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Squirrel Season In Kentucky Opens Aug. 20 Squirrel hunters may take to the woods on August 20 this year, five days later than the opening of the season last year. The Division of Game and Fish has announced. Thirty days have been cut from the season this year in an effort to protect the squirrels for future years, the Division points out. The season will open on August 20 and close on Nov. 5, both dates inclusive. Formerly the season extended from August 15 to November 30. Reports from throughout the State indicate a large squirrel population in most sections last year. The hunter must possess a hunting license, and repeater or automatic shotgun must be plugged so that they will not hold more than three shells in the magazine and barrel combined, the Division warned.

The rabbit and quail season also has been reduced this year. The season will open on Nov. 20 and continue through Jan. 10, as compared to the season of last year which opened on Nov. 20 and closed on Jan. 15. The squirrel limit will be six per day, with 10 quail and eight rabbit being within the law.

The Fish and Game Commission also changed the frog hunting season. Frogs may be taken from June 1 through Dec. 31 with a limit of 15 per day. Hunting of pheasant or native grouse will be Dec. 1 to 15, both dates inclusive, while quom, mink, raccoon, skunk, muskrat and red fox may be taken from Dec. 1 to Jan. 31, both dates inclusive.

### Emergency Buy Of Blankets Made For Polio Victims

Due to a scarcity of the type of wool needed for making hot packs used in treating polio patients, the War Assets Administration authorized an emergency purchase of 500 army blankets by the Kentucky Chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Mrs. Inez K. Ligon, Chapter Secretary an-

nounced. Distribution of this wool is to be under the supervision of the State Board of Health. The rate of new cases of polio reported in Kentucky has slowed in the past few days, with 140 cases reported in the state as of July 29, Franklin County with 10 cases, Fayette with 6, Davies 6, Jefferson 3, and Barren and Carter with 2 each, account for the majority of the cases in Kentucky.

Food Costs Jump Up

For three or four years, after the end of World War I, the topic of conversation among the people of this country was the high cost of living.

It may be interesting to note that on June 14th of this year, the cost-of-living index hit an all-time high. The index represents the retail prices of goods and services that would be used by families of moderate incomes in large cities.

The World War I peak was reached in May 1920, but the index has set new high records in the nineteen months since November, 1947. That was the month when it passed the World War I top figures and present indications are that the consumer has not yet faced the worst.

It is interesting to note that the general index is 28.8 per cent above that of June, 1918, when price controls were generally abandoned.

It is rather significant to note that the food cost of the moderate income families has advanced more than 60 per cent since June, 1946. This represents a tremendous drain on the purchasing power of the family and explains why there is something of a slump in the purchase of other things besides food.

Colleges and universities have attracted nearly 60 per cent of the World War II veterans who are enrolled in educational institutions under the GI Bill and Public Law 16. VA reported today.

The remaining 40 per cent are taking courses in high schools, trade schools and other educational institutions below the college level.

Recent statistics show a total of 1,632,780 veterans were training in educational institutions under the GI Bill of 1952, 982,297, or 59 per cent, were in colleges and universities.

At the same time, 21,071 disabled veterans were in school under Public Law 16. College students numbered 82,623, or 60 per cent of the Public Law 16 trainees.

The number of living veterans on VA disability compensation and pension rolls has decreased during the past year, VA reported today.

The total dropped from a peak of 2,233,000 in August, 1947, to 2,289,000 on July 1, 1948.

## New Highway Program For State Planned

### Withers Outlines Plan Designed To Give Kentucky Better Roads

Commissioner of Highways Garrett L. Withers last week promised a group of service clubs at Elizabethtown that it will be his purpose to promote a road program that will be an asset and not a liability to Kentucky.

"Any road that is an asset instead of a liability, one that will pay for itself, its maintenance and provide a surplus for construction of other roads will be considered," Withers told the club members at the joint meeting at which he was principal speaker. "The state should not be unwise in investing in these projects."

"Reckless expenditure of our money in the improvement of our state road system will ultimately result in bankruptcy of the Highway Department to the point that it will not be able to maintain roads that have been constructed."

Withers said every effort is being made to put the Highway Department on a sound business basis but warned his audience that last winter's freeze and thaw on Kentucky's highways had done so much damage that little new construction has been done.

"To complete the present road program would cost more than \$500,000,000," he continued. "The most we can do to carry out present program will be to 'dent' it."

Withers added that in the formulation of a sound road system that "none of us should overlook the importance of our road system to an increased tourist trade to bring in additional business and revenue to our state. That we might succeed along this line, I think it more important that Kentuckians see Kentucky first, not only to spend money in Kentucky but that we become better acquainted with our own state."

The Commissioner of Highways explained that the recent Congress failed to make a federal-aid appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1 and deprived Kentucky of approximately \$3,000,000 for the year, and cut the appropriations for the years 1949-50 and 1950-51 by

## Shirfer Feels Organized Ring Of Bike Thieves

Kids! Copy the serial number from your bicycle and keep it in a safe place as you may need it for identification purposes to catch a bike thief.

This was the advice issued today by Sheriff Sam Green, who said that there had been an orgy of bicycle stealing in and about Morehead during the week.

The Sheriff's office received two complaints of bicycle thefts last week, while three were reported stolen in Morehead Tuesday evening. One of these belonged to Curtis Gilson at Rothbar, while another was the property of Eljahn Cantrell's son, Green, said that probably others had been taken but had not been reported to him.

Sheriff Green reported one of the bikes had been recovered. The Sheriff said his office could recover a stolen bike and probably apprehend the thief if they were furnished with a description of the bike. He added that children who leave their bikes out at night were making it easy for the thieves.

The Sheriff said that he is convinced that there is an organized ring of bicycle thieves in this vicinity.

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## New Fishing, Hunting Laws Are Released

### Open Season, Bag Limits Are Changed In Some Cases

Squirrel: open season, August 20 to November 9 inclusive; bag limit—six.

Quail: open season, November 20 to January 10 inclusive; bag limit—ten.

Grouse or native phasian: open season, December 1 to December 15 inclusive; bag limit—two.

Rabbits: open season, November 20 to January 10 inclusive; bag limit—eight.

Opossum, mink, raccoon, skunk, muskrat, red fox: open season, December 1 to January 31; no bag limit.

Bullfrog: open season, June 1 to December 31 inclusive; bag limit—fifteen.

Federal regulations will apply in the hunting of doves, geese, coot and gallinule, woodcock and snipe.

A person who has hunted two or more days in succession may have in his possession a total of not more than twice the number above allowed.

Fishing season is open the year round in all streams and impoundments. It is also, open in all navigable streams (under lock and dam) for commercial fishing, but not above the last lock and dam above.

The new fishing regulations are as follows:

Black bass (small mouth, large mouth and Kentucky); daily creel limit—ten, size limit—ten inches.

Black bass or pogy eye; daily creel limit—fifteen, no size limit.

Cropper or meadow; daily creel limit—fifteen; no size limit.

Jack salmon or walleye pike; daily creel limit—ten; size limit—18 inches.

Sand pike or sauger; daily creel limit—ten; size limit, ten inches.

Striped bass; daily creel limit—fifteen; no size limit.

Muskellunge; no daily creel limit; size limit—24 inches.

No person is permitted to use a steel trap with a jaw spread of more than 5 1/2 inches, or the jaws of which have a sharp or jagged edge, or that have more than one spring for the purpose of closing the jaws or that has a spring which would normally be expected under ordinary circumstances, to set a pressure sufficient instantly to cut through or break the leg of any wild animal protected by this chapter.

When a regulation is made and where no change has been made the old laws will apply.

The sale of rabbits will be prohibited after December 31, 1948.

## Ban Use Of State Vehicles For Politics

### Employees Prohibited From Using Public Owned Equipment

Use of Highway Department equipment in political campaigns is expressly forbidden in a bulletin issued today by G. I. Withers, Commissioner, Kentucky Department of Highways. The bulletin is directed to all district engineers and all division heads and suggests that those addressed "see that this order is promptly conveyed to each employee."

"This department is concerned with the very important matter of building and maintaining the Kentucky highways," Mr. Withers said. "Sufficient time will be allowed employees to exercise the right to vote, but additional time taken will be deducted from the department payroll.

Foreign and employees must cooperate in reporting incidents which are in violation of this order. Every employee is urged to vote, but he must not use department equipment or department time to campaign in the interest of any candidate."

## Grant County Votes Dry, Perry Wet

Local option elections were held in two Kentucky counties, Grant and Perry, July 3. Grant voted to retain prohibition and Perry cast a wet vote of approximately 2 to 1.

Perry voted to return legalized liquor sales by a vote of 4,063 to 2,249. Grant voted for prohibition, 1,919 to 1,331.

The first referendum under Kentucky's new local option law will be held in Mt. Sterling on Sept. 17.

The 1948 Legislature amended the state's local option law to allow cities of the first four population classes to hold wet-dry elections independently of rural precincts. Previously, the votes were taken on a county-wide basis.

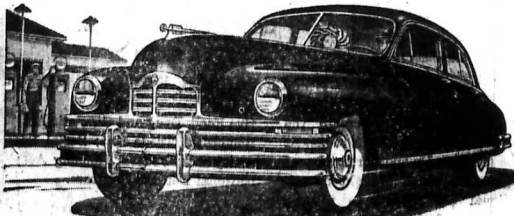

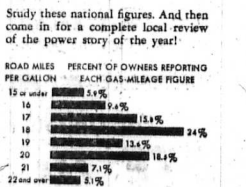

### Breeding Of Tobacco Free From Disease Is Demonstration Topic

#### By Adrian M. Razor, Rowan County Agent

Burley and dark tobacco resistant to disease will be among the sights at the Annual Field Day meeting held at the Agricultural Experiment Station at Lexington August 15. Much progress has been made at the Experiment Station in breeding tobacco that don't have any kind of disease. Farmers attending this meeting will have a chance to see first hand the new varieties being developed and to hear them discussed by experts.

Also to be seen will be the effects of rotation and cropping systems on tobacco, as the green manure chop in growing tobacco continuously on the same land. Different kinds of Hybrid corn will be seen growing in different rotation with various applications of fertilizer. The Experiment Station has made extensive tests in using the chemical 2-4-D to control weeds. Farmers attending can see just how this chemical works.

### Recruiting To Continue Despite Draft Law

The Army and the Air Force recruiting campaigns to enlist 2-year volunteers will continue without get-up although draft legislation has been passed. Sgt. Martin said here today.

The two services will continue to rely on volunteer enlistments as the principal means of obtaining needed manpower. Sgt. Martin explained. The Selective Service Act will be used only to make up the difference between authorized strength and the number of volunteers.

Volunteers are the backbone of our regular forces. Sgt. Martin said. They furnish the career men, and we cannot have an Army or an Air Force without career men, which come from volunteers," he said.

Many enlistment choices are open to 2-year volunteers. In either of the two services, Sgt. Martin pointed out. Under the Army technical school plan they can choose training in one of more than 60 specialties before enlisting. Service overseas in Japan and Korea is also available. Veterans have special choices, depending upon their previous service.

Men of draft age. Sgt. Martin said, can enlist for 21 months in active service. Eighteen year old volunteers may volunteer for 1 year. In both cases, however, these short-term volunteers will be required to join the Reserve when they complete their active service.

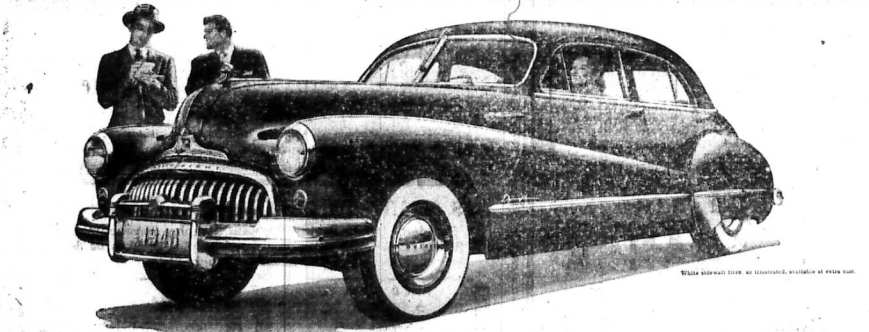

Soil Group Plan Tour Of Kentucky

Manufacturers, State Organizations Combine In Undertaking

A soil conservation caravan will start a tour of Kentucky on Sept. 18, ending Oct. 19, putting on demonstrations at a dozen points, under sponsorship of the supervisors of Kentucky Soil Conservation Districts.

Resource, Division of Forestry, Fish and Wild Life and other agricultural agencies in the planning of the caravan. The program will start at the Kentucky State Fair in Louisville, Sept. 18. The send-off program at the Fair will be participated in by Gov. Clements, Dr. H. H. Bennett, chief of the US Soil Conservation Service; Dr. T. S. Bule, Sparta, Tenn.; G. C. regional conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service; Dr. Herman L. Donovan, president of UK; H. K. Gayle, state conservationist; Dean Thomas P. Cooper of the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The caravan will be formed during this program by various manufacturers of equipment that is usable in conservation work. The caravan will put on its first field demonstration in Boone County, Sept. 22, and each Monday, Wednesday and Friday thereafter other field demonstrations will be held around the route.

Field days will consist of the establishment of desirable conservation practices including terracing, drainage work, pasture establishment, pond construction, fertilization and other practices necessary to conserve soil and water resources, according to M. W. Quills, head of the State Soil and Water Resources Agency. There will be from 29 to 30 pieces of motorized equipment at each field day and on the caravan. The equipment will consist of farm tractors with special conservation tools, crawler tractor, gradings, and tile ditches. The complete itinerary of the caravan is: Sept. 22, Joseph Hacy farm,

Kentucky Has Freed 23 Bridges In 20 Years

Freeing of the Rockport span across Green River by the State Highway Department last Saturday recalled to the mind of many here that within 20 years Kentucky has freed 22 former toll structures to the traveling public and only one state-operated toll span remains in operation. The remaining state-operated toll bridge is the Central bridge connecting Newport with Cincinnati and spanning the Ohio River. It is expected to become free in about nine years at the present rate of toll collections. It was purchased last fall for \$1,000,000. None of the indebtedness against it has been retired.

There are seven other toll spans connecting Kentucky with other states—two of which are operated by quasi-public bodies and will become free to the traveling public within a relatively short time. These are the Cairo-Wickliffe bridge and the Owensboro span both crossing the Ohio River. Five privately-owned toll bridges remain.

Kentucky's toll-bridge program was undertaken in 1928 and implemented by the 1930 General Assembly under terms of the Murphy Toll Bridge Act which provided for acquisition and construction of toll bridges.

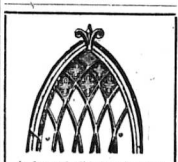

that would become free at the end of the toll-paying period when all indebtedness against the spans was paid.

First bridges obtained under the Murphy Act were the Clay's Ferry bridge across the Kentucky River which was bought for \$205,000; the Rio bridge across Green River for \$64,129.53 and Mumfordsville span across Green River for \$224,000. These were bought in late 1928 and 1929, and all were freed within a comparatively short while.

After 1930, the toll bridge program has been financed entirely by bond issues, whether the bridges were procured by construction or purchase.

Under agreements signed with Italy and Ireland and now being closed with the other countries to receive aid under the Marshall Plan, the United States stands to gain new stores of scarce war materials among other returns from the billions in foreign aid funds being invested in western European recovery.
