The wave of bombings which has swept heroes the country in recent months must disturb every thinking citizen. The fact that so many of the bombings have taken place in churches of schools seem a smack of the communist hand.

Nonetheless these

The recent bombing of a Jewish synagone in Atlanta was almost as serious, though no one was killed.

Perhaps the most precious heritage in this country is that of religious freedom. Progress in the modern world is made almost proportionately to the amount of religious freedom prevailing in a country and we can never tolerate any tampering with the religious beliefs of physical assets of any creed.

The point is that such religious intolerance should never be condoned and abould be punished. The jury in Atlanta evidently could not be sure enough on the evidence to go along with either of the guilty vector of the punished. That jury had to sentence the defendent to life or electrocution.

Suffice it all to say that freedom of religion is such a precious hertitage of every Ameri-can that any interference in this field should create indignation. One cannot condemn the bombing of any place of worship too strongly, and those who are found guilty of such deeds should be punished and punished sternly.

Moscow, Peiping

The primary hope of the West, as far as its troubles with international Communism are concerned, may lie in the possible future cooling of relations between Moscow and Peiping. The latest news on this subject gives cause for some highly qualified and guarded optimism. According to London sources, Nikits Khruskehev and some of the top Moscow Communists are distinguistically in the contraction of the contractio

munists are disspionited in the recent tread in Peiping. According to these sources, one of the reasons why Khrushchev has favored transferring the focal point of the East-West crisis from the Quemoy Islands to Berlin is that a: Big Power conference on this crisis would not involve China.

It will be recalled that when a summit con-ference was being talked about in 1958, and when Khrushchev had even agreed to attend such a conference, without China, strong ob-jections were raised in Peiping. Khrushchev rried to China to reassure Chinese diplomats




