**Ordinance**

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING AN ANNUAL REGISTRATION LICENSE FEE OF \$10.00 FOR THE OPERATION OF EVERY MOTOR VEHICLE OWNED BY CITY RESIDENTS ON OPERATED UPON CITY STREETS IN CONNECTION WITH A BUSINESS HAVING AN OFFICE LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definition: "Resident" of the City is defined as any person who has lived in the City for a period of 30 days during the calendar year during which the license fee for motor vehicle registration is chargeable but shall not include students residing temporarily within the City for the purpose of attending school.

"Motor Vehicle" is defined as a vehicle utilizing more than five horse power engine.

Section 2. Registration and License: Every person, firm, partnership or corporation owning or operating a motor vehicle within said City of Morehead shall register every motor vehicle with and pay to said City of Morehead a registration license fee of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per annum for each motor vehicle so owned or operated. Such license shall not be transferable except upon acquisition of a vehicle which replaces a vehicle already licensed hereunder.

Section 3. Purpose: The proceeds of the collection of the registration license fee shall be deposited in the General Fund of the City to be used in enforcement of traffic laws, laws relating to public streets, street repairs, maintenance and materials, enforcement and administration of this Ordinance and for the expense of maintaining the City Government.

Section 4. Display of Stickers: Upon such registration and payment of such license fee to the City Clerk of City of Morehead, the purchaser shall receive a license sticker which shall be placed in the lower right hand side of the windshield of each such motor vehicle.

Section 5. Purchase and Expiration Dates: The period for which each license during a year shall be valid is from September 1st through August 31st. Persons not qualified for payment of license fee at beginning of license year shall be determined on a monthly basis and not by the day.

A refund shall be made for any unused portion of the license year.

Registration of motor vehicle shall be required not later than September 1, 1962, with license fee paid and display sticker placed on vehicle by said date and on said date each year thereafter.

Section 6. Penalty: All persons or firms required to be registered hereunder who fail to so register their vehicles and pay the registration fee or who fail to display license sticker as directed herein or who violates any provision hereof, shall upon conviction, be fined a sum of not less than \$15.00 nor more than \$100.00 and each day violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 7. Separability: If any part, clause, or section of this Ordinance be declared void or invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portion.

Section 8. Effective Date: This Ordinance shall become fully effective upon its adoption, publication according to law and upon the 1st day of September, 1962.

**Ordinance**

ORDINANCE FIXING TAX RATE FOR YEAR 1962

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF CITY COUNCIL OF CITY OF MOREHEAD, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the property assessment as presented by the Tax Assessor and as adjusted by the Board of Equalizers, be, and the same is hereby approved as the official property assessment of the City for the tax year of 1962.

Section 2. That the City, Rate for personal and real property be and the same is hereby fixed at forty-eight (48) Cents per One Hundred Dollars of assessed valuation for the tax year of 1962 and the Poll Tax Rate be fixed at \$1.20 per male person subject to said tax.

Section 3. That all taxes paid prior to November 1, 1962, shall be discounted at the rate of 2% of the tax bill; that all taxes paid on or after November 1, 1962 and prior to January 1, 1963, shall be the net amount of the tax bill; that all taxes not paid until January 1, 1963, and thereafter, shall bear a penalty of 6%.

All 1962 taxes remaining delinquent on November 1, 1963, shall be collected by levy and sale of property as provided by law.

## Specialist Will Be In Rowan July 9 To Vaccinate Calves; Nitrogen May Harm Tobacco

In accordance with the program set up by the Livestock Improvement Association and the State Department of Agriculture in which calves will be vaccinated three times a year, Eugene Stevens,

state technician will be in the county the week of July 9 to vaccinate calves. All calves that are to be kept and are between the ages of 4 and 8 months are eligible to be vaccinated.

New Insect Has Invaded State

The smut-bone beetle has invaded Kentucky and is attacking maniocas and tulip poplars. This is a new insect for us and the university warns everyone to be on the look out for it. Chemicals for control are diiodin or sevlin. For more information call the Extension office.

### Nitrogen May Be Harming Tobacco

We had a bulletin from the university this week quoting Dr. Val-lean as saying he thinks some tobacco may be getting excessive damage from too much nitrogen. Some symptoms he notes are slow growth, lower leaves yellowing and development of dead spots similar to wildfire. He said much of this may be from a high concentration of nitrates in the soil which have a sort of poisoning effect on the soil. In any event he warns farmers against using nitrogen in this stage of growth of the crop to bring it out of any slowing down of growth or other ill.

### Directions For Control Of Budworms

Several people have reported trouble with budworms this year. For control of this insect you may use DDT, ceptron or sevlin. Follow the directions on the container and spray now and again ten days later. This material used according to recommendations will also control hornworms.

### Care Should Be Taken In Storms

Since most farm people work out-of-doors the major part of the time, it might be well to think of what we may do to protect ourselves in case of electrical storms. Remember that some of the most dangerous places to be during a storm are on tractors, near wire fences, under live trees, on hill tops or on open spaces. Look for shelter in a building protected by lightning rods if possible; in thick timber; in a closed auto; or in a ditch or ravine. Avoid carrying metal objects such as a gun, pitchfork or hoe.

### West Liberty Will Soon Get Bowling Lanes

West Liberty will be the site of a new recreation center by Oct. 1 of this year, announces the AFNE Corporation which was formed in West Liberty recently, as construction got underway last week for the Town and Country Bowling Lanes. Locally owned and built, the building will be of concrete, 150 by 60 feet and will accommodate 8 to 10 Gold Crown Brunswick lanes.

The Town and Country Lanes will also have a snack bar, game room and meeting room and will be centrally heated and air conditioned throughout. Completely modern, the lanes will have automatic pinners, telescopes and submarine ball returns.

## Community Endeavor Brings New Spirit To A Town

What can a town do to overcome the economic troubles that follow the loss of a major industry? Sometimes a great deal, Karl Detzer tells in the July Reader's Digest what two Washington communities, Chehalis and McCleary, accomplished under these circumstances with the help of experts from the University of Washington.

Chehalis, a place of 55,000 population, the professors called for an inventory of resources, and needs. Schools, churches, banks, garden clubs, P.T.A., Boy Scouts and business and professional men volunteered for assignments. Later a thousand people bought \$30 shares in the new industrial Commission.

With the money, 12 acres were bought for an industrial park and a new water system installed. Local residents extended railroad tracks by buying ties, laying the rails themselves, working nights and week ends.

Inexpensive rates were offered to industry.

## How To Enjoy Summer

No sir! There's nothing like a good old summertime sultan to make us look healthy. And when we are glamping off ourselves in a mirror or a store window, we even feel healthy.

Still, we can't eat sunshine — even though it does give us some vitamin D. Thus, the matter of proper nourishment — to make us feel as energetic as we look — can be a problem when it's "hot to eat."

Salads and iced tea are fine, say the experts, but, unassisted, there is a limit to the mileage you can get out of them. Dr. Robert S. Goodhart, noted authority on nutrition, advises that — whether the weather is hot or cold — we need a variety of nourishing foods: carbohydrates, fats, proteins, minerals, water and vitamins for growth and health.

Heavy meals are not necessary and may prove unappetizing in hot weather — and it isn't necessary, eat hot foods. Divide your daily food into three or four equal and relatively small meals to be eaten at regular intervals during the day.

Despite the best of intentions, many people will still be cutting their food essentials below the safety level in the dog days. And for them, supplementary vitamins are probably a good precaution against malnutrition. What this body does to us, we would think, is that the human species can't eat like rabbits and act like men — even with that Taran-type sun.

## Safety Belts Coming

The latest automobile production figures indicate that the use of safety belts in automobiles is steadily increasing. It has been a long fight — to get the public to accept them, and already three states have passed laws requiring them in new automobiles, now or in the near future.

The three states which have acted are New York, Virginia and Wisconsin. There are signs other states will take similar action in the near future.

Safety belts, of course, keep people from flying forward into the glass or into harsh metal when they are involved in automobile collisions. It keeps them in their seat, and tests have proved that this will often save lives.

Even better than putting this over with the public would be a more difficult task than selling the safety belt idea.

If one will not use shoulder straps, then certainly safety belts are also. If every one riding in an automobile were using safety belts today, it is estimated that as many as twenty-five lives a week would be saved in the United States. And many more serious injuries would be avoided daily.

At McCleary, an old lumber town, residents had nothing to brag about but were able to draw up a list of 116 goals. One road block to the community progress, it was discovered was the lack of a bank. So 250 McCleary residents organized the McCleary State Bank with \$140,000 capital. It took in \$150,000 more in deposits.

Other structures went up. The citizens raised the day it opened in 1960.

No two communities are exactly alike, but the happy stories of Chehalis and McCleary present a common pattern of study and action. Challenged citizens everywhere will want to read Detzer's thought-provoking article, however, if only to find out what it takes to get a whole town moving — and how, once it is in the march, it doesn't stop.

"For as he thinks in his heart so is he," says the Good Book of man. And the same would seem to apply to the congregation of men that is a city.

## Our Academic Freedom

There has been controversy in recent years at various state and private universities in the United States concerning academic freedom. Strong reactions have been caused by the banning of speakers at several universities.

Many of the greatest and most famous state universities, including the tremendous plant in California which is the University of California with branches in various places, have championed — correctly in theory — the freedom of speakers to say what they want to say, on the college campus.

After all, freedom of speech is a basic right in the United States and while some speakers may do harm, and incite much misguidance, by what they say, this evil we have found long to be less than the evil of a curb on free speech.

The right to preach and teach the violent overthrow of the U.S. government — the chiefest of the freedom of speech heritage as we know it in this country.

Thus, it would seem that the government authority of any university or college has a sober obligation to prevent this sort of propaganda and undermining, to take place on campus. For it is certainly true that the youthful mind is more impressionable and impulsive than of its elder counterpart.

On the other hand, this should not be employed as a guise for banning speakers because of associations or pasts which we do not approve of. We are told that some of these speakers are sometimes wearing "peace" cloth and that while they do not come out and say it, they are attempting to sell communism in a subtle way.

This is the price we pay for freedom of speech. And if speakers and wolves in sheep's clothing can sell the American people on new ideas and even on communist ideas, and the majority favor these ideas, then they can and should vote them into effect. This would be a terrible day for the United States — and one that, will never come.



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## Timberland Owners Can Get Loan

By Joe J. Mauk  
Many timberland owners are now eligible for loans through the Farmers Home Administration to carry out better forestry management practices, expand forest resources and to convert crop land to forestry uses, according to a recent announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

The loans will include thinning and fire protection, pest control, fencing, clearing land for planting, purchase of seedlings, seed and planting costs, or refinancing debts against forest land. The loans will be long term, up to 40 years, at 3% interest and the maximum will be \$50,000. The loans are authorized under provisions of the agricultural act of 1949.

In addition to the loan program above, legislation is in process for giving assistance to timberland owners for development of recreation, scenic or sports areas on the private timber area. The aid would be in the form of loans and planning assistance, if it becomes law.

Rehabilitation work on the Frying Pan Triangle Tower has been completed, except for some minor clean-up and touch-up jobs. The area is now open to the public. ## Nuclear Waste Plant Causing Concern In Maxey Flats Area

The good folks in the Maxey Flats area of Fleming and Rowan counties are worked up.

Their concern is rampant that the nuclear decontamination and disposal plant will contaminate the water supply, including Lick Creek; make all food grown in the area unfit for human consumption; fill the atmosphere with dangerous radioactive wastes; force nearby farmers to vacate, etc.

We doubt if the U.S. Government would permit such as this, but to be on the safe side we're contacting the U.S. Government, and perhaps Frankfort. Of course, if the materials to be shipped here (in large quantities by rail and interstate highway) are dangerous the people of Morehead would have to be in a forcible objection. After all, Morehead will undoubtedly get the major share of the danger and loss, as everything has to pass through, or near, the town. Most of the waste will be shipped by rail, and the road cars at Morehead.

The Maxey Flats people have pointed out this area is noted as being operated by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, being a private plant. Our experience has been that it's more difficult to collect damages from a company than from good old Uncle Sam who spreads their government checks like raindrops.

A Closely Guarded Secret  
This newspaper probably had the most complete story on the nuclear country editor (and our writer) Wednesday from the governor's office while the agreement was being made.

But, the matter was kept mighty, mightily secret for this prying country editor (and our writer) to have not even a small.

Morehead's Allie Young, Jr., county editor, has been called together as a policy officer from Oak Ridge vicinity Morehead last week. Allie worked for many years at the Oak Ridge atomic plant.

Publisher of the Flemingsburg Gazette must have been a little snuffed at all the secrecy, for this is what he wrote:

"This area has been tried frantically up until press time to find out more details on the proposed plant. None of the local officials or civic leaders seems to have been consulted in acquisition of the land. Mayor James T. Crain, Judge R. S. Stokes, Senator Ed Kelly or Chamber of Commerce President Peter McNeill knew nothing of the negotiations."

**Alcoholism Under Study In Kentucky**  
Five Kentuckians will attend the 20th annual session of the Summer School of Alcohol Studies, to be conducted July 1-26 at Rutgers State University Center of Alcohol Studies, New Brunswick, N. J.  
Richard B. Holt, M.D., acting director, Division of Alcoholism, Kentucky State Department of Health, said the division sends each year several public health workers and other professionals to further their knowledge of the prevention and treatment of alcoholism.  
Those being sent by the division include: John S. Davies, Louisville, administrative director, Division of Alcoholism; John R. Fraser, Jr., Louisville, principal

psychiatric social worker, Division of Alcoholism; Omar L. Giveman, Hopkinsville, educational director, Division of Alcoholism; Gustav Silbers, M.D., Hopkinsville, staff physician and chief of alcoholic unit, Western State Hospital, Ken. Middleman, supervisor of physical education, Jefferson County Board of Education and University of Louisville instructor.  
The school, through a series of lectures and seminars, will present a systematic study of problems of alcohol and alcoholism as well as the individual and society. Lecturers and seminar leaders will be made up of specialists in various fields, Dr. Holt said.

**State Schools Will Receive Evaluation**  
Self-evaluation studies will be made this summer by all schools in Kentucky, Wendell P. Butler, state superintendent of public instruction, has announced.  
"These reports will be used by the state board as bases for appropriate action at the state level," Butler said.  
In the self-evaluation study, Butler urges local educational leadership — superintendents, school principals and school officials — to make a thorough self study of their districts' and individual schools' programs in terms of the purposes for which the schools exist.  
Butler said: "We want the school officials to re-examine and re-evaluate present beliefs and practices with regard to extracurricular activities, athletics, and the use of school time."  
School officials will be asked such questions as whether athletic practice sessions and pep rallies are held during the school day, whether students are dismissed to attend ball games, how many games are played a week and how many games on nights preceding school days.  
"Questions are asked about activities sponsored by groups outside the school, including colleges; activities originating within the school; fund raising drives; and other classroom interruptions such as unsupervised student visiting, public address systems, salesmen, ticket selling."  
Another study soon to get under way will examine the organization, objectives and functions of the Kentucky Department of Education. This study will be directed by the State Commission on Public Education.



"It is true the Constitution provides for reapportionment every 10 years," the governor said, "and we have had no reapportionment in Kentucky since 1962. It is also true that all citizens of Kentucky are entitled to equality in legislative representation. I am of the opinion, however, that we have many more problems just as important as redistricting. The problems of education, highways, mental health, distressed areas, mental retardation, educational television, homes for the aged are to me just as important as mathematical population equality in every legislative district. The conflict in the Constitution itself (arising from a prohibition against more than a two-county district) needs to be resolved; the question whether the 1964 Legislature can undo the work of a special session needs to be considered. In particular, consideration should be given to some sensible plan which can be sold to the legislature and which will stand up in court. "A sound plan is more important than speedy action. The ideal solution would be to work out a bipartisan plan of action which would be endorsed by both political parties and by all of those groups genuinely interested in redistricting."

## Loans Are Available For Farm Forestry

Recent legislation passed by Congress authorizes Farmers Home Administration to make loans for farm forestry. In making a Farm Ownership Loan or an Individual Soil & Water Loan, funds may be needed for forestry purposes.

Based on an acceptable plan for the operation and management of the forest land and with a reasonable assurance that the plan will be followed, loan funds may be used for clearing and preparing land for forestry planning, the purchasing and planning for seeds or seedlings, the costs related to the establishment of approved forestry practices on a farm including expenses for fencing, insect, disease and pest control, thinning and removal of weed trees, fire protection and the development and improvement of fire lanes.

Funds may also be included in a Farm Ownership Loan to acquire a farm that will be partly or wholly forest land and to refinance debts against the forest land on such a farm.

Each loan will be scheduled for repayment within the shortest period within the ability of the borrower to repay from any source of income, not to exceed 40 years. The rate of interest for funds advanced for forestry purposes will be 3 percent on the unpaid principal balance.

Applicants are responsible for getting technical assistance from the U.S. Forest Service, Soil Conservation Service, or other competent technicians in developing a forest plan.

The Farmers Home Administration office serving Rowan County is located in the court house in Morehead. The office is open each Monday morning from 9 a.m. to noon.

## Pamphlet Recites How To Watch TV

Goggle-eyed from watching TV? Well, there's no need to worry about television robbing you of good vision.

A pamphlet issued by the National Society For the Prevention of Blindness reports that you can wear out your eyes, no matter how many late movies you tune into.

That is, provided you follow some simple rules. The first has to do with lighting. A fairly intense light is transmitted by your TV set; therefore, relaxed viewing depends on the lighting in your home. Additional light is necessary; it should not

bounce off the screen into your eyes.

"Television headache" is caused by fluttering, blurry or stony picture. Such vibrations and distortions put an extra work load on your eyes. Be sure the set is properly focused.

Eye strain may also result if you're watching the set from too great an angle. Place your set directly in front of the family's favorite chairs and make sure the screen is at eye level. Children should not watch TV from the floor because this causes fatigue of both the eyes and the neck muscles.

The size of your room, the

placement of the furniture and your own special preferences determine how far you should sit from the screen. Whatever seems comfortable to you is right for you.

Your eyes may feel tired after a really long session at the screen. You can avoid this by giving your eyes periodic rest intervals during an evening's viewing.

If you're still experiencing eye fatigue, the trouble is probably with your eyes. Have a thorough eye examination at once with an ophthalmologist—a doctor who specializes in eyes.

## Big Bone Park To Get Improvements

Approximately 100 additional acres are being purchased or leased for the expansion of Big Bone Lick State Park in Boone County.

Gov. Bert Combs, Park Board Chairman Henry Ward and Park Commissioner Edward V. Fox announced that five parcels make up the new acreage to be added to the present 18 acres making 118 acres.

The Northern Kentucky park. The cost is about \$800,000, Fox said.

Five parcels are involved. The 118-acre Black tract, a 30-acre tract known as the Marge property and two smaller parcels make up the approximately 166 acres to be purchased. The lease parcel contains four acres and will be leased for the period necessary to explore and excavate for fossil remains of mastodons and other ancient animal life.

On the park's present acreage, the state has built a shelter house, parking lot and picnic area.

Fox said the completion of the Markland Warfare Locks and Dam on the Ohio River will back up Big Bone Creek to or near the level of the newly acquired property and make that stream navigable for small craft. The Corps of Engineers project is expected to be completed within two years.

Congressman Carl D. Perkins argued today the federal government should build a large proposed trout hatchery on either the Licking or Kentucky rivers in the 7th District instead of the 5th (old 8th) District.

The 5th is predominantly Republican and Perkins thought some of his Democratic colleagues in Washington were not as cooperative as they should be.

Each of Kentucky's two Republican senators, its one Republican House member, and six of its seven Democratic representatives introduced identical bills. They were so worried that when and if the fish hatchery becomes reality, it would be in the district of Republican Eugene Siler, Williamsburg.

**'Somewhere in Kentucky'**  
That didn't suit Perkins. Insisting there are plenty of suitable creeks and rivers in the Democratic portion of Eastern Kentucky, Perkins introduced his own bill: It calls for the hatchery to be located somewhere "in the State of Kentucky."

The other bills specified that the Secretary of the Interior—who runs the Fish and Wildlife Service—locate the hatchery "on or near the Cumberland River in the eastern part of the State of Kentucky." That would mean the site probably would be below Wolf Creek

Dam, which creates Cumberland Lake.

## Overcooperative On Plan?

Perkins felt that his Democratic colleagues in the House were being overcooperative in helping to get a plan for a heavily Republican area on the eve of Republican Senator Thurston B. Morton's election contest with Democrat Wilson W. Wyatt.

This sentiment on the part of Perkins was accentuated by the fact that leadership on the House side for getting the project put in Siler's district was assumed by Democrat William H. Natcher, Bowling Green.

Perkins long has felt that Natcher, as a member of the House Appropriations Committee, is overly willing to share with Republican Senators Morton and John Sherman Cooper the credit for river development projects in Eastern Kentucky, to the exclusion of Perkins.

Other members explained that the reason Natcher handled the hatchery proposal was that when state officials came to Washington in May to propose the project, they had hoped to get an appropriation in the current bill.

**Offers To Find Sites**  
However, when they found it was too late to get the hatchery money this month, they left with Natcher the assignment of getting the delegation to approve a measure authorizing the work in the future.

Perkins said he sent a telegram to Minor Clark, of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, saying he doubted the propriety of limiting the hatchery site to Siler's district. He said he volunteered to find plenty of sites on the Big Sandy or the Licking rivers that would provide ample supplies of fresh water.

Other sponsors of the Wolf Creek Dam location, according to an announcement by Cooper and Morton, were Frank Chief, Lebanon; Brent Spencer, Fort Thomas; Frank A. Stubblefield, Murray; John C. Watts, Nicholasville; and Frank W. Burke, Louisville.

## NO FEAR OF NEW CRISIS



## Budworms Major Tobacco Problem

Budworms are causing a lot of trouble in Kentucky tobacco fields, according to the University of Kentucky Entomology and Botany Department. Judging from the inquiries received about the pest, the UK entomologists believe that budworm infestation this year is the worst in at least 10 years.

The tobacco budworm is a caterpillar which varies in color from green to tan to black. It feeds on the buds on outer leaves of tobacco plants. You can note its presence by medium-size holes in the leaves. Budworms are hard to kill and this year, some insecticides are not giving complete control when used at the rates formerly recommended.

Here are the latest recommendations as given by Richard Thurston, UK Ag Experiment Station entomologist. DDT, applied at the rate of 1 pound actual insecticide per acre, is the best control material. Next is Endrin—0.4 pound actual material per acre. The recommended amount of actual Endrin has been increased from 0.2 to 0.4 pound per acre because of the heavy budworm infestation.

Thurston believes this will give more effective control. The other recommended material is Sevin at 1.0 pound per acre. 
