**Strip Mining May Be Permitted
On Government Owned Land**

**Move Challenged By
Conservation Commissioner
Henry Ward**

The procedure being followed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson in the federal strip mining bill is being challenged in Cumberland National Forest and in Kentucky was challenged at Frankfort this week by Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward.

In a letter addressed to Benson, Charles F. Taft, chairman of the federal office, stated that the federal office should accept the responsibility of making the decision on the strip mining bill, rather than to pass it on to a committee of laymen who have no responsibility to the people of the United States.

Ward said that he has informed Charles F. Taft, chairman of the special committee named by Benson, who has set a hearing to be held by the committee on Jan. 27 at Stearns, Ky., that he believes Benson is following the wrong procedure in considering the question.

The issue involved is whether the federal government will permit the Robert L. Stearns, Jr., owner of the Stearns Coal Company, to mine coal by stripping on 47,000 acres of land in Cumberland National Forest in consideration of the reserved coal rights when he sold the land to the government.

**Feeding Block
Salt Pays Off
For Dairymen**

The relative merits of feeding block or loose salt to dairy cattle has been of interest to dairymen for many years. It has been generally accepted that high-producing dairy cows should be fed loose rather than block salt. It was thought that cows would not consume enough salt to meet their requirements from the block salt due to irritation of their tongues caused by licking salt blocks. If this were the case, cows simply would not consume adequate amounts of salt if they had to depend upon block salt as the source.

It now appears that the clerk recommendations need revising in view of some recent experimental work at the New York station. Workers there were interested in this problem and therefore devoted three years in an experimental study on it. It was found that cows consumed considerably more salt in the loose form than from a salt block. This varied with years of the study and the type of pasture being grazed, but in all years the consumption of salt was more when they were on loose salt rather than block salt. The percentage increase in consumption varied from 20 to 340 per cent in favor of loose salt.

at 124 ten day non-resident fishing licenses at \$2.
21 non-resident fishing licenses for \$5.

After deducting her commission she sent \$3,397.55 to the state. Figuring Rowan as one of the Commonwealth's 15 counties (our population is about one-half of one per cent of the state total) you will realize that this hunting and fishing revenue is a sizeable item. No wonder the Division of Fish and Game can spare a few finerling or blue-gills for our farm ponds.

We're sure that Mrs. Flamm won't mind our reporting that the clerk gets 25 cents on each hunting or fishing license she issues; 50 cents on non-resident licenses; and 15 cents fee for the junior license.

Used to be that the County Court figured the fees from this source as peanuts or 'coke money'. But, no more.

In 1954 the Rowan Clerk's office issued 2,904 automobile licenses and 1,203 commercial and farm truck licenses. This means that on the average there is a registered motor vehicle for every three persons.

Once upon a time the tax assessor made no attempt to collect taxes on motor vehicles. Now, it's a big item of revenue and the license records in every county are carefully checked to be sure that your car is assessed.

The water we drink is taxed. Fact is, the only thing we know that doesn't have a tax is the air we breathe.

But, they're even trying that. A County Attorney down in western Kentucky wrote the Attorney General a couple weeks ago wanting to know if the airplanes that flew over it were apparently grossly under-assessed with one's own flying thought. You don't have to pay a Federal income tax this year until April 15. But, we are forced to cloak good tidings like this with the miserable thought that the state income tax is payable the same day and the extra month's breathing spell will mean a double dose to lessen the aroma of April showers.

The U. S. Forest Service turned down Stearns' application, and he appealed the decision to Secretary Benson. The latter last November decided to refer the matter to the U. S. Department of the Interior, where it is being handled by the U. S. Forest Service.

Ward said he has received a letter from Taft which stated: "We would be glad to have your views on the question, and if you wish to discuss this with us personally we shall be happy to meet you at the office of the Stearns Coal and Lumber Company in Stearns, Ky., at 11 a. m. on Jan. 27th."

The issues involved are of such state and national consequences that they cannot be resolved by presenting a written statement or by attending a brief meeting in the offices of the company which is seeking this privilege of strip mining on publicly owned land, Ward declared.

"It is my firm belief that Secretary Benson is not accepting his responsibility as a federal official by seeking to pass to an unofficial committee the obligation of deciding an issue that may well affect many millions of acres of land owned by the federal government throughout the United States," he continued.

"In my opinion, as possible as head of the Kentucky Department of Conservation, I did not hesitate to accept the responsibility of taking a firm position relative to an almost exact situation that developed in 1953 at Kentucky Ridge State Forest in Bell County," Ward added. "The original owners of some of the land there who had reserved coal rights when the property was

sold to the government insisted that they had the right to engage in strip mining. I took the position that they did not have the right. I believe that the government bought and owned the surface rights. We devoted the worst of the mining company, and took the case to court. The court decision was in our favor, and the company was prohibited from strip mining."

Ward said that his position on the procedure being followed by Secretary Benson in the Stearns matter reflects his official attitude not only as head of the Department of Conservation but also as chairman of the Kentucky Strip Mining and Reclamation Commission and as chairman of the Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission. The Department of Conservation includes the Divisions of Forestry, Flood Control and Water Usage, and Soil and Water Resources.

"All of these agencies have a keen interest in this matter, and are prepared to give Mr. Benson the benefit of their experience and knowledge if he is interested," Ward said. "However, I feel that he should make the important decisions on which Stearns' case rests, rather than block salt. The percentage increase in consumption varied from 20 to 340 per cent in favor of loose salt.

Kentucky, for the fourth year, mined more than 1,000,000 tons of coal for each fatal accident in the mines, according to A. D. Sisk, chief of the Department of Mines and Geology, who said total production exceeded 30,000,000 tons in Kentucky, and 54 fatalities were recorded in the mines.

"This is the lowest number, numerically speaking, of any year since 1912," Sisk said. "However, in three other recent years—1949, 1950 and 1953—there was less than one fatality for each 1,000,000 tons of coal production in the state."



"Every time somebody burns up a vehicle to collect insurance the money to pay this criminal arson loss comes from pockets of law-abiding citizens," Lewis Ulrich, secretary of the association, said. "The responsible automobile fire laws which have been stopped, both as a protection to themselves and the public."

A show in the Agricultural Engineering Building will include exhibits emphasizing the production of crops and livestock and materials used on the farm.

On Thursday afternoon they will model suits, coats and dresses they have made, and also complete costumes they have assembled, both resulting from project lessons.

Helen Keller To Retire When She Reaches 75

Helen Keller, who for more than 50 years has made her own blindness a beacon of hope for persons less handicapped than she, disclosed she plans to retire soon as America's "ambassador" to the world's sightless.
Her 75th birthday, June 27, has been set by Miss Keller as her target date for retirement from her traveling post with the American Foundation for Overseas Blind, for which she has stricken the globe five times.
In February, Miss Keller is due to set out on her last trip abroad. It will be a 40,000-mile tour by airplane, train and auto to help Asia's 10,000,000 blind.
When this most hectic trip of her career is over, Miss Keller said, she hopes to devote her remaining days to a "summing up" of her remarkable life.
Miss Keller, stricken blind, deaf and speechless in infancy, has devoted most of her life to a crusade to prevent such afflictions from striking others and to help the handicapped live useful lives.




