Radio Station Ownership Changes Hands

Combs, Havens, Mauk, McBrayer, Whitaker Purchase WMOR Stock

Ownership of Morehead's radio station, WMOR, changed hands this week subject to approval at Washington of the Federal Communications Commission.

Five local people, Tommy Combs, Frank Havens, Earl McBrayer, Joe Mauk and William Whitaker, purchased all stock from William J. Sample, Claude Clayton and Roy Corlette.

The previous owners shared equally in the enterprise. Transfer of the stock and the financial transaction was handled by Alpha Hutchinson, Real Estate Broker. Such transactions must be approved by FCC, which grants the operating permit on the first day of the month following the date of the transfer.

22 Strawberry Meetings Scheduled

Civic promotion to expand production of strawberries in Rowan County will be carried to community centers with 22 meetings. It was announced today by the Chamber of Commerce.

Twelve citizens are donating their time to make the public appearances, mostly at rural schools.

In addition to an open forum the groups will specifically discuss: cultural practices; report of previous years; how a cooperative works; marketing strawberries; and ordering plants.

The teams that will make the public appearances include: Team 1—Ralph Wade, H. K. Taylor, Marvin Tate, H. H. Lay and William Whitaker.

Team 2—Adrian Razer, Bruce Botta, Robert Bishop, Alpha Hutchinson and W. E. Crutcher.

Several producers who will tell of their experience and profit from strawberry production will also be on the programs. Farmers will be invited to ask questions.

Rowan County has become a strawberry center for this area. Over 200 additional acres were harvested this spring as a result of a community undertaking in which merchants gave \$50 in trade to any producer planting an acre or more.

Strawberries as a cash crop has spread to nearby counties and farmers in Bath, Menifee, Carter, Morgan, Elliott and Montgomery are members of the Licking Valley Marketing Cooperative which handles most of the berries. A "labor pool" at picking season has also been formed.

Morehead is also the site of a freezing and processing plant. Taylor, who has spearheaded the strawberry crop and increased production, said the meetings in Rowan County have been scheduled at the following places, all starting at 7 p. m.:

First Voters Hear Wetherby, Cooper Disagree On Who Is To Blame For Lack of Federal Aid To Education

About 2,000 first voters—18 and 19 year old college and high school students—heard the principles, philosophies, aims and objectives of the Democratic and Republican parties exposed by party stalwarts at Eastern Kentucky University in Lexington. The speakers found a ready audience among the young

of Democrat and Republican supporters, respectively. Both were applauded when they reached the stadium and the high school and college students seemed to hang on every word.

Gulf Interstate, which operates natural gas transmission lines from the Gulf of Mexico to the Ohio River, will have an open house at its district headquarters here Saturday.





Ordinance Permits Only 2 Pets

Commissioners Pass Regulation Governing Livestock, Fowls

Morehead's City Commissioners, besieged by complaints of stray packs of dogs and reports of strays becoming nuisances in the city limits, put in effect today an ordinance that—

1. Permits only two dogs to have two pets if they are not vicious or diseased;

2. Makes it unlawful for any livestock, fowls and animals to be kept or run at large in the city and its suburbs; and

3. Makes it unlawful for any truck hauling livestock or animals to park in the city limits for the purpose of inspection, examination, sale or purchase.

The ordinance, exempting the Morehead stockyards and adding to the ordinance appears on page two of this section.

Mayor William H. Lays for cash offense is provided.

Commissioners put teeth in the ordinance by allowing numbers of stray dogs and sheep some trucks are selling livestock on the streets.

ORDINANCE AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF LIVESTOCK, FOWLS AND ANIMALS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, PROHIBITING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF SUCH LIVESTOCK, FOWLS AND ANIMALS, EXCEPTING M.A.L.S. AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Board of City Commissioners of the City of Morehead, Kentucky, does ordain as follows: Section 1. In the public interest of health, welfare and sanitary conditions it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or harbor any livestock, fowls and animals, except swine, within the corporate limits of the City of Morehead within 200 feet of the closest point of any residence built or hereafter built within said city; except such animals as are exempted in Section 3 and 4 of this Ordinance.

Section 2. No person, firm or corporation shall permit any livestock, fowls or animals owned by them to run at large on the streets, alleys or public or private property of others, with the exception of such animals as are excepted in Section 3 of this Ordinance; and any livestock, fowls or animals found running at large in such manner may be impounded by the police officers of the city and if not claimed within 24 hours, sold or destroyed by the police or other officers.

Section 3. Nothing contained in this Ordinance shall prevent any person from owning, keeping or harboring animals as personal pets, provided they are not kept for other persons for profit; for sale to others; or in excess of two out of door, adult pets, dogs or cats, per family, within the pro-

hibited limits of residences within the corporate limits of the city. Provided further, that dogs, cats and animals pets shall be permitted to run at large unless of a vicious nature so as to require their confinement in the interest of the public health and safety as provided herein or in other Ordinances of the city.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any swine, pig or hog, within the City Limits, except that such swine and other animals may be kept at the Stock Yards, located at Rowan and Bridge Streets, for a period not to exceed twelve (12) hours before the day of the regular stock sale and twenty-four (24) hours after the close of sales on said day.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to stop or park any truck or vehicle, transporting animals, upon the streets of Morehead or any other place within the City Limits for the purpose of inspecting or examining, for sale or purchase except, however, not to be construed shall prevent trucks or vehicles hauling animals from stopping, parking, loading or unloading at the Stock Yards at Rowan and Bridge Streets and the area adjacent thereto.

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation, violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$25.00 and the costs of the action for each offense; and each day in which such violation shall be permitted to exist shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 7. All ordinances or conflict herewith are repealed hereby.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall become effective as soon as passed and published according to law.

# Vettner Holds Officials' Clinic At Morehead

All rule changes were covered during the clinic. Several major changes have been made from the coming season. The more important changes made are as follows:

- (1) H and V spaces are no longer marked on the foul lanes.
- (2) During a free throw, a personal foul by the two lane spaces occupied by two opponents of the free thrower and no other player. This is the free thrower's second foul.
- (3) Throw-ins are prohibited from the free throw line extended.
- (4) If a foul occurs after the second half, the free throw or throws are a part of the second period if the foul occurs during the period if the foul occurs after the foul occurred. If the score is tied, the free throw is a part of the first period.
- (5) A "jump ball" begins and ends at the moment it leaves the hands of the players.

The basketball clinic is a regular feature of the officials' plan to officiate at the fall season. A total of 46 officials from 15 counties and 10 cities were seen by the clinic. All present are members of the Kentucky Association of Basketball Officials.

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



## City Lends Support To Highway Bonds

The City of Morehead officially threw its support today to the \$100 million highway bond issue to be voted on in Kentucky Nov. 6.

The City Commissioners and Mayor William H. Layne issued a resolution pointing out that the bonds meant no additional taxes but would be principally derived from heavy truck revenue and Kentucky is not in a position to take advantage of Federal matching funds unless the bonds are voted.

The resolution reads: "WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, did at the Second Extraordinary Session in 1956, pass an Act authorizing the execution, sale and delivery of \$100,000,000 principal amount of Commonwealth of Kentucky General Obligation Bonds, the proceeds from the sale of which will be used to match federal funds for the construction of highways, bridges and tunnels in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and providing for the submission thereof to the voters at the general election to be held on Nov. 6, 1956, and

"WHEREAS, said Act provided for the payment of the principal and interest of said bonds out of licenses, excise taxes and fees relating to registration, operation and use of vehicles on public highways and excise taxes, use and license taxes relating to gasoline and other motor fuels used upon the public highways in Kentucky, and

"WHEREAS, it is generally known that Kentucky Highways and Roads are not on a par with other states and realizing and believing from the best informed sources, that Kentucky will not be in position to take full benefit of federal aid unless the Bond Issue is adopted and approved by the voters at the November Election it is

"THEREFORE RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the City of Morehead, as follows: That they are cognizant of the need for good Streets, Roads and Highways and being aware of the difficulty in obtaining enough money to match federal aid money, recently appropriated by Congress of the United States, do hereby go on record as favoring the passage of the Bond Question by the voters at the coming November Election and do hereby urge the voters and citizens of the City of Morehead and Rowan County to

actively support and vote in favor of the Bond Issue.

"Passed, adopted and approved by the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the City of Morehead, in Regular Session held on October 9, 1956."

Gulf Interstate Gas Company, whose new Section 1A headquarters was recently completed, has announced that it will hold an Open House on Saturday, Oct. 20, between the hours of 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. The citizens of Morehead and Rowan County are invited to inspect this new addition to Morehead's business community, located at 735 Main Street in Morehead. Light refreshments will be served.

Both the attractive office-shop building of the construction unit, approximately 3,000 square feet of floor space, and the residence of the Section Superintendent and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Powell, will be open to the public.

The new construction in Morehead is the latest step in the expansion program of Gulf Interstate, whose headquarters are in Houston, Texas. The company began operations Nov. 1, 1934, delivering natural gas to its sole service customer, United Fuel Gas Company, of Charleston, W. Va. Since that date, the gathering system in southern Louisiana has been expanded, and a new experimental compressor station has been constructed at Stanton, Ky. The latter project represents the first remote-controlled, fully-automatic natural gas compressor station in service in the United States. The station has been an outstanding success.

An added 8,000-horsepower compressor recently went into service, and four additional compressor stations, patterned after the Stanton Station, are under construction on the 850-mile main line. By Feb. 1, 1947, a total of 10,000 horsepower will deliver a maximum daily volume of 460,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas per day to United Fuel Gas Company.

In charge of District 1, in which Morehead is located, is L. John Amy, whose headquarters are at Clementsville, Ky. R. C. Powell is Section Superintendent of Section 1A. Other supervisory Gulf Interstate personnel in this area are Ralph Williams, Measurement Engineer, Allie Young, Pipeline Foreman, and Paul Palmer, Measurement Inspector.

debate over integration during the last Congress and added: "Even Senator Clements in an address at Louisville, admitted that Democrats and Republicans were both to blame for failure of the congress to make the educational appropriation."  
Both speakers said they were for federal aid.  
"The Republican nominee said he was getting a little tired of hearing the Democrats accuse the GOP of favoritism to special groups. 'I don't know of any little people in the United States,' he declared. 'They're all the same to me.'"  
"The applause was heavy when Cooper said 'our people don't want another 16 years of war. They're tired of always being in war, getting prepared for war or getting out of war.'"  
Peace during the Eisenhower administration is one of the principal GOP claims.



As an aftermath of Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 7-13, the State Department of Health urges all Kentuckians to observe these rules for safety throughout the year:

1. Keep wiring in good condition. Don't string wires under rugs, over hooks, or in exposed places.
2. Keep fireplaces screened.
3. Keep matches away from small children.
4. Don't smoke in bed.
5. Check your heating system annually. Keep stove pipes at least 18 inches from walls, or burnable materials. Keep chimneys clean and in repair. Never use kerosene or gasoline to kindle a fire.
6. Keep your premises clean and free of debris.
7. Watch where cigarettes are thrown. Have a conveniently-placed ash tray wherever necessary and advisable.


