## Jury Being Picked For Brown Trial

### Charged With Slaying Bobby Rowe At Elliottville June 11, 1947

The Rowan County Circuit Court moved today to place Orville Brown, 22, on trial for the slaying, almost nine years ago of 16-year old Bobby Rowe.

The regular jury panel has been exhausted and Judge John J. Winn yesterday ordered the shift to summer additional jurors.

Circumstances leading to the trial are:

On the morning of June 11, 1947 a man, carrying a shotgun, drove covered by a paper sack with cellophane, entered the general store of Eddie Johnson at Elliottville.

Bobby Rowe, who was looting in the store, thought it a joke and reached for the gun. It was hit with a blast from the shotgun that killed the boy instantly.

Johnson made a dive for a pistol under the counter and was arrested as he attempted to flee. The murderer fled to the nearby forest.

Brown was later arrested and charged with the two slayings. On May 25, 1948 Brown was convicted of murdering Bobby Rowe and sentenced to life imprisonment. The Commonwealth alleged Brown and Johnson had previous trouble.

Rowan Circuit Court has kept the indictment for killing Rowe on the docket through every term since.

Rowe, who has an incurable case of tuberculosis, is eligible for parole but cannot obtain clemency as long as the indictment stands.

Judge Winn refused his plea to dismiss the trial bill and Brown's attorneys petitioned for a trial last year. Brown was brought to Lexington for a trial last June and also in November, but the trial was continued because many witnesses had not been located.

The double killing caused great interest and resentment in this part of the state.

The court set Monday as trial date for County Judge William T. McClain charged with aiding Zeida Brown McPherson to procure Rowan County babies from poor parents to take to wealthy Texans and with misfeasance in office.

Judge McClain has stoutly maintained his innocence asking the people to wait and get all the facts. He said "the whole thing is a terrible mistake."

Mrs. McPherson, who married a ROT employee, and now resides in Texas, was charged in a true bill on the baby selling charge.

Funeral services for Leonard Grey, prominent Morehead business man, will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 1 o'clock at the residence on Wilson Avenue with interment in Lee Cemetery.

Rev. Marvin L. Tate will officiate at the final rites.

Mr. Grey, who operated the Dixie Grill Restaurant with other local business interests, suffered a fatal heart attack while working at the restaurant Monday evening at 6 o'clock. The end came before medical aid arrived.

He had suffered intermittent headaches and illness for several years.

Mr. Grey, native of Louisville, came to Morehead about 15 years ago and established the Dixie Grill. He and his wife, Esther, built the business into one of the most thriving food establishments in Morehead. They later constructed a new building on the corner of Main and Bishop Avenue, completely remodeled and streamlined the business and invested in other enterprises.

Mr. Grey was born in Louisville, the son of George H. Grey and the late Ida Rea (Perkins) Grey, and was 47 years of age.

ORDINANCE AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE EXHAUST EQUIPMENT ON MOTOR VEHICLES IN THE CITY OF MOREHEAD.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. On and after the first day of April, 1956, it shall be unlawful for any vehicle to be operated upon the public streets and highways within the corporate limits of the City of Morehead, without being properly equipped with muffler and exhaust pipes to keep the exhaust from the escape of excess or permit loud noises.

SECTION 2. The term "properly equipped" as used herein shall mean original factory equipment on the vehicle when it was manufactured or any replacement with like kind or its equivalent.

Any muffler known as the Hollywood type or any similar design straight line exhaust system, shall not be considered as "properly equipped" and the use of any such devices shall be unlawful.

SECTION 3. Any operator or

owner of any vehicle operated in violation of this ordinance, shall upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

# Good Soil Conservation Practice Has Meant Great Improvement In Farms Of Rowan County

Rowan County's Soil Conservation District, in its annual report, released today, said that tremendous strides and advancement had been achieved. John D. Alexander is Rowan County Commissioner while Leland H. Fray is Chairman. Other committee members are Robert S. Bishop, Dave C. Goddard, Glenn Fray and Orville Goddard.

The report is reprinted in full here because of its importance to farmers.

To the cooperators of Rowan County Soil Conservation District, you and your supervisors, offer the following report. When the first meeting of your representatives met at the county house on Dec. 10, 1943, W. H. Johnson, Jesse Perkins, John C. Eldridge, and Leland Hall, sat down to evaluate the agricultural problems of your district.

At that time the land in the district was deficient in lime, phosphate and potash. The lime was hard to get, since there was no crusher in the county. Now, two quarries are in operation and the soil testing laboratory has taken the pains to work out of applying basic materials. This practice has been so well that it does not command the importance in Rowan County agriculture, that it still deserves attention, but with supplies plentiful you cooperators have taken the pains to maintain the productive ability of your soil.

The next practice we discussed was cover crops. We found that too many acres were left exposed to the washing winter rains. This is still a big problem since you are, now, raising the corn crop on your row crop land, especially that on which corn is being raised. You don't realize that the tobacco patch. Your returns from the other row crop land should be as high as the returns from that devoted to growing tobacco. In proportion to the hours of labor required to produce a crop. Now that rotation of the tobacco is recommended, it is more important that cropland be sown to cover crops. In 1955 you sowed 655 acres were bare. You did not do too well there.

We found the need for drainage to be of utmost importance. Too many water logged areas were not producing in much as they could be made to do by using disposal means suitable for the particular field that had too much water. Grassed waterways, open ditches and diversion channels would solve the problem of surface drainage. For the water in the soil, this would have to be taken care of on one farm by laying one-half mile of open ditch. 14.4 miles of open ditch are now working in your district. 600 feet of tile was placed, making a total of 28,236 feet working. It is estimated that a quarter of a million feet are needed in the district. Fifteen sand waterways were installed, covering 25 acres. Where possible, the surface water was disposed by methods to use. It prevents erosion and makes grass grow out of what would have been a gully or ditch. This practice has been applied on 170 acres in Rowan County.

We decided that pasture and hay production needed education work. Since the organization of your district, more adapt-

fat. The logs and pulp wood can be sold as they come from the stump. Not only must fire and livestock be kept out of the timber, but it must be systematically harvested. Mature, defective, cull trees should be put on the market, at sometime in its life the tree will be in one of those three categories. The best thing to do is use the phases of better woodland management. Last year, you farmed 42,422 acres of timber. You also thinned 185 acres for timber stand improvement work. Last year, you had 100 acres of timber stand improvement work. This was discussed and we thought more attention should be given to this. Many crops were being planted on unimproved land. The farmer who sowed alfalfa on soil underlain with limestone washed his seed, lime and fertilizer. He also lost the use of the land that year. The woodland owner who sold his timber on a clear-cut basis got cheated plenty. The county agent has helped us with the crops. The farmer who has helped with the woodland work. We can see considerable improvement through their efforts in the past few years.

One lady, who was reared in Morehead, spent several years in an adjoining county, recently came back to live here. After a trip over the county she said that she could hardly realize the advancement in agriculture that had been made while she was away. Your district has helped in these changes.

Fifty-eight more farmers became cooperators in 1955. This makes a total of 582 active farmers who are benefiting by taking advantage of the services your district has to offer.

Your district is mentioned in the Courier-Journal-Louisville Times soil conservation essay. Thirty-six essays were turned in from both high schools. Some of these were very good and clearly showed the extra work that had been given much thought and research in soil preparation. We are glad to help with these contents because it causes them to go together. Other than this, and to realize how necessary it is to our way of living. The use of your district together with other agencies, assisted Morehead State College in preparing a soil conservation reservation. Approximately 60 teachers took the course, and one returned to his school where he received more benefit from the workshop than any other. We are grateful to President Anderson and the faculty of the University of Kentucky for this category, and feel that it will help to fill a long wanted need. This is to be informed each year. We were sorry to hear of the resignation of Mr. Simon Eldridge as supervisor. Simon has had one year of very valuable assistance. We will miss him. Mr. Glenn Fray has been selected to fill out his unexpired term. We know that Glenn will carry his part of the load.

The Kentucky Bankers Association and the State Association of Soil Conservation Districts sponsored a field day at the Conservation Service laboratory in Morehead. This was held during the first week of July. In the conservation, practiced on a watershed basis. Three of your supervisors, together with many interested in agriculture in Rowan County, attended the meeting. Many demonstrations and exhibits were seen.

One, in which a watershed had been developed in one source of creek water, might be important to some of you. The seep must be on a slope. A ditch is dug around the hill above where the water comes to the surface. The ditch is dug deep enough to intercept the flow. The center of the ditch is then placed lower than the seeps. Field tile is placed in the excavation with a T joint at the center, to which a discharge pipe is connected. Clay is packed on the lower side of the tile to force water into the ditch. The upper side is filled with gravel. The discharge pipe should run to a water tank. Some of you may wish to try this, if you have the required site. At a recent meeting we tried to evaluate our program of work. We think that pasture establishment and improvement is perhaps the most important problem before us. Close behind, if not equally important, is woodland stand improvement and tree planting. The tree planting phase is bottlenecked in the supply of seedlings. The present nursery of the Division of Forestry cannot supply the demand which is increasing yearly. We feel that many more trees are being planted in Kentucky than facilities for producing them should be established near the place they will be used.

Russell Hunt, tobacco specialist from the University of Kentucky, points out that it was also one of the best smoker crop crops of burley ever produced. Red tobacco sold at record prices because of its low nicotine quality. The farmer who produced the crop caused tobacco companies to bid high in order to get their share of the crop. Tobacco companies can buy the other grades and the pool later since there is a large supply of these grades on hand.

What type of tobacco do farmers plan to grow in 1956? Many people have said that they intend to produce red tobacco since it was a good seller the past year. Mr. Hunt's advice to farmers is to grow a good quality tobacco that is low in nicotine content and one that has desirable cigarette qualities.

In order to do the best job of growing a good smoker type tobacco there are some rules to follow. The type is one of the determining factors in producing a low nicotine tobacco. Some of the varieties recommended by the University of Kentucky Experiment Station are: 41-A, 35, 11-A, 11-B, 58, 12-53 and Burley 21.

Burley 21 is a new variety that is looking exceptionally well. It is a stand up type, resistant to black root-rot, mosaic, and wildfire, and is a very low nicotine variety. Mr. Hunt recommends that each farmer try a part of his acreage in Burley 21 to see if it is adapted to his farm. If it does well, then next year he can shift to it entirely. Another new variety that might be tried on the same basis is 12-53.

If we are to grow good burley, fertilizing properly is highly important. The only way to know how to fertilize properly is by testing the soil. (The County Soil Testing Laboratory is located in

# Razor Recommends That Rowan Farmers Start Making Tests Of Soil, Fertilizer Needs

By Adrian Razer (Rowan County Agent)

Now is a good time for farmers to start thinking of finding out what their soil needs for the crop that is going to be put on the land this year.

This year it will probably be even more important than in several of the past years that farmers buy fertilizer wisely since costs of production are likely to be up with prices of things to be added in some cases taking a downward trend.

This cost-price squeeze means that farmers need to do a more efficient job of production and from a crop standpoint, this efficiency can very well start with the laying of plant food fertilizer crops to be produced.

At the first opportunity, take either an old tin or one and a half inch auger or a shovel and secure samples from these fields you want tested in the following manner:

If using an auger, bore down into the ground about seven inches and pull the auger out placing the soil in a box or a bucket. Do this some eight or ten times over the field to be tested, placing all the dirt in the bucket. If using a shovel, dig about one half pint in a container, label it so that you will know from what field it came and let it air dry. Then bring it to the Extension Office, and the technician will pick it up and run the test.

If a shovel is used, make a hole in the ground about 7 inches down, then from the back

Wart Cures Are Effective But You Must Believe In One Administering Them

A good friend of mine of Memphis, Tenn., has sent me several "cures" for warts that he has been able to collect out of several of the southern states. With these cures, there's no reason why we should have a wart reader of this column at all; that is, if our readers will only have faith in the cure that they administer. We will print for you several of the wart cures and you can use the one most handy for you.

Take a grain of corn. Rub it on the wart.
Take a black hen. Warty will go away.
Catch a katydid and let him eat the seeds out of the wart and the wart will go away.
Go to a graveyard. Find a bone. Rub the wart with the bone and throw the bone over your right shoulder and never look back. Away goes the wart.
Tie a horsehair around the wart and in a few days the wart will be gone.
Pick up a rock, pebble, or gravel. Make a wish. Rub the rock across the wart. Mumble a few words. Put the object back where it was and the wart will go away.
Find a black cat that does not have any white on him at all. Put him in an iron pot and pour water on him. Build a fire under the pot and boil the cat alive until he is pulpy. Remove the right knee and mash it up in a bag. Put this on the wart for two or three days. The wart goes.
Catch a sling shot. Shoot a bald eagle in the top of the head. Catch him before he hits the ground. Put this on the wart for a number three tub. Pour water on him and boil him until the feathers drop off. Take out the feathers. Pick out all the bones and leave the meat in a pan with red clay and make a poultice apply to the wart. The wart will soon disappear.
Don't worry if a wart happens on your nose. It will go away. Just keep this list of cures handy and apply one of them in your own way and watch the wart thing go away. Here is another one of the Kentucky State Forest Fire Logs which will be set out during certain hours; exemptions: (1) During the months of March, April, May, October, November, and December, even though the precautions provided by KRS 149.250 shall have been taken, it shall be unlawful for any person to set fire to, or to procure another to set fire to, any brush, leaves, grass, debris, or other inflammable materials capable of spreading fire, located in or within two hundred feet of any woodland or brushland, except between the hours of 4:30 p. m. and 12:00 midnight, or when the ground is covered with snow. (2) This section shall not apply to fires which may be set for the purpose of burning tobacco plant beds, nor to fires which may be set within the corporate limits of any city or town, or in the burning of high grass and decayed timber under the supervision of a competent employee on any railroad right-of-way that is being cleared of such material in compliance with KRS 27.220 (2). (3) This section shall not apply to any railroad employee shall be extinguished before the employee leaves the vicinity of the fire. (1848, c. 203, Sec. 2, 3, 1850, c. 91, effective June 15, 1950).

## Once Popular Thrash Blowers On Way Out

By *Clayton Houndshell*

If your baby is fretful, feverish and crying, if Mommy must walk the floor night and day, juggling the little fellow up and down in her arms to pacify him, if there is a "breaking out" on a rash inside its mouth and about the lips, then chances are the baby has the "thrash" and it's time to bundle it up and head for the nearest thrash-blower.

Doctors might be better for curing the thrash, and no doubt they have a different name for this childhood disease. But doctors have never been plentiful or easy to get to in most of our rural mountain sections, and we have always taken our young ones to the thrash blower and received good results.

The late Uncle Sherman Bradley of Lee County cured the thrash in this correspondent's mouth when he was only a small tot. You see, Uncle Sherman had never seen his father, and that is why he could cure thrash. Also, if you happen to be the seventh son of a seventh son, you can cure the thrash by blowing into the mouth of a child with this device.

Thrash blowers are becoming scarce. Maybe fewer seventh sons of seventh sons are being born, maybe fewer sons are being born who never see their fathers, or maybe roads, telephones and more medical doctors nearby have made a scarcity of thrash blowers. Probably the coming of more doctors into rural areas has more to do with the thrash blowing into a youngster's mouth to cure the thrash than any other factor.

"Clayton Houndshell will tell you I ain't no doctor. I give no medicine, and I charge no fees, but I have never failed to cure but one case of the thrash in my life. When a middle-aged man washes a squealing youngster what has a mouth broken out with the thrash and asks me to blow into its mouth, I never refuse. The mother never tells the blower will cure the child and I believe that it will cure the child.

The reason that I failed to cure this one particular child was that it was my very own youngster. A person cannot blow the thrash from his own youngster.

"A feller what can cure the thrash can also blow out fire from a burnt period.

Houndshell, a disabled veteran of World War I, feels it his duty to help the mothers of his community by keeping their children's mouths free of the thrash.

He says, "Me crippled up like I am with this arthritis, I ain't fit for much of nothing else."

He is boasting when he tells you, "I would like to see all the youngsters in a pile that I have cured. This house and porch would not hold them. I have had as many as four a day. I have been met at postoffices, stores or anywhere that a mother thought I might be upon that particular day. Just the other day there were four mothers with their youngsters awaiting for me at the Primrose postoffice. I cured those youngsters right there.

Houndshell is a busy man with his thrash-blowing cure for babies. He is able to do so, it seems, because he has never seen his father. He cannot tell you the exact nature of his curing method, because to do so would cause him to be unable to cure again.

But he can tell you that he blows nine times into each victim's mouth, blowing at three intervals of three blows each. The time between blows is determined by the length of time the child takes to get its breath or to get over its squalling mad spell because of the previous blowing.

Nine blows, he says, will cure.

and he claims that he can tell the exact instant the baby is cured.

"A little one will consent. The end of my tongue right in the time the child begins to get well," he will tell you.

There are two kinds of thrash—red thrash and yellow thrash. The yellow thrash is the scarier kind, and many times after a blower has cured this type, it might be followed by the red type. Sometimes mothers mistake the appearance of the red thrash as a sign that the blower failed to cure. Not so, Houndshell says. It will take a second blowing to cure the scarier thrash.

As Houndshell sums it all up: "A mighty lot of swell heads will think there ain't nothing in this blowing-away of the thrash and that it is caused only by a foul smell, but I have cured hundreds of mothers on my side that know I cured the thrash in their little youngsters' mouths."

"Parents have been warned that if the disease 'goes through' the child, it possibly will prove fatal. Now the thrash blower, in on his way out; but to many in the mountain sections, he has served a useful purpose.

### Farm Horse, Mule Population Declines

The farm horse and mule are on the way out. The old oags and ornerly mules once essential to farm work are being replaced by tractor and truck. The agriculture department's Jan. 1 livestock inventory showed only 3,662,000 horses and mules on U. S. farms. This is a 10 percent decline since 1915, and about two-thirds less than the 11,950,000 in the 1945 inventory. Just as the peak population of 21,431,000 horses in 1915 was pulled down by the automobile, the 1922 half figure of 8,918,000 in 1922 has been reduced by mechanized agriculture. The department no longer gathers separate statistics on the animals, it began lumping them after the 1954 count showed about three million horses and fewer than 1.5 million mules.

### Dr. Pogue Of Murray Is Slated As Chapel Speaker March 22

Dr. Forrest C. Pogue, historian, specialist in international relations and diplomacy, and professor of history at Murray State College, will be speaker at the March 22 chapel program at Morehead State College. Dr. Pogue has received wide recognition for his history of General Eisenhower's World War II command in the Pacific in Europe. The volume, "The Supreme Command," was published in 1954 by Combat Forces Journal as one of the year's ten best books on military history. Just completed is "The Meaning of Yalta," which was written by Dr. Pogue in collaboration with three other historians. The book is to be published next month. First-hand knowledge of foreign relations has been acquired by Dr. Pogue through extensive travel, mostly in Europe, at various times since 1937, and through his work with the U. S. Army. He served as combat historian with the First U. S. Army, from Chabla Beach to Pilsen, Czechoslovakia, in 1944-45; as liaison officer with the U. S. Army Headquarters, Germany, in 1945-46; and as historian for the Department of the Army from 1946-52. From 1952-54, Dr. Pogue was Operations Research Analyst attached to the U. S. Army Theater Headquarters in Heidelberg, Germany. In preparation for the book on Eisenhower, Dr. Pogue interviewed more than 100 naval, air and political leaders, including General de Gaulle, Marshal Juin, General de Lattre de Tassigny, Lord Mountbatten, Lord Ismay, General Bradley, Admiral Leahy, Admiral King and others. Dr. Pogue received his A. B. degree from Murray State College, his M. A. from the University of Kentucky, and his Ph. D. from Clark University. He was an American Exchange Fellow at the University of Paris in 1938-39. He has taught at Western Kentucky State College as well as at Murray, and at various times was professional lecturer in international relations and diplomacy at George Washington University.
