Kentucky At Bottom In Its Protection Of Forests

The best proof of the effectiveness of for-est protection and the dividends this pays is contained in a report issued this month by the American Forest Products Industries with offices at 1318 Eighteenth Street, NW, Wash-ington, D. C.

Quoting from the pamphlett "Almost nineenths (889 percent) of U. S. forest land is
under protection ..., more than three-fourths
of the nation's 1980 førest fire losses occurred
on the 10 percent of its lands still without organized protection. Only two-thirds of one
percent of the country's protected forest area
was burned last year. On the other hand, 177, percent
of its unprotected woodlands was
swept by fre."

The report discloses that Kentucky has
made some progress, from a state level, in
forest fire protection but that over half of its
total forest land remains unprotected of
Kentucky's 11,818,000 acres of forest land, the
federal government protects 565,000 geres
(mostly in the Cumberland National Forest)
while state and private lands protected
amounted to 4,603,000 acres. This leaves 6,605,000 acres unprotected. It should be bore
in mind, at this point, that although 60 persent of Kentucky forest land is unprotected. in mind, at this point, that although 60 per cent of Kentucky forest land is unprotected. the nation average is only 10 percent

The report is even more shameful for Ken-tucky in that this state and Oklahoma are the only two of the 48 in which more than 50 per-cent of the forest land remains unprotected

only two of the 48 in which more than 50 percent of the forest land remains unprotected. Purther, Kentucky is below Oklahoma, making our state last in this respect.

Through a special tax of one cent an acre Kentucky is expanding its forest fire protection. This tax is levied by the Fiscal Courts and is optional to each county. Unfortunately, many Fiscal Courts have not voted the levy, many Fiscal Courts have not voted the levy, many Fiscal Courts have not voted the levy and though it is apparent this benefits forest land owners many times over the cost. It is difficult to comprehend why any county would fall to join the state department of forsety in providing this fire protection.

The owner of 500 acres of forest land pasy, under the plan offered Fiscal Courts, \$5.00 (one cent an acre) each year. In 20 years he will have pain \$100. This appears very small ompared to the money that is realized from \$500 acre tax of timber. Without this fire retection all of his \$500 acres could easily be wiped out in one fire.

According to the American Forest Products Industries report the chances of this \$600 acres could easily be wiped out in one fire.

There is much to be done before they will possess the wealth with which to make these things available to their people on a scale comparable to such use in the U. S. Here is a field of labor sufficient to engage the thought and attention of statesmen for centuries, with resulting profit to the entire

The Public's Money Should Be Segregated

An example of the laxity in Kentucky's An example of the laxity in Kentucky's laws and enforcement is exemplified in the case of the county court clerk of Mason'County where auditors found him over \$14,600 short. The bonding company is being forced to pay \$10,000 of the shortage, maximum amount covered in their policy, while the clerk, according to Revenue Commissioner Clyde Reven, has made arrangements to pay Reeves, has made arrangements to pay the balance to the state treasury.

But, it appears there will be no criminal prosecution. Judging by the manner in which the audits of county officials has been conducted in the past, we doubt if the Mason clerk has done anything more than a great number of other Kentucky county officials have, except that in his case the shortage was larger.

It is the rule, rather than the exception, for county clerks and other county officials in Kentucky, to carry public funds in private banking accounts or in their pockets. Personal checks generally accompany their reports to the state capital.

This is a bad practice—one that the Federal government or a private business would not tolerate It is, within itself, temptation to not tolerate It is, within itself, temptation to officials handling public funds. It is probable that if a closer check was kept and officials required to have on hand and segregate public funds the shortage at Maysville would not have developed.

If the clerk of Mason County is criminally

If the clerk of Mason County is criminally liable then it is probable that hundreds of other county officials are technically guilty of the same crime. Only difference is that, in other cases, the officials cough up the money while the Mason clerk was in so far he could not produce this amount when auditors discovered the shortage.

The above should not be construed to mean that all county officials handle public funds as if they were their own, because many do carry separate bank accounts and keep careful and accurate records of all receipts and money on hand. But, general laxity in the handling and paying over to the state of such funds is evident and leads to sordid circumstances as now surround the clerk's office crumstances as now surround the clerk's office crimstances as now surround the clerk's office. cumstances as now surround the clerk's office in Mason County.

Depression Postponed By The Preparedness Program

After practically every major war in which this country has been engaged, there has occurred a serious business depression, with heavy losses in money, productivity and standard of living.

War II. This is a fair question because the answer will affect not only the business men of
the nation but the millions of families which

make up the population of the United States. Several years ago, the writer was somewhat interested in the subject. A survey at that time gave no indication of any sudden deflation. There were factors in operation which did not exist at the end of World War I and, since that time, the Government has put into motion a tremendous defense program which means continued business activity at an above-normal rate. Consequently, there does not seem to be much prospect of a serious depression as long as the defense program is being accelerated.

The arms program, by the way, is going to be much bigger than we thought even a year ago. The peak for arms orders will not occur in 1952, as originally expected, but will more likely come around in 1930 or 1934. The

The defense budget for the current fiscal year is likely to move up from sixty to seventy billion dollars and, while the amount is uncertain at the present time, spending for defense is likely to continue at that rate for two or




