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## Morehead Could Be Getting New Bank

A new bank will be coming to Morehead, if things go as investors are planning.

The proposed bank, to be called The Morehead State Bank, would be located in the old Lane Funeral Home building at 140 East Main Street.

The property was purchased Thursday from the co-executors of the Sidney E. Lane estate for \$135,000 by a group of Morehead physicians and businessmen and Mt. Sterling banker Billy Joe Hall.

In addition to Hall, the nine purchasers include: Crayton Jackson, Denver Kinder, Ival Bryant, Dr. Shelby Bennett, Dr. Thomas Fissett, Dr. Charles Franks, Dr. Warren Proudfoot and Dr. Patrick Seery.

The deal was handled by C. Roger Lewis Agency in cooperation with

William Realy for the co-executors of the Lane estate, W.C. Lane Jr. and Ezelle Lane, Morehead; Frank H. McCartney, Flemingsburg; and Drew E. Lane, Morehead.

Hall, president of the Mount Sterling National Bank, said in telephone interview Friday that he had been working with local stockholders of the proposed new bank and that a charter application was "practically ready to be filed" with the State Department of Banking and Securities and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

He added that he expects the charter application to be filed this month. "There has been a strong interest from many citizens for another opportunity of banking," Hall said.

Hall said that stock is being sold for \$20 per share and that there are 80 stockholders thus far.

He added that, once the charter application is made, there would be a

logical legal" procedure to follow, including public hearings on the proposed bank.

Hall did not project a date of when the bank would be in operation, providing its charter is approved, nor did he list who its principle officers would be. Asked if the staff, which Hall referred to as "top flight," would be made up of local or out-of-town people, he said, "Some of both."

Although the proposed bank will be Morehead's newest financial institution — joining Peoples Bank, Citizens Bank and First Federal Savings and Loan — it will be located in the city's oldest brick structure and a Main Street landmark.

"We hope to restore the building to its original looks as nearly as possible," said Hall.

He added that Winebrenner and Associates, Louisville bank designers, had already looked at the building and

were excited about working with its restoration.

Built in 1904 by the late Bill Young, a Morehead attorney, the interior is of the Victorian period with elaborate woodwork and lighting fixtures.

After Young's death in 1948 in an auto-train collision, the home was auctioned off by his widow and purchased by Drew Evans.

In 1956, William C. Lane Jr. purchased the Evans residence and converted it into a funeral home. Lane Funeral Home occupied the building for the next 21 years until W.C. Lane Jr. built a new funeral home on Old Flemingsburg Road in October 1977, now Lane-Stucky Back Funeral Home.

The building was next used for Ezelle's Flowers from December 1977 to December 1979.

It has been vacant since the flower shop moved to Morehead Plaza.

## C.B. Cornett, 60, Former Mayor, Dies

One of Morehead's most prominent businessmen and a former mayor of the city died yesterday morning in the emergency room of St. Claire Medical Center after suffering an apparent heart attack.

C.B. Cornett, 60, known affectionately as "Burrhead," had been manager of Martin's Department Store in Morehead, and owned another Martin's store in West Liberty and Mocabee's Department Store in Greemp. For the last two years, he had concentrated his business efforts at the West Liberty store. He was also a major stockholder at similar department stores in Nicholasville, Salyersville, Virco, Jackson and Vanceburg.

He was mayor of Morehead from 1974 to 1978.

Cornett, who came to the forefront of almost every club or organization he joined, was president of the Morehead State University Alumni Association in 1962, was a charter member and the first president of the Open Forum Club, was a former commander of Morehead American Legion Post 126, was a for-

mer member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Optimist Club, the Kiwanis Club, was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Disabled American Veterans and was a Kentucky Colonel.

Cornett and his wife, Irene, opened Martin's Department Store in Morehead in 1961, shortly after his graduation from MSU. A native of Carrie in Knott County, Ky., he attended Hindman High School. He also attended Caney Junior College (now Alice Lloyd) and the old Bowling Green Business College. He also graduated from the International Shoe School at Athens, Ohio.

Cornett, who first came to Morehead in 1940, volunteered and served four years in the United States Marine Corps during World War II. He was decorated with the Purple Heart for wounds he received.

Although the mayor's seat was the first and only political office he sought, Cornett did serve as judge pro-tem

## Democratic Rally Has Large Crowd

Rowan County Democrats got their fall campaign off to a big start Friday night as more than 350 people turned out for a fish fry, some music and speeches at the Carl Perkins Community Center in Morehead.

The guest speaker for the evening was William Kenton, speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives and a possible candidate for governor in 1984.

Kenton, a native of Maysville who now practices law in Lexington, emphasized unity and hard work by Democrats to win heavily in the November general election. He urged fellow party members to "muster our forces for the greatest victory Kentucky has ever known."

Kenton was elected November because Democrats "got a little lax."

"Picking up on that theme, Kenton said, 'It is time for us (the Democrats) to win elections like we used to win elections.'"

He called upon the local party loyalists to regroup and start living again in the real world.

Kenton also said that "good politics is good government and don't be bashful about it."

He concluded by saying, "The future of tomorrow is now; the promise of tomorrow is you."

In a brief interview after his speech, Kenton predicted that the Democratic leadership will propose no new taxes in the 1982 session of the General Assembly. He also said he believes that House Bill 44, which limits property tax increases to four percent, would be left as it is, except for possible changes in the timing of it.

Kenton said he expects 1982 to be a recession and that the economic woes for state government may continue to become more apparent once the full impact of President Reagan's budget policies are known.

Kenton, who will be seeking an unprecedented fourth term as house speaker, said that he did not blame Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. for the state budget problems. "He has no control over it," Kenton said. The speaker noted the coal strike and the fact that Americans are living in a period of "Reagan economics."

Kenton did criticize Gov. Brown for not calling a special session of the General Assembly to make decisions on the state budget cuts.

He said that initial indications to him by Brown were that the governor would call a special session. Kenton also said he felt Brown's remarks that the legislature was a "circus setting" were disrespectful and out of line.

Kenton said that it would seem that, since Brown was responsible for a budget of three-quarters of a billion dollars, he would have wanted the

in put of all the best minds available. The house speaker did say, however, that he "appreciated the frustration of the situation" Brown faced. And he admitted that the General Assembly had delegated very broad powers to the governor. In a matter of local interest, Kenton said that he has filed a letter of the state

Board of Ethics excusing himself from consideration of any matters having to do with the oil shale issue in Kentucky. Kenton's law partner, Eugene F. Mooney, former secretary of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, has been hired by Pyramid Minerals of Olive Hill as a special consultant. Pyramid Minerals has been critical of many provisions of the state's proposed oil shale regulations, and

Mooney was among the speakers at a public hearing on the matter in Morehead last week. Kenton, along with Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins, has been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor in 1984. Although he said he was interested in the job Friday evening, Kenton said his first priority is his seat in the house. He did say he felt Collins would run for governor, even if the succession amendment, which would permit Gov.

Brown to seek another term, passes. Kenton inquired about local feelings toward the amendment, which will be on the ballot in November, indicating that it might be a critical factor in whether or not he decides to make a bid for governor.

In addition to Kenton and Rowe, Bill Alverson, executive director of state Democratic Headquarters, spoke to the gathering. Alverson said Democratic Chairman Tracy Farmer was unable to

be at the rally because of a previous commitment.

Alverson told the group that many new things were being implemented in the state party structure.

Among those new things are a new party registration system that uses computerized lists and are made available to county organizations. Alverson told the audience that out of every 10 persons who are registered by a Democrat, eight go to the polls and

vote Democratic.

Although most of the local candidates were present at the rally, none of them spoke formally. County Democratic Chairman Ottist Elam served as the moderator.

Entertainment for the evening was provided by Rhonda Hodges and the "Nuthin' Fancy" band with some impromptu fiddle playing by Jim Day. The chef for the fish fry was District Judge Jimmy Clay.

## KU Rate Hike Is Approved

Rowan County Kentucky Utilities' customers face bigger electrical bills following the Kentucky Public Service

Commission's decision to grant the utility a \$29.37 million-a-year rate hike. The increase, announced Friday and effective Sunday, will raise the average household's electrical bill from \$29.37 to \$31.81, said a spokesman for the PSC. That is based on an electrical consumption of 616 kilowatt-hours monthly.

The increase announced includes a \$13 million interim rate hike approved last May.

The increase is short of the \$39 million increase the utility had requested from PSC in March. But the approved increase still gives the utility an increase of 16 percent return on its equity, only one percent less than requested.

According to a story in the Saturday Lexington Herald and Leader, KU spokesman Ed Van Hook said a home using the same amount of electricity in 1970 paid \$18.64 monthly. In 1975, that same home paid \$20.35, he said.

A spokesman for the utility had estimated in March that the rate of increase would be greater for an all-electrical home. Bills for such residences would jump by about \$6.09 a

month if KU received a \$29.3 million rate increase. That estimate of increase is \$500,000 less than the utility received.

KU is the state's largest utility, servicing about 332,000 customers in 78 counties.

## Munson Receives Doctoral Degree

Thomas Munson, associate professor of sociology at Morehead State University, has received his doctoral degree in sociology from the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Munson, a native of Ottawa, Ill., holds bachelor's and master's degrees in sociology from Ohio State University and has been a member of the MSU faculty since 1975. His dissertation at UK was entitled "An Exploratory Study of Social-Structural Characteristics of Publicly-Reported Community-Related Events: Toward a Theory of Community Activity."

He is the son of Dr. Byron E. Munson of Charleston, Ill., and is married to the former Donna Malone of Morehead. They have one son.

## Free Health Course Offered

A free course in health risk reduction is being offered to the public by the Gateway District Health Department.

An introductory meeting is set for Monday, Sept. 21 at 6:30 p.m. in the Rowan County High School.

Class meeting dates will be planned then, possibly in a two, three-hour session format.

Course topics will include heart attack and stroke; the causes, description and risk factors; nutrition and aerobic exercise; stress and coping; smoking and accidents.

Woodrow Barber filed for mayor of the City of Lakeview Heights.

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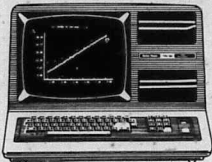


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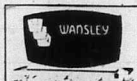
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# Property Assessment Up, But Less Than Last Year

The Kentucky Department of Revenue certified the total assessment value of taxable holdings for Rowan County at \$212,520,160, over \$10 million higher than the 1980 rate.

The increase was not as high as the one that occurred between 1979-80. In 1980, the total rate was \$202,515,319, and in 1979, \$166,907,000.

In a breakdown of assessment figures, the highest increase this year was in the intangible category, which included paper documents, subject to 1.5 cent state rate. The 1981 figure is \$1,023,527, as compared with \$822,000 in 1980.

Property Valuation Administrator Bill Porter said this "is not a great increase" when out of state accounts are considered.

Bank shares dropped this year from \$3,349,490 to \$3,341,620. The

only rate figured by the state, it is also the only rate that dropped, and Porter said he "can't understand it."

Other assessment comparisons between the two years show differences no greater than \$2 million.

The 1981 assessments are:  
Residential, \$86,473,247; farm, \$29,460,203; commercial, \$33,597,634.  
Land lease (subject to 1.3 cent state rate only), \$41,873,924;  
Tangible (1.5 cent state rate), \$5,805,223; intangible (1.5 cent state rate), \$9,578,816; and unmanufactured agriculture products (1.5 cent state rate), \$27,433.

The closest the 1981 assessment came to a total value for Rowan County property is by adding the 1981 taxable rate with \$10,622,440 in homestead exemptions. This gives a total of \$223,142,600.

However, that figure is not a true picture of the county's value, as it does not include franchises, public services or public utilities, or the theoretical value of farmland's highest potential, Porter said.

### Tax Rates Set

All taxing districts have set rates for the year, but only the health and school boards do not have certified rates recorded in the county clerk's office.

The rates must be approved in Frankfort before certification is passed to the county for its records.

The Health Board was the last district to set its rates, doing so last week. Nickell estimated Rowan Countyians would receive tax bills as early as the first week in October.

This year, tax bills will be in a new form. Real estate and tangible property taxes will be charged on

separate bills. This system will particularly aid in the collection of the auto tax, Nickell said.

He explained that percentage wise, tax collection is not high among persons holding no tangible property, such as cars and boats, but no real estate.

Commonly, college students would register a vehicle in Rowan County, then leave before paying taxes on it.

The new system is expected to result in better records and, thus, better control.

Nickell said his office will attempt to mail the separate bills in the same envelope, to reduce postage costs.

Tax rates for Rowan County are:  
School Board, 16.5 cents per \$100 assessed property value, expected to be \$370,487.72; Health Board, 3.5 cents, \$78,588 in revenues; Fiscal Court, 7.5 cents for \$168,404; City Council, 22.5 cents, \$179,429; and Library, 3.5 cents, \$78,588.

# C.B. Cornett

under County Judge W.C. Planter.

In 1967, Cornett led a group of local men in organizing the American Legion Post 126 baseball team, one of the state's most successful organizations. He had continued to have a strong interest in the team, and his family is requesting that, in lieu of flowers, donations be sent to the Post 126 baseball team.

Dave Abner, a past commander of Post 126, said of Cornett, "He was a heck of a worker in the community. He worked for the American Legion, local recreation, and anything else that was for the good of the community. He surely will be sorely missed. He was one heck of a great fellow."

Don Hardin, coach of the baseball team, said, "He was somebody very dear to me. I worked for him and with him for six years, and with everything else, he did for me."

As mayor, Cornett's leadership was responsible for many wide-ranging city improvements. Marvin Moore, who served two terms on city council under Cornett, said, "Under his leadership, Morehead had gone from a very standard city to a city that was very progressive. All of the many, many city projects — the sewer, city park, the bridge at city park, funding for the Carl Perkins Building — he was very instrumental in all these things and many, many other things. Without his great leadership, many of these never would have gotten underway and be finished."

Cornett, who was a close personal friend of U.S. Rep. Carl D. Perkins, was chiefly responsible for obtaining federal funding for the community center that bears the congressman's name. Cornett's work on getting a bridge built over Triplett Creek to city park resulted in having the street named for him. He also worked hard for funding on the new fire station on KY 32.

More also said that Cornett's death touched him personally. "It was a terrible loss. He was kind of like a father to me. It's a personal loss to me, and a deep loss."

Dr. John R. Duncan, professor of education at MSU and a member of city council under Cornett, said, "He served the city of Morehead well and did an excellent job. He was an outstanding Moreheadian."

Duncan said that he was a neighbor of Cornett for 10 years, and although he disagreed from time to time, he could do so without being disagreeable.

Mayor Crayton Jackson, who succeeded Cornett, called his death "a great loss to the community." He added that Cornett "served the city well when he was mayor and had given me a lot of support in the early days when I took

over."

Corene Castle, former city clerk under Cornett, said he "did a good job, and seemed to have the interest of Morehead behind his thinking."

R. J. Caudill, executive vice president of Kentucky Publishing Co., said of the death, "I feel Morehead and Rowan County has lost one of the strongest fighters for this area that it will ever have."

"Much of what Morehead has now in the way of a city park, up-to-date sewer and water system, can be directly credited solely to Burnhead. There is no doubt that the people of Morehead and Rowan County have lost one of their strongest supporters."

Paul Blair, city attorney under Cornett, said, "C.B. Cornett's term as mayor was characterized by integrity, concern for all the people of Morehead and accomplishments. His administrative skills were the city's and completed years of planning for a sewer line and a street improvement plan. He was personally and solely responsible for convincing state government to construct a bridge across Triplett Creek to serve the city park and the part of the city south of Triplett Creek. The people of Rowan County will long benefit from his unselfish public service."

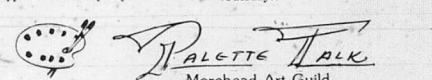
When he was sworn in on Jan. 2, 1974, Cornett was the first Democratic mayor in 20 years. In his political announcement the year before he took office in *The Morehead News*, Cornett said, "Starting next year, the mayor's office will not be a place to retire in, but a working office — working every day for the people of our city." Cornett also promised to donate his salary as mayor to the city of Morehead.

An avid hunter and fisherman, Cornett had been squirrel hunting the evening before his death. He was voted "All-State" on his high school basketball team.

Born Dec. 18, 1920, to the late Dan C. and Rhoda Martin Cornett, he is survived by his wife, Irene Bowen Cornett; two sons, Dan and C.W. Cornett, of Morehead; two daughters, Margie and Jeanne, of Morehead; one brother, Buddy Wilson Cornett, Greenup; one sister, Sallie Sue Arnett, of West Liberty; and two grandchildren.

Services will be Thursday at 11 a.m. in the Northcutt and Son Home for Funerals Chapel with the Rev. Archie Everage, of Hindman, officiating. Burial will be in Brown Cemetery with full military rites conducted at graveside by the American Legion. Members of Post 126 will serve as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers will be members of his administrative staff during his term as mayor.

Notes for the family for Funerals is in charge of arrangements, and friends may call there after 7 tonight (Tuesday).

**Court Hires Carpenters**

Rowan Fiscal Court met briefly Friday morning and set in motion plans to renovate an unused portion of space on the second floor of the courthouse for rental.

The court voted unanimously to hire Ival Ison and Don Phillips as carpenters at \$10 per hour each to start converting the space for a reception area and two offices to be leased to the State Department of Justice.

All materials will be approved and purchased by the court which also stipulated that Ison and Phillips were hired as independent contractors and would be responsible for all necessary workman's compensation and applicable taxes.

The court also agreed to authorize Dave Carlson to supervise electrical and plumbing work for the project which is estimated to cost approximately \$12,000.

The court accepted the lease agreement from the state which will pay \$875 quarterly, \$3,500 per year, on a year-to-year basis.

In other action during the meeting, the court approved an emergency amendment to the budget for \$4,351 to pay the salary of Sue Black, assistant to County Treasurer Virginia Collier.

The court also established an ordinance accepting transfers of \$10,000 for materials and supplies for the courthouse renovation project and \$5,245 for custodial services.

In other discussion, County Attorney John Cox told the magistrates that they needed to be considering a contract for electrical and mechanical maintenance of the courthouse.

Cox pointed out that the state is providing \$250 per month for the service and that two payments had already been received.

Cox also said that a service agreement on the courthouse elevator should also be decided at the court's next session on Oct. 1.

He also recommended that the county purchase a copying machine which it is now leasing to be paid for from funds from delinquent taxes.

Paul Ousley chaired the meeting in the absence of Judge/Executive W.C. Flannery.

In addition to Ousley, Magistrates Roy Plank and Calvin Ray Lyle were present.

Lemuel Black Jr. was absent.

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

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

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The sculptured works of Kentucky carver Edgar Tolson will be on exhibit Sept. 13-Oct. 18 in the Art Museum in the University of Kentucky's Center for the Arts at Euclid Avenue and Rose Street.

Titled "Edgar Tolson: Kentucky Gothic," the exhibit features 90 works by the Wolfe County artist. It also will be shown Nov. 17-Jan. 17 at the Cranbrook Academy of Art/Museum in Bloomfield Hills, Mich.

Priscilla Colt, organizer of the exhibit and director of the UK Art Museum, said, "this is the first full-length exhibition of the work of the 77-year-old wood carver. His art has been exhibited

in folk art museums and exhibitions through the U.S. and Japan for the past 15 years. The 90 works in our exhibit cover his career from 1945 to the present."

Tolson's beginning works, she explained, were characterized by typical folk-art imagery: dancing dolls, toys, chairs and animal forms — especially the snake. In 1967, he exhibited his carvings anonymously at Berea, Ky., and since then his works have been actively sought by art enthusiasts.

Members of the university art community who have been significant factors in contributing to the growth of Tolson as an artist are Michael and

Julie Hall, now with the Cranbrook Academy; Ellsworth Taylor, now with Kentucky Educational Television, and John and Miriam Tarka.

Tolson, still active at his studio/home in Campton, was a carpenter and skilled worker. In 1957 he suffered a stroke which left him partially disabled, but provided more time to carve the well-known figures and animals.

"In his earliest years, Tolson's forms and symbols were generally those of the well-documented Appalachian craft traditions," Colt said. "Later, his art becomes remarkably inventive and includes original interpretations of

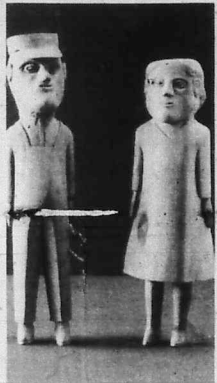
stories from the Bible," she added.

In 1968, Tolson was asked to carve a nude Adam and Eve with tree and serpent. "The Temptation," now belongs to the Smithsonian Institution collections, Washington, D.C.

Among the galleries and exhibition halls where his works have been displayed are the Smithsonian, the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Phyllis Kind Gallery, Chicago; Gertrude Kasie Gallery, Detroit; Columbus, Ga. Museum of Arts and Crafts; and Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

The Tolson exhibit opens at noon Sunday, Sept. 13, and runs through Oct.

18 in the UK Art Museum, UK Center for the Arts. Free and open to the public, the museum hours are from noon to 5 p.m. daily, except Monday.

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# Vikings Shutout Montgomery Co., 25-0

## First Victory Over Indians In Nine Years

It had been a very long time since Rowan County had beaten Montgomery County in a football game. Nine years to be exact. Last Friday night the Vikings lived up to the coaches and fans expectations by rolling over the Indians, 25-0.

It was the third shutout in a row for Rowan County. Or to put it another way, the Viking defense has held opponents scoreless during their last 12 quarters of play (144 minutes).

Coach Ray Graham seemed to have the answer as to why his squad controlled a contest against a team that usually dominates Rowan County. "The difference was we have a bunch of veteran kids and the fact that they worked so hard in the off season. They started working out right after the Fleming County game. I wanted to get them until after Christmas to get started," Graham said.

The coach went on to say, "When we win it's because of our line. When our line does a good job, that's when we get goose eggs. They just keep coming. The guys go both ways. We probably just play nine different linemen the whole game."

Once again Marvin Adkins was the main force in the Viking's attack. The senior number was called on 55 percent of Rowan's offensive plays. Adkins collected 248 yards on the ground on 55 attempts and had three touchdowns.

Fourth quarter "fumbitis" negated a dominating Morehead State University performance Saturday night as the Eagles, sporting a new set of star-studded jerseys, dropped a 20-17 decision at Marshall University.

goal to win rather than tie. MU boss Sonny Randall ordered a try for two on the conversion, but Konopka's pass, again intended for Richardson, fell incomplete.

The pie-kick changed hands so often in the fourth quarter it had begun to seem like a soccer game by the final gun. In fact, except for the series that died with the clock and three that ended with scores, every series in the quarter ended on a turnover — eight in all.

Spalding Nearly Saves Win Marshall drove into Morehead territory before Brian O'Dell lost the ball after a 12-yard catch from Konopka. Chris Spalding recovered it at his 36 for the first of two defensive plays that would have been considered keys had MSU held on for the win.

Morehead was still in position to control the outcome, leading by enough to require Marshall a touchdown to win while taking possession with a shade more than 5 1/2 minutes left.

That put Morehead in control of its destiny, holding a 10-point lead and the ball with less than 6 1/2 minutes left. It took Morehead just six seconds to give away its advantage, however, as Alan Mitchell fumbled the ball away after a first-down scamper on the very next play. Marshall heeded only 44 seconds to take advantage with the touchdown that turned the contest around. Three plays — a five-yard keeper by Konopka, a 14-yard toss to Larry Fourqurean and a three-yard pass to Richardson — made it 17-13. Looking to get close enough for a field

Konopka quickly went to the air, hitting Darnel Richardson for 15 yards and a first down at the Eagle 39. Thinking touchdown, Konopka again went for Richardson but Spalding picked it off at the goal line and returned it to the Eagle 12.

Three pitches around the left end yielded a first down at the MSU 35, but the next play, still another pitch, resulted in a fumble and a Herd recovery by Marty Palazeti at the MSU 30.

### Sports Brief

Hayes, 66, was one of 67,000 fans at Ohio Stadium Saturday who watched Ohio State defeat Duke 34-13. Hayes coached Ohio State football teams for 28 years before being fired in December 1978 for slugging a Clemson player in the Gator Bowl.

Despite the fact that Marshall inflated its numbers considerably with its last three drives, Morehead had more first downs, more rushes and yards rushing, better numbers passing, more offensive plays and yards per for more total offense and fewer penalties and yards penalized. Marshall had more time of possession, but only by 26 seconds and only after holding the ball for 7:09 of the last 12:15.

### Loney Takes Blame

Morehead even more thoroughly dominated the first half start sheet (13-5 in first downs, 162-70 in total offense, 36-24 in offensive plays) but had to settle for a 7-7 halftime deadlock. The tie came when Carl Lee returned a blocked field goal try 86 yards for a touchdown as the clock ran out at the half. "I'll take credit for (the loss)," Loney said. "It was my call at the end of the first half." Even though Morehead later moved ahead by 10 points, Loney said the block and return was the key play of the game. "I can't get away from the fact that you take away the ending play of the first half and then we score twice in the second half and it may be out of their reach. "I lost the game for us." Loney said that did not necessarily mean he regretted the call. The attempt by Duff, which was not blocked so much as kicked into the line, came from 53 yards, only two yards longer than Duff's longest ever. "It was a possible kick for him," Loney said. "I can't say I wish I hadn't called for it. I'm an aggressive coach. I

want my players to play aggressive. If I make conservative calls it's hard to ask the players to be aggressive."

There was some dispute about the game-tying extra point kick by Childers. Eagle defensive back Carey Reid was jumping up and down in obvious excitement by the time the ball hit the netting beyond the goalposts and the stands, then quickly questioned the official ruling. "I'm not second guessing them, but I can't call it from the side and I don't see how they could, either. I thought it was wide right."

### Best Quarter

Despite the freak touchdown, Morehead showed the record Labor Day night crowd of 18,212 its abilities in the second frame as the Eagles owned the quarter. MSU held the ball for the first 3:57 on a drive that ended with a 57-yard punt by John Christopher, then held Marshall to force a quick punt. The Eagles then began the best drive of the evening. Reeves directed a 61-yard, 14-play drive that chewed up 6:09 of clock time and ended when Shimer snared a pitch from Reeves and swept around left end for a 13-yard victory. His longest play was a 16-yard pass to Mark Ledford that allowed the Eagles to escape a second-and-20 situation. That was the only pass of the drive. (Continued on next page)

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
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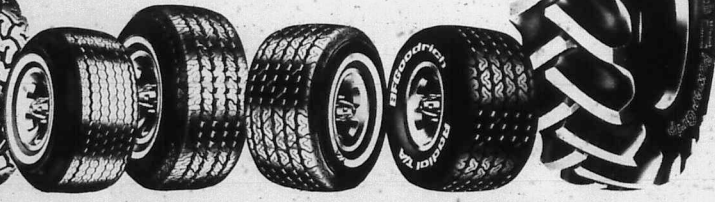


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## MUPB To Pay Engineers

Despite the fact that the situation hasn't improved, the Morehead Utility Plant Board voted to resume some payments on the new treatment center during its regular monthly session Thursday evening.

Earlier this summer, citing major items yet to be completed, including a computer that will operate on the plant on line, the board began withholding payments to the contractor, Shook Inc. of Dayton, Ohio, and the engineers on the job, Howard K. Bell Co. of Lexington.

Bob Williams, chief operator of the new sewer plant, told board members that computer still isn't finished and that a 50 page checklist of things that need to be done has not been completed.

Bob Williams, chief operator of the new sewer plant, told board members that the computer still isn't finished and that a 50 page checklist of things that need to be done has not been completed. Perkins said. The board agreed to pay Bell \$12,000, which is about half of the present amount owed. The plant board is continuing to withhold payment to Shook.

Plant Board attorney Paul Blair alerted the board to a mistake made in the \$5.23 million water distribution and purification system improvement project. While installing a new water line from Bluestone to Hidden Valley, United Pipeline of Louisville thought part of the route went through property owned by James Caudill, a member of the board. Caudill, signed over an easement for the work, but it was discovered two weeks ago, after the work was completed, that the line actually runs through neighboring property belonging to Bill Whitaker.

Board members visited the property in question Thursday night. The land used to be all forest. The water line comes down a steep slope, which has been cleared of trees about 10 yards on both sides of the line.

The board didn't take any action on the problem, but plans to work out some type of arrangement with Whitaker by the next regular meeting.

The board voted to hold a special meeting with the city council last night (Monday) to discuss plans for rehabilitation of older sewer connector lines.

The rehabilitation and improvement project was part of the original proposal that resulted in the construction of a new waste water treatment plant and new collector lines. Last year, the board hired a firm to conduct a Sewer System Evaluation Survey (SSES). Information from that survey will be used in the rehabilitation project.

The Environmental Protection Agency will pay for most of the project, and it requires that the Plant Board develop a plan to eliminate infiltration problems on private property.

The purpose of meeting the City Council is to get input on a plan that has to be submitted to the EPA and include the following basic items:

- Review the SSES report for private property corrections needed.
- Set up a notification plan for affected property owners in accordance with the city sewer ordinance and set a deadline.
- Set up an inspection system for work to be corrected.
- Set an alternative plan in case property owners do not meet the deadline.
- Set up a schedule for completion of all private property corrections to correspond with public sewer system problem corrections.
- Set up a system of publicity to alert people to what is going to be done.
- Under a city ordinance, homeowners and businesses will be required to correct problems on their own property, such as roof downspouts that go into the sewage system, at their own expense. Work will include fixing any leaks and correcting any infiltration into the system.

The board received a letter from the Department of Transportation giving notice that some of its lines may require relocation or adjustment along the portion of KY 801 which will be rebuilt.

The highway department plans to build a new portion of KY 801 of about 1.3 miles from U.S. 60 to a point near the Minor Clark Fish Hatchery.

Bill McKenzie, a pre-construction engineer for the DOT, said that the state will pay the costs for any utilities on private property that have to be moved or relocated. According to McKenzie, the Plant Board is responsible for any lines that are on public rights-of-way.

The Plant Board will have to contract out its preliminary engineering work on the relocation. Blair said he would contact highway department officials before the next regular monthly meeting to get more details about the project.

- Voted to prepare specifications to use to advertise for a new pickup truck.
  - Approved a request from Keith Kappes, public affairs director at Morehead State University, for the university to touch up its sign on the present water tower. It also gave permission for MSU to paint a sign on the new water tower on KY 32 when it's completed.

## MSU Plans Regional Education Workshop

Morehead State University will sponsor a Regional Adult Education Workshop on Saturday, Sept. 19.

**Do you need lime?**  
What does it mean to you if Kentucky farmers used 418,720 tons of nitrogen materials in 1980? What if 309,341 tons of lime is required to neutralize the acid formed from this nitrogen. Many times we read items like this and think it applies to others more than to us but everyone using nitrogen fertilizer should be concerned about lowering the pH of the soil.

According to Harold Rice, Extension Specialist in Feed Production stationed at the University of Kentucky Robinson Substation in Quicksand you need to apply 0.6 tons of lime for each ton of ammonium nitrate you use just to neutralize the acid produced from this fertilizer. You also need 0.2 tons of lime for each ton of 10-10-10 fertilizer you use. For example, if you produced 10 acres of corn which you fertilized with 300 pounds of 10-10-10 and 300 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre you would need to apply 1.4 tons of lime just to neutralize the acid formed from the nitrogen. You can calculate the tons of lime necessary to neutralize the fertilizer you used as follows:

— tons of ammonium nitrate X 0.6 = \_\_\_\_\_ tons of lime  
— tons of 10-10-10 X 0.2 = \_\_\_\_\_ tons of lime.

If you have used nitrogen fertilizer for several years without liming then you are probably losing profit due to lower yields. You really should have your soil tested before applying lime because nitrogen fertilizer is not the only way soils become acid. Soils also become acid due to the loss of calcium and magnesium removed by the crop or by leaching, and the formation of organic acids during plant growth and the decomposition of organic matter. Therefore, applying lime based only on the nitrogen you used will not be enough to maintain your pH in the most profitable range. You can use too much lime as well as too little so have your soil tested and apply the amount of lime recommended for the crops you plan to grow. Retest every three years to see that the desired pH level is maintained.

Farmers, as a group, have never applied enough lime to offset the acidity formed by natural processes and from the use of fertilizer, but that shouldn't stop you from using the lime you need. Liming acid soil supplies calcium and magnesium, increases the availability of phosphorus and molybdenum, decreases the toxicity of aluminum and manganese, increases nitrogen fixation by legumes, and increases crop yields. Then why is liming one of the most neglected practices on Kentucky farms? Then why is liming one of the most neglected practices on Kentucky farms. Probably because it takes about six months for lime to dissolve and the benefits are spread over a 3 to 5 year period. In the next decade calcium, from limestone, will likely become the nutrient most used by farmers. You can get a headstart by taking a soil sample to the County Extension Office now. Apply the lime your soil test shows you need soon after harvesting your present crop.

**The Importance of Soil Sampling**  
You can't look at the soil, smell it, or feel it, and tell whether it has 30 or 300 pounds of available phosphate. However, you can have a soil sample tested to tell you how much available phosphorus is in it. Why is it so important to know the levels of phosphorus and other minerals that are in your soil? It is apparent that minerals provide the needed nutrients for plant growth and a soil test can reveal a lack of these minerals. However, if your soil is already adequate in some or all of the required

minerals, why should you spend hard earned dollars for fertilizer you don't need.

Your soil test report tells you the levels of phosphorus, nitrogen, potassium and give a pH reading (lime). Also a special test can be performed if you desire levels of Calcium, Magnesium or Zinc. To make it easy for you to interpret the soil test results, your report form will indicate how much of what kinds of fertilizer you should apply.

#### How Do You Take Soil Samples

It is very easy to take a good soil sample. It is, however, important to follow these seven steps:

1. With a spade make a deep hole in the soil.
2. Throw out a spade full of soil.
3. Cut a 1/2 to 1 inch slice of soil from the back of the hole. Be sure the slice is 7 inches in depth and fairly even in width and thickness.
4. Place this sample slice in a clean bucket.
5. Repeat steps one through six times at different spots in your garden or field.
6. Thoroughly mix the six or seven slices you have in the bucket. Allow this mixture to air dry an hour or two.
7. After thoroughly mixing, take out about a pint of soil and bring it in to the County Extension Office. A form must then be filled out and the sample sent to the University of Kentucky.

#### The Results Of Your Soil Sample

It usually takes about two weeks for the sample results to be sent back to the County Extension Office. The County Agricultural Agent will make a recommendation and forward this to the gardener or farmer.

The soil sample can be taken any time of the year — but, if you can take your sample during October, November or December you will likely get faster service. In the rush season, January through March, a soil sample should be taken each year, if possible, especially for valuable cash crops such as tobacco.

#### Cost of Soil Analysis

Yes, there is a nominal fee to cover the costs of chemicals and a technician. The different tests include:

#### New Way To Get To Coal

Gulf research has started testing a unique method of getting the energy from coal seams that are almost vertical. The method is to bore holes deep into the seams; then by setting the coal on fire some 600 feet below the surface and by injecting steam and oxygen into the burning coal, Gulf hopes to get a fairly-clean, medium BTU gas.

If the method proves to be technically and economically feasible, it could unlock the energy for more than one hundred billion tons of coal from these almost vertical coal seams.

#### Bids Are Sought For Reclamation Projects In Area

Bids are being let for reclamation of abandoned or "orphaned" land in Floyd, Magoffin, Martin, Pike, Greenup, Lawrence, Boyd, Carter and Johnson counties.

The work involves applying limestone, seeding, planting seedlings, and spreading limestone and fertilizer. The soil must be disced with a rome disc and graded with a tractor with minimum weight of 50,000 lbs without the blade, according to project requirements.

Only qualified excavator-reclamation contractors are being asked to bid on the contracts.

The bid deadline on the project is Tuesday, Sept. 15, at 10 a.m.

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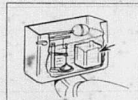

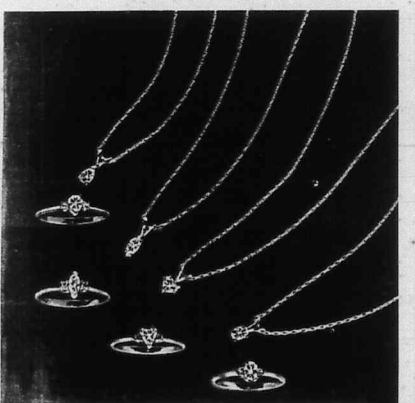

**Wallflower Plant is Showy, Prized for Early Blooms**

There is really nothing dull about the wallflower. Perhaps, this name was chosen for the girl who stood against the wall while everyone danced because the wallflower stands so tall and erect. It is a showy plant and is highly prized for its early, fragrant blooms.



The wallflower plant may grow to two feet. Leaves are narrow, lance-shaped and pointed. Flowers form in close spikes, in white, yellow, brown, red, pink and purple.

The origin of the scientific name, *Cheiranthus cheiranthoides*, is unknown. It may have come from the Greek word, *keiri*, which means "hand bouquet." The wallflower is a popular terrace plant; it is used on banks and slopes and in mixed borders.

Propagation is by fresh harvested seeds. If seedlings are transplanted in spring, the point of the taproot should be broken off to encourage better root formation.

In ordinary garden-soil to which some lime has been added and do best in areas where there is frequent rainfall.

**BUDDY'S WORKSHOP**

**Grease, Paint Splatters Need Prompt Attention**

The kitchen in our new country home has a hardwood floor, which is very beautiful—and I want it to stay that way. I am concerned about grease stains. I don't want to put a rug or carpet around the cooking area, but I do want to protect the floor from permanent grease stains. Any suggestions?

If the floor is not covered, grease stains are likely to occur—and will become permanent unless grease droppings are quickly cleaned and removed. Remove grease immediately by wiping the surface liquid with a cloth dampened in carbon tetrachloride or a petroleum-base solvent. If evidence of the stain remains, cover the spot with a thick layer of sawdust wetted down with a solvent. Wait a few hours, then sweep the sawdust, gently, into a dustpan. The stain should come away with the sawdust.

I am planning to paint the wooden exterior of my home—the upper portion—which means that I am certain to let some paint drip from my brush onto the lower portion, which is unpainted brick. I'd like to be prepared to remove the drippings as they occur. How do I go about it?

Paint spots on unpainted brick are difficult to remove, even when fresh. One trick employed by professional painters is that of rubbing over the splatters with another piece of brick. The brick dust created by friction usually picks up the paint or camouflage that which remains. A broken piece of concrete works equally well when paint is splattered on cement or stucco.



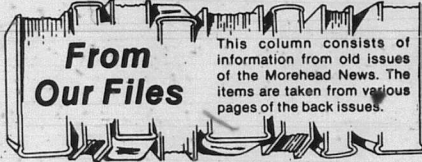
# EKEDC Board Will Meet In Morehead

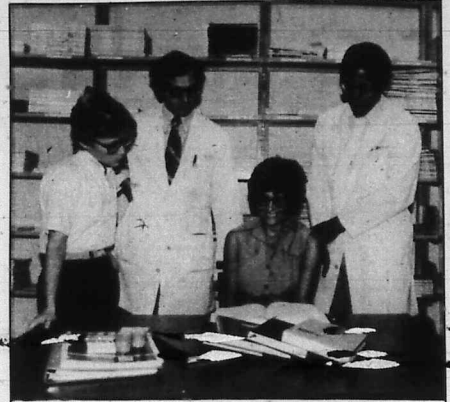

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# Wading Through Autumn Potholes

The five-cent package of peanuts that costs a quarter at the local service station helped re-energize a tired body that had spent the last three hours wading through the pools of Buffalo Creek in Carter County. Early autumn had found the stream nearly rock bottom dry and milky; an unusual occurrence for this winding little stream that is almost always gin-clear.

For the past twenty years I have wanted to wade the picturesque creek that wanders through the heart of Carter City and joins Tygart Creek near the Greenup-Carter County line. Always pictured it clear, with a gentle current and full of my favorite kind of fishing places called "potholes."

Today, however, and for the very first time for me, I found Buffalo low with a clay-colored muddiness which I don't particularly care when fishing. Outside the color of the water, though, brilliant splashes of autumn painted the low undergrowth along shore. Fall flowers were displaying beautiful hues of red, yellows, pinks and oranges. The crimson-colored leaves of the sumac added variety to the colorful landscape, making it difficult to concentrate on fishing.

The lower reaches of the stream are somewhat of a feast or famine as far as the wading angler is concerned. I found lots of dry riffle areas where what little water that was flowing in Buffalo was taking the underground route. Few potholes of the variety I was seeking could be found in that section of the stream. Long pools represented low water conditions and I found most of these wadable using either sneakers or cutoffs that you don't mind getting wet. Chest-high waders would also allow the wading angler to get through most of these low pools. Since I wore hip boots, I was somewhat limited in my movements, but I managed to catch a great many small fish regardless, and that after all, was what I had come to the little stream to do.

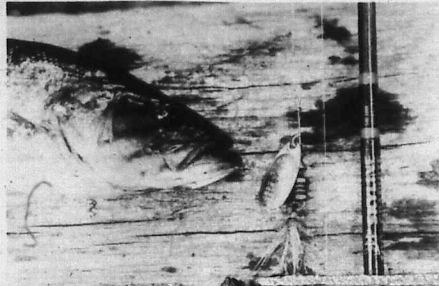
There are a lot more smallmouth waters in northeastern Kentucky than most anglers know about. Buffalo and its small tributaries are an example.

While most keeper-size smallmouths will be concentrated in the deepest pools of the main stream, oodles of smaller bass up to ten inches are to be found almost anywhere where two feet of water depth is discovered.

Since I had not planned to keep any fish taken on my pothole wading trip along the Buffalo, I selected an assortment of spinners and top water lures that I had bent the bars down on all the hooks. The spinners were all single hook varieties, which I have found to be more productive with small fish in streams than the traditional treble hook type.

With the barbless hooks, I could catch and release as many of the smaller fish I wanted without much danger of any of them being harmed.

In my opinion, there are only two kinds of fishing tackle that fits into the

scene of pothole fishing. My personal preference is an ultra-light spinning rod, four and a half foot long equipped with comparable ultra-light spinning reel of the open-face variety.

To this, I spool on two-pound test monofilament line and prefer to use plugs and spinners small enough to match the rest of the tackle. A full spool of the hair-like line allows even the smallest spinners to be cast for long distances and that's important when fishing the potholes.

If fly fishing is your fancy, the same ultra-light package is a seven-foot graphite rod, which is an excellent way to present No. 12 size black gnats and tiny poppers that will catch nearly every fish in a pothole, including minnows.

Since I had chosen the main channel of Buffalo for my first pothole angling test, I was using slightly larger size spinners and surface lures in hopes that bigger bass or even a muskie would take the offering.

Reports coming to me over the years indicated Buffalo has smallmouths that reach near the three-pound mark and it's even possible to hook onto a muskie

in the 20-pound class in the stream's lower reaches. What I planned to do with either size fish on two-pound test line is anybody's guess.

I suppose I shouldn't have worried too much because I caught neither a three-pound bronzeback nor a 20-pound muskie. What I did catch were numerous small bass ranging in size from a few inches up to one that may have stretched out to a keeping size, 12 inches.

I also caught a bunch of horny-head chubs that went to ten inches, beautifully colored sunfish, a small gar and two grass pikes that I thought at first might have been undersized muskie.

Nearly all the larger tributaries to Buffalo and Tygart Creek offer excellent autumn pothole fishing in their lower reaches. Look for small pools that have at least two feet of water in them during dry periods and you will find smallmouths up to seven inches and and horny-head chubs bigger than most of the stocked trout in this area. They fight harder too, I might add. Probably even eat as well, if anyone ever tried them in a savory fishcake such as the ones we told you about last year in the Bob Cee Camp Cook article.

I discovered the kind of fishing I was really looking for in the first mile of Grassy Creek. The stream in this area was almost completely dry, but every hundred feet or so a nice pool of water remained that was crystal clear, and some were as deep as five or six feet. Here's where I found small bronzeback and horny-head chubs galore. I didn't keep count, but I would guess that I caught a dozen or more of each species during the mile of stream I covered.

The trouble with potholing is that you can go on forever, always looking ahead for the next pool of water that might hold an even larger fish. I covered a mile on a game leg and hated to get out

of the stream, even though the holes were coming fewer and fewer as the stream climbed to more shallow sections.

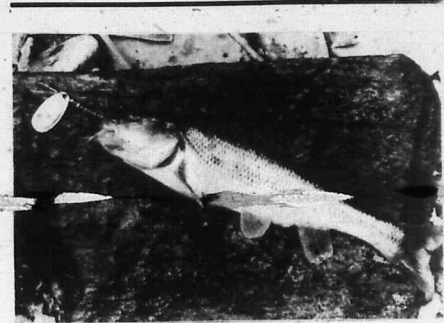
Potholes are also excellent places to learn to fly fish for trout. Drift a fly that will get a raise from a smallmouth or a horny-head chub, and chances are good that you will be able to catch that next rising trout you see below Grayson Lake Dam or in any of the area's trout streams.

Potholes are also great places to take the family fishing. Using No. 8-size hooks baited with cheese, salmon eggs or pieces of worms will allow even the smallest of the kids to catch some fish from the little pools of water. After a few are caught and the action slows, move on to the next one a few feet up or down the stream.

The greatest value autumn pothole

absolute solitude found on the small streams at this time of the year. Wildlife along shore abounds and the fish in the pools probably have never seen a lure in all their existence making them easy targets to cast. Like I said, you won't catch many big ones, but the strong fight put up by the small fish in these conditions with light tackle brings back the real joys of fishing which might be described as pure relaxation with enough fast action thrown in to keep such activity from ever becoming boring.

## Kentucky Afield

Waterfowl hunters can start making plans for this fall's duck and goose hunting, now that the Fish and Wildlife Commission has set the season dates.

As has been its past policy, the commission gave Kentucky duck and goose hunters the maximum number of days allowable under federal regulations — 50 days for duck hunting and 70 days of goose shooting in all except the four westernmost counties in Kentucky — Ballard, Hickman, Carlisle and Pullen.

In these four counties, federal law limits the goose season to 50 days, so there the season will open Dec. 2, instead of Nov. 12, the opening day over the rest of the state. The goose season will close statewide on Jan. 20, 1982.

The 50-day season in those Kentucky counties along the Mississippi River is an attempt to reverse a downward trend in the Mississippi Valley Canada goose population. Wildlife managers would like to see a 15 percent annual increase in this population, but numbers have actually decreased since 1976. So the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has mandated 50-day seasons not just in Kentucky but in portions of

Minnesota, Missouri, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana and Tennessee.

The other major concentration of geese in Kentucky belong to the Tennessee Valley population. This flock, which uses the Sloughs area in Henderson County and the Kentucky-Barkley Lake area, has a stable population and can withstand the effects of the full 70 day season.

The duck season is split this year, with the first phase running from Nov. 21 through Nov. 28 and the second part from Dec. 10 through Jan. 20. Duck limits will again be determined by the point system and the point values are unchanged from last year: canvasbacks are 100-point ducks; hen mallards, black ducks, wood ducks, hooded mergansers and redheads are worth 70 points each; pintails, all teal species, gadwall, shovellers, scaups, wigwags and mergansers (except hooded mergansers), 10 points. Drake mallards and all other species are 25-point ducks.

The limit on geese is also unchanged from last year — five daily, with only two Canada geese and two whitefronted

geese allowed in the daily bag. The possession limit is 10, with no more than four Canada and four whitefronted.

Hunters who wish to hunt on the Ballard Wildlife Management Area in Ballard County have until Sept. 30 to get their application to the area for the Dec. 7 - Jan. 20 goose season and the Dec. 10 - Jan. 20 duck hunt. Apply by letter, giving the names and addresses of each hunter in the party (no more than six names per letter), the first choice of hunting date or several alternate dates (remember there's no hunting on Sundays or on Christmas day on the area) and the preference for goose or duck hunting.

Before you seal your letter of application, make sure you've included a self-addressed, stamped envelope and a certified check, cashier's check or money order for the \$10 per hunter fee. Mail the application to: Reservations, Ballard Wildlife Management Area, Rt. 1, LaCenter, KY 42056.

A couple of changes have been made in the hunting rules for Ballard this year. Substitutions may be made the morning of the hunt (instead of one week prior to the hunt).

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# Contest Opens For Quilt-makers

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's best quilt-makers will soon get a chance to show off their handiwork and compete for cash prizes in a statewide contest. Kentucky Quilt Contest '82, sponsored by the Kentucky Heritage Quilt Society,

gets under way March 21 with 12 regional contests to be held throughout the state. Regional finalists in the three judging categories will compete during Derby Week in the state contest, scheduled for

the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington. The winner in each of the categories — traditional, contemporary and group — will receive \$1,000. All 36 quilts reaching the finals will be displayed at popular Kentucky tourist sites next summer and will be shown in a catalogue.

To help potential entrants prepare for the event, the quilt society has scheduled a series of four-hour workshops this fall in 15 Kentucky cities, noted contest committee chairman Melzie Wilson.

First lady Phyllis George Brown said she strongly supports the contest. "This is a wonderful opportunity for Kentucky's best quilt-makers to display their talent," she said. "Contests such as this one help put our best artists and craftsmen before the public eye."

Registration for the quilt contest will be conducted through Jan. 31, 1981. Entry forms are available at county and regional quilt society leaders.

Meanwhile, the society's fall meeting will be held Sept. 16 at the Old Capitol in Frankfort. The meeting starts at 10 a.m.

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### Estimated Taxes Due On Sept. 15

The third installment of estimated federal tax payments on 1981 individual income is due by Sept. 15, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This installment should be paid using declaration voucher three found in the Form 1040-ES package, "Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals."

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed during 1981 may have to file an amended declaration. Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate.

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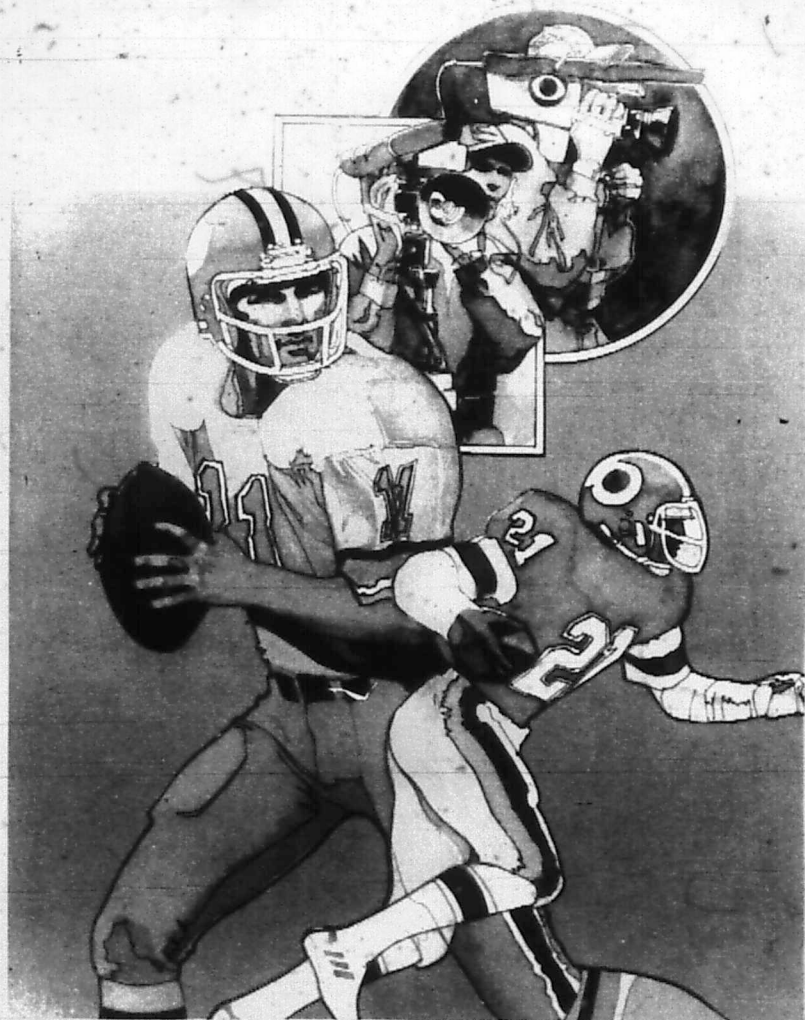

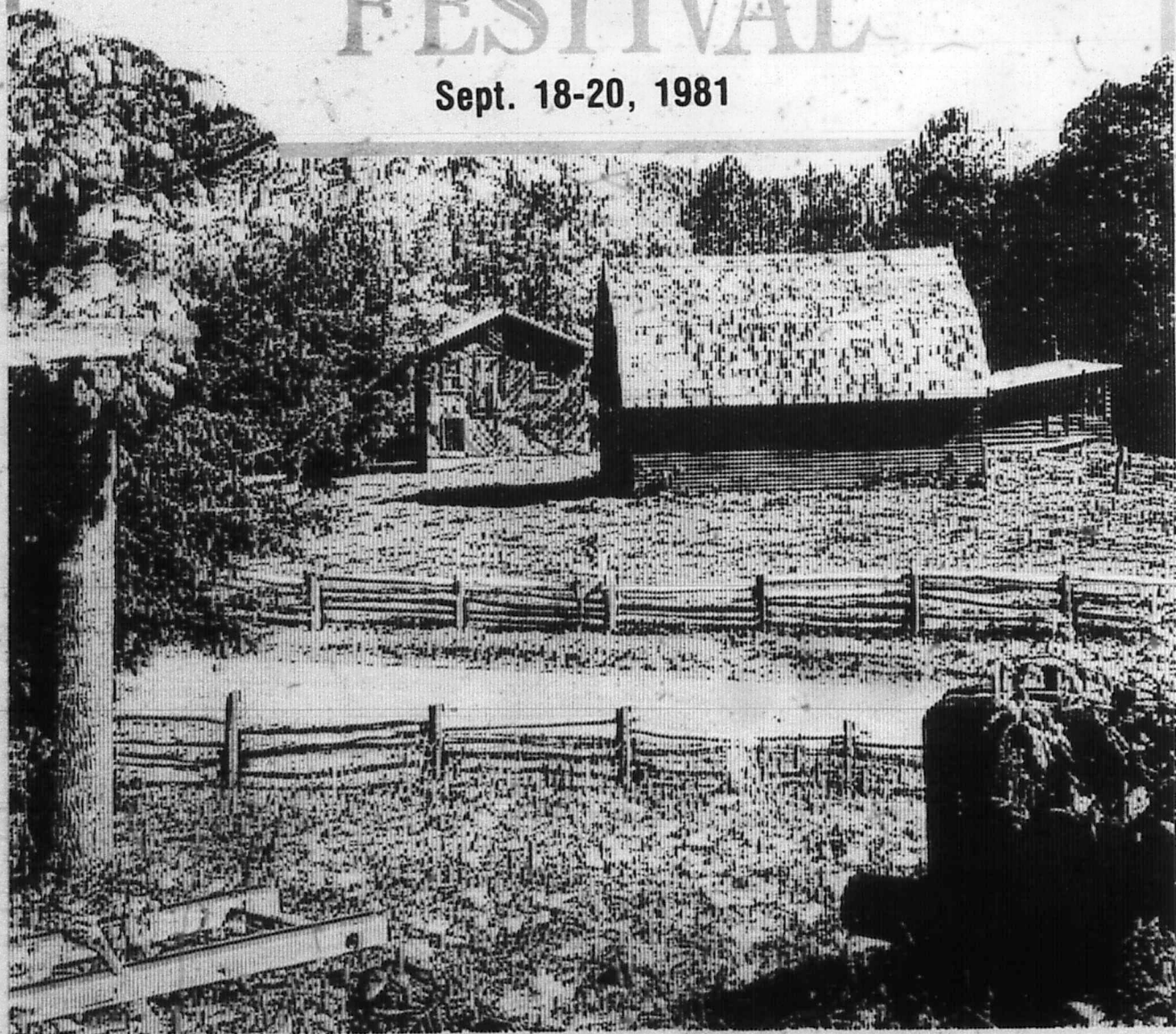

Organized each year by Janet Butcher, Grace Crosthwaite and Linda Lowe, it is not uncommon for that committee to receive phone calls from anywhere in the country.

The number of entries has steadily increased, and this year, over 200 are expected.

Publicity for the contest has appeared in magazines such as the fall 1981 Quilt; No. 23 Lady's Circle Patchwork Quilts; and the July, August and September issues of "Quilter's Newsletter."

Quilts and afghans entered in the contest are displayed in Morehead's

downtown store windows. Judging, done by area extension agents, will be Wednesday, Sept. 16, and ribbons will appear on winning quilts the next day.

A viewers' choice award is presented Saturday, Sept. 19. Persons may vote for their favorite quilt or afghan at ballot boxes found in stores.

Some of the entries are for sale, and will be marked saying so.

Quilts and afghans are entered in seven divisions: hand quilting, pieced or appliqued; machine quilting, pieced or appliqued; crib and baby quilts; heirlooms (25 years or older); novelty, as in cathedral, yo-yo, tacked, etc.; kits, such as pre-quilted or cross stitched; and afghans, crocheted and knitted.

The show is sponsored by the Downtown Merchants Association.

## Calliope Will Lend Carnival Atmosphere

When the Harvest Festival parade takes on the atmosphere of a carnival, it will mean Vic Ramey is passing by, playing the Morehead Shrine Club's air organ, or calliope.

These days, the sound is associated with the excitement of fairs, the strained, whistling notes generally heard near a merry-go-round. Looking back in time, a calliope was the music of the riverboat.

The calliope that views see in Morehead Saturday, Sept. 19, boosts a history that long. Unique with its 53 tubes instead of the typical 40 to 42, this instrument the Shriners believe was made in a blacksmith shop, each part handcrafted.

It is a known fact that before the El Hasa Shrine Temple in Ashland purchased the instrument in 1930, it rode aboard the Kansas City Mississippi River Boat.

Today, its surroundings may not be as luxurious but it generates just as much fun, as it is played on the back of a small truck, decorated in the true Shriners parade style.

Several years ago, the calliope that was played at the World's Fair in Dallas, Tex. was almost destroyed by fire. A roof caved in on the instrument, and since then the Shriners

have gone so far as to use oven cleaner on the pipes to clean the baked on grim.

This instrument is one of only two or three in 10 states.

Ramey has sat at the keys for about 15 parades a year since 1975. Joining the Shriner's funny cars, mopeds and motorcycles, that also will be in the Harvest Parade, Ramey has played in Florida, New Orleans, Memphis, Myrtle Beach, Virginia and at all the major town parades in Kentucky.

Ramey is the only Shriner calliope player in the area. Originally, there were three, but one man died in the Beverly Hills fire, while another was killed after a fall down a flight of stairs.

"We are watching him (Ramey) very close," said Jack Kegley, an active Shriner. Although Kegley has no musical background, he has helped tune the air organ. As Ramey would shout instructions over the notes, Kegley would raise and lower a piece in the pipes to get the correct sound.

Ramey is modest about his calliope talents. "I'm not a pianist, I'm a piano player," he says. "There's a difference. I'm not a professional, I just play for the fun of it."



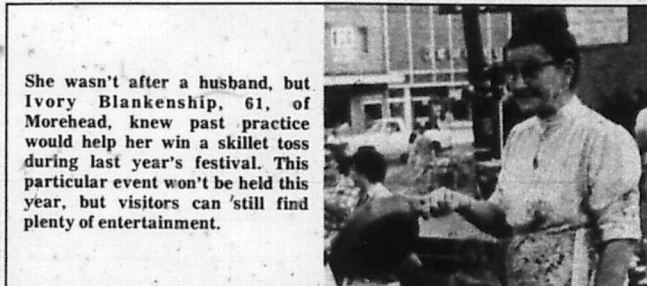

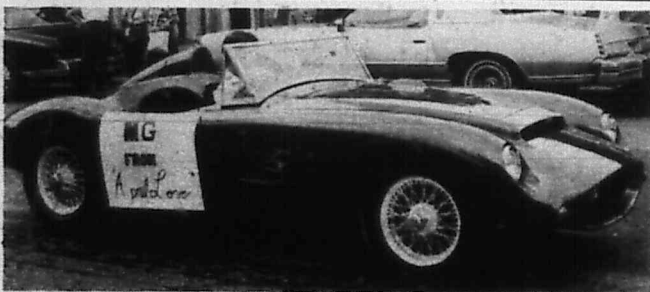

# Contest Nationally Known

Last year, The Morehead News called the Harvest Festival's quilt and afghan show a "state-noted event."

This year, it has reached national proportions.

Doing much of the footwork in the making of the higher status is Janet Butcher, chairman of the show.

Butcher started her game plan as early as January of this year. She sent letters with details about the show to five national magazines. Four published the news.

Two of those wrote back for more details, including an answer to "where in downtown Morehead?"

"I made it sound worst than it is," admitted Butcher, who told them, "There really are only two streets in Morehead."

After the articles were published (including the one at left from Quilt magazine) Butcher heard from quilters in Delaware, Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee.

Entries already come from all over Kentucky. This year, over 200 are expected. Last year, 244 were entered. In 1979, there were 234; 1978, 190 and in 1977, the first year of the Harvest Festival, about 50.

Butcher, along with Grace Crosthwaite and Linda Lowe, has

worked with the show since 1978.

Under their leadership, the show has received letters from admiring visitors. One came from a Louisville quilting teacher who said she toured the shop windows where the entries are displayed despite rainy weather. She described herself as "soaked" but fascinated.

Edith Pigg, owner of the Quilting Bee in Lexington and featured in a Courier-Journal story, has purchased several Harvest Festival quilts as merchandise for her shop.

Entrants are allowed to offer their quilts and afghans for sale by tagging the article with the price or a phone number.

Not everyone wants to sell their handiwork. When confronted by a potential buyer, one woman asked \$600 for a quilt. "I don't want to sell, and if I did, that would make it worth my while," she said.

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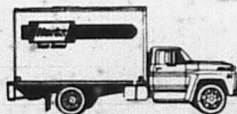
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
