## Telephone Co. Makes Increase In Rates

### New Schedule Will Become Effective In Morehead October 21

An increase in telephone rates in Morehead and 16 cities served by the Ashland Home Telephone System was announced today by L. O. Evenson, vice-president and general manager. The petition for the increase was made before the Public Service Commission, Charles E. Whittle, commission chairman, immediately suspended the new rate schedule, but company officials said they would post a \$50,000 bond and make the new tariffs effective October 21.

Other cities affected are Catletburg, Russell, Ashland, Berea, Brynstantville, Flemingsburg, Grayson, Greenup, Hazard, Lancaster, Liberty, Olive Hill, Paint Lick, Owingsville, Sharpshooter, and Vanceburg.

The rate increase will average about 39 cents a phone. The company serves about 17,000 subscribers, and the rate increase will net the Ashland Company \$90,000 a year in additional revenue. Evenson said the increase is effective October 21.

The general manager of the company set out that the present rates had been effective since 1936.

## Eagles Open With Murray Friday Night

### Johnson Disguised With Marshall Game Makes Many Lineup Changes



Bill Everhart Stars Against Marshall

Outspokenly dissatisfied, and in some respects "disgusted" with the showing of the Morehead Eagles in dropping a 38-12 decision to Marshall at Huntington Saturday, Head Coach Ellis Johnson today announced an almost complete shaking up of the starting lineup when the Blue and Gold opens its home schedule at Jayne Memorial Stadium Friday night.

Seven freshmen and four sophomores are slated to be there for Morehead, when the opening whistle sounds as Johnson plans to sideline his veterans. That Johnson was "disgusted" over the showing against Marshall was demonstrated when he put the Eagles through what was perhaps the hardest scrimmage session ever seen at the Stadium. When the evening shadows fell the entire squad was at the examination point.

Morehead's lineup against Murray will be the greatest that has ever taken the field for the Eagles, but it will combine plenty of weight, and Johnson says they may not have the experience, but they'll be in there "pitching."

The freshmen who will start are Manuel Lyons, 212 pounder of Louisville and Frank Moricze, 200 pounder of South Williamson. Also on the line are Robert Dyer, 180, of Pikeville, at guard; Jim Mauer, of Dayton, at end; and three backs, Matt Pryor of Lexington, Jerry Wing of Dayton, and Milan Perich of Gary, W. Va. The four starting sophomores are Jim Spidle of Huntington, Jim Kennedy of Huntington, Joseph Barber of Huntington, junior quarterback; and John Collins of Oak Hill, Ohio, center.

### Should The People Pay For Something They're Not Getting?

In petitioning the Kentucky Public Service Commission for an increase in rates in the 17 cities and towns which it serves, including Morehead, the Ashland Home Telephone Company points out that the old rates have been in effect since 1936 and that steadily increasing wage scales and material costs make it necessary for the company to secure additional revenue.

This appears logical and their request on the surface seems reasonable. However, Morehead's other utilities—electric, water and natural gas—have not sought a rate increase since 1936 and their profits now are greater than they were 11 years ago.

A new Packard automobile costs around \$2,000. A used Model-T costs for \$50. The question as to whether the Ashland Home Telephone Company should be permitted to increase rates is whether the Public Service Commission should allow them to charge Packard prices for Model-T service.

A long discussion of the type of service that this company renders is irrelevant and unnecessary at this time inasmuch as they have been under fire for over two years, and the Public Service Commission is undoubtedly aware that its customers are receiving poor local service with the long distance service so slow that Morehead users can generally travel to the point they are calling quicker than they can get a call through.

It is interesting that L. O. Evenson, vice-president and general manager of the Ashland Home Telephone Company says that one of the reasons why higher rates are asked is that "adequate revenues are necessary to attract additional capital required for improvements in service." This is one way of saying that the Ashland company lacks sufficient funds to make the improvements which they have promised for years, or (2) they do not have sufficient credit to borrow the money to make the improvements and an added revenue of \$20,000 annually would give them this borrowing power, or (3) the capital will not be attracted if they have promised for years, or (3) they do not have sufficient credit to borrow the money to make the improvements and an added revenue of \$20,000 annually would give them this borrowing power.

In short the public is being asked to underwrite and finance the promised improvements before their installation and with no assurance they will ever get them. It is sort of like which came first, the hen or the egg. In this case the Ashland Home Telephone Company is saying: "You pay us more money and we will give you a better system." We contend that the company should give its dissatisfied customers the proper service and then the Public Service Commission should rightfully consider their request for an increase in rates.

Further, if the rate increase is now denied, which it should be, and the telephone company does not live up to the first principle of a public utility by adequately serving the people, their franchises should be revoked and every attempt made to attract a company that will give the people the class of service to which they are entitled. As long as the people with the support of what we believe is a good Public Service Commission have a chance to put the shoe on the foot that it fits.

### Morehead Does A Good Job

Despite unforeseen last minute changes and the fact that everything didn't go just as the arrangements committee planned, the Democrat opening at Morehead last Saturday was the best ever held in Kentucky, according to many seasoned political veterans.

Gubernatorial candidate Earle C. Clements and State Campaign Manager Tom Underwood were high in their praise of the good job that was done here which they termed, "A great broadside that represents the beginning of hostilities that will sweep the Republicans from power at Frankfort." The crowd of 7,000 here for the opening was

very representative of every section of Kentucky, with at least 100,000 persons having delegates present. And, at no time in the history of the state, has so many dignitaries in the party been assembled in one place.

Moreheadians may well be proud of this opening. Presenting a quick and spasm appearance Morehead welcomed our guests in true Kentucky style, and they left here high in their praise of our small city. Hundreds of letters have poured into the local Democrat headquarters in appreciation of the reception that we accorded our neighbors.

Mr. Clements told the arrangements committee that "I shall never forget the fine cooperation that Morehead gave me, and I trust that in the future I shall be able to repay you." This coming from the man that will, barring a major political upset, be the next Governor of Kentucky, bodes well for Morehead and Morehead College, which is surely in need of assistance from the Executive chamber.

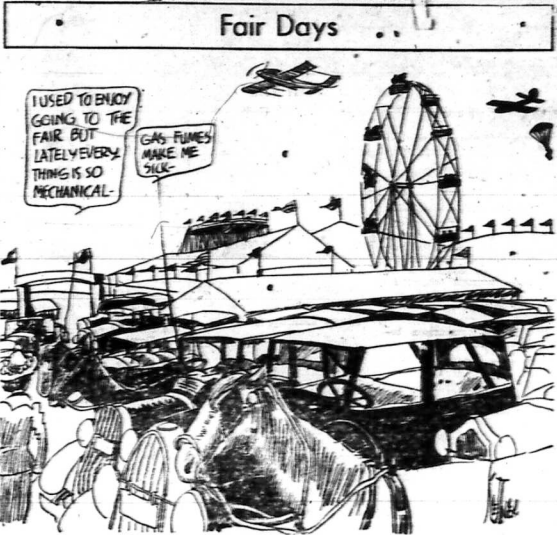

the Highway Department, it was disclosed by Mr. Watkins, there are 1011 cars which pass points near Olive Hill and Grayson each day. Of this number only 450 could be listed as through traffic, according to the survey, which indicated that the majority of vehicles using the road was by the people of the county. Mr. Watkins further stated that a by-pass of either Grayson or Olive Hill could not be demanded from the surveys, so long as most of the traffic remained of this local nature.

**Cover Crop Plantings In Rowan Urged**

Turner Lists Reasons Why Soil Should Be Properly Cared For

With at least four excellent reasons for seeding small grains this fall, not a single acre of Rowan County cultivated land should go through this winter without a protective cover crop, according to C. B. Turner, chairman of the County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The reasons he listed for seeding small grains such as wheat, rye, barley, and oats this fall were:

1. With Europe and other grain importing areas again short of bread grain a larger harvest of small grains will be needed in 1948 to feed the hungry peoples of the world.

2. With feeds scarce as a result of a short crop in the corn belt this year, small grains may be needed for harvest as hay or grain for livestock feed on many farms next year.

3. Small grains seeded in time

By establishing a small grain winter cover crop on their land this fall, farmers may earn a payment in the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program if the grains are not harvested for hay or grain.

If the grains are harvested to add to the world's bread and feed supplies, the farmer is assured of a market and a fair price for the grain through the U. S. Department of Agriculture's price support loan and purchase agreement program. Price supports as 90 percent of parity are in effect under present law through 1948.

### Mt. Sterling Hospital Gets Sharp Criticism

The Montgomery and Bath County Medical Societies sharply criticized the administration of the Mary Chiles Hospital at Mt. Sterling in a letter received today by the Board of Trustees of the hospital charging that

graduate nurses were available, but that the hospital would never have enough nurses as long as the present hospital administration continues.

The hospital board announced last week that use of 20 per cent of the beds would be discontinued because they could not find additional registered nurses. The Mary Chiles is operating at present with three registered nurses, four practical nurses and Miss Bess Pelley, superintendent. Two more registered nurses are needed for full operation of the hospital, it was said.

The doctors of both counties recommended that more beds be added, sufficient and adequate nursing care be provided and medical representation on the board be assured. The letter went on to state that unless these recommendations are acted on the doctors do not feel that in fairness to their patients they can continue to send them to the Mary Chiles Hospital.

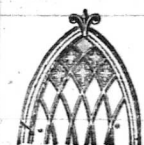
