Hindman's Yellowjackets, flashing a sharp-shooting, fast-break offensive carried off the championship of the second annual Morehead Invitational Tournament here last week. The Jackets nudged Carr Creek 34-23 in an overtime period to cop the halo.

Hindman and Carr Creek, both Knox County fives, had battled their way to the finals with convincing triumphs. Hindman romping at Cambridge, 47-28, and tripping Ashland High, 43-20, while Carr Creek was besting Salt Lick 48-28 and Owingsville 43-25.

In the final contest Hindman took a 10-0 lead with seven minutes of play still elapsed and it looked as if a rout was in the making. Carr Creek managed to cage a fielder as the period ended and the score read, Hindman 10-2.

The Creekers fought Hindman on even terms in the second period and the half ended Hindman 18, Carr Creek 9.

The third period saw a rampan Carr Creek stage a last ditch rally and tie the score just as the quarter ended, 23-23.

The lead alternated from one to the other in the fourth quarter with one minute to go Carr Creek led 29-27 but Arthur Combs, Hindman's stellar pro man tied the count.

In the overtime, Combs again hit a banker and Mark Debusch matched it to sew up the contest for Coach Pearl Combs' boys.

In earlier contests Ashland Holy Family downed Breck for the second time this season 46-39 and Owingsville beat back Morehead High 40-32 as Dan Swartz netted 33 of Owingsville's points.

Arthur Combs of Hindman was awarded the trophy given to the outstanding individual player in the meet while Swartz won the sportsmanship award.

Letters To The Editor

Stays Streets Should Be Cleaned. Editor, The News: Your news article and editorial concerning parking meters for Morehead were interesting, and I think you are right in saying that the council had nothing to show and did right by voting them in on a trial basis.

This letter is to point out one thing that has not been discussed in your news article. It is the condition of our streets. Our office will notify you of future visits of this representative should any of you deviate from the above.

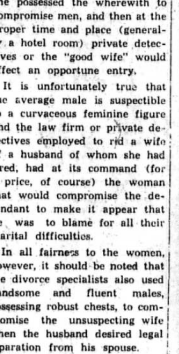

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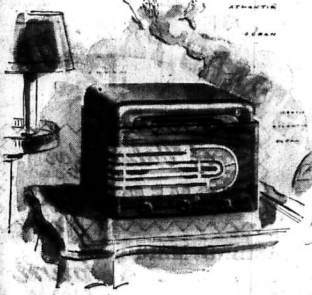

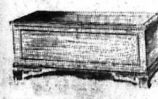

Early Opening Of Kentucky's Burley Markets Proves Mistake

"Never again" was the often heard expression throughout Kentucky's burley markets this week.

This was in reference to the early opening of the auctions this year. The Burley Leaf Tobacco Growers' Association went on record as opposing another early opening, which it said "caused much of this year's crop to be sold in a sappy condition."

"This produces a cautious attitude on the part of the buyer and therefore affects prices," Judge Lorenzo K. Wood, association general counsel, said in a statement at Lexington.

Judge Wood blamed the high moisture content of the tobacco leaf-stem and "heads" on insufficient curing. This, in turn, he blamed on the rush of the grower to get his tobacco ready for the early opening of the markets.

He said the advanced opening was urged last fall and summer by "the warehouse association."

At Lexington tobacco redrying business spokesmen claimed the "biggest headache" caused by the unusually large amount of wet burley on markets this season.

Their grief, they said, stems from the double job of handling the leaf and greater expense in processing it. When wet tobacco reaches the redryers, it is moved aside to be redried by itself. The extra handling increases costs.

One redryer said wet and damp tobacco must be hung differently on sticks for processing. Another said he had increased the redrying time and stepped up machine temperatures to handle wet leaf, both moves involving greater expense.

"We have to guarantee the tobacco is dry when we've run it through our plant," one redryer said. "When we open hogheads for sampling and selling next summer, we may find some of the tobacco is bruised or stained. That will hurt us."

Acceptance of tobacco found to be wet is declining, a Lexington warehouseman said. Because the buyers don't want it, he said his firm had sent back "several loads" for further redrying and curing on the farm.

Damp weather just before the markets opened was blamed for the big percentage of wet tobacco. The situation has been aggravated by continued rainy and foggy weather.

An effort was made to have the markets opened Nov. 15, Judge Wood recalled and they were opened Nov. 29, one week before the traditional opening on the first Monday of December.

"It is the feeling of the tobacco trade," Wood said, "that the publicity given to an early opening date has, in many instances, caused the farmer to strip his burley crop prematurely with the result that he delivered his 1948 crop before it was thoroughly cured. A great portion of the moisture remained in the heads of the tied tobacco."

practically all loose-leaf floors, Wood said, "some of this leaf was discovered by the Government graders and graded 'W' meaning wet, or 'U' meaning un-sound. However, in spite of the careful inspection by the Government graders much of the farmers' tobacco delivered was sold on the loose floors in an improper condition."

Well Known Morehead Man Dies Suddenly At Daughter's Home



Trichinosis Warning Issued As Farmers Begin Killing Hogs

It's hog killing time in the country. With the approach of cold weather farmers are getting ready to convert their pigs into succulent pork roasts and chops, delectable hams, and savory sausage. People in the cities are searching for country hams to add to the enjoyment of the coming holiday season.

In the midst of all this activity Dr. Bruce Underwood, State Health Commissioner, asks us to remember a very important thing—the danger of eating uncooked pork. The most tempting slice of fresh ham, (curing kills larvae) the most flavorful sausage, can be the home of literally thousands of the parasite known as the Trichinella.

spralitic. The larvae of these deadly little worms reside in the muscular tissues of hogs, and are transferred to the human stomach when insufficiently cooked meat is eaten. In a period of from one to two weeks the larvae which have been swallowed grow into mature worms and, in their turn, hatch out new larvae. One dangerous factor of this disease is that the symptoms are so similar to those of so many other diseases that diagnosis is frequently difficult. Since there is little to be done, once an attack has started, but wait for the encystment of the worms, the thing to be concentrated on is prevention.

It must not be assumed that all trichinosis comes from home cooked meat. This is by no means the case, and there is just as much danger in commercially slaughtered and packed pork. All pork should be slowly and well cooked before being eaten. The color should be a pale grey throughout, with not a trace of pink remaining.

Farmers Told They May Expect Lower Net Incomes Because Of Nation's Production Cost Rise

Consumption Of Burley Expected To Show Increase

Farmers may expect a lower net income next year, the Kentucky College of Agriculture said this week, primarily because production costs are rising.

Most production costs will continue upward, the college said in its 1949 farm outlook, while prices of farm products will tend to level off. They likely will be lower than the last half of this

year. Farm families therefore may have to adjust their pattern of spending to a level slightly below 1947 and 1948.

The college said farmers' production costs now are about three times the prewar level. It looked for high wages, an upward trend in taxes, a tight labor supply, and higher costs of all production factors except feed.

Lower feed costs, it said, would be offset largely by rises of other prices. The volume of crops marketed

from Kentucky farms next year is expected to exceed this year's output, but prices will average lower. The volume of livestock and its products is expected to show a small increase, the college reported.

The total gross income will be about the same as in 1948. The college noted that most major crops had declined or are tapering toward support (loan-rate) levels.

It recognized a strong domestic and foreign demand for farm goods. Agriculture is operating at capacity.

There is the way the outlook forecasts farm produce:

Feed—The outlook is excellent for livestock producers. The supply will be abundant at prices favorable in relation to the price of livestock and livestock products. Feed-grain supplies and livestock numbers are in better than normal relation for Kentucky producers. They is the only important livestock feed in an unfavorable position. Prices for it may be high until the 1949 output is marketed.

Beef Cattle—Strong consumer demands and prospective reduced supplies of beef are expected to keep cattle prices at relatively high levels in 1949 although many fluctuations are likely. Big feed supplies and favorable feeding ratios this fall are likely to result in more grain feeding of cattle.

Hogs—Prices are expected to continue high for most of next year because of near-record level of consumer incomes and probable lower supplies of pork and other meats until late in the year. Lard prices may be lower because of stronger competition from fats and oils. Planning the hog program so that hogs from the 1948 spring pig crop will be marketed early next fall ahead of increased numbers in prospect from the Corn Belt appears highly important.

Sheep and Lambs—The strong meat demand will be favorable to Kentucky lamb producers. Lamb prices are expected to be strong or near level of last year's market season. Breeding ewes for replacement will continue relatively scarce.

Dairy—Net income from dairying will probably be about equal to 1948. Prices of milk and dairy products may average lower, but lower feed prices and greater milk production will keep a high level of these prices. The pattern of demand for dairy products other than fluid milk should be much like that of this year.

Poultry—Demand for poultry and eggs likely will be strong for most of the year but prices may average lower. Profits should equal or exceed those of 1948 because of favorable feed-price ratios the first half of the year. Egg supplies should be greater late next year and in 1950.

Burley Tobacco—Domestic use of Burley is expected to equal the past two years of about 330,000,000 pounds. The use of Burley in smoking tobacco is expected to hold its own and may increase in preference to cigarettes if costs of living press more firmly on consumers. Exports of Burley may be larger than in 1948, but are not expected to be a major outlet.

Dark Tobacco—The outlook is discouraging because of a shifting world-wide trend to lighter tobaccos, the shortage of American dollars in prospective importing countries, and the desire of self-sufficiency in tobacco production in these countries.

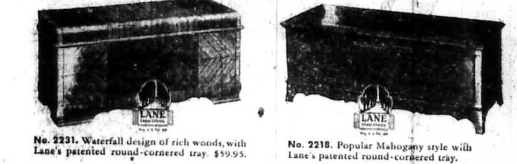

Fishing License Cost To Double On January 1

After the first of the year resident state-wide fishing licenses will cost \$2, the Division of Game and Fish reminded license buyers today. This state-wide license permits the holder to fish in any open waters in Kentucky and in privately owned lakes or ponds. If the fisherman is the owner of the body of water or is a resident leasee of the property no license is required. The Division pointed out A county resident fishing license, which sells for \$1, is good for fishing only in the county designated on the license. Previously fishing licenses cost \$1, but the state-wide license hike was approved by the 1948 State Legislature to become effective on January 1. Additional revenue from the sale of these licenses will be used to improve streams to provide better fishing.

Also effective Jan. 1, will be an increase in the cost of the Ohio River licenses. For 1949 these licenses, good for only fishing in the Ohio River by the residents of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, will cost \$2, an increase of \$1 over the former price.

Another new regulation enacted by the 1948 State Legislature and which becomes effective on January 1, bars the sale of rabbits, either wholesale or retail, in Kentucky. This enactment was voted at the request of the Division of Game and Fish in an effort to improve the rabbit population in Kentucky. The Division declares that each year many rabbits are killed and sold to commercial hunters and it is those type forays on the cottontail that has greatly diminished the number in the State. In substantiation of this statement, the Division points out that the truck of a dealer in rabbits in another state was halted near the state border last year and contained more than 300 cottontails which had been killed in Kentucky. After the first of the year such sales will be barred. No dealer may have in his possession rabbits for retail or wholesale after midnight, Dec. 31, the Division states and warns all dealers to dispose of any rabbits on hand before that date. The law provides that no rabbits may be sold in Kentucky to an out-of-state dealer. Penalty for violations of these regulations are a fine of not more than \$100 nor less than \$15.00.

School Equalization Fund And Unfair Tax Assessments May Result In Special Session

Administration Leaders Express Fear Of Reaction From Counties

The State Administration's support of two constitutional amendments may be the key for the calling of a special session of the Legislature after February 1. One of the amendments would allow the General Assembly to assign up to 25 per cent of the

common-school appropriation as extra aid to the poorer school districts. At present, the poorer districts get 10 per cent.

Last summer the Kentucky Tax Commission turned up evidence showing that distribution of the 10 per cent has been made on a partly illegal and partly unfair basis. Unless distribution reforms are achieved quickly, several officials feel that the public—particularly

aid—will have no stomach for a proposal permitting possible mismanagement of one quarter of the total handout for grade and high schools.

The equalization fund of 10 per cent for this year amounted to \$2,150,000.

So, unless the public is convinced that a 25 per cent equalization fund will be doled out on the basis of separate need or a situation everyone wants to help, some officials believe the amendment is doomed.

On 11 occasions, Kentucky has voted on two amendments at the same time. The pairs were either adopted or defeated together. The voters never have approved one and rejected the second on the same ballot.

To get the equalization amendment passed, the Legislature might have to meet in special session soon after January and consider statutory ways of tightening up distribution of money sent in the wealthier counties which don't receive extra school

to the poorer school systems. Revenue and Education Department officers have huddled frequently in the past weeks. They are believed to be working on law revisions connected with property assessment and equalization distribution.

If they can agree on a substantial remedy for the current unfairness and if Governor Earle Clements concludes reforms can be realized, then watch for the call of a special session.

The Governor's administrative advisers are certain he will bring the problem to legislative lips for consideration. But some of the Governor's political brainsters view the regular, biennial sessions of the Legislature with alarm and special sessions with horror.

A special session would start out bravely but end up in a political hurricane with an anti-Clements "storm" emerging to harass the Administration, the politicians think.

Besides, they say, tinkering with property-assessment laws is not the way "to keep the voters on our side."

Ironically, the Legislature authorized the 25 per cent equalization amendment to be put on the ballot next summer in hopes the \$12,000 salary proposal would be swept to victory with it. Many legislators felt the 25 per cent amendment would meet more enthusiasm than the 10 per cent. This enthusiasm would be enough to raise the pay, too, they believed.

Sunday School Lesson

GOOD NEWS IN THE BIBLE
International Sunday School Lesson for December 19, 1948

MEMORY SELECTION: "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people." — Luke 2: 10.

Our lesson this week is the Christmas lesson and uses Luke's account of the announcement by the angels to the shepherds of the birth of Jesus. This story—the simplest and yet the most sublime story in the New Testament—is one that appeals both to the child not yet old enough to read and to the man and woman who is at home with the world's best literature. It is a story of which we never tire. It lives with ever increasing interest, because it tells of the birth of Jesus—God's gift to man—and because Jesus was and is the world's Saviour; even as the angel declared.

In response to a decree of Caesar Augustus, Emperor of Rome, that a census of all the inhabitants of the Roman Empire be made, Joseph and his espoused wife, Mary, journeyed from their home in Nazareth, a distance of about 70 miles to Bethlehem, the city of David, which was the ancestral home of Joseph, to enroll themselves. Because many others had done likewise, the little town was overcrowded and when Joseph and Mary arrived they found that all the accommodations at the inn had already been taken. Realizing Mary's need for a place of rest and privacy, it was suggested that they could find a place of lodging in the nearby stable which while humble, was kept clean and contained an ample supply of straw, which could be used as beds.

So it was that Jesus Christ, the promised Messiah and Saviour of the world was born. After wrapping the baby in the usual manner of that time in swaddling clothes, he was laid in his little bed—the manger from which the cattle were fed, being filled with straw for the purpose. Meanwhile, out on the outskirts of Bethlehem, shepherds were watching their flocks during the night and, we imagine talking among themselves as usual. Suddenly, there appeared unto them a vision—an angel of the Lord, shining with the glory of the Lord. These humble men were frightened at the occurrence not knowing what to do or think. But the angel said: "Fear not; for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the City of David, a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." And, apparently in order to add emphasis to the wonder of the announcement just made, a host of angels joined the first one, bursting into songs of joy and praise and saying: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will toward men."

Immediately following the return of the angels into heaven, the shepherds made ready to do as bidden. They left their sheep grazing on the hillside and came with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. This was just as the angel had said and, delightedly they began to tell everyone about this wonderful thing which had been made known unto them, glorifying and praising God for all the things which they had heard and seen. "But, Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart." The message of the angel was

"good news of great joy, which shall be to all people." While for centuries the Jews had been expecting a Messiah, this Messiah was to be "their" Saviour and their's alone. However, the announcement of the angel gave promise of a universal gospel, a gospel which would be as free to the poor and the underprivileged as to the rich and learned. These shepherds heard of the birth of a king, but this king was to give the world a kingdom which was to be its first real democracy—a democracy in which all men of all races and of all ages might come in equal footing.

The songs of the angels gives us, in terse language, the real mission of Jesus. He came (1) to reveal to men the glory of God and through his life to bring glory to God; (2) to make it possible for men to live together in peace because of their good will toward each other. When men accept the teachings of Jesus Christ and try to follow his example, they will endeavor through their daily lives to glorify God and if they conscientiously do this, then peace will reign in the world, for he who is trying to glorify God will surely not want to harm one of God's children.

Laughlin's 'Trouble' Proves 'Good Thing'

Breckinridge Coach Bobby Laughlin thought "there was trouble brewing" Friday afternoon from his team, following their 46-38 loss to Ashland Holy Family in the Kiwanis Invitational Tournament here. One of the players solemnly told Laughlin: "The boys want to see you down in the dressing room."

When Laughlin (who three years ago was voted Kentucky's most outstanding high school coach) entered, the players presented him with a gold engraved watch as a Christmas present.

Will Relieve Overcrowded Conditions In School System Here

Construction is under way on the new elementary school building which is intended to house the first six grades of the Morehead Consolidated School. The building will contain nine classrooms, a cafeteria, a small gymnasium, and administrative offices for the principal. The building will be constructed of fire resistant materials throughout and will be heated with low pressure steam supplied by a stoker-fired boiler.

At the ground breaking ceremonies which were held on Oct. 26th a representative of the Wehr Construction Co. promised that the building would be ready for occupancy the beginning of the 1949-50 school term. Music for the program was supplied by the Morehead High School Band under the direction of Art Crocker. Miss Guyneith Hodge and Master Larry Cassidy speaking on behalf of the student body expressed their appreciation to the Board of Education and the Fiscal Court for making this building possible. Mr. Price, the principal of Morehead Consolidated School acted as Master of Ceremonies and introduced the County Superintendent Ted L. Crosthwait who spoke on behalf of the Board of Education and of the other County officials. Members of the Board of Education and the Fiscal Court were introduced by Mr. Crosthwait. With the completion of the overcrowded condition of the Morehead School will be temporarily relieved.
