

## ICC to hold mock trial Dec. 4

During the fall semester, Morehead State University students in the Government/Interdisciplinary International Studies 368 Human Rights and Global Justice course formed the Morehead State University Model International Criminal Court.

Now, the 26 students are preparing for a full scale trial simulation of an individual charged with committing war crimes and crimes against humanity.

The mock trial of Thomas Lubanga Dyilo, leader of the United Patriotic Front, a rebel group from the Democratic Republic of Congo, will be held on Monday, Dec. 4, at 6 p.m. in the Kibbey Seminar Room 109 of the Bert Combs Building.

"I have received many e-mails, telephone calls and office visits from students who are encouraged by having areas through which to channel their passions into activism. It is very rewarding to see them identify, refine and pursue these passions," said Noelle N'Diaye, assistant professor of government and MICC convener. "It is also very encouraging to have the constant support of my colleagues in the department and the highest levels of the administration as we seek to engage students in these higher purposes."

Students in the course each assumed roles parallel to those in the actual International Criminal Court, located in The Hague, Netherlands. The International Criminal Court is charged with hearing cases involving the most serious crimes against humanity including genocide, conscription of child soldiers, forcible relocation and attacks on civilians. The case against Dyilo is currently in the trial phase in The Hague.

Students spent the first half of the semester learning about matters which complicate international justice, including national sovereignty and conflicting ideas about jurisdiction. The students engaged in discussions about the promise of an international criminal court and the barriers to its realization, including strong opposition from the United States. They also assume the identity of a delegate from a country that is involved in the ICC and report on the status of human rights protections in their country.

During the second half of the term, the students formed the Model International Criminal Court and began simulating the structure, purposes and roles of the Court. The roles include those of Presidency, the Judicial Chambers, the Office of the Prosecutor, the Defense, and the administrative Registry.

The trial is the culmination of a series of events that have emanated from the Department of Geography, Government and History campaign titled, the Morehead State University "Year of Conscience."

"Before taking this class, I had some knowledge about what was going on in other places in the world. Now I am acutely aware of just how vast the scale of injustice is, and more than that, I actually feel like I can make a difference," said Chris Hess, pre-trial chamber judge and a Paintsville sophomore. "It seems that now, whenever I watch or read the news, I'm automatically drawn to global issues. I wasn't like this before joining the Model International Criminal Court."

The purpose of the Morehead State University Year of Conscience is twofold:

(1) To increase campus and community awareness and inspire student activism around humanitarian and human rights issues such as: genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes.

(2) To build name recognition for the newly installed MSU Model International Criminal Court--a course that helps students learn about human rights and global justice by engaging the concepts of international justice through simulation. The course culminates with the trial of an individual charged with committing war crimes and crimes against humanity.

"Preparation for this competition is an intense mix of rehearsals, coaching and individual lessons," said Nathan Nabb, assistant professor of saxophone. "It involves an enormous amount of time and dedication from the students, and I could not be more proud of them."

This marks the second consecutive year that MSU saxophone students have won the competition in both solo and chamber music.

## Vintage uniform presented to MSU

The former head of Morehead State University's nursing department recently presented a piece of history to the institution.

Dr. Doris McDowell, first chair of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences (now the [Department of Nursing](#) and the [Department of Imaging Sciences](#)), visited campus and presented an original uniform, initially worn by nursing students in 1970-71.

Now retired and living in Louisville, Dr. McDowell served as chair from 1970-74. During her first term as chair, she started an associate degree nursing program, an initiative begun by then Dean C. Nelson Grote, who later became MSU's 11th president. Dr. Grote recruited Dr. McDowell from

the state's Department of Education where she had previous experience in the administration of licensed practical nursing (LPN) programs.

MSU's first nursing class had 20 students admitted and hired two faculty members, Dr. Betty Porter, now retired chair of the NAHS department, and Sister Thomasina. Dr. McDowell said most of the clinical experiences were at what is now St. Claire Regional Medical Center, as well as Eastern State Hospital and a local long-term care facility.

"I thought there was a need for nursing here and the people in the area needed an opportunity like this," Dr. McDowell said. "Dr. Nelson Grote was instrumental in getting the nursing program started and was always encouraging to us."

The first class graduated 21 students, adding one transfer student along the way. Dr. McDowell said she was "quite proud of those graduates and remember well the hard efforts involved by both students and faculty." During her recent campus visit, she said she was overwhelmed by the rows of nursing graduates' portraits on the walls, indicative of the growth the nursing programs have enjoyed over the years.

The uniform Dr. McDowell contributed will be on display in the Department of Nursing in the future, and is currently stored in University archives in the [Camden-Carroll Library](#) , according to Dr. Erla Mowbray, department chair.

## Dr. Phillips will become chair July 1

Dr. Clarendia M. Phillips, associate professor of sociology, has been named chair of the Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology at Morehead State University, effective July 1.

Having earned Ph.D. and M.A. degrees in sociology from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and a B.A. degree in sociology from DePauw University, Dr. Phillips worked as a senior research associate with Policy Studies Associates Inc. in Washington, D.C. before starting her career at Morehead State in 2000.

"Dr. Phillips has not only established a strong record of teaching, scholarly productivity and professional service, but she has demonstrated effective leadership skills and a genuine desire to lead an interdisciplinary academic unit in its efforts to meet the changing educational needs of 21<sup>st</sup> Century students," according to Dr. Michael Seelig, dean of the Caudill College of Humanities.

In addition to faculty responsibilities, Dr. Phillips served as assistant provost, heading major campus initiatives and projects including those related to diversity for the past two academic years. She was awarded a prestigious National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) postdoctoral fellowship for the 2003-04 academic year to conduct research with the University of Kentucky College of Medicine's Department of Behavioral Science.

She is a member of the first class admitted to the MSU President's Leadership Academy and a former director of the MSU Interdisciplinary Women's Studies Program. Dr. Phillips is currently the principal investigator and project director for the Governor's Minority College Preparation Program, funded through a grant awarded by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education.

"Dr. Phillips has published several books and manuscripts, and has presented many papers at professional conferences, all of which reflect her professional interest in issues of race and ethnicity, social inequality, family, mental health and research methods," said Dr. Seelig. "She has made a significant impact on this campus in a relatively short period of time and I am absolutely delighted to have her as a member of the college's leadership and management team."

Dr. Phillips is a member of several University, college and department committees and assumes major leadership roles on many of them. In addition to the NIMH Fellowship, she has been honored by other professional associations including Theta Phi Honor Society and the American Sociological Association. Her professional activities have taken her to the continents of Asia and Africa.

"Dr. Phillips is motivated more by calling than ambition and will obtain great satisfaction in being of service in her new role to her faculty, staff and students," Dr. Seelig added.

The Department of Sociology, Social Work and Criminology has approximately 25 faculty and staff members and serves nearly 500 graduate and undergraduate student majors in addition to supporting regional campuses and the general education program.

Some of the challenges facing Dr. Phillips and the faculty involve expansion of the social work program to multiple regional campus sites, advancing distance learning and online course offerings, increasing enrollment in criminology and graduate sociology programs, and taking a lead in community engagement and regional stewardship initiatives.

## Robotics team among the top in nation

Morehead State University's robotics team finished among the top teams at the recent collegiate Tele-Operated Robotic Manipulator Contest in Cleveland.

The MSU team earned second place honors at the contest, held in conjunction with the 2006 National Association of Industrial Technology (NAIT) Convention Nov. 15-19. A total of 14 universities participated in the event, according to Dr. Ahmad Zargari, chair of the Department of Industrial and Engineering Technology (IET).

For the contest, team members were required to design and build their own robotic manipulator without using any robotic kits or off-the-shelf robot manipulators, and also prepare a technical, detailed poster about the device. The robot was required to run an obstacle course, pick up and carry an 8-inch long piece of 1.5 inch EMT conduit and place it through a 3-inch hole at the end of the course.

In the contest, MSU competed against teams from Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University, North Carolina A&T State University, Iowa State University, Missouri State University, Central Connecticut University, University of North Dakota, Millersville University of Pennsylvania, Spoon River College, Ohio-Northern University, California Polytechnic State University, Indiana State University and the University of Wisconsin-Platteville.

David Nickel, **Greenup** senior, ranked fourth place in the IT/IQ student contest out of the 59 students that participated. Three of Morehead State's IET students advanced to the semi-final round.

In addition to Nickel, team included: Jimmy Higdon, **Springfield** junior; Jace Green, **Shelbyville** senior; Matthew Slone, **Morehead** sophomore; Daniel Watson, **Raceland** junior; William Lindberg, **Flemingsburg** senior; and Brandon Osborne, **Virgie** senior.

## Lt. Gov. Pence brings cancer message to campus

Lt. Gov. Steve Pence will come to Morehead State University on Monday, Dec. 11, to bring his message about a nationwide cancer awareness campaign to students and the campus community.

Pence will speak on "Ending Cervical Cancer In Our Lifetime," a 10-state pilot project organized by the National Lieutenant Governors Association. The informational meeting will be held at 3 p.m. in Button Auditorium.

"Our goal is to encourage women of all ages to be proactive about their health. Cervical cancer is a disease that often times can be preventable," said Pence. "If we can educate Kentucky women about cervical cancer and the factors that can cause it through this public awareness campaign, I will consider it a great success."

Pence will be joined by Dr. Jeffrey L. Ellis of St. Claire Regional Medical Center in Morehead, and associate professor of pathology at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. Dr. Ellis will speak on the science of the disease, and will offer clinical information about prevention and treatment.

MSU President Wayne D. Andrews will underscore his concern for students' health by participating in the event.

"Cervical cancer has shortened or drastically changed too many women's lives," he said. "We at MSU are pleased to unite with the lieutenant governor and his colleagues in this national crusade to wipe out a deadly disease."

Dr. William Melahn, medical director of MSU's Caudill Health Clinic, and Kenitha King, nurse administrator with the Office of Counseling and Health Services, will take part in the program. Additionally, several state legislators have been invited to attend.

Pence has been visiting college campuses across Kentucky, distributing educational brochures and speaking about the campaign. The project is funded through the National Lieutenant Governors Association by an independent policy grant from Merck & Co. Inc.

Sponsors for his MSU visit include the Office of the President, Student Government Association, Office of Counseling and Health Services and the Interdisciplinary Women's Studies Program.

A question and answer session is included on the agenda. There is no admission charge, and the public is encouraged to attend.

## Winter Commencement slated for Dec. 16

During the ceremony that begins at 10:30 a.m. in the Academic-Athletic Center, MSU President Wayne D. Andrews will confer degrees on more than 550 graduate and undergraduate students.

Cundiff is a candidate for a Bachelor of Arts degree in the College of Education. An honors graduate, she has completed a degree in elementary education, preschool through fifth grades, with a component in English.

This semester, she was a student teacher at Tilden Hogge Elementary School in Rowan County. Earlier in the year, she was an in-home tutor in primary reading and math.

The daughter of MSU alumni Curt and Janie Cundiff, she was introduced to education at an early age as both her parents were elementary school teachers. Cundiff admits that as a youngster, she enjoyed "playing school" with her in the role of the teacher.

She chose education as a career because she "wanted to be a positive influence in the lives of young people." However, teaching is not for everyone and she offers this advice to those who would like to teach: "make sure you enjoy children and have a good sense of humor," both of which Cundiff does. ## Student recognized for research

King won a \$1,500 scholarship for the "best undergraduate poster" from the Rubber Division of the American Chemical Society for her poster titled, "Anionic Synthesis and Functionalization of Poly(styryl)lithium with Dimethylchlorosilane followed by Hydrosilation with Vinyltrimethoxysilane."

She picked up the honor during the 3rd Student Colloquium at the Oct. 2006 ACS Rubber Division meeting in Cincinnati.

King also received one of 24 first place awards for outstanding scientific research presentations at the 2006 Sigma Xi Student Research Conference in Detroit. She accepted a cash award of \$200 for her chemistry research project, which used the same title as the poster.

She was recognized at an awards ceremony with a certificate and an invitation to join Sigma Xi, the scientific research society. Membership in the international honor society of science and engineering is by invitation only, based on research achievements or potential.

Nearly 200 undergraduate and graduate students, representing 100 institutions, participated in the conference, for which General Motors was Platinum Sponsor this year. Sigma Xi members attending the society's annual meeting served as judges for poster and oral presentations.

King also attended career advancement workshops and participated in mentoring and networking activities, panel discussions and other events. She heard talks by leading scientists who received prestigious annual Sigma Xi awards.

Founded in 1886, Sigma Xi is the international honor society of research scientists and engineers, with approximately 65,000 members and more than 500 chapters in North America and overseas. The non-profit society publishes American Scientist magazine and sponsors a variety of programs that support science and engineering.

## Lt. Gov. Pence promotes cancer awareness at MSU

The state's lieutenant governor visited Morehead State University (Dec. 11), telling students about a nationwide awareness campaign aimed at preventing needless deaths from cervical cancer.

Lt. Gov. Steve Pence, a member of the National Lieutenant Governors Association, has been touring Kentucky university campuses in support of the association's 10-state pilot program, "Ending Cervical Cancer In Our Lifetime."

"The National Lieutenant Governors Association has taken up the mantle on what I think is a very worthy cause," Pence said. "I am happy to be visiting Morehead today to bring attention to a disease that can strike any woman," he said.

Pence said the reason he was out on campuses is that "some women simply don't know" enough about the disease, which is the 11th most common killer of women in the United States.

"Our goal is to encourage college women to be proactive about their health, visit the doctor regularly and educate themselves about the risks and treatment options available for cervical cancer."

MSU President Wayne D. Andrews applauded Pence for bringing attention to this health issue.

"We appreciate the lieutenant governor's commitment to this effort to create more awareness of cervical cancer and to help women of all ages understand this potential threat to their health."

Pence shared information about a vaccine that is now available to combat the HPV (Human Papillomavirus) strains that cause cervical cancer. The vaccine, developed at the University of Louisville's James Graham Brown Cancer Center, has been clinically proven to prevent the disease.

Dr. Jeffrey Ellis, pathologist and medical director at St. Claire Regional Medical Center laboratories in Morehead, and associate professor of pathology at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine, presented information on the cancer's cause, detection and treatment.

Dr. Ellis explained that while HPV is common and there are more than 200 strains, the virus is tissue specific and can lead to conditions as simple as skin warts. But four specific strains of HPV cause about 80 percent of all cases of cervical cancer.

Getting a regular pap smear is crucial to detecting the virus, according to Dr. Ellis.

"A pap is the single most effective cancer reduction program ever devised."

However, Dr. Ellis cautioned that while a pap is a "great test," it only detects about 50 percent of abnormalities of the cervical cells. He advised that women get regular pap tests to help ensure that the abnormal cells are detected.

"If you remember nothing of what I say here today, remember this: if you're 21, or less than 21 and sexually active, you need to get regular pap smears and exams by a health care provider," he said. "You need to be the one in control of your own destiny."

Dr. Ellis said the new vaccine is being suggested for preadolescent girls in the 11-12 years of age range, with "catch-up" shots for women as old as 26. While the vaccine currently may be cost prohibitive at about \$400, it may be covered under a woman's health insurance.

Dr. William Melahn, director of MSU's Caudill Health Clinic, was among the health care professionals at the informational session. He said pap tests are available to students at the clinic for a nominal charge, and that arrangements may be made to have them conducted at the Rowan County Health Center at no cost.

"There are very few times where we can say we have cured cancer," Pence said. "Early detection of cervical cancer can prevent death."

## Cadet ranked third in nation

Morehead State University ROTC's Battalion Commander Shannon Niki Martin, **Louisville** senior, has received a ranking of third out of 3,806 cadets from 272 universities across the nation, not including West Point.

She is the highest ranking cadet in Morehead State's ROTC history and has been top of her class for four years.

"Her achievements have not only brought national recognition and honor to her as an individual, but are a testimony of the training standards of our ROTC Program and the quality education provided at MSU," said Lt. Col. Bonnie A. Noyes, professor of military science.

The national ranking system, called "order of merit" list, is a combination of accomplishments from the last three years. The top 20 percent (762 out of the 3,806) are Distinguished Military Graduates.

Every cadet is rated on a point system based on activities completed during the last three years. A number of factors go into a session packet and all 3,806 cadets are ranked according to the number of points they achieved.

Students are judged on grade point average (40 percent), Martin has a 3.94; Military performance (45 percent), which includes her evaluations from Warrior Forge (summer training at Ft. Lewis, Wash.) and ranking among her platoon at Warrior Forge (she was first of 48 cadets in her platoon), land navigation score and extracurricular activities.

Martin, a health promotion major and military science minor, is involved in the Kappa Delta sorority and Raider Company (ROTC fraternity), and president of Scabbard and Blade (national military honors society) which she re-established on campus. She is a member of the Eta Sigma Gamma (national health honors society) and was a workstudy for two years.

The final 15 percent is the physical aspect which encompasses her Army Physical Fitness Test scores from the campus and Warrior Forge and Combat Water Survival Training scores.

Martin will be commissioned in May as an active duty second lieutenant in the Medical Service Corps.

## Dr. Regan named to state advisory panel

One of Morehead State University's department chairs has been appointed to a state health information advisory panel.

Dr. Elizabeth (Betty) Regan, chair of the Department of Information Systems in MSU's College of Business, has been appointed to the Kentucky E-Health Network Advisory Group. The advisory group, which reports to the E-Health Network Board, is charged with developing strategies and a business plan for the Kentucky e-health network by early 2007. Among its purposes are to improve the quality of patient care and the public health of all Kentuckians, support clinician and caregiver decision making through health information technology and exchange, increase the safety and efficiency of the state's health care system and lower costs and increase value for consumers and stakeholders.

"Electronic medical records hold tremendous potential to improve American healthcare. Patients and their medical providers will be able to access needed information at anytime from anyplace," said Dr. Regan.

"E-medical records are more secure, improve safety, lower costs and enable doctors to collaborate much more easily in providing patient care. State and regional initiatives to create health information networks will help put Kentucky in the forefront to benefit from these new opportunities."

Dr. Regan has served as an MSU department chair since 1998. Her previous academic experience includes teaching graduate students at New York University and the University of Connecticut's schools of education and business administration.

A former corporate professional, she was a senior systems consultant and senior project manager in designing and implementing major information systems, corporate initiatives and reengineering projects.

She holds the Ph.D. degree from the University of Connecticut, and did postgraduate work in information systems and vocational education at Colorado State University. She also holds master's and bachelor's degrees from Connecticut and an associate degree from Green Mountain College.

Her research interests include strategic information systems, business process innovation and redesign, e-commerce and health information technology. She has been published in numerous refereed journals, including international journals, and has made presentations and/or has been a visiting lecturer in various locations in Europe and Asia.

## Doan recognized by naming of room

The man that brought Morehead State University prominence in the world of cheerleading has been honored by permanently naming a facility on the campus.

Myron Doan was saluted for all the years and hard work put forth to make his cheerleaders some of the elite in the nation. The former Eagle coach, along with other dignitaries, was on hand for the ceremony naming the "Myron Doan Cheerleading Practice Room" in the Academic-Athletic Center.

"I am honored and humbled to be recognized in such a way," Doan said of the naming. "I have had the good fortune to work with a number of student athletes who devoted their time and enthusiasm to represent the University."

At the ceremony held during the 2006 Homecoming festivities, MSU President Wayne D. Andrews welcomed the crowd, which was followed by remarks from MSU's current squad coach Tony Nash.

Former cheerleader Russ Shaw of Leesburg, Va., led the tribute to Doan, who responded with heartfelt thank you's. Madonna Weathers, vice president of student life, concluded the ceremony with her comments.

Doan retired as dean of students at MSU in 2004. Since 1981, he had coached the varsity cheerleading squad, capturing 14 national championships. From 1994 until his retirement, he also coached the all-girl cheerleaders, which won four national titles.

His expertise gained recognition outside the campus and he was named the 2002 Coach of the Year by the American Cheerleader Magazine.

Active in other aspects of University life, Doan served as chapter adviser for Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity for 26 years and chaired numerous committees during his 34-year career at Morehead State. He also was a staff member of the campus radio station, now called Morehead State Public Radio.

The native of Falmouth, he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1971 and a Master of Arts degree in 1973, both from MSU.

Doan is a member of the Morehead State Alumni Hall of Fame.

When he retired, a group of former cheerleaders began an endowment fund to name the practice room in recognition of Doan's dedication. Proceeds from the endowment will be used to support the cheerleading program, including travel expenses, equipment and uniforms.

Traditionally, naming of facilities has been a permanent means of recognizing those who have provided outstanding support, financial or otherwise, to the institution or given exemplary personal service over a sustained period. The procedure requires recommendation of the president and approval of the Board of Regents. The Board ratified the action at its recent quarterly meeting.

## Professor's sculpture dedicated on Staten Island

Morehead State University art professor Stephen J. Tirone has been described as a very talented man. His works are not only on the MSU campus but are located throughout the area.

About five years ago, his friend Gino Terranova, a former Marine, saw some of his bronze and marble sculptures. Terranova liked what he saw and asked Tirone, another former Marine, if he could do something that paid tribute to all the Marines, past and present.

Tirone was commissioned by the Marine Corps League in March 2005. During the time he worked on the project, Terranova, Harold Lane, another former Marine, and Mario Terranova, an Army veteran, visited his home studio to observe the piece in progress.

After 15 months, the cast bronze work was done. Now, it was time to unveil the sculpture and Memorial Day 2006 turned out to be a very special day for Tirone.

His sculpture of the marine was installed at the Marine Corps League detachment 246 on the borough of Staten Island, New York City. It meant a lot to the artist for a number of reasons.

"It was an enormous honor to me to create this sculpture," said Tirone. "It is special for several reasons.

"It is special first, as a friend of Gino, and as a former Marine. Second, because it is installed close to where I grew up and more importantly it was the first time that my family was able to celebrate with me."

During his time with MSU, he has been honored on numerous occasions. In April, he was presented the Distinguished Creative Productions Award.

Before joining the MSU faculty in 1982, Tirone was a visiting artist and instructor at West Liberty (W.Va.) State College. He grew up in New York City, which gave him access to all levels of art. Tirone received a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of South Carolina-Columbia, and earned a Master of Arts degree, along with a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Wisconsin.

The veteran artist has worked mostly in ceramics and sculpture and has been teaching and actively producing creative works in both media for more than 20 years.

One of Tirone's lasting gifts to the University is the MSU Sculpture Concourse, located near Ginger and Radar halls on the campus, in which he has been involved since its inception. During Homecoming 2006, the concourse was dedicated in the educator's honor.

The work on the concourse earned him the title of 2006 Outstanding Fund Raiser of the Year by the MSU Foundation Inc.

## Voter turnout has increased

Turnout among 18-29 year-old voters increased by more than two million in the 2006 general elections compared to 2002, according to exit poll analysis released as part of the first comprehensive look at the youth vote in the midterm elections, presented by Young Voter Strategies.

To help get younger voters out, Morehead State University held voter registration through MSU 101 classes, by faculty members and peer advisers. The MSU project, which was funded by a grant, had a goal of determining which method produced the actual best voter turnout.

At least 10 million votes were cast by this age group in 2006 compared to eight million in 2002, and the vote counts are still coming in. Youth-dense precincts that were targeted by Get-Out-the-Vote campaigns showed even larger increases. Turnout more than doubled in the 36 precincts where groups like the nonpartisan Student PIRG's New Voters Project actively turned out this age cohort.

Also released, a new bipartisan poll by Ed Goeas and Celinda Lake shows that in 2006 young voters were motivated primarily by a strong desire for change, combined with high levels of contact from campaigns and nonpartisan organizations: 61 percent of those who were surveyed said they feel the country is on the "wrong track" and 52 percent report being contacted by a campaign.

An analysis of the National Election Pool's exit poll for 18-29 year-olds, conducted by the University of Maryland's Center for Information and Research on Civic Learning and Engagement (CIRCLE) found that turnout among 18-29 year olds increased at least four percentage points over 2002 figures, to 24 percent. This is a greater increase than was seen in the overall electorate; the share of votes cast by young people increased by at least two points.

Further, vote tallies from youth-dense precincts in eight states showed even greater young voter turnout increases in areas targeted by nonpartisan registration and mobilization efforts.

The Student PIRG's registered more than 75,000 students to vote and ran nonpartisan GOTV operations on 80 campuses in 2006.

The bipartisan polling team of Goeas and Lake—who have followed this cohort throughout the 2006 elections—released the initial findings of the first post-election "Young Voter Battleground Poll ." The poll which looked at motivations for youth going to the polls, surveyed 500 18-30 year-olds and has a margin of error of +/-4.4.

Key findings include:

- 58 percent talked a great deal/some with family and friends about the elections.
- Young people listed education and college costs, the war in Iraq, and the economy as areas of concern they want Congress to address.
- Young people said the most important issue to them when deciding who to vote for was the war in Iraq, at 43 percent.
- At the same time, 60 percent reported dissatisfaction with the President's actions on those issues.
- 61 percent of young adults surveyed said they believe that America is on the wrong track; 31 percent on the right track.
- Of those surveyed, 46 percent were contacted by a political campaign or organization during the 2006 election cycle. The majority of the contacts remembered by young voters were by phone and mail.

Young voters made their voices heard at the in the most recent election. At 42 million strong and growing, this generation has become a force in politics and will continue to grow in importance as more and more vote in each election.

During his brief trip, he saw to the care of herds of farm animals, the existence of which was for the purpose of helping to feed children abandoned to orphanages in these countries. He and his group of nine other people also took supplies and provided information so that these people could continue to care for their animals after the group had departed.

Dr. Prater came to Morehead State in 1998 from Bedford Hill Veterinary Hospital in Paris which he owned and operated from 1989-1998. He received his DVM degree from Ohio State University and did his residency in

theriogenology at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville.

This award is given for outstanding service to the veterinary profession, said Dr. Scott Rundell, coordinator of MSU's Veterinary Technology Program. "We are very proud of Dr. Prater's accomplishments and pleased that he has received this important recognition from his colleagues."

Dr. Rundell was the 2001 recipient of the same award, which he received for dedicated work with the Veterinary Technology Program.
