Wire Worm Damage May Be Costly

Loss May Be Heavy To Newly Set Tobacco Plants, Agent Warns

(Rowan County Agent)

Wire worm damage is often heavy to newly set tobacco plants. These wire worms are apparently attracted to the plant shortly after it has been set in the field. The control of these insects is a difficult problem. It has been demonstrated that large stocky plants suffer less damage from wire worms than do smaller plants. In fields known to be in-

festes with wire worms the selection of stocky plants is suggested. It may be desirable on many farms to use some of the newer chemicals to control wire worms.

From observation at the Kentucky Station it is apparent that some of the newer organic insecticides are effective for wire worm control. Tests made with two of the newer organic insecticides in setting water to 15-20 showed that chlordane and lindane gave reasonable control of wire worms. Chlordane was used at 10 ounces of a 40 percent wettable powder in 50 gallons of water and is required approximately 10 tanks of water to the acre, or one-half pint of the water to the plant. Lindane was used at the rate of 1 and 2 ounces of the 25 percent wettable powder in 50 gallons of water. The 2-ounce rate required 3 ounces of lindane mixed in 10 tanks to the acre. Lindane in a commercial transplanter solution, used at one-half ounce

Morehead Garage To Participate In Safety Program

The Midland Trail Garage today announced participation in a nationwide automobile safety program sponsored by the Chevrolet Motor Division.
The program launches for the first time in the automobile industry a continuous routine of car checks in order to eliminate defects that might lead to traffic accidents.
"Endorsed by national safety organizations, we feel this is one of the soundest projects of its kind ever undertaken," said W. H. Jayne, "Over the years it will do much to reduce traffic accident rates in the community."
As explained by Mr. Jayne, in the future all passenger cars and trucks entering his establishment for service will be given free 10-point inspection. This examination will cover the mechanical items frequently involved in accidents — tires, steering, brakes, front headlamps, rear headlamps, body, fenders, windshield wiper, rear vision mirror and exhaust system. The owner will then be given a report on the condition of these features.
"The program was inspired by findings that virtually one-third of all cars on the highway are below safety standards," said Mr. Jayne. "In many cases the owners are not aware of the defects in their car and in a great majority only a slight adjustment is necessary to correct the fault."
"Whether or not the car owner decides to authorize repairs in my shop or elsewhere, we will at least bring deficiencies to his attention."

Strawberry Yields Increased By Use Of Fertilizer

A study of the results of four years of top-dressing strawberries with fertilizer can leave little doubt as to the value of the practice, says H. C. Brown, University of Kentucky associate farm agent in Jefferson County. An increase of 108.8 crates of berries per acre resulted when 20 per cent superphosphate was used at the rate of 1,000 pounds to the acre, or 10 pounds per 100 feet of row. Half as much fertilizer an acre resulted in an increase of 49.8 crates.

Results were equally good when 40-20-20, 6-14-14 or 8-12-12 fertilizer was used at rates that give the same amount of phosphate as was obtained from 20 per cent phosphate. However, when 4-8-12, 8-8-8 or other nitrogen-bearing fertilizer was used on fruiting patches, production was lower than when no fertilizer had been applied.
