# 1952 Tax Assessment Being Taken

Property Owners Are Urged To Call At R. W. Cline's Office

R. W. Cline, Rowan County tax commissioner, stated today that his office had begun taking information for the 1952 assessment.

The official report for taking the taxpayer's list is January 1 to March 1, Commissioner Cline has requested that these dates be closely observed as the period for preparing the tax rolls for approval by the Department of Revenues and Action by the County Board of Supervisors is very short. For this reason there can be no late additions to the regular roll.

All property is assessable as of January 1, except for land in hand and tobacco in storage which is assessable as of September 1. A property owner who fails to assess his property is subject to a 10 per cent penalty for omission.

Property owners are urged to avoid an undue rush by calling at Commissioner Cline's office at his earliest convenience and listing their property.

A reminder was also issued by Sheriff Chester Lewis that 1951 taxes, now being collected at his office, will be collected at his office January 1, and a 2 per cent penalty will be added if not paid by January 1, the penalty increases to 6 per cent.

# Burley Avg. Sinks To Season Low

Grade Of Leaf Is Poorer As Price Sags To Below \$50

Kentucky's burley tobacco price average headed for a new season's low as it dipped below the \$50 per hundred pound mark in closing sales before the holidays. All markets closed yesterday (Friday).

The State Department of Agriculture said 22 markets handled 1,116,329 pounds for \$5,590,589.4, an average of \$49.48.

Wednesday's revised average of \$50.42 per hundred pounds was a new low for the season, going below the previous low of \$50.74 set Tuesday. The average Wednesday was based on sales of 14,095,457 pounds in 26 markets.

The Federal - State Market News Service reported that the eight-state burley belt market was fairly steady Thursday as compared with Wednesday. Grades sold in heaviest volume brought prices about in line with those of Wednesday.

Averages in some principal markets: Cynthiana \$51.52; Lexington \$49.85; Mayfield \$52.10; Mt. Sterling \$46.30; Winchester \$47.35.

The second plea came from the District State Police office at Morehead which followed a like warning from State Police Commissioner Guthrie Crowe.

It was pointed out that the cold wave, more anticipated snow and ice and present risky road conditions may make this the biggest death toll week in history.

"Don't drive unless absolutely necessary," the warning read, "and if you take the road, do not get behind the wheel of a car for you and others, who are in the car, may never see the New Year."

State Police said extra vigilance will be exercised on the highways during this extremely dangerous period.

# Ky. Motorist To Pay Record Breaking Tax

Louisville Automobile Executive Says Cost Will Be \$97.17

Due to recently enacted federal gasoline tax, the cost of gasoline in Kentucky will be a record \$97.17 by special motorizing taxes next year, Eugene Stuart, Secretary-Manager of the Louisville Club predicted, this week.

The car and truck owner's special tax bill will mean an all-time high because tax rates are now at their peak. Mr. Stuart estimated that the bill in 1952 when the motorist finds how drastically they add to his driving costs.

The cost of gasoline has been the highest in the history of the automobile industry since which the cost of gasoline has been the highest in the history of the automobile industry.

Just the higher federal gasoline tax will mean that Kentucky motorists must pay nine cents in state and federal taxes on every gallon of gasoline they buy, he said. "This equals a forty-three per cent tax on gasoline."

Not only that, but the federal gasoline and automotive excise taxes are not connected with each other as formerly. They are used for the support of general government. These taxes were increased in 1952 to help meet a depression emergency," he said.

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He concluded: "As soon as world conditions clear up, the federal gasoline and automotive excise taxes should be the first to receive decreased and long-overdue tax relief from the federal government."

# Kentucky Behind Other States In REA Installations

Kentucky has made great progress in getting electricity to farms in the last five years, but still lags behind the nation in this field, the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) reports.

REA estimates that 166,667 or 74.4 per cent of all Kentucky farms had electric service on the same date, according to REA figures, 84 per cent of all farms in the nation had electric service.

Back in 1935, REA says, only 8,400 Kentucky farms were served by electric power. This was only three per cent of the total number of farms in the state.

The first REA plan to Kentucky rural co-operative was announced in 1935. The plan was not put in operation until Dec. 24, 1937, some two years later. It was named the Company of Henderson, Ky.

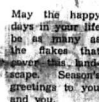

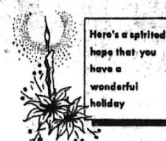

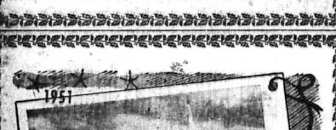

## Naval Reserve Corps May Be Formed Here

Seventeen students have signed up so far as being interested in forming a volunteer naval reserve corps on Morehead's campus, according to Marjorie Palmquist, dean of students, who is corresponding with naval authorities in an attempt to form such a unit.

Both veterans and non-veterans are eligible to apply. Once accepted for the enlisted reserve corps, students may then apply for reserve officer candidate's school. If accepted for this, students are deferred from active duty until graduation from college, and are then commissioned directly as ensigns. As reserve officer candidates, they would go for two summers on six weeks training cruises.

Members of the enlisted naval reserve corps are also eligible for summer training cruises with full pay, and for Navy retirement benefits which come due after a total of 20 years' service.

If a unit is formed on this campus, the groups would meet one evening every other week, for a total of four hours a month.

## Officials Oppose Raise In Truck Load Limit On Kentucky Roads

State-wide protest against any increase in the legal weight limit of highway truck freighters in Kentucky was voiced by three county officials' organizations in their annual conventions at Louisville last week.

The Kentucky Sheriffs' Association, the Kentucky County Judges' Association and the Kentucky County Attorneys' Association each unanimously passed resolutions strongly opposing any increase in Kentucky's present law, which permits a load limit of 2,000 pounds for the highway trailers and semi-trailers.

which, the resolutions stated, "greatly damage our highway and cause inconvenience to the traveling public."

The County Judges' Association resolution stated, in part, that as presiding officers of 120 Fiscal Courts, the judges know "and are greatly interested in the economical construction and maintenance of all public highways" and that "in recent years, particularly in 1950, Kentucky's highways have shown accelerated deterioration due to excessive weights transported by motor trucks and semi-trailer trucks," and urged that "if any change is made by the legislature in the legal weight limit, it be for a decrease rather than an increase" in this.
