Two Draw Sentences In Circuit Court

Five Year Terms Meted Out On Child Desertion Indictments

Two men drew five year penitentiary terms in Rowan Circuit Court this week upon conviction of child desertion.

Emerald Bowling's sentence of five years was probated, however, provided that he pay his wife \$15 a week. The other five year term was meted out to Paul Barryman.

Arthur Moore, charged with carrying concealed a deadly weapon, was found not guilty. There are no murder trials scheduled this term, and the docket is the lightest in years.

The State Highway Department today announced that it would receive bids until June 6 for widening and high type surfacing of the Morehead College Boulevard from its intersection with Main Street at the courthouse to the stadium, a distance of a little more than half a mile.

Cause For Sober Thought

The resignation of two 'key' staff members at Morehead College this week brings to more than a score the number of faculty and administrative leaders that the institution has lost in the last year. It is cause for much sober thinking and increases the burden of Dr. William Jesse Baird, the president, who is already carrying a top-heavy load in his efforts to restore normalcy to the largest institution of higher learning in Eastern Kentucky.

A combination of loss of accrediting and inability to meet the pay-roll standards offered of the year is gradually robbing Morehead of the heart of its teaching and administrative staff. With the salaries that the Board of Regents can offer under its present budget it is well nigh impossible to replace these persons with equally competent people.

When Ellis Johnson resigned this week to accept a three year contract as coach of the professional Louisville basketball team he told reporters: "I am crazy about Morehead. . . I like the college and I like the people. . . I am unable to resist the larger salary I am offered at Louisville." Johnson, who had already turned down two or three lucrative offers, will receive twice as much pay at Louisville as he has been getting at Morehead.

The other resignation is that of Miss Mary Page Milton, who has become almost a second cousin to Morehead students and Morehead alumni. In a quiet but efficient manner Miss Milton has won her way into the hearts of practically every student that Morehead has had in the last 17 years. She has always played a leading role in alumni activities, and from her office as registrar there has never come any complaint. She has accepted a position at the University of Kentucky. In Miss Milton Morehead loses another valuable person.

Dr. Baird has long been cognizant of these resignations and has scouted the whole nation for replacements. There was a time when some people advocated that Kentucky institutions should be staffed by Kentuckians. Now, the college is fortunate if they can find a qualified man in any

state who will accept a position at the salary they can afford to pay.

Is there a solution to this problem which is sapping Morehead? There is one but it will not be easy to achieve. First, Morehead must regain its accreditation with the Southern Association and the American Association. There is reason for optimistic thought that this can be done in December.

But, this is only the first step. The other must follow when the state legislature meets. Morehead must have more money. They need funds for capital outlay which Dr. Baird will ask for. But, more important than that, Morehead must have more money on which to operate. Morehead can employ top personnel only if they can pay in proportion to colleges in other states. It is perhaps a harsh thing to say, but nevertheless true, that a depression would help Morehead College.

The people of Morehead and all the citizens of Kentucky who are interested in educational advancement can help this college when Kentucky's legislature does meet. The legislature will be faced with demands for increased appropriations from practically every department and certainly from the University and the other three teachers colleges. The legislature and the Governor must be convinced that Morehead's need is paramount and that the requests that Dr. Baird will make are mandatory for this college to progress and attain its rightful place in educating boys and girls of the mountains of Kentucky. Dr. Baird will need the public opinion of Eastern Kentucky behind him, and there is no better place for the center of that support to emanate than right here in Morehead.

Sunday School Lesson

THE FALL OF THE NORTHERN KINGDOM
International Sunday School Lesson for May 25, 1947

OLDEN TEXT: "For the Lord knoweth the way of the righteous; but the way of the wicked shall perish."—Psalm 136.

Lesson Text: II Kings 17: 5-23; 22; Isaiah 38: 1-4.

In this lesson we come to a climax in our study of Israel's history. The Northern Kingdom, Israel or Ephraim, founded by revolution under Jeroboam in 931 B. C., was two hundred and nine years old when it came to a convulsive and violent end in 722 B. C. under Hoshea. It is significant that, even in its beginning, Israel had no solid religious foundation. The Temple, the prophets and the priests were in Judah.

Jeroboam, realizing this, set up two places of worship, but these could not take the place of the Temple at Jerusalem in the hearts and minds of the people. The Northern Kingdom suffered under the plague of Baalism introduced by Jezebel and, in the main, the kings were lacking in spiritual understanding. The people of Israel were also strongly influenced by the surrounding nations and, instead of bringing the true religion to their neighbors, they absorbed from their neighbors low, pagan principles.

In 745 B. C., Tiglath-Pileser began his reign in Assyria. In 738 he came against the land of Palestine and exacted tribute from those peoples, and in 734 he came back with a strong army and began the subjugation of the territory. The Kingdom of Israel was practically ruined, as the army swept into Galilee and took away captives throughout the land of Israel. The capital city, Samaria, was alone left to stand through the next few years.

Shulmanzer followed Tiglath and he was followed by Sargon. After a long, and bloody siege, the city of Samaria fell before the Assyrian invaders and the people of Israel were taken away into captivity. The ten tribes were taken away and Assyria and then paroled out of the other nations of the East so that they were scattered all the way from Samaria to the regions beyond Assyria. We speak of them as the "Ten Lost Tribes" because as a people they disappeared being absorbed by the people with whom they lived. The few who were permitted to remain in Samaria intermarried with their conquerors, and became the hated "Samaritans" of whom we hear during Jesus' day.

That, in brief, is the story of the rise and fall of the Northern Kingdom. The story is a painful one because the cause of the fall is so apparent. Sin had its way and did its worst. The people forgot God to whom they owed their very existence and turned to paganism, worshipping idols. When they did attempt to worship Jehovah, it was in a half-hearted way and without understanding of the true nature of worship.

Despite the warnings of God, through his prophets, the people continued in their sinful ways, failing to walk as a godly people. Finally, the hand of God came heavily upon them to bring about their captivity and suffering and ruin. "The soul that sinneth, it shall die," is as true as of a nation as it is of an individual.

In our own time, we have seen nations rise and fall and may have asked ourselves the question "Why do nations perish?" A study of the Scripture gives, with absolute directness, the answer, attributing the collapse of nations to a lack of quality of heart and conduct. The nation that rejects the moral and spiritual law of God will perish. The fact was evident in the day of Israel; it is still true today. This is still God's world and those who love and obey him will survive, while those who hate him and violate his basic laws will suffer. "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." (Prov. 14:34).

Isaiah tells of a primary wickedness which contributed to the fall of Israel, when he declares, "Woe to the crown of pride, to the drunkards of Ephraim, whose glorious beauty is a fading flower, which are on the head of the fat valleys of them that are overcome with wine. Drunkenness was a contributing factor to the downfall of Israel and to the fall of other great nations. During the past war it was Pétain, who declared, "Alcoholism was the chief cause of the French army's collapse and the worst of France's come with serious problems. Our soldiers were drunk and could not fight."

Having studied the reasons for the fall of Israel and other nations, what parallels do we find in our own nation's life? Are we in danger of slipping as a nation? While we may not be building places for pagan worship, erecting idols to paganism, can it not be said of us that we are wearing "a crown of pride," worshipping at the shrine of material prosperity and, in the pursuit of pleasure, forgetting God?

And the drunkards of Ephraim have nothing on us. The drinkers of America spent a total of \$8,700,000,000 for alcoholic beverages in 1946, or an average of \$89

for each person over 18 years of age. The growing list of arrests for drunkenness, car wrecks caused by it, and rottenness growing out of it put Ephraim to shame. If greed, immorality and intemperance can be called ungodliness, then America is headed toward Israel's doom.

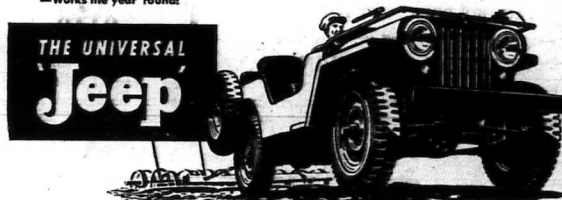

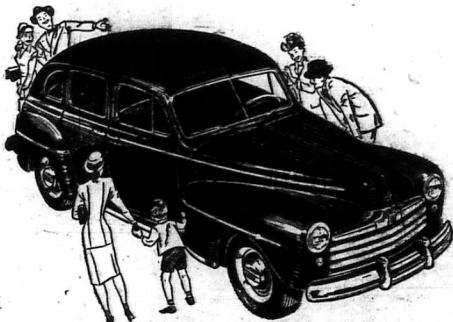

Johnson Resigns Coaching Post At Morehead

Takes Position As Coach Of Louisville Pro Basketball Team; Successor Has Not Been Named

Ellis Johnson, head coach and head of the physical education department at Morehead State Teachers College since 1936, resigned his position here yesterday to accept an offer from the Louisville Dads professional basketball team. The effective date of his resignation is as yet uncertain.

Johnson, who has enjoyed tremendous success while at Morehead, said that his contract with the pro club was for three years and made it possible for him to make from \$7,000 to \$9,000 annually.

"I'm crazy about Morehead," Johnson was quoted as saying, "but the pro offer was just too attractive to turn down. It gives me a chance to specialize in coaching, to concentrate on one sport instead of coaching everything as I have been doing."

His selection ends an almost four-month search by the club for a coach. Adolph Rupp of the University of Kentucky, Ed Diddle of Western State Teachers, Everett Case of North Carolina, Johnny Wooden of Indiana State and Branch McCracken of Indiana University, were among those offered the job.

Johnson did not apply for the job until Saturday morning when he made a special trip to Louisville for that purpose and only yesterday tendered his resignation to President William Jesse Baird.

Johnson was a four-sport star at the University of Kentucky from which he was graduated in 1933. He was named an All-American basketball player in high school in 1928 while playing with the Ashland Tomcats, national champs that year. Prior to coming to Morehead in 1936, Johnson coached at Williamson (W. Va.) high school.

The new Louisville Dads head man has recently been mentioned in connection with coaching jobs at V. P. I., the University of Idaho and Vanderbilt.

His basketball teams at Morehead have won approximately 70 per cent of their games.

Dale Morey, former player-coach at Louisiana State University was signed as a player-assistant to Johnson in his new position.

No successor to Johnson has been named, although the names of several prominent coaches are being passed around on the MSTC campus. However these must be considered as speculation because no official announcement as to Johnson's replacement has been made, no selection is expected in the near future. President Baird was reported to be out of town and therefore was not available for comment on Johnson's resignation or any possible successor.

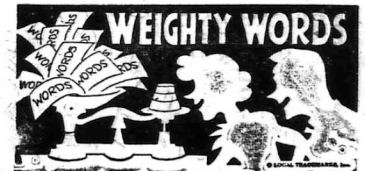
