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## Statue Returns To St. Claire

Almost a year after vandals hammered the head and arms of a brand new statue of a Madonna standing in the lawn of St. Claire Medical Center, freelance artist Tony McKinney, of Elliottville, has sculpted another.

McKinney said the "kind of human disappointment" by the ruin of the first Madonna is more satisfied with his second creation.

He explained that the first statue was a compromise between an abstract picture the hospital administration suggested he copy, and the style he wanted to do. This second piece is "my own expression," said McKinney.

"She is more more natural — softer — all-out of my head," he described with a smile of satisfaction.

McKinney, who is a native of Neon in Letcher County, says several of his friends have remarked that the mother and child resemble his wife, Karen Stewart McKinney and their son, Shane, who is 6.

"If it's there, it's subconscious," he said.

The Morehead State University graduate used clay from Clack Mountain in Rowan County, as he did for the first statue. However, a different firing process gives the figure a terra cotta cast, that resembles the actual color of the clay.

## Board Begins Setting Policies On Merger

The Rowan County system, and students have until the school day ends tomorrow (Wednesday) to decide if they want to attend it or another of the county's buildings.

The open enrollment plan was adopted along with several other policies concerning the University Breckinridge at a special meeting of the Rowan County Board of Education Saturday morning.

Last week, Morehead State University's Board of Regents voted to merge University Breckinridge, the institution's former teacher training school, with the county school system. The action was meant, in part, to help offset \$686,900 in budget reductions announced by the state last month.

"Technically, Breck is closed," Rowan Superintendent John Brock told an audience of about 50 persons, mainly parents, meeting at the high school cafeteria. The number of students in Rowan County has grown from 3,000 to 3,500.

"The question is: Are we going to continue to operate Breck in its present form?" he continued. "We're not going to move all the students from Breck down here."

The Rowan system has a population problem, with the enrollment at the high school almost double the building's design capacity.

Board members agreed to have Breck continue in its current form for the 1981-82 school year. The board has agreed to a lease-rent arrangement, whereby MSU provides utilities and maintenance for \$1 for the first year.

"In the future, it will have to be operated just as our other public schools are operated," said board vice chairman Eugene White. "We must make this transition without hurting the children. This is the task and this is what it is all about."

Currently, the schools have variations in such things as calendars and athletic programs. Brock started classes several days behind Rowan, and it's schedule calls for holidays on George Washington's Birthday and Good Friday, and a different time for spring break.

The board voted to approve the Breck calendar temporarily, and open it to amendments at its regular meeting Monday, Oct. 12.

The calendar, if left as it is could cause transportation problems. Brock was authorized by the board to work out the details of a bus schedule for Breck. If spring breaks are different at the schools, pupils at Breck may not have transportation when that school is in session and other Rowan schools are out.

Athletic offerings at the schools are unequal. For instance, Breck is unique with its "soccer" team, Rowan, its football.

Brock promised that the sport

programs would not be changed. However, there is the likelihood that Breck athletes, fearing numerous

might "jump on the bandwagon," leaving too few players to make a team.

"The ideal situation would be to have students stay in the same school," said White.

But, as Superintendent Brock noted, such a policy would cause problems. About 50 students transferred to Rowan during the summer; would they have to be sent back?

If a different approach were tried, and the schools were considered separate bodies, Rowan "would have to somehow district."

Dr. Ben Flora, professor of mathematics at MSU, suggested that Breck be operated as a temporary building, and students be merged. This way, athletic eligibility questions would be easier answered and crowded classrooms could be eliminated.

Brock replied that such a situation probably would be best, but "the public has been thinking in other terms." Vice chairman White added, "We're past that point."

Another parent commented that such a situation would result in single athletic teams, limiting the number of eligible players. Twin clubs combining at the schools would cause one set of officers to get bumped.

### Class Adjustment

Superintendent Brock was authorized to limit and adjust the size of class enrollment. Brock explained to the News that he could write to parents of youngsters in an overcrowded room, advising them of a smaller class that their child could attend.

Brock's suggestion that the board employ the pros and cons of the Breckinridge faculty met with disagreement by one woman. She said some local persons "have been here a long time trying to get this system."

White agreed with her and worded the motion so that it says the system will hire "those additional teachers needed at Breck" on a limited contract. In its last action of the morning session, the board authorized Brock to make necessary administrative decisions in order to solve problems that may develop. The motion included the understanding that anything involving policy would be discussed at a special meeting.

Board member Chennault James extended his support to Brock in remarks applauded by the audience that had grown into a crowd of 200.

The new faces were there for an 11 a.m. meeting about athletics. Moderated by Brock, the atmosphere resembled a pep rally as his introduction of coaches and cheerleading sponsors evoked cheers from students attending.

Brock explained the open enrollment

## Pennington Nominated As Attorney

By the narrowest of margins — one vote — Harvey Pennington was selected last Thursday evening by the Rowan County Democratic Executive Committee to replace the late Paul Caudill as the nominee for county attorney in the general election.

When Caudill was killed in a traffic accident on Aug. 6, it became the duty of the Democratic Executive Committee to select another candidate for the Nov. 3 general election.

Pennington, who served as county attorney from 1971 through 1977, will face no Republican opposition in the fall. He was the only candidate who challenged Caudill in the May primary.

After making the announcement following a 20-minute closed meeting, Democratic Chairman Otis Elam, who presided over the meeting, said the group as a whole didn't want to release the vote totals.

Later The Morehead News learned that Pennington received eight votes compared to seven for former city attorney Paul Blair. Paul Stokes, a third candidate, who shared an office with Caudill, received no votes, although his name was placed in nomination.

As the three candidates waited nervously together near the entrance to the courthouse, the 15 members of the Democratic Executive Committee gathered in the Fiscal Court meeting room on the second floor.

That general fund roll, it was reported that William Whitaker, one of the members, was in the hospital. Whitaker's vote was made by proxy through Stokes. Williams' vote then went to going executive session.

After receiving congratulations from Blair and Stokes, Pennington was all smiles as he learned of the committee's decision.

Pennington said he really doesn't expect much change in the way he will handle his office from his previous term, except for the fact that a new court system is being used.

After the vote, Blair said, although he was disappointed he wasn't nominated, "I respect the committee's decision and I will support the nominee and the entire Democratic ticket."

Stokes said simply that he wished the death of Caudill had not made the entire process necessary.

## Public Hearing On School Tax Set For Tonight

A public hearing to obtain comments on a school tax rate will be at 7:30 tonight at the Rowan County High School cafeteria.

The Board of Education has indicated its intent to set a rate of 8 cents for the general fund and 13 cents for a special voted building fund.

That general fund tax rate is expected to produce \$162,000, of which \$44,000 is from new property and personal property.

The special voted building fund could produce \$283,000.

Board members could approve a compensating general fund rate of 6.4 cents. Revenue from that would be \$129,000. The compensating special voted building fund rate is 10.1 cents, with \$204,000 in revenue expected.

## County To Rent Offices To Department Of Justice

Following a lengthy debate, members of the Rowan County Fiscal Court approved a one-year lease of courthouse office space to the Kentucky Department of Justice.

"If we don't say 'yes, we'll let you in,' they're going to advertise for office space, and then we'll have to compete with people in the community," said County Attorney John Cox.

"They are the employees of the justice department's division of parole and probation, now working in office space at Christy Creek.

Cox said at Friday's special meeting of the court that the division of parole and probation contacted him Thursday about the office space.

"They wanted 700 square feet of space when I talked to them on the phone yesterday," said Cox. "But I received a letter from them this morning saying they wanted 525 square feet."

The parole and probation division's request for two 12-by-12-foot offices and a reception area would be partitioned from a 2500-square-foot room still unleased in the courthouse.

Cox said the most the department would pay for the leased office space is \$5 per square foot. That amounts to a little more than \$2,600 annually for the courthouse space requested.

"The county would make no money in the first year of such a lease, according to magistrate Paul Ousley.

"After we pay to partition these offices, the first year will just be a break-even point," said Ousley.

"We'll," said Cox. "It's all they are allowed to pay, and if we can't give it to them at \$5 a foot, they'll have to find the

space somewhere else."

Cox said the court would not have to solicit bids on the partitioning project. Instead, local carpenters could be hired to use materials purchased by the court.

In other business, the court appointed Dave Carlson as county electrical inspector on an emergency basis, without advertising for applicants.

Cox said he had received notice from Kentucky Utilities that no new electrical service would be supplied in the county until an electrical inspector was hired.

The court set emergency-period inspection fees at \$25 for residential inspections and \$35 for commercial and industrial inspections. The fee includes the cost of an initial "rough-in" inspection and a final inspection by Carlson.

Cox also requested the court to call a special session to consider pending legal action against the Rowan County Air Board.

Several debts incurred by the RCAB have gone unpaid because of Judge-Executive W.C. Flannery's failure to sign checks for payment of bills, said Cox.

"The state attorney general has ruled that the signature of all the magistrates, and the county treasurer, can legally function as the judge-executive's signature," said Cox.

Now, the checks require the signature of the judge-executive and the county treasurer.

The major debt is a default on a state Department of Transportation loan.

"We're looking at some legal action," said Cox. "It will be a black eye on all of us if the state has to bring legal action to get the Air Board to pay their bills."

The special session is this morning at 9 a.m.

## Cancellation Of Two Greyhound Runs Not Fault Of The City, Council Says

The canceling of two bus runs by Greyhound, Inc. is unrelated to recent Morehead City Council action to restrict loading and unloading of the buses to only commercial-carrier zones, said members of the council at a special session Thursday. That statement was later affirmed by Greyhound.

The council also approved a bid from Leets Blacktopping to resurface city streets, and approved an amended

ordinance giving emergency-funds to the Morehead-Rowan County Ambulance Board.

The council gave final approval to an ordinance limiting commercial carrier loading and unloading to two 24-hour no-parking zones on Main Street.

Following the approval, Mrs. Gordon Lambert, wife of Bear's Den owner and Greyhound Bus Lines agent Gordon Lambert, requested the council to reconsider the ordinance. Mrs. Lambert said the company plans a Sept. 9 cancellation of two Morehead runs, one eastbound and one westbound.

"I don't think Greyhound is pulling out the two runs because of the parking situation," said council member Randy Wells. "I heard about the loss before the parking situation arose."

Later, the Greyhound Bus Lines, Inc. district supervisor for the Morehead area agreed with Wells.

"I wish I could say that the cancellation was connected to the parking situation in Morehead," said Kent Hewitt from his office in Louisville.

"But, I honestly cannot. They are un-

# Bath County Election Trials Moved To Rowan

OWINGSVILLE — The trials of two Bath County election officials indicted on charges stemming from alleged voting irregularities in the May primary will be held in Rowan County.

Circuit Judge Caswell Lane ordered that the trials of Oscar Whit Jr. and Arnold Miller be moved from Bath County after listening to evidence from both the prosecution and defense at a change of venue hearing Friday.

The Bath County grand jury, which returned indictments against the men during the week of July 6, had recommended that the cases be tried outside the county "in order to insure a fair trial on the charges."

The trial of Whit, a judge in the Preston precinct and an employee of both the state and Bath County highway departments, is set for Sept. 29.

The trial of Miller, a member of the Owsingville Board of Education, a missionist and an Owsingville businessman, will begin Oct. 5.

Whitt was indicted July 8 on felony charges of forcibly removing a female voter from the voting booth at Preston and voting her ballot for her.

Also on July 8, Miller was indicted on misdemeanor charges of violation of counting of votes and two counts of advising or assisting violation.

The grand jury reconvened two days later and indicted Miller on four felony counts of allegedly bribing and tampering with a grand jury witness.

According to assistant commonwealth attorney Ted Mayre, both sides agreed to combining the change of venue hearing for Whit and Miller,

although they will be tried separately.

Both men are represented by Alan Peck, of the Mt. Sterling law firm of White, Peck and Carrington.

The charges against Whit and Miller were the only felony charges returned by the grand jurors, who indicted a total of 13 people on various counts.

Many of the misdemeanor cases have been disposed of in Bath County District Court after defendants pleaded guilty.

During the change of venue hearing, the prosecution called a total of nine witnesses, with most of them saying they felt neither the defendants nor the commonwealth could get a fair trial in Bath County.

Five persons testified for the defense, with all of them saying they felt the commonwealth could receive a fair trial.

Although the various grand jury indictments concerned several of the same offenses, the cases were moved against Whit and Miller are basically related to the Democratic contest for county judge/executive, which incumbent Ray Bailey lost by 23 votes to Charles Metz.

In explaining his decision to move the trials, Judge Lane said it is usually his feeling that cases of such unusual circumstances should be tried in the county where the alleged offenses took place.

"Noting that it is usually the defense that seeks a change of venue, Lane said, 'I feel there is so much personal involvement on both sides that I don't believe we could get a jury to honestly and fairly say it could try this case.'"

The judge said the thing that most affected his decision to move the trial is the fact that threats were issued against members of the grand jury and his belief that such intimidation of witnesses and jurors does not seem to be letting up. Lane said he doubted if the petit jurors could go through a trial without being contacted.

Those who testified for the defense were: Mike Shroat, who lost his primary bid to gain re-election as county attorney; KSP Sgt. Det. Jay Hancock, who headed a team of eight officers that looked at the alleged incidents; Thomas E. Craycraft, the grand jury foreman; Dorothy Whisman, a witness before the grand jury and the wife of Clyde Whisman, an unsuccessful candidate for sheriff.

Sarah Gilvin, a member of the grand jury; Debra Adams, a 19-year-old resident of Menifee County who said she was allowed to vote in Bath County; Johnson Razor, of Salt Lick, a teacher at Rowan County High School; Russ Metz, publisher of the Bath News Outlook; and Arthur Maze, a Bath County businessman whose son, Tummy, was indicted on misdemeanor charges of statutes pertaining to absentee ballots.

The two witnesses who served on the grand jury — Craycraft and Gilvin — said that they had received threatening phone calls. Another witness — Whisman — said she had been shot at twice.

Most of those who testified for the prosecution said they doubted if either side could get a fair trial in the county, including newspaperman Metz. Metz said he believes there is too much family involvement in the issue. He said politics is a way of life for many people in the county and a source of income for many others. He estimated that as many as 90 percent of the county's residents are "either involved or highly interested in politics."

Asked by Peck if he felt that 12 people in the county could be found who would be impartial and fair on the jury in the case, Metz said, "It's possible, but highly unlikely."

Peck asked Metz, "Isn't that quite an indictment against the citizens of the county?"

Metz replied, "Yes, I'd say it is."

The defense witnesses took exactly the opposite stand, saying they felt the commonwealth could get a fair trial.

Those testifying for the defense included: John Dicken, of Bethel, president of Owsingville Banking Co.; Sherman Goodpastor, of Owsingville, president of Farmers Bank; Clark Rogers, of Owsingville, a farmer and real estate agent; Handolf Richardson, a mortician and contractor and the brother of District Judge James Richardson, the father of Leslie Richardson, a successful candidate for Bath County attorney; and Aikkin Darnell, a retired banker and former county treasurer for 37 years.

Many of those associated with it said the Bath County primary was one of the "hottest" elections in recent memory, quite an event for a county described by Metz as one of the last bastions of traditional Eastern Kentucky politics and a place where people take their politics "very seriously."

policy set by the board earlier that day, and told the students they must make a home-school decision by Wednesday in order to be eligible to play athletics at that school.

"I hope every athlete and cheerleader will remain where they were last year," said Brock, "encouraging 'school spirit, and friendly red-hot rivalry'."

After the three-day period, decisions on eligibility will be made by the Commissioner of Athletics in Lexington, and the board of control.

"Now is the time to decide," Brock said. "Resolve it now and live with it."

Brock said that coaches are "absolutely forbidden" to encourage any student to go to a particular school. It is also technically illegal for a parent or team member to encourage a switch. The superintendent said the school could be suspended from the association and not allowed to play in athletics in these cases.

The changes with a new school affect cheerleading, as well, although it is governed by individual schools and not the association. Brock appointed high school principal Marvin Moore and Brock director Dr. Charles Whitfield to make a recommendation about cheerleaders.

Brock said, "Students will not have any problems at all. They will adjust. As parents, let's not be part of the problem."

He added, "We're off on the right foot, ready to go, if we don't fumble the ball."

Comments from the heads of the high schools concluded the meeting. "The training school isn't here any longer," said Moore. "Let's all work for the benefit of Rowan County."

Whitfield said he comes from a system with five high schools, and called it "very healthy." He said, "This can be a good year if we all support it. We can do it, let's do it."

### Firms Get Permission For Mining

The division of permits in the state Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection issued 160 mining permits during the month of July.

Five of those permits were for projects in several area counties.

Coal-Op, Inc., of Grayson, received a permit to surface mine 13 acres in Carter and Elliott counties. The company paid a permit fee of \$900 and posted a bond of \$14,040.

Placer Coal Co., of Sandy Hook, gained permission to surface mine in two areas of Elliott County.

HRN Coal Co., of Marissa, paid a \$3,600 permit fee and posted a bond of \$158,130 to mine two tracts in Morgan County. One tract is 65 acres, the other is 63.6 acres.

Oldfield Coal Co., of White Oak, paid a fee of \$4,250 and posted a bond of \$61,500 for permission to surface mine a 79.5 acre tract, also in Morgan County.

Statewide, the number and types of permits issued included 86 original permits, 41 revision permits, 24 amendment permits and nine succession permits.

Of the total issues, 99 were for surface mining operations, 44 for underground mining operations, 14 for preparation plant facilities and refuse areas and three for haul roads.

Permitting activities for July authorized the disturbance of 3,264 new acres of land.

### State Police Initiate Vehicle Identification Program

Protecting your automobile from thieves may be easier now that the Kentucky State Police have begun the Vehicle Identification Program.

The program is a permanent marking of the vehicle identification number on the windows of a vehicle. Every automobile has a different VIN.

According to John Lambert, public affairs officer for the KSP Morehead Post, the procedure is simple and quick.

"The VIN is marked on every glass in a vehicle using paint, a pencil, and acid," said Lambert. "The paint is removed after the number has been permanently etched into the window's surface."

The procedure takes less than 20 minutes, and the vehicle is not harmed by the barely-noticeable numbers. The vehicle number and the owner's name are recorded in Frankfort.

"It is hoped that this procedure will reduce the number of vehicles which are stolen in Kentucky each year," said Lambert. "It becomes very expensive for a thief to replace the glass in a vehicle and more difficult for a thief to dispose of the vehicle."

### FOP Is Still Undecided About Concert

Members of the local Fraternal Order of Police still are not certain how they will go about making refunds to persons who bought \$5 tickets to an Aug. 15 concert, which was cancelled by the promoter.

Harvey Pennington, attorney for the FOP, said he had contacted Bruce Carpenter, attorney for CMA Music Productions of Jamestown, N.Y. but had not reached any decisions about the matter.

CMA said it was forced to cancel the Ronnie Robbins concert because it did not have the money to produce the show.

Pennington said he is trying to get a fund, set up by CMA for the Morehead show, released in a trust to the FOP. The FOP has been considering either returning money to those who purchased tickets, or setting up another concert by Robbins.

Proceeds from the concert would have gone to FOP community projects.

Dear Friend: Obviously, you've written yourself off, but I haven't. I believe a tenacious, dedicated therapist could help you turn your life around. Fifty-four is not too late - if you really want to do it.

Look under "mental health" in the phone book. You will find several choices. Your letter indicates a high level of intelligence, and keen insights into your warped thinking and sick behavior, obviously, you are well-educated. (Your letter was grammatically perfect and required no editing by me - only shortening in the interest of space.) I believe you are worth saving. Now go ahead and DO IT.

Dear Ann Landers: Thank you for blasting that husband who was em-

barrassed because his wife made a lot of noise in the delivery room. I wish you had awarded the skunk cabbage to the doctor who didn't believe in easing the pain of childbirth.

If a doctor refuses to help a woman through those agonizing hours, she might as well have her baby at home and not have a hospital bill. I can't understand how a physician who is supposed to be dedicated to relieving suffering can adhere to the outmoded tradition of "letting nature take its course."

In my opinion, the present-day practice of allowing fathers to accompany their wives into the delivery room is a good thing. The man who helped start her pregnancy should have a guts to help her finish it. - A. W. from Knightstown, Ind.

# Refusal Of Farmers To Grow Cucumbers May Be \$50,000 Loss

Rowan County farming revenue will drop by as much as \$50,000 this year following the loss of cucumber farming in the county.

A lack of interest and poor management seems to have caused Paramount Foods, Inc., to discontinue a shipping station for the county's cucumbers farmers.

William J. Burr, representative of Paramount, said the station loss was not disinterested on the company's part. He was interested in having a station in Rowan County, but we need the acreage to make it worthwhile," said Burr.

been dwindling over the past few years, according to county statistics.

Several years ago, there were more than 100 farmers. In 1978, there were about 30 growers, and last year 23 Rowan farmers grew cucumbers. Only 15 acres of cucumbers were raised.

Arthur Creech raised cucumbers once "ten or 12 years ago," and then renewed his interest last year. It was not a good experience, he says.

"I lost more than two tons of cucumbers last year," Creech said. "The station wasn't there to help to keep it open, they said, but they never told us the station was closing until the day it did close."

Burke also said the station closed without warning, leaving the growers with extra cucumbers.

"The station manager never explained why he was closing, he just said 'this is it,' and closed down," said Burke.

Chadwell said he had closed on instructions from Burr in Louisville.

"That is not correct," said Burr. "It was the decision of the station manager to close the station."

Ramsey said he had written Burr concerning the closing of the station and the lack of interest for growing cucumbers, but had received no response.

"I have no plans of doing anything more on the cucumbers for next year unless I'm contacted by Paramount Foods, Inc.," said Ramsey.

Burr said this season is nearly over, but he'd like to discuss getting cucumbers back in Rowan County for next year.

"I'd be more than willing to talk with the county extension agent," said Burr. "But we need the acreage and the community interest."

## Kentucky Wins Corn Competition

The Commonwealth of Kentucky, long noted for its champion horses, can now also boast that it is a champion corn-growing state.

It has won the National Corn Derby at the Farmers Fair of Riverside County in Hemet, Calif. Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. will receive a trophy topped with a golden ear of corn.

Kentucky's stalk grew to 13 feet 11 inches, beating out the all time champion of Wyoming by an inch. Wyoming has held the honor since 1971, when the derby was started.

Boone County white is the name of the type of corn sent by Thomas O. Harris, executive director of the Kentucky Council on Agriculture. This corn is grown in the eastern part of the state and usually attains a height of 10 to 12 feet, according to the report sent by Harris.

Second place in the 1981 contest was New Mexico's "White Wonder" corn.

Each of the 39 participating states sent five seeds which were planted June 1. After the seeds had sprouted only the two tallest were left standing and the tallest of these were the ones that was measured. The corn patch on the fairgrounds received a daily deep watering.

# Burley Aide Designs Factory In West Africa

The "flag" of U.S.-grown burley tobacco was recently planted on Communist soil in the developing young nation of Guinea on the west coast of Africa.

By invitation of Guinea's President Sekou Toure, R.C. (Dick) Travis, representing the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, spent two weeks in that country this past July, as technician and official advisor on the subject of tobacco processing and cigarette manufacturing.

Travis, an experienced manufacturer and blender, spent the time designing a new cigarette factory to replace a large but antiquated plant. By request Travis designed two plants, one calling for renovation and replacement with used machinery, and the other for new electronic equipment to modernize methods and output.

The authorities favored the new plant, costing between \$2 and \$3 million. The Guinea government proposes to build this with funds supplied by the World Bank, as part of an industry development program.

Reporting on this trip, Travis told the Burley Association directors meeting August 12 at Lexington, that the Guinea government earlier had used the Soviets as industry advisors, and also the Chinese, but found both groups unsatisfactory and expelled them from the country.

Everything in Guinea belongs to the government, said Travis. "There is no private ownership of land or anything else. The main street in Conakry, the capital and largest city, is named Fidel Castro Boulevard. The finest building is

a new structure called the Cultural Center, left by the Soviets."

In a related report, Travis disclosed that some American tobacco, including burley, has been getting through to Russia via Finland, involving shipments of American-type blended cigarettes.

News of the shipment of American type cigarettes into Russia by exporters in Finland was termed "significant" by Travis.

He cited a recent Foreign Agricultural Service report of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which noted that Finnish tobacco laws were stiffened three years ago. No advertising is permitted, except in trade magazines.

In spite of the restrictions cigarette use went up in 1980.

In the fall of 1980, Finland signed an export agreement with the U.S.R., calling for Finland to produce and export to Russia 2.5 billion pieces of American type cigarettes, a \$23 billion deal. Finland factories make the cigarettes under license with the American manufacturers, using top American brands.

The U.S. share of Finland's imports of unmanufactured tobacco amounted to 4,205 tons last year, down 15 percent from the previous year.

The drop was attributed to the higher price of U.S. tobacco, and also increased purchases of raw tobacco from Brazil and Rhodesia.

Tobacco produced in Brazil and Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) is said to be improving in quality, and at lower prices tends to lessen dependence on U.S. tobacco.

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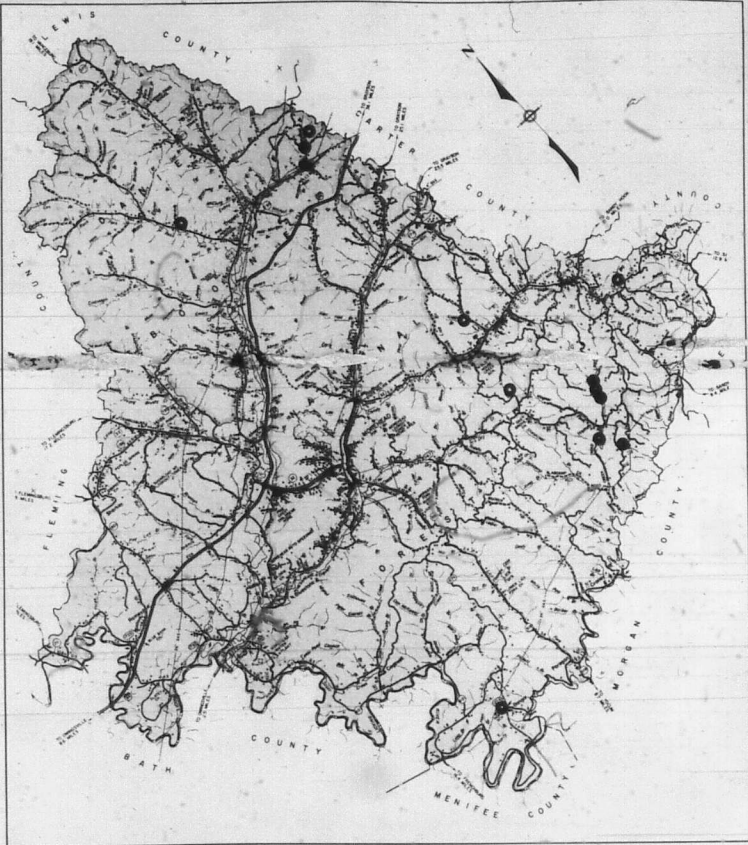
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Dots on this map of the county show the approximate location of farms that have reported finding blue mold on tobacco plants.

### Blue Mold In 12 Local Fields

Rowan County now has twelve cases of blue mold. Since the last edition of *The Morehead News*, five cases have been reported, all having "massive" sporulation according to Extension Agent Tim Ramsey.

Farmers most recently reporting crops with the tobacco fungus are Brooks Karrick, Rock Fork; Jean Johnson, Craney; Chester Hamilton, Craney; John Glover, Campbell Branch and Willis Glover, Campbell Branch.

Ramsey said lesions have spread from the lower part of the stalks

into the top leaves, in cases of shaded fields or low areas. Growers should be aware that fields having blue mold should wilt their cut tobacco for at least three days. "Housed tobacco that has not been wilted completely will rot in the barn," said Ramsey.

He added that not all fields have blue mold, and control practices vary from field to field. "Very few fields will be recommended for complete cutting," said Ramsey. "At this time, only spot cutting is necessary."

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# Governor Honors Jesse Stuart With Distinguished Service Medal

W-HOLLOW — Greenup County's noted author received a rare honor Thursday, Aug. 20, in his W-Hollow home.

Kentucky Governor John Y. Brown and his wife Phyllis joined with dignitaries from across the Commonwealth to announce the upcoming publication of a new Jesse Stuart collection of poems and short stories, and to present Stuart with the highest honor possible for a citizen of Kentucky.

The ceremony was short and informal, held in Stuart's bedroom. The noted author has spent much of the past three years in the bedroom, suffering the after-effects of a severe stroke.

The announcement of the new Stuart publication was made first by Joe L. Hamilton of the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels. He said his organization was donating \$5,000 to the Jesse Stuart Foundation to be used to publish, print and distribute 5,000 copies of a new book for Kentucky eighth graders. The

book, entitled "Land of the Honey Colored Wind," will be a collection of the best of Stuart's short stories and poems for adolescents.

The gift from the Kentucky Colonels will be matched by \$5,000 from an anonymous donor, bringing the total of the fund to \$10,000, Hamilton said.

Dr. Morris L. Norfleet, president of Morehead State University and chairman of the Jesse Stuart Foundation, was present to accept the check on behalf of the Foundation.

Stuart was surprised by the announcement but was left speechless when Gov. Brown presented him with the highest honor bestowed on citizens of the Commonwealth — the Governor's Medal For Distinguished Service. The honor was the 34th such medal to be given in the past 25 years.

"It is my privilege on behalf of the citizens of the Commonwealth to present to you this honor," Brown said. "We treasure you as one of Kentucky's greatest citizens. We treasure this medal as much as you do Kentucky throughout your career."

Brown also compared Stuart with Abraham Lincoln, repeating a quote about the former president and saying it also applied to Stuart. "He was a man, take him for his all and all, because we shall not look upon such a man again."

Stuart was overwhelmed with the honor and at first was unable to respond. Later he did ask, with a gleam in his eye, "What would Lincoln Memorial think" if Stuart was a student at the Tennessee College in the early days of his career.

"I've never seen Jesse Stuart at such a lost for words," commented Mickey

McGuire, a Grayson attorney, accompanying the governor.

The governor and his wife arrived by helicopter, which set down several hundred yards from Stuart's home. They rode the remaining distance in a Kentucky State Police cruiser and were met in the yard by local dignitaries and friends. Stuart's wife, Naomi Deane, met the Browns at the door and led them into the bedroom where the ceremony was held.

Following the ceremony, Mrs. Stuart conducted the governor and his wife on a tour of the house, with the Browns noting the number of local and area

crafts and antiques which furnish the Stuart home.

The Browns also toured the shed-like structure behind the house where many of Stuart's works were written. Both the governor and his wife also took turns dipping water from an open well outside the Stuart home.

They visited at the Stuart home for more than an hour and expressed an interest in returning to W-Hollow, possibly in the fall.

The governor and his wife returned to their helicopter, heading for Ashland where Brown broke ground for the new 13th Street Bridge.

## Local Roads Now In Plan

The state Department of Transportation has added two miles of KY 801, Paragon-Farmers Road, and one mile of KY 799, Rock Fork Road, to this year's resurfacing program for Rowan County.

The road is part of \$8.4 million in projects for the year.

The new projects raise the state's total resurfacing program in 1981 to \$40 million. More than 1,000 miles of Kentucky's roads are receiving a new surface.

Last year the department resurfaced 384 miles of state roads at a cost of \$21.3 million.

The additional resurfacing projects are the result of economy measures instituted by Transportation Secretary Frank Meets.

"As savings are realized from the economy measures we have implemented, we are converting those dollars to roads," Meets said. Bids for the resurfacing projects will be accepted on Aug. 25 and Sept. 4.

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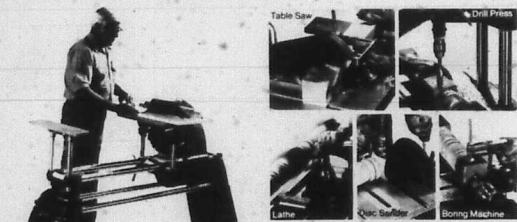
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# Breck Athletes Should Stay Put This Year

Whether you're a fan of Rowan County Vikings or the University Breckridge Eagles, you may not be able to, as the saying goes, tell the players without a scorecard this year.

A side-effect has come out of the absorption of Breck by the Rowan County system that negates, apparently for this year only, rules designed to prevent team-jumping by high school athletes.

While encouraging all students to stay where they were last year, the Rowan County Board of Education Saturday instituted an "open enrollment" policy. That means that any student in Rowan County has the choice of going either to UBS or the appropriate school in the county system. The only exception is that Superintendent John Brock was given the power to limit or adjust class enrollments as he deems proper and necessary to avoid overcrowding and other specific problems.

The board feels this is the best policy for all students. For one thing, some 50 students at Breck last year had enrolled at Rowan County the year before the absorption was announced last week. Putting in a freeze rule, freezing all

where they were last year, would stop those who did not want to go to Rowan County. Brock said that might present legal problems for the system.

All of this may well be the best thing for the overall system. But it is not the best thing for the sports programs at the two schools.

The board has decided to keep Breck as it was before the absorption. But, because of a number of ropes that have almost everyone's hands tied, some of the sports teams will be nothing like they were before the changes. There will be wholesale club-jumping, and there is very little anyone can do about it.

The board's hands are tied because it must look at the overall picture and do what is best for the most students. Having decided that open enrollment is best, the board cannot add "except athletes." The board cannot legally treat athletes any differently than it does other students.

Kentucky High School Athletic Association Commissioner Tom Mills also finds his hands tied. It is his organization that set up eligibility rules which Brock referred to Saturday as "stringent." I agree they are stringent, and I think Brock will agree they should be stringent. The rules were made primarily to discourage team-jumping.

In this case, however, the KHSAA's hands are tied because of a precedent set when the Jefferson County school system was re-districted. Technically speaking, the Rowan County school board has re-districted in this case. Mills, having allowed eligibility in that case, can do nothing else this time around without risking legal action.

There is one group involved whose hands are free - the athletes. There probably will be little problem with football and soccer players, since neither sport has a team in both schools. But basketball and baseball - therein lies the problem.

Discussion Saturday morning centered on the fact that many Breck athletes wanted to transfer because they could not be sure there would be teams at Breck this year. Realistically, they still cannot be sure, but through no fault of the board, which said Saturday that all sports offered last year in both schools will be offered again this year. But there's a catch: not enough players out means no team. That is, if only four players come out for basketball, there will be no Eagles roundball team this year.

If that sounds unrealistic, don't you believe it. If the heart of Breck's hoop team transfers to Rowan County, there may not be enough interested boys left in a school with the small enrollment of Breck. And even though the Eagles have been guaranteed a team to play on, that, contrary to Saturday's statements, will not be enough to hold last year's Eagles at Breck. Why? The wreath.

This reporter is personally aware of more than one Breck Eagle of last year who wants to go to Rowan County because "they can go to state this year."

# Post 126 Ends Best Campaign

The most successful regular season in the history of American Legion baseball in Morehead ended Thursday night as Post 126 defeated its alumni team 10-2.

The victory, Morehead's fifth straight, was its 61st of the season - a club record - in its 81st game - also a club record - since 1963. Post 126 lost just 19 games and had one game end in a tie.

The 1981 club defeated the team of alumni, with players dating all the way back to the club's inaugural season of 1968, 10-3 in the season-closing series.

Sluggier Joe Dawson collected three singles in four official trips, raising his batting average to .495. That represents an 11-point cushion over the team record set nine years ago by Billy Fouch. To take that record, Dawson needs to keep his average above Fouch's for as long as Morehead lasts in post-season action, starting with tomorrow's Great Lakes Regional here.

Dawson has already obliterated six offensive single-season club records besides average.

With teammate Shawn Johnson surpassing the club record for stolen bases in a season, Morehead players have established new highs in every single-season offensive category kept except triples. Both Johnson and Dawson stand two off that mark of five.

Career records will not be totaled up until after the season is completed, but it seems a safe bet that several career marks have already been wiped out as well.

Five different pitchers tuned up for the second straight game Thursday. Sam Holbrook, Bobby Hamilton, Todd Pratt and Kirk Mattox took two innings each, while Ted Carter finished up. All but Carter struck out one each. Pratt and Mattox each walked one. Carter took two. Holbrook gave up two singles and Hamilton one, and the alumni could not must a base hit after the third inning.

"The last two ball games we got to work the entire pitching staff," coach Don Hardin said. "That was the intention. We got to work four pitchers two innings each in each game, and got to work Ted Carter. Hardin's short relief ace in either, both games and keep him sharp."

Not only pitchers benefited, Hardin added. "We played everybody in both games."

The alumni got off to a good start when Skip Holley, who wound up leading the club in average at .419, singles with 12, hits with 13, runs with nine and walks with six, led off with a base hit.

After Hamilton had thrown two scoreless innings, Morehead took the lead in the bottom of the fourth with a two-run rally. Dawson started it with a walk, and Joe Magrane followed by reaching on Holley's error at short. Tim Johnson's double drove both home for a 2-1 Morehead lead.

That rally represented a turnaround for alumni: started Dale Horner. Pitching for the first time in the series, Horner retired all but two Post 126 batters in his first trip through the order, getting three on strikeouts while allowing only a walk and a single.

But Post 126 continued to solve Horner in the fifth, scoring twice more. Horner walked Dean Hardin and Mike Ishmael for openers. An infield out put two in scoring position and Dawson drove them home with a single.

Pratt gave up the second alumni run, an unearned tally, without surrendering a hit in the sixth. Holley regained leading off on an error at second, moved ahead on a walk to Joey May, hooked up with May on a double steal, and scored on

Fouch's sacrifice fly.

But Post 126 welcomed Fouch to the mound with a three-spot in the bottom of the inning to put the win away. Jeff Patrick began the rally with a one-out double, with Troy Witt's single. Gary Allen's groundout. Ty Fannin's single, a walk to Shawn Johnson and Dawson's two-run single accounting for the Fouch's sacrifice fly.

Carter never got the final out. The game was called when a circuit breaker, killing the lights.

Individual leaders for the alumni include Holley, who besides his team-topping numbers in average, hits, singles, runs and walks, may have been toughest to fan. Of the seven players who had more than 20 official at bats in the series, Holley struck out least often, just four times.

Jim Morrison was the only alumni to play in all 13 games. He also collected the most at bats, 40. Donnie Harper topped the club in doubles with three and runs batted in with eight, while Danny Kiser swatted the only home run of the set for the alumni. May had a third of the club's only steal.

Tony McKinny was the workhorse of the pitching staff in terms of appearances with five, three of them in relief. But May led the staff in starts and complete games with three each, including two 12, strikeouts with 11 and earned run average at 3.86.

As a club, the alumni batted .254, while the pitchers turned in a club ERA of 8.24.

The Vikings then had the ball for their longest possession of the first half, 6:40. Two drive didn't result in a score even though it covered 54 yards and two first downs. A 15 yard holding penalty hampered the Vikings and the drive ended on the 12 yard line.

After limiting the Cougars to just three downs and a punt, Brock signaled for a fair catch, which he should have returned, on the Vikings 45 yard line. Two plays later, Morgan County had the ball as Byron botched a handoff and dropped the ball.

The Vikings received the benefit of a fumble two plays later and started another touchdown drive on their own 49 yard line. After Brock and Adkins gained legitimate first downs rushing, the Cougars were caught holding which gave Rowan County a first down on Morgan's 12 yard line.

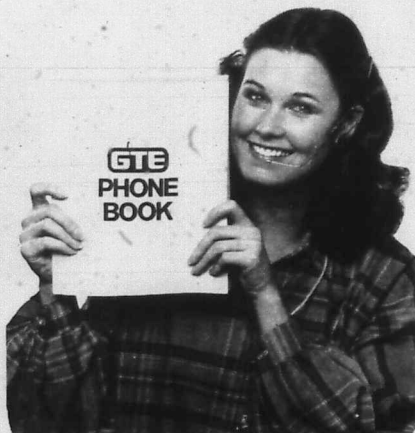
Brock scored two plays later from 10 yards out. Graham waited until his team had a safe 20 point lead, 27-7, before inserting the second unit.

There is the bottom line no one was willing to say out loud Saturday morning. Breck has no realistic shot at any major title in basketball, although most of the team, in ordinary circumstances, would be back and would figure to improve on its record of 7-24.

Suppose those athletes who will be bumped — they probably know who they are — recognize the inevitable and transfer to Breck. Then, yes, UBS will have a team — in effect, a junior varsity club subservient to the Vikings.

As I said, almost everyone's hands are tied. The school board can't make special statements for athletes; the KHSAA, whose regulations are designed to prevent this very thing, virtually must waive those regulations this time. But the athletes have free hands. The fair thing to do is for all players to stay where they were last year. I suspect most have already made up their minds, and there isn't a lot anyone else can do about it. But the athletes, like all students, have until tomorrow to decide.

Those who want to play for a winner will go to Rowan County. Those who want to play, period, will go to Breck. And those who will want to be fair will stay where they are.

Not just the Eaglets sports program stands to be hurt. Its days are numbered anyway. What bothers me is those who will be hurt worst, those Vikings who will be bumped, either from the starting lineup or from the roster entirely, by the transfer of a few "super-athletes," as they were called Saturday morning.

All I can do is sympathize. All the super-athletes have to do is stay put.

### Nuclear Issues Committee Sets Aug. 28 Session

The state Special Advisory Committee on Nuclear Issues will meet Friday, Aug. 28, at 10 a.m. in Room 105 of the Capital Annex in Frankfort.

The panel will consider a draft of the report, "Alternatives for Managing Kentucky - Generated Nuclear Waste." In addition, representatives of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection will present an analysis of the Maxey Flats Nuclear Waste Disposal Site budget and decommissioning efforts.

Legislative members of the panel include Rep. Pete Worthington, D-Ewing, chairman, and Rep. George Plummer, R-Vanceburg. Allen Holbrook, chairman of a local citizens group, is also a member of the committee.

### Alternative To Rail Abandonment Is Proposed

There may still be some hope for rail lines abandoned by the railroad companies which operate them.

The subcommittee on air and rail transportation has approved a bill creating a Railroad Finance Authority. The authority would have the power to issue bonds to buy and renovate rail lines scheduled for abandonment by railroad companies. The authority could rent the lines to railroads and use the payment to retire the bonds.

Several short-haul lines in the central and western parts of the state have been threatened with abandonment and cuts in federal funds may further hinder attempt to revitalize those lines.

Terroristic threatening and resisting arrest charges have been filed against a Mason County man who held four hostages at his home for more than eight hours Friday.

Allen Laakso, 24, of Minerva, held his wife, two children and another man hostage most of Friday night.

The Mason County Sheriff's Department responded to a call to Laakso's residence about 10 p.m. Friday. Laakso came to the door of his mobile home, threatening officers with a rifle.

Six Kentucky State Police responded to the officer's call for assistance.

according to Trooper John Lambert of the Morehead KSP Post. By the time they arrived, Laakso had barricaded himself and his wife, Kathy, his 3-year-old son Steve, his 2-year-old daughter Katrina, and a friend of the family, 18-year-old Joey Watson, into the home.

A local minister and Laakso's parents, who called from Michigan, were unsuccessful after nearly three hours of attempting to get him to surrender.

A Special Response Team from Ashland fired tear gas into the dwelling and Laakso surrendered at 6:30 a.m. There were no injuries.

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# A Return To Rondeau

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — The dog days of mid-summer in eastern Kentucky bring an exodus of bass fishermen from this end of the state who go in search of good fishing farther to the north. Traditionally, thousands of area angling families have crossed the U.S. border into southern Canada where they have discovered excellent fishing for bass and pike. For many years, the favorite spot for most was a tiny fishing village by the name of Eriau. Recently, author Soc Clay returned to Rondeau after a six-year absence. While there, he sampled a brand new fishery just starting to develop and visited the hottest bass fishing spot to be found currently within a 500-mile radius of our area. A series of three columns will deal with Clay's trip across our northern

loading kids and fishing equipment into vehicles and driving the some 350-odd miles to the little village that clings to a fragile spit of sand jutting into Lake Erie and holding back a part of 5,500-acre Rondeau Bay.

Old time anglers like the late Ken Ratliff, Booty Kotcamp and a host of other who have gone on, were the first Kentuckians to find the blue roof cabins of Burke's. That was back in the early 50's and fishing for northern pike was fast and furious in the protected waters of Rondeau. But problems were brewing for the pike fishermen in the form of watermilfoil — an aquatic weed that was invading the bay, causing anglers difficulty in running an outboard and finding the hangouts of the northern pike.

The weed problem continued to develop. Anglers were more than pleasantly surprised when they learned that pike were being replaced with whopping size largemouth bass, and a bunch of them to boot.

Because it was the only fishing camp in the village back then, anglers automatically stopped at Burke's Cabins. Today, a number of fishing camps are located in the small village, but Ross and Tiny, his wife, are by far the most popular for Bluegrass anglers who still stop to visit the area.

One of the main reasons for the couple's popularity with folks from Eastern Kentucky is that annually they visit our region to renew old acquaintances. Twenty-five years ago this summer, they came south from Ontario to culminate their courtship by being married at the South Shore Church of God.

"Oh, my, you ain't heard nothin'!" Ross proclaimed of the gala event that attracted fishing friends galore. He still talks about Bob Johnson of South Shore who marched the couple into the church with a double-barrel shotgun.

But that was a long time ago and down through the years the happy shafts of successful bass fishermen would sound throughout the camp in the late hours of the night. The late Ken Ratliff, who would become known as "Muskie Twins," were famous for ringing the big bell at Burke's each fishing morning at 4:30 a.m. sharp.

Even the bell is a Kentucky original, having been shipped out of the old court-house at Greenup just before (or after) it burned. Ross discovered the bell in a dusty corner of Bryson's General Store on Schultz Creek, Greenup County's oldest general store, where it has lodged for many years.

Bass fishing at Rondeau continued to be excellent and many stories were written about the close-to-home area where a daily limit of six selected largemouth were common occurrences.

Stormy clouds started gathering over the bay a few years ago, however, as sailing and pleasure boating groups protested the weed growth more and more as interfering with their sport. The Ontario Department of Lands, Forest and Waters attempted to reach a compromise by killing off part of the weeds so that fishermen and boaters alike could enjoy the sport. After all, they reasoned, there were 5,500 acres of weeds and it wouldn't hurt to lose a few of them.

Joe Stewart, one of Canada's best bass anglers who lives near the bay fought the weed poison project to no avail. He feared the worst that the poison would wipe the bay clean of all aquatic growth. His worst fears came true and today a weed in Rondeau as a rare find.

As the weeds went, so did the bass fishermen from the hills of Kentucky. They were picking up anchor and heading for another weed-infected area a hundred miles to the east to a place known as Long Point. And once again, it was the exploring nature of the Ratliff's that found the new area. Soon, there were no more bass fishermen to be found at the Blue Roof cottages or Burke's nor anywhere else around the broad reaches of Rondeau Bay.

Such was what I discovered when my

son, Tom, and I pulled the little pickup into the well-kept grounds at Burke's Cabins. Earlier, Joe Stewart had phoned, inviting me to come back to Rondeau to look into the new fishery developments that are occurring there in the absence of the weeds and bass.

What we discovered is that northern pike are returning to the bay once again, but hardly anyone knows where they are concentrated in any numbers as yet. I also learned that some of Canada's finest crappie fishing is now found in the marshy backwaters of the bay.

From late April through the last of May, this past season saw fish in excess of three pounds being pulled from the shallow waters by anglers using live minnows and tiny jigs. "It was really something to experience," Joe said. "We hardly had time to breathe on many occasions when big crappies were hitting jigs just as soon as the lure struck the water."

For the hundreds of Kentucky anglers who remember locations in the bay, crappies are being found in spring behind the old Stone House Point in Grundy Bay. In fact, all the back pond areas seem to be well supplied with slab-size fish, Joe explained.

We discovered that the heat of summer almost empties the bay of all anglers nowadays. I talked with a visiting fisherman from Wisconsin who has been fishing Rondeau since 1938. He and his wife still find the kind of angling they're interested in — yellow perch.

Anchored 200 yards off the dock at Burke's, they managed to land about 75 small perch and a few crappie for their morning's effort.

One group of anglers staying at Burke's, who had driven up from Indiana, reminded me of the old Kentucky crowd. They stayed up all night playing poker and drinking scuds of Canadian beer, slept the next day until noon, then went out on the bay for an hour and coming back in with the woeeful story that "the damn place if fishless!"

Bassin' at Rondeau can still be found in limited areas and Joe is hopeful the weeds will make a comeback in the near future. Right now, though, it takes a while to find scattered clumps of new growth where most of the bass are taken. Shoreline fishing can provide some sport, as anglers have found that one bass prefer to stay near the many private docks along the Erieau side of the Bay.

Kentuckians still visit Eriau, but most of them are simply looking for an

old familiar place where they can spend a few days of rest and relaxation. Eriau has developed their public beach and O.J. and Molly Veddlar have opened an excellent restaurant and lounge where the old grocery store used to be. There's a million-dollar marina now located where the old coal dock was and three charter boats leave the pier daily in search of deep-water salmon, which have shown up in large numbers off the Erieau shore.

The salmon has brought a new kind of angler to the Rondeau Bay area and it wouldn't surprise me to see the East Kentucky fishin' gang stop by now and then to try their hand at this new and

exciting kind of fishing. It is late in the night and I have listened to the great tales of Hoss who is now 80, but looks the same as he did 20 years ago, until the rest of the camp activity has died and the lights have gone out in all the cabins. Tomorrow, it's an early start with young Bill Cudney who is one of the top-rated salmon charter captains operating out of Eriau.

I'm very tired and my son has been asleep for hours, but like days of old, Ross only slaps his balding forehead and proclaims over a small glass of brandy, "Soc, me boy, you ain't heard nothin'. You AIN'T heard nothin'!"

"Oh, my, you ain't heard nothin'! You AIN'T heard nothin'!" So goes the familiar cliché used daily by the grand patriarch of fish camp operators in Southern Ontario and known far and wide throughout Eastern Kentucky as Ross Burke, owner of Burke's Cabins in the tiny fishing village of Eriau, Ontario.

For the past 30 years, bass fishing families from our area have been



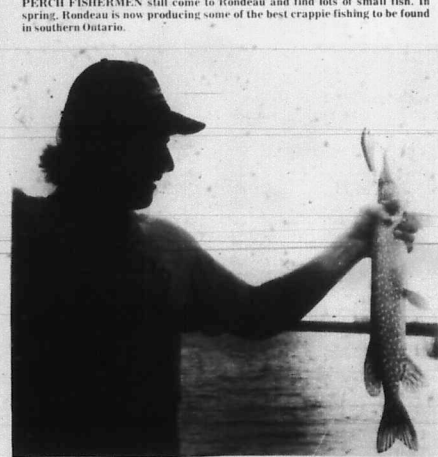

connected."  
Hewitt said the Sept. 9 loss of the runs, one eastbound and one westbound, was a decision based on "revenue."  
"That decision came from our scheduling office in Phoenix," said Hewitt.

But Hewitt said he had written a letter to the council expressing his concerns for the safety of his passengers because of the council's decision to make passengers walk the short distance to the bus station.  
Council member Marvin Moore said he felt the council had gone to great lengths to work with the bus line.  
"If I were those people, I'd be tickled to death with this council for the efforts we've made to accommodate them," said Moore. "We've set up the best possible situation under the circumstances."

The council accepted one of only two bids for resurfacing of city streets. The special meeting of the council had been called to examine bids received after the regular bidding period had been extended for one week. The extension had come at the Aug. 10 regular meeting of the council when only one bid was submitted.

Leets Blacktopping of Flemingsburg received contract approval from the council with a \$38.27 per-ton bid on asphalt, and a bid of \$2 per gallon of taci-

oil.

Letts said that \$1.02 would be deducted from the estimated cost-per-ton of asphalt if the city would furnish a certificate of tax deduction.

That certificate, which allows Letts to use the city's sales-tax exemption in purchasing the asphalt, was approved by the council members.  
The other bid was submitted by Arrasmith Blacktopping, Inc. of Mt. Sterling. The company requested 90 cents per gallon of taci-oil used, and \$46.90 per ton of asphalt.

The amount given to the board from the city's contingency fund remained unchanged, but only \$15,000 will be given by Sept. 30. The remaining money will be given to the ambulance service at the mayor's discretion, but sometime after Jan. 1, 1982.

In other business, the council approved replacement of 44 lights on the city's softball field.
