Retirement Plan On Sound Basis, Reports Surplus

Kentucky's Teacher Retirement System—with assets of more than \$23,000,000—is on an actuarially sound basis and has a wider span of coverage than any similar system, N. O. Kimbler, executive secretary of the System, said this week.

Kimberly urged Kentucky teachers not to underestimate their equity in the huge retirement fund.

He pointed out that a teacher reaching the age of 64 may become eligible for an annuity of \$1,200 and during a normal retired life receive from the Retirement Fund \$21,884.

This is not to be overlooked in choosing a profession," he continued. "It is equal to the income from \$40,000 worth of three per cent bonds."

The Retirement law and its benefits by which teachers make annual contributions into the fund, matched by state funds in addition, should provide an additional inducement to young persons wishing to choose a profession, he observed.

"Hansel and Gretel" is Don's first appearance with the Players.
