MSU Students Are Victims Of Prank...

He Gave Them The Shirt Off His Back, But Not His Pants

State police at Morehead are investigating an apparent prank which could result in its perpetrators being charged with armed robbery, kidnaping and terroristic threatening.

The unusual incident began Sunday night, Oct. 5, while Lenville Martin, a Morehead State University freshman from West Liberty, and a female companion, Joanna Bentley, an Ashland freshman, were parked in her car at KY 826, near Cave Run Dam.

About 11 p.m. as Martin and Bentley were sitting the car, two women with panty hose on their heads approached the vehicle, one on each side and ordered the couple to get out of the car.

Martin told police that one of the women had a .38-caliber revolver. The women, both described as being husky, then ordered Martin to an offensive tackle on the MSU football squad, to take off his pants and his boots.

Trooper Frank Merritt, who is investigating the case, said that Martin refused to remove his pants. "He advised them he would rather die first," Merritt said.

After a lengthy debate, during which the women attempted to persuade Martin to take off his pants, a compromise was reached in which Martin agreed to take off only his shirt.

Bentley said in a telephone interview Friday the women gave Martin "my mom's quilt" which was in her car. Martin also was allowed to keep his jacket.

The women then forced Bentley to drive them away in her white Monte Carlo. As they reached the main roadway, one of the women got out of Bentley's auto into a blue Datsun 280Z.

The other woman, with the stocking still over her head, forced Bentley to drive her to campus where she took Bentley's wallet containing \$50 and identification cards. The woman then got into a yellow Ford LTD and left.

Although Bentley said she took the incident "as if it was maybe just a prank," she admitted, "It did scare me." She said Merritt she kept her eyes straightly ahead the entire time and could not tell if anyone else was in the yellow Ford.

Bentley said she did not see a gun. But Merritt told her there was one and "I took it for granted it was there," she said.

Meanwhile, Martin, who was stranded at Cave Run, with no shirt, hitched a ride back to campus. He told police he had no trouble getting a ride when he told the driver what had happened to him.

Thinking the entire incident was a joke, involving his girlfriend, Martin went to bed at his dorm, Downing Hall.

To Bentley, however, the matter was far from being a joke. In the interview Friday, her voice had a slight tone of disgust when she said her boyfriend "went off and went to bed on me."

Bentley was a little more concerned about her friend, however. She said she drove back to the lake twice to try to

find him, spending about an hour and a half in the search.

Later in the evening, Bentley phoned Martin at his dorm and told him was not a prank. Together, they reported the incident to state police at the Morehead post about 3 a.m.

As one might imagine, authorities were skeptical of the report at first, apparently thinking that Bentley may have been involved in a prank on Martin. But they initiated an investigation nonetheless.

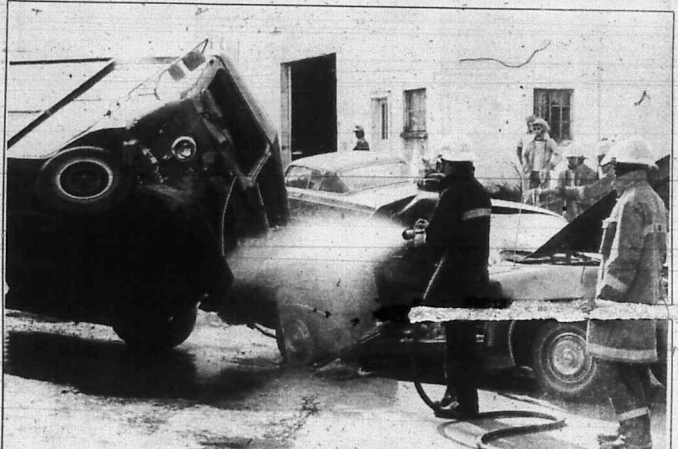
The letter included Bentley's cards and but not her \$50. The "Partners in Crime" thanked the couple for the use of the articles and apologized for the inconvenience.

As it turned out, the sorority sisters said they had to do the whole thing over again because they misplaced Martin's shirt (they had left it in Bentley's car).

Bentley said she did not appreciate the prank and said she would press charges.

Merritt said of the case, "We know it's a prank now, but she (Bentley)

Two Die In Separate Accidents

Two men are dead following separate auto accidents Friday and Saturday on KY 32 west of Morehead.

The first accident occurred about 10 a.m. Friday 4.7 miles west of Morehead near the intersection of KY 32 and KY 158. That wreck claimed the life of Sanford Skaggs, 85, of Hillsboro.

State Trooper Jim Cooper, who investigated the accident, said that Skaggs pulled from a side road into the path of a United Parcel Service truck driven by Sammy Wallingford, 31, of Maysville.

Cooper said that Wallingford locked up his truck to avoid striking Skaggs' vehicle but hit it in the passenger side.

The force of the impact carried the vehicles into another car parked alongside the road. The driver of that car, Bobby Adkins, 44, of Michigan, was not injured. Wallingford was treated and released at St. Claire Medical

Center.

The UPS truck overturned on its side. Fuel was spilled from the wreckage, prompting the appearance of the Morehead, Volunteer Fire Department to water down the roadway. The UPS truck was also said to have been carrying ammunition.

The second accident took place Saturday night at 10:30 about 2.5 miles west of Morehead on KY 32 and resulted in the death of 24-year-old Craig W. Crawford of Whippoorwill Valley, Morehead.

State police said that Crawford's auto exploded and burst into flames after being struck in the rear by a 1969 Ford pickup truck driven by Donald Gregory, 32, of Rt. 4, Morehead.

Crawford died in the flaming wreckage but Corner Jim Barker, said death was not instantaneous. Gregory was admitted to the Veterans Hospital in Lexington

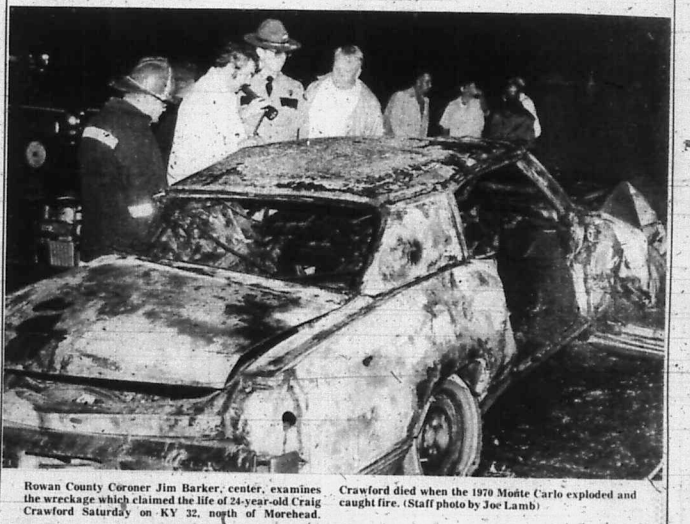
and a passenger in his truck, Richard Collins, 29, of Erlanger, was taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he was listed in good condition Monday.

Police said Crawford and Gregory were both east bound on KY 32 at the time of the accident and were traveling at a high rate of speed. Both drivers had reportedly left a party together.

"When Crawford came upon another vehicle on KY 32 he locked up his auto to avoid striking the car in the rear. As he did so, Gregory's truck plowed into the side and rear of Crawford's 1970 Monte Carlo."

Police said alcohol was a contributing factor in the wreck but they added that no charges had been filed as of Monday.

Rowan County Disaster and Emergency Service units and the Morehead Volunteer Fire Department were on the scene.

Sewer Plant Nearly Ready To Open

Morehead Utility Plant Board's new waste water treatment plant is nearing the point where it will be able to handle all the utility system's waste.

Bob Williams, chief operator of the sewer plant, said Thursday, during a regular meeting of the Plant Board, that the contractor would like to have the plant start operating at full capacity Friday, Oct. 18.

Actually, the contractor, Shook Inc., would like to have opened the plant even sooner because it is having to pay \$250 in liquidated damages each day since it failed to have the plant completed on July 1.

The damages are being withheld by the Plant Board's engineer, Howard K. Bell. Williams said Thursday that it is Bell's contention the Plant Board should get the liability of Shook's back as soon as possible.

Plant Board members have expressed worries about the willingness of Shook to complete the plant promptly once the damage clause is removed and the plant is certified as being substantially complete.

Williams said the contractor does not yet have the plant ready for automatic control because the computer is not fully operational. But he said it could be

operated manually if the plant went ahead and started receiving waste from the plant near Morehead.

Once the present plant is decommissioned, Williams said the new treatment center would be getting as much waste as a regular plant as it is now getting in a month. But Plant Board members pointed that once the old plant is taken out of service there is no turning back.

Bell is to meet with Shook this week and review the status of the plant, Williams said.

In other matters Thursday, the plant board accepted a low bid from Brandeis Machinery of Lexington for a new gas-powered air compressor. That company had the lowest bid of six received with \$7,584.82 for a 175-horse power machine. The highest bid, from Wayne Supply, was \$10,985 for a 185-horse power diesel air compressor.

A Brandeis representative said the machine lists for \$14,000.

Bids were also opened for contractors for painting a vacant building on First Street the utility purchased as an office.

One side of the two-story-block structure had not been painted by the original owners because there is not

enough room for scaffolding between that property and the adjacent land owner, Grace Slory.

Slory has agreed to permit the Plant Board to paint the building now, however.

The lowest of four bids came from Donigold of Clearfield, who offered to do the job for \$992. The highest bid from Jackson Builders, was for \$1,643.

Meanwhile, the Plant Board still has made no decision as to whether it will actually occupy the building or not.

Some members of Morehead City Council had criticized the purchase of the building as not being in the best interest of the city. And Board Member Curley Barker said he would prefer to see the utility build a new office.

The city has offered to provide the Plant Board with part of its lot on the corner of First Street and South Wilson Avenue if the utility will agree to pave all the property for a municipal parking lot.

Barker has come up with drawings for the new office and price estimates for building it. He estimated the structure could be built for about \$70,000.

Maloney's Acquires 29-Store Chain

MT. STERLING — Maloney Enterprises, Inc. has acquired 100 percent of the corporate stock of S-Mart and the Southern Dollar discount store chain, according to Charles Padgett, President and Owner of Maloney's.

The purchase was finalized today for an undisclosed amount, between Maloney's and S-Mart, Inc. of Kentucky, the parent company of Southern Dollar Stores which is based in Richmond. Twenty-nine discount stores were acquired in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Tennessee, and West Virginia, bringing the total number of stores owned by Maloney's to 45.

The Richmond S-Mart office and warehouse will be closed and moved to Maloney's headquarters in Mt. Sterling.

"The new stores fit us well in their

geographic relationship to our present stores and will make us even more dominant in our trading areas," Padgett said.

Padgett also said the sales-expense relationship of Maloney's would improve with the acquisition and added that projected sales for the next fiscal year are estimated at \$70 million.

He also noted that Maloney's realized record sales and profits for the fiscal year ending last July 31.

The S-Mart Stores will be totally converted to the Maloney's discount merchandising concept and will be operated under the Maloney's name.

These are located in the Kentucky counties of Cumberland, Inez, Irvine, Letchfield, Liberty, Manchester, Martin, Neon, Paintsville, Russell

Springs and Whitesburg. There are two stores in Tennessee, at Oneida and Livingston, and in West Virginia at Gilbert and Bluewell.

The Southern Dollar Stores will become "Mr. D — The Discount King." They are located in Kentucky in Beattyville, Corbin, Covington, Harlan, Mt. Vernon, Russell Springs, Salyersville, Springfield, and Whitley City. There are three stores in Cincinnati and one in Oneida, Tennessee.

Over the past year, Maloney's stores have opened in Berea, Inez, Olive Hill, Prestonsburg, Stanton and Whitesburg in Kentucky and in Norton, Virginia.

The nine original Maloney's stores are in Mt. Sterling, Morehead, West Liberty, Jackson, Irvine, Hazard, and Grayson, Kentucky, and in Williams and Kermit, West Virginia.

their blood. None of those things were true.

Now a Menifee County family has fallen victim to an apparent prank which may be related to the rumors in Rowan County.

Mr. and Mrs. Guy Robinson told police Friday night that their home on Leatherwood Road in rural Menifee County was the site of some unusual activity.

It seems that someone started a small fire in their driveway and painted

crosses on several trees in the yard.

She Robinson, in an interview with the News, said she, her husband and her stepson were home at the time.

Mrs. Robinson said it all started when she heard what sounded like several owls in the woods near their home, which is located at the end of a long drive off Leatherwood Rd.

The Robinsons live in a tri-level home and when she went out on the front porch deck, the owls quieted down. Mrs. Robinson said one owl then sounded off

the deck. She said she went back inside, thinking no more of the sounds.

Her husband later saw flicker of light from a window. He then found a lamp-size fire had been started in the driveway of the home.

Mr. Robinson fired a couple of warning shots into the air when he thought he saw someone leaving the drive. None of the Robinsons heard any sounds from a vehicle.

The Robinsons found a rock on their steps with a cross painted on it as well as four other crosses painted on trees in the yard. Two of the trees were close to the front of the house and two others were side by side about 30 feet away from the house.

The crosses, which were done with white spray paint, were about 12 inches tall with a 12-inch cross member.

The Robinson's son, who did not want his name printed, said the fire was started about 20 to 25 feet away from

You talk about trying to get out on the Connector at 4 a.m. We, the people of Kentucky, make and set the laws, not the police. We put up the speed signs and we pay them—the police—to enforce them. So don't blame them for doing what we pay them to do.

Harassment. You don't know the meaning. I know one officer whose enemies tried to set his house on fire with his wife and kids in it. The dog ran them off and there were two, five-gallon cans of gas at each door.

I know one little kid who came home and asked her dad why she had no friends at school because her dad was a cop. And the phone calls at night threaten them because they do a job no one else can or will do. That, my friend, is harassment.

Yes, I agree we have a fine Kentucky State Police. But it's nice to know that the city of Morehead (police) will come out in the county if the state doesn't have anyone to come. Some people don't know it, but the city police and Morehead State University security police have the same powers in our county as the state police do in the city. Check the law on it as I did.

You know it's funny, but people like the law as long as the law doesn't stop them or arrest them. And then they (the officers) are PIGS.

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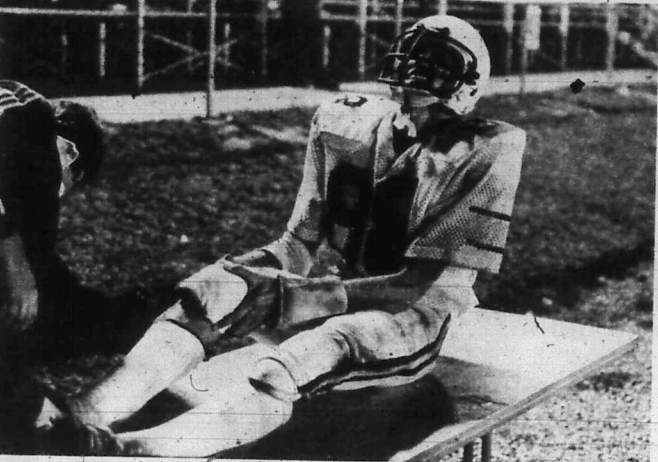

The Vikings had trouble last season against Pineville, winning by just seven points, 13-6.

The less than ideal conditions were two starters absent from the field.

The Vikings looked a little flat at times and awesome as ever at others in blasting Bethel. "We may have been looking ahead and behind at the same time," Gartin said. "We're looking forward to Farmers, sure, but these kids still haven't come down from beating Fleming County, either."

"Morehead made an instant mistake by letting the opening kickoff roll; it was recovered by the Eagles. The Viking defense refused to let Bethel take advantage, however, and Andy Thompson scored the game's first touchdown by barreling 47 yards on Morehead's first play after taking the ball on downs. Cameron Kenney passed to Steve Back for the conversion.

Thompson got his only other touchdown on the Vikings' next possession, scoring from 32 yards away with 1:47 left in the first quarter. Then, after a long but unsuccessful Bethel series, Kenney ended a typical Viking drive with a five-yard score.

The Vikes came within an eyelash of scoring again on their fourth possession, and it wasn't the Eagle defense that stopped them. It was the clock. Bruce Cecil set up the near score by intercepting a Bethel pass at the Eagle 46 and returning it to the 15. Two plays later, Thompson was stopped at the one, and the half was over before Morehead could get another play off.

Early in the third quarter, Jeff Gessity set up the next Morehead score with a 31-yard trip to the Bethel 11. The

score itself was turned in by Kenney from a yard out. On the conversion, Kenney handed off to Back, who hit Jimmy Livingood for the conversion, making it 28-0 with 5:32 left in the third quarter.

Exactly three minutes and 21 seconds later, the Eagles salvaged some pride from the loss by becoming the first club this year to score on the Viking defense.

It was set up when Daran Razor returned the kickoff 68 yards to the four. The stingy Morehead defenders nearly kept their slate clean, allowing just one yard on three straight shots up the middle, but then Razor hit Barry Fryman in the end zone right flat on fourth down. Razor made it 28-8 with the conversion.

If Bethel had thoughts of a comeback at that point, they were quickly squelched. Shortly after the kickoff, Thompson found open field again, going down at the Bethel four only after a 52-yard spurt. David Morris took it in from there. Morehead used the option pass again, except Back's target this time was Larry Early.

The clubs paced off a scoreless fourth quarter, although the Vikes nearly got another six points on a 47-yard pickoff return by Thompson. It was negated, however, when Morehead was called for roughing the passer on the play.

Morehead's record is now 7-0, while Bethel drops to 3-3.

The nightcap started with a bang when Pirate Chris Erwin fumbled the opening kickoff at his own 10, noticeably throwing the Farmers coverage off balance. Erwin used that to his advantage by scooping up the football and streaking 90 yards for a touchdown. Luckily for Farmers, Salt Lick was guilty of clipping at midfield.

Three plays later, Salt Lick faced a fourth-and-16 at its own 29. Pirate Coach Lonnie Vice would later say going for it in such a situation is "worth the gamble" because "in junior high, you're only going to move it 15 to 30 yards upfield with a punt." This time, though, the gamble didn't pay off. Elwood Hamilton sacked Quarterback Phillip Barber at the 23. Austin Peay Halts Eagles In Second Half, Earn 23-21 Victory

Morehead State lost its second Ohio Valley Conference game Saturday night, 23-21 to Austin Peay.

The Eagles are now 2-5 overall.

Austin Peay quarterback Sonny DeFilippis demonstrated why he is the leading total offensive player in the OVC by running for two touchdowns and adding a 69 yard touchdown pass.

All told, DeFilippis accounted for 362 yards on the evening. He entered the contest averaging 192.5 yards a game.

The Eagles simply had too many problems on offense. They totaled 235 yards, well below their average of 277 and over 100 yards less than opponents of Austin Peay had averaged in four games this season.

"We simply didn't execute," Eagle coach Tom Lichtenberg said.

Lichtenberg went on to say, "The quarterback-center exchange problem really hurt us as we were trying to score. We didn't block the way we were supposed to, and twice we didn't even run the formation we sent in from the bench."

"I know we're young, and I'm tired of using that as an excuse, and I told the kids after the game that we're making mistakes that we shouldn't be making. I said before that we can't make mental mistakes, and we didn't get out physicalized. I know we are young, but its time we stop making the mistakes we're making."

The Eagles first touchdown was set up by a fumble by Cosmo Cochran after a 24 run. Bill Vogel recovered for Morehead on the Austin Peay 44 yard line.

Bo Chambers caught his only pass of the evening on the first play from scrimmage, good for 21 yards.

Freshman Brian Shimer, who finished the evening as the Eagles second leading rusher with 39 yards, then picked up a tough two yards.

Area High School Football Roundup

When the Bath County Wildcats and Lewis County Lions took the field Friday night in Owensville, just about the only thing that was pride. Each team was heading nowhere in either its conference or its subdistrict, and each was riding a losing streak - the 'Cats of three and the Lions of four.

It was the Bath County streak that ended as the Wildcats delighted a rather sparse hometown crowd by rolling to a surprisingly easy 34-13 victory.

The offenses were a study in contrast. Bath County stayed on the ground, collecting 305 yards rushing against just eight passing; Lewis County went to the air 23 times, getting 169 of its 269 total offense yards through the sky. Three Wildcats collected 78 yards or more on the ground, led by Danny Warner's 124 yards, his third straight century game; the leading Lion rusher was Terry Riley with 55 yards. Comparing the quarterbacks, Bath County's John Lyons threw but eight times, the completing one, Ernie Robinson of the Lions, despite one string of six straight incompletions, connected on 12 of his 23 tries for 169 yards and a touchdown.

3 Eagles Suspended Athletic Official 'Not Pleased' About Suspension Ruling

Ohio Valley Conference commissioner Jim Delany announced last Thursday that three Morehead State University football players have been suspended along with six players from Middle Tennessee as a result of their actions during the brawl that broke out during a game between the two schools three weeks ago.

The Morehead players who were suspended are:
Chris Spaulding, a 6-foot-1, 180 pound, freshman defensive back from Louisville; two games.
Mike Ealey, a 6-2, 241 pound junior offensive guard from Washington, D.C., one game.
Ray Yates, a 6-3, 250 pound sophomore offensive tackle from Trotwood, Ohio, one game.

The fact that the suspensions were issued just two days before the Eagles game last Saturday against Austin Peay, and a full 12 days following the

incident, upset both the Morehead head football coach and the athletic director. "If our players were judged to be wrong, then I think the commissioner did the right thing. I do believe it was unfair to tell us just two days before our next game, after those players had been practicing all week," said Tom Lichtenberg, the Eagle coach.

Morehead State athletic director, G. E. (Sonny) Moran, thought the suspensions against Morehead were unfair.

"I wasn't pleased with the timing of the announcement, with the start of the initial investigation or with the assessing of the penalties. I also wasn't pleased with the severity levied against our athletes," Moran said.

The athletic director went on to say, "I think the commissioner had a through investigation and he tried to be objective, however it's an impossible task to please everyone. I'm just not

happy with the result."
The brawl broke out in the game Sept. 27 when Middle Tennessee's Jerry Lockhart was returning a punt in the fourth quarter. After Lockhart was tackled near the Middle sideline, Morehead's Charlie Franklin, who was closing in on the play, jumped over two players and went out of bounds, slamming into a Middle player and knocking him to the ground.

Franklin also fell to the ground and was punched and kicked by some Middle players. The Morehead players on the field and on the bench, then charged across the field, resulting in several other altercations.

Franklin was reprimanded by Delany for "the unnecessarily rough manner in which he made contact with the Middle Tennessee player on the sidelines."
Delany said that had that action been seen clearly by a game official, it probably would have resulted in an unnecessary roughness penalty.

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Fly-In Disappointing, But Not Discouraging

Despite less than perfect weather conditions, about 2,000 people managed to come out for the second annual Fall Fly-In at Rowan County airport over the weekend.

Gateway Aviation Association, an area non-profit organization, sponsored the event. And club President Buddy Salyer said of the fly-in, "We're disappointed, but not discouraged."

Although there was no rain and temperatures were not that cold, strong winds Saturday prevented many activities from being staged at the airport and kept many pilots from coming to the airport.

Anywhere from 40 to 50 pilots did make the trip and they gave spectators a chance to see their aircraft closeup. Some of the pilots offered rides to airport visitors and others put on acrobatic demonstrations.

In addition, the U.S. Marines brought in an OV-10D Bronco aerial observer. The Marines, who are stationed at New River, N.C., were enroute to California for a combined exercise.

Salyer had a lot of praise for the Marine pilot and observer who brought in the aircraft. He said the men were pleasant and accommodating, standing outside Saturday and Sunday and "answering the same question a thousand times." Salyer said he felt honored to have the men here.

Anywhere from 40 to 50 pilots visited the airport during the two-day event and several trophies were given away.

The trophies included: best classic, Richard Holbrook, Irvine, Ky.; a Swift, best handbuilt aircraft, Dennis Meadows, Charleston, W.Va.; a Baby Ace, best antique, James Burdett, Huntington, W.Va.; a Steermax, longest distance traveled to the fly-in, John Auxier, Lenoir City, Tenn., 250 miles; and first arrival, Joe Brown, London, Ky., who came to the airport about 8 a.m. Saturday.

Sam Meads of Charleston took two trophies for floor bombing and spot landing with his Baby Ace.

Because of the wind, many of the scheduled events could not be held. Some of the things cancelled included a hot air balloon, three gyrocopters, a sky-jumping demonstration, a fly-over by some Air Force bombers, and a visit by an AT-37 trainer.

As an indication of how bad the wind was Saturday, Salyer said the sky jumpers from the National Guard were unable to come Sunday because of an accident Saturday in Lexington. One of the divers broke a leg in a jump there.

Salyer said some of the things the fly-in did have were a visit by two National Guard helicopters, one gyrocopter from Cincinnati, and acrobatic demonstrations by pilots Sunday.

Salyer also said the Marine plane gave spectators a limited view of its jet Sunday.

Financially, Salyer indicated the event was only a moderate success. Only about \$300 in proceeds were realized, partly because of the bad weather.

He said about \$1,200 was taken in, but expenses such as advertising, trophies, toilets and other things such as food which could not be returned cut into the profits.

Salyer said one of the best things to come from the event is that Gateway Aviation now has a better idea of what, to do to stage a fly-in, including how to get support from the military.

Gateway Aviation also holds an annual spring fly-in at the airport.

Carter Had Warning About Afghanistan Invasion, CIA Analyst Tells MSU Class

Melvin A. Goodman, Senior Soviet Analyst, Office of Political Analysis, Central Intelligence Agency, said that in the case of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the warning time was there for President Carter.

He told a Morehead State University military science class Thursday that more than three weeks before the invasion, the CIA wrote a report which was provided to the White House and the National Security Council of the Soviet plans to invade Afghanistan with force.

"Our next mission was to try to determine what the motives were for the Soviet invasion and what the implications were of that part of the world," Goodman said.

He added that he would make the argument in terms of Afghanistan and the politics of the intervention, the Soviets intervened primarily for the negative consequences that would have resulted if they hadn't used force rather than any positive gains by using force.

"In other words, I am not arguing and it is not the CIA position that the

Soviet invasion of Afghanistan is part of that first step in a grand scheme to take over all of Southwest Asia including the oil deposits in the area of the Persian Gulf," Goodman added.

"Rather, that the Soviets were confronted with a series of problems in Afghanistan that would have resulted in negative consequences they were not willing to tolerate and therefore felt a need to use force."

Goodman described the negative consequence as the deterioration of all the major military and political institutions in Afghanistan that were primarily established with the help of the assistance of the Soviet Union.

Therefore they had a stake in the political structure in Afghanistan.

"The Soviets would have believed or

possibly did believe, that the international perception of the Soviet Union if they did not act to uphold their interest in Afghanistan would have been one of weakness," Goodman said.

"This was extremely important to the Soviet leadership because of the actual weakness they did show early in 1979 when China invaded Viet Nam. The Soviets not only did nothing about that invasion, but made it clear publicly and privately that Viet Nam had everything it needed to wage that war and therefore the Soviets were going to stay out of it."

He added that he thought the Soviets thought that was a show of weakness but in the case of Afghanistan, the Soviets felt they could do something about it.

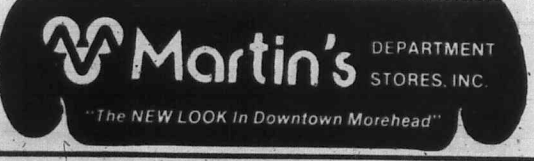

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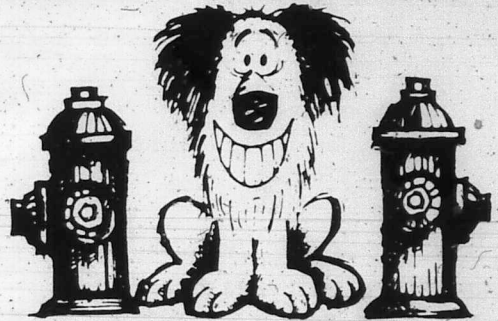

The Eastern Kentucky North Region dinner meeting was held at Morehead State University in Morehead on Wednesday, Oct. 8, with retiring Chairman Catherine Wells, chairman of the Elliott County Board of Education, presiding.

Dr. Rudy Dunningan, a member of the Ashland Independent Board of Education, was elected Vice-Chairman of the Region.

Harold Holbrook, Superintendent of the Carter County School District, was chosen as Secretary of the Eastern Kentucky North Region, succeeding Elliott County School Superintendent Eugene Bimon.

Kentucky Crop Report

Weather and General: September started with a continuation of the hot and dry weather experienced in August. After mid-September temperatures moderated and by late September cool temperatures and rainfall were experienced by Kentucky farmers. The rainfall received improved the soil moisture condition, but did little to improve crop prospects. Most crops had finished their growing season prior to receiving the rain. Double cropped soybeans were helped, but rain earlier in the month would have been more beneficial.

Corn: Estimated corn production is the lowest in 5 years. Production for Kentucky is forecast at 102.0 million bushels — down 23 percent from last year while unchanged from September 1. Yield per acre is estimated at 68 bushels, down 34 bushels from the 1979 record yield of 102 bushels, but unchanged from last month. Acreage intended for harvest as grain at 1.5 million acres is up 15 percent from last year. Yields are highly variable — by areas of the state and within a county and even between fields belonging to

the same farmer. The drought stricken Purchase Area of Western Kentucky had the overall poorest crop. As of October 5, corn harvest was 52 percent complete and advancing at one of the most rapid paces on record. Last year 17 percent had been harvested at this time while the 5-year average is 26 percent. Harvest is most advanced in the far-West where 91 percent of the corn has been harvested.

United States corn production is expected to total 6.47 billion bushels, down 17 percent from last year's record crop of 7.76 billion bushels and 1 percent below the September 1 estimate. Yield per acre is estimated at 99.8 bushels per acre compared with 109.4 last year.

Burley: The Kentucky burley crop is estimated at 388.5 million pounds, up 2 percent or 9.3 million pounds from September 1. The "harvesting and curing season has been nearly ideal and losses" from houseburn should be minimal. The expected 1980 crop is 25 percent above last year's short crop, but 84.9 million pounds below the 1980 effective quota. Yield per acre is estimated at 2,100 pounds, up 100 pounds from the very short 1979 crop and 50 pounds higher than last month. Harvested acres at 185,000 are up 19 percent from 1979. Late tobacco production in the favorable September weather, mousing of tobacco was virtually complete by October 1. Only 6 percent of the crop showed any houseburn as of October 5 and most of this was very light. Approximately 12 percent of the crop was cured and ready for stripping by October 5, and some farmers have started stripping.

Production in the Burley Belt is expected to total 553 million pounds. This is up 24 percent from last year's short crop but 11 percent below 1978. Yield per acre is estimated at 2014 pounds compared to 1,875 pounds last year. Kentucky production accounts for 70 percent of the Burley Belt total.

Soybeans: Production of soybeans in Kentucky is forecast at 36.8 million bushels, a decrease of 32 percent from last year and down 4 percent from September 1. Yield per acre is estimated at 23 bushels per acre, down 9.5 bushels from last year and 1 bushel below September 1. This is the smallest yield since 1964. Acreage for harvest is estimated at 1.6 million acres, 4 percent less than last year. As of October 5th, soybean harvest was 17 percent complete compared to 8 percent in 1979 and 12 percent for the 5-year average. Early October temperatures in the upper 20's and low 30's may have damaged a few late crop beans.

Soybean production for the Nation is expected to total 1.76 billion bushels, down 23 percent from 1979 and 4 percent from September 1. Yield per acre at 26.1 bushels per acre compares with 32.2 bushels last year.

Dark Tobacco: Production of all types of dark tobacco in Kentucky is below last year. Kentucky Type 22, Eastern fire-cured, production is forecast at 7,360,000 pounds, down 26 percent from last year and unchanged from September 1. Type 23, Western fire-cured, production is estimated at 5,600,000 pounds, down 26 percent from 1979 while up 290,000 pounds from September 1. Type 35, one suckers production is estimated at 8,370,000 pounds, down 9 percent from last year and 270,000 pounds from September 1. Type 36, Green River, production is estimated at 3,685,000 pounds, down 15 percent from last year and unchanged from September 1.

U.S. production of Type 22 is forecast at 25.96 million pounds, down 16 percent from 1979. Type 23 production is forecast at 6.62 million pounds, 24 percent below last year. Type 35 production is estimated at 11.01 million pounds, down 7 percent from 1979. Type 36 is grown only in Kentucky.

Five Appear Friday Before Judge Lane

Three men and two women appeared before Circuit Judge Caswell P. Lane Friday morning on indictments returned in Montgomery and Bath County Circuit Courts, during the Montgomery Circuit Court Motion Day. William A. White, who had pleaded guilty in Rowan Circuit Court Oct. 9 to two charges of theft by deception, entered guilty pleas to two-count indictments — returned in both Montgomery and Bath counties on charges of criminal possession of forged instruments in the second degree. On all six charges, a 2-year sentence was recommended, all to run concurrently; and Judge Lane set Oct. 24 for final sentencing.

Roscoe Cassity, who was indicted

Oct. 6 by the Bath County Grand Jury, pleaded innocent to two counts of attempting to bribe a witness and his trial was scheduled Jan. 26. He was charged with offering Larry Short \$200 on Oct. 2 and again on Oct. 5 not to testify in the Lester Spencer case. Johnny Byrd and Wanda Brewer, both of whom were indicted in Bath Circuit Court Oct. 4 for complicity in the theft Aug. 5 with Tony Conkright at the Midland Marine Co., pleaded innocent and their trials were scheduled Dec. 10. Billie Ann Adams, who was indicted in Montgomery County for theft of three checks from Gold 'Kwik, pleaded guilty to an amended charge of complicity to a forged instrument and possession of a forged instrument and

the Commonwealth recommended a one-year sentence. Judge Lane ordered a pre-trial investigation by the Probation and Parole Department and set Oct. 21 for final sentencing.

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Houseboats: Headquarters For Fall Fishing

There was a chill in the air as I stepped out on the deck with a cup of steaming black coffee in my hand. "Camp coffee," I thought I'd sipped the rich fragrant brew in hunting and fishing camps all over the country for the past 25 years. "Wonder why it's always so strong?"

My big brother, Fred, well at least he's more round than I, came through the plate glass doors of the boat with a pint jar of the smoking liquid. "Man, this is what I call living," he said, stretching to unkink stiff muscles and breathing deeply the clear, fresh air of autumn.

Daylight comes up late in the morning in October. Mist was still rising from the cooling water as the sun cut a

swath across the top of distant hills. A slight breeze out of the west promised another great day of fishing weather as we returned to the cozy comfort of the interior of the houseboat. Fred, who is one of those great camp cooks, got busy with pots and pans as rolled sausage, eggs and canned biscuits came from the ice box. Looks like we weren't going to lose much weight on this trip, as is the usual case.

Late October is southern Kentucky, is a delightful time to be afloat. Surrounding hillsides were ablaze with the magnificent colors of autumn. Perfect fishing weather had held for the three days we'd been fishing the blue-green wates of sprawling Lake Cumberland. Fishing itself had been good.

We'd managed to land several nice bass from shallow coves and small shoreline indentations where they had come to feed on shad and other baitfish that were crowding the shallow areas.


A bucket of lively minnows had produced some nice eating size crappie from around stick-ups and in the few tree tops we had been able to find. At night, we'd set lines from the deck and so far three nice channel cats had been added to our growing pile of fillets. If eating fish is supposed to be good for your health, my brother and I, after six meals of fried and broiled fish, ought to be pretty healthy specimens.

Earlier, we'd driven the 250 miles to the State Dock at Cumberland Lake State Park near Jamestown. There

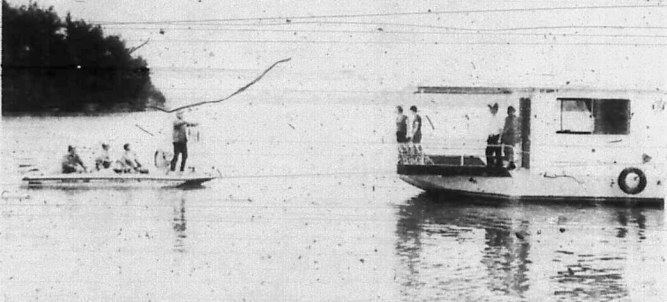

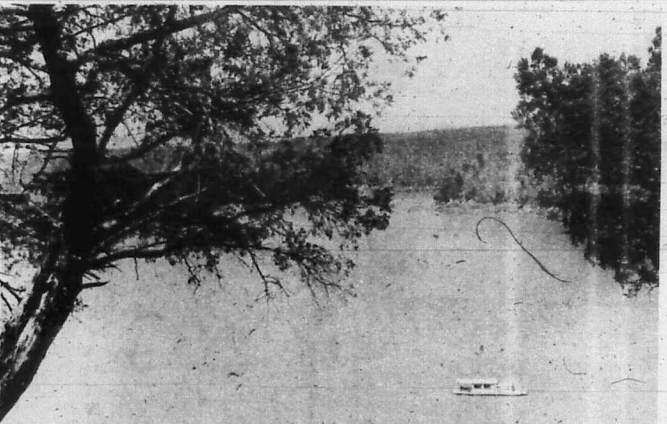
we'd picked up 55-foot houseboat which was gassed up and waiting. Completely furnished including tanks of fresh water, it only required a few minutes for us to load a week's supply of groceries, our fishing tackle and personal effects aboard. Back the boat away from its mooring and head out into the nearly people-free waters of the lake.

We cruised into the main channel of the lake with nothing more than a map to guide us. We'd find our own hot spots by anchoring the boat in the small coves and probing the fishing possibilities with the small boat and motor we pulled behind. If one place didn't show much promise, we'd simply move to another. Such is the versatility of using a houseboat for fishing, headwaters.

We'd picked late October for a couple of reasons. First, this time of the year produces some mighty good fishing in the big flood control reservoirs. Water temperatures have fallen off to the low sixties — perfect for tossin' plugs and spinnerbaits along shore.

Second, this time the season is about as good as there is to get a deal on houseboat rentals. Though our boat was actually a little large for two anglers, it had all the comforts of home with enough room for two big men to laze about without getting into each other's way. Size wise, our boat can accommodate up to eight people. If that many fisher men pooled their resources, the boat could be rented for just a few dollars each.

Such is not the case during the peak of the season. Houseboats during the summer months go for as much as \$800 per week. Pretty steep for most anglers budgets.

A houseboat is probably the finest way I know to spend a week fishing. Because you're setting on top of the best fishing grounds, it only requires a few minutes in the early mornings to hop out of the sack, jump into some clothes and start fishing.

Breakfast can wait for an hour if fish are moving at daybreak. Since there is little time wasted in running a boat to fishing grounds, extra minutes can be spent in the cozy comfort of the bunk.

Our routine has been to sleep until daybreak, spend an hour fishing the coves and shoreline cover then head back to the boat for coffee, breakfast and check our set lines from the night before.

If fishing seems to be off in the area where we stayed the night, we spend an hour or so in the mornings checking out new waters to see if something strikes our fancy. After a light lunch, whipped up in the boat's well-equipped kitchen, we take the small boat out again to try our luck in early afternoon. If we catch a few fish at this time of the day, chances are good that fishing will be even better towards evening.

Fred, who also enjoys squirrel hunting, has climbed the steep bluffs that rise from the lake's edge, on two different occasions. Each time has netted him one plump grey squirrel that resulted in a scrumptious breakfast of fried squirrel, squirrel gravy and his famous calbed biscuits. Good thing we brought along plenty of Roloids.

Houseboats would, of course, be ideal for such combination trips for those who enjoy both sports. Excellent squirrel hunting is found around the edge of most of our larger reservoirs in the state. Generally, there will be an ample supply of reds close to water, greys will be found farther back on the ridges in most cases.

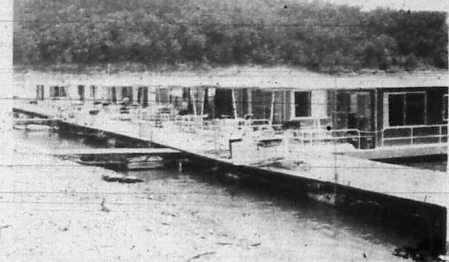
From a fisherman's point of view, late autumn houseboating is the ideal time to have the lake completely to yourself. Our three days have been spent in absolute privacy. We haven't seen another soul, be it fisherman or anyone else. We have seen a variety of wildlife including a red fox who quickly checked out a small sand beach at the head of a cove then disappeared in the tangle of underbrush just above the summerpost mark. At least two mink have visited the shore near our anchored house on the water. On both occasions, the mink was attracted to our boatside by fish leavings that we'd thrown out on the bank in hope of attracting some form of wildlife. Lake-side is checked out daily by a variety of animals hoping to find a frog, dead minnow or other kinds of food washed ashore from wave action. Even a deer came out to look us over.

One good thing about autumn houseboating is that you can rent a unit for as long as you like, be it a day or a month. Weekends, we were told, remain popular through the early weeks of autumn but fall off sharply after a nip is felt in the air.

Many of the larger lakes in the state offer houseboat rentals up through November and I suppose you could rent on about anytime as long as it is still in the water.

Some planning should take place before deciding on what houseboats to rent at this time of the year. Most rentals didn't have heating units installed, but hearty anglers get around this by lighting a couple of the stove burners. Some houseboats also do not supply linens and blankets.

Check to be sure what you're has or does not have so you can take what ever is necessary. Houseboat rentals are extremely

Q. I just had a dental check-up, and my dentist didn't take an x-ray. He said my old ones were enough and that too much exposure to x-rays increases the risk of cancer. Can this be true of one annual x-ray?

A. Like many other things, x-rays can harm a person as well as do good. Exposure to x-rays may add slightly to the risk of getting cancer later on in life. In addition, exposure of the sex organs to x-rays can cause changes or mutations that would be inherited by future generations.

The amount of radiation used in x-rays is very small, so the chance that x-rays will cause these problems also is very small. Still, it is good idea to avoid needless exposure.

There is no way to say that a certain number of x-rays is safe, and one more will be dangerous. Exery x-ray can involve a tiny risk, but if it is needed to learn how to better treat a medical problem, it's worth doing. Your dentist apparently was confident enough in his other diagnostic techniques not to require an x-ray.

Here are some steps you can take to eliminate x-ray risk:

- Don't insist on an x-ray.
- If an x-ray is recommended by your physician, don't refuse it.

- If you are pregnant or even think you may be, tell the physician so that your baby can be protected with a shield or the x-ray delayed.

- Not all women, especially younger than 50, need mammography (a sort of breast x-ray) used to detect breast cancer.

- Ask for a shield for you or your child's genital organs if x-rays are to be taken of the lower back, abdomen or near the organs themselves.

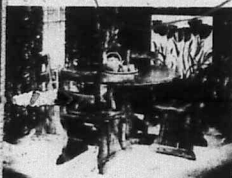
- Keep a record of x-rays by date, types of x-ray and where it is filed. Then if another physician suggests an x-ray of the same area, you can tell him or her about the previous ones. It may suffice or it can be a useful indicator of any changes.

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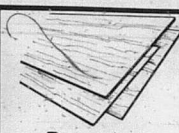

Eggs Are Best Buy In Protein Category

Eggs are one of the best protein buys available in the supermarket today.

Their low cost, good taste and high protein content make them the perfect basis for any meal — breakfast, lunch or supper.

Some people have asked whether yolks are lighter in color than they used to be.

The yolk color is almost completely dependent on the feed the hen eats. Birds that have access to grass, pasture, yellow corn or alfalfa in their diet tend to produce dark-colored yolks.

The depth of color also varies. Generally brown-shelled eggs have a darker yolk color than eggs with white shells.

However, the color of the yolk or the shell has nothing to do with the nutritive value or cooking characteristics of the egg.

Large eggs must weigh 24 ounces per carton, compared to a minimum weight of 21 ounces for medium eggs and 18 ounces for small eggs.

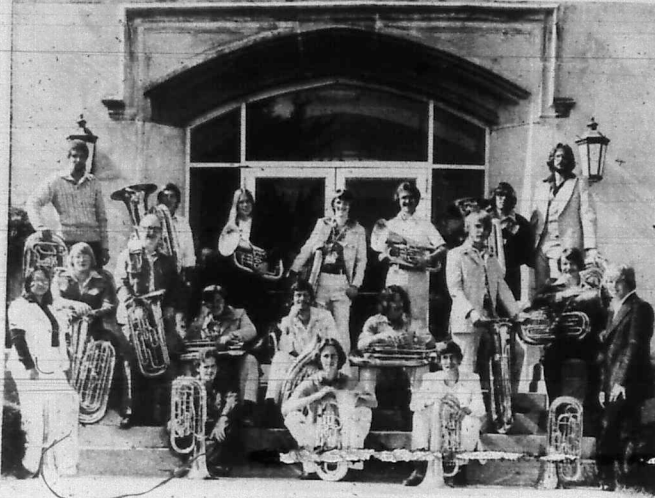

Part III: Parents - the Other Victims

How could a mother hit her baby so hard that he falls down and suffers a concussion?
How could a father berate and criticize his daughter so often that she grows to hate herself enough to want to die?

The verbal and physical abuse of children by their parents is difficult for many people to comprehend. The public has a generally unsympathetic attitude about abusive parents and sometimes sees them as evil or less than human, "monsters" deserving the most severe legal and social punishments.

What many people may not recognize is that most abusive parents feel that way about themselves.

According to the children's division of the American Humane Association, neglect and abuse are rarely willful acts. Another national organization, Parents Anonymous, agrees.

"What is seldom understood is that parents who abuse their children wish they didn't. Most experience intense anguish and guilt about their behavior," says a Parents Anonymous publication. Parents Anonymous is a network of voluntary self-help groups for people who abuse or fear they may abuse their children.

Brenda Williams, state coordinator of Parents Anonymous in Kentucky Inc., believes abusive parents are in the grip of feelings they can't control. "Most parents who hurt their children are 'normal' people who 'have problems they can't handle,'" she says.

Studies show that even among serious cases of abuse, only a small percentage of the parents are found to be psychotic or mentally ill.

Then why do they abuse their children?
"There is no single answer," said Williams. "Most of the parents seem to feel overwhelmed by the circumstances in their lives. They can't handle the frustrations and they can't control their emotions or actions. They take it out on the children."

Program On Child Abuse Set At MSU

Morehead State University's "4:15 Special Series" will open on Thursday, Oct. 16.

Dr. William Altemeir, Jr., of Vanderbilt University's Department of Pediatrics, will discuss "Child Abuse - A Profile of Activity and Behavior."

The program, in the Adron Doran University Center at 4:15 p.m., will include participants from the University and the Morehead community.

The program is free and open to the public.
Dr. Altemeir will also be speaking to area physicians at a Medical Continuing Education program Thursday at 6 p.m. at St. Claire Medical Center. Dr. Altemeir has done extensive research in the study of child abuse.

The Hidden Hurt

Frustrations at the root of child abuse problems include feelings of isolation, marriage problems, financial pressures, the burden of unwanted, unplanned children, overwhelming responsibilities and the sense of a loss of freedom.

Such circumstances and pressures don't actually cause child abuse, said Williams. It's a parent's reaction to the situation, a parent's inability to deal with it, that is the basis for the abusive behavior.

"In order to stop child abuse, we have to help the parent," she said.

Ironically, abuse can occur when parents expect too much of themselves as parents. "For example, a mother promises herself she will never raise her voice in anger toward her child. One day the child spills milk all over the clean kitchen floor. The mother gets irritated and screams at the child," Williams said. "There are very few parents who don't say things in anger once in a while. This parent, though, has failed to meet her own high standards of parenting. She then blames her child for making her break her own rule. Her anger at herself takes the form of anger toward the child."

Some parents confuse abuse with discipline, said Williams. They feel that as parents they have the right to do what is necessary to control the behavior of their children. "They sense they are wrong to physically hurt them, but they haven't learned there are much more effective ways to teach

right from wrong," she said.
Any number of factors can contribute to a parent's inability to control abusive behavior, said Williams. "One factor is the parent's upbringing and how he or she was treated as a child."
"All of us learn how to parent from our parents, said Williams. "In many ways, we imitate our mothers and fathers, even if we grew up vowing to be different."
Another factor is immaturity. Sometimes parents, especially very young, insecure parents, can't understand a child's behavior and needs, said Williams. When a baby cries and the immature mother can't calm him, she may see the crying as something the baby is doing on purpose just to upset her. She may physically hurt the baby to "get even."

According to Parents Anonymous literature, some parents depend on young children to supply the love they may have missed when they were children themselves. Parents who cannot relate well to other adults may expect their children to be their friends. In both cases, said Williams, parents may become upset when their children cannot fulfill those emotional needs. Studies indicate that a majority of the parents who abuse their children have poor self-images and low regard for their own abilities.

It's very difficult to love others and threaten them with respect than you don't even like or respect yourself," Williams said. A parent who dislikes certain characteristics of his own may be abusive to a child who exhibits the same characteristics. This sometimes explains why a parent abuses one of his children and not the others.

Williams stresses that most parents who abuse their children want to change. "People often think that when a parent has abuse problems, his entire relationship with his child is abusive," she said. "Most parents with abuse problems can and do relate to their children in healthy, loving ways. Abuse is seldom only a small part of the parent-child relationship, but a part that the parent must have help to overcome."

Williams feels that self-help organizations like Parents Anonymous can do a lot to help parents help themselves. Other sources of help include private psychologists and psychiatrists, public and private mental health clinics, the state's Department for Human Resources, and its Bureau for Social Services, comprehensive care centers and family physicians. Parents Anonymous stresses the importance of "early detection and help for abusing parents before the problem becomes severe."

One of the organization's brochures states that early detection might be accomplished in a number of ways:
-By training professionals who often come in contact with young children and parents to recognize the early symptoms of parents with the potential for abuse.

-By giving teenagers and young adults the kind of training they need to become good parents.

-By offering abusing parents a treatment program they can accept and respond to.

Perhaps just as important in the early detection and treatment of child abuse, says Williams, is public understanding that abusive parents are people who need help.

There Are Ways To Spot Abuse

When should someone suspect a child is being abused? The appearance and behavior of the abused child are keys, said Dr. Susan Turner, a Department for Human Resources psychologist. While it is important to report a child abuse case, it also is important to be cautious in identifying child abuse, she said. It is not unusual for a 12-year-old to have a bruise or to be aggressive with other children. Also, most parents occasionally become angry with their children and do or say something that might be considered abusive.

But if some of the following signs are seen frequently in a child, it is time to

consider contacting the local Bureau for Social Services office:

- Repeated injuries, such as bruises, welts and burns.
- Very shy and withdrawn behavior.
- Dirty, shabby, out-grown clothing or the appearance of malnutrition.
- Disruptive behavior.
- Actions that make the child appear like a "little adult," such as smoking and drinking coffee at a very young age.

The parent's behavior may also be an indicator:

- Unusually critical of the child.
- Apparently unconcerned by the child's injury or ready with an unlikely explanation of the injury's cause.
- Distrustful of others, perhaps isolated from the community.
- Expressing unrealistic expectations for the child, considering the child's age.
- Frequently saying how "nervous" their children make them.
- Exhibiting very low self-esteem.
- Seeming to be uncomfortable relating to their child in another adult's presence.
- Over-reacting with extreme anger when a child makes small mistakes.

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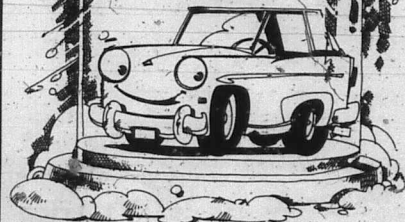


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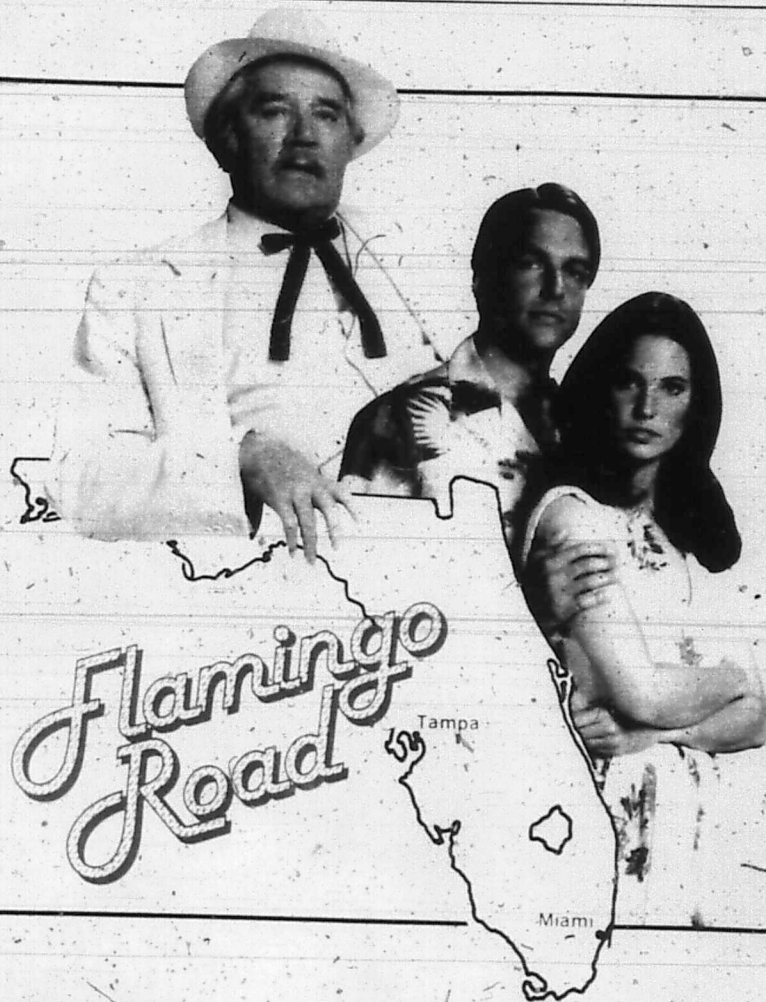

Actors know their calling at early ages

Reporters who go to interviews with preconceived premises might "start-off" with the notion that Bonnie Franklin is a classic example of the toddler whose first full sentence is, "I want to be a star."

Wrong. She is an exception. Franklin takes only busman's holidays instead of real vacations, and does TV movies and a nightclub act when her CBS series, "One Day at a Time," is in hiatus.

Bonnie was pushed by the unfulfilled dreams of a mother who hoped to find satisfaction through the success of her child. By a lucky fluke it worked, because Franklin has both the talent and energy that might have led her to choose the course her mom had already mapped.

Bonnie is a strong woman who gives with the sass and takes no guff. In a mid-summer interview in New York, she said that during filming of last spring's TV movie, "Margaret Sanger," she disagreed with producer Marvin Minoff on "practically everything" and "yelled a lot." She also fell in love and married him.

As we said earlier, Franklin is the exception. Most others with non-showbiz backgrounds who have made it to the big-time are mavericks, at least as far as their families are concerned. But - and this is important - though non-showbiz parents are usually bewildered by their sprouts' determination to act, they are supportive.

When Burt Reynolds reached a turning point in his career, just after his early television series had been canceled and before his movies became "bankable," he confided that it helped him when he discovered his police chief father considered acting an honest way of life.

Larry Pressman, who is the star of the delayed CBS series, "Ladies Man," is the son of prosperous merchants. His father founded a chain of clothing stores down South and his mom has a couple of stores of her own. From them he learned to dress well (most of his wardrobe is from designer Giorgio Armani) and to "work hard at your profession." Initially his parents were startled by his choice. They shouldn't have been.

Pressman said, "From childhood on, they supplied tickets for not just plays, but all the way (Kentucky)."

He became serious when he enrolled in the drama section of Northwestern University in Chicago, which earlier spawned Charlton Heston.

As Larry says, his folks were sophisticated about theater and the arts, so when they realized the depth of his commitment, there were no problems.

There were no problems, either, for two relative newcomers to television, though their folks seem still to be muttering. "What's it all about?"

Frizzy-haired, likeable Murphy Cross, who starred as the wife of a defecting Soviet Olympic athlete in a CBS summer series, "Phyl and Mikky," is one who said at 4 she was going to sing and dance and act. Her devoted parents are still bewildered but, as she says, "Mother's Bible class in Laurel, Maryland, always watches when I'm on television."

Daryl Anderson (he plays the photographer Animal on CBS' "Lou Grant") is another who sensed his true vocation - honest - at the age of 4. His mother now remembers hearing him say when he was about 6 that he was going to

be an actor. She was surprised. She still is.

But the Andersons, says Daryl, stay close despite personal preferences. He is from Seattle. Everybody else in his clan worked at Boeing Aircraft. When his parents retired they went in for raising race horses, an interest he never shared and which they never urged upon him.

"He muses, 'I'm not interested in gambling. I've been to a track only once, and just recently.'"

So, give the Andersons straight A's for combining two basic virtues: family values with live-and-let-live choices.
