Man Arrested For Trying To Burn Goddard Bridge

A Fleming County man was arrested last week in connection with the attempted arson of the Goddard Covered Bridge.

Lodged in the Fleming County Jail is Omar Jordan, 38, Rt. 1, Flemingsburg in lieu of \$5,000 cash bond.

State Police Arson Investigator Donald McBrayer made the arrest in the case and is still investigating the incident.

McBrayer said that approximately \$1,000 worth of damage was done to the structure of the bridge.

The incident reportedly occurred at

1:30 a.m. Feb. 2. Jordan allegedly started a fire on two cross beams on the inside of the bridge at about 11:30 p.m. the night of Feb. 1.

McBrayer said a beer carlon was used to start the fire, which burned a hole through the bridge.

The Goddard Church was burned to the ground last Aug. 24 in another fire where arson is suspected.

McBrayer said, however, Jordan is not a suspect in that case, as he was out of town at the time of that fire. He said there apparently is no connection between the two fires.

KY 801 Changes Now In Design Stage

An estimated \$2.7 million proposed highway project in the county will completely rebuild 1.4 miles of KY 801 from US 60 to Cave Run, according to James A. Brown, district engineer for the Bureau of Highways in the state Department of Transportation.

Brown said the construction phase of the project, which will total \$1.7 million, should get underway in 1983. A right-of-way for the project is scheduled to be purchased sometime in 1982 at an estimated cost of \$474,000. At the present, design work is being done and finalized for the project, noted Brown.

The rebuilding of the road will consist of new construction including grade, curbing and high walls for a possible 1.4 miles at the junction of US 60 and KY 801 and extending southerly for approximately 1.4 miles.

Brown said safety and a better traffic capacity were the prime reasons for the proposed project. He noted the roadway

is an approach to Cave Run Dam and is frequently used, though it is very narrow and has a limited shoulder.

"Traffic just demands a better road," he said. Brown stated, to his knowledge, the present road has been there before the lake and no new road has ever been built, despite the increased usage.

Once the KY 801 project is started in 1983, Brown said it should not take very long to complete since it is not a "big" project work-wise. He said the length of time for completion will depend on the size and ability of the contractor and the weather, among other factors.

"The 801 (construction) is a major project in improvement of service," he stressed.

Another proposed highway project for Rowan County is the pavement restoration of 1.1 miles of 164 from KY 799 to Smith's Run Road slated to begin sometime in 1983. The cost of the

project is estimated at \$1.8 million and will basically consist of repaving the roadway, which has deteriorated due to weather and heavy use.

Brown termed the job "routine maintenance" and said he didn't believe this section of 164 has been renovated since it was built.

"A road just lasts so long and then you have to put a black top on it," he said.

"The money is big, but the project is not that complicated as far as the public is concerned," said Brown about the 164 project.

"It won't interrupt service," he said, adding, "Traffic will be accommodated as the project is finished."

Once the project is finished, Brown said it will make for a smoother ride on that section of 164, as well as prevent the road from getting rougher due to continued deterioration.

The proposed highway projects involve both federal and state monies.

Loan Sought For Rowan Water Expansion

Rowan Water Inc. moved one step closer toward the expansion of the water service for customers in the KY 32 vicinity during a special session of the board of directors Friday afternoon.

Four motions were passed by the board, which allow the completion of all remaining paperwork for a possible \$610,000 loan from Farmers Home Administration that will permit Rowan Water Inc. to proceed with the project.

The board authorized Board Chairman Sherman R. Arnett to execute a letter of intent to FmHA officials in regard to the loan. The motion called for Arnett to legally assure FmHA that Rowan Water Inc. had reviewed and accepted the conditions of the loan as set forth by FmHA in a letter to the board dated Jan. 29.

The letter of intent will also promise FmHA that all the stated conditions of the loan will be met within 120 days of the letter.

Also pertaining to this motion: the board authorized Arnett to gather any documents required by FmHA for processing of the loan.

Motions adopting a proposed operating budget schedule and an operation and management plan for the KY 32 project were also passed by the board. Both motions were necessary in order to wrap up required paperwork for the loan and allow FmHA officials to submit it for processing.

The last motion passed in regard to the project authorized Arnett to write a letter to the board's engineering firm telling it to begin work on the project according to conditions of the FmHA loan.

Two FmHA officials, Thomas G. Fern

and Charlie Blankenship, attended the special meeting to go over conditions of the loan with board members and answer any questions.

After all motions pertaining to the loan were passed by the board, Fern stressed that execution of the letter of intent by the board does not mean funds have definitely been obligated for the project. He said, though, with all the necessary paperwork complete it was a good indicator that once the loan is officially processed — the funds should flow.

He emphasized that any unforeseen problems, including unexpected cuts in agency funding, could jeopardize the loan. However, he added it is expected that FmHA will be able to make the loan to Rowan Water Inc.

"We don't anticipate any problems," said Fern.

Arnett expressed the board's appreciation and gratitude to FmHA for the loan.

"It's been through their agency that we've been able to serve our 1,800 customers," Arnett reminded board members.

Rowan Water previously had applied to FmHA for funding, preferably grant money, for the KY 32 project. About two weeks ago, Arnett was advised by FmHA officials that funds through a loan might be available for the project. Upon consulting with board members, it was decided to apply for the loan which would enable the project to be completely finished in lieu of a lesser loan that would only partially complete the job.

The special board meeting was a result of this decision, as well as a necessary procedure to finalize it and prepare for the processing of the loan.

At the meeting, Blankenship told board members that while the KY 32 project was a high priority project on

the FmHA list, it was not the highest.

He said the top priority project of the agency consumed the entire amount of agency grant monies, some \$449,000, as well as reserve grant funds obtained by the agency at a later date. Because of this, he said FmHA could only offer Rowan Water possible funding through a loan.

Blankenship said the board probably was wise to accept a virtual certain loan than to deal with an uncertain future.

Official verification of the loan application for the project is expected soon. Rowan Water is presently providing service to approximately 690 customers in the KY 32 vicinity on a line that was designed to hold 140 laps.

In another matter, Larry Breeze and Rowan County Judge Executive W.C. Flannery came to meet with the water board representing the "32 North Sewer Committee," a body formed to develop the Gateway Area Development District here on the project.

The primary purpose of the committee is to gain a sewerage line to service residents in the KY 32 area all the way to the Fleming County line. This proposed customer group will also include the Morehead State University Farm and the new high school.

Breeze said the committee had

finished all of the preliminary work on the project and now must find a legal body to sponsor and carry it out.

The city had been approached about sponsoring the project, but declined to accept the invitation due to problems pertaining to its charter, said Breeze.

He stated it was the committee's belief that the next most logical body to sponsor the project was Rowan Water, so he and Flannery were formally making the request.

Breeze noted that \$128,000 in funding was practically certain from the Morehead State University Development District for the project. He added that additional funding might be gained through tap fees and grant or loans from FmHA.

This is expected to be done sometime this week.

Parks, however, did say that all three classes in Rowan County were close to the 108 mark and within eight percentage points of each other.

"All of them were within four points of either side of 108 (percent)," he noted.

While individual property class ratios have not been made known to either state PVAs or the public yet, composite county assessment-sales ratios have been released due to a requirement of law. The Department of Revenue is bound by law to release the composite ratios to the public by the end of each January.

In layman's terms, Parks said, "This (the Rowan County composite ratio of 108.4 percent) means assessments in the county are about eight percent higher than the median sales price for property sold in the county last year."

"Overall, the picture in Rowan County is good and this is considered a good quality assessment," said Parks. "We can safely say there will not be any need in Rowan County for any general or broad assessment in the past year," he said, adding, "It's (Porter) in good shape in Rowan County."

Property owners whose property status has changed in some way, however, will still face the possibility of assessment increases. This would include property that has been improved or property that has changed classes during the past year, said Parks.

Parks also noted possible assessment increases might depend on the discretion of individual PVAs across the states. He said it was possible in some counties for one particular class

of real estate (farm, residential or commercial) to have assessment-sales ratios extremely high and another class to have substantially lower ratios. In such cases, Parks said the PVA might want to raise assessments in the class with the low ratio and lower assessments with the extremely high ratio.

All nearby counties had composite assessment-sales ratios lower than that of Rowan County. According to the ratios released by the Department of Revenue, property tax assessment-sales ratios for surrounding counties were: Bath County, 65.5 percent; Carter County, 89.2 percent; Fleming County, 104.5 percent; Lewis County, 95.5 percent; Menifee County, 107.5 percent; Montgomery County, 87.8 percent; Morgan County, 83.2 percent; Wolfe County, 102.8 percent. An assessment-sales ratio was not available for Elliott County as "assessment totals were not submitted for certification as of Jan. 19."

The highest assessment-sales ratio in the state was a 117.9 percent in Spencer County while Jefferson County had the lowest with a 71.9 percent, according to the state Department of Revenue data.

While it is noted that assessing property is not an exact science, Department of Revenue officials said the International Association of Assessing Officers has recently suggested a standard to determine when a median assessment to sale ratio is acceptable. According to the suggested guideline, if the ratio falls within 10 percent, plus or minus, of market value, it can be considered an acceptable indicator of true market value. Thus, all assessment ratios falling between 90 percent and 110

percent in the released state data met this criteria.

Assessment-sales ratios reflect a comparison of the certified assessments for the past year with actual sales and is the best available measure of the extent to which property has been assessed according to a Constitutional standard. The state standard requires that all property in Kentucky be assessed for tax purposes at its full fair cash value.

The Department of Revenue computes the ratio on actual sales and assessments in each county. The assessment and a sales information as reflected in the individual ratios is used to compute the percentage of the fair cash value achieved by assessments in the county. In compiling the averages, the ratios for the three classes of real estate (residential, farm and commercial) are calculated separately, then an overall average is figured, giving each of the three classes its proportional weight according to the typical countywide assessment.

The ratios signify the typical countywide assessment and cannot be applied to individual parcels of property. Thus an assessment ratio of 95 percent does not mean that each individual's property was assessed at 95 percent of its fair cash value, but instead that the typical countywide assessment was 95 percent of indicated market value.

The Department of Revenue reports the overall ratio for all real estate in Kentucky last year was 89 percent. This average is weighted to account for the fact that some counties have significantly greater assessed values than others.

State officials have stressed that the

Stamper-Link Trial Underway

LEXINGTON, Ky. (UPI) — The trial of state Sen. Woodrow Stamper, D-West Liberty, and Lexington realtor Robert F. Link resumed in federal court yesterday — only six days after the pair were mentioned in an indictment of former Democratic Party chief Howard P. "Sonny" Hunt.

U.S. District Judge Bernard T. Moynahan Jr. said with as many as 50 witnesses expected to testify, the trial could take as long as eight weeks.

Stamper, 63, and Link, 59, are accused of conspiring to cajole the state into buying the Hidden Valley dude ranch in Powell County on an inflated price, all the while knowing Stamper had a secret interest in the property.

Stamper failed to pay federal income taxes on the money he made off the scheme, according to federal prosecutors.

The 22-count indictment against Hunt, handed down Feb. 4, offers clues to the story prosecutors are likely to tell when the Stamper-Link trial gets beyond the jury selection stage.

That process was suddenly interrupted last year when both sides charged improper use of media funds. However, Moynahan refused a defense motion to dismiss the charges on that basis.

In the Hunt indictment — though the exact details are obscure — the three are accused generally of conspiring with others to control from start to finish the process by which Hidden Valley was acquired by the state.

"It was part of the scheme," reads the Hunt indictment, "that the defendant and co-conspirators would and did put in motion the process by which the Commonwealth would purchase Hidden Valley, and (that they) influenced and controlled the various stages of said process."

The indictment further charges the trio and others oversaw "the inspections of said property, the appraisals, as well as the recommendations and decisions with respect to the price, selection and purchase" of Hidden Valley.

The Hunt indictment said the dude ranch acquisition was accomplished "by extraordinary means."

Specifically, Hunt is accused of helping Stamper pay for options on Hidden Valley by ordering Bombwell Insurance Agency of Lexington to make payments to another insurance firm run by Stamper's son-in-law.

The money was then directed to Stamper himself to make some of the Hidden Valley option payments.

The state bought the Hidden Valley property for \$515,000, intending to turn it into a prison. That never happened, and the state is still having trouble finding a buyer for the 680-acre tract.

Stamper and Link were indicted last July 25 by a special federal grand jury investigating alleged corruption in state government. That jury was impaneled in June, 1979.

PAL Activities Suspended

The Police Athletic League is having growing pains.

Lack of a facility to meet in on a regular basis has caused suspension of activities until the problem is solved.

"Mr. Clifford Cassity has been gracious in letting us use Morehead Grade School, but 75-80 kids is just too many to play in there," the Police Chief said.

Other facilities have been offered the PAL, but only on an irregular schedule. "We meet on Thursdays from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. To keep the kids, we have to meet at the same place, same time and same night consistently, or otherwise

there is no solution. . . . use the Carl D. Perkins Community Building as its walls could not withstand the impact of ball playing. Some nights have found the PAL split in several groups at various locations to avoid overcrowding, a situation that does not please board members.

Anyone can be a member of the PAL, a group kept busy with bay rides, canoe trips, parties, ballgames and roller-skating.

"Some come through the courts, some the Department of Human Resources, some are just walk-ins," said Barnsdale. "We don't tell who is there on what conditions — there is no name calling."

The ultimate goal of PAL is to "have a piece of land, a building of our own, then open when school lets out, and on Saturdays," said the Chief. "For the time being, we need to find something on a once a week basis. We've grown to

ratio might have come substantially closer to the 100 percent required by the state Constitution had it not been for several court cases involving assessments last year. Due to court actions, the Department of Revenue was required to certify assessments at less than full value in 16 counties last year which included Barren, Bell, Boone, Boyd, Carter, Franklin, Grant, Greenup, Harlan, Jefferson, Logan, Morgan, Nicholas, Pendleton, Shelby and Simpson.

The combined assessment sales ratio of these 16 counties came to 75.5 percent, compared to a combined ratio of 96 percent of remaining Kentucky counties where assessments were certified at full value.

Also, because the department was legally forced to certify assessments at a lower level in these 16 particular counties, it resulted in unequal treatment of taxpayers in other counties, according to the state.

The state property tax rate of 24.1 cents per \$100 valuation was applied to assessments in all counties; therefore the effective tax rate of the 16 counties with lower assessments was less than those counties that followed the requirements of the law.

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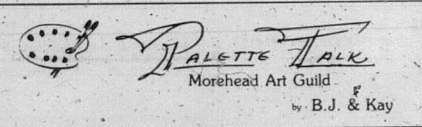

Legend has it that the first explorers upon first sight of the broad valley from the surrounding mountain peaks, was claimed to utter the biblical expression, "Behold the land of Canaan!" Early pioneers discovered this high mountain valley as early as 1753 and realized immediately that this was an exceptional land, destined for many great things in the future.

One of those things has been 6,000-acre Canaan Valley State Park. This was the first complete winter sports complex built in the Mountain State and is rated high on the popularity list of visitors from many surrounding states. A new 250-room lodge, plus a number of housekeeping cabins, and accompanying area that remains open throughout the winter are the basic accommodations for skiers on the slopes at Canaan Valley, nearby Blackwater Falls State Park and numerous private facilities throughout the area are also used by many visitors when the park is filled to capacity.

Downhill skiing became popular in Canaan Valley more than 30 years ago when area residents decided to take advantage of the valley's annual snowfall of between 120 and 180 inches. Later, when the park was developed, modern snow-making equipment was utilized to guarantee enough snow to fill out the winter season, which runs from before Christmas of most years into late March.

With a base elevation of 3,400 feet and summits running almost 4,300 feet, Canaan is an ideal winter sport facility. Not only does the resort offer excellent downhill skiing, ice skating at the lighted rink is highly popular among park guests as are the miles on top of miles of cross country ski trails.

Canaan Valley is a great place to learn to ski. Qualified instructors take beginning skiers (such as Groh and I) and teach them the basics of the sport. Gentle slopes are then used to practice. With no more than an hour's instructions, the average first-time skiers will be able to handle beginner slopes with enough skill to make the activity interesting. As in our case, we learned truly to enjoy the sport after a couple of hours practice.

Cost-wise, Canaan Valley is also a

YOUR... Social Security
By Robert Stapp

A person's social security number is his or her key to future protection against loss or reduction of income because of retirement, disability, or death. Robert Stapp, social security district manager in Ashland, said recently.

This is because future social security benefits will be based on the record of earnings kept under the number shown on the social security card during a person's working lifetime.
Many people have the same name, but each person has his or her own social security number which singles out that record from some 200 million others.
A person should show his or her social security card to each employer and make sure the employer copies the name and number exactly as shown on the card. This will help avoid any mis-

takes, as reported earnings are recorded under the correct number.
The stub showing a person's social security number should be kept with other important papers. If a person loses his or her social security card, he or she can then take the stub to any social security office to apply for a new card which will show the old number. Proof of identity is required, however.
A person who changes his or her name should also apply for a new card. He or she will need evidence showing both old and new names.
It is against the law to use another person's social security number. It is also against the law to use a social security number obtained by giving false information on the application. Penalties include a fine of up to \$1,000, a jail sentence of up to one year, or both.

December Unemployment Was Up

Unemployment for December in Rowan County was among the lowest in Eastern Kentucky, according to figures just released by the state Department for Human Resources.

And the rate of 7.7 percent was the lowest of any county in the surrounding region.

The numbers mean that in December, 658 people out of a civilian labor force of 8,574 were looking for work.

Martin County, with its coal fields, posted the lowest unemployment rate of any county in Eastern Kentucky with a rate of 4.6 percent. The 34-county Eastern Kentucky area had a

December unemployment rate of 10.1 percent, compared to 9.2 percent the month before. The figure represents an increase in the number of those out of work from 28,272 to 30,767.

The highest jobless rate was posted in Carter County where 1,564 people, or 18.2 percent, of the labor force, were looking for jobs.

Other Eastern Kentucky rates in this region were: Bath County, 15.1 percent; Elliott County, 9.4; Menifee, 15.1; Montgomery, 9.7; Morgan, 12; and Wolfe, 16.4.

Fleming County had an unemployment rate of 10.8, percent while Lewis County posted a rate of 15 per-

cent. Both counties are listed under the Northern Kentucky region, where unemployment averaged 8.4 percent.

The state unemployment rate for December was 8.6 percent, up 0.6 percent from the month before. The national unemployment rate for December was 6.9 percent.

Excise Tax Is Not Decreased

You may have noticed that the federal excise tax on your phone bill didn't decrease this year.

That's because a bill signed into law in December by then-President Jimmy Carter froze the tax at its 1980 level of two percent.

Since 1973, the tax had been decreasing by one percent each year, and was to be totally phased out at the start of 1982.

Under the present provisions, the tax will remain at two percent this year, decrease to one percent next year and be totally phased out at the start of 1983.

Freezing the tax at two percent will bring the government \$358 million more than if the tax had been reduced to one percent.

The tax, which is levied on all local and long distance phone calls, was at 10 percent when the annual reductions began in 1973.

today, followed by a discussion between Friedman and an articulate exponent of different and usually opposing points of view.

In episode one, Friedman visits Hong Kong to demonstrate how free markets work. According to Friedman, Hong Kong, possessing no natural resources other than a fine harbor, enjoys a thriving and prosperous society. The absence of economic controls and government central planning allows the economy to generate a standard of living that is among the highest in Asia. And Hong Kong's people are free, a condition also rare in Asia.

Against Bethel, LCC turned the game around in the second quarter. For a time, it looked as if the Lions might do the same against the Cats, but LCC ended up outscoring Tollesboro only 18-16 in the quarter to trail 30-21 at intermission.

But Tollesboro wrapped it up with an 18-3 third frame, then added a 15-9 fourth-frame advantage.

Tollesboro's Kelly Harrison led all scorers with 23, 11 of them in the fourth quarter. The 6'1" standout included seven hits of nine free throws in his totals. He was joined in double digits by John Bruner who fouled out with 17, and Darin Stanfield with 15.

The Lions won their first two games in the tourney largely on the outside shooting of Andy Plummer and Merle Kidwell, and they lost this one largely because Tollesboro shut that pair down. Neither scored in the first quarter. Although they combined for all but two of the Lions' second-quarter points, Tollesboro shut them down again the rest of the way. Plummer ended up with 14, eight in the second quarter alone, while Kidwell posted only eight, all in the second.

Morehead 49 University Breckinridge 47 (Overtime)

The Vikings, having taken a week off after upsetting previously unbeaten Clark Hill in the tourney's second

round, became prohibitive favorites for the title after that win. Besides their 18-1 record and their lengthy string of accomplishments this season, Morehead owned 44-31 and 42-24 victories over Saturday's opponent, Breck.

The Eagles, meanwhile, appeared to have jelled after the second Morehead loss. Breck got to the final four on a 33-point win over Tilden Hogge and a 13-point win over RCGSL runnerup Farmers, the only team to beat Morehead this season.

Breck broke to a 10-4 first quarter edge and still led, 20-16, at the half. The Eagles extended the edge of 34-26 after three quarters and very nearly pulled off the upset. Jimmy Livingood and Andy Thompson combined for 14 fourth-quarter points, though, and the period ended with the cross-town rivals knotted at 43.

Morehead held Kyle Crager, who led all scorers with 30 scores in the overtime, allowing only one field goal each by Eric Blair and Mike Serey. The Vikings, meanwhile, got a floor shot from Livingood and two free throws each from Steve Back and Larry Early to collect the win.

Crager was the only Eagle in double digits. Livingood scored 18 for the Vikings, who also got 10 from Back.

University Breckinridge 66 Lewis County Central 61

Crager and Kidwell put on a scoring clinic in Sunday's consolation game. Kyle scored 10 points in the second quarter alone on the way to a game-high 28, and Gary had a 13-point fourth quarter while getting 27 for the game. As Crager won the battle of the scorers in a close one, so Breck won the game in an overtime decision.

Oddly, the game began as a low-scoring one, with Breck and Lewis combining for only 15 first-frame points. Led by Crager, however, the Eagles rolled up 21 points in the game's second frame as Breck moved to a 29-19 halftime edge.

LCC closed that to 37-34 after three, then tied it 35-35 Kidwell's big fourth quarter, along with six points from Plummer.

In the extra period, Crager outscored Kidwell 5-4, but Blair added four more for Breck while the only other Lion to score, Joey McCann, posted just two. Brian White also added a field goal for Breck, which won the period 11-6 and

the game 66-61.

One of the reasons LCC faded at the end was the absence of two starters, as both Plummer and Tony Swearingen fouled out.

Morehead 31 Tollesboro 28

The tournament's championship game could have been written and rehearsed, judging by its drama.

When the tournament opened three Saturdays ago, the Vikings had the second best record in the field at 14-1. Tollesboro the third at 16-3. With both Morehead and Clark Hill, 12-0 as the playoff opened, in the same bracket, a collision of the best two records for the title was not possible. But a collision of two of the top three was, and that's exactly what happened. After Morehead upset the Hawks, the Vikings became the team to beat, and Tollesboro nearly did.

Morehead took a 13-9 lead after one period and was forced to struggle to hang on the rest of the way. The Vikings never again outscored the Wildcats, tying the second stanza at seven, losing the third 6-5 and trailing the fourth 8-5.

Harrison scored six of his game-high 11 points while leading the fourth-quarter effort. Cameron Kenney, who was held to a single point by Breck, paced the champions with nine. Larry Early scored eight, including four crucial final-frame points as Morehead held off the Wildcat rally.

Awards

The top four teams received trophies after Sunday's finale. The coaches — Corky Prather of Lewis County Central, Scott Cites of University Breckinridge, Randy Harrison of Tollesboro and Gary Gartin of Morehead — accepted for their clubs.

The top two cheerleading squads were honored, with sponsors Brenda Wells and Veronica Kenney accepting for their girls, first-place Tilden Hogge and second-place Morehead.

Crager, who put together four straight 20-point games in the tourney and averaged 22 per game, was named the tourney most valuable player. Crager had the highest scoring average among players on the teams who reached the final four. His 22.3 points per game were among all tournament players.

Lady Eagles Demolish Campbellsville

When the Morehead State Lady Eagles defeated the Dayton Lady Flyers 80-69 during the 1976-77 season, Susann Brown established a team record for assists in a single game with 11.

Although their record has stood ever since, it has been bettering lately. Saturday night, it finally fell.

Against Bellarmine Jan. 28, Irene Moore collected nine assists. The next night, Robin Harmon matched that number against Ohio. On Jan. 31

against WKU, it was Moore again, this time with eight. In Marshall eight days later, Moore collected 10, and Thursday at Murray State, Harmon had nine.

Then, in Saturday's 107-48 pasting of Campbellsville, Moore assisted Harmon for MSU's first bucket of the game and had rolled up nine basket aids by halftime.

In the second half, Moore moved within one of the record by assisting Harmon again less than two minutes into the half. Five minutes later, Moore

tied the record when Harmon took a pass from her and laid it in. And, with 5:14 to go in the game, Moore passed to Bonnie Blackford and Harmon, who footed to allow Moore to erase Brown's name from the record book.

Moore was involved in the scoring of an astonishing 45 points in the game. Besides passing out 12 assists, she scored 19 as well. Three other Lady Eagles joined her in double digits, as Stephens posted 24 to lead all scorers while Priscilla Blackford and Harmon delivered 14 each. Stephens and Blackford were the game's top rebounders with 15 apiece. Lynn Miley collected 11 carrots.

The individual scoring leaders for Campbellsville were Cathy Settle with 17 and Betty Conover with 11. Jennifer Myers, Conover and Settle each recovered seven missed shots.

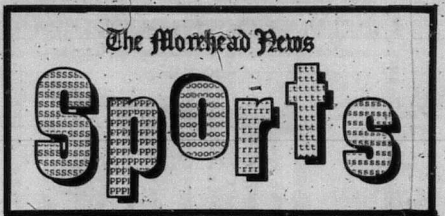
As a team, MSU also set a single-game record. The Lady Eagles scored 51 field goals, establishing a new mark for the second time this season. The old mark was 50 against Bellarmine.

The Lady Eagles also approaches some other team single-game marks. Their 95 field goal attempts were six off the three-year-old record. Morehead scored 51 points in the first half, six off the record set this year against Bellarmine, and 56 in the second half, five behind the old mark set two years back against Charleston. The 107 points were eight off the old record and four fewer than the season high against Bellarmine. Also, Morehead's 69 rebounds missed the old mark by six.

Statistically, MSU's domination of the Lady Tigers was nearly complete. Morehead's field goal percentage was 31.6, more than double the 24.3 turned in by Campbellsville on 18 of 74. MSU out-rebounded Campbellsville 69-34, had three fewer turnovers at 16-13, picked up eight steals to six for the losers, and blocked 11 shots, compared with none by Campbellsville.

The Lady Tigers' only statistical advantage came in categories involving fouling and free throws. Campbellsville committed 14 fouls, two fewer than Morehead. The Lady Tigers also out-scored the Lady Eagles 19-5. However, Morehead attempted only seven free throws, hitting 74.1 percent, while Campbellsville tried 17 and hit 70.5 percent.

Campbellsville, now 10-7, is an NCAA Division II school, so the loss does not count in the standings of the Kentucky Women's Interscholastic Conference, even though both schools are members. Morehead's record is now 11-12; and the Lady Eagles will try to even their mark for the first time since Dec. 5 when they lost to Louisville at 7-30. MSU is now 8-0 at home.

The Eagles' continue to have rebounding problems. They were outrebounded at Murray by 11, 42-24.

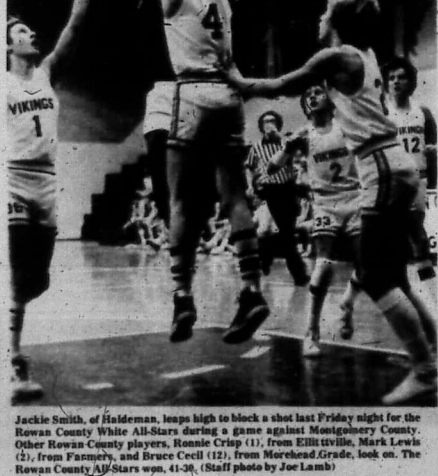

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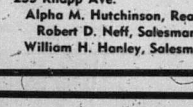
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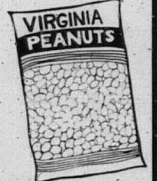
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Brides-To-Be Treated To Fashion Review

On Sunday afternoon, a truck arrived at the White House loaded with a computer printout, giving a full answer to what someone in the department had considered a serious question from the president. To compile the printout, the Labor Department kept a full computer team working overtime during the weekend.

A horrified Rosalynn Carter was told the research had probably cost hundreds of thousands of dollars in overtime, "the Post reported. Amy's teacher must not have been impressed. She only got a "C" on the homework.

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Southern States Plans Meeting For Morehead

Members of Southern States Cooperative's local board and committee members, agricultural workers and retail agency managers will attend a regional board meeting in Morehead on Feb. 17. The session will be held at the Holiday Inn and registration will begin at 9 a.m.

Also attending the meeting, will be a number of guest young farmers from this area.

A total of 19 of these regional meetings will be held by Southern

States over a five-state area. The cooperative serves farmer-members who live in Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Delaware and Kentucky and who hold a total of 354,552 memberships in the organization.

Jerre Cannon of Flemingsburg, a member of the Southern States 15-man board of directors will preside at the meeting. Cannon represents the cooperative's members in eastern Kentucky and western portion of West Virginia. He has been a member of the board since 1975.

Featured at the session will be a presentation entitled "The Future and You," to be presented by R.W. Bryan, director. Member and Institutional Relations, who heads a two-man management team that will attend the session.

H.B. Manuel, manager Retail Operations, the other team member will discuss a number of cooperative principles which are the primary factors that make cooperatives unique among the other members of the business community.

Blue Mold Did The Most Damage

Black shank was a major cause of damage to Kentucky's 1980 burley crop, according to Bill Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"The hot, dry weather that we had during the summer caused a reduction in black rot, but favored the black shank, causing twice as much damage as in any previous year," said the pathologist.

He added that black shank was found in fields in which the farmer and the county Extension agent claimed the disease had not existed before this year. This indicates a rapid spread.

Nesmith said that now black shank is a problem throughout the state. "In western Kentucky, black shank is everywhere and it's spreading eastward at an alarming rate toward the major burley producing areas in and around central Kentucky."

In 1980, blue mold cut the tobacco yields 5 percent for a total of \$32 million. "Only about half of the loss was field damage with the rest due to early harvest of diseased tobacco," the specialist said.

Field mold was tracked by UK Extension personnel last year. "The disease entered the state from northeastern Tennessee and was first spotted in southern Kentucky on about July 5. From there it moved northward into the heavy producing counties in central Kentucky, swung northeast, followed the Ohio River west and finally moved back down to the south along Interstate 65," Nesmith reported.

He added that it took less than six weeks to spread the disease to spread throughout the state. All areas had some blue mold except for the dry areas of western and south central Kentucky.

Plant diseases were more prevalent than usual in 1980. UK researchers believe that new plant bed covers and the later season caused higher soil temperatures which encouraged diseases.

Blue mold was not a problem in most western counties, but black shank was widespread among all types of dark tobaccos. However, drought was the major cause of damage in dark tobaccos, accounting for a 16 percent loss in some types.

Dairy Groups To Hold Meetings
Dairy farmers of the state will hold their annual meeting of American Dairy Association of Kentucky Sunday and Monday, Feb. 15-16, at Executive Inn West, Louisville, in a combined meeting with the Mid South Division of Dairy and Food Nutrition Council of the Southeast, Inc.

Sunday evening's activities will be devoted to the speech portion of the annual Dairy Congress. A festive dinner banquet starting at 6:30 p.m. Gita Glover, 1978-1979 State Princess, will be Mistress of Ceremonies. Princess coronation activities will follow a 12:30 luncheon on Monday, Feb. 16. Mistress of ceremonies for the coronation will be Miss Patsy Coles, Simpsonville, 1979-1980 State Dairy Princess. Jeannie Wilson, Fane Farm, is the reigning princess. Tickets may be purchased for these events by calling or writing the American Dairy Association office in Louisville.

Winter Conference Stresses Learning
The winter conference of the Kentucky New Farm Coalition (KNFC) is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 14, near Bardston, and anyone interested in learning or sharing information or crafts skills is invited.

The morning workshops will provide answers to questions on a variety of topics like: "How many sweaters can you expect to get per year from one sheep? What's the best way to manage a 60 x 60 house lot to a productive

gardening operation? What can be grown outside the kitchen window to cure a sore throat? How is a solar greenhouse constructed? And what is the urban/rural connection?

An address by Wendell Berry, author of "Culture and Agriculture: The Unsettling of America," will close out the conference after the afternoon panel discussions on such topics as the family farm and the urban/rural connection.

The conference starts at 8:30 a.m., and runs until 4:00 p.m., at the Sisters Charity of Nazareth campus, 1 mile north of Bardston on Highway KY 245. Child care is available. After the conference a meal will be served for those participants who choose to remain for it.

Record Dairy Production Expected
Record-high milk production predicted for 1981 will bring good buys in the dairy case for consumers, but will bring problems for producers (milk with rising feed costs and inflation, according to a dairy specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Milk production this year is expected to equal or exceed 1980 production, which was a record at 128 billion lbs., said Dr. Gary T. Lane, Extension dairy specialist in the UK's animal sciences department.

"With the expected large supply of milk, dairy prices will increase less than most other foods this year," he said.

The 1980 milk surplus resulted from dairy industry expansion in the late 70s as producers enjoyed favorable milk prices in relation to feed prices. Many dairy farmers increased their herds and many new dairies entered the market in the last few years, Lane said.

Since 1977, dairymen have been keeping more heifer replacements than in previous years," he said. "In addition, they culled fewer cows from herds because of low feed costs for culms and a good milk feed ratio."

Increases both in cow numbers and in production per cow contributed to 1980 record milk production. The U.S. dairy herd is estimated at 10.88 million cows, with production per cow at 11,813 lbs. a year, up from 11,471 in 1979.

The milk surplus has caused a considerable build-up in government stocks, as the USDA purchased 8.2 billion lbs. of milk products in 1980, up from 1.7 billion in 1979. Even so, this support milk prices paid to farmers have failed to reach support prices since last April.

In mid-1980, record milk production, coupled with rising feed costs and inflation, put the squeeze on dairy producers. Feed prices rose in response to weather-induced shortages of many commodities. Hay prices reached \$129 per ton in Kentucky, higher in Southern and Southwestern states.

"With higher feed prices and small increases in milk prices, dairy farmers will be hard-pressed to stay in business in 1981," Lane said.

"Unlike some enterprises, dairymen cannot trim the production pipeline on and off as will be said. "Cows continue to milk. Overhead costs in buildings, labor, machinery and utilities must be met."

While individual farmers may try to survive the squeeze by increasing cow numbers and production per cow, Lane said, the dairy industry in general will be hurt further by higher production.

Lane said dairy producers should watch in 1981 for changes in the price support program and in cull cow prices.

"Congress should change the price support program or stop purchasing milk during heavy production, prices could really take a drop," he said. "If slaughter cow prices increase enough to encourage high culling, a decrease in cow numbers could reduce production."

Winter Related Deaths Occurring

The Kentucky Division of Disaster and Emergency Services has alerted emergency personnel across the state that winter-related deaths are being reported by police, fire and medical officers in even southern states and that residential fires have increased sharply in some areas. Also predictions that as many as 50,000 persons may be hospitalized for accidental hypothermia have been given by the surgeon general.

D.E.S. is calling attention to the problems of accidental hypothermia. This condition involves the lowering of body temperatures below 95 degrees and can be fatal. In most extreme cases, police are finding people frozen to death on city streets. However, accidental hypothermia may occur inside homes at temperatures far above freezing.

Hypothermia should be suspected if an individual has any one of the following symptoms: uncontrollable shivering, or coordination, sluggishness, swollen face, discolored or pale skin, slurred speech, shallow or very slow breathing, drowsiness, reduced blood pressure, or irregular or noisy heartbeat.

These signs can be confused with a stroke, diabetic coma or a heart con-

dition. The important clue is to note if the victim has been exposed to temperatures of 65 degrees or below for a long period of time or subfreezing temperatures, for a relatively short period.

If accidental hypothermia is suspected, the person should be rewarmed slowly and should receive emergency medical attention even in those cases that appear mild or where the victim no longer feels cold.

Social clues to hypothermia victims include considering vulnerable persons over 65 year old, those living alone and receiving few visitors, those on low incomes and little savings, and people in substandard housing. Such people should be informed that hypothermia can result from staying in a cold dwelling and alternative emergency shelter should be considered.

A person in danger of accidental hypothermia should seek the room temperature to at least 70 degrees, eat well-balanced meals, and wear adequate clothing including a hat or cap, gloves and scarf if necessary.

An energy shortage can create circumstances in which a large number of cases of accidental hypothermia may occur within only a day or so.

News Report From . . .

Furnaces
The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that last year 6,400 consumers received hospital emergency room treatment for injuries associated with central furnaces and more than 2,200 received treatment for floor furnace accidents.

These are some of the accident patterns:

- A two-year-old boy crawled onto the hot grate of a floor furnace. He received second and third degree burns to his hands and legs.

- A woman stuffed a towel into the make vent for her furnace because the air was making her utility room cold. This deprived the furnace of oxygen which it needs to burn the fuel, and large quantities of carbon monoxide were produced. The woman was found dead from carbon monoxide poisoning.

- In trying to light the pilot light in his furnace, a man ignited the gas which had accumulated in the combustion chamber. His shirt caught fire, and he received burns over 50% of his body.

These illustrations represent the following accident patterns associated with furnaces:

- Contact with hot metal grates and other hot surfaces. Children can crawl onto or push each other against hot floor furnace grates. Adults also can fall and get burned by hot surfaces.

- Carbon monoxide poisoning. All fuel-burning appliances need air in order to burn the fuel properly. If an oil, gas, coal, or wood furnace is "starved" of its necessary intake air, it will operate inefficiently and produce large quantities of carbon monoxide. In addition, if the exhaust pipes are clogged or cracked, carbon monoxide can leak into your home.

- Ignition of accumulated fuel vapors - Trying to light a pilot light or to perform maintenance procedures can be hazardous if you're not familiar with the furnace. The accumulated vapors can ignite and cause a fire or burns.

- In an effort to save energy, many consumers are insulating their homes and closing off all drafts and air leaks. This can be hazardous if necessary air intake vents are blocked. In some older homes, furnaces actually need a drafty door or window in order to get enough air to burn the fuel properly. Have your furnace checked regularly by a service company to make sure it is getting enough air to burn the fuel safely.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission has the following

suggestions for selection, use, and maintenance of furnaces:

Selection
- Be sure that the furnace has a "safety pilot" that automatically stops the flow of fuel when the pilot light goes out.

- Have the furnace installed according to all local codes. These usually specify the air-intake and exhaust requirements for safe operation of the furnace.

Use
- Cover the metal grates of furnaces with a metal screen which will prevent children-and-adults from touching the hot surface.

- If you are insulating your house or trying to block air drafts around doors and windows, be sure that you don't cut off air necessary for the furnace to burn its fuel properly. Have a service company check for adequate air to burn fuel efficiently, it will produce large quantities of carbon monoxide which could leak out and kill you.

- Keep flammable liquids (such as gasoline) away from furnaces because the flammable vapors could be ignited by the pilot light in the furnace. Keep flammable liquids in tightly-capped safety cans in a shed outside - away from any flame or heat sources.

- Don't attempt to light a pilot light unless you are familiar with the furnace and the proper techniques. If the pilot light goes out or if the furnace needs adjustment, call an experienced service company or the gas company.

- Have your furnace checked at least once every year, before the heating season begins, to be sure that there is adequate intake air and that the exhaust system is working properly.

- Have flues checked to be sure they are not blocked by debris, which could permit fumes to enter the house.

Adult Agriculture Class Starting

Bill Patrick, vocational agriculture teacher at Rowan County High School, is conducting an adult class starting Feb. 11 at 6:30 p.m.

The class will consist of ten sessions tentatively meeting every Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. and lasting for two hours. The first session will be at Rowan County High School's vocational agriculture room. At that time, topics to be discussed, such as lawn care, landscaping, vegetable production, pruning and plant propagation, will be selected based on the group's needs.

Most Students Off Food Stamp Rolls

WASHINGTON - Recent changes in the Food Stamp Act have eliminated most college students from the food stamp program, according to a U.S. Department of Agriculture report shows.

Students now comprise only two-tenths of one percent of the food stamp caseload.

Under the Food Stamp Program Amendments of 1980, enacted by Congress last year, students were made ineligible for food stamps unless they have dependents, are elderly, or disabled, or already work. The study shows that the new law has cut most students from the program. At one time, over 200,000 students received food stamps.

Over half of all students remaining on the program are heads of households who support dependents. Most of these are single mothers supporting children with Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) while they attend school to gain skills that will enable them to get off welfare and into regular employment.

The course is offered Mondays.

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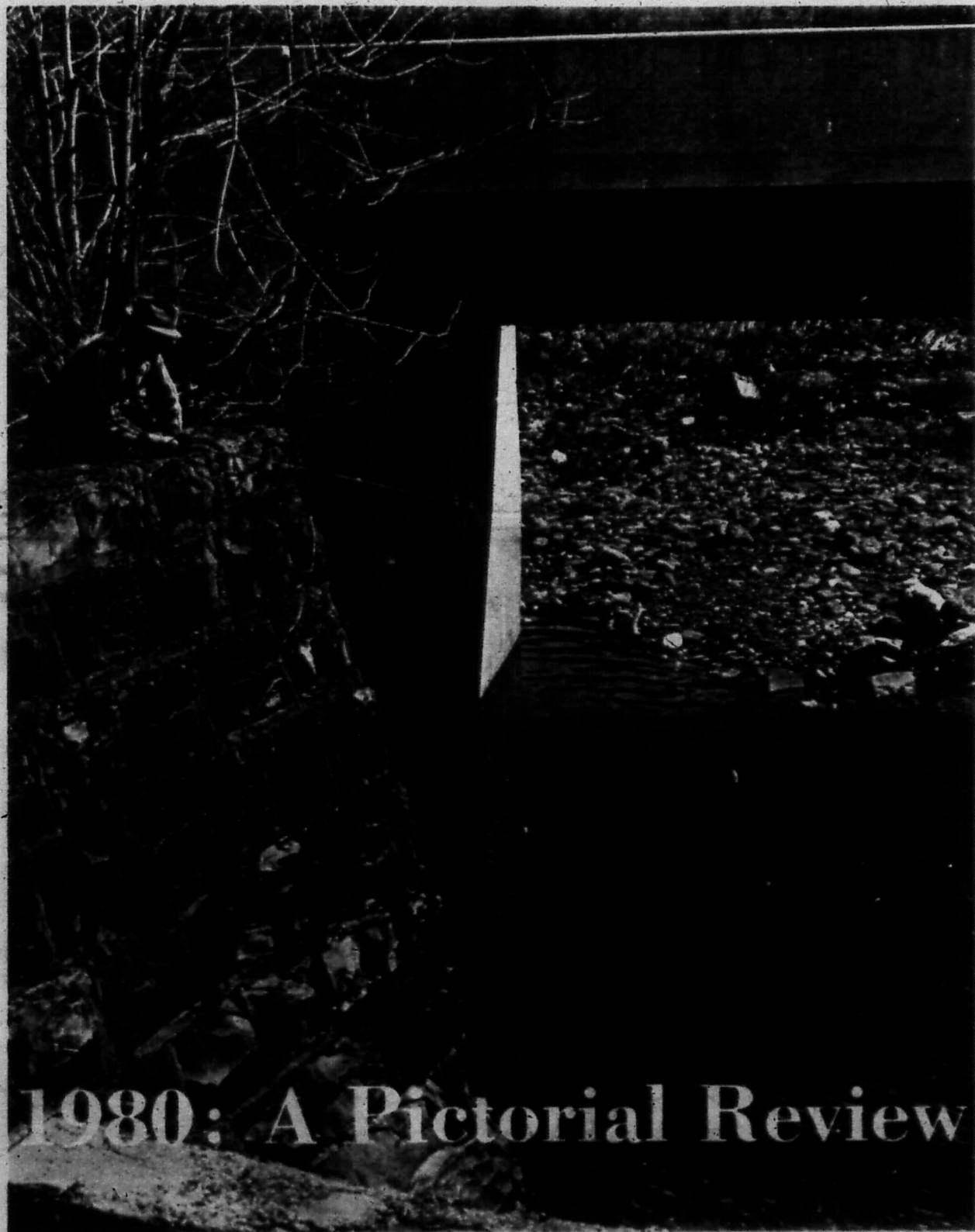

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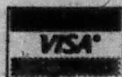

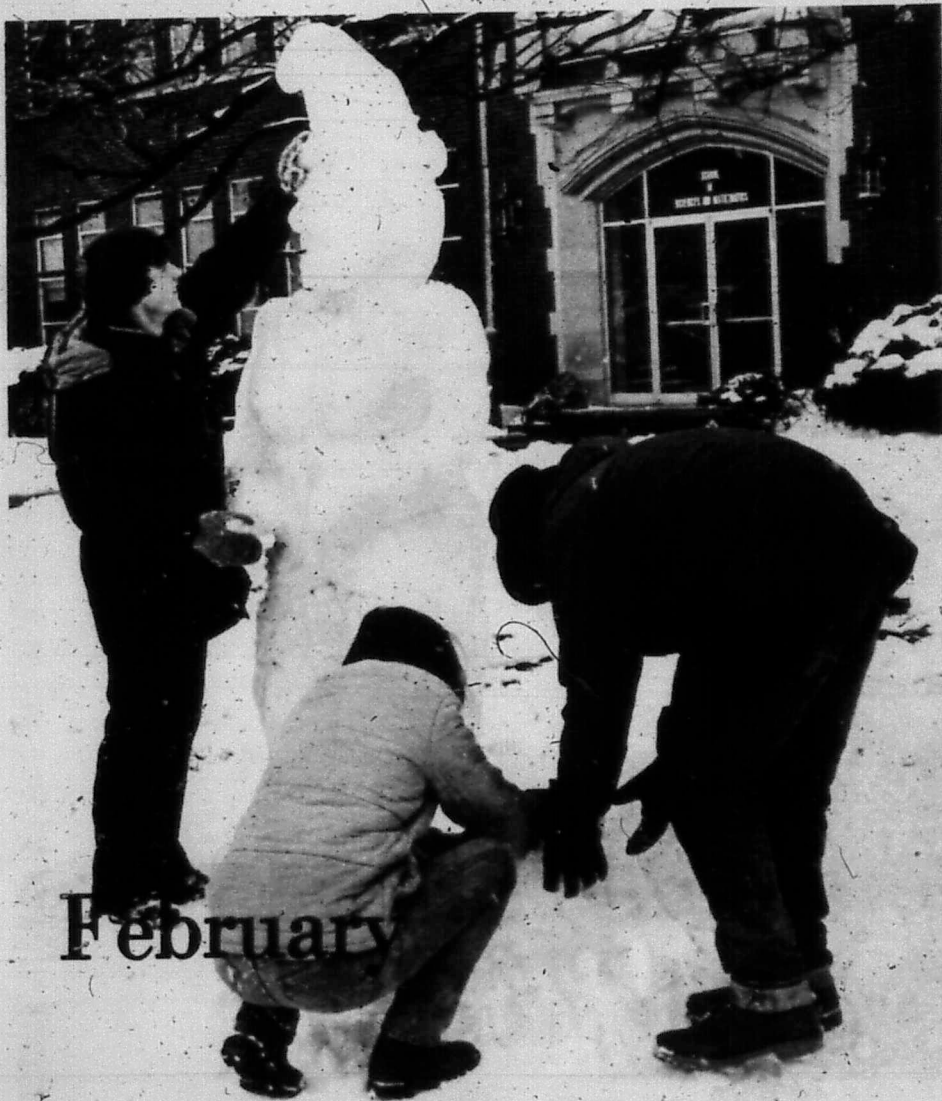

Wallace said he just grabbed hold of the steering wheel and sort of leaned over into the seat. When the truck stopped, he said he kicked open the door and crawled out.

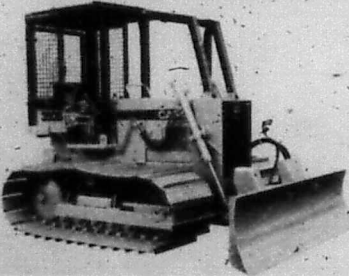
The truck was finally righted about two-and-one-half hours after the wreck with two four-wheel-drive vehicles attached to it with chains.

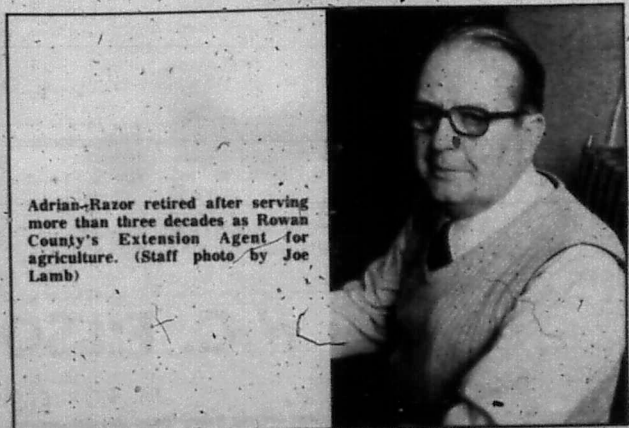

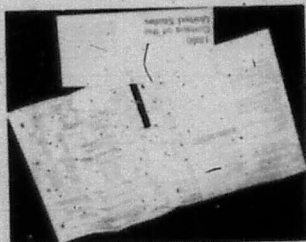

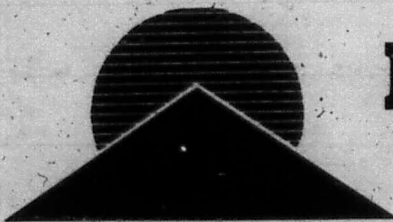

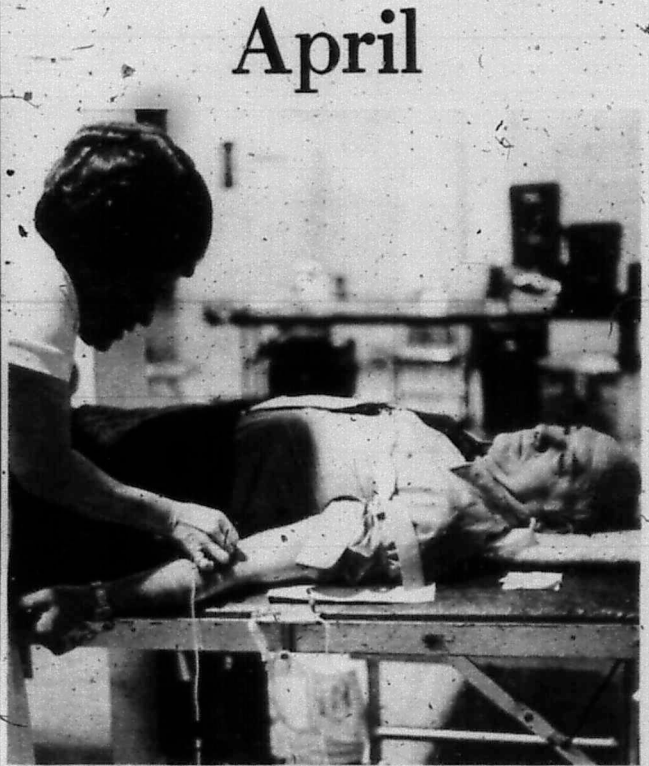

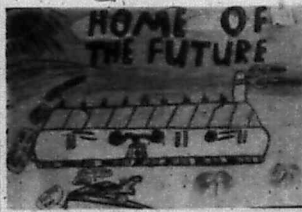

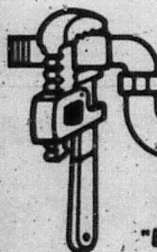

We're proud of those words --- and we believe them.

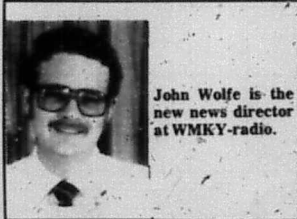

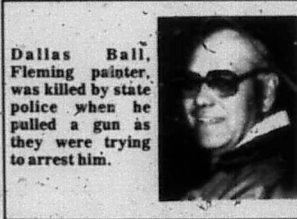


### Roll Call

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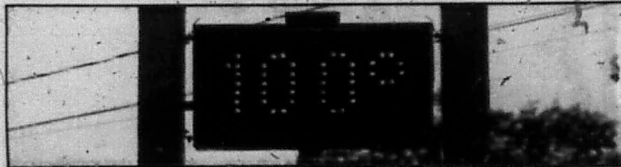

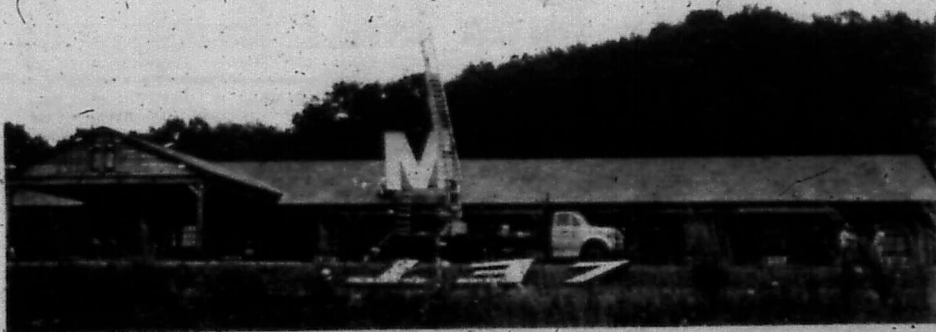
## Signing Up

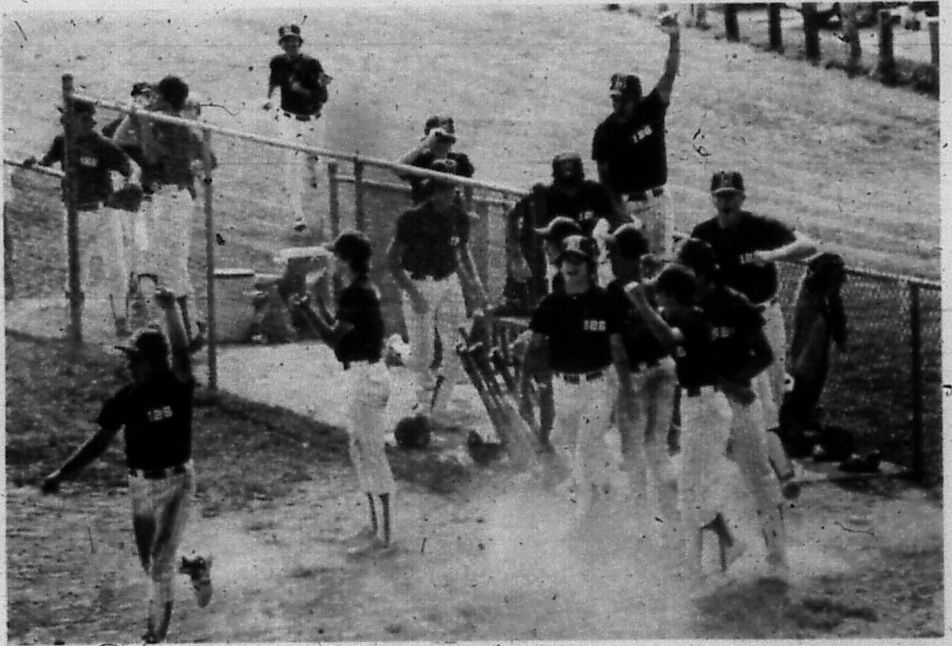

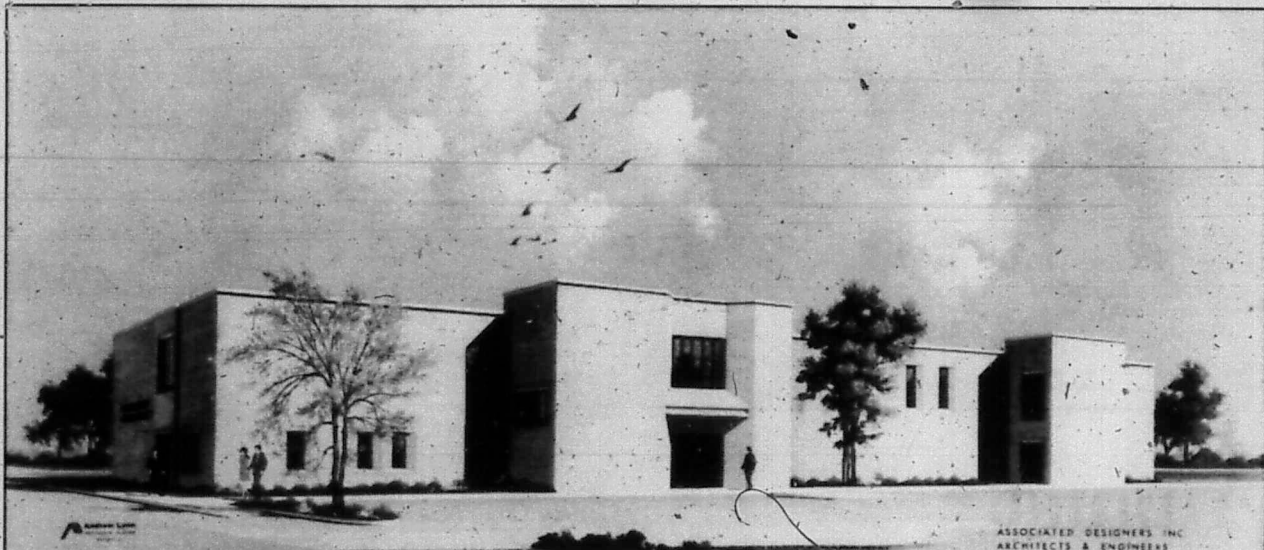

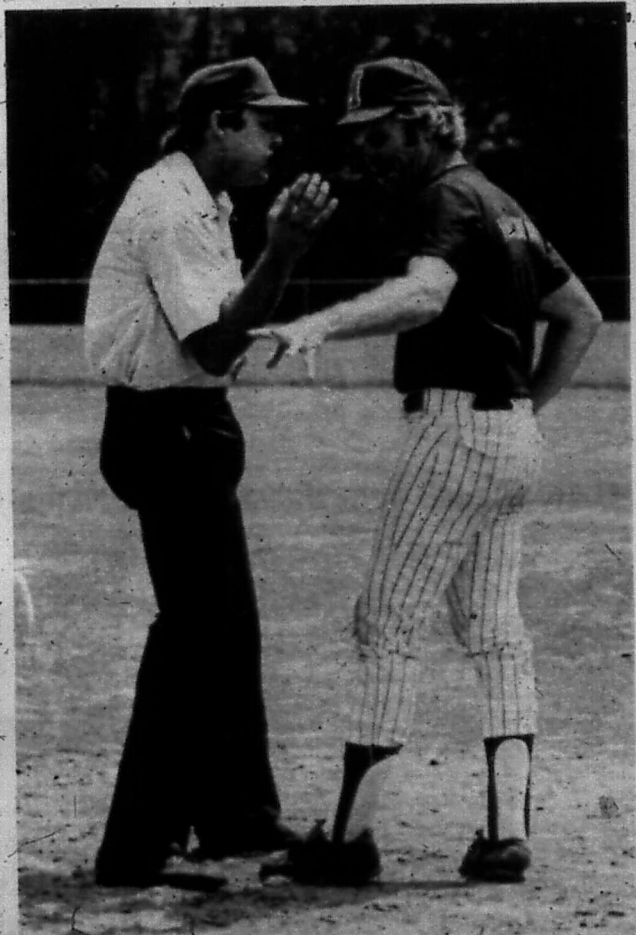

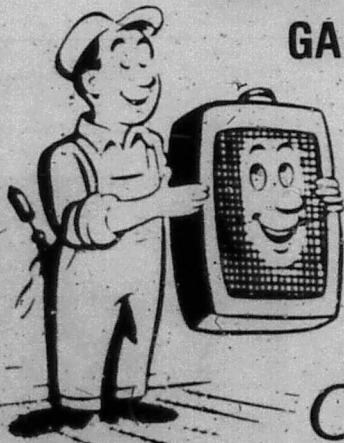

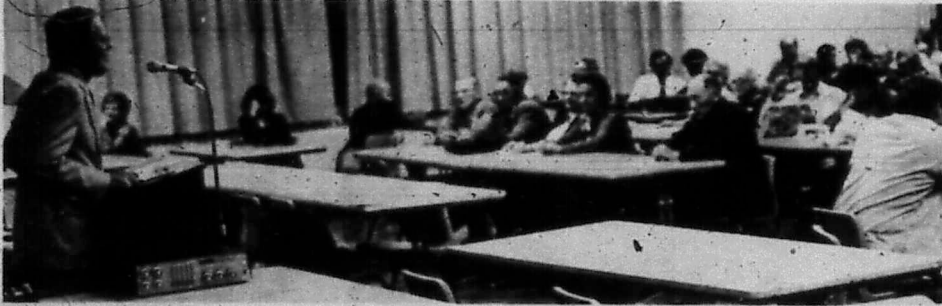

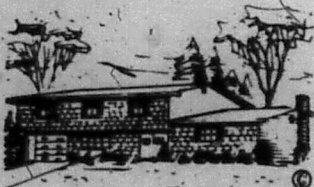

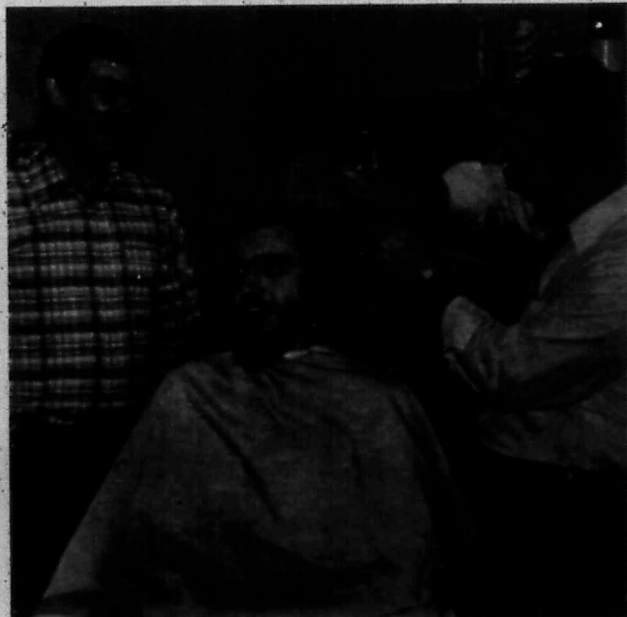

## Samuel E. Wright: majoring in life

Samuel E. Wright attended college for nearly eight years, but by design, never obtained a degree. The easy-going actor, who co-stars with Sonny Shroyer on the CBS comedy series "Enos," sees life as a classroom, with liberal arts an on-going major.

"I never intended to pin myself down to a given subject," says Wright, who at various times had four majors while attending South Carolina State College in Orangeburg and C.W. Post College in New York City. At different times, he opted for physical education, English, speech pathology and theater.

It's difficult to imagine that the lithe, 175-pound, 6-foot-2 perennial student was also once a bruising 197-pound halfback who excelled in basketball and on the track. A fleet-footed dash man who ran the 100 yards in 9.6 seconds, long jumped over 24 feet and did 440 yards in about 46 seconds, he was a coach's dream, running with the football.

"In those days, I was what you might call a big dumb jock," says Wright. "It was easy to be a big man in athletics and to skip the more meaningful aspects of life. However, I had a high school English teacher who always told me that my real future was in singing and not in athletics."

His teacher's words proved prophetic when, in 1969, Wright made his Broadway debut in the musical "Jesus Christ Superstar." Subsequent starring roles in "Two Gentlemen of Verona" and "Pippin" confirmed Mrs. F.C. Hull's foresight.

"She was always interested," recalls Wright. "She used to visit our home on Sunday afternoons when I was 8 and listen to me preach regular sermons and sing my own gospel hymns for the family. Then, when I got to high school, she encouraged me to try out for the school musicals. She obviously saw something in me that I didn't discover for several years."

Friends of the actor call him a true Renaissance man, one who soaks up knowledge like a sponge. If you start a quotation from Shakespeare, he can probably finish it, they say; he'll recite poetry in classical Greek, or devastate you with his re-creations of Marx Brothers routines.

But it's still music that lies at the core of Wright's genius. He's self-taught on the guitar, which he took up as a boy. "In those days I just tuned all the strings to an open A and strummed," he said. "However, in 1978, I determined to really play the instrument. I bought two books and set a goal for myself to play like Andres Segovia after a year

or throw the guitar at the wall. Naturally, I fell somewhat short of my goal. But after a year and a half I was in John Denver's range. And that's not too bad."

Wright is also an impulsive composer, jotting down notes on the nearest scrap of paper when hit by inspiration. "I'm forever getting ideas and putting them down on paper towels," he says.

Wright's manager, March Pressel, who was also his musical conductor for "Jesus Christ Superstar," produced his first record in 1971 and has big plans for the future.

Wright, also a trained dancer, fills his spare time with sketching and painting and doing a variety of arts and crafts. He also likes to climb mountains, and go camping.

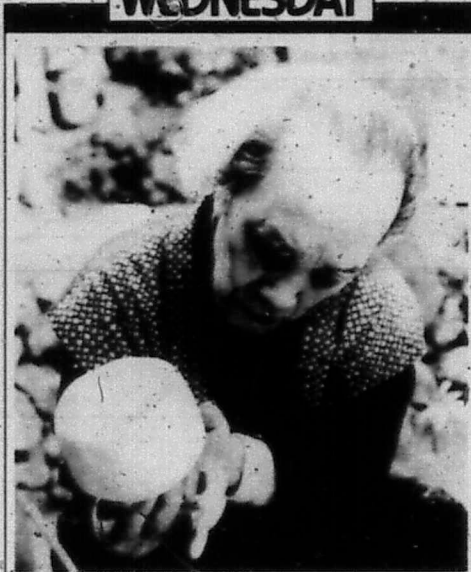

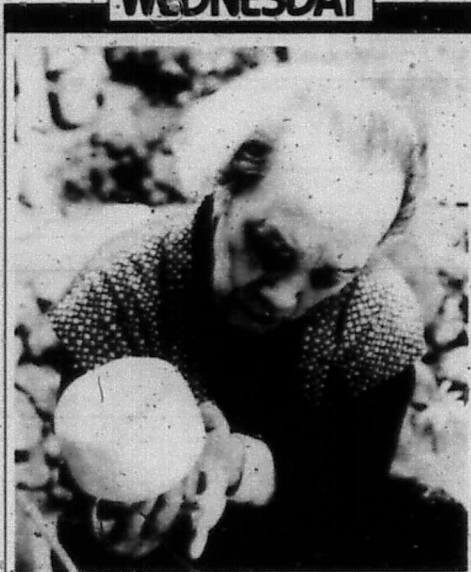

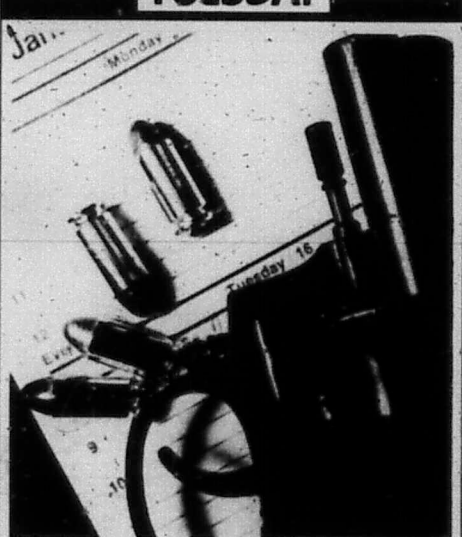
