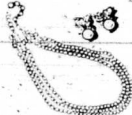

Aid Is Urged For Depressed Areas

Sen. John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.) told the Senate Friday that if any administration expects an effective foreign aid program to be continued by the Congress and have the support of the American people, it must do something to help its own people in the depressed areas of the United States—and do it very quickly.

Noting that there is a growing disillusionment in this country toward the program, Sen. Cooper declared: "I earnestly request the Administration and the Congress to pass some kind of depressed areas bill, and to take

more positive steps toward establishing programs to assist the people in our population who have been left behind in the large sweep of prosperity which this country enjoys.

They proposed an introduction and co-sponsored legislation designed to provide employment for people in distressed areas of the United States. During this Congress, the Senate passed the Cooper amendment which stipulates that the Secretary of Agriculture must supply surplus food to needy people at home before sending any abroad.

Horn Tooting Out Of State. Veterans Visit Capitol, But Governor Is Elsewhere

A 290-car motorcade of horn tooting, out-of-state Kentucky veterans railed into the state capital Friday and protested against their claims of being left out of the veterans bonus act.

In an orderly display of strength, the veterans gathered at the capitol building after a speech-making rendezvous at a drive-in theater five miles west of Frankfort.

Their purpose was to convince Gov. Bert Combs he should call a special session of the legislature to change the bonus act to include veterans now living in other states.

Combs was en route to Washington to attend a Democratic dinner.

Acting governor Alvin Kiddwell, a Sparta Democrat, told the veterans he saw no immediate need to revise the bonus act passed by the 1960 General Assembly.

"We don't believe many veterans will be deprived of the bonus," Kiddwell said.

The delegation was led by Boyce Lyttle, a former resident of Hartian who now lives in Dayton, Ohio.

The veterans, totaling about 500 counting their "families," came from Ohio, Indiana, Tennessee, West Virginia and Michigan.

The bonus act, passed two months ago, says to be eligible a veteran must have been a "legal resident" of Kentucky Nov. 3 when Kentucky voters approved the payments. Bonuses would range up to \$500.

The veterans indicated they are concerned not so much with the money but the "principle of the thing," and that they will retaliate politically unless the law is changed.

The 66-year-old Kiddwell, a veteran of World War I, remained adamant in the face of emotional pleas to call a special legislative session.

"You can make history in Kentucky today by calling a special session and saving it from all the disaster publicity," thundered Lyttle.

He presented Kiddwell with five registration books signed by those chambers with the delegation representing local chapters of the National Organization for Out-of-State Kentucky Vets.

Then the group, led by Wal Treadway of Hamilton, O., a former U.S. Cavalry sergeant, "knocked the governor's office, told him why they now worked in

other states—and said in essence they were embarrassed and hurt because they were not included in the bonus act."

"It's not the money so much as being discriminated as Kentuckians," they said. One veteran almost cried.

Kiddwell said the vets, if necessary, will campaign throughout Kentucky against any candidate endorsed for public office by Combs.

He also said he had assurance from State Sen. H. Nick Johnson (R-Hartan) that no budget bill would be passed in the 1962 legislative session unless something is done on the bonus issue.

Lyttle said Johnson spoke for 28 lawmakers who represented 1,500,000 Kentuckians. He said any campaigning by out-of-state vets would be for Republicans and Democrats alike who said they favored their cause.

"Gov. Combs has not heard the last of us," declared Lyttle. He said he plans to return with a larger stack of petitions when Combs is in Frankfort.

The attorney for the veterans, Edson Smith of Evansville, Ind., told Kiddwell the bonus act discriminated against veterans on two terms, that tended to exclude veterans out of the state on Nov. 3.

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He noted the final decision of who will get the bonus rests with the bonus administrator, Adj. Gen. A. V. Lloyd.

Kiddwell said the veterans should give the law a chance to be tested before calling it unjust.

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The only other lawmaker who presented a group of out-of-state vets in Lexington earlier this month was state Sen. James Hamilton (D-Georgetown), who with former Gov. B. Chandler represented a group of out-of-state vets in Lexington earlier this month.

Farm Facts For Kentucky Folks

European Tour Convinces Writer That America Has Too Much Land Erosion

Report from Britain: This is written from London on Easter Sunday where we have just arrived after a 200 mile trip. The country is beautiful with early spring flowers blooming in gardens and window boxes and millions of sheep grazing the lush pastures that cover the hills and valleys. Britain is fortunate in having fertile soils, moderate temperatures and ample moisture. It is like an enormous Bluegrass country without hot, dry months for barley tobacco. The lambing season is just ending and it looks as if every cow had twins or triplets. One farmer told me that he expects a 70 percent lamb crop and they all come within a three week period!

Here and there the pastures are interspersed with recently planted fields of small grain or potatoes. Wheat, oats and barley are grown for stock. In the mountains the islands are too far north. Vets of wheat often reach 70 bushels and potatoes produce 10 or more tons per acre.

Although much of the land has been cultivated for a thousand or more years I haven't seen a gully since I left America. The lack of erosion, however, is due more to the open soil types and the gentleness of the rainfall rather than to good farm management practices because much of the tillage is done up and down the hill. There is an enormous amount of tree planting going on, especially on the moors of northern England and Scotland, which are now being reforested.

Except for sparse grass and fern-like plants the moors are quite barren and support less than one sheep per acre.

Our contact help but be impressed with the enormous contributions that these small islands have made to the American way of life. From them have come our language and many of our basic principles of law and justice. A

Tests Reveal Certified Seed Pays Dividends

Proponents of certified seed for Kentucky crop seeds, officials of the "certified seed don't cost—it pays."

Laboratory reports on an unlabeled lot of seed bought at a farm auction recently proved it was pure. It cost \$7 cents a pound for 200 pounds of what purported to be Korean lespedeza, and which had no purity or germination tests. Going price in the region—seed of comparable lespedeza seed was about 10 cents a pound.

Here, county UK seed laboratory technicians rated the seed: Purity, 76.85 per cent, germination, 50 per cent, vigor, 8.25 per cent. The weed seed included such field pests as buckhorn, dodder, common filaria, bracted plantain, purpletop, Virginia plantain, beggar-ticks, papadum, witch-grass, crabgrass, butterbeans, large-flower, bristlegass, spiny hula and hell.

B. W. Furtenberg, Kentucky Seed Improvement Association manager, estimated the lot contained actually about 40 pounds (out of 200) of good seed, which made the price per pound run 41 cents a pound.

The farmer decided not to use this lot, but bought certified Rowan lespedeza at 18 cents a pound. Purity was 85 per cent, germination 51 per cent, vigor matter, 4.0 per cent, weed seed 6.02 per cent, and other weeds, 1.2 per cent. The seed lot figured out to cost 19.16 cents a pound compared to the 41 cents for the uncertified lot—plus what he saved on not having to clean up a weed-infested field.

Market Irregular In Monday Selling

Late selling tipped an irregular Stock Market to the downside Monday, but a partial recovery saved the list from penetrating its 1960 low.

A cautious Wall Street wanted to see whether the "rest" of the year's lowest level would result in a break through to sharply lower prices or a strong rebound. Neither happened.

After moving unevenly most of the session, the market began to wobble in the final hour. A burst of selling, accompanied by a late ticker tape sent prices down further—but a recovery drive clipped losses.

Boat System Of Kentucky Approved

The United States Coast Guard has approved Kentucky's new boating system set up by the 1960 General Assembly.

According to Scott Barbour, director of the Division of Boating in the Department of Public Safety, the agency now has federal approval to require registration and numbering of boats July 1.

Boats in Kentucky waters have been receiving numbers from the Coast Guard. After July 1, these boats and others being registered will have to receive their numbers under the Kentucky system.

Registration and payment of fees will be made at circuit clerks' offices.

Barbour said the Kentucky system had received Coast Guard approval under the Federal Boating Act of 1958. The state will supervise numbering of boats, reporting of boating accidents, statistical compilation and furnishing of other boating information.

At the last General Assembly Kentucky joined 31 other states which have boating laws.

The Kentucky law requires that every boat with a motor be registered and sets up a schedule of fees.

Visitors from out-of-state bringing boats into Kentucky will be allowed to operate them for 90 days without registration, if the boats already have registration numbers from other states or federal-issued numbers.

Home Demonstration Week Is Observed

Mrs. Dixie Higgins, Rowan County Home Agent, reports that leaders of homemaker clubs, 4-H clubs, workshops and cooperating organizations have helped Extension Service reach families with home economics information.

Home Demonstration Week is being observed May 1-7 to help acquaint families with home economics work.

Eleven training schools for 204 homemaker project leaders were held in 1959 by Mrs. Higgins. These leaders held 175 community meetings over the week.

Home demonstration work programs are planned by the Home-Makers Council and County Extension Agent. The council has included in the program desires and needs of all communities represented by its members.

Three hundred and forty girls were trained in home economics projects in 1959. The most popular was clothing, followed by other projects like canning and preserving.

Reputational workshops have been held in a community. Mrs. Higgins has conducted and helped conduct training meetings for 4-H leaders who have helped the girls with their project work.

The home agent has worked with families in home visits and office calls on problems of decorating the home, house plans, remodeling, kitchen equipment selection and keeping records.

Co-op Changes Points Of Distribution

Southern States community supply distribution services for the entire north central Kentucky area will be grouped in a new operating region with headquarters offices in Lexington.

This new region is one of 10 being set up by Southern States throughout its five-state operating territory as a step towards reorganizing better service to farmer members of the cooperative.

White Henderson is the only employee named so far for this reorganization. He will be five other key workers to be named shortly.

The new reorganization plan reorganizes the present some 60 operating districts scattered throughout the region into six districts, each headed by a district manager for separate local farm management services.

Several changes have been made in the cooperative's headquarters staff. The present director of the U.S. Southern Marketing regional supply distribution operations under Community Services Administration is J. C. Buehler, who heads local cooperative supply distribution management service.

Farmers Confused On New Burley Laws

By C. H. Fields. Rumors from the country indicate some confusion on the part of some farmers on the new burley tobacco legislation which was passed by the Congress early this year.

This legislation was proposed and sponsored by Farm Bureau. It was based on a regulation adopted by the United States Department of the State Farm Bureau at the American Farm Bureau convention held last December in Chicago. It had the support of the Kentucky Farm Bureau and other tobacco state Farm Bureaus, and almost unanimous support of all segments of the tobacco industry.

The legislation provides that the price supports on burley tobacco for the 1960 crop shall be the same as for the 1959 crop, and that starting with the 1961 crop, the price supports will move up or down in accordance with a three-year moving average of the cost of producing burley tobacco.

This is a good example of developing sound tobacco legislation within Farm Bureau and going to Washington with a solid front. In the past, this has not always been the case.

House Democrats have rammed through, 214-162, a billion-dollar housing bill which Republicans are expected to veto if it goes to the White House.

Before the final roll call vote, the measure in the Senate, the House beat down an anti-discrimination amendment, 235-129.

On that vote all four Negro members—Democrats every one—opposed the Republican-sponsored amendment which a few Democrats denounced as a trick to beat the bill.

A main feature of the measure would provide a billion dollars to buy at face value home mortgages insured by FHA or guaranteed by the Veterans Administration.

It also called for abolition of Kentucky's fee system for public officials during a speech at a Law Day program at the University of Louisville.

Culbick, who wants the public to approve the call for a constitutional convention, said he would like to see these changes made.

Intermediate Court Plan Of Governor

Gov. Bert Conba has urged the creation of an intermediate court that would relieve the Court of Appeals of some of its heavy work load.

1. Permit state officials before the governor and lieutenant governor to succeed themselves.

2. Remove the \$200 salary limitation on officials such as school superintendents, mayors of cities below the first class, city consultants and some college and university officials.

3. Open the way for more home rule for cities and counties.

The constitutional convention proposal will be on the November ballot and Conba said "I am desiring every effort to secure public approval of the proposal."

Afterwards, the governor told reporters he does not consider the veterans bonus a great problem and that he has no plans for a special legislative session to liberalize the law any time soon, if ever.

Kentucky veterans living outside the state have been demanding they be considered for payment.

Federal Mine Safety Act Is Changed

Senate Bill 743, which amends the Federal Mine Safety Act, was passed this week by the Senate by a vote of 80-4. It places all coal mines under federal inspection, but contains four provisions favoring miners' employment in 14 or fewer miners. Senator John Sherman Cooper (R. Ky.), speaking on the bill, said "I fought in the Senate Committee on Labor for two years against the original bill, which would have almost removed the exemption to secure amendments which I believe will protect Kentucky's small mines and the miners who work in them."

Senator Cooper told the Senate "The amendments which we have placed in this bill are the Senate's orders to the Federal Bureau of Mines to treat the small mines fairly and not to put them out of business." He said, "With the mechanization of the large mines nearly one-half the miners of Eastern Kentucky were put out of work, making the region a depressed area. The only employment available to these displaced miners is in the small mines. If the Federal Bureau of Mines should close down the small mines, it would throw thousands of miners out of work and hurt their families and every business in Eastern Kentucky."

Presbyterians Will Hold Their Tobacco Stocks

The Southern Presbyterian Church's General Assembly has turned down an overture asking that church agencies and boards be directed to sell any tobacco company stocks they may hold.

The tobacco overture from the Suvannee Presbytery of North Florida and tobacco is detrimental to health and the church should not be associated with such firms in any manner.

There was some debate on the overture before it was rejected.

The Rev. Clarence E. Strod of Houma, La., said the Committee on Christianity and Health might be asked to look into the use of tobacco. He said he believed the use of tobacco is not so much a spiritual problem as a physical one.

John McCollough of Fort Lauderdale said the use of tobacco is not so much a sin as the selfishness it shows. Recalling that he was a former heavy user of tobacco, he said other users might also refrain as an example to others in the church and give the money saved for church operations.

Dr. A. V. Gibson of Atlanta said if the assembly should direct selling of tobacco stock or even giving it away, because we considered it sinful to have, we would be guilty of causing further harm to others.

If we want to dispose of it, the only way we could do it would be to burn it, if we voted it as a moral question."

Claim Kentucky Has Best Mint Juleps

"We Kentuckians have recently noted with some gratification that our neighbors from Mississippi, Virginia and West Virginia have just learned how to make a mint julep," says Henry Harned, president of the Kentucky Historical Society.

He added that proof of this is found in their recent claim to having discovered the julep in the first place.

Had they even come close to knowledge of the julep's origin or experienced its potentialities, they would have proclaimed its discovery long ago, Harned declares.

Just to keep the record straight, with the Kentucky Derby in the offing and thousands of hearts waiting to thrill to the strains of My Old Kentucky Home and the flavor of a Kentucky mint julep, Harned notes that the drink did not originate in 1861, 1860 or 1850 in Virginia, Mississippi or West Virginia, as some partisans of these states claim. Harned explains:

The mint julep originated during the pioneer days of Kentucky-Bourbon County, after which Bour-

bon whiskey was named, was chartered in 1794, and by 1810 the julep had risen to such acclaim that the premiums awarded at local fairs were coin silver julep cups, the only fitting and proper receptacle for making a julep.

Furthermore, it is made of bourbon not "falcher"; it is made in a coin silver julep cup, not a balustrade bowl or a glass, and it is flavored with mint from the evening shade of the old limestone springs.

And so, to those who would usurp the honor of having first discovered the famous nectar, Harned adds: "We're proud to see you 'courting' this beautiful and luscious nectar. We rejoice and celebrate with you in your late-discovery of this palatable and potent potion, even though the long ago plighted her troth deep in the roots of Blue Grass sod, whilst it was yet the Dark and Bloody Ground."

Man On The Street

Survey Shows That Nixon Would Easily Beat Adlai Stevenson For President

Results of the latest Man On The Street "trial heat" of voter preference show Vice President Nixon holding a good substantial lead over Governor Adlai Stevenson.

This is the way Man On The Street and his people see it at this time:

Nixon 54.6%
Stevenson 44.2%
Undecided 9%

Excluding the undecided vote, the figure became:

Nixon 55%
Stevenson 45%

Two months ago, Man On The Street findings on the same question showed the following: Nixon, 33.4%; Stevenson, 64.6%; Undecided, 1.9%. In other words, since early March sentiment for the two men has remained approximately the same.

Today's split in sentiment among Democrats, Republicans and Independents is worthy of particular mention. For instance, Nixon has more than nine out of every ten Republicans in his camp, whereas, Governor Stevenson has not quite four out of every five Democrats in his camp.

Survey also show that Vice President Nixon outpicks Stevenson among rank and file Independents by a margin of about 12 to 7.

Here's how Democrats, Repub-

licans and Independents voted in today's survey:

Republicans (32% of eligible vote) - Nixon, 93.3%; Stevenson, 6.4%; Undecided, 2.

Democrats (42% of eligible vote) - Nixon, 21.6%; Stevenson, 77.7%; Undecided, 7.

Independents (26% of eligible vote) - Nixon, 62.5%; Stevenson 35.4; Undecided, 8.2.

Today's findings become all the more meaningful when compared with findings of a Nixon-Kennedy "trial heat" survey, which showed Kennedy, 51.4%; Nixon, 47.9%; Undecided, 7%.

And particularly so when the political party breakdown for both Kennedy and Stevenson are compared when they are each run against Republican Nixon.

Per cent of each political group, Stevenson and Kennedy received when run against Nixon:

Republicans - Stevenson, 6.4%; Kennedy, 10.0.

Democrats - Stevenson, 77.7%; Kennedy, 84.0.

Independents - Stevenson, 35.4%; Kennedy, 48.5.

From the above, it can be seen that Senator Kennedy runs 3.6% better than Governor Stevenson among rank and file Republicans when the two are matched against Vice President Nixon.

Among Democrats, Senator Kennedy does 6.2% better than does Governor Stevenson. And among Independents, Senator Kennedy runs 12.1% better than does the former Illinois Governor.

Asks Pope For Facts On Kennedy

A former U. S. District Court Judge Sunday asked Pope John XXIII to say whether Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), a presidential hopeful, or any other American Catholic is bound by principles of the Roman Catholic Church in conflict with the U. S. Constitution and laws.

Retired Justice Albert Levitt of Hancock, N. H., a Protestant and a candidate for the Republican nomination in New Hampshire, said he cabled the Pope asking for a clarification of the religious issue involving Kennedy and possibly other candidates for public office.

"Sen. John F. Kennedy is a candidate for the nomination of president of the United States," Levitt's cable read. "He is a member of the Roman Catholic Church. His nomination is being opposed on the ground that he owes his primary and complete political allegiance to the Catholic principles of the Roman Catholic Church, which are in conflict with the Constitution and laws of the United States."

"Many Protestants and Catholics are distressed by this situation," he said.

"You would clarify this issue if you would state, ex cathedra, whether or not a Roman Catholic is bound by any political principles of the Roman Catholic Church which in conflict with any provision of the Constitution and the laws of the United States."

"I am a Protestant. I make this suggestion with the utmost deference and respect."

Levitt, who retired from the bench about 20 years ago, also has served as assistant attorney general of the United States. He said he is a student of canon law and that there are about 140 principles of the Roman Catholic Church which would be in conflict with the U. S. Constitution and laws.

Then he drew the challenge bars at the application. Asserting that Democratic policy hasn't changed since the administration of Harry S. Truman, he declared "The Truman record is one with which any Democratic candidate will be satisfied. And I'd be happy to run on an Eisenhower versus Truman record."

He told a news conference here he would "build out" the Eisenhower record, especially on the farm issue.

Nixon said he is in the midst of a number of farm studies now and "I do not consider myself bound to any school or any rigid policy."

He spoke to newsmen shortly after he and his wife flew into Chicago to attend a rally sponsored by the Polish National Alliance.

He was asked about statements by Democratic party leaders in Washington Saturday night that he would not be permitted as a presidential candidate to divorce himself from the current Republican regime.

"I have no intention of divorcing myself from the Eisenhower record. The eight years of the Eisenhower administration have been the finest record of any administration in history," he said.

Nixon Says He Will Take Ike's Record

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, on answering a Democratic challenge, said Sunday he has no intention of divorcing himself from the record of the Eisenhower administration.

At the same time, he talked about a "new farm program" to replace one which "everybody agrees is wrong."

Then he drew the challenge bars at the application. Asserting that Democratic policy hasn't changed since the administration of Harry S. Truman, he declared "The Truman record is one with which any Democratic candidate will be satisfied. And I'd be happy to run on an Eisenhower versus Truman record."
