# Court Could Be Liable For Shortage

Members of the Madison County Fiscal Court could become personally liable if they waived part of a \$30,000 shortage in county funds, the attorney general's office said this week.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Edward L. Fossett added, however, that the Fiscal Court possibly could be in good faith waiver of the interest due on the shortage.

A state audit issued recently that J. B. Arnett, former county clerk, owes the county \$28,148 in excess fees he collected during 1957-58.

County Atty. Salem W. Moody Richmond, wrote that such shortages are subject to a 6 per cent interest. He asked the attorney general to clarify two questions in the case:

# 200,000 More Dems, Republicans Qualify For SS Payments

## New Law Creates Additional Benefits For More State Citizens

More than 200,000 disabled people have qualified for monthly disability benefits under the 1956 law, according to Robert A. Flynn, manager of the Ashland district Social Security office.

Prior to August 1956, the law provided that social security disability benefits must be reduced by the amount of certain other disability payments. Flynn said, however, the 1956 amendments eliminated this offset. Beginning August 1958, no disability beneficiary will see a reduction in benefits because of another disability payment.

Recent figures available show that about 37,000 were drawing only partial payments because they received another disability benefit which had to be subtracted from the social security benefit. Now these people will receive full benefits beginning August 1958. These payments will be automatic, and beneficiaries need not apply for claims at the Social Security office.

Flynn also said that the dependents of disability beneficiaries will still receive full benefits having a right to the children who may be eligible for them at the Social Security office. Benefits are payable beginning with September 1958 for dependents.

On the second question, Fossett said the Court of Appeals has held the relationship between a county official and the county to be that of debtor-creditor and, accordingly, has applied "the five-year statute of limitations that would apply to a creditor's action against a debtor." "Generally speaking," he said, "interest on unliquidated claims between debtors and creditors is not allowable as a matter of law." Such cases, he added, are left to the discretion of the court.

Fossett concluded that the interest could be waived since there is evidence it is believed that the shortage in question was liquidated.

## State Laws Discussed By Educators

School Administrators Make Plans For Legislation At Frankfort

The Northeastern Division of the Kentucky School Board Association met Monday night on the campus of Morehead State College and discussed "The Needs of Our Schools and Needs of Our Citizens."

Addresses by Dr. Adron Duran, Morehead president; Verne Hogue, public relations director of the Kentucky Education Association, and Barton Fluer, executive director of the Kentucky School Board Association, kept the night's activities busy.

Dr. Duran presented the Kentucky Council for Education and related to the group the progress of that organization. The Kentucky Council for Education is an aggressive cover the top of both developing groups concerned with legislative policy and direction in connection with the state's educational program for education.

Dr. Duran explained he continued, "We must find out three things: (1) what kind of schools do the citizens want? (2) how much will it cost to build them? (3) where do we look for the money?"

Hogue, speaking for the K-E-A, related to the other members of the group the state's association fell was necessary. He explained the six-point program which had been proposed. In speaking of the condition of the state's education and the adoption of better proposals, Hogue said, "The final analysis is decided at the local precinct."

In closing, Hogue told the educators, "There are two important things for us to keep in mind as we meet with the state board of education: (1) we must relate these to the local districts."

Fluer addressed the group concerning the expanded program of the Kentucky School Board Association.

## Sheasants Seem To Thrive In Kentucky

The possibility of pheasant for Kentucky hunters is dim stream only months ago, took a new hope.

Division of Game officials in Frankfort announced the initiation of a new pheasant research project, one revolving around the Reeves pheasant, a different, more hardy breed which is the words of State Federal Aid Coordinator Don Strode, "comes closer to filling the bill than anything we've tried before."

Kentucky biologists had worked long and hard to bring the pheasant in the state, but the bird wouldn't take to Kentucky's weather conditions.

Then Kentucky joined a cooperative research project with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, headed by Dr. Gardner Bump. One of the top research men in the nation, Dr. Bump is traveling in remote parts of the world in search of game species existing in climate and habitat similar to those found in the various states. The new research project is the result of Dr. Bump's findings and recommendations.

A native of central China, the Reeves is larger, hardier bird than the Ring-neck and an excellent sporting target.

Kentucky biologists are tabling more concentrated on general merchandise and variety stores in smaller communities, Thurman said.

"The placing of insurance in the hands of unlicensed companies or agents is a risky business no matter how attractive a scheme or plan is offered. It is the primary function of the Department of Insurance to protect the public and it is distressing to find business men who neglect themselves of this protection," Thurman added.

As a final warning, Thurman said Kentucky law prohibits anyone from adjusting any loss on behalf of unauthorized insurers.

## Cheap Insurance Generally Proves Most Expensive

"Cheap" and "bootleg" insurance became expensive after the Insurance Commissioner C. P. Thurman warned Kentucky business men, after receiving information from a licensed Canadian company had invaded the Kentucky market through the mails.

The company, the La Societe d'Assurance Caisse Populaire, doing business through the Belmont Insurance Agency, said it had sufficient assets to qualify to do business in Kentucky, Thurman said. No collectible judgment against this company can be secured, a Kentucky court said and its agents are considered to be without value to Kentuckians in purchasing insurance, Thurman said.

The present attempt by the Belmont Insurance Agency to bootleg insurance "across the border" has concentrated on general merchandise and variety stores in smaller communities, Thurman said.

### Foster's Record On Pigs Excellent

Denzil Foster, Rowan County farmer, has an almost perfect record as pig producer. Last spring Foster saved all pigs that were farrowed from six brood sows (100% pig average per sow). This fall only one pig has been lost from crushing.

From the four sows kept and managed by Foster, he has saved a 215 pound pig average per sow. Foster has used buildings and equipment built on the farm, employing practical versions of farrowing crates. He has a good knowledge of feeds and feeding as well as of other management factors and spent several hours of labor at night during the farrowing season. This has meant much in numbers of pigs saved per sow.

### Suit Challenges Warehouse Order

A suit challenging the right of the Shelbyville Tobacco Board of Trade to restrict its use of selling space has been filed in U. S. District Court by a Shelbyville warehouse. The North Carolina owners of the Big Top Warehouse Co. said that an addition to their warehouse built since the last market season gives them adequate floor space to handle 2,000 additional baskets of tobacco. The former total capacity was 1,000.

The Shelbyville board, composed of the local warehouses, passed a resolution last week permitting them to increase their number of baskets by only 20 per cent during the coming season, the owners said. The warehouse would be permitted to add the same number of baskets each succeeding year until 100 per cent of capacity is reached, the petition said.

# 'Ticklicker' Favorite Of Boone's Rifles

Historians are reasonably sure that the famed "Ticklicker" is located in the Kentucky Historical Society Museum in Frankfort. "Ticklicker" was Daniel Boone's favorite rifle.

It was bought in 1809 from Colonel Gilbert Walden, a self-styled "Southern Eloquent, Rough Rider, and Cowboy Orator." According to Walden it was made for Daniel Boone by a North Carolinian gunsmith by the name of Graham, whose muzzle mark consisting of eight stars indicates that it was made sometime in the latter part of the 18th century.

"Ticklicker" was featured in the Feb. 25, 1925, issue of The American Rifleman. According to the article, there is no contradiction between the period ascribed to the historical society-owned rifle and the characteristics of the first of the Kentucky rifles. It lacks the pronounced crescent-shaped plate common among flocks of the following century. Furthermore, the absence of a patch in the stock marks it as a Southern rifle, perhaps, one made in North Carolina.

The Boone rifle was passed on to Gilbert Walden with the information that Graham made this rifle for Boone around 1760. This, then, was the rifle of all probabilities.

## Morehead Gets Grant Of \$55,700

### National Science Foundation Announces Financial Support

Morehead State College has received \$55,700 for support of a "Summer Institute for High School Teachers of Science and Mathematics" by the National Science Foundation, Dr. Adron Duran, President of the school, has announced.

The Institute will be held next summer for a period of approximately eight weeks, under the direction of Dr. William B. Oswley, Head of Morehead's Division of Science and Mathematics.

Preliminary attempts to secure such a grant were made by the late Dr. Featon T. West. The grant came less than two weeks after he had passed away.

The major objectives of such an institute will be:

- (1) To improve the subject matter competence of the participating teachers.
- (2) To strengthen the capacity of these teachers for motivating able students to consider careers in science.
- (3) To bring these teachers in personal contact with prominent scientists who participate in the institute, with a view to stimulating the interest of their teachers and increasing their prestige.
- (4) To effect greater mutual understanding and appreciation of each other's teaching problems among the teachers.

In directing such an institute, Dr. Oswley will be undertaking his first major activity since succeeding Dr. West as the Division's head. He spent the greater part of last summer attending the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology in Charleston, Oregon, under the sponsorship of the University of Oregon. The attendance at this workshop was also made possible by a grant from the National Science Foundation.

Stipends awarded to participants will amount to seventy-five dollars per week, plus an additional allowance for dependents (up to a maximum of four) at the rate of fifteen dollars per dependent per week.

A travel allowance equal to a single round trip up to the rate of four cents per mile from his home to the institute will be paid each stipend holder.

## Cranberries In Good Supply This Thanksgiving

Cranberries are in good supply. This means they can be used not only for the traditional sauce and jelly, but also for other tasty items. Miss Fannie Gruner, Extension nutrition specialist at the Ohio State University, suggests a cranberry conserve using raisins, oranges and chopped nuts with the cranberries.

The ingredients for about seven 6-ounce glasses are: 1 pound cranberries; 2 cups water; 1/2 cup raisins, chopped; 2 oranges; 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup chopped nuts.

To prepare the fruit, the specialist suggests you wash and sort the cranberries, add water, and cook until tender. Press the berries through a sieve. Wash oranges, and grate peel from them; next remove the white membrane and seeds and chop the oranges.

To make conserve, combine sieved cranberries, raisins, chopped oranges and grated peel. Cook slowly for 10 minutes. Add sugar and boil rapidly, stirring constantly until thick—about 15-20 minutes. Then add the nuts and stir well. Miss Gruner says the constant stirring keeps the mixture from settling on the bottom of the pan, and scorching as it thickens.

The final step, according to the specialist, is to remove the conserve from the fire and skim and stir alternately 5 minutes, then ladle into hot, sterile containers and seal immediately. Label with the name of the product and date prepared.

Senator Knuckles Tells Rowan Teachers Legislature Should Appropriate More School Money

Two of Kentucky's gubernatorial candidates were heard last week by Rowan County teachers at their monthly meeting and both pledged additional state aid for schools if elected.

Hubert Carpenter, Democrat, Louisville, and Senator Denver C. Knuckles, Middleboro, said they recognized the lack of financing in schools and that Kentucky teachers pay is far below most states.

Knuckles also said he would support the veterans bonus, to be voted on next November. Knuckles pointed to "my 100 per cent record for better schools and higher teachers salaries in the General Assembly."

The Middleboro senator, who represents Bell and Knox counties, said he introduced the following legislation at the last session: Senate Bill 248 providing teaching staff will not lose tenure credit when they transfer from one district or county to another.

Senate Bill 77 granting each teacher 10 days sick leave annually, accumulating to 180 days. Senate Bill 183 permitting a majority of the Board of Education to employ a teacher without recommendation of the superintendent.

Opening Sale 'Wonderful' One of the warehouse managers, Foster, declared: "I have been in this business all my life, but I know this is one of the greatest opening sales I have ever seen in the Morehead market is assured, and it has been proved that this main grocer no longer take this crop to Central Kentucky floor."

Morehead Chamber of Commerce President W. E. Crutcher described the Morehead sale in these words: "... this is a great day for rejecting by the farmers of Northeastern Kentucky. No longer will they be subservient to the bigger growers of Central Kentucky... all the time in prayer and of our people have been held here today... it is appropriate our dream has been realized at this Thanksgiving."

(The Chamber of Commerce played a major part in establishing the Morehead market and securing federal graders last year. The Chamber also served free coffee at the Morehead warehouse this week, and signs proclaimed: "We are proud you sold your tobacco at Morehead... there is no finer market. The Chamber also placed advertisements in Eastern Kentucky newspapers glorifying the Morehead floor "our market.")

The Morehead Warehouse reported receipts this morning "exceptionally heavy." Foster said that he believed many farmers of this area hold their tobacco to see what the opening day average at Morehead would be.

Trucks were lined to U. S. 60 this morning unloading leaf at the house.

Farmers generally accepted Monday's success as our victory. The Department of Agriculture met outspoken, stolid and resentful opposition from area farmers a year ago when graders had not been assigned for the first sale. But, this all had apparently dissipated Monday as they lined up at the cashier's window to receive "fat" checks—highest price in history they had obtained for their tobacco.

Average Is Higher The Morehead Warehouse had about a million and one hundred thousand pounds on the floor for the opening sale. This was considered good since most auction floors in the state had 25 to 40 percent less burley Monday than for the first day sale in 1957. Dry weather held back deliveries all over the state.

Last year the beltwise average opening day was \$60.90, and the Kentucky average \$61.92. Government support price this year had been fixed at \$55.40 a hundred.

The better heavier volume grades Morehead ranged from \$63-\$68; lugs \$65-\$66; and firings \$59-\$66. Tips were in the \$50-\$65 range and nonscript from \$40 to \$56.

Most crops sold at \$64 to \$67. No sale will be held Thanksgiving Day, but the warehouse will be open for receipt of leaf. Sales resume Friday and will be conducted at Morehead each day until the market closes for Christmas.

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Gibson said he found toast burning and Mrs. Stamper's breakfast eaten when he entered her living quarters at the back of the store.

Later, it was learned, Edward Amyx had passed up the Grassy Creek road with a tractor and corn picker about 7:45 a. m. and saw a black Oldsmobile car parked by the store. He said he observed the car while backing up twice in order to get around it. The car had Magoffin County license, he remembered, and no one was in it.

When Morgan County Sheriff Phipps arrived about 9:30, the body was still warm.

Coroner L. H. Owens said death was caused by skull fractures and strangulation. In addition to binding her hands and feet with balling wire, the robbers had gagged her with a handkerchief and put tape around her face. She also had been bludgeoned on the head and had two skull fractures, Owens said.

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Sheriff Phipps and State Police said they believed the robbers had tried to force Mrs. Stamper to open the safe or tell them a combination before killing her.

## Urges Driving Care During Holidays

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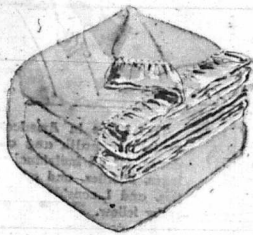

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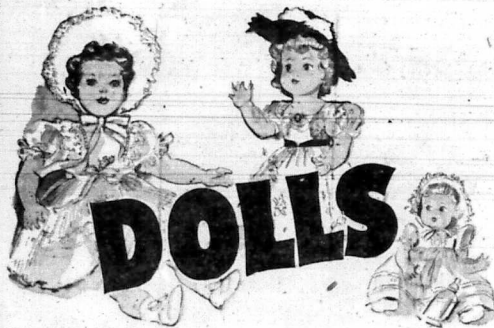

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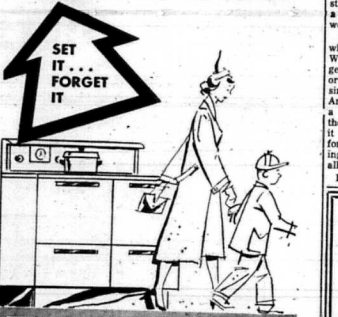
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
