Ohio Man Attempts Suicide Saturday

An Ohio man was last known to be in critical condition at U.K. Medical Center after an apparent attempt at suicide on North Tolliver Road Saturday at 7:51 p.m.

Morehead police received the report of a shot fired in that area, and on investigation found Donald J. Deshuk, 19, Wellington, Ohio, sitting on the passenger's side of a car holding a .32 caliber revolver in his left hand.

Chief of Police Fred Barnsdale said the wound was to the left temple.

Deshuk was found to have weak vital signs and was taken by the Morehead-Rowan County Ambulance Service to St. Claire Medical Center. He later was transported to the Lexington hospital.

charges in district court against Holbrook for allegedly menacing and threatening him. Barber claimed that Holbrook shouted obscenities at him and hit him in an argument at an undeveloped section of city park.

Mayor Jackson had appointed Barber to undertake work there to control erosion. Barber was staking out the area when the incident is said to have taken place. Holbrook has refused to comment on the matter.

But Moore said Thursday night the fact that Mayor Jackson has appointed Barber as chairman disturbs him a great deal. Moore pointed out that Barber is a resident of another city, Lakeview Heights, and that he should not be allowed "to tell us how to run a city park."

Moore also noted that Barber had called in an order for gravel and that he should have no more authority than an average person to order for the city. The mayor had authorized the order of the gravel.

Holbrook agreed that "it's not right for an outsider" to serve on the recreation commission. Holbrook is the council's representative on the commission.

Moore said Mayor Jackson had appointed Barber chairman because he would go along with him attempting to get rid of Don Hardin, park director, and Dan Stewart, recreation director. Moore claimed that Barber has a long-standing grudge against Hardin.

Moore said that Mayor Jackson also wants to get rid of City Administrator Don Evans and said "that he has changed Evans' title to assistant to the mayor. He said Evans cannot even sign a purchase order now."

Councilman Moog also charged that Mayor Jackson had fired Gary Cisco from the park without cause. And he said the mayor has a "personal grudge against a few people who disagree with him."

Moore said that "no one is more dedicated than Don Hardin" but that Barber wants to get rid of him.

Three of the council members—Moore, Holbrook and Roe—have challenged the authority which the mayor claims the new laws have given him. And Salyer has requested an attorney general's opinion on many of the questions being raised.

Moore has said that he won't go along with the mayor's authority until that opinion is received. Moore said the mayor believes the new law gives him "a little more clout to make things as unbearable as he can."

Roe also said of the mayor, "He just can't stand peace and quiet." Roe asked if the law gives the mayor that much power, "Why have six councilmen?"

Councilman Reg Anderson was absent from the session and Jack Fraley, Randy Wells and Mayor Jackson left when Moore began his comments.

Evans, the city administrator, has been on vacation for the last two weeks and Moore said he was glad Evans was out of town because he would hate to see

him "hurt by one individual."

Moore said that Evans, Hardin and Stewart "are close friends of mine and have worked their hearts out."

Earlier this year, it was a vote by Jackson, Anderson, Wells and Fraley which kept Stewart from getting more than a seven percent raise from the city.

Moore also said Thursday that Mayor Jackson does not spend two or three days a week in the job and he hates to see a man, who spends no more time than that in the city, try to dictate things to the council. He said he "could not sit here as an elected official and see this happen."

On each end of the table were silver punch bowls of pink punch.

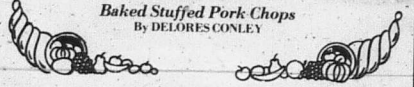

Gourmet Corner

Baked Stuffed Pork Chops
By DELORES CONLEY



4 rib pork chops cut 1 inch thick
1 Tbl. chopped onion
2 Tbl. chopped celery
1 Tbl. shortening
2 cups dry bread crumbs

1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 tsp. sage
1/4 tsp. poultry seasoning
1/2 cup bouillon or water
Salt & pepper to taste
1/2 tsp. salt

Slit a pocket along the bone side of each chop (or have them slit at the grocery.) Prepare the stuffing by browning the onion and celery in the shortening and then combine with crumbs, salt, pepper, sage, poultry seasoning and bouillon. Stuff each chop with 1/4 of this mixture. Season chops with salt and pepper. Place in baking pan. Cover the pan and bake in a moderate oven at 350 degrees for 1 hour. The chops may be browned first in a heavy skillet and then baked covered for 1 hour.

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County Road Projects Reviewed In Hearing

Public comment was sought last Friday morning on several county road projects during a public hearing in the county courthouse.

The hearing is part of a new procedure required under law for the county to expend money on major road repair projects.

Several roads were considered during the public hearing including acceptance of an industrial drive for maintenance, widening of Copperas Hollow Road, and blacktopping on Bluestone-Bratton Branch and Sugar Leaf Mountain roads.

Judge-executive W. C. Flannery, who chaired the hearing, asked for comment about the acceptance of the deed for a gravel road, leading to property owned by Matt Dykes and Vern Bishop.

The road was built primarily to serve a storage building Dykes Enterprises has leased to Browning Manufacturing. One woman said she thought the county should not be building a road for private industry but withdrew her objections after Flannery explained the road would serve five property owners who didn't want it paved. Actually, Flannery said two of the property owners are served by another road but that they later plan to combine the two drives.

The county's acceptance of the road has been criticized by some of the

magistrates, but Flannery said Friday that Browning was able to create 67 new jobs by moving using the Dykes building for storage and putting in new machines in its plant.

Flannery also noted that the county built the road which now leads to the Browning plant on U.S. 60 west.

The magistrates must still accept the final deed for the road.

Flannery said that blacktop patching is being completed on a three-tenths mile section of Copperas Hollow Road. He said new metal culvert was put in on the road to replace a wooden bridge and that 75 percent of the work was donated by people who live along the road. With the work already more than half way completed on the road, it was not exactly clear why the road was part of the public hearing.

There was no comment from the audience about blacktopping a two-tenths mile section of Bluestone-Bratton Branch Road. Bids were to have been opened on the project Friday morning but none were received. Judge Flannery did have a price quote, dated July 31, from East Kentucky Paving to do the work for \$6,500. Fiscal Court would have to award a contract before work would begin. The section of blacktop would make the road complete from J. C. Wolfe Lumber Co. on Ky 32 to Lakeview Heights. Flannery called the project to

blacktop eight-tenths mile of Sugar Leaf Mountain Road "one of the most essential in the county."

The judge said road crews had been hauling dense base to the road to make it ready for blacktopping. Using the price quote for the other road as a guide, Flannery estimated the road could be blacktopped for less than \$30,000.

A delegation of six residents, including Thelma Skaggs, Betty Porter, Virginia Key, Judy Kelsey, Bill Lane and Kenny Porter, expressed their desires that the county complete the project as soon as possible.

The judge said money was available for the job and that it could be completed before winter with Fiscal Court

approval. The magistrates would have to advertise the project for bids.

There was no comment on a project for blacktopping eight-tenths mile of Rock Fork Road which would complete it to the Fleming County line.

A proposal for closing an old county road on Bluestone Hill to old U.S. 60 was also discussed. Raleigh McClurg, Opal Purdue and Helen Fannin expressed their opposition to the closing if they were not left a way into their property.

Flannery said the plans were to close the old road from old U.S. 60 to about 20 feet below the property line of Coburn Dehart. The judge said that would still allow the owners ingress and egress.

That statement appeared to satisfy the parties.

a vet for additional supportive treatment.

Dr. Derrickson says, "We've had fair results with the treatment."

Dogs which have not contracted the disease and which have not been vaccinated could be isolated from other dogs to help control the spread of the disease. But Dr. Derrickson says it is difficult to keep dogs from being exposed.

If someone has had a animal die from the virus or even to have recovered, Dr. Derrickson suggests the area around where the dog was kept be

thoroughly cleaned. He recommends a solution of one part chlorine bleach mixed with 30 parts water.

Dr. Derrickson says the virus is not affected by the weather or the environment and can live for several months in the stool.

The virus is no threat to other animals, the veterinarian says, although a similar strain also affects pigs.

Dr. Derrickson points out that, because the strain of virus is so new, "dogs are pretty much 100 percent susceptible."

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Bright Finds Similarities In His New And Old Team

CINCINNATI — Greg Bright was all smiles as he sat patiently in the Cincinnati Bengals locker room waiting for a device to clip the tape from his ankles to be passed his direction.

Bright didn't mind the delay in getting into the shower because he had just earned a starting position in the NFL.

Last year Phil Simms was drafted early in the first round by the New York Giants and by mid season became their starting quarterback.

Reflecting on his accomplishments thus far as a professional athlete, Bright said he finds himself in a similar situation which he faced during his senior year at Morehead.

"I've found that in a way this team is similar to the Morehead Eagle team I played on last season, a team which had a label of not being competitive and just a bunch of losers. But there has been a change of attitude on this squad and you will find that we will never give up this season and will always fight to the end," Bright said.

New Bengal head coach Forrest Gregg kept a dozen rookies besides Bright and fields a more enthusiastic team that Bright feels will help down the line.

Bright must have leaped three feet in the air when teammate Ray Griffin intercepted a Terry Bradshaw pass and returned it 23 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter.

Not only did the Bengals hold Pittsburgh scoreless in the first quarter, which most teams find hard to do, they actually led 10-0 at the end of 15 minutes after rookie Ian Senter added a 27 yard field goal.

"Coach Gregg has this team believing in ourselves, much the same way coach Lichtenberg did with us last year at Morehead. A victory like this against Pittsburgh should go a long way in instilling confidence in this team," Bright said.

Last season the Bengals defense ranked last in the AFC in yards given up. They entered Sunday's contest ranked first in team defense allowing just 86 yards in two contests. It should also be pointed out that Cincinnati's offense ranked last going into the Pittsburgh game.

Bright feels an athlete entering the pro ranks from a college program that doesn't have national recognition is at an advantage, and under less pressure. "I really feel it's good for someone who wasn't on television a lot in college, to make it in professional football. It demonstrates that if people work hard, no matter what their job is, they will be rewarded," Bright said.

Bright went on to say, "Everybody

has their ups and downs, but they shouldn't let things get them really down, no matter what the odds, hard work will pay off, someone will notice. Sure I've been lucky, but I also hustle on every play, which will keep the coaches attention."

Bright entered the college ranks as a walk-on in 1975 from Butler High School in Louisville. He couldn't find a college willing to offer him a scholarship.

He was red-shirted at Morehead as a freshman, but stepped in the next year and played regularly. By the time he reached his senior season Bright had played under three different coaches and was the only member of his freshman class still on the team. He played through three losing seasons before Lichtenberg turned things around last year with a 5-4-1 mark.

Speaking about his skills, Bright said, "They drafted me because of my aggressiveness. That's the thing the coaches liked about me, and that's the thing they still like the most. But they also found out that I had some speed and quickness."

"I've had to work for most everything I've ever gotten," he said. "It's not any different for me now. Some guys might relax once they make the team, but I've still things to prove to myself and to people who had doubts that I could do it when I got drafted."

I feel pretty good about the way things have turned out, but I've never been the type of person that becomes complacent. I'm smart enough to know that if you make mistakes in the NFL they can still get rid of you."

Vikings Reach .500 Again By Beating Lewis Co., 26-7

Lewis County brought a 26.5 scoring average into its Thursday afternoon loss to Lewis County.

Before the game was over the Vikings had seven points, and Ray Graham, the Vikings head coach was upset that Lewis County had scored at all.

"We worked all week in practice to stop several plays that we knew they ran well and simply just didn't stop them Thursday."

One of the defensive lapses that Graham referred to came in a crucial part of the game. Lewis County faced a fourth and ten on the Vikings own 39, trailing 20-0, when quarterback Ernie Robinson hit Chris Evans with a pass down to the 10 yard line.

On the very next play Lion Terry Riley was in the end zone.

"I was bothered about the play that set up their touchdown, it's simply never heard has happened if off ends had put pressure on the quarterback. As it turned out Robinson had all the time he needed," Graham said.

The Rowan County defense prevented Lewis County from scoring early by recovering two first quarter Lion fumbles.

The second fumble occurred on the Viking 17 yard line.

Sixteen plays later, Marvin Adkins scored from six yards out for the games first touchdown.

"The Vikings needed a fake punt on fourth and five near mid-field mark to keep the drive alive."

Lowell Thompson ran a sweep around the right end to the 40 yard line of Lewis County for the first down.

Two plays later when Rowan County faced a third and nine situation on the 39, Viking quarterback Chuck Davis found Bill Brock open near the 20. The junior caught the pass and was downed on the 15. Four plays later Adkins paid it.

On the second Lion play from scrimmage following the touchdown, Brock intercepted a Robinson pass and returned the ball 57 yards for another Viking score.

Davis threw to Randy Riddle for the two point conversion to give the Vikings a 14-0 lead.

Rowan County scored on their first possession of the second half. The Vikings took over on their own 26 yard line after stopping the Lions on downs.

Two plays later, Bill Brock burst into the clear for a 40 yard score. The point after touchdown gave Rowan County a 20-7 lead.

The Vikings scored one last time with about five minutes left in the game. Lowell Thompson capped off a four play, 55 yard drive with a 29 yard sweep around left end.

Graham admits the Vikings were fortunate to win. "We got some lumps early, but we also got in some good lumps on defense. We still made some mental mistakes and we can't afford to make those kind of mistakes this week against East Carter," Graham said.

The Viking head coach pointed out

that Lewis County scored 27 points in a loss to Russell. "And I'm sure they expected to put more than seven points on the scoreboard against us," Graham said.

Graham thought the offensive line has improved somewhat. "They are starting to come around, but we still had our share of mistakes. The team really wanted to win their first sub-district game," Graham said.

Lewis County ran 61 plays, compared to just 54 for Rowan County.

Both Adkins and Thompson gained over 100 yards on the afternoon. Adkins racked up 102 yards, and Thompson had 101.

Brock, with just four attempts, totaled 66 yards.

All told the Vikings gained 263 yards on the ground.

Davis threw just two times, and each time he was successful. He totaled 26 yards in the air and both passes were in the first half.

The Lions quarterback, Robinson, received the most pressure he has faced all season and his statistics prove it. He completed just 12 of 32 passes for 134 yards, and he had two interceptions. Brock snatched both of them for the Vikings.

Lewis County passed more times Thursday than they ran, 32-29.

The Lions did total 104 yards on the ground with Terry Riley getting 69 yards on 16 carries and Charlie Thompson totaled 42 yards on eight rushes.

Graham said he was pleased with the Vikings aggressiveness Thursday, but added "We still haven't arrived as far as playing with intensity for the whole game, and that type of complacency can get you beat."

The Fleming County Panthers shuffled their feet a little Friday night, but finally succeeded in taking Step Two toward post-season action with a 21-0 victory over Bath County.

Step One was an earlier sub-district win over Henry County. Step Three will come later, when the Panthers face their last sub-district foe, Carroll County, in Flemingsburg, Oct. 17.

Coach Ted Purcell said his team was "flat" Friday night. During practice last week Purcell said the players took it for granted that the Wildcats would provide them with another easy victory. "I told them all week that Bath County was a real football team," he said. "I guess they didn't believe me, but they're better now. Bath County came to play tonight."

The Panthers compounded their own flatness by turning away the football while within certain scoring distance on their first offensive series. The 'Cats scored late in the first half.

Fleming County ended the zeroes with a typical sustained drive that ended with 3:25 left in the half when Mark Hawkins burrowed in from the one, but Hawkins was short and wide to the left with the extra point kick and it was still just 6-0 at halftime.

During the intermission, many of the Panther-partisan Homecoming crowd must have wondered what was happening. It seems a safe bet that someone in the stands must have pointed to the absence of star Running Back Buddy Lewis, who did not dress for the game because of his recurring knee problems.

There was a hole in that theory, however, and it was named Mike Ishmael. By halftime, Ishmael had totaled the ball 13 times for 67 yards.

Another possibility was that the Homecoming hoopla, rather than firing the Panthers up, served as a distraction.

Purcell admitted that was possible after the game.

"Whatever the reasons, Fleming County found itself in a dogfight for three quarters or more. Then, on the first play of the final stanza, Quarterback Timmy Williams tried only his fifth pass of the night and got only his second completion. It was a biggie, going for 62 yards and a touch-down to Curtis Jackson. Fleming County then made up for the earlier missed extra point when Williams carried it himself for two.

Trailing 14-0 in the last frame, the 'Cats might have been forgiven had they lain down for the night. After all,

the Panther defense had just completed its nineteenth consecutive quarter without allowing a point. Instead of laying down, though, Bath County took the kickoff and rolled downfield, coming as close as anyone to breaking the Fleming County defense's scoreless skein. In fact, Bath County punched it into the end zone on fourth and goal from the one, but a motion penalty pulled it back, and the 'Cats could score on fourth and goal from the six.

The Panthers thus inherited the ball on downs, and used that series to score the game's last touchdown. A couple of turf-bound bursts and a 15-yard loss

from Williams to June Handy, the safety valve on a broken play, moved the ball away from the confines of the Panther end zone. Then Williams, wanting to pass, rolled out to his left, waited as long as he could for a receiver to come open, and finally had to evacuate the pocket. Down the left sideline he scrambled, then cut back toward the middle and waited for three much-needed blockers at about mid-field, and it was on to the end zone, where Williams crossed the goal line with just 53 seconds to play. Hawkins succeeded in getting the kick between the posts this time, and Fleming County led 21-0.

The 66-yard spurt gave Williams 84 yards on the night, allowing him to beat out Ishmael, who was pretty well shut down in the second half, for game rushing honors by just two yards. Williams' rushing total was a tribute to his scrambling ability. Three times he was trapped trying to pass. Only once did he wind up with a loss, and that was the only three yards. Besides the only three yards, the other "trap" breakaway TD, the other "trap" resulted in a two-yard gain.

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District Judge Transforms Carp Into Gourmet Feast

Grocery store food cost is nothing new to District Judge, Jimmy Clay of Morehead. The good judge has been fighting the high prices of food items for most of his life.

Years ago, Judge Clay discovered there's a bounty of natural foods available that make delectable table-

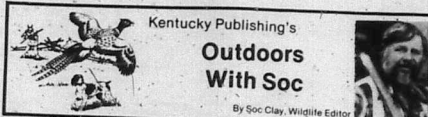
fare, much of it classed even in the gourmet style. Many of these delicious food items are being over-looked by today's cooks who have grown dependent of whatever food suppliers want to place on the shelves of the neighborhood grocery.

A country boy by origin, an outdoorsman by choice, Judge Clay has incorporated various styles of cooking and the preservation of foods that can cut down considerably on the total food budget. He's also not fussy about what he eats, learning a lot about other styles of cooking from a four-year hitch in the Marine Corps and stationed in the South Pacific during World War Two.

Famed as an outdoor cook in the Morehead area, Judge Clay has gained his reputation as an artist in culinary skills by making himself available to numerous political and civic functions where he readily accepts command of the kitchen, be it a modern inside facility or a crude pile of hot coals in the middle of the wilderness.

A master of Cajun cooking, the Judge has discovered the secrets of superb dining off the land, something the South Louisiana French folks are noted for all across the world.

One of the most abundant sources of food readily available to anyone who owns a fishing pole is the lowly carp. Originally imported from Asia as a food fish to feed the masses, the carp is indeed the most abundant of large size-

fish that swims in our fresh water lakes and streams today.

Anyone can catch a carp. All one has to do is place a doughball or a piece of prepared carp bait on a hook, sink it into 10 feet of water, let it lay on the bottom and wait for the nibble to come.

If you don't fish, chances are more than good that you know someone who does and would be more than glad to bring you a few carp — that is if you want to follow in the steps of Judge Clay who transforms this undesirable fish into a gourmet feast.

On a recent visit to Judge Clay's home in Morehead, he offered me a sampling of two very good smoked fish, identical in color and texture, he asked if I could determine the difference between smoked salmon which sells in the gourmet shops at a whopping \$14.00 per pound, or a fillet of smoked carp that only cost a few cents per pound.

Truthfully, I could not for the world of me tell any difference and must rely on the Judge's word as to what was what. I

know one thing, they both were delicious and served plain or in a variety of ways, make an excellent snack that will bring howls of delight at any occasion.

Since carp are so abundant in area waters and since the finished product is so tasty and inexpensive, we asked Judge Clay to share with us the way he transforms this ugly fish into such a delicious food item.

Here's the way he does it:

Select carp in the two to five pound size from clear waters. Fillet fish, leaving the skin on the outside. Remove mud vein in center of fillet. In a crock glass or plastic container large enough to hold 12 quarts, place 1 1/2 Cans of River salt (course canning salt will do), one cup of brown sugar and a couple of dashes of onion and garlic salt. (Note two cups of Morton's Sugar Cure is an excellent substitute for the above). Place fillets in crock and pour enough cold water over the fillets to cover.

Place in refrigerator overnight or as long as 48 hours. Remove fillets from the brine, place on a wire rack and allow to air dry for one hour. (When dried, a tacky film will form on the fillets which is required before the fillets will take smoke).

After the fillets are dried, place on racks in smoker, skin side towards the heat and using prepared hickory sawdust, smoke at 175-200 degrees for 8 to 12 hours. About three changes of the prepared material is required for this length of time.

If you do not own a smoker, turn your oven to 150 degrees and bake fillets with liquid smoke for 8 hours. Check doneness by flaking fillet with a fork.

When done, allow to cool, then wrap fillets loosely in foil and store in refrigerator. Smoked carp will remain in good shape for a month. If longer storage is required, simply freeze the packages after making sure there is no torn places in the foil that will allow freezer burn.

While Judge Clay recommends smoked carp as a gourmet treat, he also recommends the carp as an excellent source of recreational pleasure.

Preferring to harvest his own fish for smoking, Judge Clay enjoys fishing for carp in Cave Run Lake. "Find a cove

that is 10 to 12 feet deep for daytime fishing (four to six feet for night time angling) and put a dough ball or cheese ball (Velveta is good) on a #4 size hook. Fish the bait on bottom and chances are good you'll be in the action pretty fast," Judge Clay said.

Another excellent source of carp for smoking is how fishing which occurs each spring. Archers harvest carp by the hundreds and most of them wind up fertilizing area fields. The Morehead jurist believes that this method of harvesting the overpopulated carp is an ideal form of recreation and one of the handiest ways to obtain large amounts of carp fillets there is.

An active member of the Kentucky Long Rifle Association, Judge Clay is often called on to prepare a variety of unusual food items for occasions when modern day mountain men gather. He can do wonders with a mess of squirrel or rabbits. Grouse and quail cuisine are specialties to him and he's enjoying the idea of smoked rattlesnake for his next venture into outdoor cooking.

One thing sure, we're betting that the outcome will be something to brag about as the colorful judge from Rowan County spreads good cheer and great foods among those fortunate enough to have an invitation to one of his feasts.

Kentucky Afield

Even though we've had some September days with temperatures in the 90s, fall is definitely in the air. Days are noticeably shorter now, mornings are likely to be foggy and there's a certain quality to the late afternoon light that veils the summertime temperatures.

Something similar is happening below the surface of our lakes and streams. Although water temperatures have dropped only slightly, fish are beginning to stir around more, feed a little more heavily and more often. Like us, they can sense that winter is approaching.

Fishermen are coming back to the docks now with both heavier strings and happier expressions than they did during July and August, when the anglers who braved the heat generally got little for their efforts except sunburn.

We are right now on the threshold of what is generally one of the best fishing times of the year. From now until really cold weather sets in, anglers have a good chance of finding active, aggressive fish — and finding them in shallow water, where they're easy to fish for and catch.

Fall is also a great time to be outdoors. Many days are crisp and cool, with bright blue skies which complement the golds, yellows and reds of autumn foliage.

The fall fisherman has another advantage over his summer counterpart — fewer people. Vacationers have gone home, water skiers have quit until next year and many sportsmen, lured away

from the water by squirrel, dove or bow deer hunting, have turned to other pursuits, leaving the fall fisherman relatively undisturbed.

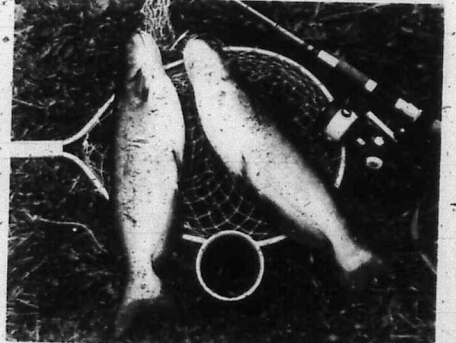
Spinner baits and buzz baits seem particularly productive in the fall. If you're fishing lakes such as Kentucky or Barkley, watch for what the local anglers call "popcorn" — small bait fish dimpling the surface like someone popping corn underwater. Run a buzz bait through this school of bait and most likely you'll attract largemouth bass that was following the smaller fish looking for an easy meal.

In deep, clear lakes like Cumberland or Dale Hollow, Kentucky bass will school off vertical banks, suspending out in the lake from between 15 to 25 feet deep and from 20-30 feet off the rocky wall. They are easy to spot on a depth finder and will strike a small jig dropping slowly among them.

As the water cools, these fish will move closer and closer to the bank until, when winter sets in, they are holding tight against the rock walls.

Don't overlook fall stream fishing, either. Some surprisingly small creeks around Kentucky hold good population of smallmouth bass. These waters (compared to our large, popular lakes) don't get that much fishing pressure and autumn is an excellent time to fish flowing water.

In short, don't put your boat and your tackle in storage just yet — there's a couple of months — at least — of good fishing left in 1980.

year in an attempt to offset the affects of inflation on tax bills, boards were given the options of going with 1) the compensating rate, which provides the same revenue each year; 2) the 4 percent higher rate or 3) subsection II, an assessment reflecting the inflation rate.

Funds generated by the compensating rates would be \$361,252; 4 percent, \$374,309 and sub section II, \$454,829.

Chairman of the Board Gene White suggested the board either go with the high or low rate, as the 4 percent figure is not that much different from the compensating rate.

A tax bill for a property owner with an assessment of \$100,000 would differ \$43 between the high and low rate and \$37 between the middle and upper rates.

Dr. Warren Proudfoot called house bill 44, "Like radiation, accumulative." He explained, "You're not just facing the problem this year, you're going to face it next year and the next year."

Until that legislation is changed, he said, it would "break the back of every school in the state."

He suggested that the board is obligated to take the higher rate, and in doing so, the required hearing would bring out the public and they would "be responsible even as much as the board is."

After some discussion on public in-

volvement, the board decided to table action and set a special meeting, not a legal hearing, about the subject.

The board officially approved phase II of construction for the senior high school after a report by Stan Klausung, Leon Browning Architect.

Klausung described the phase as the foundation work to support all the walls. Cost is expected to be about the same as for phase I, or \$210,000.

The board will open bids for the phase Oct. 9 at 2 p.m. at the Holiday Inn. A pre-bid meeting will be Sept. 30 at 1:30 p.m. at the site.

In an update of groundwork procedures, Nick Varney, construction manager, said Ensor Excavating of Mt. Sterling is on schedule and "working intelligently." He announced the arrival in Morehead of Art Hoffman, field construction manager, job superintendent. Hoffman is living in a trailer at the construction site on the Old Flemingsburg Road.

In the only other business of the special called meeting, an educational improvement plan prepared by Watt White and staff was approved and submitted to the state department of education for approval.

The outline proposal suggests ways of advancing objectives revealed in testing in fourth grade and sixth grade spelling, eighth grade math and eleventh grade study skills.

Brook said the plan is mandated by legislature but funds are not provided.

that it would be best to terminate the matter at this point."

Despite that agreement, charges were brought before the Rowan County grand jury which returned no indictment. Ewers' attorney was also permitted to present evidence to the grand jury and a defense of many of the same allegations later contained in an attorney general's report.

It was a letter from Ewers' wife, Irene, which initiated the state police investigation through the attorney general's office.

The attorney general's report contained a memorandum, dated Nov. 2, one day after Ewers' letter firing Ewers, from Graham to Norfleet alleging misappropriation of university funds by Ewers.

That memo identified six university activities where concessions were sold—ballgames and concerts—and some funds were allegedly unaccounted for. The memo listed a total of \$2,086 in missing funds for events from Sept. 16, 1978 through Oct. 28, 1978.

Graham said in the memo, "We have taken every step possible to disprove our suspicions. However, there is no doubt in our minds that a misappropriation of funds has taken place. It is my recommendation that the facts that we have been presented to the commonwealth attorney and to let him determine if this situation should be turned over to the grand jury for possible indictment. It is my recommendation that Ewers be terminated immediately. I will personally assume the responsibilities for the supervision of the cafeteria and the concession operation."

Graham added, "Very little is done, if anything, by Mr. Ewers in the way of purchasing and this will not create any hardship in the division of purchasing."

During the course of testimony to the state police in the attorney general's report, Ewers said he signed the letter admitting to mishandling funds on the advice of his attorney. He said he took the money home from the concessions during the weekends so his wife and he could count it and put it in bundles. Ewers told the state police he would always give the money to the concessions manager Monday morning and added, "I never did handle the money last, he always handled it last. So, I signed this letter with that understanding."

Ewers later added, "I admitted that I had erroneously handled (money) because they thought and had made the statement that because I had taken the money home at night, that was the wrong way to handle it but I live right beside the stadium and at night, there is a security station not a hundred yards from the apartment where I lived and I had always made up with them and told them on which weekends I would have money at home and to be careful and so on."

Richardson in making his recommendation that the board hire an attorney said the whole situation grew out of the Ewers incident and that neither side—either Ewers or the university—could get "a criminal court to provide a forum."

He said Bryan should determine if Ewers "owes the taxpayers of the state of Kentucky any money."

Richardson said he felt the "situation was handled badly from the beginning" and that the investigation by Bryan would permit the matter "to be laid to rest and the university be rid of it."

Bryan presumably would charge the board for work by the hour and would begin as soon as possible after being hired.

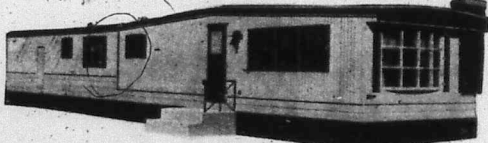

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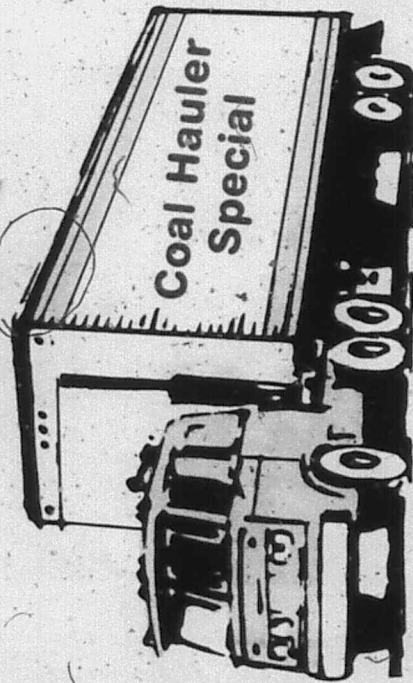
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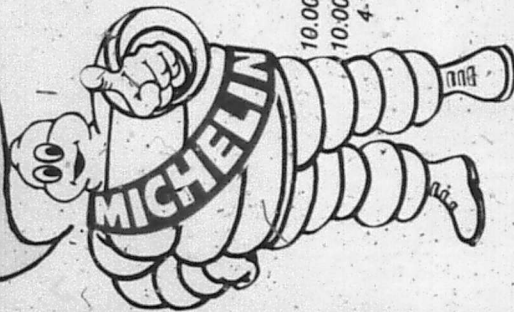

It took 1,000 miles for a 30-second scene

John Hurt made a 1,000-mile trip, with three stopovers, to film a scene that takes exactly 30 seconds in "Crime and Punishment," the idiosyncratic portraits for four-part series that opens Masterpiece Theater's 10th season on Sunday, Sept. 28 on PBS.

Hurt plays Raskolnikov in the Dostoevsky classic thriller about a penniless student obsessed with the idea that he is so superior to others that he can commit murder without suffering guilt or penalty for his crime. Raskolnikov's delusion is put to the test by an examining magistrate (Timothy West) who patiently permits the murderer to trap himself.

This is another in a series of idiosyncratic portraits for four-part series that opens Masterpiece Theater's 10th season on Sunday, Sept. 28 on PBS.

the production staff to find all the locations. Even then, some special effects had to be created.

For instance, a scene in which Raskolnikov gazes out over the gray Neva River to the elegant homes and onion-domed churches on the far bank was all shot on film in London's East End with the aid of a little paint and glass.

"We put a sheet of glass between the camera and the view," explains Powell. "We painted in the buildings that we wanted to appear on the glass and painted out the bits we didn't - like Millwall docks. It's an old trick, simple but effective."

Just how effective it is was indicated by glowing reviews of "Crime and Punishment" when it aired on the BBC. In addition to an enthusiastic reception for the performances of Hurt and West, for Jack Pulman's script and for the production as a whole, critics went out of their way to comment on the settings. The London Daily Express noted, "The early crowd scenes in the streets of St. Petersburg in the 1860s grittily capture the savage struggle to survive in a country ridden by feudalism."

In the "1,000-mile scene," the down-at-the-heels Raskolnikov pushes his way through a crowded market square, pauses to stare at his reflection in a pond; then hurries down a flight of stairs to the house of an old pawnbroker.

This 30-second sequence was filmed in three separate locations: the market in the quadrangle of the Naval college in Greenwich, South London; the pond on the grounds of a private house near Salisbury, Wiltshire, and the pawnbroker's shabby tenement in a poverty pocket of Edinburgh.

Director Michael Darlow hasn't forgotten the tem-

porary trauma he experienced before the locations were found. "When I came on the project and was faced with the task of re-creating the atmosphere of St. Petersburg more than 100 years ago, my first reaction was to think 'Help,'" he says.

Looking back on it all, producer Jonathan Powell says, "Actually, it could have been the pawnbroker's shabby tenement in a poverty pocket of Edinburgh. Petersburg notwithstanding, it took several months for

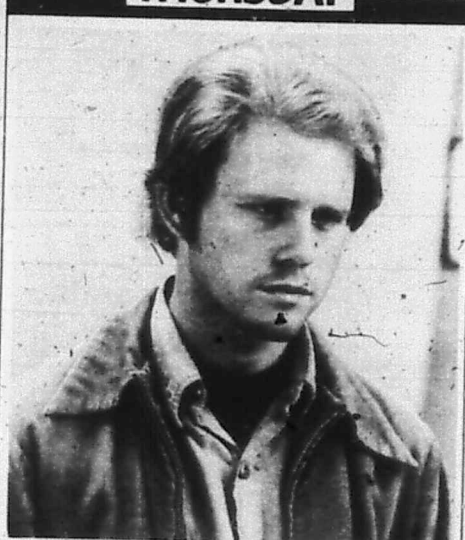

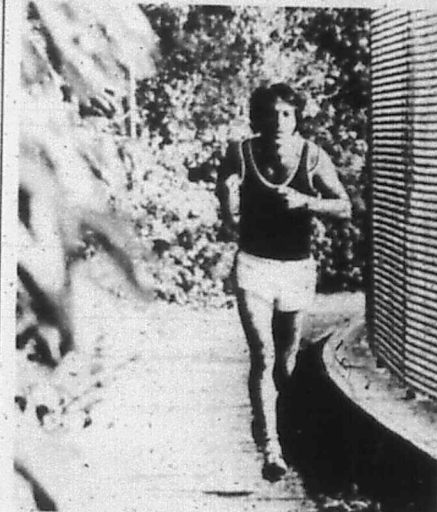
