Award Contract For Tar Flat Road In Rowan

Ruth Brothers May Start Construction In A Few Days

The final step to take the people in the productive farm section of Tar Flat out of limestone dust was removed today when the Highway Department at Frankfort officially approved a bid of Kentucky Road Oiling Company (Ruth Brothers) for the project.

The low bid of \$102,999 exceeded highway engineer estimates by almost \$3,000. They thought the construction of the 0.4 miles from Hilda to U. S. 60 via Farmers, would cost \$100,000.

Kentucky Road Oiling has been awarded over \$400,000 for road work on rural and secondary roads in Rowan County in the past 60 days.

Rowan has received more money for its rural roads since July than in the past 25 years or more.

Construction of the Dry Creek, Clearfield and near-Elliottville stretches will be finished in three or four weeks. Ruth Brothers said they were pushing the work. Whether Tar Flat will be completed this fall is problematical.

Members of the council and parents of graded school children said that cars are speeding through the school zone on the Flemingsburg Road and also at a West Main Street school crossing.

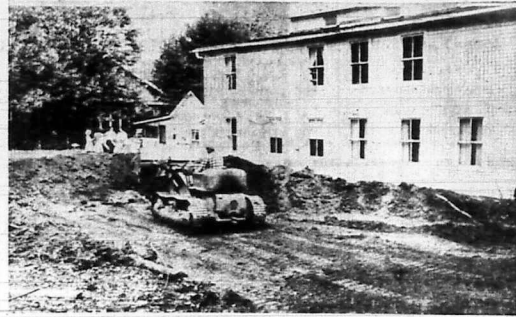
United Fund Drive Talked For Rowan

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State Police Conduct Two More Raids

State Police continued to turn the heat on local option violators by making simultaneous raids on two places in Rowan County at 11 o'clock Saturday morning.

One of the raids was on a drive-around about three miles east of Morehead, the fourth time this establishment has been hit recently.

The other was at Pernel's Grocery on Christy Creek. Captain Vernon Sanders, head of the district State Police force of Northeastern Kentucky, left his desk to conduct one of the raids—this against the drive-around. District State Police chiefs generally do not participate in the actual raids.

Sanders said the drive-around had netted 625 cans of beer, and 49 half-pints of gin, whiskey and vodka.

Julian Lowery, 23, and Roy M. James, 24, both of Morehead, were arrested.

Lowery was charged with selling in possession, while James was charged with possession.

Sanders said both men were in the drive-around at the time and were operating the place.

Lowery and James executed bonds of \$250 each and are scheduled for trial on Oct. 19 in the district of Magistrate Jesse McDaniel.

The raid on Pernel's grocery, seven miles south of Morehead on Ky. 32, was led by Sergeant Eugene Shy. He was assisted by Troopers Shanon Cornan and Estle Coleman.

The officers confiscated 196 cans of beer and 27 half-pints of whiskey, gin and vodka at the grocery.

Corby Stewart, 38, the alleged operator of the store, was arrested and charged with selling and possession. He rendered a \$250 bond and his trial is also scheduled in McDaniel's court Oct. 19.

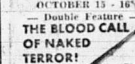

Burley Tobacco To Be Supported At 51.7 Cents

The Agriculture Department announced this week in Washington that for a relatively long term (four or five years) with eligibility for reappointment, gives greater assurance of a complete superintendent and professional planning and execution of school programs, as well as continuity of program. Does the amendment provide for such an improved method of selection? A. Yes, it provides for the appointment of a nine-member State Board of Education and authorizes that board to select the Commissioner of Education (State Superintendent) and fix his term of office and salary. Q. Why change the present set-up for the State Board of Education? A. In addition to its other duties, this board is to appoint the Commissioner of Education, it should be selected from politics as is possible. Q. What assurance is there that the Board will be free of politics? A. The provision as to length of terms of members is one assurance. This provision makes it certain that after the first Board is appointed, no Governor will ever appoint a majority of the Board during his term of office. In addition, the board will be a relatively large one (nine members) and after original appointments, each member will serve for nine years except in filling possible vacancies. Q. Will the new State Board represent all parts of the State? A. Yes, The State will be divided into eight districts as of nearly equal population as possible. One member will be appointed from each district and one from the State at large. Q. When would the new State Board of Education assume its duties? A. On July 1, 1958. Q. Will the new Board appoint a Commissioner of Education or will the present State Superintendent complete the term for which he is elected when it ends January 1, 1957? A. This will be a matter for the Court of Appeals to decide. Q. Won't there be some confusion during the time the Court is considering this question? A. Probably, but this uncertainty should not last long. It can be safely assumed that the Court will act promptly on the question because of the important nature of public education and public interest in its orderly proceeding. Q. How does the amendment insure better continuity of educational planning and program? A. In two principal ways, first, the State Board will be a relatively large one with overlapping terms of members and with the loss of only one member a year by term expiration. Such a board can agree on and adhere to an extensive program of educational planning. Second, since the State Board which originally appoints the Commissioner may reappoint him for another term, such a chief executive officer can work at the same time with his board to assure continuity. Such a teamwork effort of long duration would not be possible under the present law. Q. Does the amendment do anything about local boards of education? A. One paragraph in the amendment appears to create the possibility of a change in the length of terms of members of local boards of education, but this would require legislation by the Kentucky General Assembly. 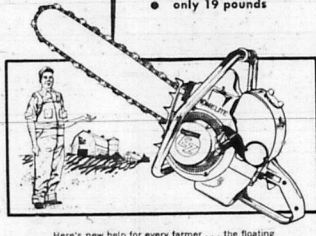

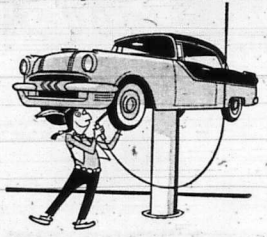

Laws Stringent For Forest Fire Arrests

Oct. 3 was the official beginning of the fall forest fire season in Kentucky. Several of the state fire laws will become effective on that date which only apply during the official fire season. The fire season runs through December.

During the official fire season is the 4:30 burning law. This law, KRS 149.300, states in part that no fires shall be set to brush, leaves, grass, debris, or field containing dry grass, located in or within 100 feet of any woodland or brushland. Between the hours of 4:30 and midnight burning of brushland or woodland is prohibited.

In all there are eight different state laws which apply to the escape or setting of fires in or near woodland or brushland in Kentucky. To enforce these laws, all of the regular employees of the Kentucky Division of Forestry and the Commercial National Forest have been sworn to an oath by an elected official in the Northeastern District.

Penalties for violation of KRS 149.290 and KRS 149.300 are fines from \$10 to \$100 or imprisonment from ten days to six months. In addition, the violator should be liable to the state for burning the person letting fire escape is liable to the state for the full cost of suppressing that fire.

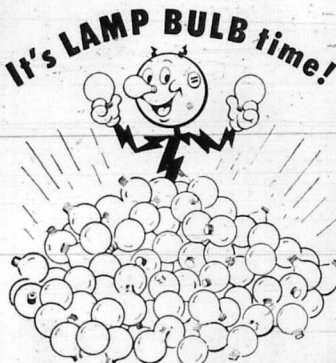

## Directory Shows Industriail Gain

Kentucky has 3,069 industrial manufacturing plants, nearly 400 more than in 1955.

This is indicated in the 1957-58 Kentucky Industrial Directory recently published by the State Department of Industrial Development and the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce. The last directory was published in 1955. The new directory says manufacturing in Kentucky has reached its "highest level of development" and now provides jobs for one of every six persons in the state's labor force and contributes nearly 20 per cent of all personal income.

Average monthly manufacturing employment in the state last year touched a high of 170,630, a gain of 2.7 per cent since 1947. The directory says this compares with employee gains of 12.3 per cent for the nation and 22 per cent for the southeast. Economic Development Commissioner George Hubley said Kentucky had a 2.8 per cent increase in manufacturing employment between 1955 and 1956, the fourth largest gain in the 11-state southern region.

Mastadons Roamed Big Bone Lick In North Kentucky

Since the Commonwealth has announced plans to develop a state park on land near Covington at Big Bone Lick to be acquired by a local development association, interest has grown concerning this spot, known as one of the nation's outstanding prehistoric bonanzas.

Long ago, the sulphur springs and salt formations of the valley attracted herds of mastadons and other gigantic mammals. Many of them mixed in the soft soil and their bones were preserved through millenniums.

Later, the place apparently was a neutral hunting ground for Indians who came from as far north as Lake Erie, not to make war but to kill the deer, buffalo, and other game that habitually visited the salt lick in abundance.

Several parties of American explorers visited the salt lick and used the mastadon ribs for tent poles and the vertebrae for seats. They carried away mastadon teeth weighing 10 pounds each, tusks 11 feet long and five-foot thigh bones. In 1825, Thomas Jefferson, as an official of the American Philosophical Society, had a party gather one of the most complete collections ever taken from the lick but an ignorant servant had the bones ground into fertilizer. All the bones are now gone.

Just before the Civil War, Big Bone Lick became a fashionable watering place for young ladies who had gone into "declines" and for men and women who ate and drank too much and exercised little. A hotel arose to accommodate those who came to drink the sulphur water. But the spa disappeared as other health resorts were followed.
