## Girl Uses Common 'Deer Sense' To End Search For Missing Fawn

If you like Walt Disney's "Bambi," you're going to love this local version of a deer in distress.

The star of the story is an amiable fawn appropriately named "Fawnia," who was brought to Rowan County late Thursday afternoon by Harry Pawelczyk, district biologist for the U.S. Forest Service.

According to Pawelczyk, the fawn was confiscated by conservation officers in the London vicinity where it had been kept as a pet by people in violation of state law.

"It is so domesticated and so tame that it wouldn't be able to live in the wild," Pawelczyk explained.

"Apparently it had been wandering around, walking up to houses (before the conservation officers found it)," he continued.

Pawelczyk said that he brought the deer home to his residence in Pleasant Valley Subdivision, Morehead, to keep overnight Thursday with plans to release it in the Twin Knobs area of Cave Run Lake on Friday.

"It would be safer at Twin Knobs which is surrounded by water on three sides than it would be in the forest under the threat of poachers and predators," Pawelczyk said.

At 9:15 p.m. Thursday night, Fawnia lunged and broke away in Pawelczyk's back yard, dragging her chain behind her.

Pawelczyk and Don Woodall, with the Division of Water Enforcement and a neighbor of Pawelczyk's, searched for the deer using spot lights but failed to

find it Thursday night.

On Friday morning, Dr. Roland Burns, Walter Rybba and Dr. J. Rybba, citizens interested in conservation, joined in the search throughout the woods and hills surrounding Pleasant Valley but their efforts proved in vain.

"We feared that the dogs would get her or that she would wrap her chain around a tree or something," Pawelczyk said, emphasizing the fact that the deer was so tame she wasn't, by natural instinct, afraid of anything which might threaten her.

The fawn's plight spread quickly throughout the neighborhood, especially among the children.

That's how the heroine of the story, ten-year-old Michelle Sergeant, heard about the missing deer and decided to strike out on her own to find Fawnia.

Michelle's account of finding the lost fawn goes this way:

"I was riding home on the bus from camp when I heard Betty Jane (Surratt) and Rhonda (Chapman) talking about it," Michelle said.

"After I got home I started thinking about it," continued the fifth grader at Rowan County Elementary School, "and I got to thinking like a deer and I thought where would I go on a hot day if I was a deer," she said.

With that analytical thinking tucked under her mind, Michelle struck out with her dog, "Tippy," and her aunt's dog, "Brownie," toward a small pond located over a hill in Pleasant Valley.

Michelle's logic about where a deer would go on a hot day paid off.

As the search party comprised of the little girl and two dogs came in view of the pond, sure enough Fawnia was

there, lounging in the water.

"At first she jumped," said Michelle, "but then she came out of the pond."

Michelle was leading the deer home when she heard dogs over the hill barking.

She hid the deer in high weeds to protect her and then ran home to tell her mother, Juanita.

"She didn't believe me at first," Michelle said.

"I brought the deer home to show her," Michelle said, adding that she placed Fawnia next to her duck, "Lucky's" pen, which the deer promptly decided to jump into.

Michelle then scampered off to notify her friend, Tracy Fannin, of the events.

"He got his dad (Danny) who was mad because the deer's neck was rubbed by the collar and he thought someone around here had done it," Michelle said.

"But then Brent McKinney (another playmate) came along and said the deer belonged to a man named Harry," she interjected.

And so the young delegation delivered Fawnia to the Pawelczyk residence, safe and sound.

"Michelle is the real heroine," Pawelczyk commented Saturday morning as Fawnia nuzzled at the shrubbery in his back yard, protectively guarded and petted by Michelle.

Pawelczyk released the fawn later at Twin Knobs.

"I think should be stressed that not only are people breaking the state law when they domesticate a wild animal but they are making it bad for the

## Plant Board Hires Gas Engineer, Will Start Sewer Rehabilitation

Members of the Morehead Utility Plant Board Thursday night entered into a professional services contract with a Lexington-based engineering firm to provide consultation services for the utility's natural gas system.

The board charged the engineering firm of Grier, Asher and Fuqua Inc. with reviewing the existing gas system, recommending improvements, mapping the lines and revising the operations and maintenance manual.

Although the exact cost of the work requested under the contract won't be known until the engineers begin the document signed Thursday night, scales for the consultants, ranging from \$47 per hour for the principal or associate of the firm to \$15 per hour for draftsmen and maintenance men.

In addition, the Plant Board will pay the firm actual costs for all reimbursable expenses plus 10 percent.

Officials of the federal transportation department have warned the board that it must undertake improvements to the gas system or face the possibility of fines.

Each year the utility is required by the federal department to have its system surveyed by an independent firm.

The study by the engineers presumably would help the utility locate safety problems as well as pinpoint locations of leaks.

Former Utility Plant Board Superintendent Herman Brown will work with the engineers to help them become familiar with the system. Board members noted that Brown, who still works part time with the utility, knows more about the natural gas system than any other employee.

Although explosions involving gas systems are relatively rare, Morehead has never had one, board members said. W.L. Fuqua, president of the firm, said, "It's like an airplane — when it crashes it makes a big noise and it's spectacular."

Services under the one-year contract, under which Fuqua could do work other than that requested Thursday night, include two types of services: general engineering consultation relative to the operation of the natural gas system and design engineering for improvements and extensions to the system.

### Sewer Rehabilitation

In addition to the gas system work, Plant Board members also took another step in a process that eventually will lead to rehabilitation of the city's sewer system.

The board authorized Howard K. Bell, of Lexington, its engineering firm for water and sewer, to proceed with the necessary paperwork on the project to seal off leaks and correct infiltration problems in the system.

The improvement project was part of the original proposal that resulted in the construction of a new waste water treatment plant and new collector lines.

It is to be funded by a 75 percent federal Environmental Protection Agency grant. Last year, the board hired a firm to conduct a sewer system evaluation survey. Information from that survey will be used in the rehabilitation project.

Actual construction work is still down the road, however, for the more than \$600,000 project.

Under city ordinance, homeowners and businessmen will be required to correct problems on their own

properly, such as roof downspouts that go into the sewage system, at their expense.

Smoke tests conducted during the evaluation survey last year show where the problems areas are located.

### Sewer Plant Still Incomplete

In a related matter, Board Chairman Clayton Perkins said some improvements have been made, but that there still remains a great deal of work on minor items by the contractor for the new treatment plant.

Last month, the Plant Board voted to withhold payment on the project to the contractor, Shook Inc., of Dayton, Ohio, and the engineers on the job, Howard K. Bell, until the work is done.

Board members reported that a sewer problem that resulted in a lawsuit by a Farmers man has been "straightened out for now." The board was told that a manhole on property owned by Leo Williams had been taken out. The lawsuit, however, which was filed against the city, is still pending.

The board denied a request by Bob Williams, chief operator of the sewer plant, to perform lab work for area cities and private operators of waste water plants. Williams said he had been requested by those people to test samples of water for them. The testing is now being done by a Lexington firm.

Currently, water samples from a treatment plant operated by the U.S. Forest Service at Twin Knobs is being tested by the utility. Board members

## Problems Plague Gateway Fair

"We need to apologize to the public," said Dale Kelsey, fair treasurer for the Morehead-Rowan County Jaycees.

Kelsey was referring to the 15th annual Northeast Gateway Regional Fair held last week, supposedly through Sunday, at the club's fairgrounds on US 60 East. Due to an oversight in the contract, the last day for fair rides provided by Britton All day, instead of the traditional Sunday.

The company packed its rides after midnight Saturday, unable to continue one more day due to a filled schedule.

Reportedly, Britton promised 20 rides and 40 concession stands for the fair, but only delivered 12 rides and 10 booths.

"We'll change amusement companies next year," said Kelsey. "If I have anything to do with it."

Attendance at the fair was down this

year, he added. Total receipts at the gate for the week were \$11,670.

Merf Allen, member of the exhibit committee, said exhibits were down, also. She said the fair catalogue was published late this year, giving people little notice for preparation.

## 900 Expected For Band Camps At University

Morehead State University will host a series of four marching band camps beginning Sunday, July 19.

More than 900 high school band members from throughout Kentucky will participate in the week-long sessions learning the basic fundamentals of marching and preparing for fall competition.

The camps mark the opening of the high school marching band season. Coordinator for the camps is Eugene C. Norden, assistant professor of music at MSU.

## Gas Prices Drop Again

Despite a nine tenths of a cent per gallon increase in the state price on the price of gas for tax reasons on July 1, the average cost for a gallon of gas in Morehead lowered slightly within the past 30 days, marking the fourth consecutive month that gas prices around town have dropped.

A survey of 14 local gas stations last Friday found the average price of fuel to be \$1.97 a gallon, compared with \$1.375 last month.

Regular gas on the average dropped a penny a gallon from \$1.325 to \$1.314. Three stations tied for the lowest unleaded, Trademore Gas, Save Mart, and Convenient at \$1.289. The Ashland station on KY 32 has the highest, unleaded this month, at \$1.439. The average unleaded price in July is \$1.372, down only slightly from the June average of \$1.375.

The average cost for premium fuel dropped just over a penny since June 12. Premium averages \$1.415, down from the \$1.426 of last month. The range

between the high and low premium average is 16 cents. Save Mart has the lowest premium gas for \$1.329, and the Shell station on U.S. 60 reported the highest price, \$1.489.

Six of the service stations lowered their prices on the average since June 12. The biggest drop came at the Chevron on KY 32, where the average pump price was 3.3 cents below the June reading.

According to station manager Lee Helwig, "Chevron has lowered their prices a cent and a half a gallon about every two or three weeks, depending on what the other markets are doing."

Helwig said he receives word about the price changes with a mailgram and added he had no way of predicting when the next change would take place.

The Shell on U.S. 60, Ashland on KY 32, Trademore Gas and Express Mart, all had the same average price for all three grades of gas as in the June survey.

Roger Dale Garner, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Brian Garner, Farmers, and Jennifer R. Mabry, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Denver Mabry, Morehead, were taken into town by their folks that morning and last seen at about 9:30 a.m.

Garner said he would be applying for a job at a local restaurant, while Mabry said she was taking care of school business. She told her parents she would be eating lunch with Garner, who has been a regular visitor to her home for the last two months.

Mr. Mabry said the couple had never expressed the desire to go anywhere and visits were always at his home. Although Garner recently purchased a car, it remains parked at his house.

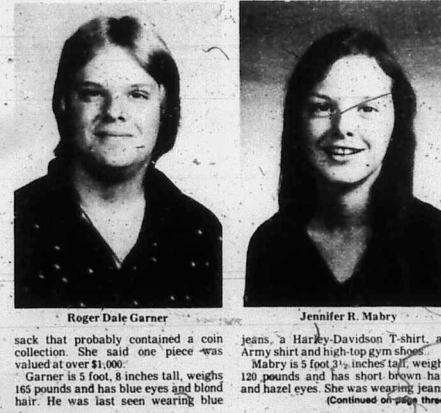
Mr. Mabry found that Garner sold his class ring and two guitars at a store in town prior to his disappearance. His mother said he left home carrying a

Menifee Rate Highest...

Unemployment Rates Show Small Decline

Menifee County's unemployment rate continues to be the highest in the state - 21.9 percent - according to mid-May figures released by the Kentucky Department for Human Resources.

Statewide unemployment dropped for the fourth consecutive month, reaching a low of 7.5 percent of the labor force.

Rowan County's unemployment rate was 9.9 percent, a drop of one full percentage point from the previous month, and the second lowest rate in the 34-county Eastern Kentucky region.

The figures show that some 121,900 persons were out of work during May, down from 133,600 in April of the year.

Other rates for the area by county were: Bath, 10.4; Carter, 14.4; Elliott, 10.3; Montgomery, 8.4

The national unadjusted unemployment rate for May was 7.1 percent.

New Vehicle Expected; Pack Resigns Seat On Local Ambulance Board

Coming next week, a new ambulance service provides residents of Morehead and the Rowan County area.

Morehead-Rowan County Ambulance Service Director Pete Hamm announced the projected delivery date for the new ambulance is Wednesday.

Hamm's announcement was part of the resignation of board member Lyman Pack resulting from circumstances she said made it impossible for her to continue.

Pack's resignation decreased board membership to six. Hamm, City Council representative Jack Roe, Fiscal Court representative Paul Ouseley, local physicians Dr. Patrick Servey and Dr. Ewel Scott and citizen members, Don Greenhill, the board chairman.

Board by-laws specify Pack's replacement must be recommended by the county judge-executive and the Morehead mayor and then approved by Rowan County Fiscal Court and Morehead City Council.

The board members unofficially agreed to suspend discussion on an immediate recommendation for Pack's replacement.

Board Member Dr. Ewel Scott suggested possible restructuring of the board's charter might possibly eliminate the need for an immediate selection of board members.

"Maybe we should take a close look at the organization of our charter to see how we can make it more workable,"

City Council representative Jack Roe said changes in the board member selection process would be easier made after appointment of the new member.

The board approved an investigation into workers compensation rates for four workers currently not covered.

Hamm told the board he would check rates from various insurance agencies to find the most reasonable price.

Hamm said circumstances after depletion of CETA funding had yet to be determined.

"We are just going to have to take a close look at our monies to see who are going to keep and who we need to keep," said Hamm.

Chairman Greenhill said, "The time is coming when we are going to have to get out what we are going to do."

In other business, the board approved payment of June bills totalling \$1747.61.

Hamm's June ambulance report showed 123 ambulance runs, including 62 emergency and 61 transfers.

The ambulance service's monthly deposit was \$4,775.50.

The board also approved minutes of the last meeting.

Whitt, Miller Enter Pleas; Trials Are Set OWINGVILLE - Oscar Whitt Jr. and Arnold Miller both pleaded not guilty to charges concerning the Bath County May primary election during their arraignments Monday morning before Circuit Judge Caswell P. Lane.

Whitt's trial is set for Sept. 29 and Miller's is set for Oct. 13.

Both were indicted on felony counts by the Bath County Grand Jury last week which met in special session to investigate alleged irregularities and illegalities reported in the heated election.

Whitt and Miller are represented by Alan Peck of the Mt. Sterling law-firm of White, Peck and Carrington.

Whitt, a judge in the Preston Precinct and an employee of the Kentucky Department of Transportation and the Bath County Highway Department, is charged with forcibly removing a female voter from the voting booth and voting her ballot for her.

His indictment, along with 11 others, was returned by the jury Wednesday.

The jury reconvened on Friday afternoon and indicted Miller on four counts of allegedly bribing and tampering with a grand jury witness.

The jury returned the indictment against Miller after hearing testimony from William Rothwell.

Miller, a member of the Bath County Board of Election Commissioners, faces additional misdemeanor charges of violation of counting of votes and advising or assisting bribery, two counts.

Those charges were made in indictments returned Wednesday by the grand jury.

# High Water Closes Beach

Visitors to Cave Run Lake this weekend saw life guard chairs, "out of order" and water lapping at benches normally feet away from the shore.  
Heavy rainfall raised the water level to about 739 feet, or nine foot above normal, Sunday.  
Conditions were so severe that the beach was closed due to high water for the first time in the history of the lake. However, regular beach hours are in effect this week, as the water is dropping about six inches daily.  
Herb Spradlin, assistant ranger for

the Morehead District, U.S. Forest Service, said campers were permitted in the beach area when it was closed to the general public. He said the low number of campers made it possible to do this; lifeguards on duty were able to watch for their safety.  
Typically, there are over 3,000 persons paying to go to the beach on one weekend day, he said.  
One danger of the high water was obstacles left on the ground due to the rapid flood rate. Lifeguard chairs and garbage can holders are two such examples.  
Spradlin said there was "no real damage" caused by the water, other than gravel washout and removal of the surface on campsite impact areas.  
Repairing Clear Creek alone could cost \$500, he estimated.

That building also was not damaged.

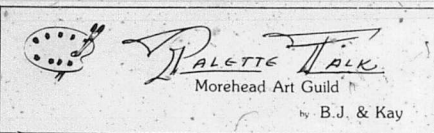

Objects in tone painting have three values — the color of the object (middle value), the shaded area (darker value). This, of course, is due to the fall of light on three dimensional shapes.

When doing tone painting, always use very dry oil paint, using the tiniest amount of copal, to help blend the oils and speed drying time. For deep shading and highlighting, use no copal at all, because these colors will blend with the middle value and it may already have some copal in it.

Layer in the separate values side by side with a ragged edge to each area and slightly overlap light over dark (lay in the darker value first). This

will begin your blending and eliminate a lot of work later.

When blending, use short zig-zag strokes on the line where colors meet. You want to see the distinct colors in their areas with a gradual melting together with no distinct lines. For good highlights, pat your color in the area you want it in and blend. Remember to wipe your brush frequently when blending.

These are just some ideas and suggestions for you to consider. There is no "one way" to paint objects, just as there is no technique that is "the correct way" to paint. One sits through knowledge gathered from art books and classes, from observations, artist's demonstrations, and from one's own experiences. Then keep the things that are best liked and easiest to use.

### Roadway Signs To Be Changed

In a spirit of energy conservation, the state Department of Transportation expects to save more than \$5 million annually by changing the type of roadway lights used in Kentucky.

Transportation Secretary Frank Metts said the department will convert from mercury vapor lights currently in use to high-pressure sodium lights.

The conversion is estimated to cost \$1.4 million, and bids on the project will be accepted later this year.

At present cost levels, this investment in conservation will pay for itself in less than two and a half years, and even greater returns will be realized in the future if energy costs rise as expected," Metts said.

Lower wattage sodium lights produce the same amount of light on the roadway as mercury vapor lights and improve visibility for motorists.

It is estimated that converting the state's 8,000 highway miles on interstate highways and other highways will save more than 11 million kilowatt-hours per year. At current rates a kilowatt-hour costs 6 cents.

"We are factoring in the short fall in state federal revenue through 1982 and, every dollar saved is being directed toward highway improvements and maintenance."

### State MAP Closing

FRANKFORT — Because of budget problems, the Department for Human Resources will no longer provide full-time Medical Assistance Program eligibility workers to 14 medical facilities throughout the state.

The workers, now stationed in the facilities to take applications from patients seeking government payment of their medical bills, will be reassigned to the bureau's local offices Sept. 1.

Eligibility workers to be reassigned are now stationed at Norton-Children's Hospital, University Hospital and two primary care centers, Louisville; Western State Hospital, Hopkinsville; Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, Lexington; and eight Appalachian regional hospitals in Eastern Kentucky.

**Roadway Signs To Be Changed**

In a spirit of energy conservation, the state Department of Transportation expects to save more than \$5 million annually by changing the type of roadway lights used in Kentucky.

Transportation Secretary Frank Metts said the department will convert from mercury vapor lights currently in use to high-pressure sodium lights.

The conversion is estimated to cost \$1.4 million, and bids on the project will be accepted later this year.

"At present cost levels, this investment in conservation will pay for itself in less than two and a half years, and even greater returns will be realized in the future if energy costs rise as expected," Metts said.

Lower wattage sodium lights produce the same amount of light on the roadway as mercury vapor lights, and improve visibility for motorists.

It is estimated that converting the state's 8,000 highway miles on interstate, primary and major highways will save more than 11 million kilowatt-hours per year. At current rates a kilowatt-hour costs 5 cents.

"We are currently searching for ways to conserve energy and reduce operating costs of the Transportation Department," Metts said. "We are fortunate to have a surplus in state and federal revenue through 1982 and, every dollar saved is being directed toward highway improvements and maintenance."

**State MAP Closing**

FRANKFORT — Because of budget problems, the Department for Human Resources will no longer provide full-time Medical Assistance Program eligibility workers to 14 medical facilities throughout the state.

The workers, now stationed in the facilities to take applications from patients seeking government payment of their medical bills, will be reassigned to the bureau's local offices Sept. 1.

Eligibility workers to be reassigned are now stationed at Norton-Children's Hospital, Louisville; and two primary care centers, Louisville; Western State Hospital, Hopkinsville; Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, Lexington; and eight Appalachian regional hospitals in Eastern Kentucky.

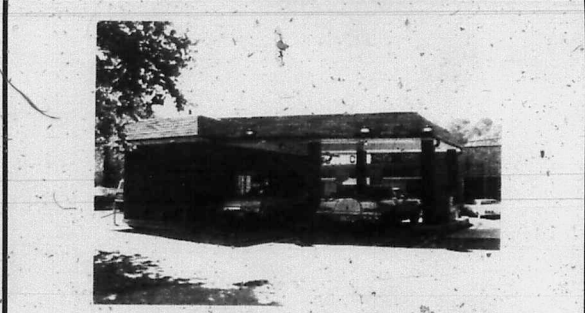

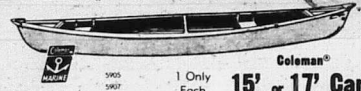

The nose of the canoe cut a silent wedge through the clean, bluish-colored water of Mill Creek Lake, easing its way through the standing slick-ups. An orange T-1 size flatfish, a large yellow skirt attached to the rear hooks wobbled past the dead trout that had been left standing when the lake was un-

ponded. The fish could be seen easily as it made its way alongside a partially submerged log that had lost its battle to stand upright and had fallen to the lake's surface.

It was only the broad-sided flash of a large fish that could be seen as the lure suddenly disappeared beneath the log. My little Skyline Graphite rod arched double with the impact of the strike as I reared back hard against the solid resistance of the fish at the other end of the four-pound test line. Good thing these line manufacturers make a stronger line than the advertised breaking strength, I thought, as the thin monofilament held against the force of the strike.

The battle continued in a see-saw fashion amid the heavy cover. But I finally managed to work the thrashing largemouth out of the tree tops and into a spot of open water where I reached down and took a firm grip on the lower jaw of the bass and jerked it clean of the

water while it was still in a mood to fight.

The two-pounder would be plenty for supper and would also make a nice ending to a strenuous day of fishing and exploring one of Kentucky's more popular resort parks.

Natural Bridge is a high activity, fun kind of park and is the central attraction for recreation users in the Slade area. The big draw to this park is Natural Bridge, a huge sand rock span that adorns the crest of a high ridge behind the park's popular Hemlock Lodge. The span is one of the more magnificent and easily accessible natural bridges in a land of many such sculptures. Every first-time visitor wants to see this natural wonder carved from sandstone and conglomerate sediment by the eroding powers of winds, water and eons of time.

Natural Bridge is a well-developed state park and it is apparent from all angles that a lot of government money and good management have been combined to make the park highly popular among visitors who come mainly from the Louisville, Cincinnati and Dayton areas. Its one weakness is perhaps the lodge which has only 38

rooms and is filled from Memorial Day through Labor Day each summer. The two campgrounds show obvious heavy use by throngs of campers who enjoy the hiking, fishing and scenic exploration that abound in the region.

Only a short drive from the park entrance brings you to Narda and through the old hand-carved railroad tunnel that leads driving visitors into the magnificent Red River Gorge country.

In recent years, the square dance program held at Hoedown Island just below the lodge has increased greatly in popularity. Square dance groups from several states. Dances are held every Saturday night during the summer season and many special square dancing events are scheduled throughout the spring, summer and fall.

The climb to scenic Natural Bridge is a strenuous one, but those who would like a better route up the steep slope may opt for a ride on the skylift, which runs from near the stable area to the crest of the ridge near the bridge.

Another attraction at Natural Bridge is the beautiful swimming pool located just below the lodge and at the side of the small backed-up mill pond where multi-colored paddle boats get a good working out daily.

The pool is free to lodge guests, but everyone else is required to pay a daily fee. From a personal viewpoint, free swimming privileges should be afforded to campers who, I believe, are charged a very high fee. An example was space enough for me to park my small pickup, which cost \$5.50 and did not provide a table, hook-ups or hardly even a level spot.

Perhaps a solution to this costly problem would be to afford primitive camping areas at a low cost for those of us who do not require acres of space to park huge recreational vehicles or the expense of electrical hook-ups to run the air conditioners, TV or washers and dryers, that many of these units contain.

Like all resort parks, Natural Bridge offers a schedule of recreational activities during the tourist season. The park provides good dining services at the lodge and there are tennis courts, horseback riding, a nature center and several gift shops.

Readers of this page who enjoy fishing will find good angling possibilities in the 54-acre lake. Some excellent largemouths are to be found in the extra clear waters as are smallmouth, crappie, bluegill and rainbow trout.

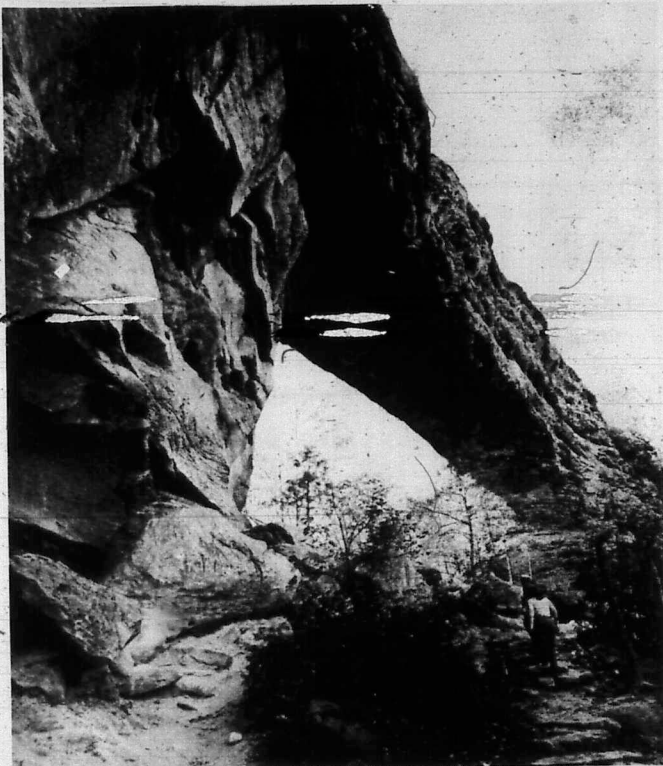
The latter is stocked several times each spring and it is believed that many of them live over the summer in the deep and cool lake, allowing them to grow to respectable size.

Other than a few bank fishermen coming from the park, the lake is fished mostly by a few locals. The upper reaches of the lake can often provide good fishing during the weekdays when very few boaters are to be found.

It is also considered a good night fishing lake for largemouth bass. Explorers who visit Natural Bridge will find a multitude of opportunities surrounding the park. Ridge top drives carry visitors past quaint hillside farms in Powell, Wolfe and Lee counties. This is considered by many to be the heartland of Kentucky Appalachia. In autumn, hunting for squirrel, quail and whitetail deer is good throughout most of the region.

The nearby Red River Gorge provides a multitude of sights, hiking trails and canoe trips down the scenic Red River. You may even want to put in a few hours searching for the legendary Swift Silver Mine, which many believe is located in the Natural Bridge region. A few hours probably won't turn up too much, seeing as how dozens of others in the area have spent a lifetime looking for the elusive remains of 70-mule-loads of smelted silver crowns believed to be buried along some faint trail of the long ago past.

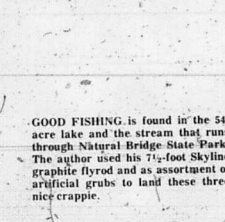

# Brown Concedes He'd Like George Allen To Replace Curci

LEXINGTON, Ky. (UPI) — Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. has conceded he would like to see former national Football League coach George Allen replace University of Kentucky football coach Fran Curci.

In a copyrighted article in the Louisville Courier-Journal Sunday, Brown said he has been attempting to convince UK administrators to replace Curci because "a losing team for 30 years is not good for the state."

"I've been talking till I'm blue in the face to UK officials," Brown said. He emphasized that he believes the university has a good opportunity to hire Allen.

Allen conceded Friday he's talked to Brown about the idea of coaching at the University of Kentucky but dismissed the conversations as "nothing serious."

Allen, once coach of pro teams in Los Angeles, Washington and Chicago and now with CBS, said Friday from California, "We've talked about it, but there is nothing serious. I have a contract with CBS and they (Kentucky) have a coach."

"I've known the governor and Phyllis (George Brown, also a CBS employee) from trips to the Kentucky Derby.

There's really nothing serious." —But Brown said Sunday the chances of attracting Allen are better than the 59-year-old former coach said.

Asked if Allen had assured Brown he would take the post if offered, the governor responded, "Well not to that degree. But I think you know me well enough to know unless there wasn't some interest involved, I wouldn't get interested."

Brown said if he could convince University officials that they should replace Curci with Allen, he would have no problem raising the necessary money to pay the remaining four years of Curci's contract.

But UK President Dr. Otis Singletary said Saturday UK is not shopping for another football coach, and issued a statement saying the procedure for selecting a coach rests with the Athletics Association.

Dr. Singletary's prepared statement put him squarely in head coach Curci's corner.

"Yes, the governor had indicated on several occasions his personal dissatisfaction with the football program," Singletary said in his statement. "I feel it is important to

make clear that the university is not party to the discussion with anyone about the head football coach's position."

The Cat's Pause, a 6-year-old privately printed Lexington magazine devoted to UK sports, reported Friday Brown has been trying for six months to get rid of Curci, apparently because the coach wouldn't publicly endorse Brown for governor in 1979.

The magazine's editor, Oscar Combs, told UPI one of his unidentified sources indicated Brown was particularly anxious to have such backing because UK basketball coach Joe B. Hall was behind Terry McBrayer, running against Brown for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Curci was unavailable for comment, according to UK sports information spokesmen. Curci's eight years at UK have resulted in a 44-42 record, including a 3-8 campaign last season.

Curci's high point came in 1976 when UK won the Peach Bowl, and a year later the team went to 10-1.

Last December, the UK Athletic Board voted to automatically give Curci a one-year extension on his five-year pact, meaning he has about three, and-a-half years left on his contract.

# MSU Security Program Has Student Cadets

Morehead State University students MaryEtta Bledsoe and David Tapp haven't lost any friends since they took their last job. In fact, they say their friends are more understanding than expected.

The jobs they accepted are as "student cadets" with the university's Division of Safety and Security.

The "student cadet" program is a cooperative effort involving MSU's professional police officers and university students. Cadets work from 12 to 20 hours per week, relieving officers from chores such as directing traffic, writing parking tickets and checking campus building security at night.

"One of the first tickets I had to write was on a friend's car," recalls Tapp, a sophomore from Morehead. "Of course, he responded when I told him later that I had written a ticket on his car. He didn't really mind."

had been illegally parked."

The program started at MSU earlier this summer but planning began two or three years ago, according to Gary Messer, MSU's director of safety and security.

"We couldn't begin the student cadet program until we had our regular security force at full strength," Messer said. "We had been operating with less than a full force and had no men to work with the students. Now the program is going well, judging by these first two students."

"Now we have only the two students, but we hope to expand to six or eight cadets in the fall semester," he said. "Of course, they all will be paid under the university's work-study program."

Her work hasn't been difficult, said MaryEtta, a Dayton, Ohio, junior. "I'm glad to be paid, and I know the university staff that she feels are more

difficult to handle than being on the street.

"I worked around the office when I first began the job and I would much rather write parking tickets than be the person at the window where the fines are paid," she said. "The people who get tickets really come up with some far-out stories about why they parked illegally. Collecting is a difficult job sometimes."

Student cadets will have expanded roles this fall when they help guard control at athletic events, conferences and musical events. But Messer feels the major part of the cadet role may be unseen.

"Aside from relieving regular officers, I can see where it will help students not even connected with our division," Messer said. "It can't be more than positive, from a student's point of view, to see other students helping security officers. The

relationship from student to student will be one of more understanding than from officer to student."

It's that student-to-student relationship which caused MaryEtta and David some concern at first, but now that concern has been replaced by a confident assessment of their jobs.

"I'm already playing a role in helping students understand the people that are here on the security force," said Tapp. "I've even convinced a couple of my friends to apply for a job in the fall."

MaryEtta says her friends think it's funny that she is a part of law enforcement.

"They say they can't believe that I'm that mean," she said. "But they're just joking. I really convince them that the security force is just people out there doing their job."

"I hope to work here until I graduate," Tapp said. "I think it's one of the best jobs I'll ever have."

# KU Ordered To Make Refund To Customers

FRANKFORT, Ky. (UPI) — The state Public Service Commission has ordered Kentucky Utilities Co. Inc. to draw up a plan to refund \$6.7 million — plus interest — to overcharged customers in 1974 and 1975.

Meanwhile, two utilities Friday requested a total of \$68.8 million in rate hikes from the commission.

The commission Friday ordered Kentucky Utilities to submit a plan to pay back its customers who were overcharged when the utility ignored a PSC rate hike approval in 1974.

The utility had asked the commission for a \$13.4 million rate hike in May 1975, but the commission only granted the utility a \$7.3 million dollar rate increase. The company ignored the PSC order and charged customers the higher rate and sued the commission.

The state Court of Appeals ruled the company was wrong and had to refund its customers whatever the rate hike was plus interest.

The PSC Friday said KU must submit a plan for those refunds within 15 days, and must begin paying refunds within 60 days after the PSC approves the plan.

The PSC order said the firm must pay 6 percent interest on overcharges collected from May 15, 1974 to July 10,

1974 and must pay 10 percent interest for the period from 1974 through 1981 on those overcharges collected from July 10, 1974 to July 23, 1975.

The PSC said if KU is unable to find all of the 1974 and 1975 customers overcharged, it must pool the unreturned refunds into a fund to be distributed through future credits to its existing customers.

Meanwhile Friday, Louisville Gas & Electric applied for a \$56.6 million natural gas and electricity rate hike. If approved, LG & E's rates would increase almost 12 percent and would raise the average residential bill by more than \$6 per month.

The utility said it needs the higher rates, which would affect about 230,000 customers in Louisville and 14 outlying counties, because of inflation and increased construction costs.

Columbia cited two reasons for the rate hike. First it said inflation in the price of materials, supply, labor, and taxes forced the company to seek a rate hike request. Secondly, the utility said it needed to increase its rate of return on investment to 16.7 percent.

The commission has not yet set hearing dates for either request.

July Crop Report Is Released

Weather and General

Agriculture was at a near standstill during the first half of June. Planting was further delayed on wet, waterlogged fields and flooded river bottoms. However, by late June farmers in most areas of Kentucky were wanting rain to help the newly planted tobacco, corn and soybeans. Widespread showers received the July 4th weekend were beneficial.

Crops are generally in fair to good condition. Tobacco is highly variable in size with some blooming at a very early date. Leeching of fertilizer, insects, black shank, and blue mold are other concerns of tobacco farmers. Wheat harvest is nearly finished, and most double-crop soybeans have been planted. The hay crop shows good growth but quality has suffered due to rain damage and rank growth.

Corn

Corn production in Kentucky is forecast at 139.1 million bushels, up 26

percent from last year's drought reduced crop. Acreage intended for grain at 1.53 million acres is up 50,000 acres from 1980. Yield is estimated at 85 bushels per acre — an increase of 15 bushels from last year but well below the 102 of 1979. Considerable corn was planted in April, and development varies from a few inches in height to roasting ears. Overall, corn is reported in fair to good condition.

Corn production in the United States is forecast at 7.12 billion bushels compared with 6.65 billion in 1980 and 7.94 billion in 1979. Estimated yield at 85.5 bushels per acre compares with 91.0 bushels last year.

Wheat

The wheat crop in Kentucky is expected to total 29.4 million bushels, and increase of 113 percent from 1980 and the largest production on record. The previous record crop was the 13.8 million bushels of last year. Wheat acreage for harvest is up dramatically.

Estimated at 200,000 acres, it is up 100 percent from 1980. Yield is forecast at 42 bushels per acre, up 2.5 bushels from last year and the highest on record. Wheat harvest was 85 percent complete by July 5. Lodged wheat and fields too wet to support combines have caused some harvesting problems.

United States production of winter wheat is forecast at a record high 2.09 billion bushels, 11 percent above last year. Estimated yield at 35.7 bushels per acre compares with 36.8 a year earlier.

Other Small Grains

Kentucky barley production is estimated at 1.66 million bushels, 4 percent above 1980. Barley production in the nation is expected to be 478 million bushels compared with 359 million bushels last year. Oat production in the U.S. is expected to be 236 million bushels compared with 458 million last year.

Weed Control Update

Farmers will have an opportunity to get the latest information on weed control at an all-day event near Princeton, KY, July 28.

Sponsored by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, the weed control update will be at the West Kentucky Research and Education Center. This year's event is the second of this type of field day at the Center, and will emphasize current problems facing farmers and herbicide performance, according to Dr. J.R. Martin, weed control research specialist headquartered at Princeton.

The morning program starts at 9:15 C.D.T., featuring presentations by five weed science specialists in the UK Agronomy Department. Topics include herbicide distribution with different incorporation equipment, use of conventional and innovative herbicide application equipment, black nightshade control, and weed control options available during either very dry or very wet seasons, new herbicides for postemergence control of johnsongrass in soybeans, and grain sorghum weed control options.

During the afternoon, research plots will be on display from 1 to 4 p.m. Specialists will be on hand to interpret what the 15 different experimental plots are showing.

Six of the experimental plots show various aspects of johnsongrass control. In soybeans, the tests deal with row spacings of 30- and 10 inches, double-cropped soybeans, postemergence control of johnsongrass in the crop, and long-term control. In corn, farmers will see progress in preemergence and postemergence applications of herbicides to control johnsongrass in the crop, a season-long approach to combating the weed.

Four soybean plots are devoted to cocklebur control, postemergence applications of herbicides to control morning glory, a comparison of how different varieties respond to postemergence herbicide treatments, and the effect of timing of postemergence applications of herbicides.

Two corn plots show the response of the crop to delayed evaluation of Paraquat and preemergence herbicides, and a long-term evaluation of preemergence herbicides in a continuous corn cropping system.

Other research in the evaluation of equipment used for incorporating herbicides in the soil, effect of Atrazine and Princep residues on crops that follow the one on which applications are made, and a comparison of herbicide application equipment with conventional sprayers.

"Our weed control update will include advances being made in technology and ways to solve problems caused by changes in the situation," said Martin. "Weather has varied from very dry last year to very wet this year. Weed problems also change. For example, black nightshade has become a severe problem in soybeans the past two years, and it appears to be spreading."

Irrigation of Corn

Increased corn yields and average of 43 bushels per acre and boosted net profit by \$13.50 per acre in tests conducted last summer by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture at its research and education center near Princeton, Ky. This was the first year for the irrigation feasibility study on corn. Dr. Don Shurley, Extension farm management specialist, said that the tests are continuing and that annual analyses will be made over the long-term to assess the agronomic potential and economic feasibility for irrigation in western Kentucky.

"Although corn yields were increased by irrigation last year, results were below expectations," Shurley said. "Even with sufficient moisture, yields were held down — probably from heat stress on the crop."

Irrigation increased production costs by about \$122 per acre. The added costs included cash expenses such as for additional fertilizer, seed, fuel and labor plus overhead expenses on the irrigation system of depreciation, interest and insurance.

Despite lower corn yields than expected on the irrigated land, net returns were higher because of the favorable corn price of \$2.50 per bushel, according to the farm management specialist. Costs and returns vary from one farm to another because of differences in fertilizer rates, plant population, corn hybrid planted, and soil type. Shurley said that management is the key to results obtained from irrigating corn — such things as quantity of water applied and proper timing of application.

Japanese Beetle Activity Begins

"Groups of Japanese beetles, half-inch metallic green insects with bronze colored wing covers, are beginning to emerge from the ground and will be feeding on a variety of trees, shrubs, crops and ornamental plants during the rest of the summer."

These insects, which feed on the upper surface of the leaves of about 300 different species of plants, leave the damaged foliage with skeletonized appearance, according to Dr. Lee Townsend, Extension entomologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. He added that the beetles prefer plants exposed to direct sunlight and often start at the top of a plant and work downward.

Sevin is the most effective insecticide to use against Japanese beetles, Townsend said. "A regular spray program is usually necessary to protect valuable ornamentals or garden plants, especially those that add foliage rapidly," he said.

Commercially available traps containing a floral or sex odor lure also can eliminate a large number of beetles. But it is difficult to achieve satisfactory control with traps alone, said Townsend. Combining the use of traps with a sound insecticide program achieves better beetle control.

USDA Proposes Extension For Baled Burley Supports

ATLANTA, Ga. — Producers of burley tobacco will be eligible for government grading and price supports on unlimited marketings of untied, baled tobacco — up to their marketing quotas — under a proposal that has been announced by Under Secretary of Agriculture Seelye Ludwick at Washington, D.C.

Limited amounts of baled burley have been eligible for government grading and price supports since the 1978-79 season, Ludwick said. The proposal would mean all quantities of untied burley packed in bales would be eligible for price supports and for official grading by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, beginning with the 1981-82 season.

Ag Land Loss Hearing Topic

A hearing on problems associated with the loss of prime farmland to such things as roads, residential and industrial development will be held at Morehead State University Thursday, July 16 at 7 p.m. in Reed Auditorium.

Morehead is one of four sites in the state where public hearings are being conducted by the Kentucky Agricultural Lands Study and Policy Committee.

Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. established the committee in February to look into state policies affecting agriculture, and to decide what should be done about the growing urban threat to rural lands.

At the first hearing last week in Hopkinsville, the majority of the 200 persons present expressed disapproval of federal and state programs or agriculture districts to protect the most fertile land.

The loss of farmland amounts to more than 70,000 acres a year in Kentucky, according to a recently published National Agricultural Lands Study. The same study concluded that the annual loss nationwide is about 3 million acres of farmland, including about 1 million acres of cropland.

Meetings on the problem are also being held in Elizabethtown and Somerset.

Ludwick said producers will not be required to file an application to market baled burley, as was required in the past.

He said the proposed action will help reduce marketing costs for burley tobacco producers.

The proposed price support and grading changes are published in the June 24 Federal Register. The deadline for receiving comments is July 24.

## Senate Democrats Want To Revise Reagan Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democrats want to amend President Reagan's tax cut bill, but the White House says the president will accept no further changes.

Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., and other liberal Democrats said Friday they will try to target the measure more towards middle-income people and make the final year of the cut contingent on the health of the economy.

They made their announcement shortly after the White House said Reagan would accept no further changes in his 33-month, 25 percent, across-the-board tax cut. Reagan initially sought a three-year, 30 percent tax cut.

Senate Republicans feared the administration would suffer an embarrassing defeat over the tax cut in the Democratic-dominated House, and sought to avoid the battle through compromise.

Sources close to Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski said the Illinois Democrat believes he can muster sufficient support in the House for a Democratic victory.

Speakers said Reagan knows "it's going to be a hard fight."

## UK Professor To Study Scot Regionalism

Whether Scots feel the same kind of regionalism experienced by Appalachian people will be explored by University of Kentucky professor John Stephenson under a Fulbright grant-in-aid during August.

Stephenson, director of UK's Appalachian Center, will examine regionalism in Scotland, particularly as it relates to a sense of nationalism.

A part of that study will be a close look at "devolution," a process whereby Scots would assume authority for their own legislative activities from Great Britain. A referendum on devolution was defeated by the Scots in a recent election, but Stephenson says the concept is being "restructured."

Stephenson's Fulbright award is one of more than 500 Fulbright grants for university teaching and advanced research in more than 100 countries for 1981-82.

Fulbright awards for university teaching and advanced research are administered by the Council for International Exchange of Scholars in Washington, D.C. under a contract with the U.S. International Communication Agency.

Stephenson was appointed Appalachian Center director June 28, 1979. He served as UK's dean of undergraduate studies for nine years before the appointment.

"The president has set his heart on this," said deputy press secretary Larry Speakes. "He's adamant on it. He says it privately and publicly."

House Speaker Thomas O'Neill heard the strong words and responded in kind. "The president has set his heart on a tax bill that real Democrats cannot in good conscience support," he said. "As long as he insists on an unfair bill, a bill that shortchanges the middle class and penalizes working people, we are set for a tough fight."

The proposed revisions offered by Bradley and other Democratic senators would bring the package more in line with the Democratic tax proposal pending in the House.

Bradley said the third year of Reagan's tax program should be dependent on the inflation rate and the budget deficit. He also said he would try to target the tax cut toward people with income below \$50,000.

House Democrats support a 21-month, 15 percent tax cut targeted more toward people in the \$15,000 to \$50,000 income brackets.

The White House's reaffirmation of its no-compromise stance was in response to suggestions by Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bob Dole, R-Kans., that there still might be room for negotiations with opposing Democrats.

"That is not our position," Speakes said of Dole's speculation of a compromise. But Speakes said the White House recognizes Dole "has the right and duty to work his own deal."
