It Was 7 Years Ago That Japs Gave In

It was seven years today (Thursday, Aug. 14) since Washington made known the glad tidings that the Japanese Imperial government had accepted the terms of the Potsdam ultimatum. However, the peace that so many had hoped for, after six years of fighting, was short-lived. It soon was replaced with what became known as the cold war. Then the outbreak of fighting in Korea on June 25, 1950, made it clear that real peace was still far away.

A new defense program—put into motion shortly thereafter—still dominates the nation's economy. As may be seen from the tabulation below, the outgo for military purposes in the government's fiscal year ended June 30, last, was almost triple each expenditure two years earlier, as the Korean war began. Moreover, spending for defense today, according to government sources, is at a rate of \$30,000,000,000 annually and will rise sometime next year to a rate considerably in excess of \$40,000,000,000 annually. This compares with an actual defense dollar outlay of \$38,965,000,000 by the United States Treasury in the fiscal year ended June 30.

The rate of individual output (203 in June based on an index of 1925-29 equaling 100) seemingly appears low (see tabulation), in view of all the defense activity.

GOP Must Beat Jinx In November

The Republicans are up against an 89-year jinx in their efforts to win the presidency this November.

Not since 1872 has the GOP been able to win the presidency in a year ending with the figure "2".

Ulysses S. Grant, who was re-elected in 1872 by defeating Democrat Horace Greeley, was the only man in the 86-year history of the present Republican party to lick the jinx.

Among the collections 3,000 records are approximately 600 of the cylinder type. Many of the records are recordings of speeches, these being popular in the days before radio and television. Young has speeches of Theodore Roosevelt, William Jennings Bryan and other notables of decades past.

In the record collection there is great variety in which jazz is intertwined with classical music, much of which was recorded in Italy. Speeches by Thomas Edison and General Pershing and songs by Lillian Russell and the great Caruso are filed alongside a recording of Amos 'n' Andy made when they called themselves Sam and Henry.

One novelty piece is a recording of a horse race in which the winner may be any (one of six horses). This seems impossible but it is accomplished through the use of six parallel grooves, each a different recording with a different outcome, depending upon the groove in which the needle is placed at the start. (Betting odds were not permitted.)

What are so-called developments in the use of permanent needles are not so new, according to Mr. Young, who has made a study of the early history and development of the "talking machine." Diamond-pointed needles were in use in the early

days. Sapphire needles also have been in use for many years.

Nor is the long-playing record such a new trick. In the 1920's Edison put out a record with a record that played for twenty minutes. It had a gear shift for changing from the conventional to long-playing and a separate tone arm for dance music that was an additional heavy duty tone arm for dance music that was in the volume.

"Machines in Young's collection range in size, price and importance from the small \$3.50 model, sometimes given as a premium with the purchase of groceries, to the deluxe \$350.00 number with the gear shift for change to long playing.

The phonographs were artistically turned out. Some had highly polished solid brass horns, while others had horns of tin or other metals painted and decorated with flowers and ornate designs. In traditional Gay Nineties style, Woodrow horns, chiefly of mahogany, were also popular.

An interesting feature of the advertising material used in the early days of the phonograph was the commercial that sounded in behalf of each new model. From the first tin-plated wrapped cylinder job to the much improved model of many years later, the underlying note was the perennial claim that at last here is to be found "the perfect reproduction of the human voice."

The Columbia Magazine of March, 1899, contained an advertisement of the Columbia Graphophone, a claim to the "unfading note" achievement of the "talking machine art" with "reproductions so perfect that the ear cannot distinguish them from the original."

In the same issue of the magazine is the gift offer of Edison's Graphophone as a part of a commercial firm's "great \$14.75 Family Combination Grocery Order." This is the only record included \$16.30 worth of groceries and the Graphophone for \$14.75 with the proviso that "if the groceries are not so represented return them at our expense and we will refund your money and you keep the Graphophone."

From an examination of some of the historical material Mr. Young has collected in connection with his hobby, one learns that the photograph idea was first used mostly as a dictaphone for stenographic work and for novelty entertainment at parties and gatherings. Only at a later time was it used to great extent for recording music—its greatest function in the present day.

First models performed both the recording and playback functions. One merely started the machine, talked into the horn and then started it over to his own voice played back. Pamphlets were issued that gave instructions in using the machine to promote or generate safety and laughter at social gatherings.

Another paradoxical aspect of the machine's development had to do with its motive power. Strangely enough, the first models were electrically driven and the later development of the spring motor was looked upon as a distinct improvement.

The early electric model, however, did not resemble the electric record player of today. It is run by a cumbersome motor powered by wet cell batteries

that proved to be far from satisfactory in between these power models driven by water power and by a sewing machine type of foot treadle.

Edison wrote an article in the June, 1878, issue of the "North American Review" in which he mentioned some uses to which his invention might be put. Among these were letter writing and dictation of all kinds; Phonograph books for use of the blind; teaching, lecturing, reproducing music; as a family record—recording of sayings, reminiscences, etc.; by members of a family in their own voices, and even the last words of dying persons; speaking music boxes and toys; and connection with the telephone to make a permanent record of an otherwise fleeting conversation.

Outside of the fact that the average American family has not taken kindly to the gruesome idea of recording the last words of dying persons, it must be admitted that Edison envisioned at a very early date many of the ultimate uses to which his favorite invention was to be put.

At any rate, Morehead's Tom Young says he has had many hours of fun and fascination in building up his collection of "talking machines" and in tracing the development of this heritage from the "Wizard of Menlo Park."

is a wonderful thought, and carrying off a premium or a ribbon is great too. Gives you something to think about when you start preparing the tobacco beds and all through the various stages of growing tobacco, from the setting of plants, the plowing, the hoeing, the control of black shank, the topping, and suckering (yes, I know suckering is a back-breaking job, but it sometimes makes the difference between a blue ribbon or a red ribbon) then the cutting, the housing, the firing in bad weather, the proper curing of tobacco, the stripping, the bulking for market, and the selecting of the tobacco to be exhibited, is a lot of hard work, but knowing that you won at your State Fair, makes the hard work seem a little easier.

To encourage young farmers to exhibit their tobacco, we have classes for 4-H and FFA in the Burley and in the Green Tobacco Division. We have also raised the amount of the premiums offered in tobacco to \$1,000 this year. This year for the first time, we will have a demonstration of the proper method of stripping burley tobacco, by men from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These demonstrations will take place twice each day during the Fair in tent No. 1, in the new Farm Building and Equipment Center, south of the Administration Building. Proper stripping means better prices for the whole burley industry. Kentucky can rightly be proud of her tobacco that is exhibited at

Rowan School Lunch Plan Is Sketched

USDA Donates 745 Cases Canned Goods During The Past Year

School lunch rooms in Rowan County received 745 cases or units of USDA donated commodities valued wholesale at \$6,205.76 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, Rowan County School Superintendent Mrs. Eunice Cecil said today.

These commodities were donated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and distributed by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture under the supervision of Thomas A. Lewis, director of commodity distribution. Donated commodities represent dollars to schools—dollars that buy lunches—at prices children can afford to pay. The lunch program serves a dual program of safeguarding the well-being of Kentucky children by creating a local market for farm products.

Mrs. Cecil pointed out that these donations make up only a small percentage of the total lunchrooms. Most of it is purchased by the schools. These local food purchases by school lunch rooms in Rowan County totaled \$91,536.14 for the fiscal year.

In addition to donated commodities school lunch rooms which participate in the National School Lunch Program also receive cash assistance from the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the purchase of food from local sources. Kentucky's share of this cash assistance is made available to eligible schools in the Commonwealth through the State Department of Education. Distribution to schools is made under the supervision of Miss Mary Lois Williamson, State School Lunch Director. Rowan County's share of cash assistance received in Kentucky during the past school year was \$4,917.51.

Of the foods donated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and distributed to schools in Rowan County, 416 case units were purchased by USDA with funds appropriated by Congress for the operation of the National School Lunch Program. These foods, which include dry beans, canned green beans, peanut butter, American process cheese, canned sour cherries, canned peaches, canned sweet corn, tomatoes, tomato paste and dried prunes, were distributed only to schools operating under the National School Lunch Program, which amounted to 328 cases or units in Rowan County, was from stocks acquired by USDA under price support and surplus removal programs. They included fresh apples, nonfat dry milk solids, concentrated orange juice, strained honey, shelled pecans, and dried eggs. The schools, said Mrs. Cecil, paid freight charges on dried eggs as required by law.

All non-profit school lunchrooms were eligible to receive the foods acquired under the price support and surplus removal programs. Some of these commodities which require no preparation were distributed to schools which have

(Continued From Page 1) hausted. It will be necessary to relocate about 50 families presently living on the lands to be acquired. The Commission and other federal agencies will provide such assistance as they can to families seeking new locations should they desire help. An orderly process will be followed in evacuating the area and the Commission will notify residents as soon as the schedule is completed.

As has been the case in all new installations of the AEC in the past two years, for example, at the National Reactor Testing

Station in Idaho, the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina and the gaseous diffusion plant in Paducah, Ky., there will be no AEC-built and operated community.

Direct supervision of the construction and operation of the new plant will be under a new Portsmouth Area organization which will be established by the Oak Ridge Operations Office of the AEC. Kenneth A. Dunbar has been named area manager, and R. H. McCulloch deputy area manager. Local offices will be opened in Portsmouth, Ohio in the near future.

The principal construction contractor for the new plant is Peter Kiewit Sons' Company of Omaha, Nebraska. The concerns which will handle the various phases of design and architectural work include at present: Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation, New York City; Giffels and Vail, Inc., Detroit; Sargent and Lundy, Chicago; Singmaster and Breyer, New York City; Smith, Hinchman and Grylls, Detroit; Burns and McDonnell, Kansas City, Mo., and Holabird and Root and Burgee, Chicago.
