.

The names of 28 Democrats,

representing all of the state's nine congressional districts appeared on the official declaration of intent with Secretary of State Charles K. O'Connell.

Among them were Ben Kilgore of Franklin, unsuccessful candidate for Democratic nomination for governor four years ago; Mrs. Eppy H. Goodpastor, president of the State Democratic Women's Clubs; a number of Circuit Judges, Legislators, and Representatives of management and labor, and Glenn W. Lane, Cashier of the Citizens Bank of Morehead.

"In filing my declaration for governor in the Democratic primary August 2, I am conscious of the honor I seek and the responsibility that will be mine if I am elected. That is why I am submitting my candidacy in humility."

Pledges Progress "I am humbly conscious of the opportunity to give Kentucky an honest and efficient government, the general welfare of all the people. I humbly believe the people are in the temper to demand that we forget the old political faces and things that divided us in the past. It is my humble conviction the people want greater achievement in schools, hospitals, prisons, highways, rural roads, parks, health departments, bridges."

Does No Personal Gain "If the people elect me governor, I now pledge that my service will not be hindered by political consideration, nor strangled by unbecoming ambition for personal advantage. I shall covet only the approval that my record will deserve."

"It is, I believe, becoming clear to the people that my opponent is supported by a combination of special interests on one hand, and a coterie of machine politicians, on the other hand. These forces use politics as a measuring rod for every proposal that is advanced to improve the general welfare of all the people."

As I see it, the primary issue of this campaign will be the people of Kentucky versus the privileged interests. I now pledge you that I will side with the people. This is not a new stand for me to take. The record of my public service will show that I have always been on the side of the people. My record of public service will show I have always opposed special privileges for any individual, group or interest.

"The second issue of the campaign, as I see it, will be private utilities versus TVA and REA.

I shall continue to advocate cheaper electric power for all the people. I shall do all I can to electrify every farm home in Kentucky. I shall work unceasingly to secure better service and cheaper power, through TVA and REA, for town people and country people alike. I shall resist with all my strength further attempts of private utilities and power interests to monopolize distribution to fasten perpetual franchises upon the people, and to fix arbitrary rates that are excessively high.

"Within the near future, it is my purpose to make a detailed public announcement of my program as to:

1. Roads and bridges.
2. Education.
3. Agriculture, business, labor and industry.
4. Welfare, health, hospitals and prisons.
5. Conservation and recreation.

"Home rule, with respect to the financial plight of cities and counties.

1. Fiscal affairs, with respect to revenues, appropriations, and the cash surplus.

"The third issue as I see it is the issue of performance. I will be able to do the things I promise because I will not be bound to any special interests or political bosses. But my opponent is in the opposite position. He will be bound to the vested interests and machine politicians who support him. They will demand and obtain a voice in administering any program my opponent might advocate."

"I believe the people know my philosophy of government, as demonstrated by 10 years of service in the House of Representatives. I believe my service has set a standard by which Kentuckians can gauge my fitness for the larger tasks ahead. In any case, upon that record rests my candidacy, my request for support, and my hope of election. I submit myself and my record in full candor and faith."

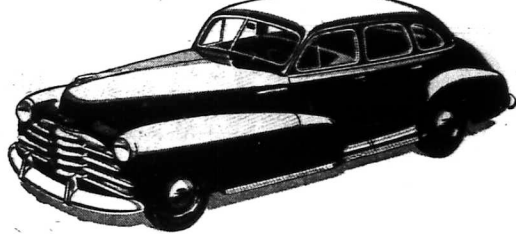
