ORDINANCE

To Regulate Traffic on Certain Streets in the City of Morehead, Kentucky.

Be it ordained by the Board of City Council as follows: Section 1. That the Second Street be a one way street from its intersection with College Blvd.

Section 2. That parking on either side of Second Street at its intersection with Tipton Avenue and that traffic on said street be permitted on the South Side only.

The Atomic Plant Will Bring Both Gold And Vice

In its editorial columns last Thursday, this newspaper reviewed an informal discussion between the publisher, a Kentucky business leader and an elective official holding a high position of trust in the national government.

It was concluded that the billion dollar atomic bomb plant will be located in the Greenup-Lewis counties neighborhood of northern Kentucky or across the river, west of Portsmouth, Ohio. News stories from the national press indicate that the site where the plant will be located, although unannounced by the Atomic Energy Commission may not come for 30 days.

Actually, no one has any real inside information about the plant's location. But the northern Kentucky area across the river and west of Portsmouth, Ohio, is in the vicinity in southern Ohio appear logical for the reasons this newspaper set out: ample supply of water from the Ohio River and nearness to the Big Sandy coal fields... coal and water are requisites in an atomic plant; ample supply of electric power; abundant labor supply and better housing conditions than are available in other communities under consideration; sufficient electric power; desire of the people for the plant; and not of flood territory but still on the river.

If the plant is located in the Portsmouth area a boom, like that at Paducah, is in the offing. Workers will commute as far as 75 miles, land values will jump, and an unprecedented flow of money will come from the huge construction and operation payrolls.

But, as the people of Paducah have learned, many headaches go hand-in-hand with such a boom. The high cost of currency brings gambling, prostitution and other vices that follow the route where the pickings are plentiful and easy. Morals will slip as they have at Paducah and the glitter of gold will blind men that no community desires.

Kentucky's past success results in its present embarrassment. Almost every day we read of some influential citizen or person in the public eye being indicted for income tax evasion. A recent example is that of Fred Saig, president of the St. Louis Cardinals. As everyone knows, only a small percentage of those who are caught, are brought before the criminal courts. In a sense, they are being made examples of.

The above is mentioned as a parallel to the publicity of the past nine months about the University of Kentucky's basketball team. Kentucky is recognized as the national champion of the hardwood sport and Adolph Rupp, with his brown derby, is one of the nation's best known sports figures. In a sense, Kentucky is being made the goat.

We are convinced, however, that things have been going down at Lexington, but we are equally certain they have been magnified, distorted and that Bill Spivey's attorney was probably correct when he said that New York City politicians are trying to run a Governor or Mayor's race on the basketball grounds.

United States Commits A Dangerous Mistake

The United States is playing with dynamite in supporting policies of colonialism which are too often followed by French, British and other European interests. The most serious mistake yet made by the United States in such a matter occurred only recently and involved Tunisia.

Tunisia, like Morocco, wants more home rule under the French. Riots and disorders in that country caused the French to jail a thousand natives and arrest the Tunisian premier. The French, under the Bey of Tunisia name a pro-French cabinet. This course is rather ruthless and old-style colonial discipline.

Thirteen Arab and Asian members of the United Nations asked the Security Council to look into the Tunisian problem. All the countries asked was for an investigation, and not a vote of censure against France. In the Security Council, France opposed the move. Russia favored it and was joined by four other delegates, including Brazil and Chile, much pressure, brought to bear on the United States, caused this country to abstain from voting and this abstention prevented a majority vote in favor of taking up the Tunisian question.

Immediately, the United States was blamed throughout the Arab and Asian worlds for supporting colonialism, which is an unadmitted charge. Secretary of State Brent Acheson explained the U. S. position as one designed to let the French and Tunisia settle their own differences without interference from the United Nations. He said the two countries were already solving the problem and an interference at this time would not be warranted.

The result, however, in the Asian and Arab worlds is to line the United States up with old-style colonialism, which has cost Western Europe so many friends in the last century. It is a dangerous mistake and one that will eventually exploit to the fullest in the coming months.

Anything Can Happen In Next Thirty Years

In a lecture on "Dynamics of Energy Movement," Dr. L. K. Silcock, executive vice president of the New York Airbrake Company, pointed out that the coal industry of the future will be radically different from the industry of today.

By the end of the century he foresees technological improvements that will increase the rate of production at least five times that of the present. He believes that the coal will be crushed, cleaned and sent by pipeline to centers where there are adequate supplies of water. The experimental pipeline of the Philadelphia and Pottsville Coal Company is an indication of what we may expect.

Dr. Silcock expects a world shortage of petroleum in 1960, when the world will need 60 per cent more oil than it produces. At that time, the United States will be producing an estimated one billion barrels as compared to an annual five-billion-barrel output.

Of course, it is virtually impossible for anyone to predict what will be needed twenty-eight years from now. None of us knows what the developments in the field of atomic energy will be, and how that will affect other fields of endeavor.

Man Who Risks His Life Deserves More Pay

The controversy which has centered over the advisability of paying flying personnel extra "flight pay" is one which many civilians do not completely understand. Flying officers have been receiving additional pay for hazardous duty, which, in their case, is flying, for many years. They received it during World War II and have received it during the Korean War.

Other military personnel engaged in very hazardous duty also receive extra pay. Naval personnel assigned to submarines, parachute troops who jump from aircraft, and other military personnel receive extra pay for hazardous duty. In most cases, this pay is well-deserved and every dollar of it is earned. The man who is risking his life deserves extra pay for that.

When God Gave Man The Sabbath Day He Knew That Man Would Grow Strong And Do More Work With A Day's Rest

International Sunday School Lesson for May 11, 1935. Memory Selection: "Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy." —Exodus 20: 8.

We have for this week's study a consideration of the Fourth Commandment, which concerns the Sabbath Day. We have seen how the First Commandment has to do with the oneness or uniqueness of God, the Second Commandment with the worship of God, the Third Commandment with the sanctification of the Sabbath Day, and the Fourth with the right of man to a day of rest.

A close study of the Ten Commandments as a whole, reveals the fact that the first three Commandments concern man's duty to God, and the last seven his duty to his fellowmen, while the Fourth Commandment forms a link between the two.

The word "Sabbath" in Hebrew means to break off, or to desist, or simply a time of cessation from work. Someone has said: "The greatest gift God ever made to the world was the gift of the Sabbath Day."

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When God gave man the Sabbath, he gave him a day of rest. It was a gift to him. He knew that man's body would give regular rest, and that it was capable of more service, if he rested one day in seven. As the great need occasional rest, or even thought the Sabbath was beneficial to man, said: "The Sabbath day is for our physical good. All nature needs periods of rest. 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REMINISCING WITH LEE STEWART YOUR HEALTH

Reciting The History Of The Modern Day Camera, Photography

By Lee Stewart. Louis Daguerre invented the eponymous process in 1832. The camera had been invented in 1816, but it was not used with any success. Having one's picture taken prior to the time Daguerre perfected his process was much like taking an auto ride in 1902. There was quite a bit of excitement over the experience and when the results were viewed, it was with mixed emotions of dismay and pride.

The year of 1839 was the golden age of photography. Line for line in facilities, the eponymous process of photography has supplanted the less faithful design engraving's process. However, this does not mean that the present day appreciation of engravings of artistic excellence has depreciated. Arthur Hayden, an English engraver, has made an expressed it by saying that it would be as logical to quarrel with the engraving process because it took the place of the early ecclesiastical writers with wealth of illuminations.

The average person is not interested in the process of engraving, but almost any one likes to know to what class a print belongs. For example, we are familiar with lithographs which were first used in America in 1821 and were quickly followed by chromolithography, simply a lithograph with the subject in color. Daguerotypes were first in black and white and were followed by the ambrotype. The same process with the deep, soft dark shades of blue and deep amber.

A mezzotint is a copper plate covered in every place with a picture of rich, velvety black. Based on the mezzotint process, a picture of lighting requires a deft deflection which is the same process with the deep, soft dark shades of blue and deep amber.

Because the parents didn't want the child to be immunized, if your child did not receive his or her immunization in school and you have the choice to be immunized, take him or her to your family doctor or to your county health department and it will be done.

A reminder to all adults, continue your booster shots, one necessary each year. How long it has been since you were immunized? Isn't it better, to be safe than sorry?

May 22 is the last date upon which the College Qualification Test will be held during the present academic year.

Although applications postmarked May 10, 1952, or earlier will be accepted, students wishing to apply are urged to secure complete, and mail their applications at once. Early filing will insure a test and other necessary supplies for the student at the center he selects or at a nearby center, according to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test.

When filling in the application, available at Selective Service local boards, the student should cross out "April 24" opposite the space reading "Center No." and write in "May 22."

Morehead To Have Cleaner Streets; Editor Hits Billion Dollar Guess

It is almost a certainty that Morehead will have a street cleaner. This is something that merchants and housewives have been pleading for a long time, but Morehead, with growing pains and a lot of financial problems because of the necessity of just about rebuilding its water, gas

and sewage systems has been unable to purchase the street cleaner. The city council came up last week with the plan of selling advertising space on its more than 300 parking meters. This revenue has been earmarked for payment of the vacuum-water street cleaner.

We have never been sold on parking meter advertising and have campaigned editorially, along with practically every progressive community paper, against roadside and advertising that clutters up the highways and the streets. New Germicidal Cloth Developed For Dairy Farms

A helpful precaution against milk contamination on dairy farms is afforded by newly developed "Rochoth," now being introduced nationally by Sterwin Chemicals Inc., according to P. Val Koh, president. The product assures the farmer a sanitary cloth and an easy, accurate and economical sanitizing agent every time he prepares a germicidal solution to sanitize cows' udders and flanks and dairy equipment.

Sheets of specially woven, thin cotton fabric, 12 inches square, have been impregnated with Roscol, powerful quaternary ammonium germicide. For use, a sheet is immersed in approximately ten quarts of water, preferably warm. Agitated a few minutes, it makes a sanitizing solution containing 200 parts per million, and the sheet itself is then used with the solution as a germicidal agent.

"Rochoth" is packaged in a stiff fibre carton with a hole punched at the top so that the box may be hung on a wall and sheets pulled out when needed. The sheets are packed 60 to a box.

Efforts to establish this sentimental holiday actually began shrewdly after the Civil War. But it wasn't until 1914 that Miss Anna M. Jarvis finally convinced Congress to authorize Mother's Day as an annual event.

As a young girl, Anna Jarvis lived in Grafton, W. Va. There her own mother, Mrs. Anna Reeves Jarvis, had once organized a "Mother's Friendship Day" to end the feuds and bitterness between families who men had fought as Union and Confederate soldiers.

2 Governors, Committeeman Hold GOP Key

Their Decision Could Swing Nomination To Eisenhower Or Taft

Two governors and a national committeeman might hold the key to the Republican presidential nomination if a convention deadlock develops between Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The three are Governors Earl Warren of California, John S. Fine of Pennsylvania and Michigan's national committeeman, Arthur Summerfield.

All three will be under extreme pressure at Chicago because cause together they apparently control a majority of a bloc of delegates of the convention's 1,200 delegates. This represents the largest group of delegates publicly uncommitted to either Eisenhower or Taft likely to be chosen for the July convention.

With surveys indicating that neither major candidate now is in a position to win the 603 votes needed for a first ballot nomination, the trio probably could swing the prize either way.

Or, if they choose to act together and early enough, they could form a powerful bloc in his way if a tight deadlock develops.

Home Owners Urged To Study OPS Ceilings

If you are having any roofing, siding or insulation work done on your house this spring, be sure you're not paying more than Government OPS ceiling prices.

The Kentucky district office of Price Stabilization said recently in reaching them, indicated some door-to-door salesmen have been charging prices over the OPS ceiling.

"If you are buying these services and are in doubt about the legal price for this type of work, call or write OPS immediately," Horace Way, head of the agency's Equipment and Machinery Section, said. The OPS office is at 307 South Fifth Street, Louisville, and the telephone number is AMherst 2381.

Ceiling Prices Must Be So Public Can Read Them

The new restaurant regulation requires the posting of dollar-and-cent prices primarily for the customer's benefit, OPS Price Executive Walter L. Kallbreier reminded operators.

The instructions state the posters shall be plainly visible to those served which means they should be legible and within the eye range of the average person," Kallbreier said. He explained that some operators have their posters so high on the wall and the prices printed so faintly as to defeat the purpose of the posting provision.

"Ceiling prices definitely don't mean prices on the ceiling," the OPS official declared.

Business Shows Increase Despite Employee Strike

French Canada's largest department store gained business this week despite a strike by 800 union employees.

When the workers walked out last Thursday night in a wage dispute, Dupuis Freres, Ltd. of Montreal, arranged living accommodations inside the store and moved in all its department managers and both union employees.

Then it set up a serve-yourself system, dispensing with clerks, and cut prices by 20 per cent.

Record crowds of shoppers jammed the store during the week of the average \$30 spread.

Thirty policemen kept watch on picketing strikers.

The union demands a \$10 increase of the average \$30 weekly sales clerk salary.

Rural Health Conference Is Underway

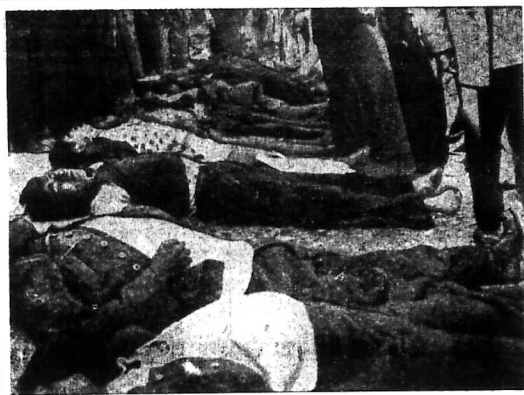
Meeting Designed To Establish Centers In Rural Communities

State Strawberry Crop Will Be On Market Next Week

Strawberry producers in Kentucky this week were reported preparing for early picking, expected to begin in 6 to 8 days.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics said more gardens in Kentucky already are producing early crops such as satsumas, onions and lettuce.

Irish potatoes are early and doing well. The outlook for the fruit crop remained excellent in the absence of weather damage. The report said generally moderate soil moisture prevailed over the state except for the extreme western, northern and eastern counties where farm work was delayed because of muddy or soft ground. But farmers were kept busy, if not with plowing, with shearing sheep, weeding tobacco beds or planting corn.

Spring plowing is about two-thirds completed.

Good pasture conditions prevailed throughout the state, relieving most storage shortages. Reports indicated pastures to be 85 per cent of normal, 10 per cent better than two weeks ago.

Michigan Family of 7 Wiped Out By Blaze

A family of seven was wiped out this week in a fire that destroyed their large paper home in the isolated "Scrub Oaks" district eight miles northwest of Grant, Mich.

The one-story dwelling was burned to the ground by the time the Grant fire department arrived. The seven bodies were found huddled around a charred bed.

State police sifted the rubble of the home for some clue to the cause of the fire that took the lives of Harry Hayward, Jr. 27, his wife, Mary 30, and their children—Harry III, 4, John, 7, Franklin, 5, Mary Edna, 4, and Alice Elaine, 2.

They said Hayward, a laborer who worked in Muskegon, Mich., and his wife apparently killed the children in a windowless bedroom when flames blocked the only doorway.

Two passing motorists, Dan Clark and Tony de John, both of Grant, saw the fire and tried to knock in the door. Driven back by

flames, they sped to Grant and roused firemen.

Clark and de John said the nearest farm house was half a mile away from the Hayward dwelling. They said that rather than waste time looking for a telephone they decided to drive straight to Grant.

Better Local Fire Departments In State Revealed

State Fire Marshal J. T. Underwood, Jr., this week attributed a 38 per cent drop in fire fatalities during the first three months of the present year to "increased diligence on the part of state and local fire protection authorities."

Fire caused 72 deaths in the first three months of 1951, but through March of this year only 45 deaths were reported to the State Fire Marshal's office.

"Ordinarily we would attribute a decrease in deaths to mild weather and the fact that faulty heating systems and flues were not overloaded," Underwood said, "but with a temperature drop of only about three degrees for January and February, it is more than conceivable that increased diligence on the part of state and local fire protection authorities is bringing results."

Noting the news of deaths from unvented or defective gas heaters, especially those in cottages, last year, Underwood noted that for the first three months of 1951 there were 17 such fatalities and this year only seven have died from the same cause.

Open fires, also a perennial killer, accounted for 18 deaths during the first three months of last year, and five deaths this year—while home fires resulting from miscellaneous causes dropped from 28 to 23 during the period.

Churchill Says War Danger Has Lessened

Prime Minister Winston Churchill said this week the danger of war has lessened in the last six months.

Churchill, in a political broadcast on the theme of his regime's first half-year of office, remarked "We have gained the peace and I do not believe that the danger of world war is as great as it was a year ago or that the last six months have not seen an improvement."

The prime minister asserted all

hopes of making things better at home depended upon keeping the peace and added:

"The fear of another world war casts its dark shadow upon every land on both sides of the Iron Curtain that divides mankind. I have the feeling that this fear is becoming universal and it is sinking deeper into all human hearts, and from that I draw the hope that all will in the end come right."

Churchill commented that it has led in an improvement of the world tension process correct "no one will rejoice more than those who in this country were so wickedly accused by their political opponents of seeking war when the present Parliament was being chosen."

He praised the "wise and skillful conduct" of foreign affairs by Anthony Eden.

Homemakers Told World Problems Related To Food

Ten weeks spent in the islands of the Pacific convinced Mrs. Anna C. Pettes that the problems of the world are closely related to the problem of food.

She urged that the women of the United States show great understanding and patience for the women of Japan.

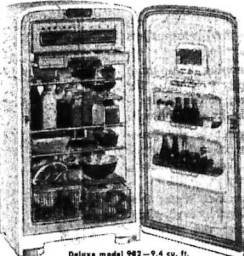

Serious Flare-Up Of Rabies Is Reported

Serious flare-ups of rabies in rural areas in several sections of the country were reported the past week by officials of the American Foundation for Animal Health.

Incidents in other areas were alerted by the foundation, and urged to be particularly suspicious of strange actions by cattle, horses and other farm animals, and to report questionable cases promptly so proper safety steps may be taken.

Two of the worst flare-ups involving deaths of farm animals have been reported in Georgia and Pennsylvania. Chief spreaders of the disease in these areas are said to be dogs, foxes and other wild animals. In Georgia alone, authorities report that more than 500 head of rabid cattle have died. The foundation says, "In Pennsylvania, nearly 100 cattle were stricken and Governor Fine states that the incidence of rabies has reached a point where it constitutes a serious menace to the health of the people." Latest reports from Iowa veterinarians show that in metropolitan areas, rates kill more than any other type of domestic animal. First signs of rabies in cattle are loss of appetite, lowered milk production and a noticeable change in disposition. Cows become restless and jump. In the dairy farm, the animals later become paralyzed with death soon following. In the fur farm, the animals become excited and are liable to attack and even bite other animals or human beings. So susceptible are cattle to rabies that about half of all cattle bitten by rabid animals will die.

"Owners can do several things to help prevent such losses," the foundation says. It includes: (1) Have a veterinarian give the best treatment to bitten animals if circumstances warrant it; (2) impound or dispose of stray dogs; (3) infection exists or is suspected; (4) practice greater restraint of farm dogs, especially at night; (5) shoot wild animals that appear rabid; and (6) have farm dogs vaccinated against rabies.

Fewer Whiskey, Beer Licenses In State Seen

Alcoholic Beverage Control Board Chairman Shearer this week predicted there will be fewer whiskey and beer licenses renewed for next year because of the department's announced policy of denying renewal licenses to those who possess federal gambling tax stamps either in their own name or in the name of another person whose address corresponds with licensed premises.

Department field representatives are checking a list of those in possession of gambling stamps to eliminate any tie between gambling and licensed liquor and beer premises.

"The General Assembly has given us the duty of policing the liquor and beer sales business—and it is our intention to do all within our power to keep it clean," said Shearer. "Several months ago warning was given that licenses would not be renewed where owners possess gambling stamps. We were neither kidding ourselves nor winking at anyone in the industry when this promise was made."

Shearer explained that an up-to-date list of those with gambling stamps has been provided by the Bureau of Internal Revenue and they are being culled thoroughly. "New licenses for the fiscal year 1952-53 must be obtained by July 1. Shearer recalled. Last year, there were 39 wholesale liquor licenses, 322 wholesale beer licenses, 823 retail package licenses, 947 retail drink licenses and 4,975 retail beer licenses issued through the department.



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May 15-21 White Cane Week In Kentucky

May 15-21 has been set aside as White Cane Week for the purpose of bringing the public to a better understanding of the blind and their problems.

That the blind can and do learn to do most of the things without sight that we do with sight, this many opportunities of employment and social activity are denied the blind and newspapers, radio and television stations throughout the state are devoting time and space in an effort to correct some of these false impressions of the blind.

National White Cane Week is sponsored in this state by the Kentucky Federation of the Blind. It has been proclaimed by the Governor and endorsed by many prominent citizens of our state. It is a part of a nationwide effort to bring the blind and their friends, coming on invitation of the Governor will start in Louisville May 23 and will end their tour in Frankfort the following Sunday.

The tour will include the Mountain Laurel Festival at Pine Mountain State Park, Pineville, on Memorial Day, and visits to 10 other State and National parks. It will be sponsored by the State Chamber of Commerce.

The week in Kentucky will be part of a national observance based on a proclamation by President Truman.

Wetherby And Gaines Speak On Mental Hygiene

Kentucky's mental health program and problems will be discussed by Governor Lawrence Wetherby and Dr. Frank M. Gaines, director of the new Department of Mental Health, before the Kentucky Association for Mental Health Inc. at the Association's annual dinner meeting, May 27 at the Seelbach Hotel, Louisville.

Barrs Bingham, president of the association, announced also that the Governor and Dr. Gaines will answer questions from the floor.

The state-wide association's meeting comes a little more than a month before legislative changes in the mental health program take effect, and as a consequence is expected to be of particular significance and interest. The new Department of Mental Health, created at the last legislative session, became effective July 1.

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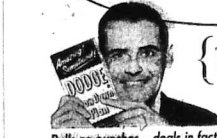
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Kentucky Farm Market Report

Egg Prices Unchanged To 1c Higher; Hogs, Cattle Prices Remain Stationary

Kentucky farmers received the following prices during the week of April 24-30:
Fryers and broilers commercially grown 24-27 cents, mostly 24-25, down 2 cents from the previous week; heavy hens 17-22 cents, mostly 18-20 cents, unchanged on bulk of receipts; light hens 12-18 cents, mostly 14-16 unchanged; old roosters 10-15 cents, mostly 12-14, unchanged from previous week; large eggs 30-33 cents, mostly 32 cents, unchanged to 1 cent higher; current receipts 27-32 cents, mostly 28-30, unchanged to 1 cent higher; premium cream 60-64 cents, mostly 62 cents, unchanged on majority of markets; reprocessed regular cream 50-54 cents, mostly 52 cents, unchanged.

Feed Markets Reported: Demand Less Active
Feed markets were unsettled during the week ended April 29, reports to the U. S. Department of Agriculture indicate. Western conditions were excellent for the development of new pastures and the general outlook for most feedstuffs was less active. With the exception of soybean meal, prices were generally lower for the week.

Wheat millfeed prices declined 1-1 1/2 per ton. Soybean meal prices advanced 57 per ton to the revised ceiling but offerings were negligible. Animal protein feed markets weakened and prices declined 5-13 per ton. Alfalfa meal offerings increased but demand was less active and prices dropped \$4.5 per ton. Due to higher soybean meal prices, the index of wholesale feedstuffs advanced nearly 3 points to 279.6 compared with 281.8 a year earlier. The feed grain index dropped over 2 points to 250.6, the lowest point since last October and compared with 250.2 a year ago.

The hominy feed market was about unchanged and gluten feed offerings continued scarce with prices unchanged. Distillers' dried grains remained scarce at the ceiling level while brewers' dried grains also continued at the same level.

Lambs Up; Hogs, Cattle Unchanged To Higher
Top hog prices averaged slightly higher during the past week in Kentucky's major auction markets. This is the third straight week in which prices have advanced as much as 25 cents on the average. Reports to the State Department of Agriculture also show cattle and lambs steady to higher but veals continue to decline.

Cine Total sales on the 28 markets reporting 10,551 head; average per market 377 head; last week 943. 100-250 pound butchers ranged from \$16.10-18.30, mostly \$16.75-17.25, prices unchanged to 25 cents higher on standards cwt or hdl or higher on state-wide basis. Cattle: Total sales nearly 7,000 head; average per market 243 head; last week 194. Good and choice steers and heifers brought \$26.25-34.50, mostly above \$31. Prices were lower on some markets but the state-wide average was up to 50 cents higher. Veals: Total sales over 5,000 head; average per market 182 head; last week 150. Good and choice veals ranged from \$33.38-50. The price range was 50 cents to \$1 lower but the bulk of receipts over the state were unchanged.

C&O Expands Railroad Yards At Paintsville
The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway announced this week that to expand and improve its facilities in the Big Sandy coal fields, it will spend approximately \$100,000 at its assembly and repair yards at the Paintsville, Ky. terminal.

Harry Kindt, superintendent of the C&O's Ashland Division, made the announcement. Two new tracks and a ten-car passenger track will be added to the assembly yard, where empty and loaded cars are received and dispatched. The improved yard will accommodate 811 cars. The car repair yard will be relocated and rebuilt to hold a total of 30 cars. To provide for adequate drainage of the repair yard, a new subdrainage system will be installed. The project will be completed about July 15. The Forbes Construction Co., Inc. of Huntington, W. Va., has been awarded a contract for the grading.

Scouts Return To 'Avenue Of Champions'

Performance Scheduled By Boys At University Of Kentucky Stadium

Over 1,000 Boy Scouts from this and 33 other counties will return May 9 to Lexington's "Avenue of Champions" Here the scouts contributed 4,600 hours of public service last year by aiding the thousands of people who attended University of Kentucky and high school athletic contests.

But this time, things will be different. It is the Scouts' turn to take to U. of K.'s Stoll Field and give what promises to be an All-American performance. The event will be the Boy Scout Circus sponsored by the Blue Grass Scout Council which covers this area. Activity will begin at 3 p. m. with a parade through downtown Lexington in which every Scout will participate. They come the "Grand Entry" at 8 p. m. on Stoll Field. All Cub Scouts and Explorers will take part in the entry. The theme for the "Grand Entry" is called "The Great Partnership." The object is to show the relationship of Scouting to the institutions of America. Brief pageants will show relationships of Scouting to churches, civic clubs, fraternal orders, veterans organizations and citizens groups. Emphasis will be on relationship to home, church and school. In rapid succession, like any good circus, the scouts will demonstrate precision bicycle drills with each Scout on a zany decorated bike. Scouts in Indian costumes making fire with flint and steel objects - this will be followed by ancient Indian ceremonies; folk dancing - in which

Explorer Scouts and their partners will demonstrate folk dances. Disaster scenes in which the Scouts show how they help in times of disaster. Such scenes as a car wreck, live wire blown down, burning house, explosion and many others are on the program.

What is a circus without clowns? It's no circus at all. The Scouts like to have fun as well as work. Their clowning will entertain you with some real stick comedy, those in charge promise.

And this is only the beginning. Rope spinning and whip cracking acts are also included. Pioneering in which the scouts will actually build bridges, towers and lean-tos. The boys will make camp, pitch tents and signal each other by semaphore and Morse code. In the concluding ceremonies "Forward on Liberty's Team" is the theme, cut outs of the Statue of Liberty and the Liberty Bell will symbolize a three-year Scouting program designed to "Strengthen the Arms of Liberty." During the grand finale, all Cub Scouts, Explorers and their leaders will be on the field. The Scouts and Scout leaders planning this event emphasize that this is a chance for the public to show by its attendance that the adults are solidly behind Scouting. 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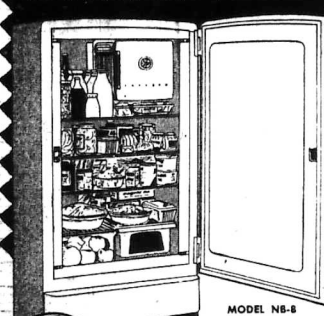
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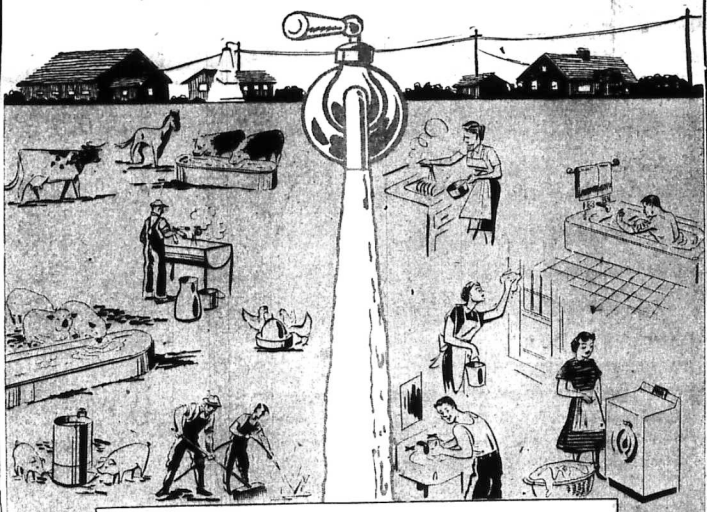
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
