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## SA president facing charge

The Student Court will meet at 8 a.m. tomorrow to take action on a charge leveled against Student Association President Mike Fox.

The charge deals with Fox's alleged illegal posting of campaign posters during the race for re-election as SA president.

Student Court Attorney General Duane Osborne filed charges against Fox on April 9.

The charge alleges that Fox placed posters in areas specifically forbidden by the SA campaigning regulations.

Fox's posters have been seen in classrooms, offices and on residence hall television sets, all against regulation.

The SA spring election rules for 1985 state: "All political advertising should be put on bulletin boards, which are designated for general use and/or other areas designated by the Student Association. There will be a limit of one (1) poster per candidate per SA board, not to exceed 16 inches by 24 inches. No campaigning materials

will be allowed on trash cans, utility poles, buildings, doors, trees, or other places deemed inappropriate. Fox, however, stated that he had no knowledge that his posters were being placed in the violating areas. According to Fox, several people helped him place the posters around campus and all posters were placed in legal locations.

"I'm responsible for my campaign materials," Fox said, "but I'm not responsible for whatever other people do with them."

## Primary winners announced

The results of the Student Association primary election are in and the list of candidates for the general election has been made.

The presidential candidates are Mike Fox and Ben Eden. Vice president candidates are Margaret Holt and Todd Stewart. Treasurer candidates are Blaine Holtkamp and Dwayne T. Jutt.

Other candidates are Tyson J.

Cummings and Kim May for secretary. Public relations candidates are Joe Hamner and Amy E. Holton. Programs director candidates are Lee Elmer and Diane F. Osborne.

Election turnout included 701 student votes, which is 16.7 percent total enrollment of full-time students. Ben Eden led the presidential candidates with 334 votes. Mike Fox was second with 183 votes and Roy Downey, who was eliminated from the general election, was third with 144 votes.

The winners of the vice presidential primary were Margaret Holt with 314 votes and Todd Stewart with 243 votes. Tim Long received 89 votes. Treasurer candidates were led by Blaine Holtkamp with 174 votes. Glenn Meade received 47 votes. Eddie Plummer, 120, Tracy Buchanan, 78, Eddie Smart, 39 and Dwayne T. Jutt, 183 votes.

The general election will be held on Tuesday, April from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the first floor of ADUC.

## Candidates stress student voice

Mike Fox, who hopes to be the first Student Association president to be re-elected since 1968, says he is best qualified for the position because, "I'm not going to have to start from the beginning."

Fox said although Ben Eden and Roy Downey, two opponents in the primary, would be able to do the job, "a lot of things you have to learn on your own, and you make mistakes. I'm not going to make those mistakes again because I do have that experience."

Fox said he was not having his platform on more ice and change machines or more parking, calling them "too trivial" to be part of a campaign. He said these were things he would be working toward anyway since "one of my responsibilities as president is improving the campus."

Instead, Fox said he is running on his abilities to "relate well with students to know what they want and need" and "to work with the administration."

Fox said that most changes at the university must be implemented through the administration and in his year as SA president he has built their respect and developed "a good working relationship."

He said he has already started talking with the administration about upgrading the weight room, asking that the Student Association be allowed to borrow \$154,000 from the university in order to buy new equipment and move the facilities to a larger area.

Comparing the planned weight room to the TVs students may rent at registration, Fox said he would like to see the facilities "run like a spa" with students paying \$20-\$25 per semester for the privilege of using the equipment. He pointed out this cost would be far less than joining a privately-owned health club.

Association for the past three years. He is a past Public Relations director and is the current SA vice president.

"I see the SA as a go-between among students and the administration," says Eden. "We are very fortunate to have a university president and that person should be very sensitive to the needs of the students and make sure that these needs are taken care of."

Next year, Eden hopes to continue renovation of ADUC, better gamesmanship maintenance, put change machines and Living Learning Centers in most every dorm and better maintenance in all dorms if elected.

Eden also sees a need for improvement in the Laughlin Health Building, especially the weight room, improvements in the Placement Office, located in Allen Young, and better parking facilities around the female dorms.

Eden would like to see continued progress as the SA president. He has a Fund, with new ideas for raising money. Eden said there is a need to prepare for longer hours during the week, for instance, staying open until midnight on Monday through Thursday nights.

"We are all consumers of the university and each one of us makes a difference," Eden said.

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The pomp and pageantry of academic ritual will be the order of the day here Thursday, April 11, when Dr. Herb F. Reinhard is inaugurated as MSU's ninth president.

A full day of activities, highlighted by the inaugural ceremony at 3 p.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center, is in store for the hundreds of delegates from other colleges and universities and learned societies, invited guests and the general public.

Dr. Reinhard, a native of Covington, will be invested his presidential medalion, symbol of his authority as the university's chief executive officer, during the afternoon ceremony.

Other events open to the public include a reception at 4:30 p.m. at the AAC, the Inaugural Banquet at 7 p.m. and the Inaugural Ball at 8:30 p.m., both at the Adron Doran University Center. Tickets for the banquet and ball are \$20 per couple and are available at the University Center.

A private luncheon for the institutional delegates is scheduled at 11:30 a.m.

Student involvement in the Reinhard Inauguration begins on Wednesday at 7 p.m. with a Student Honors Art Show and Chamber Singers Concert at the Claypool Young Gallery. The program is free and open to the public.

Ten individuals will bring greetings to President Reinhard as part of the traditional ceremony before he responds with his inaugural address.

Participants will be U.S. Representative Carl Chris Perkins, representing the Congress; Dr. C. Loone Caudill of Morehead, representing the citizens of Eastern Kentucky; Harry M. Snyder, executive director of the Kentucky Council on Higher Education; Mike Fox, MSU's student regent and president of the Student Association; and David Bell of Morehead, president of the MSU Alumni Association.

Also involved will be Virginia Caudill, MSU's payroll officer, representing the staff of the university; Dr. Stephen S. Young, chairman of the MSU Faculty; Robert D. Duncan of Inez, chairman of the Board of Regents; Dr. Robert A. MacQueen, past president of the Faculty Council of Slippery Rock University.

When Dr. Herb F. Reinhard is inaugurated here Thursday as Morehead State University's ninth president, his audience will include delegates from nearly 100 colleges and universities, including 13 other chief executives.

The 3 p.m. ceremony at MSU's Academic-Athletic Center will also include a display of the official "greetings and felicitations" from 120 institutions.

Dr. Reinhard will become the first MSU president to be inaugurated at a campus site other than historic Betton Auditorium. The Academic-Athletic Center was selected because of its larger seating capacity, parking

## Downing reschedules; lecture next week

Colette Downing, best-selling author of *The Cinderella Complex*, will speak at Morehead State University April 18, under the sponsorship of the 1984-85 MSU Concert and Lecture Series.

Originally scheduled to open the second half of the 1984-85 season on Feb. 13, Downing has been rescheduled to appear at the 10:20 a.m. lecture in Betton Auditorium.

A successful contributor to such magazines as *Harper's*, *The New York Times Magazine*, *New-View* and *Redbook*, Downing has been writing about women's issues for many years.

"In my best work, I have used myself as a bellwether," Downing said. "I examine the underlying bigotries and conflicts in my own life and seeing how these relate to the lives of women in general."

After thorough self-examination, research and interviews, Downing said, she wrote *The Cinderella Complex*, whose theme is "women's hidden fear of independence."

She said that women seem to like her book because she knows, from her own experiences, what they are going through. "I know about having children, about husbands, about divorce and death."

Downing is a mother of three

Porter Dailey, Morehead State University's acting vice president for Administrative and Fiscal Services has been named to the post on a permanent basis by MSU President Herb F. Reinhard.

"I am pleased to be appointed to this position," said Dailey, "and I'm excited about continuing in the administrative organization that President Reinhard has formed."

Dailey came to MSU in 1978 as director of budgets. Previously, he served seven years in the Kentucky Department of Finance, including three years as a policy advisor in higher education. A graduate of

Eastern Kentucky University, he also holds a master's degree from MSU.

As one of three MSU vice presidents, Dailey is responsible for about 350 employees involved in physical plant operations, business services, food services, safety and security, personnel, purchasing, computing services, budgets, printing and communications services. "Our primary focus is responsiveness and service to the campus community," said Dailey, "I look forward to the challenge the job presents and the chance to continue a working relationship with the division of administrative and fiscal services personnel."

## Instructor workshop held

MSU's nursing program will be hosting a workshop April 18 that will teach the teachers how to teach.

The workshop is for Test Construction in the Health Professions and such topics as the relationship between curriculum, objectives and evaluation procedures will be discussed along with explaining basic principles of designing a test blueprint. Dr. Harriet L. Schneider, Ed.D., R.N. and Professor of Nursing at the University of Mississippi, will be the guest speaker at the workshop. Dr. Schneider has conducted workshops throughout the country on test construction and performance evaluation and has been a staff nurse at several hospitals in New York, and has worked with the National League for Nursing in test construction and test development.

Schneider has had many professional publications and her most recent one is *Effective Test Construction in the Health Professions*. The book gives tips on writing questions and the use of test blueprints.

## Annual horse show scheduled

The Twentieth Annual Horse Show sponsored by the Morehead State University Agriculture Club will be held April 12 and 13 in the Richardson Arena at the Derriencourt Agricultural Complex.

Riders from all parts of the country will compete in 30 classes including saddle breed, walking horse, amateur open and western classes for a portion of the \$6,000 in prize money, according to Dr. Joe Bendisen, professor of agriculture. He said the show is one of the largest horse shows in Kentucky this year.

The MSU complex is on KY 377, six miles north of Morehead. Competition starts at 7 p.m. both nights and tickets are \$2 per person. Children under five years old will be admitted free of charge.

Registration for the competition will be held nightly before the competition begins. Seals are available for horses at \$20 each.

Will cooking appliances be legal in the residence halls, is a question that a lot of students have been asking and the answer is no according to Jim Morton, director of the Office of Student Housing.

The student handbook presently states the possession or use of cooking utensils (electric fryers, microwave ovens, hot plates, etc.) is not permitted in residence halls. "We have related that regulation in regard to items such as popcorn poppers and hot cups," said Morton. "My main concern about the cooking utensils in the rooms are power consumption, fire hazards and maintaining sanitary conditions." Thompson Hall and North Hall are two main power consumers.

If a person is caught with illegal appliances in their room they are asked to take them home by the hall

director. If caught a second time the hall director takes the appliances and puts them in storage. If caught a third time the situation will be handled in a different way.

Some possibilities Morton discussed were letting each dormitory have a designated area in the dorm where students could bring their cooking utensils and prepare their meals. "We are also looking at renovating the residence halls to make space for cooking areas. This is only a possibility. We have not decided whether or not we are going to do it," he said.

When asked why some students would want to cook in their rooms, Morton said, "It's an attempt to stay within a budget, but while trying to do this they are not getting a very nutritious meal."

When a student cooks in the room there is always a risk of something catching on fire in which case the student is held responsible for the damages.

# 'Police Academy II' lacks comedic talent

Thought for the week: Why got send the kids from Angel Beach High School on a camping trip in Crystal Lake?

**Police Academy II: Their First Assignment** follows the very successful formula set by the first *Police Academy*, dumb-cops fighting crime with insanity as well as automatics, and manages to create a few honest laughs along the way. Missing from this film, as well as from the first, is any major comic talent to hold the proceedings together, such as a Bill Murray or John Candy, but the jokes and gag are strung tightly enough to keep the picture from ever totally falling down.

The story picks up the adventures of the same group of misfits who graduated from the police academy in the first film, now assigned to the precinct's head by their old instructor, Commandant Lasard's brother, Captain Per Lasard (Howard Hesseman, largely wasted in a thankless role). Captain Lasard has been ordered to clean up his neighborhood, the most crime-infested in the city, within thirty days or be fired. Chief among the felons they must apprehend is a gang of marauding hoodlums led by the spastic punk Zed (Bob Goldswain).

What follows is the standard farce involving jokes about sex, obscenity, gross eating, toilet humor and dogs (dog's). Sabotaging their efforts is the treacherous Lt. Mauer, who's out to take over the captaincy himself, as well as find out who put liquid cement in his shampoo.

Of the recurring regulars, Steve Guttenberg's Carey Mahoney, certainly the star of the first film, is given less to do in order to accentuate the rest of the cast, though he does

give a good impression of a deranged crook (typesetting maybe) in order to infiltrate the crook's gang.

The rest of the cast fare decently enough, especially human sound effect Larvelle Jones (Michael Winslow), who brings off a hilarious kung fu movie parody complete with his words out of sync with his lips. The romance between trigger-happy Pickleberry (David Graf) and tough-as-nails lady cop Kirkland (Colleen Camp) also has its share of amusing moments.

However, the biggest comic talents in the movie remain George Gaynes as the semi-senile Commandant Lasard, who shows his sympathy to his brother by giving him a broiled goldfish, and Bob Goldswain as the crazy gang leader Zed, a psychopath who speaks in an unintelligible punk accent and cries switching terms of "Family Affair."

Chosen as the most promising new comedian of 1984 by *People* magazine, Mr. Goldswain would seem to have a bright career ahead in motion pictures.

Academy pictures delivers enough laughs to be worth at least sitting through once. Be warned though: in this film intelligence is a capital of fence.

Midnight Star has been in the record business for 2 relatively short time, nine years to be exact. But this nine member, Cincinnati-based unit put its stamp on the term "technofunk" in such a dynamic fashion that *Midnight Star* has become one of the leaders on the contemporary music scene.

The group's last album, *No Parking on the Dance Floor*, produced three hit singles and resulted in *Midnight Star* being the only black group to attain platinum sales in 1983 and double platinum sales in 1984. *Midnight Star's* new album, *Planetary In-*

vasion, is an eight-song collection of dance-and-romance tracks that utilize the very latest in electronic percussion sounds and keyboard technology.

The group was formed in 1976 on the campus of Kentucky State University in Frankfort where its members were enrolled as students. Initially, the group would sneak one another into their dorm rooms to rehearse at a low volume, but in 1977 the group left school to pursue music on a full-time professional basis.

*Midnight Star* was awarded "R & B Album of the Year" by the National Association of Record Mer-

chandisers and the "Amper Golden Red Award" for their hitmaker status. Also, the group has been featured in an hour-long video produced by Gary Deffner (in conjunction with Black Entertainment Television); the video is available for sale and is distributed by Home Video USA.

# Women's and men's tennis teams have disappointing weekend

Last weekend, the MSU women's tennis team played important matches with Notre Dame and Southern Illinois that carry weight in determining who will receive the bid for the Midwest Region to the NCAA tournament.

The matches' results were disappointing for the Lady Netters as Notre Dame and Southern Illinois handed MSU their second and third loss of the season on the road.

Before the Notre Dame match, Coach Beverly Mayhew was dealt two major problems. Third seed Helen Curtis suffered a back injury which inhibited her play considerably and the change from indoor to outdoor courts posed a slight problem.

Against Notre Dame, a team that MSU defeated last season, the Lady Netters recorded just two wins out of

nine. The top two seeds for MSU, Angela Longo and Sally Anne Birch, recorded impressive wins over their opponents.

"I was just determined not to come off the court unless I won," said Birch.

Angela Longo, who started the season off in a slump, is definitely back in winning form as the beat a tough Notre Dame player 7-5, 6-2.

Sally Anne Birch, who remains undefeated in singles this fall season won in three sets. Birch recently was one of three athletes in the OVC voted "OVC Scholar Athlete" for a 4.0 average.

Injured third seed Helen Curtis lost 6-2, 4-6. "The injury inhibits my play considerably. I'm looking at a week's recuperation," said Curtis. Although MSU lost their remaining matches, the Lady Netters need Notre Dame all they could handle.

Fourth seed Helen Hadden lost three tough sets 6-3, 5-7, 7-6. Had-

dson had the upper hand going into the second set. But the senior just couldn't get the breaks going her way.

Vanessa Adams lost in the fifth seed Adams, who did not play at 100 percent due to an illness gave her usual gallant effort.

Freshman Kacey McKay played an aggressive first set, but could not hold off her first loss as an MSU Lady Netter.

In doubles competition, Birch and Curtis and Longo and McKay each won their first set, but lost the remainder of the matches.

The final score was Notre Dame 2 and MSU 2 in a match that was closer than the score. It was a disappointing weekend for the Lady Netters who are being considered for that Midwest bid, it was a disappointing weekend," said Coach Mayhew.

The day after a heartbreaking defeat against Notre Dame, MSU played the number one team in

NCAA's Division II, Southern Illinois.

Number two seed Sally Anne Birch was the only bright spot for the Lady Netters as she continued her incredible season with a 7-5, 6-3 win.

Angela Longo was defeated by the top lady tennis player in the nation 6-2, 6-2.

Helen Hadden once again lost a close match. Helen Curtis and Vanessa Adams both retired after the first set.

Sixth seed Kacey McKay recorded her second straight loss 6-3, 6-3.

Southern Illinois defeated MSU by an 8-1 score.

The weekend was not a total disaster for MSU. The Lady Netters defeated a fired-up Louisville team 7-2 and ended their weekend trip on a winning note by defeating Evansville 7-2.

"We are now going to concentrate on winning the OVC and hope still for a NCAA bid," said Coach Mayhew.

The MSU men's tennis team is off to a slow start this season. So far, the Eagles' record stands at 4-10 overall, 1-1 in the Ohio Valley Conference.

"Although our overall record could be better, we are off to a good start in the OVC," said Coach Jake Nathanson.

Last week, MSU continued their losing ways with a loss to Western Kentucky and Louisville at Lexington.

Junior Paul Hope picked up the slack for an injured Fred Kangwa with an easy 6-1, 6-2 victory.

"Paul Hope is playing great tennis right now on his," said Coach Nathanson.

The preliminary meeting of the Morehead State Athletics Hall of Fame Committee was held last Friday.

The newly formed committee will establish a hall of fame for former MSU athletic stand-outs and will be in charge of inducting those athletes.

The committee was established on a suggestion by President Herb Reinhardt that MSU should have an athletics hall of fame, said Morehead State Athletics Director G.L. "Sonny" Moran, who is chairman of the new committee.

"I am pleased with the progress of the committee," Moran said, "but things are still in a preliminary stage. No guidelines are definite yet."

The eight members of the committee were chosen to represent as many eras of MSU students as possible.

"We wanted a good representation of alumni," Moran said. "The committee has five former MSU students."

"We are trying to cover as wide a timespan in MSU athletics as possible, and we want committee members to be able to relate to early Morehead athletes as well as recent ones."

Moran said he met with athletic directors from the other OVC colleges last week in Richmond to get ideas for Morehead's hall of fame.

"The idea I got for reference material. Several OVC schools have an athletics hall of fame. Those universities have individual guidelines for nomination and induction and they supplied me information about their snags."

In the Friday meeting of Morehead's committee, members discussed guidelines for induction and nomination of athletes such as who will be nominated, how and when they will be nominated and how

they will be inducted.

"Hopefully, we will have our first inductees during the 1985-86 football season," Moran said. "We have no idea who will be inducted yet. Choosing the first inductees will not be the problem, as there are several names that come to mind. It is several years down the road when finding inductees becomes difficult."

Moran said that this was the case with the other OVC schools. The first year the OVC inducted 10 members but in the following years the numbers have decreased.

The Morehead committee met again today to finalize some guidelines and possibly review nominees. Moran said the committee will meet as often as possible to work out details that get the induction process underway by fall.

MSU's golf team took the University of Tennessee to a playoff before losing last week at Pikeville, Tenn., in the Eagle Classic.

"Our team showed some improvement," tied for first," said Coach Chaley.

Ohio Valley Conference play began last weekend for MSU, when Youngstown State Penguins waddled into Allen Field in hopes of starting the young season off on a good note.

But the Penguins waddled out of Allen Field disappointed as the Eagles took advantage of the windy weather and unleashed a potent offense which was led by centerfielder Shawn Johnston.

MSU defeated Youngstown State 11-6 in the first game and won the remainder of two games to sweep the series. MSU improved their record to 10-13 overall and 3-0 in the OVC.

"We played good ball. We cut down on our errors and executed well on defense and offense. When we can accomplish this, we're a good team," said Coach Steve Hamilton.

In the second inning Shawn Johnston hit a three-run homer to extend MSU's lead to 6-1. But two errors by MSU helped the Penguins have a four-run inning to cut the lead to one.

In the fourth, Smith and Johnston both singled allowing Wayne Campbell to step to the plate and hit a RBI increasing MSU's lead by two. But Youngstown State scored in the top of the fifth cutting the lead to one.

In the sixth, Brad Phillips hit a two-run homer with the wind blowing out.

Shawn Johnston then added two more runs, increasing his RBI total to 27 and helping starting pitcher Rob Williams earn a complete game with his third win of two defeats.

"I never look to hit home runs. I just look to hit the ball hard," said Johnston.

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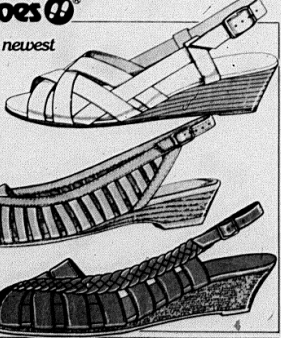

### Reinhard brings strong background to presidency

When Dr. Herb F. Reinhard arrived on the Morehead State University campus on July 8, 1984, to become the institution's ninth president, he represented the most experienced collegiate professional to assume that office since its creation in 1922.

With over 25 years of administrative experience in public higher education, including a very successful five years as president of Slippery Rock University in Pennsylvania, Dr. Reinhard's rich background also involves institutions in five other states.

His career in public higher education began as director of student activities and international student adviser at Auburn University. He later moved to Indiana University where he was assistant director of the Indiana Memorial Union while engaged in doctoral study. His next assignment was as dean of student services at Florida State University, where he earlier had earned bachelor's and master's degrees in psychology.

Dr. Reinhard then moved to Western Carolina University where he served as that institution's first vice president for student development. His next step was the University of Tennessee at Martin for the assistant vice chancellorship for academic affairs.

He spent a year as director of research and chief of college and university affiliations for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services before moving to Florida A and M University as assistant to the president at that historically Black institution.

After accepting the Slippery Rock presidency in 1979, Dr. Reinhard became one of the most active chief executives in the Pennsylvania system and was instrumental in his institution's attainment of university status and in the establishment of a unified governance structure for a system of 14 universities.

Active in various professional organizations on the national level, he currently chairs the Committee on Governance of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and is a Division I representative on the new Presidents' Commission of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A former professional baseball player and professional entertainer, he is a Navy veteran of the Korean War and is a native of Covington, Ky.

His civic activities have included various charitable organizations, youth baseball, Boy Scouts, Rotary International, Chambers of Commerce and others. He recently became a member of the Board of Directors of the Jesse Stuart Foundation.

President Reinhard is married to the former Nancy Warner of Tampa, Fla., also an alumnus of Florida State. They are the parents of four children: Herb III, assistant athletic director at Florida A&M; Don, a recent graduate of Florida State; Mary, a recent graduate of Slippery Rock; and Ann, who will graduate from Penn State in May and enroll in law school this fall at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
