

Radjunas Resigns Coaching Position At Morehead College

Football And Basketball Jobs May Be Divorced

Persons close to the athletic situation at Morehead State College conjectured today that coaching duties for the two major sports—football and basketball—will be divorced, starting this fall.

It appeared probable following the resignation Monday of Stan Radjunas as assistant football and basketball coach. Radjunas gave up the job as Elia Johnson's assistant to accept a position with Lee Clark Products Company, Clearfield.

It is known that Johnson feels that one coach cannot do both to both sports in the tough Ohio Valley Conference and Morehead like the only member school where the same staff tutors collegiate football and basketball. Johnson has also said he would prefer being athletic director and head basketball coach. He has handled both football and basketball since coming to Morehead in 1946.

Radjunas advised President Charles Spain of his resignation and said he preferred to work with the college but felt his opportunity was better in the business field.

A native of New Britain, Conn., Radjunas came to Morehead as a freshman in 1936, the same time that Johnson and the late Len Masters took over the coaching posts. Stan was a star football player from the start.

He graduated with an A.B. degree in 1940, but returned to Morehead in 1946 as assistant basketball coach. He has also earned his Masters degree at Morehead. He has been working on his Ph.D. at Ohio State. He is married and has two sons.

Radjunas said he regretted that his new job would probably take him from Morehead where he and his family have made their home. Radjunas has been known throughout the state, not only in his connection on the Morehead coaching staff but also as one of Kentucky's outstanding officials.

Work for winning teams appears brighter at Morehead since in many years following the decision of the O.V. conference to limit athletic scholarships to 50, Morehead has been able to compete on even terms in this respect, with other state clubs like Miami, Western and others. Last year these three schools granted twice as many grants to athletes as did Morehead.

Taxpayers May Inspect Assessments

Commissioner Cline Says Books Will Be Open Until May 1

Every taxpayer in Rowan County will have an opportunity to inspect the tax assessment roll for this year, Tax Commissioner R. W. Cline announced today.

As provided by Kentucky law, the property tax roll will be open for inspection from April 15 to May 1. Any taxpayer may visit the tax commissioner's office and check his own assessment as well as comparing it with others in the county.

Commissioner Cline strongly urges every taxpayer who possibly can to take advantage of the inspection period. This is the only way to be sure the assessment is correct. Some taxpayers have had to pay taxes they did not rightfully owe because of their failure to take advantage of the inspection period.

Anyone who feels that his assessment is higher or lower than that on other like property in the county may appeal to the board of supervisors. The appeal must be filed in writing with County Clerk D. B. Day before May 1. Appeal for a review may also be made by the tax commissioner, Department of Revenue, county judge, chief financial officer of any city using the county assessment or the superintendent of any school district in which the property is located. The board of supervisors may raise or lower individual assessments in which the property has been made in order to equalize them.

"The inspection period is a safeguard for the taxpayer," Commissioner Cline said, "and I urge every one to take advantage of it for his own benefit."

Morehead Gets Reduction In Business, Residential Fire Insurance Rates

Revamping Water Distribution And Supply System, New Fire Truck Results In Better Classification

Victory in Morehead's seven year fight for lower fire insurance rates has been all but achieved, it was learned today.

Mayor William H. Layne and Fire Chief C. B. McCullough were notified by C. H. Parker, manager of Kentucky Inspection Bureau, Louisville, that the city is obtaining a sixth class rating.

Two engineers from the Bureau are scheduled this week making final inspections and the Mayor said "it is certain" that he will obtain the better classification.

Elevating the city from 7th to 6th class is a flat reduction of 25 per cent in all unexpired dwellings (brick or frame), the Mayor and Fire Chief said. Actually, a city with 6th class rating gets the same rate on residences as the first class.

This means that Morehead's residential fire insurance rates will be as good as the first class.

The Rowan County News suggests, in its editorial page, that the city can soon retire the indebtedness which created the 7 per cent fire insurance tax, and eliminate it entirely, by earmarking 50 per cent of parking meter funds. Parking meters are now paid for.

The state and further improvements will be made in the city's fire department (business) districts.

"Our engineers last week made the final inspection of the improvements in the fire department of your city, and also made the final inspection of the water distribution system."

"They found that all of our recommendations for a sixth class rating have been carried out, except the installation of the two fire control switches in the mercantile district, as outlined in our letter of recommendations to you of April 13, 1950."

"In view of the fact that the means for calling the fire department are dependent entirely upon telephone communication, these switches are necessary for this district for promptly calling the fire department when stores are closed and telephones are not available."

"In order to avoid any further delay, we plan to proceed with the work of rearing your city on the new basis, assuming that these switches will be installed and in service by the time our recommendations are received."

"We shall appreciate it if you will inform us immediately if this plan meets with your approval in order that we may be governed accordingly."

"In installing this sixth class rating, it is assumed that the water supply will, at all times, be adequate and reliable and the water works system including the pump, filters, etc., and all fire hydrants will be properly maintained at all times."

"It is also assumed that the fire department, its personnel and equipment, will at all times be maintained up to the standards which justified this rating."

"This sixth class rating applies only to the area within the present city limits, and does not contemplate the protection of any additional area."

WHEREAS, the Morehead Utility Plant Board, the operating agency for the City of Morehead Municipality, owned water and natural gas distribution systems, advise that the wholesale cost of natural gas for the City has been increased on two occasions since November 1951 and since the present gas rate schedule was put into effect, and which increases amount to approximately 51% increase in the cost of gas on the date, and

WHEREAS, the said agency, by resolution of its official board, has decided it is impossible to continue to meet its operating expenses and debt service without increasing its revenue, and

Only Lawyers May Charge For Preparing Deeds

An individual citizen, not a lawyer, may prepare deeds and other legal documents on an accommodation basis only but may not make any charge for his services, it was held by Assistant Attorney General M. B. Hollifield.

Watts Predicts Floor Fight On Cigarette Tax

Outlook For Defeat Of Measure Not Too Good, Congressman Says

Floor fights in both the House and Senate on the proposed graduated tax on cigarettes were forecast this week by U. S. Rep. John C. Watts of Nicholasville, Sixth district congressman. The proposed legislation, which would lower the federal tax on economy brand cigarettes to \$2.80 a thousand while retaining the present \$4 rate on standard brands—currently is before the House Ways and Means Committee.

It was attacked vigorously by representatives of burley growers in recent public hearings in Washington.

Congressman Watts, who left for Washington Sunday night after spending the Easter recess of Congress in the Blue Grass, declared the measure was none too bright for defeat of the tax measure in the Ways and Means Committee.

He noted that absence of Rep. Robert Doughton, of North Carolina, former chairman of the committee, would be felt deeply. Rep. Doughton, who retired last year, was an ardent foe of the graduated tax.

On work of Congress in general Congressman Watts said that appropriations bills would be the first measures of importance that would be considered on the House floor following the recess. He declared there undoubtedly would be cuts in the proposals, which were submitted to Congress by Harry Truman before President Eisenhower became chief executive.

Legislation proposed by Rep. Dan Reed, New York Republican, to reduce personal income taxes, will be held by the Rules committee until after total appropriations have been determined, Congressman Watts said.

He explained that this would follow an administration request that all efforts be made to balance the budget.

Congressman Watts forecast cuts in present budget requests, but said that if large expenditures were made for defense of the U. S. against atomic attack total expenditures might not be reduced.

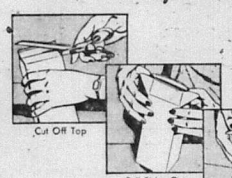

Elliott County Has Only One Physician

The question of greater medical school facilities for Kentucky will be discussed May 21 when a number of medical societies meet in Frankfort to discuss findings of the Legislative Research Commission about the paucity of physicians in some areas.

was announced this week by Commissioner of Economic Security Vego E. Barnes.

On this figure, employers paid into the State's Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund \$18,520,000. Experience rating provisions of the law which allow reduction in the insurance rate for employers having stable employment experience afforded a net savings in taxes of \$10,291,000.

Without the rating, employers would have paid the full tax rate of 2.7 per cent. As required by the Federal Social Security Act, or \$28,811,000, Barnes said.

The average tax rate for 1952 was 1.66 per cent as compared to the standard 2.7 per cent. An additional three-tenths of one per cent is automatically paid to the federal government for administrative purposes. All the rest of the collections go into a trust fund solely for the purpose of paying benefits to unemployed workers.

Payments last year were \$15,272,265.20.

Kentucky's trust fund totaled \$140,414,534 at the end of 1952 and, according to Barnes, is "the most actuarially sound unemployment insurance trust fund in the country."

The fund earned \$2,537,138 in interest last year, which, together with tax collections, brought net revenue to \$21,457,138 or \$6,184,873 above sums paid unemployed workers.

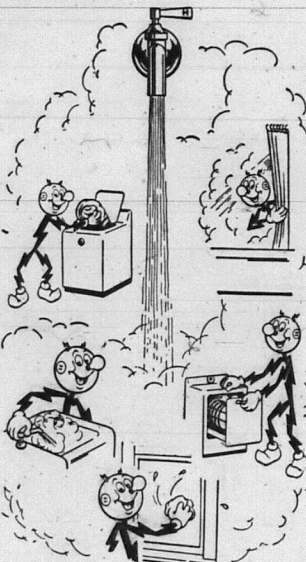

Kentucky Farm Market Report

Poultry Market Generally Unchanged; Index During March Is Up One Point

Kentucky farmers received the following prices for produce delivered during the week ending April 8. This is based on reports from 15 widely scattered cities of the state including Louisville and price trends compared with those of a week ago.

Commercially grown, fryers or broilers 28-30c, markets generally unchanged to 1c lower, undertone unsettled on Kentucky, Cincinnati and North Georgia markets; heavy type hens 20-22c, mostly 21-22c, prices unchanged to 1c lower; light and leghorn hens 10-23c, mostly 13-18c, mostly unchanged, however a few markets reported slight price changes in both directions; old roosters 10-17c, mostly 12-14c, unchanged.

Premium cream unchanged at 52-54c. National butter market continued about steady under continued heavy CCC buying. Production butters were 10 percent above average last week. Other dairy products continued barely steady to weak.

Feed Prices Are Unsettled

Feed markets were unsettled during the week ending April 7. The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported. The increase demand for formula feeds, which normally develops at this season of the year has failed to materialize and handlers continue to purchase supplies only as needed. This slackened demand was due in part to the decreased numbers of poultry and hogs and the rapid development of spring pastures.

The index of wholesale feedstuffs advanced slightly due to the sharp increase in wheat millfeed prices. The index of whole-sale feedstuffs prices advanced 0.2 points to 230.7 compared with 217.7 a year ago. The feed grain index advanced 0.14 points to 14.0 compared with 13.9 compared with 257.1 a year earlier.

Soybean and linseed meal was off 1¢; cottonseed meal slightly lower; wheat millfeeds 52-53 higher because of a flour mill strike in the Midwest; hominy feeds about unchanged; gluten feed unchanged to 8¢ lower; dried grains unchanged to 50¢ lower; animal protein feeds 52-70-50 lower and alfalfa averaged 52¢ lower.

Index Is Up To 264 Per Cent

During the month ended March 15, 1953, the index of Prices Received by U. S. farmers rose 1 point (1/3 of one per cent) to 264 per cent of the 1910-14 average, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics has announced. Higher prices for hogs, cotton, eggs, wheat, and corn more than offset lower prices for beef cattle, calves, wholesale milk and potatoes. The March 15 index is 9 per cent (24 points) below a year ago, but 6 per cent higher than June 1950, just before the outbreak in Korea.

During the same period the index of Prices paid by farmers including interest, taxes and wage rates rose 1 point (1/3 of one per cent) to 130.5 per cent of the 1910-14 average. Prices of commodities bought for family living purposes rose slightly more on the average than goods bought for production. The parity index in mid-March was 2 per cent under a year earlier. The parity ratio remained unchanged at 94 per cent.

Top Butcher Hogs Are Up

This report is based on sales on 24 of Kentucky's major livestock auction markets during the week ending April 8.

Hogs: Total receipts 7,630 head on the 24 markets reporting. The average was 314 head per market, down an average of 22 head since last week. Top butchers weighing 180-250 lbs. cost an average 25-50c this week which makes the average price 75c-81¢ higher in the past two weeks. Prices ranged from \$20.25-21.30, mostly \$20.75-21.10.

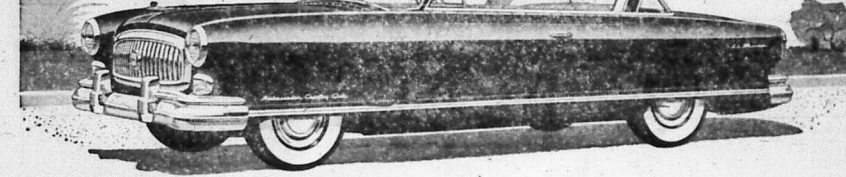

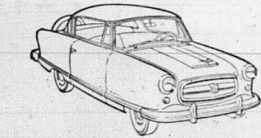

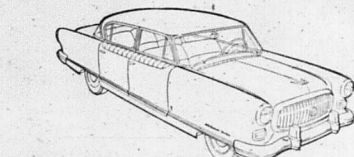
