The Boosters Club has arranged an intra-squad game in which Bob Laughlin will mix his variety with the best looking group of freshmen Morehead has had in years.

Most followers of Kentucky basketball believe the Eagles should win the championship of the Ohio Valley Conference, one of the nation's strongest if all goes well. But there are many question marks and viewers of the Thanksgiving sets will have the first chance to answer these for themselves.

Here are the big "ifs"—Will tobacco chewin' Dangerous Dan Swartz of Owingsville be as potent as expected or as he was last year when he paced all Kentucky College scorers with a .262 average? Swartz underwent a knee operation during the summer, supposed to correct an ailment which kept him sidelined last season, otherwise his per game average would undoubtedly have been in the 30's. Physicians say the operation was successful. Swartz got married since last season and sometimes family problems decrease an athlete's efficiency. If Swartz lives up to expectations he will be the most feared player in the Commonwealth this year and a definite candidate for All-American.

Will Steve Hamilton, the 6-foot-6-inch lad who has long arms and shoots with either hand be as good as last season when he averaged better than 16 points per game? Mayabb also had a summer operation on his knee. Reports are he's better than ever.

Neither team looked very impressive, however, Breck did show fine form at different stages of the game.

With Fair and Pierce scoring, Breck moved into a 7-1 lead in the opening minutes of play. Breck continued to lead and was off 17-9 at the end of the first quarter.

During the second quarter MHS came to life and closed the margin 27-23 on Moore's tip-ins and shots around the foul circle. During the last two minutes of this quarter Breck began to move again and led 35-23 at halftime.

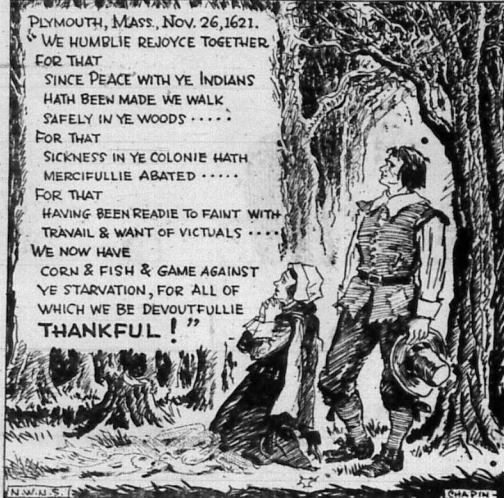

TGT Is Now The Biggest Taxpayer In Rowan County

You may recall editorial observations in the newspaper over the past five years about local benefits of the many natural gas lines from Texas to the east, that pass through Rowan County.
A perusal this week of the tax records at the court house reveal that, for the first time in more than 75 years, the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway is not the biggest Rowan taxpayer.
Largest bill now goes to Tennessee Gas Transmission Company which has laid four lines of 24 to 30 inches and constructed a booster station in Rowan, on the edge of Elliott.
TGT's tax bill to Rowan County is \$32,000, C&O says \$32,000.
There are rumors of more pipe lines to come and also that TGT plans to construct a booster plant on North Fork of Triplet, next year.
This will likely bring TGT's franchise tax in Rowan County to over \$50,000.
No Hunting Signs Are Groping Up
Local sportsmen complain that more farmers have posted their land in Rowan County than ever before.
This is borne out by sale of no hunting signs at East Kentucky Printing Company.
We have talked with several farmers about this.
It seems that in most cases the land-owner will not object if you ask his permission in other words, he'll let you know who you are and that you are not to be let in.
The farmer who destroys his livestock (the farmer also rightfully frowned on those who hunt on his land) John Barleycorn under their skins.

Protest Made On Application Of Railroad Of Railroad

C&O Seeks To Discontinue Passenger Trains 23 And 24

Hearings are underway before the Kentucky Railroad Commission on application of Chesapeake and Ohio Railway to discontinue passenger trains 23 and 24 on the Ashland-Lexington division.

Opposing the application are towns and counties served by the passengers, including Ashland, Grayson, Olive Hill, Morehead, Preston, Salt Lick, Mt. Sterling, Winchester, Lexington, Frankfort, Shelbyville and Louisville.

The hearings opened Monday morning with C&O claiming they lost \$200,000 last year on the two trains. This figure is disputed by the opponents.

G. C. Phillips, Richmond, Va., superintendent of passenger transportation, said the average monthly income from No. 23 decreased from \$7,359.33 in 1951 to \$5,201.71 for the first six months of 1954.

On No. 24, the average monthly revenue was \$9,357 in 1953 compared with \$5,503.43 in 1954, he said.

Phillips also testified that the average monthly passenger revenue from No. 21 is about \$1,000 in 1954, more than it was last year. Average monthly income on No. 22 decreased about \$1,300 this year from last, he added.

Opponents to the plan testified Monday that many towns along the route will be without public transportation if the company is allowed to drop the two trains. Some shippers would have no way to get their products to market.

Testifying against dropping the trains were Mayor William H. Layne of Morehead, Rowan County Judge William T. McClain, Morehead; Mrs. Amanda Yoder and C. O. Swartz, Champlin; Arthur Cassidy, Salt Lick; and Arnold Miller, Preston.

Written protests have been filed by the cities of Lexington, Frankfort, Morehead, Mt. Sterling, Ashland, Louisville, Champlin, Denton, Hitchens and Rush. Also, the chambers of commerce of Frankfort, Olive Hill, and Grayson have filed objections along with conductors who work on the trains.

Other protests came from the Ben Williamson Company, Ashland; Sam Porter, Grayson; J. S. Watkins, Lexington; Olive Hill Boat Club; J. D. Gay, Jr., Pine Grove; Salt Lick Lions Club; Mary Lou Kish and Robert Fitch, representing students of Centre College; Dr. Adron Doran, president of Morehead State College; Blue Anchor Overall Company, Inc., Olive Hill; C. H. Parsons Company, Ashland.

Farmers Bank of Owensville; Samuel Hamm, Soldier; O. T. Barker, Enterprise, local chairman, Order of Railroad Telegraphers; Citizens Bank of Morehead; E. Preston Young, Louisville; A. B. Loux, Farmer; Mrs. Ellen Hume Ottitt, Frankfort; Boyd County Attorney Calvin E. Gearheart, Catlettsburg; J. A. Bays Jewelry Company, Morehead.

The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, which protested August 23, later asked the commission to disregard it.

permitted the governor's race to become involved in or interfere with the election of Alben W. Barkley to the United States Senate. We did everything we could to assist in that objective, and I am proud of the part that we played and any contribution that we made to his victory.

county jail are needed.

The complete report, signed by Foreman Ray L. White.

"The Grand Jury for its final report herein state: We have been in session four days and we have reported into open court 21 indictments.

"We have investigated cases held to our attention by the lower courts and have returned true bills in each case in which the evidence justified and where the evidence did not justify a true bill the foreman has so endorsed up on the warrants.

"We failed to return an indictment against Arnold Mayberry who was held under bond from the county court to answer an indictment and our failure to do so is because of the absence of the witnesses whom we cannot obtain and we recommend that this case be referred to the next grand jury for their consideration.

"We have had witnesses from all parts of the county and we have returned true bills where the evidence justified.

"We have inspected the public buildings and find them in fair condition but we do recommend that a ventilating system such as an exhaust fan be placed in the upper part of the jail in order to produce ventilation to the inmates. We definitely recommend that the fiscal court construct an adequate quarters for the female inmates so that they may have more privacy when they are incarcerated. The female quarters are indeed and that condition should be immediately corrected.

"It has come to our attention that alcoholic beverages are being sold in various places in the county.

placed in various locations in the county and we recommend that the sheriff of this county be instructed to take over and hold in his possession all alcoholic beverages taken by any of the officers during the performance of their duty; that such liquor be stored in separate and labeled properly as to contents and the names of the persons from whom taken; that the sheriff alone carry the keys to the room wherein he stores this alcoholic liquor and that the room be properly secured so that it cannot be entered except by the sheriff as prepared for such entrance.

"We find that there are indictments against 11 persons of the Commonwealth cases tried by the lower courts and it is our recommendation that the fiscal court provide commonwealth dockets that all cases tried by the lower courts be entered on those dockets indicating the offense and disposition of same and disposition of fines when and if collected. This procedure should be immediately taken effect.

"We have discovered that the lower courts at times transfer cases to the grand jury where they have jurisdiction to try. We wish to point out that this is an improper practice and that the lower courts when and if collected where they have jurisdiction and proper docket and report these cases and the practice of transferring cases from one court to another should immediately cease, which practice is not a legal or proper practice.

"We find from our investigation that there has been in the past many churches and school houses where the grounds have been desecrated by law courts and other obnoxious objects during the week ends. We recommend to the peace officers of this county and state that they make investigations during the week ends and that arrests be made in all cases where there are violations.

"We recommend that sufficient funds to the extent of about 75.00 be purchased for the Morehead High School in especially three rooms, seventh, eighth and a general class room, including three altogether. Our reason for making this recommendation is that we observe it to be almost impossible for the children required to use these rooms to assimilate their lessons. We also recommend that the boys' toilet be kept in a more sanitary condition. The general condition of the Morehead High School should be reviewed by the Board, and proper steps be taken to make the necessary improvements and better the environment of the children."

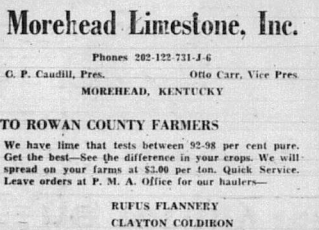
