**CIVIL DEFENSE**

**Small Communities Will Care For Evacuees Of Bombed City**

 (This is the second in a series of five articles on the all-important subject of civil defense.)

If you were one of those directly beneath the explosion of an atomic bomb over your home tonight, there would be practically no hope of your survival. Even if you lived anywhere within a half-mile of the center of the explosion, your chances of living to tell the tale would be about one in ten. From a half-mile to a mile away, you would have about a 50-50 chance, and farther away than that your chances would be pretty good that you would be able to help your less fortunate neighbors.

And of course within these areas your chances of injury would be even greater. But your chances of recovery from radioactivity or other injuries would be good.

And if you have a few minutes warning of an impending air raid, the chances are vastly improved. What should you do, even if you have only a few seconds warning? The first thing to remember is to fall flat on your face. If you have time to park a spot to fall, choose first to flatten out against a cellar wall, or even an inside wall, or beneath a sturdy table or bench. Or if you are outside, drop beside the base of a building, or fall into a ditch or gutter. And when you fall, cover your face in the crook of your arm, and cover any exposed skin with whatever is handy and hold it for several seconds after the explosion to prevent flash burns.

To you folks in the home towns of the nation and in the rural areas there is little danger of a direct atomic bomb overhead for the enemy would most certainly aim at one or more of some 16 strategic target areas in large cities and industrial areas. But your neighbors in your nearest large city might suffer, as follows:

A surprise daylight attack on an average city would produce about 120,000 casualties. Of this total, approximately 40,000 would be killed outright or die the first day. An additional 20,000 would die in the following five or six weeks. Of the 80,000 remainder, about 43,000 might be suffering from burns, 40,000 from mechanical injuries and 16,000 from radiation injuries. This total of over 100 per cent arises from the fact that a large number of casualties would be suffering from two or more types of injuries. To top this staggering total, there follows the complex and difficult job of evacuation, either after the bomb drop, or of course, if there is warning, preferably before the drop.

And here is where folks in strictly rural communities and the small towns of the country can play a tremendously important role in their state's civil defense set-up. If your town and your county is chosen as an evacuation site, plans may be

made beforehand to care for several thousands or even a million or more evacuees from a stricken city in the following order:

1. School age children.
2. Children under six years, accompanied by mothers or escorts.
3. Pregnant women.
4. The aged, infirm.
5. Inmates of institutions, hospitals, homes and state or county institutions.
6. All others except those serving in essential capacities such as

industry. Your town or your county must be organized to care for these people to help provide transportation, health service, sanitation, police, fire protection, water supply, food, housing, hospitalization, morgue services and a dozen other essentials, including welfare service.

Your state civilian defense administration and his entire staff running down into the cities, towns and counties, should be trained to meet every contingency of such a catastrophe. This requires weeks and months of organizational work and intense planning and entails the draft or volunteer of thousands of individuals, both men and women, who should be trained and educated, simply, as Gov. Millard Caldwell, director of the national civilian defense administration said; to save their own lives and

to assist in saving the lives of their neighbors.

Here are a few musts in preparing your house after an air raid warning:  
 Don't let trash pile up; shut doors, windows and pull down blinds; throw your electric switch; if you can burn coal, close draft doors; keep a flashlight handy; don't light a match; have a radio, first-aid equipment and a supply of canned goods; don't eat open food; don't rush outside after a bombing; drink only bottled liquid; don't start rumors and use the telephone only for emergency.

There is little danger of radioactive clouds after the first two minutes after the bomb burst.

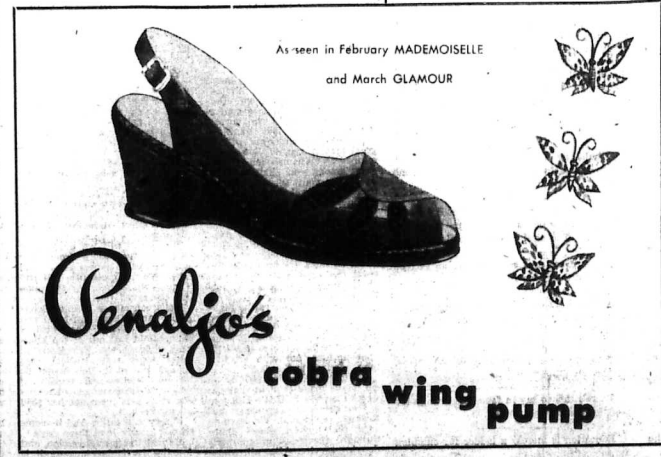
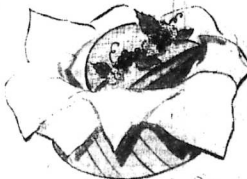

### Executive Committee Of Club Holds Meet

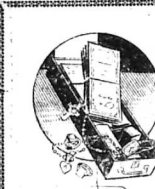

**Heart Fund Campaign Is Extended**

**Bad Weather Stopped Activity For A While**

Because Kentucky's worst blizzards in years inflicted a 10-day "freeze" on volunteer activity for the 1951 Heart Fund campaign, the drive is being extended until March 10. W. Farrell Curran, State campaign chairman, announced.  
The Kentucky Heart Association's board of directors made the decision following reports about weather hardships in numerous Kentucky communities.  
"Snow and ice conditions in many places were even worse than they were in Louisville," Curran said, "and they were really bad here."  
He said women's groups who undertook to distribute the red plastic heart money receptacles to stores and other prominent places simply were "frozen in." Driving, parking or walking, especially in the near-zero weather, were nearly impossible, he pointed out.  
Window display posters remained in shortage and radio announcements about the campaign left interested persons looking in vain for the plastic hearts. In addition, so many people were concerned with personal problems directly involving the weather that little thought was given to the campaign.  
"We know there are thousands of people who want to contribute to the campaign," Curran said, "and who might drop the idea after February 28, our original closing date. The extension and the promise of better weather will give us a hope-for break."  
Contributions may also be mailed in, he pointed out, addressed simply "Heart, care, postmaster." Kentucky's goal in the drive is \$200,000. The funds go for research, health, education and community heart projects.

**Gabbard Speaks At Baird Service In Berea**

The Trail Blazer prints here an excerpt from the funeral remarks made by Dr. Elmer E. Gabbard of Witherspoon College, Buckhite, Ky. Dr. Gabbard spoke at the service which was held in Berea for Morehead's late president, Dr. William Jesse Baird.  
"Sorrow brings friends and loved ones together. Regardless of distance or difficulties, we want to be with those whom we love when they need us. The G.I. who faces death to go to his wounded comrade, feels repaid a thousand times when his friend recognizes him and whispers, 'I knew you would come.'"  
"When Mrs. Gabbard and I came to Berea in 1943 to bury our son, Jesse Baird was one of the friends who met and helped us on that occasion. Hundreds of miners can recall his smiling ministries of helpfulness in times of need."

"Our friend's warm and genial soul drew people to him and his friends are legion. Some of these friends are here this afternoon. Countless others would be here if they could. And all of us are bound together by a deep sense of our common sorrow and loss."  
"There is the loss—a very great loss—to the institution of which he was President. To Morehead State College he was giving devoted and capable leadership. He had taken to his heart the upheaval from which the school was suffering and quietly but surely the process of healing and recovery is underway."

"A greater loss, perhaps, will be his absence from the wider circles of the Commonwealth where his influence and leadership were increasingly valuable. With unusual understanding of the problems involved in the whole realm of education from the one-room school of the remote mountains to the university, his counsel was invaluable to the state and to the nation."

"Sorrow brings loved ones together. And sorrow brings us to God. Here today we join our sorrowing friends and loved ones in prayer. When my heart is overwhelmed, lead me to the Rock that is higher than I. I can ill spare a man like Wm. Jesse Baird, Morehead, Berea, Kentucky, Christian civilization suffer irreparable loss in his passing. But in our hour of loss we are not like Naomi who returned from Moab bewailing the loss of her loved ones. 'Call me not Naomi,' she said, 'but call me Marah, for the Lord hath dealt bitterly with me.'"

"Every thought of Dean Baird calls for gratitude to God for the ministry of his rich and varied life. His triumphant and dynamic soul will live on in that great company of God's servants, who seen and unseen make up the invincible hosts of the immortal. We join together, therefore, in rendering here this afternoon our thanksgiving to Almighty God for all that this dear man has meant to us as a friend, a companion, a comforter in the great cause to which he gave such valiant service."

**GI's May Get Free Insurance**

Senate leaders are hoping to win quick approval of a bill to give \$10,000 worth of cost-free government insurance to every person in the armed services.

## Harry May Be Considering Old Seat in Senate

The White House is keeping silent this week reports that President Truman may run for his old Senate seat when his term expires Jan. 20, 1953.

But Attorney General McGrath is skeptical.

Emerging from a cabinet meeting at the White House, McGrath was told of the reports circulating on Capitol Hill.

"Would you say that?" a reporter asked.

McGrath smiled. "No," he

said, and walked away.

White House Press Secretary Joseph Short said he had no comment.

However, old friends of Mr. Truman in Congress said he is seriously considering a return to the Senate where he spent 10 happy years. One Congress member, who declines to be quoted by name, put it this way:

"If Harry Truman does what he really wants to do, he will run against Senator Ken (Mo.) in the 1952 election. He really loves the Senate."

Wetherby said his proposal would provide a "moderate increase" in pay and may keep many teachers in the profession.

The 1950 Legislature appropriated \$20,212,500 for teacher salaries and \$4,287,500 to the equalization fund for the coming school year. The fund provides extra help for poorer school districts.

Wetherby said extra aid to education, welfare and public assistance and the placing of government workers under social security benefits "are the only which demand emergency attention."

A special legislative session is limited to subjects the governor puts in his call.

There had been special session talk when Wetherby first took office but it died down quickly. Reporters surmised something

was up when state officials began going to the governor's office. But these officials brushed off reporters' queries.

Kentucky's last special session was in March, 1949, when Clements called for revamping of property assessment laws and a tightening of qualifications to participate in the school equalization fund.

nation, then there is no other choice for me to make."

The first Congress I was in, in addition to my other duties, chairman of the District of Columbia Subcommittee on Appropriations.

"But, now my work with the Appropriations Committee has been more than trebled as the world crisis has imposed many additional places on the Congress. I have been placed on two other Appropriations sub-committees. These committees allocate all funds for the defense and preparedness program, with the exception of that granted directly to the military. All appropriations for European Recovery, National Production Authority and other defense agencies are cleared through these committees."

"I also made this statement at Louisville: 'It is my hope that these rapidly changing times and crisis facing our country and all the freedom loving nations of the world will have subsided sufficiently so they will not interfere with this announced intention of my candidacy for the Governorship.'"

"It is my belief that some progress has been made toward achieving peace, but we must all recognize the world picture continues dark and there appears little hope that the threatening war clouds of possible global conflict will dissipate in the foreseeable future—certainly not by the time of this year's primary election in Kentucky."

"This is no time for any member of Congress or any person holding a position of trust in the national government to place his personal aspirations before service to his country."

"It would be unfair to the many Kentuckians who have pledged me their support in conducting the vigorous campaign that I anticipated, if I did not clearly my intentions as speedily as possible. For this reason I am issuing this statement at this time."

"Believing I should continue to render service from the national level during these trying times, I have decided not to become a candidate for the Governorship of Kentucky. I reiterate my gratitude to the great number of Kentuckians who share in my thinking and my philosophy of government who pledged their support if I became a candidate."
