Students to visit laboratory during trip

A group of 25-30 Morehead State students will visit the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory, in Ocean Springs, Miss., April 13-21.

According to Dr. Gerald DeMoss, professor of biology, the purpose of the field trip is to give biology students interested in invertebrates and geology students interested in marine science "hands on" experience.

DeMoss, coordinator of the trip, said visiting the research laboratory offers students an opportunity to ap-

ply what they've learned in the classroom. "It's hard to study oceans in Kentucky," he said.

Some of the activities during the weeklong stay include hand coring of marsh sediments, the collection of marsh fauna and flora, a tour of NASA-National Space Technology Laboratories at Bay Saint Louis and boat trips to nearshore waters of the Mississippi Sound and the Gulf of Mexico.

No credit is earned during the trip, and students are expected to make up

anything they miss from their other classes. However, "the ones that go down have a much better general knowledge, and do better on the exams from their experience," said Charlie Mason, professor of zoology.

Facilities available for the study group's use are accommodations in the laboratory's dormitory, classroom laboratories, a dining hall where students may prepare and serve their own meals and the 38-foot, diesel-powered trawl boat, Hermes.

Both DeMoss and Mason will be accompanying the group. "It's an opportunity for students to learn and enjoy," said DeMoss of the trip. Mason said, "It's not a fun-in-the-sun type trip, but it can be fun."

Nightclerk system review

The nightclerk security system is under review to improve cost effectiveness and evaluate the benefits of the system, according to Jim Morton, director of the Office of Student Housing.

Another security system under consideration is the key system, in which each resident would have a key to open the outside door. Included in this method, the lobby doors would be locked at a certain hour when the residents must use their keys to enter the residence hall.

Morton said the system would place more responsibility on each resident for his or her own security. The key system preliminary estimated cost is \$22,000-\$25,000. Morton said, "The key system would be much lower in cost" than the nightclerk system already in use.

This method of security, among other methods, is also under review by the Office of Student Housing and the Office of Student Development. The combined offices are not certain which method will be used, if any changes are going to be made.

Work nearing finish

Construction on Palmer House, located on the corner of University Street, is almost finished and offices will soon be moved there.

According to Porter Dailey, vice president for Administrative and Fiscal Services, the Development Staff and the Morehead State University Foundation, Inc. staff should move into the house the week of April 8. The name of the house will be changed to the Development House.

The Palmer House was a private residence before it became university property. It was then used as a home demonstration house for the Department of Home Economics.

Former mayor dead at 76

William H. Layne, 76, former mayor of Morehead, died Tuesday March 19, at St. Claire Medical Center after a short illness.

Layne was elected mayor in 1947 and held the position for 26 years. He was an active Republican and had been a member of the GOP State Central Committee.

Layne owned rental property and at one time operated Layne's Men's Store in Morehead, Owensville and Olive Hill before he retired from the business in the 1970's.

Layne was a Johnson County

native and attended high school at both Berea and Paintsville. He played football for both schools. He attended Morehead State Teachers College and the University of Kentucky and played football for both schools.

Layne was a member and chairman of the Rowan County Board of Education in the 1930's. He was also past president of many other organizations in Morehead. He belonged to Oak Hill Shrine Temple in Lexington.

Layne's wife, Frances Elizabeth McKinney Layne, passed away in 1983. He is survived by one son, William J. Layne, in Morehead; four sisters; and two grandchildren.

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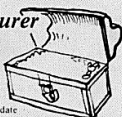
