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Man Who Shot Robbery Suspect Has Home Burglarized Saturday

A lot of people say their luck runs in streaks. Why? When something bad happens to them, they can usually count on a few more things going wrong.

One person whose luck has been anything but good lately would have to be 78-year-old Harry Shields of 813 Clearfield Street in Morehead.

Last Wednesday night, two men broke into his grocery store-home and attempted to rob him and his son, Jessie, at knifepoint. Shields shot one of the suspects and the other fled when the men resisted the intruders.

Saturday afternoon Shields' home was burglarized while he and his son were away. That time neighbors called police and identified the suspect as Marion Norris, 23, 309 Parkside Court, Morehead.

Police apprehended Norris minutes after the call and charged him with first degree burglary. Police also found about \$105 worth of merchandise stashed outside Shields' home.

The suspect apparently had entered through the rear door of Shields' place and had taken two bags of potato chips, an AM-FM radio, an electric razor, a

toy gun, straw hat, four apples, two Moon pies and a toaster.

Norris was to have made an initial appearance in Rowan District Court Monday. He is in Rowan County jail in lieu of 10 percent of a \$10,000 cash bond.

Meanwhile, the man who escaped during the Wednesday night incident has been identified by police. Timmy Goodman, 20, of 201 Rowan Street, confessed to Morehead Police Thursday after being confronted by Lt. Robert Wright with information linking him with the attempted holdup.

Goodman's accomplice, 23, of Olive Hill, who was shot Wednesday by Shields Wednesday evening, is listed in stable condition at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington.

Goodman is charged with first degree robbery and in District Court proceedings Monday evening an examining trial. He was bound over to the grand jury which will convene Nov. 24 and remains in Rowan Jail under \$10,000 full bail.

Gee and Goodman were said to have entered the Shields' residence about

9:30 p.m. Wednesday wearing stockings over their heads. The pair threatened Harry and Jessie Shields and a neighbor Vernon Adkins, who was visiting the men.

Using a knife, Gee demanded money from Harry Shields, who told him it was in another room. As Gee forced Shields to go to the money, a fight erupted between Jessie and Goodman, who also had a knife.

Gee turned to help Goodman, police said, and Shields drew a .38 caliber pistol from under his shirt. When Gee fired, Shields fired twice, with one in Gee's spine.

Goodman escaped out the front door. Police said that Gee had been on probation for armed robbery at the Pump and Save Gas Station in Morehead a year earlier.

Police have filed no charges against Shields in connection with the shooting. The elder Shields had been taken to St. Claire Medical Center for observation after the shooting but was released shortly after being taken there. Police said the excitement irritated Shields' heart condition.

Ground Turned For New Apartments

Ground was broken Thursday for a new apartment complex in Rowan County with a total development cost in excess of \$1 million. The groundbreaking followed the signing of documents for the project at the Farmers Home Administration office in Morehead.

The new complex is being developed by Clearfield Manor Associates, LTD and will be constructed off McBryer Road in Clearfield. Philip R. Lewis, president of Clearfield Manor Associates, said that construction will begin immediately and the project is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy next fall.

The new development will be composed of five buildings. In-

cluded are 16, one-bedroom units, four of which are designed especially for handicapped residents; 16, two-bedroom units; eight, three-bedroom units and an OLM unit providing laundry facilities. Site development includes paved parking areas, landscaping, playground and exterior lighting.

To be eligible for occupancy in the complex, tenants must be either senior citizens or handicapped persons, without regard to income, or non-senior citizens with an adjusted family income of \$15,000 or less, or have a family income within limits established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Lewis said the project was

designed by Terry B. Simmons A.I.A. Architects, Inc. to be an asset to the community. Lewis said it will be constructed by P.J. Land Company, which he owns, in such a manner that will be attractive to the area and will be under local management.

Terry Simmons, principal of the architectural firm, has designed and is developer of other housing projects in the state.

P.J. Land Company is also involved in the construction of Pretty Valley subdivision in Clearfield where about 200 new homes are being built in cooperation with Gateway Housing Corporation and a site development grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

Hearing Will Decide Tax Rate

Rowan County taxpayers apparently will be able to decide for themselves what they will pay in school taxes this year by their attendance at a public hearing Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the Rowan High School cafeteria.

Members of the Rowan County Board of Education have said they will do what those who attend that meeting want in regard to setting the tax rate for 1980.

The board has said that it needs the revenue that a tax rate of 20.8 cents would produce. That rate is only one-tenth cent lower than the maximum allowed by law and is subject to voter petition and recall.

The School Board is also looking at rates of 16.6 cents and 17.2 cents per \$100 of property valuation as other options. Neither of those rates, which were provided by the state, are subject to recall. The 16.2 cents rate would produce the same amount of revenue as last year's rate of 19.3 cents, because of higher property valuations, and the 17.2 cents rate would provide for a four percent increase, exclusive of new growth in the county.

Superintendent John Brock said Monday that as far as he knows the board has made no decision on the rate. "I would say it's wide open," Brock added, "even though I don't know for sure."

Brock said he hopes there will be a "good, representative crowd" at the

meeting Thursday.

"The board would invite everyone to come out whether they are for or against a particular rate," Brock said. Brock said the format for the meeting is yet to be determined but he expects it to be structured in such a way that "everyone who wants to speak can have an opportunity to talk without being interrupted."

The superintendent said he will not be giving out the same kind of detailed information he has at previous meetings, "unless the board instructs me to." He noted that similar information has been provided at three previous meetings. He said the information will be available but not in the same formal manner as before.

Despite the fact that he has no money, Rowan Sheriff Jim Nickell says he is still keeping his office open with volunteer help.

Sheriff Nickell, who runs his office with fees from collecting taxes, has been forced to layoff both his deputies and his office secretary. He does not even have the funds to pay himself.

But the sheriff says there have no complications from the lack of funds yet and does not expect anything

Brock said he has received little feedback since the last hearing. "I've had two telephone calls from people concerned about higher taxes and I've had two or three people stop me on the street who were concerned about a good education program."

The superintendent says he is not necessarily for the higher rate. "There's a great need in the school system and being closer to it than anyone else, I can see that. But people are having to pay higher taxes and the economic situation is not good."

"My main goal is for people to get informed and get the best information possible about education for their child."

Huge Crowd Enjoys Court Days At Mt. Sterling

Residents helped out the visitors and their own pocketbooks by parking cars in their yards and cars lined both sides

of the narrow Mt. Sterling side streets, leaving in many cases only one lane for moving vehicles.
Most of the activities were con-

centrated in the area between Main Street on the north to the C&O railroad on the south and between Bank and Queen streets, including city and

private parking lots in that area and every other available space where a trailer, table or booth could be set up. Everything imaginable was for sale by the hundreds of vendors attracted to the area by the huge crowds of Court Day.

Gun Trading Popular

Two of the big attractions seemed to be, however, the trading of guns and knives, as well as the sale of them. Hundreds of people were seen carrying guns, which they were trying to sell or trade. Some of the trading was done with the dealers who congregated on South Queen Street near the railroad, while other was done between individuals.

Many of the people heading toward their cars after wandering through the displays were carrying items, some of them antiques or formerly used things, and others axe and hoe handles, and a wide variety of other items. All kinds of food also was for sale from booths in the area.

Police Capt. Danny White said the Sunday crowd was as big as last year and he said the crowd this year appeared to be a little rowdier, with more fights being halted by police, but he added that there appeared to be less stealing.

Police were using two golf carts to get around, but Sunday afternoon Ptl. Roger Ditterline said the crowd was so thick they couldn't get through even with these vehicles.

Space More Costly

Space for the 1981 Court Days, which will be held the third weekend in October, as it has been for over a 100 years, will be more costly. At its last meeting, the Mt. Sterling City Council, which rents parking spaces in two city lots on Locust Street to vendors, raised the cost from \$65 to \$100 per parking space.

Doris Baxter, city clerk-treasurer, pointed out that this fee covers electricity and water, and also the \$15 city license fee charged all the sellers. Only the \$15 fee is collected by the city from the other vendors, but there are reports of some prime spaces going for \$200.

Mrs. Baxter said the higher fee may cause some of the vendors not to return, but some new ones already have contacted her after visiting the Court Day and seeing the throngs of people. The city had hundreds of calls for spaces from would-be sellers this year after all the city spaces had been sold, Mrs. Baxter said.

Off To Slow Start

The Court Days got off to a slow start Saturday because of a half-inch rain early that morning that kept some vendors from setting up their displays until about noon. But then the light rain stopped, the sun came out and the buying, selling and trading got into full swing.

The city no longer permits the trading and selling of dogs in the city, a former favorite part of Court Days, and this activity now has moved to Preston in Bath County during Court Days weekend. Oliver Becraft of Middletown, Ohio, a former resident of Menifee County, said there were a lot of dogs available this year. He bought a 3-year-old registered Walker coonhound for \$550 from Butch Garner of Salt Lick. Becraft, who also bought two mixed breed "squirrel hunting" dogs at Preston, had the dogs with him in Mt. Sterling Sunday when he bought a 410 double barreled gun.

before the rate can be certified. During that time, the rate could be challenged by petition of 15 of the voters, which means a special election, which could be held no earlier than Dec. 4, must be called.

The board was to have to make a decision on the tax one week ago, but delayed a decision until a special hearing Thursday night (see related story).

Sheriff Nickell says the one week "really didn't make that great deal of difference" in the situation. If the board goes with the low rate, tax bills can be sent out within the next two or three weeks. If the board sets the higher rate, the same amount of time would have to have elapsed.

The sheriff said he will not lose any money as a result of the delay. "We just won't have any to run the office on."

Sheriff Nickell added that he does not plan to go back to Fiscal Court to ask for money again. "I don't think it would do any good," he said. Magistrates turned down the sheriff's request earlier this month because they said it was not available.

Right now, the sheriff's wife is helping him operate the office on a voluntary basis three days a week.

The sheriff does not expect to lose his employees who have been laid off. He said he expects them to draw unemployment until he is able to recall them.

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State Payroll System Revised

FRANKFORT, KY. — A revised program for paying Kentucky state government employees will begin in November, state Personnel Commissioner Dick Robinson said.

Earlier this year, state employees asked for and began receiving paychecks on certain dates each month. Since March 29, paychecks have been issued on the 13th and 28th of each month. When those dates fell on a weekend or on a holiday, employees received their paychecks on the nearest scheduled working day.

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finally, the moving and melodic "Quintet in B Minor for Clarinet and Strings" by Johannes Brahms, a piece filled with incredibly subtle autumnal beauty giving Richard Stoltzman and his clarinet a chance to display his superlative talent.

Special note should be made here of the new work on the program, Bill Douglas' refreshingly innovative "Celebration II." Douglas, composer, pianist and bassoonist, is currently coordinator of the music department at the Naropa Institute in Boulder, Colorado. Awarded the Margaret M. Grant Memorial Award for the best composition at Tanglewood in 1968, Douglas was commissioned to compose two extended works, one of which was premiered at the International Festival of Contemporary Music in Warsaw, Poland in September 1968. "Celebration II" is a nine-minute piece that will gladden the hearts of all who love exciting contemporary music. The piece has been influenced by the rhythms of African music and the beat of American jazz.

200 Expected For Speech Event




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A Bluebird Kind Of Day

It has never been the intent of this weekly output to say that one has to harvest material objects, to have a successful outdoor experience. There is simply so many more important things to consider than landing a big trout size fish, bagging a limit of game or harvesting a full bag of mushrooms.

Take the day a few back when Phillip Cooper and I drove out to Cave Run for a day of fishing. At 3:15, Phil is a died-in-the-wood bass angler from Grayson and he's pretty good at it — most of the time.

Phil has proven his skills behind a

casting rod on a number of occasions by winning a variety of fishing tournaments here in the state and around the country. Fact is, Phil even walked away with top honors in the Kentucky State Championship sponsored by the Bass Angler's Sportsman's Society (Bass) in 1979. But even Phil can have a few problems when he runs into a bluebird kind of day.

Serious bass fishermen know what the term "bluebird day" means. In very simple language, it means a beautiful autumn day when the sky is fantastically blue with little white

powder-puff clouds just floating around up there. It's a day when there's hardly a breeze blowing about and the lake is as clear as a good brand of gin — in other words a great day to be alive.

Now such a day is kinda frowned upon by serious fishermen. They prefer a cloudy, over-cast day with a breeze ruffling the surface and a little color to the water. These days will find bass nearer the surface because they don't care for bright sunlight in their eyes and I suspect they feel a bit more comfortable when there's a chop on the water to cut down on visibility. And if the water is a bit cloudy, I'm sure they are aware that predators can't put a fix on their position so well. All of these factors add up to better fishing conditions for the angler, on bad weather days.

Water temperature at Cave Run was excellent for fall bass if everything else had been in order. A cooling 68 degrees that ran from the surface down to about 18 feet, meant that bass, a cold-blooded creature, would feel quite comfortable and frisky in that temperature range.

"This is going to be a boom or bust kind of day," Phil predicted as he backed the boat into the lake at the Twin Knobs ramp. He meant, of course, that we would either catch a lot of fish or none at all. Guess how it turned out?

Our intentions were to do some structure fishing. Now in case you're not a bass fisherman, I'll tell you that structure means brush, logs, big rocks, drop-offs, or a sunken object of any kind that is large enough for a bass to hide around.

At times excellent fishing is found in these areas when they're deep enough that surface disturbances (like boating water skiing and fishing) don't spook the fish. There are a number of such areas in Cave Run, but only a few of the more dedicated fishermen know where they're located. Phil knows where most of them are.

Bass fishermen who like to fish this thing called "structure," carry a little crate like box that hold several small floating devices that have line and a sinker attached. These are markers they use to establish underwater structure areas. A depth sounder is necessary to find and mark such places.

Our first try for deep water bass was off the end of a long, slopping point where it abruptly comes to an end nearly a hundred yards off shore. At the end it breaks off into 20 feet of water, seemingly, an ideal place for bass. But after an hour of casting bottom bumping lures and worms, we had a total of nothing for our efforts. We moved.

Our next stop was over some submerged farm ponds, the levees of which make very good bottom structure for largemouth bass. Bass for some reason hang on these earth fills and ridges and if you know what you're doing, you can catch several good size bass from such areas.

We didn't and we moved again.

I came close to some action when I saw a school of shad running on the surface a few yards away from the boat. Knowing that bass often herd these schools to the top before they attack, I threw an Ugly Bug towards the school of fish. It landed near the tail end and a chunky bass hit the front end of the baitfish. Since you only get one try with this kind of fishing, I blew mine, a typical happening on such a beautiful day.

Our next stop was "a sure thing," or so said Phil. We passed the boat camp near Clay Lick ramp and only one tent was in evidence. His boat pulled upon the beach indicated he was taking a break from the slow fishing. This is a beautiful campground, private and disconnected from roads. There's a great view of the lake and a perfect camp for autumn anglers on Cave Run.

With our third move of the day, Phil was feeling the pressure to produce, to uphold his reputation as a bass champ of the Commonwealth. Unquestionably he was giving it his all, but then there was those lovely clouds and that gorgeous sky overhead — a bluebird

kind of day. From my point of view, I was having a marvelous time. The day was perfect for being afloat. Cave Run was glassy smooth, the sunny day was warm without being hot and you could feel autumn in the air. A couple of wood ducks passed high overhead and I could hear the giant Canada geese, which are managed and cared for by the Daniel Boone National Forest, chatting in the background.

Two water skiers in the distance were adding their special kind of art work to the day. October's low-slanting sunlight was catching the arching plume of water off their skis and transforming the clear liquid into instant silver against the shadowed side of distant hills.

My small cooler was full of golden colored apples. I offered Phil one, but he was too intense on fishing to enjoy their juicy deliciousness. His reputation was being threatened, mine wasn't so I ate both apples.

If you never been on Cave Run when the sun sets on a glorious day, you've missed a spectacular occurrence of nature. As evening approaches, snowy white clouds are transformed into a multitude of colors, backlit by the setting sun. Slanting sunrays enhance lengthening shadows on the lake's surface and turn surrounding hills into blue black objects.

It's a glorious scene when the sun finally drops behind a pointed peak in the distance and provides one last shining halo for the day.

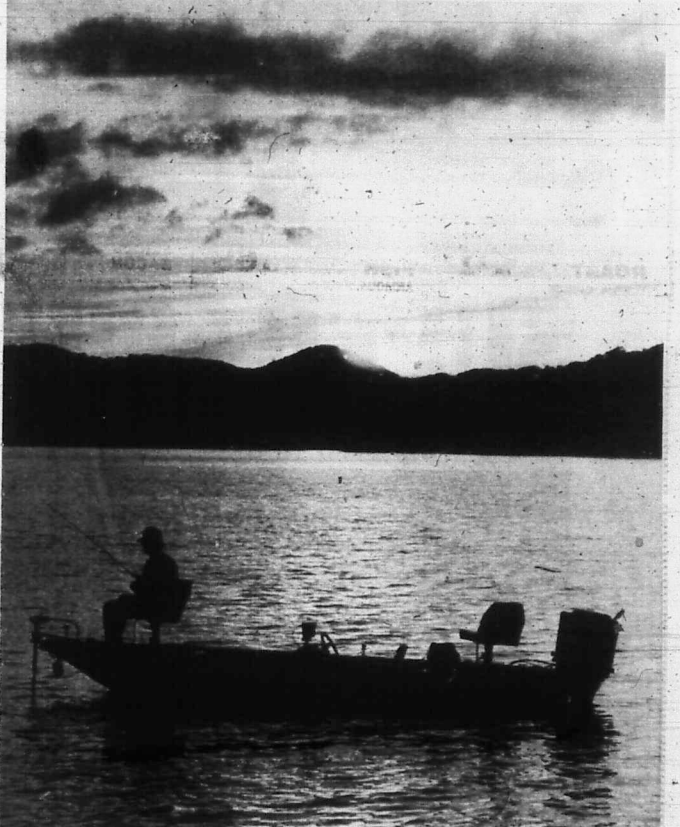

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

Brown Prefers Local Control

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. told local government officials recently he wants state government to turn over more duties to cities and counties.

Speaking at the annual Governor's Conference on Local Issues, Brown said, "The governor can't be all things to all people 'playing king down there (in Frankfort)."

Brown said local governments are getting more money to address local needs, through programs such as municipal aid and coal severance.

Brown said he is optimistic about Kentucky's future. He noted four synthetic-fuel plants are planned for Kentucky and major improvements are expected in the state's rail transportation. Those developments spell major increases in coal production in the future, he said.

Economic Development also offers a bright future for the state, Brown said. He said the state is striving to attract more business for Kentucky and that

through the sale of industrial revenue bonds, local governments can play a major role in that effort.

"We have, right now, more to offer than any other state and you're going to see us tell our story (to business)," he said.

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Below Average Rainfall Could Make Fires Worse

The approach of a fall forest fire season in Kentucky brings to mind the most disastrous forest fire in the history of the United States. It occurred on October 8, 1871 and struck the town of Peshtigo in the north Wisconsin woods. When it was over, 1,500 persons had died and 1,280,000 acres of timber had been burned. This fire went largely unnoticed at the time because the Great Chicago Fire, which occurred at the same time and killed some 250 persons, grabbed all the headlines.

It is unlikely that a disastrous fire like the Peshtigo fire will occur again, but the potential for large forest fires exists whenever the combination of dry

timber, high temperatures, strong winds and a flame or spark occurs in the forest.

On the Daniel Boone National Forest, which consists of over 664,000 acres, rainfall has been below average this year. As of the first week in October, the Forest is deficient by approximately 27 inches. If appreciable amounts of rainfall do not occur during the fall months, forest fire conditions could become serious, resulting in a long, hard fire season.

The Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, manages over 188 million acres of forest and range land and gives aid and assistance to State

forestry agencies which protect many more millions of acres of state and private woodlands. It has the world's largest forest fire fighting organization.

The Forest Service policy on fighting forest fires requires that suppression be fast, energetic and thorough and that it be conducted with a high degree of regard for personal safety. Forest fire fighting is a hard, dirty and dangerous job and to paraphrase a well known statement, "Fighting Forest Fire Can Be Hazardous To Your Health." The suppression of forest fires has been compared to fighting a military battle. The fire approaches on a far flung front and has to be met aggressively with suppression forces to keep it from spreading and advancing.

Forest fire fighters face a number of hazards including running flames, falling trees and snags, rolling rocks, burning embers, fatigue and choking smoke. The Forest Service, concerned for employee safety, has taken steps to ensure that fire fighters are protected from some of the hazards they may encounter. Fire fighters must meet the National Fire Qualification System requirements, which include training

and experience in forest fire fighting and physical fitness standards.

The forest fire fighter's motto is: "Hit 'Em Hard and Keep 'Em Small." Modern technology, in the form of sophisticated communication systems, lightweight and reliable equipment, dependable ground transportation and aircraft, used in conjunction with bulldozers, tractors with fire plows, water tankers and handtools, helps to keep most fires less than 10 acres in size.

All persons are urged to use extreme caution with flammable materials when traveling in and near woodlands and grasslands. Instead of throwing matches or cigarettes out of car windows, the car ashtray should be used. When trash and debris is burned, all applicable laws pertaining to the burning of such material should be observed.

If everyone heeds the motto, "Remember You Can Prevent Forest Fires," our forests and woodlands would yield even more benefits than they do now and forest fire fighters would be less exposed to the many hazards that they face every time they go to a fire.

Bond Rates To Increase

Secretary of the Treasury G. William Miller has announced a one percent increase in the interest rate paid on United States Savings Bonds and Savings Notes.

President Carter recently signed legislation permitting the Secretary of the Treasury, with the President's approval, to raise Savings Bonds interest rates by up to one percent during any 6-month period. Previously the interest rate ceiling was fixed by statute.

The interest rate on Series EE Bonds purchased on and after Nov. 1, 1980, is being increased from 7 percent to 8 percent, compounded semiannually, when the Bonds are held to original maturity. The term to maturity is being shortened from 11 to 9 years.

The interest rate on Series HH Savings Bonds purchased on and after Nov. 1, is being increased from 6 1/2 percent to 7 1/2 percent to their original maturity, which remains at 10 years. Interest on these Bonds is paid semiannually by check.

All outstanding series E, EE, H and HH Savings Bonds, as well as out-

standing Savings Notes (Freedom Shares) will also benefit from a one percent increase to their next maturities. The redemption value of E and EE Bonds and Savings Notes and the interest on H and HH Bonds during periods before their maturity will be improved. In general, the increase will be effective with the first semiannual interest period that begins on or after Nov. 1, 1980. Maturity periods for these Bonds and Notes will not be changed.

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Vikings Flush Royals In Final Home Game, 42-0

The Rowan County Vikings closed out their 1980 home campaign Friday night by manhandling Mason County 42-0 in a steady rain at Viking Field.

Friday's shutout was the third of the season for the Viking defense. More importantly, it was the second in the last three games.

"Ever since the second part of the second quarter against Montgomery County, I knew our defense had a lot of potential," Rowan County Coach Ray Graham said after Friday's win. "Now they know it too. They're playing with a lot of heart, enthusiasm and confidence. They know they can stop people."

Offensively, the line opened enough holes to allow three different Rowan County runners to crack the century mark - Bill Brock with 140 yards, Lowell Thompson with 126 and Marvin Adkins with 124. "Our line has improved tremendously," Graham said. "There has been an obvious improvement in the last four weeks. The difference is mental. This group is starting to believe in themselves."

That last statement might be extended from the offensive line to the entire club. After a seasawing first half season, Rowan County has won its last three games, outscoring its opposition through that stretch 116-12. In Friday's walkaway, the Vikings rolled up 404 yards rushing and 473 in total offense.

Quarterback Chuck Davis threw 11 times, completing four for 69 yards and two touchdowns, and he did not throw an interception. In fact, the Vikings turned the ball over only once all night.

Royal Turnovers Help

The Royals, on the other hand, made a gift of the ball to the Vikings six different times - three interceptions and three lost fumbles. Five of those turnovers led directly to Rowan County touchdowns.

The games was no giveaway, however. The Vikings earned what they got, especially the defense. The Rowan County defense virtually choked off the Royal running game - five different players carried the ball for a total of just 10 yards rushing. Mason County quarterback Allen Feldhaus was thus forced to the air, where the Viking defense held its own, allowing nine completions in 26 tries for 109 yards besides the three interceptions.

Perhaps the best yardstick to show the game's one-sidedness, aside from the score, would be first downs. In that category, Rowan County ran up 20, while the Royals achieved just six - one of those by penalty.

The Vikings received the opening kickoff, putting the ball in play at their own 22 after a 14-yard return by Brock. They then proceeded to run off their best offensive series of the evening. Ironically, however, it did not result in a score. The Vikings moved the ball

from their 22 to the Royal 21 in 11 plays eating up almost seven minutes, but the drive ended at that point when Brock lost a fumble.

Mason County quickly returned the favor, though. After an incomplete pass by Feldhaus, the Royal quarterback dropped back to throw again on second-and-10. He was sacked for a six-yard loss on the play and fumbled the ball. John Stamper recovered.

Makes Turnover Count

For a moment, it looked as if Rowan County might blow the opportunity. They drove an incomplete pass and a two-yard loss on a keeper, Davis faced third-and-12 at the 18. Then he made the turnover count, however, laying an 18-yard touchdown pass into Brock's arms to make it 6-0. Rowan County's conversion attempt failed when Steve Moore's kick was short. In fact, if the Vikes showed a weakness Friday, it was on point after tries. They were unable to get a single extra-point in seven tries.

The next Mason County series was a typical one for them against the Viking defense - three downs and a punt. Rowan County took over at its own 31 and ran off another fine, but fruitless, offensive drive. This one covered 55 yards in 12 plays at 4:28. Five minutes, but died on downs at the Rowan County 14.

The Royals picked up a first down in moving as far out as the 29, but a clipping penalty set them back and forced another punt. Brock returned it 46 yards for a touchdown, but the score was negated when the Vikings were themselves caught clipping.

Undaunted, Rowan County scored anyway, eight plays later. The drive started at the Viking 25. A few things going in a hurry with a 37-yard punt on the first play, Rowan County looked like a yo-yo for a moment, losing four on a run, gaining 10 on a run, losing five on a penalty, gaining nothing on an incomplete pass. Faced with seeing another drive stall out, though, Rowan County turned in the key play of the set when Davis hit Brock for 14 yards and a first down at the 15. Two plays later, Rowan County closed to the six when Brock carried to the 11 and Mason County was called for face-masking. Adkins broke loose for the touchdown on the next play.

The Vikings almost picked up the conversion, Adkins carried it in, in fact, but Rowan County was caught holding and had to try again from the 18. A pass play failed.

Again, the Royals moved three downs and punting. Again, Brock turned in a long return - 16 yards to his 42. And again, the Vikings were caught clip-

ping, setting themselves back to their own 14.

Thompson turned the series into a serious threat, however, by streaking 61 yards to the Royal 21 on the first play. The Vikings got as close as the six, but both Adkins and Thompson were stopped inside the five by the Royals as time ran out in the half.

Vikings Break Loose After Half

Leading only 12-0 at halftime, the Vikings were still faced with a football game. They quickly remedied that situation, though, by scoring the first four times they had the football in the second half.

The first was set up when Randy Riddle intercepted a pass on Mason County's third play after receiving the second-half kickoff. Riddle returned the ball to the Royal three, and Brock took it in on the first play. Before the snap on the conversion attempt, the Viking line moved, dropping the ball back to the eight. A pass play failed from here.

After the kickoff, the Royals put the ball in play at their own 41. On the first play, Feldhaus fumbled the snap at his own 40. Again Rowan County struck paydirt on the first play after the turnover, with Davis hitting Moore for the touchdown on a bomb down the right side. The Vikings tried to kick the extra point, but Moore missed.

Mason County spent the next 3 1/2 minutes after the kickoff moving to the Viking 35, but Feldhaus lost a fumble at the 46 and the Vikes were in business again.

On the first play, Brock crossed mid-field to the 47. On the second, he was

stopped for no gain. On the third, Adkins got outside and blazed into the end zone to make it 30-0. Rowan County came as close as possible on the conversion, but Moore's kick fell short after hitting the goalpost.

Trick Play Fails

The kickoff went out of bounds, giving Mason County possession at its own 40. Three plays needed just a yard and the Royals punted again. Darrell Glover fumbled the kick at his 28. He recovered but couldn't pick up any return yardage.

However, back-to-back breakaways immediately put Rowan County in position to score again. The first, by Thompson, moved the ball to the Royal 43; the second, by Brock, jumped it to the 15. Three plays later, Brock scored his third touchdown of the night from the six. This time, Rowan County tried a trick play on the conversion - a fake dock and a pass by Davis - but still failed on an incomplete.

Three downs and a punt later, Rowan County put the ball in play at its own 49. The series was actually stopped without a first down, but Mason County roughed Mike Adams on the punt to provide a gift first down at the 29. Again the Royals held on, downs, however, collecting the ball at their own 22. For the first time in the half, the Vikings did not end an offensive series with a trip to paydirt.

They might as well have, though. Feldhaus threw a pass on the Royals' first play, and Stamper picked it off and returned it for the game's final touchdown. Mason County was just sort of there in the end zone, leaving it 42-0.

Larry Ellington picked off a pass to end the next Mason County series short of midfield, but Rowan County couldn't pick up a first down to run out the clock. Mason County again took over on downs but failed to get out of its own territory as the clock wound down to the shutout.

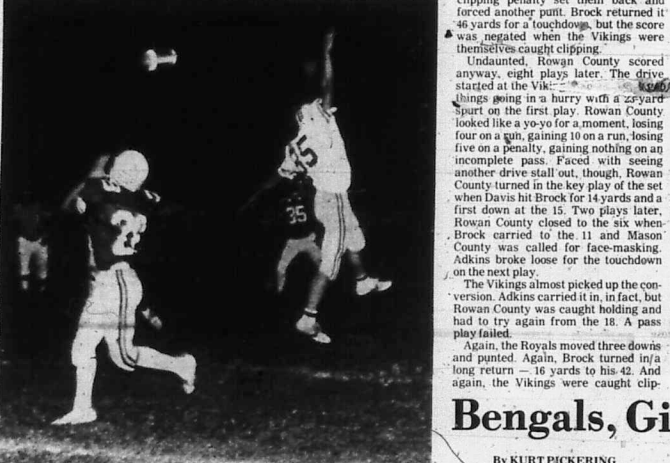
The game ended a four-game home stand as well as the home season for the Vikings, who finish on the road with games at West Carter and Fleming County. Rowan County, now 5-3, still has a slim shot at both the Eastern Kentucky Conference title and a playoff berth. In order to win either, they must win both of their last two games. Their EKC slate is 3-1, and they are 2-1 in the subdistrict.

Graham Still Hopes For Playoff

"We hate to finish up with two on the road," Graham commented, "but we know what we have to do. Our playoff hopes are still alive, so not being home shouldn't hurt our enthusiasm. We should be able to play in the lake."

"For the Vikings to win the subdistrict, Lewis County would have to beat West Carter County Friday in Grayson. If that occurs and Rowan County wins, the Raiders, Lipox and Adams would all finish up at 4-2 in the subdistrict. That happens," Graham explained, "it comes down to common opponents - how many wins the common opponents have against other teams. Neither of them (East Carter or Lewis) beat Fleming, so if we do, we'll win the sub-district."

Mason County's record is now 1-5, 2-3 in the EKC and 1-2 in the sub-district.

Bengals, Giants Get Junior Football Victories

The Bengals, in their third year in the league, have gone from doormat to contender on the strength of their favor when Shane's win marked the first time this season that the Bengals, now 3-1, have not gone to overtime. More importantly, it's the third straight game that the Bengal defense has not allowed a point in regulation.

One, a 32-yard, nine-play effort, ended at the Steeler 35 when the clock ran out at the half; the other was an eight-play drive covering 45 yards to the Steeler 12 that successfully ran out the clock in the fourth quarter. Besides using up much precious time, the Bengal offense ran up 129 yards in total offense, 96 in the first half.

Defensively, the Bengals were routinely immovable. The Steelers lost 14 yards in total offense in the first half, ending up with only 34 yards for the day. In fact, the only Steeler series of note died on downs at the Bengal 33 after 41 yards on 11 plays.

It was a remarkably penalty-free game, with only one flag flying. That came in the fourth quarter, a 15-yard walkoff against the Steelers on a mouthpiece violation that gave the Bengals a first down at the 20 after the series had apparently been stopped on downs.

The Bengals won both ends of the season series from the Steelers, now 1-3. Their first meeting, held at six after regulation, went to the Bengals 28-26 in overtime.

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High School Football Roundup

The word out of Flemingsburg Friday night that a team known as the Panthers, wearing black and gold uniforms, had come up a winner was no surprise. After all, the Fleming County club, which fits that description, hadn't lost a single one of its last 15 home games.

This time, though, there was a catch: the visiting team fit the same description. A team known as the Panthers, wearing black and gold, but calling Carroll County High School home, pulled the biggest upset of the season in this area by nosing out Fleming County 8-6.

The similarities extended beyond names and colors. Each team picked up the bulk of its yardage on the ground—168 yards out of Carroll County's 219 yards in total offense, 123 of Fleming County's 190. Each team looked to one runner for most of its work—Carroll County's Lonnie Humphrey had 141 yards; Fleming County's Bobby Lewis had 110. Each team completed only about a fourth of its pass attempts—Carroll County's Pat Smith was two of eight for 50 yards, while Fleming County's Timmy Williams was four of 15 for 67 yards, plus an interception. The two teams even defeated one of the common opponents by identical scores—49-0 over Haysville County.

The difference was one turnover, the interception thrown by Williams. Playing safely, Smith picked off the pass at the Fleming County 34, switching to quarterback, he immediately threw a touchdown pass to Scott Shelton to give his club the lead early in the second quarter. The lead hooked up

again on the conversion play, giving Carroll County all the points it would need—barely.

For a long while, it looked as if the extra points had been wasted effort. Then, in the fourth quarter, those points became the key to win. Fleming County finally got its offense in gear, driving 80 yards in 18 plays with Lewis scoring on a four-yard run with just 1:22 left. Forced to go for two points, Coach Ted Purcell chose a pass play, with Williams looking for his favorite receiver, Curtis Jackson. The ball, however, fell harmlessly into complete and Carroll County ran out the clock for its biggest win of the year.

The frustration for Fleming County is multiplied by the playoff situation. After the Lewis County scare two weeks ago, Fleming County played a solid game against a fine East Carter squad last week and appeared to be rolling again, heading into Friday's upset. Fleming County was 2-0 in the four-team subdistrict and needed just this one more win to guarantee itself a berth in the playoffs. Carroll County, however, was also unbeaten at 1-0 in the subdistrict, having yet to play Bath County. Now that Fleming County has lost, its fate is no longer in its own hands; no matter what Fleming County does the rest of the season, it cannot win the playoffs.

unless Bath County upsets Carroll County Friday in Carrollton. And that would only make it possible, not guarantee it.

Fleming County's overall record is now 6-1, while Carroll County upped its record to 6-2. Fleming County visits Maysville Friday.

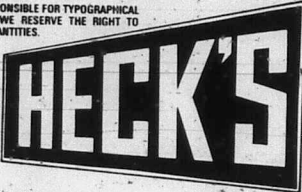
The Morehead, Berea, London, Somerset and Stearns Ranger Districts offer primitive camping sites available by reservation only. They are open year-round except for those on the

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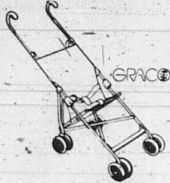
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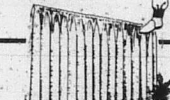

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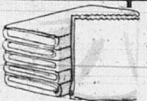

Mail Order Firm Is Sued By State.

FRANKFORT, Ky. Attorney General Steven L. Beshear has announced the consumer protection division has filed a lawsuit against National Marketing and Advertising Ltd. Inc., a Fort Lauderdale, Fla., mail-order company and its president, Danny C. Lennen.

The lawsuit alleges the Florida business engaged in unfair and deceptive trade practices in the advertisement and sale of sewing kits and "Doodle Loom" yarn kits to consumers in Jefferson, Fayette and Franklin counties.

Beshear said the consumer protection division received more than 150 complaints from Kentucky consumers against the mail order company. The lawsuit alleges National Marketing and Advertising Ltd. violated the Kentucky Consumer Protection Act when it advertised and accepted payments for merchandise not available, failed to deliver merchandise within 30 days after receiving orders and failed to refund payments after orders were canceled.

The lawsuit, according to Beshear, seeks a permanent court order against the alleged unfair and deceptive practices, full restitution to victimized consumers and civil penalties of \$2,000 for each willful violation of the Kentucky Consumer Protection Act.

Beshear said any consumers who have complaints against National Marketing and Advertising Ltd. should immediately send his office a written statement with information concerning their problems with the company. Frosts Can Increase Risks Of Cattle Loss

Early frosts in Kentucky have warned cattlemen of the dangers of prussic acid poisoning, which has killed some animals in the last two weeks. But cattlemen can reduce the risk of potentially dangerous forages with good grazing practices, said Garry Lacefield, Extension forages specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Plants of the sorghum variety, including sorghum hybrids, can produce toxic levels of prussic acid, depending on the weather and plant height, Lacefield said. Pearl millet is apparently

free of prussic acid in toxic amounts, he said.

Several weeds, including johnsongrass and leaves of wild cherry trees can also produce dangerous amounts of prussic acid, one of the most potent toxins in nature, said Lacefield.

"An animal that consumes a lethal dose will die in a few hours," he said. "Often, a dead animal the morning after a frost is the first warning of prussic acid poisoning."

Animals consuming lesser amounts will have labored breathing and irregular pulse, and will froth at the mouth and stagger, he said.

Lacefield recommends several steps to minimize the danger of prussic acid poisoning:

1. Do not graze sorghum plants for two weeks after a non-killing frost.
2. After a killing frost, do not graze until plant material is dry, usually in 48 hours. Check each field to make sure it is completely frozen.
3. Do not graze at night when frost is likely.
4. Graze sorghum plants only when they are at least 15 inches tall. Do not graze wilted plants or plants with tillers. Young tillers contain higher levels of prussic acid, which is diluted as the plant matures.
5. Delay grazing fields of crop-residues infested with johnsongrass and other weeds until the fields have been completely frozen and the weeds are dried.
6. Do not allow access to wild cherry leaves whether they are wilted or not. After storms, check pastures for fallen limbs.

Lacefield said farmers usually do not have prussic acid feeding problems from silage or field cured hay, since prussic acid implants is usually diluted during the ensiling and curing processes.

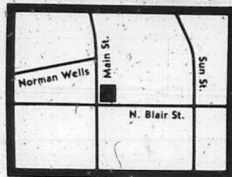

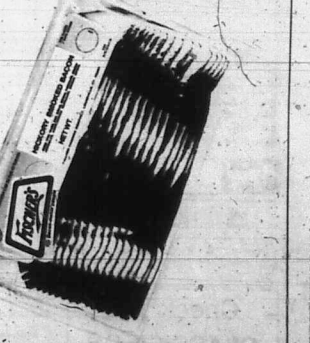

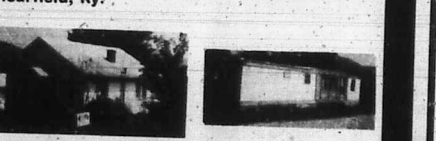

down by virtue of a 16 yard scamper by Dorrin Hunter down to the nine yard line.

The Eagles were halted on the four yard line and settled for a 21 yard field goal and a 20-7 lead with 17:27 left in the game.

Youngstown scored first, and quickly on a 48 yard run on their first play from scrimmage.

Morehead put together a nine play-90 yard drive before the end of the first quarter, capped off by a quarterback sneak by Reeves.

The drive was highlighted with a nine yard draw by freshman Brian Shimer for the Eagles first first down.

Shimer followed with a 11 yard run on the next play.

Do Chambers was an important factor in the touchdown drive, catching two first down passes, one for 21 yards, and the other good for 33 yards, which put the Eagles on the Youngstown two yard line.

Reeves then took the ball into the end zone himself.

Morehead didn't waste much time getting its second touchdown. The Eagles marched 54 yards in three minutes.

The 12 play drive contained four of the Eagles 10 first downs.

Hunter did most of the work during the drive and received credit for a one yard touchdown.

Hunter was the leading ground gainer for Morehead with 91 yards on 26 carries. Shimer finished with 33 yards in five attempts.

Morehead totaled 143 yards rushing and 85 yard passing.

Reeves threw 17 passes, completing six, two to Chambers and four to Devine.

John Christopher kept Morehead in the game with his nine punts. The sophomore averaged 38.4 yards, his longest falling into the end zone, 48 yards away.

Goach, a sophomore linebacker, tied a MSU school record with 23 tackles, 11 of them unassisted.

Jerry Spaeth had 23 defensive plays in 1973 against Marshall and so did Ron Little in 1971 against Eastern.

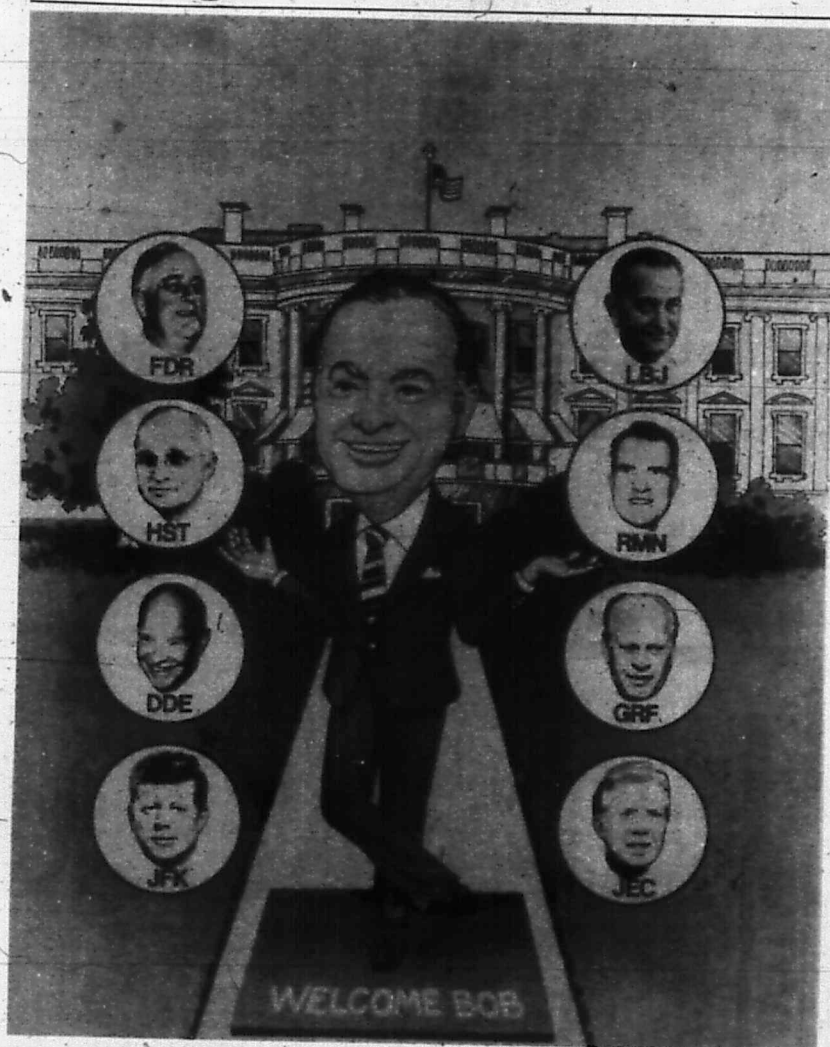

Pen pals galore

"Dear Pen Pal," the world's largest program of its kind, recently matched its 2 millionth pen pal. The name-matching operation to provide children with pen pals is a national children's television series.

According to Mary Nagelmann, supervisor of the pen pal program, "Since we started in the summer of 1974, we've processed 1.3 million domestic and 700,000 foreign requests for pen pals." Most of these requests are from youngsters aged 10 through 16. Nearly 1.5 million requests come from girls. Writings older than Bible are explained

Reviewing the film in Archaeology magazine, Dr. Harvey Weiss of Yale University wrote, "This is a remarkable film. Thanks to a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, we now have a vivid and engrossing document that explains what has been discovered at Tell Mardikh-Ebla in Syria and why these discoveries are of such significance. ... The Royal Archives of Ebla" provides this information in a manner that will make extraordinary viewing on television.

Filmed at Ebla and other ancient sites in Syria and narrated by Arthur Kennedy, the film features Dr. Fasolo and Matthiae, discoverer and director of Ebla. Standing on the ramparts, Matthiae explains why he chose this site and what his future plans are for its excavation. Backed up by magnificent helicopter views of the dig and the Royal Palace of 3rd millennium Ebla, the camera follows Matthiae into the room in the palace where scribes filed the clay tablets 2,500 years before Christ. There Matthiae found them.

Dr. Giovanni Pettinato, original translator of the Ebla texts, transmits his joy at finding a large tablet with the words "en-eb-laki" which means "king of Ebla."

The film uses modern examples to illustrate the contents of the texts, e.g., as the narrator explains that 70 percent of the tablets refer to Ebla's prosperous trade

throughout the Near East, donkey caravans are seen traversing mountain and desert terrain, and views of cities Ebla merchants visited are included. References to Ebla's foremost industry, weaving, are recounted against the sight and sound of weavers at their looms in Aleppo today, just 35 miles from Ebla. Then, as now, the area was famous for its textiles.

Magnificent statues from Mari, arch rival of Ebla, and an unusual score using ancient instruments enhance the impact of the film.

"The biblical connection" is not omitted. Great interest and controversy was aroused when Pettinato identified biblical names such as Ishmael, Sodom and Gomorrah in the Ebla texts. However, the Ebla texts predate the biblical period by 500 to 1,000 years.

The series will assess the strengths and weaknesses of America's nuclear strategy and the readiness and competence of our armed forces and examine the Soviet Union and what the nuclear age means to that world power. It will also look at the wild cards, those small countries that may force the superpowers into war, or develop nuclear capabilities of their own and blackmail the superpowers with the threat of nuclear conflict.
