

FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.

Everything Quiet in Rowan—Judge Stewart Ruled out and the Cases Postponed.

MOREHEAD, KY., July 7.—All is quiet this evening at the seat of war. Owing to the absence of witnesses, court did not convene until 8 o'clock this P. M. The defendants filed their affidavits, stating that they did not believe they could get a fair trial before County Judge James Stewart. The Judge made an order directing the Sheriff to summon two magistrates to convene as an examining court to try the prisoners, and all the cases were adjourned until the 9th inst. Hon. K. F. Prichard, of Catlettsburg, is here representing the defendants. This evening Sheriff McKenzie, with a detachment of soldiers, searched the residence of Howard M. Logan, where it was reported Cook Humphrey was concealed, but he was not there. As yet no member of the Martin faction has been found, while all the Tolliver faction have surrendered themselves into the hands of the civil authorities, and seem anxious for a full, free and fair investigation of the troubles.

Ed Pierce, the noted desperado, who was brought here by Humphrey to murder Col. Z. T. Young and others, was brought here this evening for an examining trial on the charge of shooting and wounding Col. Z. T. Young. J. M. Cary and H. M. Logan, who have been refugees for several days, arrived home to-day. Mr. Martin's examining trial is set for to-morrow.
