**Johnson Homemakers Nominate Their
Mrs. Sam Litton, Route 1, For 1951 Title**

The mother of three children, she is the nominee of the Johnson Homemakers Club.

**Has Been Active
In Civic Work
For Many Years**

To the people who are active in promoting a better standard of living in the rural sections of Rowan County, the nomination of Mrs. Sam (Stella) Litton as Master Homemaker of 1951 is not surprising for her name has been synonymous with farm and home organizations for a great many years.

The Johnson Homemaker Club nominated Mrs. Litton. She is one of the 11 progressive Rowan County women that are vying for the title this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Litton, parents of three children, live on a 115 acre farm five miles from Morehead on the Flemingsburg Road. Their children are Sam, Jr., who is also a farmer on the Flemingsburg Road; Mrs. Opal Stias of Morehead, and Mrs. Lucille DeHart, Morehead.

On the 115-acre farm, Mr. and Mrs. Litton have a herd of 25 Holstein cows and a modern dairy barn. They sell Grade A milk. Mr. Litton was awarded first prize in the county in the Green Pasture program and won the Corn Derby in 1948 and again in 1950.

They have made a long time program of home improvements. The most recent improvement has been in the kitchen. Mrs. Litton has built-in cabinets, installed in a U-shaped kitchen which has island linoleum. They have their own gas on the farm, which they use in the refrigerator, kitchen range and hot heat. They plan to install a bath room and recreation area with a built-in back porch for laundry and canning. N. R. Elliott from the University of Kentucky and H. C. Hagan of Morehead State College helped make plans for the landscaping of the lawn and entrance, much of which has already been done by putting new shrubbery around the house, removing all trees and making a drive-way.

Mrs. Litton is a charter member of the Homemakers Club in her community and has held office of president for the past two years. She was Rowan County's first president and project leader for three years. She was the first 4-H leader when her own children were of club age and recently served again as project leader in the Johnson 4-H Club. This spring she was enrolled in the Home Nursing course at Morehead College.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Litton and their children are active in the Johnson Church of God in their community, assisting in building the new church. Mrs. Litton is county chairman of Southern States Women's Board and community chairman of Associated Farm Bureau Women.

In checking the improvements Mrs. Litton has made as a result of the Homemaker Club, you will find many in the Home Furnishing program, she put into use all of the lessons, refinishing her hall and floor, selecting wall paper, arranging furniture, arranging pictures and window treatment. She also has wired some beautiful oil oil lamps. Last year, she completed her program in clothing following all the recommendations on her lesson sheet and was one of the women in the annual style show. She has also appeared on Radio Station WFTM.

When it comes to county fairs the Littons carry away many prizes. Mrs. Litton has beautiful canned foods, can make excellent cookies and cakes and almost anything there is to home making. Her picture has appeared recently in the News, using the Rowan County community center.

It is significant that the names of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Litton are connected with practically every farm organization and rural improvement program in Rowan County. They are willing and efficient workers and have shown a remarkable spirit of cooperative enterprise.

Seventy-four Kentucky children under 15 years of age were killed and 1,250 were injured in motor vehicle accidents last year.

Guthrie Crowe, commissioner of state police, cited the figures this week in urging motorists to be more child-conscious now that most schools in the state have re-opened.

National figures for 1950 show 3,900 children killed and 165,000 injured.

Crowe said that special caution should be taken in school zones and at school bus stops. Stop

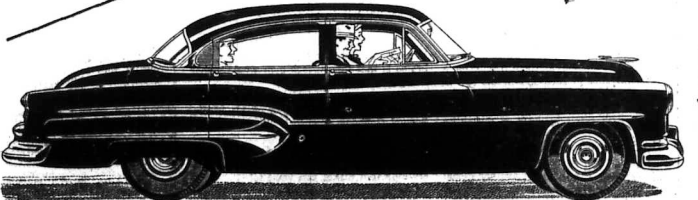

Soldier Who Lost Legs And All But One Finger Marries 18 Year Old Illinois Girl

Was Second Quadruple American Amputee In Korean War

Pvt. Hubert Reeves, who lost both his legs and all but one of his fingers in Korean combat, married pretty Beverly Jean Hall in the First Baptist Church at Joliet, Ill., Saturday.

Reeves sat in a wheelchair beside his 18-year-old bride as the Rev. Ralph Blatt read the serv-

ice joining them as man and wife. And his best man slipped the ring on the bride's finger. Reeves became the second quadruple amputee of the Korean war, after suffering severe frostbite in combat.

The nation, along with Reeves' home community, showed their gratitude on his day of days.

Hundreds of well-wishers thronged in the church for the 4 p. m. services and waited to pet them with rice as they emerged. The Cantigny post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars threw a big public reception for the couple later in the afternoon, to be followed by a dinner party at the Hotel Louis Joliet sponsored by radio's "Welcome Traveler" show.

The newlyweds were showered with gifts. Welcome Travelers gave them virtually complete furnishings for their home and an all-expense free honeymoon to any place they choose.

The honeymoon probably will be delayed, however, as Reeves still must undergo treatment at Valley Forge (Pa.) hospital. Comedian Eddie Cantor dedicated his first television show of the new season Saturday evening to the young hero and his bride, who planned to stop off at the home of his mother, Mrs. Hubert Reeves, Sr., to watch the show before going on to the dinner party.

Cantor sent them a TV set as a personal wedding present and other members of his cast sent a sterling silver dinner service.

Reeves' brother, David, served as best man at the ceremony and the bride's sister, Mrs. Edith Shipley of Mason, Ill., was matron of honor. Bridesmaids included Reeves' sisters, Louise and Dorothy; David Reeves' sister, Mrs. Maria Cohen, the bride's closest friend. The head usher was another hero of the Korean War—Pvt. Wallace Smith of Lyndonville,

N. Y., whom Reeves met and buddies up with at military hospitals.

Reeves was serving as a sniper with the Seventh Infantry Division in Korea when he was wounded less than a month after going into action. He was loaded in a truck with other casualties to be returned to a rear area when the truck was ambushed by enemy.

The Reds killed all the men in the truck. Reeves played possum and lay in bitterly cold weather for 24 hours before he was rescued. He suffered frost bite that necessitated removal of his feet and nine of his fingers.

It was while he was in the hospital, recuperating, that he became acquainted with Beverly, whom he never had met previously although her hometown, Wilmington, is only a few miles from Joliet.

A letter she wrote was one of the thousands sent to him by citizens, offering encouragement.

Reeves' mother read him Beverly's letter along with the others. "It was different from most of them," he said. "It wasn't gushy and didn't make me feel sorry for myself. She just said she wanted to thank me and the other guys in Korea for what we did and didn't mention what had happened to me."

Reeves kept the letter. And the next day he had his brother drive him over to Wilmington to meet her. More letters and visits

Tobacco, Cows, Chickens Are Good Combination For Small Farms To Earn Cash Profits

Spray Program May Make That Orchard Lucrative To Farmers

By Adrian M. Razor (Rowan County Agent) Growing tobacco and milking cows or raising chickens are about the best combination for small farmers, according to the study recently made by the University of Kentucky of small farms containing less than 40 acres of cropland.

The fact they could do practically all of their own work was considered an advantage held by the small farmers. With the help of a member of the family they grew tobacco, milked cows and raised poultry. Many of them exchanged their harvesting tobacco and hay.

Another advantage is the small investment in land and equipment. Small farms furnish opportunity for young families with a relatively small amount of capital to get started as farm owners without incurring an excessive debt burden, it was found. Dairying on a small scale, milking 3 to 6 cows, was the most profitable enterprise combination with tobacco. For such farms, practically all feed for the dairy stock except protein supplement was produced on the farm. Egg production from 200-500 hens was next to dairying.

Spray Program Turns Home Orchard Into Cash Crop

Anyone visiting the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Barnett, at the top of the Cold Spring Hill off Crispy Creek, will probably be taken first to the apple orchard which lies to the right of the house. Leslie has an excellent crop of apples this year on four trees, many of which he has grafted himself. He showed me four trees from which he picked 15 bushels of apples and sold on the local market and he said that they were not nearly enough to meet the demand at the time he brought them in. Leslie has been following a recommended spray program and although he did not get all the sprays on, he got good control with the main spray he used. Two trees did not receive the spray that the others received, and Leslie questioned me to tell the visitor that these trees were not sprayed because the apples on these trees are faulty and are dropping.

Mr. and Mrs. Barnett say that they cannot use all the apples in their orchard and as a result they will have an additional cash crop this year from their home orchard.

Kenland Clover Continues To Gain Local Favor

A number of farmers in Rowan County this year have seeded Kenland red clover for the first time. Harlan Fuller, who lives in the Poplar Grove section, says the Kenland red clover field he seeded is far superior to any clover he has grown for hay. This variety which has outyielded all other varieties in tests and which is considerably longer lived than the other varieties, promises to be a great improvement in Kentucky's hay crops.

(Continued From Page One) per acre and apply 1,000 pounds of 3-12-12 fertilizer and 1,000 pounds of phosphate per acre. He plans to seed the field to rescue and ladino. With such treatment as this, farmers will not experience many seed failures. Neither will they be bothered with broome sage and weeds taking over the stand, which in the past has made it necessary to re-establish most pastures after a few years.
