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## Gas Rate Hikes Inevitable

Natural gas customers of the Morehead Utility Plant Board are facing another rate increase, according to a decision made Thursday by the plant board.

The board voted unanimously to pass on to its customers a 19 cent increase per thousand cubic feet as a result of the same increase imposed upon them by their supplier — Tennessee Gas Transmission.

According to Herman Brown, plant board superintendent, the rate increase becomes effective July 1. The increase pushes the monthly minimum bill from \$3.67 to \$3.86. The minimum is for the first 1,000 cubic feet (or less) of natural gas used.

Further increases in cost to the individual consumer will be based on the actual amount of gas used. Customers, until July 1, will pay the old rate per 1,000 cubic feet. The rate is \$1.82 per 1,000. The new rate will be \$2.01 per 1,000 cubic feet.

An Example: If a customer uses 25,000 cubic feet of natural gas per month, based on the old rate, his cost would be \$45.50, plus the \$3.67 minimum for the first 1,000 cubic feet, or a total gas bill of \$49.17.

The new rate, based on 25,000 cubic feet would result in a bill of \$50.25, plus the \$3.67 minimum, for a total billing of \$54.11 for natural gas.

In addition to its decision on gas rate increases, the board met with two Morehead State University representatives, John Graham and Bob Stokes, regarding what they termed "unreasonably large penalty charge for late payment."

"It is unreasonable," the MSU representatives contended, "in light of the specific situation of the University which involves the necessity for receiving bills, having to forward them to Frankfort, and then waiting to pay for Frankfort to make out checks for payment and return them to the University."

One University spokesman pointed out that the University's bills sometimes run as much as \$8,000 per month and the 10 percent penalty charge results in a penalty fee of \$800.

The plant board came to no agreement as to a solution since, according to Paul Blair, attorney for the board, to forego the late charge penalty for any customer would amount to inequitable treatment. "Equitable treatment is what we're after," Blair remarked. "We want to treat all customers equally." He continued, "Blair suggested the problem might be solved by the University making a \$7,500 to \$10,000 deposit which would eliminate late charge fees. Graham said he was not sure Frankfort would approve such action."

Another possible solution to the problem was presented by Clayton

Perkins, plant board chairman. He suggested that the board may be able to arrange an earlier reading of the University's meters and supply them with bills at an earlier date.

No final decision was made and the committee from the University left, remarking that they would look into the

possibility of making the deposit while the plant board agreed to check out the feasibility of earlier billing.

Among other matters discussed by the board were the situation with Rowan Water, especially in regard to

## City Awarded \$146,000 For Town Branch Project

The City of Morehead has been awarded \$146,000 for the Town Branch flood control project.

Announcement of the funding was made Monday night by City Administrator Don Evans during the regular monthly session of Morehead City Council.

Evans said the money was awarded by the State Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. The city's \$50,000 matching fund portion brings the project total to \$196,000.

During the three and one-half hour session, Council spent more than an hour in closed sessions dealing with legal and personnel matters.

Reports to the city regarding excessive speeding by motorists in Rawcell Heights prompted Council's decision to provide the low-rough project area with more speed bumps. The action was based on the fact that numerous children and elderly persons reside in Rawcell Heights and complaints that a danger does exist there.

City Attorney Buddy Salyer was authorized by Council to take legal action to abate a nuisance structure (a refrigerated truck) in the West Morehead area.

Through passage of a motion, an alleyway in Tolliver Addition became abandoned city property and will be returned to its former owners, Gerald McDaniel voiced opposition to Council's action.

He had requested the alley be retained as city property, noting he

plans to develop land he owns that adjoins the area of the alley. Had it been retained as city property, McDaniel could have benefited by using it as access passage to his adjoining land.

The city attorney advised Council that McDaniel has other access to his property. He said the city legally has no right to retain the parcel of land any longer because of the length of time it has been holding it without making use of the tract.

Attorney Salyer said, "It is necessary for you (Council) to return this land to its original owners in order to avoid the

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## Roark's Grocery Violates Food Stamp Regulations

Roark's Grocery, Rt. 6, Morehead, has been dropped from the federal food stamp program for one year because of violations. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) reports.

Owned by Otis H. Roark, the store was disqualified from the program for one year, starting May 26, after being charged with selling cigarettes and other ineligible items for food coupons.

Robert L. Cunningham, who is in charge of the Food and Nutrition Service, explained that the store will not be allowed to accept food coupons during the disqualification period.

Cunningham added that food stamps, by law, can be used only to buy food. The only exceptions, he said, are garden seed and plants to be used to produce food.

## MSU Hosting Governor's Development Conference

Morehead State University President Morris L. Nofleet will officially open the Appalachian Development Center at MSU and Gov. Julian Carroll will address the delegates at the Governor's Appalachian Development Conference June 19-21 at MSU.

The conference's theme "Focus on Economic Development in Kentucky Appalachia" will address specific issues facing Eastern Kentucky and feature individual speakers from regional, state and federal agencies.

Sponsored by MSU, the Appalachian Regional Commission and the Kentucky Development Cabinet, the conference will feature four task force workshops, including streamlining state government for Appalachian development, socio-economic impact of energy production, human economic development needs in Kentucky Appalachia, and economic diversification and development financing.

Highlighting the conference will be two entertainment programs open to the public at no charge.

Appalshop, The Roadside Theatre will present "Red Fox: Second Hanging" at 9:30 p.m. Monday, June 19. The McLain Family Band of Berea will perform Tuesday, June 20 at 9 p.m. Both programs will be in the Crager Ballroom of the Adron Dornan University Center.

The conference is the first of a series of regional meetings planned by the state to focus on Kentucky's economic development problems.

## New Evidence Found In Student's Shooting

Rowan County Coroner Jim Barker has set June 22 as the date on which he will hold an inquest into the shooting death of 24-year-old Greg Williams.

Williams died June 4 in an apparent exchange of gunfire with local law enforcement personnel. Six persons will be chosen from the Rowan Circuit Court jury list to sit as a jury on the proceedings.

The inquest will be held at 1 p.m. in the Mabry building on Ky. 32 where circuit and district courts meet.

New evidence uncovered by Morehead and Kentucky State Police shows a .38-caliber pistol did discharge in the car driven by rape suspect Greg Williams sometime before he was

fatally shot by local police on Sunday, June 4.

Officers recovered a .38-caliber slug laying amid fragmented glass in Williams' auto three days after the shooting. The bullet apparently had been overlooked by KSP detectives who combed the car for two days following the incident.

KSP personnel were not on hand when the bullet fragment was recovered.

Williams, a 24-year-old MSU student, died of a 357 Magnum hollow point bullet wound to his upper chest. One local source who asked not to be identified, said ballistics tests reveal the fatal shot came from Officer Mike Stevens' weapon. Stevens is an MSU security officer.

Morehead Police officer Ron Farley, who also fired his weapon at the suspect, apparently shot at an angle which caused his bullet not to penetrate the auto. KSP said Farley's bullet ricocheted off the suspect's vehicle.

Campbell said one officer on the scene reported hearing a "muffled sound" within the car. He also confirmed a report which said a local policeman had reported seeing a "possible flash" before the fatal shooting.

"We don't know now, and we may never know exactly when the victim's gun was fired," he said.

State Police have deduced the suspect's slug may have in fact struck the left rear window in the car as was reported in last week's editions of the Morehead News. Capt. Campbell said the slug did strike glass, but did not hit

another window in the car.

Law enforcement personnel on the scene said they broke out the left rear window to gain entry to the locked vehicle.

## Teachers' Salaries Raised

The Rowan County Board of Education set teachers' salaries and voted to pay a series of controversial claims during a tedious five-hour meeting Monday night.

At least twice during the proceedings, Superintendent John Brock stopped discussions and cautioned members of the audience to be quiet.

In approving a new salary schedule, the board came under fire from audience member Homer Amburgey. Amburgey, and others in his party, vocally questioned the decision to give beginning rank III teachers a 3.3 percent raise while voting maintenance workers an 8.5 percent increase.

While some teachers will get an in-

crease of over \$3,000 per year in pay, beginning rank III teachers get \$310 more. Brock explained that there was a good supply of beginning teachers locally and the school system couldn't afford to pay more.

Board member Lake Cooper called the salary schedule "the height of ignorance" and "sort of an insult."

The motion was approved 4-1 with Ms. Cooper voting against adoption.

Questions again arose over the board's decision to renew the lease with the Department of Human Resources for the upper floor of the kindergarten at just over \$15,000 annually. Ms. Cooper said a law she said prohibited the action. She also cast the lone vote against the move.

Near shouts from the audience were heard over the board's decision to pay the monthly claims. The claim sheet contained five checks payable to individuals who brought suit against the board over alleged punitive transfers of personnel in 1971. The claim payment was discussed in an 85 minute closed session.

Rowan Circuit Court issued an order this year ordering the board and former Supt. Clifford Cassidy to pay the estimated \$8,000 in damages. Brock made a motion for the present board to cover the damages and did not mention Cassidy's name.

Brock said "This has been hanging over our heads for several years now and it's in the best interest of our school system to get it settled tonight."

Amburgey stood up in the audience and asked why the board was not making Mr. Cassidy pay any of the damage money. Brock responded that the board will pay the claim and if additional legal decisions require Mr. Cassidy to pay part of the cost, appropriate action will be taken.

A bid from the Campbell-Phillips Company for \$8,075 was accepted to install new ovens and dishwashers in the school system.

A bid for school bus tires and tubes was accepted from the Goodyear Tire Center in Mt. Sterling. The firm consistently offers the lowest bids on the materials to several school systems in the area.

## City Passes Zoning Ordinance

"What a lot of people forget," Planning Commission Chairman Woodrow Barber said, "is that the city council and fiscal court four years ago

asked us to put this zoning plan together for them... really we are an arm of fiscal court and council."

Barber was commenting for The Morehead News following passage of the new zoning ordinance Monday night by Morehead City Council.

Council passed the ordinance in the form it was presented by the planning commission and it will become law within the city limits of Morehead following its legal publication in the newspaper. Copies of the new zoning ordinance will be available soon at city offices. Under a grant arrangement from the Gateway ADD district, the copies are being furnished free.

All city council members voted for the ordinance except Jack Adkins, who voted "no" and Wilburn Fraley, who abstained.

The League of Women Voters had expressed their support for the zoning ordinance and showed up prepared to fight for it Monday night, but their "fight" was not needed.

Fiscal Court Next  
Barber said the zoning ordinance will

soon be presented to fiscal court for approval.

"It's time we started to protect our agricultural land and not have it abused by stripping off the good soil. But the point is, the ought to draw up the rules ourselves and not let the federal government do it," Barber told The Morehead News.

Land use planning legislation has come up for a vote in the last two sessions of Congress, narrowly being voted down in the last session.

"You can bet it's going to come up again," Barber said, "and if Congress passes it this time, we'll have a law imposed on us by the federal government. I think we ought to do it ourselves and have it the way we want it."

Barber said the new ordinance passed by city council Monday night was less stringent than the old zoning law in many ways. "It's just that the old law was never enforced, and not many knew of its provisions."

FRANKFORT, KY — The 6th District Congressional race heated up this week with the Democratic nominee, Tom Easterly, charging the Republican Party with engineering Mary Louise Foust's withdrawal as a GOP candidate. Easterly said the GOP wants to field a more serious candidate against him now.

CINCINNATI, OHIO — Johnny Bench was in Christ Hospital Tuesday for treatment of a lower back strain that has kept him out of the Reds lineup since May 27. His hospital stay was not expected to be a long one.

FRANKFORT, KY — The number of cases of venereal disease continues to rise in Kentucky, health officials say, but not at the rapid rate of the past. Education in the schools is "critical" to lowering venereal disease, officials said.

BURBANK, CALIFORNIA — Funeral services will be held tomorrow for country singer Johnny Boyd who died Monday. Boyd had three early hits including "Smoke, Smoke, Smoke That Cigarette."

### More Charges Filed Against Local Man

Terry Mabry, Rowan County, has been transferred from Bath County facilities to the Fayette County Jail without bond after being charged with carrying a concealed weapon June 7, district court records state.

Arrested by city police at St. Claire Medical Center for having a gun in his sock, Mabry was reportedly at the hospital the Sunday before, threatening employees, police said.  
Police said that the night before the arrest, Mabry reportedly was in the Windmill Restaurant with a gun in his belt, accusing Don Woodall as being the one who turned him in on a previous charge. (Mabry was in district court June 6 on a receiving stolen property charge.)

City Police records contained a statement by Woodall that "Mabry said he would kill Captain L.T. Owens (of the State Police)," and that "Mabry also had words with Roger Collins" who was with Woodall.

three of its master meters reportedly being inoperable most of the time, and a problem with Browning Manufacturing Co.'s sewage waste disposal.

short gaps before dying enroute to St. Claire Medical Center across the street. He was not reported as having said any coherent statements before being pronounced dead.

According to Campbell, autopsy results will not be available for some time to show if there were in fact powder burns on the suspect's hands or clothing to indicate if he did fire the weapon.  
He also pointed out there have been several instances where a bullet would ricochet around in the car during a shooting. "In the 15 years I have been conducting investigations, I have never seen a bullet do the same thing twice."

Campbell said he did not know how Williams got the gun found in the car at the time of the shooting. "We could not detect any residue to indicate it had been left outside," Campbell commented.

At the time of the alleged May 8 rape, Williams was brandishing a blue silver revolver according to testimony delivered by the victim. The gun was never recovered by police when the suspect was arrested in his dorm room. Police did confiscate clothing and shoes he allegedly wore during the assault.

KSP said the gun is still being traced, but all available reports indicate it was not stolen.  
KSP said they had turned up no evidence of a prior record of criminal acts committed by Williams, but added an investigation into that area is continuing.

A report by Morehead State University's radio station was also contradicted by Capt. Campbell. The station broadcast the suspect had been hit in his forehead by the bullet which supposedly discharged from his pistol. Campbell said the victim suffered a wound to the left side of his head. The wound, according to police, was not sufficient to cause death.

Ambulance attendants also reported Williams suffered no forehead wound.  
The MSU coed who originally brought the rape charges against Williams testified at her examining trial that the victim told her after the alleged May 8 rape, "if you tell anyone about this, I'll kill you. If I can't do it, then some of my friends will."

KSP said they were not aware of anyone facing complicity charges in connection with the crime.

JUDY—An 18 year old Jeffersonville man was killed and four other persons injured Friday night in a three car head-on collision four miles north of Mt. Sterling on Ky. 11.

State Police at Morehead said Bobby Ray Johnson was pronounced dead on arrival at Mary Chiles Hospital after his auto went out of control attempting to pass another vehicle about 9:30 Friday night. Johnson's car struck an auto driven by Charles Faulkner, address unknown, #268, then sideswiped a car driven by Nancy Gossage of Olathe, Mo. Two passengers in the Johnson car, 15

year old Billy Wayne Johnson, Jeffersonville and 17 year old William Patton, Carlisle, were treated at Mary Chiles. Patton was later transferred to a Lexington Hospital.

State Police also reported a Montgomery County man was injured when the car he was a passenger in wrecked early Saturday morning in Montgomery County, three miles east of Mt. Sterling. William Highly reportedly suffered two broken ankles and was taken to the UK Medical Center. The driver, Donnie Ray Winkoughy, was not listed by KSP logs as being seriously injured.

### Unemployment Down Sharply

FRANKFORT, Ky. — (June 9, 1978) Eastern Kentucky unemployment decreased from 21,316 persons in March to 14,979 in April, according to Robert MacDonalld, chief labor market analyst for the Department for Human Resources.

The rate of unemployment dropped from 7.4 percent to 5 percent in that same period. Magoffin County had the highest rate of 7.7 percent while Martin County was lowest with 2.8 percent.

"Seasonal factors and the end of the coal strike account for most of the decrease in unemployment," said MacDonalld.  
Last April's unemployment rate in eastern Kentucky was 5.4 percent. This April's rate for the entire state was 4.1 percent, the lowest since October 1977.

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# KSP Conduct Massive Drug Raid In Montgomery

MT. STERLING — "Word has it you couldn't buy an aspirin in Mt. Sterling Friday night."

That statement by a Kentucky State Trooper summed up their feelings on a series of drug arrests in Montgomery and Bath County which began Friday night after a six month investigation by undercover narcotics detectives. According to Montgomery County Attorney Paul Cowden, near 70 criminal complaints were sworn out by KSP agents who were allegedly either given or sold drugs by the persons charged.

The "bust" was reported to be the largest in the history of Montgomery County and possibly the largest, in terms of persons arrested, in the history of the Morehead KSP Post.

State Police said the arrests came with the cooperation of the Montgomery County Attorney's Office. A spokesman did not point out the weekend arrests were thought not to be related to the discovery of a body in a rural Montgomery County well earlier this year.

This partial list of persons arrested and their charges was released by State Police and the Montgomery County Attorney's Office:

Robert Howell Schultz, 31, of Samuels Ave., Mt. Sterling, charged with possession of valium and trafficking in a schedule 3 non-narcotic.

Jeffery Wayne Fritts, 206 Jameson Street, Mt. Sterling, 19; charged with trafficking in a schedule 4 non-narcotic and possession of valium. Bond set at \$1,000.

Timothy Wayne Terry, 22, of Rt. 1, Jeffersonville; charged with transferring marijuana, a misdemeanor. Bond set at \$250.

Billy Watson of Mt. Sterling charged with two counts; trafficking in a schedule 1 non-narcotic and a schedule 3 non-narcotic.

Ricky Parker of Mt. Sterling was charged with two counts of trafficking in a schedule 1 non-narcotic and one

count of trafficking in a schedule 3 non-narcotic.

Gordon Lee Williams, 19, of West Side Drive, Mt. Sterling, charged with trafficking in a schedule 1 non-narcotic for allegedly selling agents 13 tablets of LSD. Bond was set at \$2,500.

Glen Gray, 25, of 11 Sycamore Street, was charged with trafficking in barbiturates, trafficking in a schedule one-narcotic. Bond was set at \$1,000 on each count.

Danny Martin was charged with transferring marijuana, a misdemeanor, in connection with allegedly giving an agent a marijuana cigarette on June 3. Bond set at \$250.

Eddie Howard Gilvin, 30, of 322 Maple Court, Mt. Sterling, was charged with two counts of trafficking in a schedule 2 non-narcotic, possession of a schedule 4 non-narcotic, and trafficking in a schedule 4 non-narcotic.

Mrs. Carl Chambers, 18, of the Trimble Trailer Park, Mt. Sterling, was charged with a felony in connection

with allegedly selling agents counterfeit drugs. She was arrested on counts of trafficking in a schedule 1 non-narcotic controlled substance and selling counterfeit non-narcotic controlled substances.

Jane Pargen, 20, of the Oldfield Trailer Park, Mt. Sterling, was charged with trafficking in phenocyclidine, a schedule 3 non-narcotic, in connection with allegedly selling 10 tablets to agents April 15 for \$32.50.

Howard Pargen, Garth Faulkner, Barry Miller, Deborah Williams, Oliver McFarland, Tony Curtis and Robert Dams were also arrested according to

KSP logs, but charges and bond amounts were not available.

KSP Sgt Charles Johnson, agents Mike Moulton, Emmett Mills, Robert Brown and other KSP personnel participated in the investigation and arrests.

The suspects were slated to be arraigned Tuesday morning in Montgomery District Court where pleas would be heard. Actual trial dates had not been set at Shopping News press deadlines.

State Police said the arrests were made at various locations throughout the county.

## Government Studies W. Va. Scaffold Disaster

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government has not yet determined whether criminal charges also should be brought against a major contractor who was cited for 16 violations of federal safety laws in connection with a West Virginia scaffolding disaster that killed 51 workers.

Assistant Labor Secretary Eula Bingham announced Thursday that 20 citations had been issued against three firms, carrying proposed fines totalling \$108,300.

Sixteen of them were against Research-Cottrell Inc., of Bound Brook, N.J., the construction company building the second of two 400-foot cooling towers for a power plant at Willow Island, W. Va., when the April 27 disaster occurred.

And 10 of those were for "willful violations" she said, adding that meant either the firm was aware they were violating the law, or were simply aware of a hazard and did nothing about it.

Each willful violation brought the maximum \$10,000 fine, but could also bring criminal charges.

OSHA law prescribes criminal sanctions for a willful violation of a standard resulting in the death of an employee," Dr. Bingham said. "The Department of Labor is determining whether to recommend criminal action to the U. S. Department of Justice in this case."

Asked about the status of such a recommendation, she replied: "The decision has not been made . . . it is a possibility."

Both Mrs. Bingham and OSHA solicitor Ben Mintz refused to comment

further on the possibility of criminal charges, saying discussions have to be held with the Justice Department on whether the Research-Cottrell firm had been legally "negligent."

United Engineers and Constructors Inc., and Pittsburgh Testing Laboratory were hit with two \$800 citations each for lesser "serious violations."

All three companies have 15 working days to contest the citations.

A spokesman for Research-Cottrell said OSHA "was not justified in issuing the principal citations, and the company intends to contest them."

But R.V. Bowser of Friendly, W. Va., speaking for a group of victims' families, said the fines "seemed insignificant."

"OSHA lost faith and credibility. Research-Cottrell lost concrete and steel, and we lost far, far more than they did," Bowser said.

Dr. Bingham used a series of graphic designs at a news conference to explain the collapse, and concluded that as concrete was raised from the floor of the tower to the top, "it is apparent that there is a tendency for the entire assembly to tip inward."

"With poorly anchored and maintained supporting legs, missing bolts, and uncertain concrete, there were clearly present the ingredients for a disaster," she said.

She rejected as "misleading" a report by a Ralph Nader associated organization, Health Research Group, that the agency had been forewarned the Willow Island scaffold was unsafe but failed to follow up with further inspection.

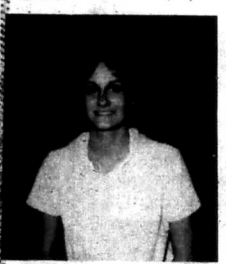

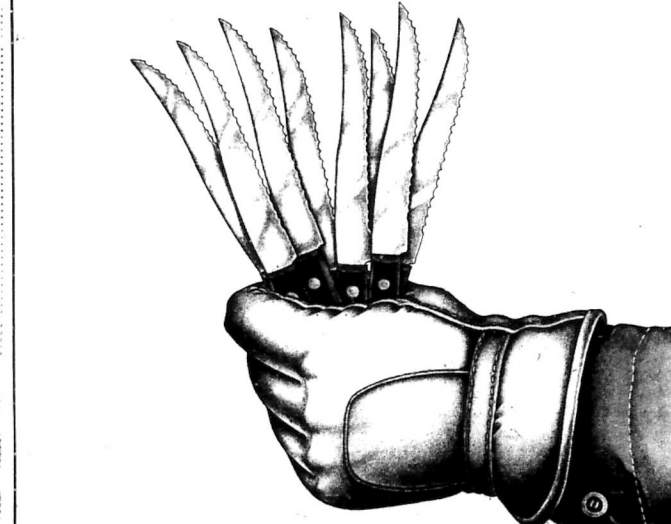

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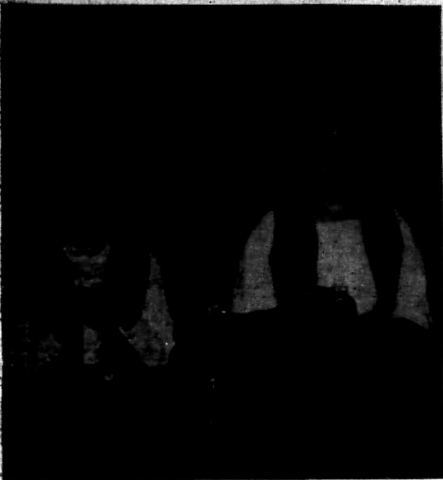

## Legionnaires Disease Gets Stepped Up Interest

ATLANTA (UPI) — The national Center for Disease Control says it has intensified its investigation into the mysterious Legionnaires' disease after a new outbreak killed three victims. More than 1,000 people are being questioned in an attempt to find out if there is a common source for an outbreak of the disease in Bloomington, Ind. The rash of cases, 11 in the past year with three of them fatal, involved people who visited Bloomington less than two weeks before becoming ill. Nine of the cases have occurred since the first of the year. Ten of the patients stayed overnight in the Indiana Memorial Union, a hotel and convention complex on the campus of Indiana University. The other victim had not been in the IMU building on his visit to Bloomington.

Legionnaires' disease is a severe, pneumonia-like illness marked by high fever and, in some cases, internal bleeding. It got its name when it struck 181 American Legionnaires' attending a state convention in Philadelphia in July 1976, killing 29. CDC researchers eventually tracked the cause of the ailment to a previously unknown bacterium. Despite intensive investigation, however, the source of the disease still is not known, although it is believed to be spread through the

air. At least two antibiotics have been found to be effective in combatting the disease — gentamicin and erythromycin. Most of its victims have been people over 50. The patients in the Bloomington outbreak ranged in age from 34 to 71 years, nine were men. The CDC said two studies were being conducted to determine whether exposure to the IMU building "poses an unusual risk of infection with the Legionnaires' disease bacterium and to identify additional cases." It said about 1,000 people registered at the IMU and other Bloomington hotels in the first week of May are being queried by mail about illness after their visits, underlying medical problems and activities in Bloomington. Employees of the IMU and other Bloomington hotels were being asked about previous illness. There have been five outbreaks, or clusters, of the disease since the Philadelphia deaths, including the one in Bloomington. They occurred in Burlington, Vt.; Columbus, Ohio; Kingsport, Tenn.; and Los Angeles. Together they accounted for 111 cases and 27 deaths. Another "cluster" of five Legionnaires' disease cases, and one death, also occurred in Nottingham, England.

### Local Post Office Hiring

The Morehead Post Office will be taking applications for employment as a clerk-carrier from June 15 until June 26. Applicants may pick up an application card during business hours at the local post office window and return them by mail. Positions are awarded on the basis of scores attained on a three-hour skills test which will be administered shortly after the application period closes June 26. A clerk-carrier will make some home and business mail deliveries and will also be required to do clerical work in the post office. Requirements for application include an age limit of 18. If the applicant has completed high school, permanent resident alien status, or US citizenship, and a driver's license if the carrier position requires driving. The skills test will be administered during a three-hour examination and consists of address checking number series, general abilities in word meaning and reading and address memory.

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### Importing Beef May Not Lower Prices

FRANKFORT, Ky. (UPI) — Agriculture Commissioner Tom Harris predicted Thursday Kentucky consumers, who eat less than the national average of beef per year, will not see any great reduction in prices at the supermarket as the result of President Carter's efforts to increase beef imports.

In addition, Harris predicted many cattle raisers in Kentucky will be abandoning their businesses because of Administration's moves.

Carter, in an effort to stem the rising price of beef, announced an increase in beef imports of around 15 percent. The voluntary restraint agreements will be raised by a total of 200 million pounds during the rest of the year.

Harris said prices would likely drop some in Kentucky but not significantly.

"Instead, you will see a continuation of the trend of more and more cattle raisers getting out of the business because they aren't going to be making a profit," Harris said in an interview. "The consumer isn't going to benefit from this tremendously in the long run."

Harris explained that beef producers in Kentucky and the rest of the nation are more likely now to reduce the number of cattle they slaughter annually because of the rise in imports. As a result, the price of cattle may eventually offset the decrease in prices that were forecast as the result of more meat coming in to the U.S.

"They (producers) aren't making that much money to begin with," Harris said. "It runs in a boom to bust cycle, and although it will likely improve soon, the Administration is not letting the farmers make enough money right now to make up for some of their losses."

The decision, which comes after Agriculture Department officials estimated beef prices would rise by 20 percent this year, also comes in the wake of two successive bad winters in Kentucky where farmers experienced losses of more than \$200 million.

"Just when they were about to get a chance to get some recovery they are being told more meat is going to be imported," Harris said. "That doesn't seem right, does it?"

Harris cited rising costs for feed and other producing requirements that is reducing the profit the farmer is making.

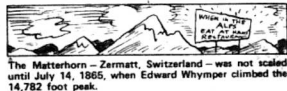
"He isn't making the money off the rise in beef prices, I can tell you that," the commissioner added.

Harris said in Kentucky, the average person consumes 73 pounds of beef per

year, about 20 pounds below the national average of 93 pounds of beef annually. If the savings made on increasing imports is placed at around one to five cents, the money Kentucky consumers will be saving will be less than the national average.

"It isn't going to amount to a whole lot of savings for the consumer, which is the sad part because if a move like this is going to be made at the sacrifice of the grower, than someone had ought to benefit from it."

Auto Cost  
The cost of owning and operating an average, intermediate sized 1978 car is \$1,957 a year — or, 19.6 cents per mile. This is down three per cent from 1977. ## Kentucky Bows Out In National Spelling Bee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The word "oppugn," proved to be the downfall of a young Kentuckian in the 51st annual National Spelling Bee Wednesday.

After a morning of spelling in the ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel, only 76 of the 106 contestants remained in competition 44 of the 58 girls and 32 of the 48 original boys.

The spellers — from Kentucky and 3 other states, Puerto Rico, Mexico and the Virgin Islands — worked their way through 294 words. They were to keep spelling through the day and into Friday until only one was left — the new national champion.

In the contest "oppugn" tripped Herman Miller, 13, of Harrodsburg, Ky. The tenth speller eliminated, he spelled it "opping."

George Perivolotis, 12, a sixth grader from Tewksburg, Mass., was the first to fall. He stumbled on "farical."

Before his stumble, 36 spellers breezed through such words as "dissuade," "Jonquil," and "saboteur." Mike Barnes, 13, of Tulsa, Okla., who had never flown in an airplane or been out of the Mississippi, tripped up on "detonator." He spelled it "detonater."

Angus Stocking, 14, in the eighth grade at Glendale, Calif., was stopped by "fiduciary." He thought the "pronouncer" had said "seduciary" and that is what he spelled.

The judges ruled him out and when he protested they played a tape recording of the sequence of events, then stood by their ruling.

To get to Washington, some of the spellers had to prove themselves best out of as many as half a million contestants in their home districts. The contest is sponsored by Scripps-Howard newspapers and 87 other newspapers.

All told, an estimated 8 million children under 18 competed in local and state contests. The national champion wins a \$1,000 prize and a trophy.

The spellers were seated on a platform, but more and more seats became vacant as misspellers were eliminated. Some took it hard, wandering off into the hotel's lobby to hide their dismay.

When George Perivolotis was tripped self-disgust. His mother sat with him on a couch and whispered in his ear. "Each of you are champions — you're big shots already," philosophy professor Richard Baker of the University of Dayton, in Ohio, assured the youngsters before the contest started. Baker is the official "pronouncer" — a role he has filled for 18 years.

The spellers are to visit Rosalynn Carter at the White House on Friday. Sheryl Saffille, 14, of Mt. Prospect, Ill., stumbled on "naissant," spelling it "nain." "Inchoate" was the downfall of Mary Summers, 14, of Lodi, Ohio. She spelled it "incuit." But "inlier" posed no problem for Eric Elias, 13, of East Chicago, Ind.

## Court To Decide If State Can Boss Private Schools

FRANKFORT, Ky. (UPI) — A Franklin Circuit Court hearing is scheduled next Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to determine whether the state Department of Education can regulate Kentucky's private schools.

The hearing stems from a suit filed last September by the Kentucky Association of Christian Schools and parents of several children attending Christian schools against the state Board for Elementary and Secondary Education and the Department of Education.

The controversy began last month when the state board refused to accredit 20 Christian schools for failing to meet minimum state standards in such areas as textbooks, facilities and certification of teachers.

Compulsory attendance laws exempt children from attending public schools if they are enrolled and in regular attendance in a private or parochial regular day school approved by the state Board of Education.

The lawsuit charges that the law is unconstitutionally vague and does not authorize the board to accredit or approve such schools.

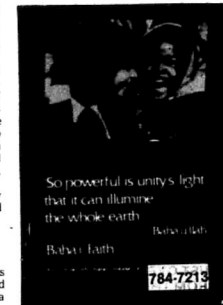
The board accredited Kentucky schools for the coming year during a special meeting on May 24, but it did not consider the 19 private Christian schools involved in the lawsuit.

Circuit Judge Henry Meigs had earlier issued a temporary restraining order stopping enforcement of the state's truancy laws against the schools involved in the suit until the suit is decided.

## Atkins Calls for Restraint In Mansion Expenditures

Revealing that since Governor Julian Carroll's announcement of proposed innovations at the governor's mansion, the auditor's office has received many inquiries regarding the propriety of this \$1 million dollar expenditure. State Auditor George Atkins has asked for restraint in government expenditures and power.

"With government under attack everywhere and with the taxpayers in revolt, new, more than ever, we need public servants to act with restraint and dignity and project an image of 'dignity and sacrifice.'" Atkins said while visiting the mansion this week. He said that government expenditures are unnecessary.

Atkins said he does not regard the use of a half million dollars for security gates, circular driveway, and swimming pool as an improvement.

"Our government will not reflect the spirit of the people if it is surrounded by a security wall. The county-two governors have a mansion and pipe before the necessary to erect a barrier between themselves and the people."

"The government of the house of the people should not reflect the prestige and not the taste or power of the man who lives there. We will have to set an example, to represent the people who elected us, and to show the difference whether you're a politician or a gambler, or a football player or a school teacher."

Atkins said Carroll's explanation that the suggested changes at the governor's mansion were made by a Governor's Design Advisory Council isn't true.

"They were made by the governor, submitted to a committee he appointed, and will be spent at his discretion without legislative appropriation." "As auditor, I do not have the power to halt the mansion renovation or stop the waste of government dollars, but I do have the statutory responsibility to give the people of this state the facts they need to force their government to operate more honestly and more efficiently," he says.

## Agree Or Not . . .

FRANKFORT — William (Bill) Cox's announcement last week that he is a candidate for the lieutenant governorship in the Democratic primary next May just about shapes up the field for the two top spots.

He is the fifth to make his intentions known to seek this office. The others are State Senator Joe Prather, James Vernon of Corbin who worked in the department of Public Information; Supreme Court Clerk Martha Layne Collins; and former state Senator Richard Lewis of Benton.

Cox directed Gov. Julian Carroll's primary campaign for the governorship and later worked as one of his chief advisors, and then went to Washington in the Department of Transportation.

The field for governor on the Democratic side is even more crowded with six candidates, five of them challenging Commerce Commissioner Terry McBrayer, the governor's choice.

First District U.S. Rep. Carroll Hubbard still keeps kicking the political door open for this race and has been a critic of the Carroll administration.

State Auditor George Atkins keeps challenging the governor over his use of airplanes and other actions, and this keeps Atkins' name in the news constantly. It is quite evident that Atkins has won support from the public in challenging Carroll.

Lieutenant Gov. Thelma Stovall, a name that has been around in state government for more than 30 years, is making a strong bid. Her support has

been from labor and women's groups as well as the "courthouse crowd" across the state.

Former Louisville Mayor Harvey Sloan has been traveling about the state quite a bit and seems to have been the first to set up a campaign organization. Agriculture Commissioner Thomas O. Harris is also in the race and will be depending upon agriculture interests as his strongest base, but he also has other connections in business circles.

Stovall and Sloan are both from Louisville and are likely to split the vote there in Jefferson County which contains about 30 per cent of the statewide vote.

McBrayer is from Eastern Kentucky while Atkins and Hubbard are both from the first congressional district in Western Kentucky. This portion of the state has had the governorship in the last two times. It could be time for a change.

One of the big questions in political discussions around the Capitol City is will McBrayer choose a running mate among the five candidates? For lieutenant governor, Mrs. Collins has always been a strong supporter and close friend of both former Gov. Wendell H. Ford and the Carroll administration. At the same time, Hubbard was a classmate of Mrs. Collins' husband and Carroll spent a weekend in their home in a recent visit to the state.

Prather, president pro-tem of the Senate, also has been a close ally of the governor and served with him in the House. Richard Lewis also has served



in the House with Carroll and McBrayer. Vernon is the one with the least ties to the administration.

The big question is, "Will Carroll's support be a candidate's advantage or be a handicap?"

I keep getting messages that county judges across the state are blaming Carroll for doing them out of their judicial powers. In the court reorganization even though this was a constitutional amendment voted by the people. Police chiefs in some of the smaller towns also are miffed over this change.

The police chiefs could go to their county judges in the rural counties and get favors done for some of their friends. They've lost this contest. And other county officials don't like the change, but this is not a state-wide feeling, but it is enough to make a difference in close races.

The campaign won't really get going until after the first of the year, but there are a lot of factors that can make it interesting.

Every administration is able to raise money and swing support behind a candidate, but the blessed candidate has to take the thorns with the roses.

## Changing County Government

(Editors note: This is the second part of a six-part series on changes in county government. These are a result of 1978 General Assembly actions becoming effective June 11, 1979.)

Have you a problem with the county which requires fiscal court attention? A bill to be paid? A complaint? An inquiry? Then you need to know how fiscal court operates and what its powers are. These have changed too.

The County Home Rule Act says: Fiscal court shall not exercise authority except as specifically assigned by statute. This provision complements the Judge/Executive Act making a judge the chief executive officer. Fiscal court sets the policies and follows up in an oversight capacity.

The act further says: Fiscal court . . . may enact ordinances, issue regulations, levy taxes, issue bonds, appropriate funds and employ personnel in performance of (the various) public functions.

Clearly and for the first time, fiscal court has become a law-making body. This, plus the taxing and appropriation powers, distinguishes the legislative from the executive branches of government.

The 1978 County Home Rule Act spells out the minimum procedures for introducing, passing and recording county ordinances. These, too, become a part of the administrative code.

County ordinances which carry penalties will apply countywide including cities unless a city has the same or a more stringent ordinance.

Fiscal court is further required to appropriate the funds required by law to provide for necessary public facilities including the care and maintenance of county buildings. The budget, for example, must include funds for the county judge/executive salary, the coroner's salary, the PVA's office expenses, voting machine payments, election expenses, county debt payments and audit ex-

penses. Fiscal court will establish policies for itself as well as for the judge/executive in the administrative code. For example, the code will include such items as:

The regular meeting schedule; provisions for special meetings; public notice of meetings; the authority and selection of a presiding officer and rules of order; the use of an agenda and definition of the order of business; the procedure for putting an item on its agenda; the method for approval of bill payments; the organization and location records — minutes, ordinances, resolutions.

These items also will tell you how to put your business before the court if you need official action.

In addition to the adoption of the code, the approval of optional expenditures in the budget is fiscal court's most important means of exercising policy control. As a result, the county budget law was changed by the General Assembly so that fiscal court must review and tentatively approve the

budget before it is sent to the state local finance officer, and the County Budget Commission must adopt any changes proposed by fiscal court before sending the budget to the local finance officer.

As with the President and Congress, the judge/executive may propose but fiscal court disposes.

## Business Opportunity Improving

Beginning June 19, consumers thinking of investing in a distributorship or business opportunity will have more protection. The Business Opportunity Act will regulate specific types of distributorships and business opportunities in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Before even soliciting, a salesperson should provide the potential investor with information regarding such things as: (a) names and addresses of all offices and salespersons, (b) length of time the business has been operating, (c) information on any lawsuits against the company or salespersons, (d) names, addresses, and phone numbers of previous purchasers within the past two years and a list of those who requested refunds, and (e) the registration number of the company listed with the Department of Banking and Securities in Frankfort.

Under the Act the purchaser also has 30 days to cancel, provided any equipment involved is still in good condition.

# Gateway CAP Receives Energy Reimbursements

**WEST LIBERTY** — Gateway Community Services Organization has received a grant total of \$87,718 in state and federal funds, according to releases issued by the Kentucky Department for Human Resources.

One grant of \$22,000 was received by Gateway Community Services for emergency crisis intervention which consists of emergency energy assistance services to low income people in the area.

A GCS spokesman said Thursday that their staff assisted 460 low income households during the severe winter weather. A total of 466 homes were assisted with fuel bills at a cost of \$31,869.

A spokesman also said 127 homes were given assistance in categories

other than fuel and energy supplements at a cost of \$6,389.

GCS reported they spent a total of \$60,149 for weather related assistance to low income homes in the area.

An estimated 1,867 persons were directly aided by the organization in the crisis intervention program.

Gateway Community Services assists low income citizens in the counties of Rowan, Montgomery, Menifee, Bath and Morgan.

# Auto Inspections Not Completely Dead

**FRANKFORT, Ky. (UPI)** — Kentucky automobile owners who no longer have to worry about mandatory automobile inspections may be finding themselves being stopped by police if they have faulty equipment.

The mandatory vehicle inspections in Kentucky were done away with by the 1978 Kentucky Legislature, and Gov. Julian Carroll expedited the demise of the procedure with an executive order earlier in the spring that, in effect, moved up the end of the program.

However, G.B. Arnold, commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicle Regulation, said he believes the state and local authorities will be concentrating more effort to rid the state's roads of cars with faulty equipment.

"Just because the inspections are coming to a close doesn't mean that authorities are going to sit by and let cars go out on the highways that are not only dangerous to the driver but to other motorists as well," Arnold said in an interview.

Arnold added that because the inspections are being eliminated, the chances for more cars to have some type of faulty equipment will increase, hence creating more opportunities for motorists to be cited.

"I know the arguments have been said the inspections weren't doing much anyway, but at least they were a form of checking one's car," Arnold said. "I would like a pre-purchase test that you will see police actively checking to make sure certain operating items are working properly, and if they are not, I think people are going to be pulled off to

one side and be issued a summons."

State police have indicated they plan to keep monitoring for faulty brakes, headlights, mufflers and other equipment as they have in the past.

But Arnold said by not having the inspections to serve as a backup, many automobile owners may become lax in correcting some of the problems with their vehicles, especially those Kentuckians who may own older autos.

"As always seems to happen with any change in the law," Arnold explained, "those people who needed it the most aren't going to benefit and those who didn't really need it are going to go ahead and continue to get inspections on their own."

The inspection program for all vehicles is actually not dead. Large commercial vehicles, those weighing over 38,000 pounds, will still come under scrutiny of federal and state officials for inspections.

"However, our inspectors normally find that these vehicles are handled by professional companies and firms that as a rule are very conscious of safety requirements," he said.

Many service station operators had complained they were losing money on the mandatory inspections and demonstrated in Frankfort, seeking an increase in the inspection fees.

What Arnold believes will happen now is that motorists who are "safety conscious anyway" will rely on their local dealers and gasoline stations to make the necessary improvements.

"However, the people who are going to be the ones that are caught with faulty devices of some sort are the ones who are not going to bother to get their cars checked anyway," Arnold said.

# Invitations Being Sent For Nixon Visit

**FRANKFORT, Ky. (UPI)** — Invitations are being sent to a select group of officials, including Democratic Kentucky Gov. Julian Carroll, this week for former President Richard M. Nixon's visit to Hyden, Ky. July 2.

Leslie County Judge/Executive C. Allen Muncy said Tuesday Carroll, Kentucky's U.S. senators, and representatives, and other officials will be invited to Nixon's appearance July 2. "The invitations should be going out next week," Muncy said Tuesday in a telephone interview.

He said he planned to confer later this week with members of U.S. Rep. Tim Lee Carter's staff on working out details of the Nixon visit.

Carter talked to Nixon in May and confirmed that the former president said he was coming to Kentucky.

"We should have most of the details ironed out by this Friday," Muncy said. An aide to Carter, Johanna Schrambling, said no one on the Republican's staff had talked to Nixon since early last week, but added there was no doubt in anyone's mind that Nixon would be attending.

She also said a press pool would likely have to be set up to handle the overflow of media expected to attend the former President's first public speaking engagement since his resignation.

"Barring some personal problem in his family, we are certain he is coming and the details will be worked out in plenty of time," Schrambling said. "But, the local people are in charge of all preparations, including the press, but we think with so many people crowding into a small area, some type of press pool arrangement may have to be set up."

Muncy does expect thousands of people to come to the tiny southeast Kentucky coal mining town.

"It could be 10,000 to 15,000, or it could go as high as 20,000 or 40,000 with the July 4 holiday," Muncy said.

On behalf of Leslie Fiscal Court, Muncy last month invited the former President to speak at the dedication of a federally-funded, recreational center named for him at Hyden, and Nixon accepted. Hyden is in the 5th Congressional District, which normally votes heavily Republican.

Nixon was President when the federal grant providing for the recreational

complex was approved.

Muncy confirmed some of the details for the visit, including the fact Nixon will arrive the day before the speech, which will be given at 1 p.m. on July 2. "Mr. Nixon will arrive at London Airport on July 1," Muncy said. "That much we know now." He will stay overnight in the area and then speak at 1 p.m. EDT on July 2, inside the recreation complex's new gym, also named for Nixon. We still don't know where he will be staying but we're working on that.

Muncy said he had asked Carroll for additional state police for crowd control during the former President's visit.

Nixon will be accompanied from California by Secret Service agents assigned to ex-Presidents and their families.

Muncy said he had called the Nixon residence at San Clemente, Calif., and Nixon said they were leaving details of the visit entirely up to his Kentucky hosts.

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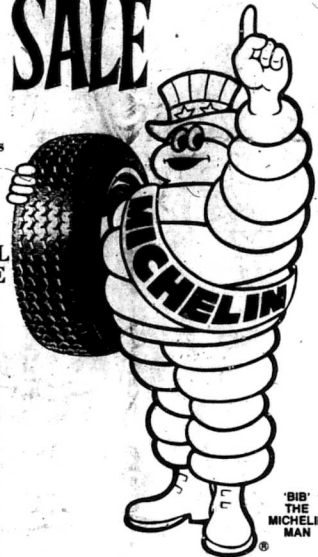

### Pennington Submits Financial Reports

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Former County Attorney Harvey Pennington has filed the required financial status report with the Kentucky Department for Local Government.

"Reports are being received daily since the public announcement of the list of delinquent officials," Bob Purdom, state local finance officer for the department, said.

Reports have been required by the state since the enactment of legislation in 1974 requiring accounting systems for county officials. Pennington earlier told The Morehead News the state never informed him he was delinquent on any reports until a press release was issued on the matter. Pennington said he filed his financial status report as soon as he became aware it was due.

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## Morehead Swim Team Begins Fourth Season

It takes stamina to dive in a swimming pool not knowing if it's going to be soothing warm or tingling cool. But it takes a special kind of dedication to challenge the water's early morning chill and knowing you may very pop out as a human icicle.

For a couple of weeks now, at least since the opening of the City Pool, 35 youngsters, ages ranging from five to 17 years, have been doing just that as members of the Morehead Swim Team. The team is entering its fourth year of summer competition and is sanctioned by the AAU. It competes with other area swim teams in Paris, Lexington, Ashland and Mt. Sterling.

Unlike most seasonal sports, such as baseball or basketball, swimming is a year round thing, explains Coach Robbie McGrath.

"During the winter we work out two or three days a week at the University pool," he says. "Then, when the pool opens over here in the summer, it's practice every weekday morning with meets on the weekends."

What makes the Morehead club different from the others is the main objective is not necessarily winning, "but just to go out and have a good time swimming in the way we operate our team," says Coach McGrath.

He admits the team hasn't made a habit of winning during its existence, but "again, that is what it's all about."

McGrath says the parents of the kids on the team have been the backbone of the club. The parents pay a small amount of dues to help finance the club and many act as chauffeurs on away meets. Then when Morehead hosts the competition the parents turn into judges, timers, starters and general hosts and hostesses.

This year's schedule has yet to be totally completed. But when it is, there will be a new addition — league members. McGrath says three nearby teams — Paris, Mt. Sterling and Lexington Country Club in Georgetown — have formed a small league. Each team will

host a dual meet with the other teams, meaning they will compete with each team at least twice.

Also on the schedule are visits to the Brezeland Invitational in Ashland and the Huntington (W.Va.) Invitational.

"We'll probably have around nine meets this summer," McGrath said, "which will average out to about one a week."

The teams compete in just four styles of swimming — freestyle, butterfly, breaststroke and backstroke and in different age groups. The bulk of the Morehead teams lies in the eight to 14 age bracket.

"We get a lot of youngsters on the team but once they get to be 16 or 17 they get summer jobs or start playing baseball and it's hard to get any real consistency," the coach said.

Among the ones who have stuck it out this season has been 13-year-old Tim Gostick. Gostick is the team's "Mr. Everything," competing in all four events.

A 14-year-old who has a lot of potential, says the coach, is Tom Fossett. His tall, thin frame has become an advantage and the coach says Fossett has really been the most improved swimmer this season.

Some others who show real promise are Gordon and Clayton Black, Dee Greenfield, Jennifer Alfrey, Steve and Susan Burchett and Nita Eyster.

McGrath calls Steve Burchett the "wild card" on the swim team but says it's a club secret as to why.

The coach says the team roster is always open to new members, since swimming is a sport where you can have "a second" on the team. McGrath hopes to add at least 10 more swimmers before the season begins.

## Cincinnati Takes Three Wins; Post 126 - Giants Tonite

Just like the weather the competition got hot and heavy on the legion baseball circuit this past weekend as Post 126 finally tasted the bitterness of defeat, three times to be exact.

Morehead's American Legion baseball team built its perfect season mark to eight wins before Cincinnati's Mt. Carmel club finally put the deadly ax to the streak. But then the losses could have done more good than harm.

Just two seasons ago, Coach Don Hardin experienced a 26-game winning streak to open the season "and believe me the pressure got heavy."

"I didn't actually want to see them lose but the pressure that year was

tremendous," Hardin said. "The guys got so tight you wouldn't believe it."

The coach also had the fear of what would happen once his team did drop a game. Could they recover or would the slight trauma reap a team kill? It resulted in the latter. Post 126 dropped eight of their next 14 games but by no means was the season a losing one.

Anyway, Coach Hardin can rest easy on two things. His team will not reach the 26-0 plateau, because of a trio of weekend losses, and they've proven they can recover quickly from any setback.

Post 126, to begin the week, easily copped two wins from Lexington's Dealers, 11-4 and 14-7, with the theme of the twin-nighter being "Walk Around the Bases Tonight." Morehead took full advantage of some 24 walks issued by a staff of Lexington hurlers in the two games.

Two Lexington Dealer pitchers combined for over half of the walks total in game one. Five of them came in the fifth inning when Post 126 exploded for six runs to help starter Tim Ramey pick up his second win in as many starts. But the 18-year-old strongarm needed late inning relief from Wendell Bailey, Morehead's instant heat, and David Michaels.

In the second game Morehead plated all the runs they actually needed (eight) in the first two frames enroute to a 14-7 victory. And it was again the free pass to first playing the major role. Eugene Ferguson notched his second victory.

Then the competition came to town for a five-game, weekend series. And when the dust settled late Sunday evening at Hardin Field, Coach Hardin seemed to feel mighty lucky his team managed the two wins they did get from Mt. Carmel.

"To say the least they're a good ball club," Hardin assessed. "It's the first time we've ever played."

Hardin was impressed with the defensive play of Mt. Carmel and particularly with the competitive spirit they expressed during their visit.

Morehead escaped with a 3-2 win in Friday's opening match. Cincinnati wasted little time in showing it meant baseball business, scoring a run in the opening inning off Post 126 starter Mike Maddox.

The home team came back to tie the game with a single run in the third via back to back singles by Ronnie Cornett and Johnny Warner followed by a run producing fielder's choice by David Gaunce.

Mt. Carmel went back on top in the seventh with a single run to make it 2-1. Post 72 scored on a walk by Mike DeMoss, an error and an rbi by Denny Fore.

A two-run double by Joe Dawson in the eighth inning put Post 126 back in front for good, 3-2. Dawson's shot to the rightfield power alley plated Tomy McKinney and Joey May who had reached in a fielder's choice and walked, setting up the heroics by Dawson.

Maddox went the distance for his second win, allowing just five hits in his nine innings on the mound, striking out nine and walking only three batters.

But Cincinnati reversed like score in Saturday's opening game which also ended by a 3-2 margin.

The game began as an all-out pitching duel between Morehead's Larry McLin and Greg Kasten of Post 72. But after four almost eventless innings Cincinnati reached McLin for four hits and three runs. Morehead countered with two in the seventh but Kasten closed the door on Post 126, dealing them their first loss in nine starts this season.

Cincinnati made two in a row with a 10-2 run in the second game Saturday as Michael's starting, debut didn't turn out to be anything more than a nightmare for the 15-year-old hurler.

Post 126 suffered a third setback in Sunday's game by the mark of 8-2 but salvaged the weekend series with a 5-4 win in the last duel with Cincinnati.

Dawson continues to swing the big stick for Morehead, hitting at a 346 clip with 10 hits but the hot bats this weekend were Johnny Warner, and David Gaunce.

Warner built his average to .442 and

leads the club with 19 hits while the ever-threatening Gaunce totes a .355 mark.

At one point in the weekend Warner was red-hot, going five-four-eight in Saturday's twinbill.

Post 126 was resined out of their road debut in Lexington Monday evening. Morehead's schedule calls for a home game tonight against Lexington's Metro Giants before embarking on a weekend swing to Hillsboro, Ohio and Columbus, Indiana. The latter stop will be for a weekend tournament involving six teams.

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# Donaldson's Plans Sky-High Adventures This Summer

Since the movie, "Those Magnificent Men in Their Flying Machines", Chuck Donaldson's interest has grown in flying and, by the end of this summer, he plans to soar over the countryside on his own set of wings.

"I have been interested in flying for several years and in hang gliding since it began," says the Morehead State University senior from Portsmouth, Ohio. "He began four years ago to build a

hang glider with a 32-foot wing span and now finally has its completion within reach.

After several starts and stops, construction resumed last fall in MSU's Lapping Hall when Donaldson used his "Icarus V" glider plans as a part of a special project in a physics class.

Donaldson says he decided to build this particular model after reading about it in a magazine several years ago. He said he bought the plans for

\$12.00 for what was, in his words, "the most sophisticated hang glider of its day."

More and more hang gliders are being seen around cliffs in different sections of the country as the sport continues to grow.

"A lot of people getting into the sport want to get started as soon as they can," he said. "So they go out and buy some sort of kit and put the glider together and they're ready. That's the difference in my glider because I have only the plans and have to build it myself. This takes a lot of time which most people don't want to spend."

An experienced glider flyer and parachutist, Donald plans to foot launch along the Licking River because "high performance gliders like the Icarus V don't need the high cliffs many of the others do."

After parachuting and fixed-wing flying, he prefers hang gliding.

"It's like you are really flying," Donaldson says. "You can float and soar like the birds."

The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Dale Hollow: Bluegill fair to good in

inlets and bays; walleye fair trolling deep runners off deep banks and mud flats; white bass fair on plunker and fly combination in the jumps; clear, stable at summer pool and 70°.

Cumberland: White bass and crappie fair at night off rocky points; black bass fair on the lower lake early and late on surface lures and artificial night-crawlers in inlets and bays; bluegill fair

on the upper lake off gravel banks; in tailwaters, crappie, sauger, trout and white bass good; clear, falling, two feet below the timberline and 70°.

Herrington: Black bass fair and improving casting artificial night-crawlers and still fishing soft crawfish off medium and shallow banks; rockfish fair trolling deep runners in the area of the dam; bluegill fair still and drift fishing crickets off deep banks; clear to murky, stable, one foot above summer pool and 70°.

Green: White bass good trolling spinners over drop-offs and falls; black bass fair on surface lures in inlets and bays and on artificial night-crawlers off points and over drop-offs; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80°.

Laurel: Trout good at night still fishing worms off deep banks and points; black bass fair on surface lures and artificial night-crawlers in inlets and bays; clear, stable, two feet below power pool and 81°.

Rough River: Black bass fair on the north fork early and late and slow on the south fork on medium runners and artificial night-crawlers off points and over drop-offs; bluegill fair on the north fork over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 80°.

Barkeley: Black bass fair and improving on artificial night-crawlers and brush line in inlets and bays; bluegill fair around brush in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish fair, white bass slow; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80°.

Kentucky: Catfish fair off rip rap; sauger fair trolling deep runners and still fishing minnows off ridges; in tailwaters, catfish and sauger fair; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 81°.

Grayson: Bluegill fair in inlets and bays; black bass slow on spinner baits off muddy banks and over submerged stumps; in tailwaters, bluegill fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 79°.

Fishtrap: Crappie fair around stick up; bluegill slow and improving in inlets and bays; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 78°.

Dewey: Crappie fair over submerged cover and around stick up; clear to murky stable at summer pool and 80°.

Cave Run: Musky slow on crank baits and spinner baits off shallow banks; black bass slow on spinner baits and artificial night-crawlers in inlets and bays and around stick up; clear to murky, falling slowly, one foot above summer pool and 78°.

Beaverdam: Crappie slow over submerged cover; bluegill slow off shallow banks; in tailwaters, catfish fair; murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 75°.

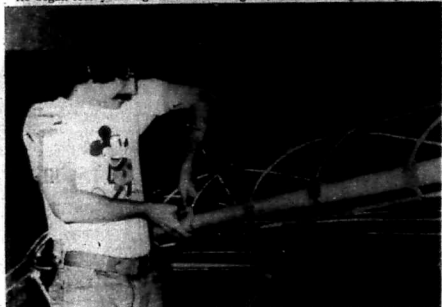
Barren: Black bass good on the lower lake; black bass and slow on spinner baits on artificial night-crawlers off points; white bass fair to good on the lower lake trolling deep runners with spinners off flats; bluegill fair to good on the upper lake still fishing worms and crickets and on flyrod poppers off deep banks; catfish fair on the upper lake off rip rap; in tailwaters, catfish and crappie slow to fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 80°.

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# ORDINANCE

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF MONEY FOR INTERIM FINANCING IN CONNECTION WITH THE CITY'S PROJECT WHICH IS BEING FINANCED IN PART BY THE ISSUANCE OF ITS UTILITY REVENUE BONDS, 1977 SERIES A AND 1977 SERIES B ACCORDING TO THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF A CERTAIN LOAN FROM THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF PROMISSORY NOTES FROM TIME TO TIME IN EVIDENCE OF SUCH BORROWING; AND PLEDGING REPAYMENT OF SUCH BORROWING AND INTEREST THEREON FROM THE PROCEEDS OF AN EPA GRANT.**

WHEREAS, the City of Morehead, Rowan County, Kentucky (the "City"), has sold to the United States of America, acting through the agency of the Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration ("FHA"), on May 12, 1978, \$2,450,000 "City of Morehead Utility Revenue Bonds, 1977 Series A," to be dated as of the date of delivery, the proceeds of which sale will be applied to the acquisition, construction and installation of major extensions and additions to, and improvements of, the City's sewer system which is a part of the Utility System (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, in connection with said Project the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") has undertaken to make a grant to the City in the amount of \$7,052,000, which sum, however, may not always be available at the exact time the City makes expenditures for the project; and

WHEREAS, with FHA approval, the City has previously authorized the borrowing of money for interim financing in anticipation of the eventual receipt of such proceeds; and now finds it to be expedient to authorize borrowing in anticipation of receipt of the EPA grant, such money to be expended upon the Project from time to time as needed, and to request the lender or lenders; and it appears to the City that it is essential at this time to provide for such borrowings;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** The borrowing of up to the aggregate sum of \$1,000,000 and accrued interest from the Peoples Bank of Morehead, Morehead, Kentucky, or from either of said banks (the "Banks"), is hereby authorized; and the Chairman and the Superintendent of the Morehead Utility Plant Board are hereby authorized to execute in the name and on behalf of the City and of said Board any number of negotiable promissory notes, in such form and at such rate of interest (if acceptable to FHA) as may be prescribed by the said Bank (or Banks), each evidencing and advance of cash funds by said Bank (or Banks) to the City; and the said Bank (or Banks) is hereby authorized and requested to make disbursement of the proceeds of each of such borrowings;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** The borrowing of up to the aggregate sum of \$1,000,000 and accrued interest from the Peoples Bank of Morehead, Morehead, Kentucky, and First National Bank of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, or from either of said banks (the "Banks"), is hereby authorized; and the Chairman and the Superintendent of the Morehead Utility Plant Board are hereby authorized to execute in the name and on behalf of the City and of said Board any number of negotiable promissory notes, in such form and at such rate of interest (if acceptable to FHA) as may be prescribed by the said Bank (or Banks), each evidencing an advance of cash funds by said Bank (or Banks) to the City; and the said Bank (or Banks) is hereby authorized and requested to make disbursement of the proceeds of each of such promissory notes as approved in writing, by the County Bank Supervisor, and the aforementioned Chairman and Superintendent. The authority hereby given the Chairman and Superintendent of the Morehead Utility Plant Board to act for the City and said Board shall include the execution of renewal notes in evidence of renewal and extension of due, providing the aggregate of the principal amount of all such promissory notes outstanding and payable to said Bank (or Banks) shall not exceed \$1,000,000 and the interest and providing the notes which renewed or superseded is simultaneously cancelled by said Bank (or Banks) and transmitted to the Superintendent of the Morehead Utility Plant Board.

**Section 2.** As permitted by the terms and conditions of the FHA loan to the City the City hereby covenants and agrees with said Bank (or Banks), being the financial institution (or institutions) named in Section 1 hereof, that upon receipt of portions of the EPA grant to be referred to in the preamble hereto, which is the same grant also referred to in the City's contract with FHA, the City will apply the proceeds thereof, to whatever extent may be necessary, to the payment of the principal amount of all such notes then held by said Bank (or Banks), together with interest thereon to the date of such payment, and the proceeds of said bonds are hereby pledged therefor; and they shall constitute a first and prior charge against such proceeds.

**Section 3.** Authority is hereby given for said total authorized interim financing of \$1,000,000 and accrued interest to be the maximum principal indebtedness which the City may owe to said Bank (or Banks) at any given time which is payable from the proceeds of the EPA grant; provided, however, that the City must reduce the amount owed by the City to said Bank (or Banks) from time to time as when funds are available to the City, and may borrow from said Bank (or Banks) additional amounts in anticipation of the payment of the City of additional grant proceeds in order to enable the City to save interest cost by applying the grant proceeds as received (and which are not immediately needed for payment of cost of the Project) toward the liquidation or reduction of said interim financing loans until such time as additional interim financing loans are needed to provide additional funds for cost of said Project as required of the City, subject to the limitation that the total amount of \$1,000,000, and accrued interest, and (b) shall not be in excess of the balance of grant proceeds not theretofore received by the District.

The limitations contained in this paragraph relate only to loans repayable from EPA grant proceeds, and shall not be construed to include loans authorized by a separate interim financing ordinance which was adopted by the City Council on April 14, 1978, which relates to borrowing in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of the sale of the aforesaid bonds. Said ordinance of April 14, 1978, is confirmed and is not affected hereby.

**Section 4.** The Bank (or Banks) named in Section 1 hereof, in its (or their) discretion, may associate itself (or themselves) with any other bank in lending or advancing money to the City as herein authorized.

**Section 5.** The notes as hereinbefore described shall be executed by the Chairman and the Superintendent of the Morehead Utility Plant Board in the following manner:

**Section 6.** A certified copy of this Ordinance and the City's Bond Ordinance and the said loan to the said Bank (or Banks) and the same shall constitute a pledge of the first EPA grant proceeds toward the payment of the said loan, and said Bank (or Banks) is hereby authorized to apply the first EPA grant proceeds to the liquidation of such loan and when such amounts are deposited with said Bank (or Banks), the effective date of the approval of this Ordinance by the City or Plant Board officials being required as to such application.

**Section 7.** This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication as provided by law.

#### DAIRY SITUATION

Milk production in the United States was down one percent in April, two percent lower in Kentucky. Production per cow was the same in April as in March in Kentucky but up six pounds per cow in the United States. We now have 274,000 cows in Kentucky. 500,000 less than in 1976. The milk-feed price ratio for April was 1.62 down from 1.68 in March. Higher feed prices caused slightly lower milk prices accounted for the decrease.

Dairymen should avoid off-flavored milk from wild onion and weeds in pastures by pulling cows from the pastures two-three hours before milking.

#### TOBACCO WEED CONTROL

Allen Wallace, extension tobacco research specialist, will be in the county next week to put out a demonstration on the use of four different chemicals to control weeds in tobacco fields. This will be done on the farm of Boyd Fannin on Christy Creek and will be visited on Field Day. Jim Hestron, extension weed control specialist, was in the county on Tuesday of last week to put out a trial on Johnson grass control on the farm of Howard Spurlock. These trials are put out and supervised by the Agronomy Department of the University of Kentucky and results will be published as they are available. Ken Lewis is growing the corn.

#### TAX LAW FARMLAND

In the near future, heirs to some Kentucky farmland will pay state inheritance taxes based on its use for agricultural production rather than on its fair cash value.

Recently passed laws causing this change in assessment will become effective in the estates of persons who die on or after July 1, 1978.

According to Stephen Allen, extension farm management specialist in the UK College of Agriculture, the change usually will mean less state inheritance tax levied on heirs to this land.

To be assessed under the new law, land must meet certain qualifications, among which are: it must have been farmed for at least five years immediately prior to the death of its owner. Its fair cash value must exceed 50 percent of the gross taxable estate of the deceased person. It must pass to qualified persons.

"Qualified persons inheriting the land must use it for farming for at least five years after the death of its previous owner," Allen says. He points out that if the land is sold (other than to another qualified person who is a joint owner) or converted to a use other than farming within the five-year period, additional inheritance tax, based on fair market value plus interest at eight percent per year must be paid.

The specialist adds that under these new laws, the gross estate of the deceased may never be reduced by more than \$500,000 as a result of the use value appraisal.

#### MEAT BUSINESS

Taken in total, livestock and meat production in the United States is a big industry. Last year more than 123 million cattle, hogs and sheep were marketed to produce 39 billion pounds of red meat, according to the National Livestock and Meat Board.

Latest government and industry statistics show that livestock are produced on 1.8 million cattle farms and ranches, 679,000 hog farms and 126,450 sheep farms. Many of the livestock produced in this country spend some time in one of more than 134,000 feedlots. The livestock are sold through 2,100 marketing points to be converted into meat at some 6,100 packing and processing companies.

The meat is purchased by the nation's consumers in 265,000 retail food stores and more than 500,000 food service operations.






# Ford To Recall All Pintos

**DETROIT — (UPI) —** Ford Motor Co. in a move intended to "end public concern" over the danger of exploding gas tanks, has agreed to call back 1.5 million Pinto and Bobcat subcompact to modify possibly explosive fuel systems.

The recall, announced Friday, includes all 1971-1976 Pinto and 1975-1976 Bobcat sedans and three-door runabouts. Station wagons and newer models are not involved, the company said.

A Ford spokesman said the modifications are designed to strengthen the tanks and filler pipes against the danger of rupturing and exploding in a rear-end crash.

Reports of hundreds of such explosions and fires prompted the

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to investigate the Pinto gas tank design. Ford also has been hit with dozens of lawsuits stemming from Pinto accidents.

Ford Vice President Herbert L. Misch said the recall is not an admission by Ford that the tanks pose a significant safety hazard, as was charged by the NHTSA in a preliminary report in May.

Nonetheless, "we recognize that the agency had identified areas in which the risk of fuel leakage could be reduced significantly on a practicable basis," Misch said.

"Accordingly, Ford decided to offer the modifications so as to end public concern that has resulted from criticism of the fuel systems of these vehicles."

In Washington, consumer advocate Ralph Nader said the proposed Ford correction is inadequate because the

whole fuel tank should be replaced with a double-layer version separated by polyurethane foam.

He said Ford noted in its letter to NHTSA the corrected version would still be below that required for 1977 and later models under NHTSA's newer fuel tank safety rules.

The agency, in its initial findings, said tests had shown the tanks could rupture in a low or moderate speed rear-end collision, resulting in "massive fuel leaks" and fires.

One lawsuit stemming from such an accident resulted in a \$128.5 million jury award to a California woman who was severely burned in a fiery Pinto crash that killed the driver.

Earlier this month, an Arlington, Va., jury awarded \$675,000 to another young burn victim whose parents died in the

fiery crash of a 1973 Pinto.

Ford is appealing the verdicts. Misch said the modifications will involve replacing the original fuel-filler pipe and seal with a longer pipe and improved seal and installation of a polyethylene shield across the front of the parts.

He said the modifications will not be in dealers' hands until September, Misch said.

# HOME BUYER CLINIC

**DESCRIPTION**

One of the functions of a deed that transfers real estate ownership is furnishing a description of the property acquired. When a description is inaccurate, it can mean an expensive problem for the home buyer.

More than 15 years after completing his real estate purchase, a buyer in an eastern state discovered that because of an erroneous description in the deed his property overlapped some four feet onto his neighbor's land. With a possible lawsuit in the offing, it was necessary to retain an attorney.

After the legal work was completed to remove the problem, attorney fees and costs amounted to a substantial sum. Since the buyer was protected by owner's title insurance issued at the time of his real estate purchase, the title company paid for the corrective work to avert financial loss for its insured.

Precautions against the possibility of land title hazards from the past are a justifiable concern for home buyers. Although a title search of public records is designed to locate problems before a real estate purchase is completed, no search can guarantee that all title difficulties have been found. Owner's title insurance has been developed as protection against hazards including those a search will not reveal—such as a forged deed that transfers no title, a claim by a previously undisclosed heir, mistakes in the records, and so forth.

### KSD Fund Approves 300 Horses, Four Tracks

LEXINGTON — The Kentucky Standardbred Development Fund has announced that 282 horses are eligible for the fund's two-year-old races at the state's four harness racing tracks. 

# ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, RELATING TO THE CITY'S COMBINED AND CONSOLIDATED UTILITY SYSTEM, ESTABLISHING A REVISED SCALE OF RATES AND CHARGES FOR SERVICE TO BE PROVIDED THROUGH THE FACILITIES OF SAID SYSTEM; PRESCRIBING THE EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF AND CONFIRMING EXISTING RULES RELATING TO TIMES FOR METER READING, RENDITION OF BILLS, PAYMENT OF BILLS, PENALTIES FOR LATE PAYMENT, AND THE DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE TO DELINQUENTS; AND ESTABLISHING OTHER RULES AND REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS, the City, by concurrent proceedings, is providing for the acquisition, construction and installation of additions and extensions to and improvements of its municipal utility system, in and by which concurrent proceedings the City is authorizing the issuance and sale of its "Utility Revenue Bonds, 1977 Series A" to pay a portion of the costs of said project in the manner authorized and provided by the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and in compliance with the terms and conditions of a certain federal loan to the City from the United States Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration ("FHA"), in aid of said project; and

WHEREAS, in and by said statutes and the terms and conditions of said federal loan from FHA, it is required that rates or charges for the use and services of said system be prescribed and maintained so as to pay the interest upon and the principal of said Bonds as the same become due, and also to pay operating and maintenance costs, as well as to create a depreciation fund,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDEIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1. General.** No free use of the services and facilities of the municipal utility system of the City (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "System") shall be granted or permitted to any user thereof, including the City itself.

**Section 2. When Service is Available and Required.** Water or gas service is deemed available when, at the request of the user, a connection has been completed and is in working order for water service or gas service, as the case may be, and no request has been made for disconnection. Sewer service is deemed available, and is required, in accordance with the provisions of a separate ordinance relating to mandatory connection to the System.

**Section 3. Sewer Service Rates and Charges to be Collected as to All Premises Where Such Service is Made Available.** The rates and charges hereinafter prescribed for sewer service shall be made to and collected from the owners or occupants of all premises within said City where sewer service is available, whether such premises are connected with the System or not. In the case of unconnected premises which are water customers, the rates and charges for sewer service shall be according to the sewer rate schedule hereinafter set forth. In the case of unconnected premises which are not water customers, if any, a minimum monthly sewer charge of three and 70/100 dollars (\$3.70) shall apply, but higher rates shall be fixed and determined when the volume of sewage justifies such increased rates. The fact that sewer charges may have been billed to or collected from any such unconnected premises shall not have any bearing upon, nor constitute a defense to, any criminal charge arising out of failure to connect such premises to the System; but such monetary charges are and shall be deemed to be civil exactions toward the costs of making sewer facilities available, and the costs of operating and maintaining the same in the necessary interests of the public health, safety and general welfare.

**Section 4. Service Rates and Charges.** Rates and charges for the use of the water and sewer services and facilities of the System shall be based upon the consumption of water, and rates and charges for the use of the gas services and facilities of the System shall be based upon the consumption of gas. Such rates and charges shall be at least adequate to meet the cost of maintaining, repairing and operating the System and making required principal and interest payments and deposits to the debt service and/or depreciation reserve. On said basis, rates and charges are hereby established and fixed, and will be maintained, at not less than the following:

**EXCEPTIONS IN APPLICATION OF SEWER CHARGES**

The City recognizes certain exceptional situations wherein adjustments in the manner of applying sewer service charges should be permitted, and provision is made for the same, as follows:

(a) Where more than twenty percent (20%) of the water used by the owner or occupant of any premises during the year does not flow into the sanitary sewer, the percentage in excess of twenty percent (20%) shall be excluded from the calculation of the sewer service rates and charges herein provided. It shall be the burden of the owner or occupant of any such premises to prove to the City that more than twenty percent (20%) of the water used on such premises during the year does not flow into the sanitary sewer, and such burden shall be deemed to be met only upon a showing by the sewer user, to the satisfaction of the City, that the quantity thereof is accurately measured by means of a standard water meter. In the event the sewer user has no such evidence, a meter for such purpose may be provided by the City upon payment by the sewer user of the cost of the necessary equipment and all expenses of installation. In no case, however, shall the sewer service rates and charges herein provided be calculated upon less than twenty percent (20%) of the water used by the owner or occupant of any premises during the year.

(b) Whenever it is determined by the City to be necessary to classify any commercial institutions or industries by reason of the unusual purpose for which water is used, or the character of the sewage, water, or other liquid wastes discharged therefrom, or whenever the established schedules of sewer service rates and charges for any reason are not applicable, then special sewer service rates, rentals or other charges may be established by the City Council, and any person, firm, or corporation being dissatisfied with the established schedule of sewer service rates, rentals, or other charges, by reason of peculiar or unusual uses of water, may file application with the City for special sewer service classification, rates, rentals and charges. The City may take such action thereon as it sees fit; provided, however, that no special classification or rate may be established if the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration, objects thereto.

(c) Sewer service charges shall not apply to bills representing surplus water furnished at wholesale to other municipalities, communities or water systems; but if any municipality, community, or other entity shall desire to make arrangements for disposal of all or a part of its flowable sewage wastes through sewer lines or facilities of the City, same shall be only upon the basis of special contract specifically approved and authorized in each instance by Ordinance or Resolution duly adopted by the City's governing body. The City recognizes no obligation or duty of any sort to enter into any such contract or arrangement, and may entertain or refuse to entertain any such proposal as it sees fit, and regardless of the fact that it may in the past have seen fit, or may in the future see fit, to act otherwise or upon different terms in any other similar or dissimilar cases.

(d) In the matter of the furnishing of sewer service upon a temporary basis to circuses, carnivals, tent meetings, outdoor athletic events (other than those carried on by the public school system), and other miscellaneous temporary uses, a flat rate may be fixed in each individual case and the service charge shall be paid in advance.

**Section 5. When Rates and Charges Effective.** The rates and charges herein prescribed shall become effective immediately upon making a connection, or, in any event, if no sewer connection is made as required by the mandatory sewer connection ordinance, upon the first day of the calendar month following the last day for making a connection under the terms of the mandatory connection ordinance; provided, however, the rates and charges herein established, which are recognized to be based upon the necessities of the financing of the City's project for the expansion and improvement of the System through a loan agreement with FHA, shall not become effective until the completion of said project and the delivery of the aforementioned bond issue to FHA, or \_\_\_\_\_, whichever comes first; and existing rates and charges shall continue until that time.

**Section 6. When Bills Due; Penalties; Disconnection of Water Service; Re-Connection; Charges; Interest; Other Provisions For Collection.**

The rates or charges as aforesaid shall be billed monthly in the case of metered users, and no less frequently than quarterly in the case of special users, and the water bill and sewer bill shall be rendered at the same time and on the same bill forms, but as separate charges, and all bills for such service shall be due and payable when rendered. If not paid by the 10th of the month following the date rendered, the bill shall be delinquent, and a delay penalty equal to two percent (2%) of the face amount of the bill shall become due and payable; provided, however, that if such "delinquency date" should fall upon a Sunday or a legal holiday, then the face amount of the bill may be paid on the next secular day which is not a holiday. If the entire bill for both water service and sewer service, together with said penalty, shall not be paid for a period of twenty (20) days after the mailing of the bills, then pursuant to authority of KRS 96.934 the water service connection to the premises shall be disconnected, whether the same customer's water service bill has been paid or not. If any delinquent customer shall, thereafter, desire reconnection, a charge in the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) is hereby fixed to cover the expense thereof; and prior to such reconnection, the customer shall be required to pay the delinquent bill, the penalty, and the said charge for reconnection. Whether or not any premises are disconnected because of such delinquency, the City Attorney or any attorney duly authorized to act for and by the City, is hereby authorized and directed to enforce and collect the amount of any bills remaining delinquent for thirty (30) days after penalty is added (including the penalty, interest or six percent (6%) from date penalty is added and court costs) by suit in any court of competent jurisdiction.

**Section 7. To Whom Bills Rendered.** In the case of sewer service to premises which are connected to the water system serving the City, the bill for sewer service charges shall be rendered to the water customer. In other cases sewer rates and charges aforesaid shall be billed to the owners of the premises, except that application by the tenant of any premises, who is not the owner thereof, filed with the City, accompanied by a cash deposit or other appropriate security or indemnity in an amount or a kind approved by the said City, such bills may be rendered to such tenant.

**Section 8. Notice Taken of Statutory Requirements.** Nothing set forth in this Ordinance shall be construed in such manner as to conflict with the requirements of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and of the Ordinance of even date herewith, authorizing the issuance of the Bonds referred to in the preamble hereof, that the rents, royalties, fees, rates and charges for the services rendered by the System shall be fixed and revised from time to time so as to be sufficient to provide for payment of interest upon all Bonds and to create a Sinking Fund to pay the principal thereof when due, and to provide for the operation and maintenance of the System, and an adequate depreciation account; and it is expressly declared that the rates and charges herein set forth are minimal only, and that they will be increased, if increases should be required at any time, or from time to time, to comply with the requirements set forth in said Statutes and in said Bond-authorizing Ordinance.

**Section 9. Severability.** If any section of this Ordinance shall be held void, the other sections are intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.



**Section 10. Repeal of Conflicting Legislation.** All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, but only to the extent of such conflict, it being the intent of the City to continue such legislation in effect except as modified hereby. No ordinance heretofore enacted relating to mandatory connection to sewers is repealed, but this Ordinance shall be deemed supplemental thereto.

**Section 11.** This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption, approval, and publication as provided by law.

KENTUCKY, at a meeting held on June 7, 1978, on the same occasion signed in open session by the Mayor as evidence of his approval, attested under seal by the City Clerk, ordered to be published

as provided by law, and declared to be in full force and effect from and after such publication.

# Pay Periods May Change For Teachers

Teachers and other state employees may start getting paid twice a month instead of once a month effective July 1, if a strict interpretation of a new law is given to the Director of Labor Standards, Jerry Hammond in Frankfort.

There is apparently some confusion in implementing the new Wage and Hour law passed by the recent legislature, according to Hammond.

"The key phrase is — 'all employers doing business in Kentucky' — that is what needs to be interpreted," Hammond said. "We don't know if that means school system or if it applies to state government."

Rowan County Superintendent of Schools John Brock said his accounting system would go ahead and pay twice a month beginning July 1.

Nearly all school systems in the state and many state employees now get paid once a month.

In the meantime, Hammond said his department will ask for an in-

terpretation of the new law, as to whether it is meant to include school districts and even state government.

The event, sponsored by the Wilderness Road Girl Scout Council, will feature workshops in stillchery and design, guitar, and native crafts.

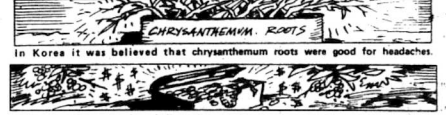

## Inspection Bureau To Be Closed Down

The repeal of Kentucky's motor vehicle inspection law by the 1978 General Assembly will eliminate the state Bureau of Vehicle Regulation's Division of Inspections, Transportation Secretary Calvin G. Grayson announced today.

Grayson said the division will be closed out on June 15, two days before the effective date of House Bill 332, which ends the 10-year-old inspection program.

The program has been funded totally by inspection sticker sales and permit fees, said Grayson. That income stopped almost two months ago, he said, and the program's remaining

funds have been used to reimburse inspection stations for leftover stickers and half of this year's \$25 permit fee.

Commissioner of Vehicle Regulation O.B. Arnold said vehicle inspection makes up about 75 percent of the division's activities. The remaining duties — licensing of motor vehicle dealers, salesmen and manufacturers

will be transferred to the Bureau's Division of Motor Carriers, he said.

Arnold said that about 10 of the inspection Division's 37 employees will be retained by Motor Carriers. The others face layoffs if they haven't been offered other employment in the department by the 15th.

## Some State Job Markets Improving

FRANKFORT, KY. (UPI) — Louisville and Lexington are now reporting record or near record employment levels as the state continues to shake off the effects of the nationwide coal strike and harsh winter weather.

The two largest metropolitan areas reported a record number of people employed during the month of April, according to the Kentucky Department for Manpower Services.

In Louisville, employment was pegged at \$25,000, bettering the record of 384,300 set last November. Lexington recorded 158,000 persons with jobs, which compares to about 147,000 one year ago.

Robert MacDonald, chief labor market analyst for the state, said the number of people holding jobs signals a trend of more jobs being available in the larger markets in the state.

"We have found that this trend is covering all sectors of the economy," MacDonald said in an interview. "Manufacturing, non-manufacturing and agricultural industries are all reporting increased numbers of persons employed."

The number of salaried workers in Kentucky is up 80,700 over the figures for the first third of 1977, MacDonald added.

The figures carry over to the unemployment rate for the two cities for the month of April.

David Diersing of the manpower services department in Louisville reported an unemployment rate in the Louisville area dipped to 4 percent of the work force in March, down from 4.6 percent in March.

"We think the trend is going to continue," Diersing said in an interview.

"All economic signs are good for more people to continue to be employed in the city as we shake off the affects of the winter and the coal strike," he said. In Lexington, the unemployment rate was at only 2.8 percent in April, the lowest in months and a marked improvement from the 3.7 percent figure in March.

The state's overall employment rate, released late last month, was at 4.1 percent, a sharp drop from the 5.4 percent level recorded in March at the end of the UMW strike.

"In March, we were still getting some of the affects from the United Mine Workers strike and the bad winter weather," MacDonald noted. "We appear to have broken loose from that."

For the next two months, MacDonald and Diersing see continued economic growth with many people employed and lower unemployment. The figures should stabilize later in the summer, barring any other unusual work stoppages or weather problems.

"We see a continuation of some fairly nice gains in employment as the summer comes around," Diersing said. "The outlook for more people being employed looks good."

## National Teacher Examinations Slated At MSU

Prospective teachers planning to take the National Teacher Examinations have less than two weeks to register for the tests.

According to Dr. Stephen Taylor, director of MSU's Testing Center, registration forms must be mailed to the Educational Testing Service before June 22. There will be no registration the day of the tests.

"Registrants will receive an admission ticket and notification of the location of the center at which to report," Taylor said.

During the one-day session, a registrant may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in professional and general education, and designed to test knowledge of particular subject matter and teaching methods.

#### CHAPTER LXV SINCERITY

Dale Carnegie's book, *How to Win Friends and Influence People*, is filled with practical how-to-do-it examples. He supplies "Six Ways to Make People Like You," "Twelve Ways to Win People to Your Way of Thinking," "Nine Ways to Change People Without Giving Offense or Arousing Resentment," and "Seven Rules for Making Your Home Life Happier." Maybe, as a minister suggested, "Carnegie puts too much emphasis upon doing things for other people for what you can get out of it myself," but in his book he also stresses sincerity. He argues, for example, that "flattery seldom works with discerning people. It is shallow, selfish, and insincere. It ought to fail and it usually does."

He tells the story of when he was waiting in line to register a letter at a post office. Noticing that the clerk was bored, he tried to cheer the fellow up. While his envelope was being weighed, he remarked, "I certainly wish I had your head of hair." The clerk looked up, half started, his face beaming with smiles... He was immensely pleased. I'll bet that chap went out to lunch that day walking on air. I'll bet he went home that night and told his wife about it. I'll bet he looked in the mirror and said: "It is a beautiful head of hair..." If we are so contemptibly selfish that we can't radiate a little happiness and pass on a bit of honest appreciation without trying to get something out of the other person in return — if our souls are no bigger than our scrub apples, we shall meet with the failure we so richly deserve.

Abraham Lincoln, in a way that made his sincerity apparent, wrote a personal note to General Grant:

My dear General:

I do not remember that you and I ever met personally. I write this now as a grateful acknowledgment for the almost inestimable service you have done the Country. I wish to say a word further. When you first reached the vicinity of Picksburg, I thought you should do what you finally did — march the troops across the neck, run the batteries with the transports, and thus go below; and I never had any faith except a general hope that you knew better than I, that the Yazoo Pass expedition and the like could succeed. When you got below and took Fort Gibson, Grand Gulf and the vicinity, I thought you should go down the river and join General Banks, and when you turned Northward, east of the Big Black, I feared it was a mistake. I now wish to make the personal acknowledgment that you were right and I was wrong.

Very truly yours,

A. Lincoln.

Lincoln was gaunt, ungainly, and ugly. He did not pretend to be anything else. The people that you like best also live without pretense. They are not the name droppers, the social climbers, and the braggarts. Jesus also liked people who were frank and candid. He was repelled, as you are, by those who are not sincere. His worst epithet was, "Thou hypocrite!" He ridiculed those who sounded a trumpet before giving alms that they might be seen and "that they may have glory of men." They did not serve for the joy of serving but for praise. They were not motivated by humility, empathy, and love. They were glorifying themselves. Take heed that you do not your righteousness "before men, to be seen of them," Jesus warned. A good deed might be spoiled by an insincere motive. "When thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth," He said. In the sermon on the Mount, He spoke prophetically of those who are humble, merciful, and sincere:

"How happy are the humble-minded, for the kingdom of Heaven is theirs!"

"How happy are those who know what sorrow means, for they will be given courage and comfort!"

"Happy are those who claim nothing, for the whole earth will belong to them!"

"Happy are those who are hungry and thirsty for goodness, for they will be fully satisfied!"

"Happy are the merciful, for they will have mercy shown to them!"

"Happy are the utterly sincere, for they will see God!"

"Happy are those who make peace, for they will be known as sons of God!"

"Happy are those who have sufficient persecution for the cause of goodness, for the kingdom of Heaven is theirs!"

### Says Farm Bureau VP...

## Loose Leaf Burley A Virtual Certainty

A looseleaf burley program will become a reality in Kentucky within the next three years, it was the opinion of Farm Bureau spokesman at a Press Seminar held in Morehead Thursday night.

"We experienced the same thing in Virginia 12 to 15 years ago," guest speaker Robert Delanyo, Vice-president, American Farm Bureau said. "Everybody was against looseleaf flue cured tobacco, even some of the farmers, until we tried it. Then almost everybody liked it."

Delanyo said he thought it was only a matter of time before the entire burley belt had a loose leaf program.

Delanyo's comments came on the heels of an announcement of a meeting in Washington between burley representatives and Secretary of Agriculture Bob Berglund at which "quite a bit" of progress was made toward an experimental program in Kentucky this year.

"We have been able to get almost unanimous agreement between burley factions of a five percent experimental program and that's what we're trying to sell to Berglund," Ky. Farm Bureau President Boo Wade said.

Wade said if Berglund agrees, farmers would be by their own choice, be able to try tying bundles with up to five percent of their crop this year.

Wade said the loose leaf method would save farmers between six and seven percent on costs, which would be almost entirely a savings on labor.

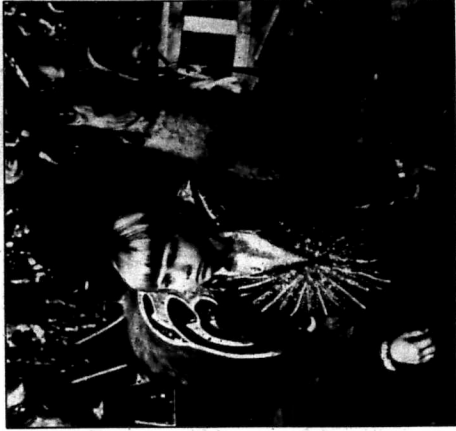

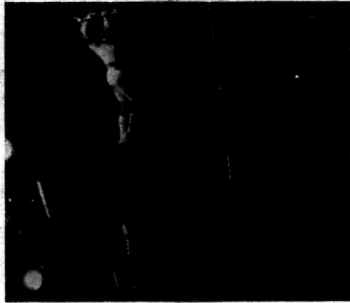

## Sloane Stumps For Votes

MIDDLESBORO, Ky. (UPI) — More coal severance tax funds should be returned to eastern Kentucky counties to provide for economic development according to gubernatorial hopeful Harvey Sloane.

The coal boom isn't a bonanza that's going to continue forever, Sloane said. "It's a natural resource that's being depleted and a significant portion of the severance taxes should be used to promote economic development in eastern Kentucky."

The former Louisville mayor said he plans a year of non-stop campaigning throughout Kentucky including a 1,000-mile walk before the May 1979 Democratic primary election.

Sloane also said he would encourage implementation of the federal strip mine law. "In order to do this, we can't have anybody exercising discretion about enforcement and non-enforcement. If we don't enforce the law, the federal government is going to take it away from the state."

Sloane, a former public health physician in eastern Kentucky, said he would try to increase the availability of health care in the region. "Not enough students in eastern Kentucky, think of medicine as a possible career and we need to encourage more young people from the region in this direction."
