The agent attended a meeting at Salt Lick last Saturday at which plans were drafted for a strawberry marketing cooperative association, for Fleming, Menifee, Bath and Rowan counties.

W. W. McGill, Extension Horticulture Specialist, was present and told of the possibility of the strawberry industry in these Eastern Kentucky counties. Mr. McGill thinks that, with the small

acres of tobacco in these counties, that strawberries have a good place and that it will be possible for farmers in these counties to add considerably to their income with small acreages of strawberries.

He said that strawberries would have a cash return equal to, or exceeding that of tobacco. Another meeting will be held during the latter part of August for everyone who is interested in growing strawberries. Anyone desiring information should let me know or watch the paper for the time and place of the next meeting.

## Compromise 75 Cent Wage Bill Sought

House Administration Leaders Have Agreed To New Proposal

House Administration leaders have agreed to a compromise 75-cent minimum-wage bill that would bring about 600,000 new workers under the Wage-Hour Act. The measure was worked out in cooperation with "moderate" Southern Democrats and was introduced Tuesday. It was approved by Administration Democrats on the House Labor Committee at a caucus last Thursday. The legislation, which will carry the name of Chairman Leiniski (D-Mich.) is intended

to dull Republican and Southern Democratic opposition to raising the minimum. It will be brought to the House floor August 6. The 1948 Democratic platform called for an increase from 40 to 75 cents an hour, and pledged the party to extend coverage to millions of workers now exempt.

In March the House Labor Committee reported favorably a bill calling for 75 cents and bringing an estimated 5,000,000 new workers under the Wage-Hour Act—the bulk in retail and semi-agricultural trades.

Republicans and Southern Democrats promptly rallied behind a substitute by Rep. Lucas (D-Texas) that would raise the minimum to 65 cents for the balance of this year and then permit it to slide up and down annually with the Labor Department's cost of living index. But at no time could it go below 50 cents an hour.

Administration leaders, conceding that they could not lick the Lucas bill with this measure, now have worked out the

compromise. Principal features are: 1. Inclusion of seamen under the wage provisions. 2. Inclusion of maintenance workers for air lines and motor carriers under the maximum-hours provision. 3. Elimination of sawmills employing fewer than 12 persons. This principally would affect mills in the South. The Congress of Industrial Organization's propose mean-

while that unemployed workers be given jobless pay equal to 85 per cent of their regular earnings as a means of stimulating purchasing power and restoring full employment. The plan was suggested in the CIO's monthly Economic Outlook. Under current state unemployment compensation programs, jobless pay averages about \$25 a week up to \$5 weekly.

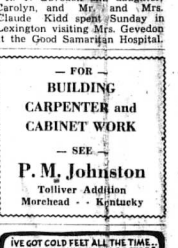
